



GROWTH **Council deals with annexation, phones**

Growth was the key word of Monday night's meeting of the Iowa Park city council.

An ordinance setting the second required public hearing on the proposed annexation of Lake Iowa Park was approved.

The first hearing was held, without comment from the audience.

And growth of city offices has also brought about a need for more telephones at city hall.

With the expansion of the public works department into the former Chamber of Commerce wing of city hall, at least two telephones need to be added to the system.

Aldermen were asked to consider one of three plans to alleviate the problem: advertise for an upgraded telephone system, enter into a leasepurchase agreement, or run a separate phone line to the expanded office.

A separate line to the office would not enable those in the office to use the intercom system, and the cost of a different line and installation line would offset the cost of a new system that could include it, aldermen were told.

Council members appeared to be unreceptive to a lease-purchase.

With a trade-in of the current system, the upgraded system would permit up to 32 telephones, offer 18 outside lines, and cost \$7,141.

Administrator James Barrington was instructed to advertise for bids.

When he pointed out that the process would not make the bids available for the Dec. 12 meeting, aldermen said a called meeting could be held.

The ordinance addresses only the zoning fee, and does not change the existing building permit requirments, however.

Liability insurance, both because of coverage limit and premium fees, were changed to the Texas Municipal League, with council approval.

A 25-minute session was held behind closed doors by the council and police chief Alan Sheffield. The session was listed on the agenda as being for "deployment of security personnel or devices," but Mayor Tim Hunter said afterward there was no action to be taken.

During a discussion that the cable television company had informed the city it was raising its monthly fee by \$1.25, effective the first of the year, several aldermen said they had received complaints about the firm.

The primary complaint was that service was not made available to entire blocks of residences, such as a block near Kidwell Elementary.

district health policy manual, and consideration of hiring a firm to conduct a needs assessment of facilities.

Added to the agenda has been a proposal to participate in "Project 2000."

Board chairman Jimmy Howell said he would like an outside opinion from an expert on the district's future building needs.

He said the cost of such a study would be less than \$8,000, but with the elementary enrollment increases the district has experienced recently, a plan for expansions at the junior high and high school campuses were needed.

Action was tabled on the health policy manual after trustee John Sibley said he felt a section addressing the AIDS disease should be included.

Typed proposals for the at-risk plans and educational goals were not available at last week's meeting, and the superintendent said they would be ready for consideration today.

The district recently spent \$600 for an expert to identify 484 containers of unmarked chemicals stored at the high school, trustees were told.

Actually, the expert charged \$400 to identify the chemicals, and \$200 to tell the school how the con-

for \$3,825.

While some trustees said they felt that was excessive, Howell, who works at a chemical company in Wichita Falls, said he believed it to actually be lower than most bids.

No action was taken on the plan, but it is expected to be on next month's agenda.

Though the average daily attendance of all four campuses during October was slightly lower than the same month last year, the district's increase in enrollment is expected to generate approximately \$35,000 more money from the state next year.

Supt. Mitchell said attendance was only 96.73 percent, as compared with 97.27 during October 1987, but this year the average attendance was 1,755 students, as compared to 1,720.

Average Daily Attendance is reported during October, to establish the state's funding of the district.

Iowa Park schools, primarily the high school, experienced a decrease in enrollmen during November. The district had 1,897 students in October, and it was down to 1,879 in November, according to the report given trustees.

Enrollment dropped from 539 to 527 at the high school in November, where enrollment in 1987 was 544.

Police load increases with rash of thefts

Iowa Park police are investigating an unusually large number of thefts that have been reported during the past week.

A purse was reportedly stolen Wednesday of last week from a vehicle parked at 411 W. Texas.

Two tires were reportedly taken the next day from a structure at 1303 N. Pacific, and valued at \$150.

James Beals told police a king size wooden water bed and two garden hoses stored in one of the Mini-Con units on West Highway Nov. 1 were missing when he went there Saturday. A combination lock had apparently been cut from the door.

Pam Johnson, director of the Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center, reported to police Monday that someone had entered the building and taken two stereo speakers. They apparently had been left when thieves took the stereo a couple of weeks earlier.

Gasoline was reportedly stolen from a vehicle at 1218 S. Wall sometime Sunday night.

A 24-volt battery was taken sometime Monday night off the city's land scraper at the landfill. The theft was referred to the county, since the theft took place outside the city limits.

Sunday evening, police took Truxton Lee Fox, 35, into custody on two warrants issued by the Wichita County Sheriff's Office. He was later released to a deputy, according to the police blotter.


Iowa Park Future Farmers of America will hold a Christmas auction at 2 p.m. Saturday in the vocational agriculture building on the high school campus.

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In case it hasn't occurred to you, if you delve in dope or any type of an illegal controlled substance, you better not have it in Iowa Park.

In the past three weeks, 18 persons have been sent to county jail on drug related charges by the Iowa Park Police Department.

My comments in no way assumes any guilt or innocence of these 18, nor any other cases pending from local arrests.

But the plain fact is, drug use is not wanted in our community. That goes for both the police, and the citizens.

Drugs have a way of promoting all sorts of criminal activity. And I suspect a great many thefts that have been reported recently stem directly from the need for money with which to purchase illegal substances.

To admit drugs are in Iowa Park is not to condemn or disgrace our community. It's undoubtedly in all communities, regardless of size.

But we cannot bury our heads in the sand and attempt to ignore it so it will go away. It won't.

The lives of some wonderful people have been ruined by drugs. I know some, and I suffer for them, but more for their families.

But at the same time, I suffer for those who have lost property to the thieves who find it handy to take items to sell so they can buy their stuff.

You don't think people are stealing from farmsteads and homes just to use for themselves, do you?

Where we have more than we can put up with here in town, it's getting increasingly worse in the rural areas. Thieves can operate almost with impunity in the country, it appears.

One friend of mine told me it's getting so bad in his area, to the northwest of Iowa Park, that he feels sure someone's going to be shot; not by thieves, but thieves by farmers.

A couple of years ago, I passed off most of the stealing as a result of so many being unemployed when the oil patch activity virtually shut down.

I'm now convinced that's not the

When I came to town Monday morning, I noticed a couple city employees cutting down the few remaining parking meter poles. But they were leaving the several anchors and rings that were used earlier this cen-

tury for hitching horses. I don't remember when either were installed.

I do remember writing the stories that signaled the removal of the parking meters for the first time. It must have been late in the 1940s. I also remember announcing their return during the boom years of mid-1950s. And, of course, they came down again (I guess in the 1960s) when finding parking spaces ceased to be a problem.

I have sympathy for someone who is hooked on drugs, recognizes it, and wants to stop. I'll do all I can to help them.

But I hate a thief. And one who steals to satisfy his habit is even more despicable.

So, if you're using drugs, and have no intention of quitting, you are not wanted in Iowa Park.

You had best go look up Timothy O'Leary's friends. At least there, you might be welcome.

But if you stay, there's a pretty good chance that the Iowa Park Police may someday pay you a visit.

State officials to visit schools



Interviews will be conducted by team members beginning at 4 p.m. in the Iowa Park Junior High School library, 412 E. Cash.

Every school district in the state is required by law to be visited by an accreditation team from the TEA to evaluate the quality of its educational programs and to determine what progress the school district has made since the last visit.

During the interviews, emphasis will be given to the quality of instruction and community support present on each campus in the district.

Areas to be evaluated by the team include planning, curriculum, instruction, services to students, instructional resources, personnel, gov-



ernance, community conditions and physical facilities.

Jimmy Duggins scored 31 points against the Wildcats.





Two state legislators, Senator Hector Uribe and Representative Ron Wilson, have prefiled a bill in Austin that, if passed, will give the citizens of the state the chance to vote on a state lottery for Texas.

The bills call for a constitutional amendment that would remove the prohibition against games of chance. The measure requires that two-thirds of both houses of the Legislature vote for the amendment and then it must be approved by a majority of voters in the state.

If the amendment passes, then a Lottery Commission would be

the games. Eight states are collecting over \$1-billion each year from their lottery operations.

Uribe has estimated that Texas would make over \$300-million in the first year of operation and could double that amount in later years. With the problems of funding school districts, prison construction and mental health facilities, the prospect of increased revenues looks very good to some lawmakers.

With so many opinions on both sides of the issue, the Legislature should pass the amendment and let the people of Texas decide if they want a lottery. A statewide vote in November would settle the matter and if defeated would stop future Legislatures from wasting time discussing lotteries.

If the amendment passed, then a new source of revenue would be added to the state coffers. I suspect that a lottery would raise substantially more than \$600-million a year.

The idea of a state lottery is appealing. When you dutifully pay your six percent sales tax at the checkout counter and ante up your forty or fifth dollars for car tags there is absolutely no chance of ever seeing that money again.

With a lottery, even with the chances of one in a million, there is a chance that some of that money will find its way back to your pocket. Some people will overspend on lottery tickets, but those same people are now finding some other way to waste their paychecks.

Above all the lottery would be a voluntary tax. If you did not want to play, no one would force you to buy a ticket.

A voluntary tax with a chance of a return may be just the answer to give the rest of us some relief from growing state taxes. JIM HUDSON **Perryton Herald**

out by the governor's office a couple of weeks ago. If you think that drugs in Texas are something pedaled by teen-agers to friends on parking lots, think again.

According to the criminal justice division in the governor's office, illegal drug operations in this state are big and sophisticated.

Last year, police in McAllen stopped a 1986 Chevrolet Blazer because of an unsecured seatbelt violation driven by a known narcotics trafficker.

The untrained eye would think the Blazer looked normal. Closer inspection, however, revealed bulletproof windows, steel plating and Kevlar floor matting -- armour designed to stop direct hits from highpowered bullets.

Electronically detonated tear gas ports were hidden behind fake reflectors and aimed laterally from each side of the front and rear fenders. The tear gas could be fired from switches marked "safe" on a control panel below the steering wheel.

Also found in the vehicle was a cache of automatic weapons and one ounce of cocaine.

In another stop, according to the report, the West Texas Multi-County Narcotics Trafficking Task Force in El Paso confiscated 15 AK-47 semiautomatic rifles manufactured in Communist China, along with 14 bayonets, 3,000 rounds of ammunition and \$14,000 in cash. The weapons were said to be traded for drugs in Mexico.

While making an aerial survey in Lamar County, a helicopter flown by a DPS agent was fired upon and hit two times by a man with rifle guarding what appeared to be a field of marijuana.

A cougar was part of the security arrangements which included the latest high-tech surveillance equipment at a clandestine lab in East Texas. The task force there confiscated \$5million worth of methamphetamine.

Commonwealth Production of Dallas has posted first production figures for a pair of new wells in Wichita County Regular Field, 3.5 miles northeast of Clara.

The wells are designated as the No. 16-C and 20-C C. Birk.

The No. 16-C showed ability to pump 12 barrels of oil per day plus 30 barrels of water and a slight show of gas, while the No. 20-C pumped 48 barrels of oil daily and 10 barrels of water, after being bottomed at 1,692 and 1,687 feet, respectively.

Production intervals will be in the Gunsight Sand at 1,629 to 1,644 feet into the wellbores.

The wells are located in a 160acre lease 305 feet from the south line and 1.440 feet from the east line. and also 640 feet from the south line and 810 feet from the east line of the F. Huseman Survey, respectively.

A new oil producer has been brought on line in Wichita County Regular Field, with West Landrum of Burkburnett as the operator.

Located one-half mile northeast of Kamay, the well is in a 314-acre lease 1,830 feet from the south line and 1,700 feet-from the west line of Block 30 in the KWVFL S/D Survey. It is designated as the No. 27-L Bailey.

It pumped 21 barrels of oil per day plus 43 barrels of water from perforations in the gunsight Sand at 1,762 to 1,770 feet into the hole. The well bottomed at 1,810 feet.

Texo Oil of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The operator has 60 acres leased, with drillsite 2.075 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the west line of Block 5 in the SA&MG Survey. It is designated as the No. 31 S.B. Burnett "B." Drillsite is two miles south of Fowlkes.

Commonwealth Production of Dallas has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 17-C Birk "C." It was a developmental try

Drillsite is one mile northeast of Margaret.

A new oil producer has been brought on line in Hardeman County's Kadane Cato Field, with Paul DeCleva Inc. of Wichita Falls as the operator.

Located five miles southeast of Medicine Mounds, the well is in a 40acre lease 1,348 feet from the north line and 1,555 feet from the east line of block 16 in the H&TC Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 Grange.

On an 8/64-in. choke, it flowed 100 barrels of oil per day, along with 74,000 CF casinghead gas. Flow pressure registered 910 PSI.

The well bottomed at 8,300 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Cordell Sand at 9,194 to 9,388 feet into the hole.

At a location five miles northeast of Quanah, Trio Operating of Wichita Falls has finaled a new oil producer in Hardeman County's Groesbeck Creek Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1-A Wells, pumping 38 barrels of oil per day, along with 12,400 CF casinghead gas and 63 barrels of water.

Location is in a 285-acre lease 2, 622 feet from the south line and 2,210 feet from the west line of


section 96, Block H in the W&NW Survey.





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
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ESA benefit dance slated Sunday
