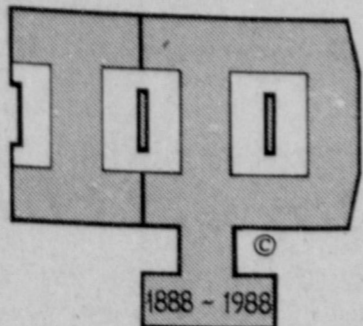

## GROWTH

### Council deals with annexation, phones

Growth was the key word of Monday night's meeting of the Iowa Park city council.

An ordinance setting the second required public hearing on the proposed annexation of Lake Iowa Park was approved.

The first hearing was held, without comment from the audience.

And growth of city offices has also brought about a need for more telephones at city hall.

With the expansion of the public works department into the former Chamber of Commerce wing of city hall, at least two telephones need to be added to the system.

But the problem is, that exceeds

the limits of the system purchased about four years ago.

Aldermen were asked to consider one of three plans to alleviate the problem: advertise for an upgraded telephone system, enter into a lease-purchase agreement, or run a separate phone line to the expanded office.

A separate line to the office would not enable those in the office to use the intercom system, and the cost of a different line and installation line would offset the cost of a new system that could include it, aldermen were told.

Council members appeared to be unreceptive to a lease-purchase.

With a trade-in of the current system, the upgraded system would permit up to 32 telephones, offer 18 outside lines, and cost \$7,141.

Administrator James Barrington was instructed to advertise for bids.

When he pointed out that the process would not make the bids available for the Dec. 12 meeting, aldermen said a called meeting could be held.

Other business during the meeting included an ordinance amending the code to provide for certain exclusions from requiring zoning permit fees; accepting work on a sewer lift station west of town; changing the police/public official liability insurance coverage, and an executive session.

No longer will the \$1 zoning fee be required on reroofing of existing structures, remodeling interiors of existing structures, and adding to the exterior of a building such features as siding, shutters and similar cosmetic

or insulating improvements, as long as the work does not increase nor decrease from the original dimensions.

The ordinance addresses only the zoning fee, and does not change the existing building permit requirements, however.

Liability insurance, both because of coverage limit and premium fees, were changed to the Texas Municipal League, with council approval.

A 25-minute session was held behind closed doors by the council and police chief Alan Sheffield. The session was listed on the agenda as being for "deployment of security personnel or devices," but Mayor Tim Hunter said afterward there was no action to be taken.

During a discussion that the cable television company had informed the city it was raising its monthly fee by \$1.25, effective the first of the year, several aldermen said they had received complaints about the firm.

The primary complaint was that service was not made available to entire blocks of residences, such as a block near Kidwell Elementary.

Aldermen agreed, however, that they had no control over the rates the firm charges.

## 5 arrested on drug charges

Five persons were arrested on drug-related charges, in two separate incidents, here Tuesday night by Iowa Park police and taken to county jail.

Three of the arrests resulted when police executed a search warrant at 105 W. Diamond at 9:54 p.m.

The other two stemmed from a 2:15 a.m. traffic check of a vehicle at Yosemite and Lafayette.

Arrested during the search of the mobile home were Gary Loyd Tucker, 34, Jeannie Gail Tucker, 35, and Jeffery Alan Taylor (AKA Jeffery Alan Tucker), 21.

They were charged with possession of drug paraphernalia, Class C, and possession of marijuana, Class B, and transported to Wichita County jail, where they later posted \$200 bonds and were released.

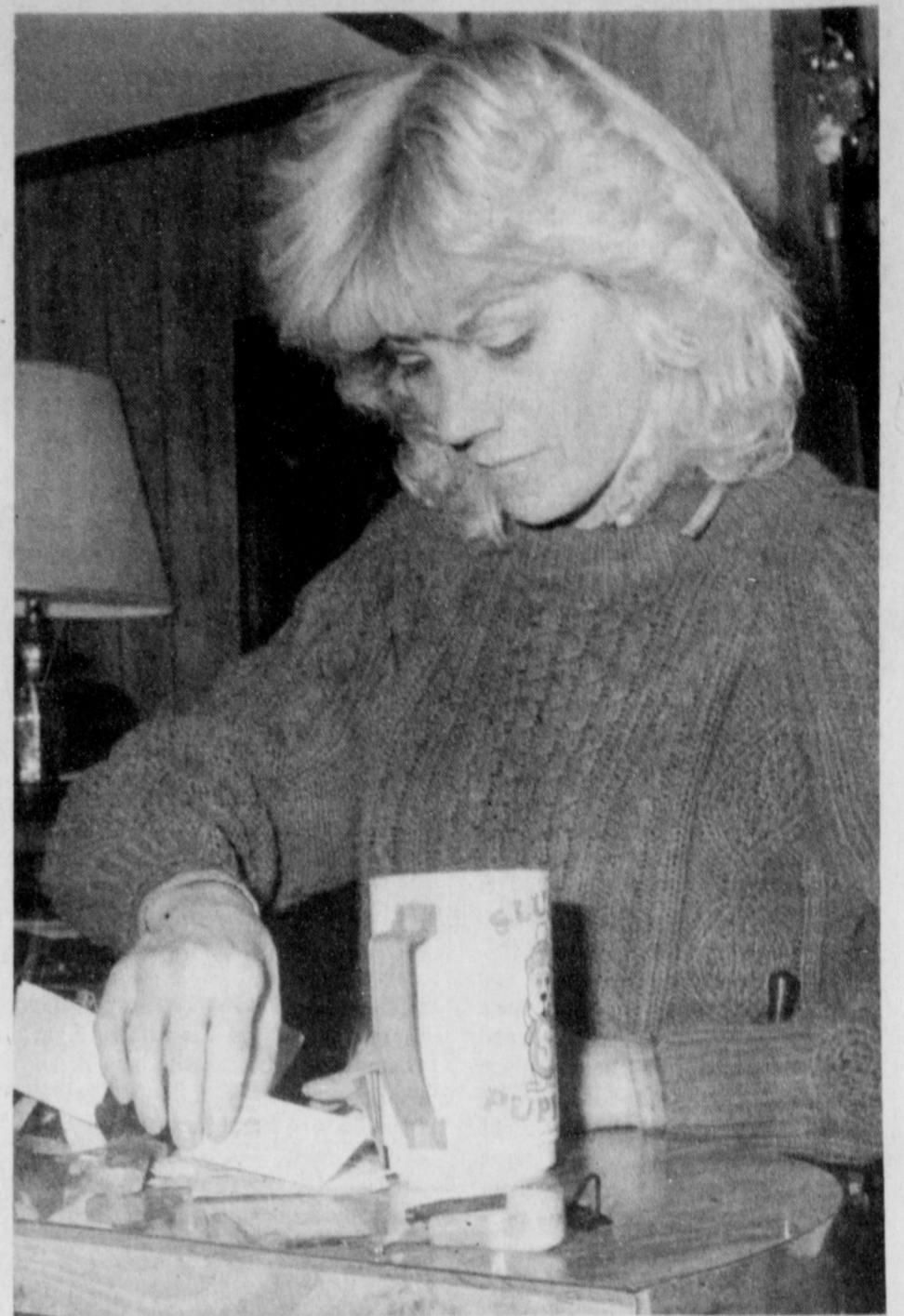
Also in the home when police arrived were three young children. They were turned over to relatives.

Among the paraphernalia found during the search of the Tucker home were at least eight brass pipes made of plumbing materials, two sets of scales, two syringes and two "bongs."

Several other items are being sent to a police laboratory for study police said.

## School nurse quits job

Iowa Park school trustees last week hired a new teacher, accepted the resignation of the school nurse, and tabled three items for a called meeting this evening.

Trustees accepted the recommendation of Supt. Glen Mitchell to hire Susan Mollett to teach the "English as a Second Language" course.

Judy Silvers, who has been working three days a week as school nurse, has resigned, Mitchell told the board.

The superintendent said he was working on an agreement with the Wichita County Health Department to fill the void left by Mrs. Silvers, and does not expect to hire a replacement the balance of the school year.

On the board's agenda for 7:30

this evening, which will be held in the administration building, will be two curriculum plans, district and campus at-risk plans and district educational goals; adoption of the district health policy manual, and consideration of hiring a firm to conduct a needs assessment of facilities.

Added to the agenda has been a proposal to participate in "Project 2000."

Board chairman Jimmy Howell said he would like an outside opinion from an expert on the district's future building needs.

He said the cost of such a study would be less than \$8,000, but with the elementary enrollment increases the district has experienced recently, a plan for expansions at the junior high and high school campuses were needed.

Action was tabled on the health policy manual after trustee John Sibley said he felt a section addressing the AIDS disease should be included.

Typed proposals for the at-risk plans and educational goals were not available at last week's meeting, and the superintendent said they would be ready for consideration today.

The district recently spent \$600 for an expert to identify 484 containers of unmarked chemicals stored at the high school, trustees were told.

Actually, the expert charged \$400 to identify the chemicals, and \$200 to tell the school how the con-

tainers should be packed for shipment, Supt. Mitchell explained.

He also told the board a firm that disposes of Cryovac's excess chemicals has offered to haul them away for \$3,825.

While some trustees said they felt that was excessive, Howell, who works at a chemical company in Wichita Falls, said he believed it to actually be lower than most bids.

No action was taken on the plan, but it is expected to be on next month's agenda.

Though the average daily attendance of all four campuses during October was slightly lower than the same month last year, the district's increase in enrollment is expected to generate approximately \$35,000 more money from the state next year.

Supt. Mitchell said attendance was only 96.73 percent, as compared with 97.27 during October 1987, but this year the average attendance was 1,755 students, as compared to 1,720.

Average Daily Attendance is reported during October, to establish the state's funding of the district.

Iowa Park schools, primarily the high school, experienced a decrease in enrollment during November. The district had 1,897 students in October, and it was down to 1,879 in November, according to the report given trustees.

Enrollment dropped from 539 to 527 at the high school in November, where enrollment in 1987 was 544.

## Police load increases with rash of thefts

Iowa Park police are investigating an unusually large number of thefts that have been reported during the past week.

A purse was reportedly stolen Wednesday of last week from a vehicle parked at 411 W. Texas.

Two tires were reportedly taken the next day from a structure at 1303 N. Pacific, and valued at \$150.

James Beals told police a king size wooden water bed and two garden hoses stored in one of the Mini-Con units on West Highway Nov. 1 were missing when he went there Saturday. A combination lock had apparently been cut from the door.

Pam Johnson, director of the Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center, reported to police Monday

that someone had entered the building and taken two stereo speakers. They apparently had been left when thieves took the stereo a couple of weeks earlier.

Gasoline was reportedly stolen from a vehicle at 1218 S. Wall sometime Sunday night.

A 24-volt battery was taken sometime Monday night off the city's land scraper at the landfill. The theft was referred to the county, since the theft took place outside the city limits.

Sunday evening, police took Truxton Lee Fox, 35, into custody on two warrants issued by the Wichita County Sheriff's Office. He was later released to a deputy, according to the police blotter.



FOUR INJURED PERSONS were taken to Wichita General Hospital about 4:30 p.m. Monday when their automobile collided with a farm tractor at the 400 S. Colorado curve. The driver, James Michael Lehman, 19, of Electra, was entering Iowa Park on FM 368 and apparently was not acquainted with the 90-degree curve. The car smashed into the rear wheels of a tandem tractor being driven by Jerry Paul Smith, 28. Lehman, Debra Ann Lehman, 21, Mickey Lee Wells, 24, and Becky L. Admire, 17, were taken to the hospital. A fifth person in the car, Donald Glen Allen, six, was not injured, nor was Smith, driver of the tractor, which is owned by George R. Adams. Traffic had to be rerouted while the injured were cared for and the debris cleared.

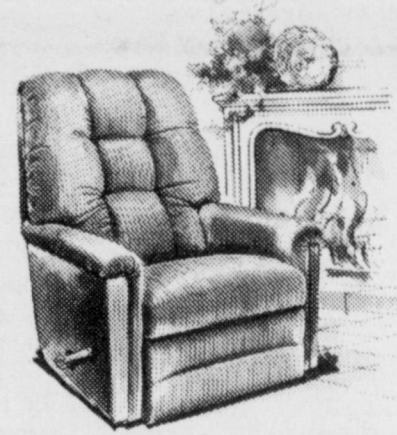

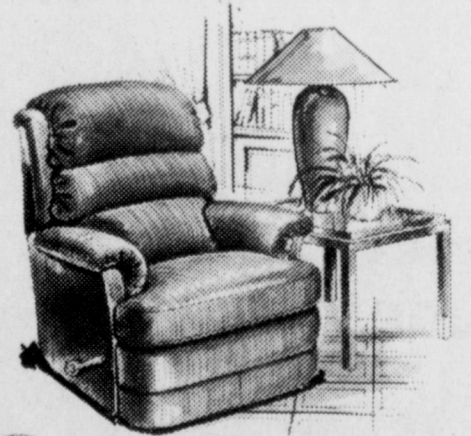

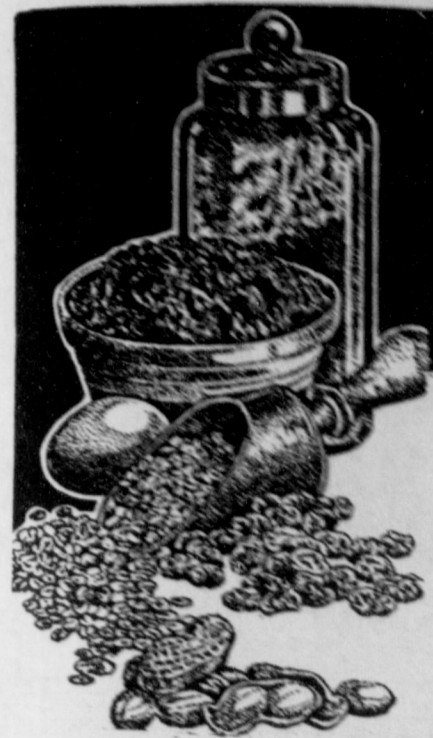

She enjoys reading, of course, and aerobics in her spare time.

### WASSAIL PUNCH

- 1 gallon apple cider
- 2 cups pineapple juice
- 2 cups orange juice
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 8 whole cloves
- Juice of 2 lemons
- 2 cinnamon sticks

Combine all juices and sugar in a 2 gallon pan. Place cloves and cinnamon sticks in a mesh bag and add to juice mixture. Heat slowly over low burner until steamy hot. Serves 10-12.

### HOLIDAY SALAD

- 1 cup crushed pineapple
- 1 cup sugar (1/2 cup will do)
- 1 box orange jello
- 1 cup cold water
- 1/2 cup Cool Whip
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts (optional)

Heat pineapple and sugar to boiling. Stir in jello and dissolve. Add cold water and chill. Add whipped cream, cheese and nuts. Chill.

### LAYERED DIP

- 1 1/2 lb. hamburger meat, cooked
  - Large bottle taco sauce
  - 1 carton sour cream
  - 1 large pkg. Mozzarella cheese
  - 1 to 2 mashed avocados
  - Tomatoes
  - Green onions
  - Cheddar cheese
  - Chopped black olives
- Layer in order in 9X13-inch pan. Serve with chips.

### APPLE COFFEE CAKE

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 cup sour cream (cultured)
- 2 cups finely chopped apples
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 4 Tbsp. melted oleo

Cream together shortening and sugar. Add eggs and vanilla, beat well, add flour and other dry ingredients, alternating with sour cream. Fold in apples, spread batter in 9X13X2 pan. Bake at 350 degrees

### PECAN PUFFS

- 1 stick butter
- 2 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 cup flour

Beat butter until soft. Add sugar and vanilla. Beat until smooth and creamy. Mix rest of ingredients into butter mixture. Roll into small balls. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake 45 minutes in a 300 degree oven. While hot, roll in powdered sugar. Cool and roll again in powdered sugar.

### COWBOY CASSEROLE

- 1-8 oz. pkg. spaghetti
- 1 lb. hamburger
- 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/4 tsp. chili powder
- 1 to 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- Grated cheese

Cook spaghetti until tender. Brown hamburger. Add salt, pepper and seasoning to taste. Add soup. Mix spaghetti with soup and hamburger. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Put into casserole dish, top with cheese and heat until cheese melts.

NOTE: I add one or two cans milk or water when adding soup to make it more juicy.

As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



In case it hasn't occurred to you, if you delve in dope or any type of an illegal controlled substance, you better not have it in Iowa Park.

In the past three weeks, 18 persons have been sent to county jail on drug related charges by the Iowa Park Police Department.

My comments in no way assumes any guilt or innocence of these 18, nor any other cases pending from local arrests.

But the plain fact is, drug use is not wanted in our community. That goes for both the police, and the citizens.

Drugs have a way of promoting all sorts of criminal activity. And I suspect a great many thefts that have been reported recently stem directly from the need for money with which to purchase illegal substances.

To admit drugs are in Iowa Park is not to condemn or disgrace our community. It's undoubtedly in all communities, regardless of size.

But we cannot bury our heads in the sand and attempt to ignore it so it will go away. It won't.

The lives of some wonderful people have been ruined by drugs. I know some, and I suffer for them, but more for their families.

But at the same time, I suffer for those who have lost property to the thieves who find it handy to take items to sell so they can buy their stuff.

You don't think people are stealing from farmsteads and homes just to use for themselves, do you?

Where we have more than we can put up with here in town, it's getting increasingly worse in the rural areas. Thieves can operate almost with impunity in the country, it appears.

One friend of mine told me it's getting so bad in his area, to the northwest of Iowa Park, that he feels sure someone's going to be shot; not by thieves, but thieves by farmers.

A couple of years ago, I passed off most of the stealing as a result of so many being unemployed when the oil patch activity virtually shut down.

I'm now convinced that's not the

case. People are stealing to buy their fix.

I have sympathy for someone who is hooked on drugs, recognizes it, and wants to stop. I'll do all I can to help them.

But I hate a thief. And one who steals to satisfy his habit is even more despicable.

So, if you're using drugs, and have no intention of quitting, you are not wanted in Iowa Park.

You had best go look up Timothy O'Leary's friends. At least there, you might be welcome.

But if you stay, there's a pretty good chance that the Iowa Park Police may someday pay you a visit.

Worth Quoting

When I came to town Monday morning, I noticed a couple city employees cutting down the few remaining parking meter poles. But they were leaving the several anchors and rings that were used earlier this century for hitching horses.

I do remember when either were installed.

I do remember writing the stories that signaled the removal of the parking meters for the first time. It must have been late in the 1940s. I also remember announcing their return during the boom years of mid-1950s. And, of course, they came down again (I guess in the 1960s) when finding parking spaces ceased to be a problem.

When we yearn for the good old days, do we mean when we used horse hitching rings, when we had parking meters, or when business was good enough that parking meters were acceptable?

Members of an accreditation team from the Texas Education Agency will be available Tuesday to meet with parents and patrons who have an interest in expressing their views and opinions about the Iowa Park schools, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Interviews will be conducted by team members beginning at 4 p.m. in the Iowa Park Junior High School library, 412 E. Cash.

Every school district in the state is required by law to be visited by an accreditation team from the TEA to evaluate the quality of its educational programs and to determine what progress the school district has made since the last visit.

During the interviews, emphasis will be given to the quality of instruction and community support present on each campus in the district.

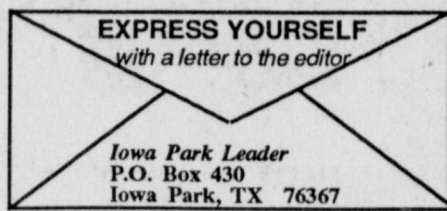
Areas to be evaluated by the team include planning, curriculum, instruction, services to students, instructional resources, personnel, gov-

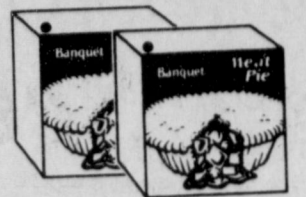

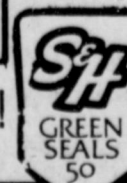

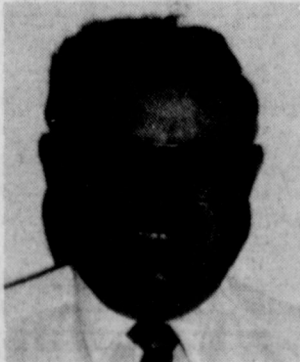

## TROUBLES

Do you have troubles? You are not alone. Read of the troubles of Job in chapters 1, 2, and 19:13-26. Our troubles seem to pale in comparison.

An old Hebrew story tells of a rabbi who was compelled by persecution to wander far from his native land. He owned the clothes on his back, the Jewish Scriptures, a lamp by which he studied the Scriptures, and a donkey.

Late one evening he sought shelter at a village, but was refused. The only shelter available was inside a well curbing at the village's outskirts. The rabbi lit his lamp and began to read. A violent wind arose and he was unable to light the lamp. Unable to read, he tried to sleep. His sleep was disturbed by a lion that seized his donkey and dragged the remains into the underbrush. By this time, the rabbi was beside himself with grief at his loss. He tried to pray, but could only complain over his misfortunes. In exhaustion, the rabbi fell into a deep sleep.

The first rays of the morning sun awakened the rabbi to a very shocking sight. On the streets of the village lay the mutilated bodies of all the villagers slain by a vicious band of marauders who had swept down out of the hills that night.

The rabbi began to understand. If the villagers had received him, he would have lain among the victims. If the wind had not blown out his lamp, the robbers would have seen him. If the donkey had not been killed, the animal might have betrayed him. The rabbi learned that salvation come sometimes through losses.

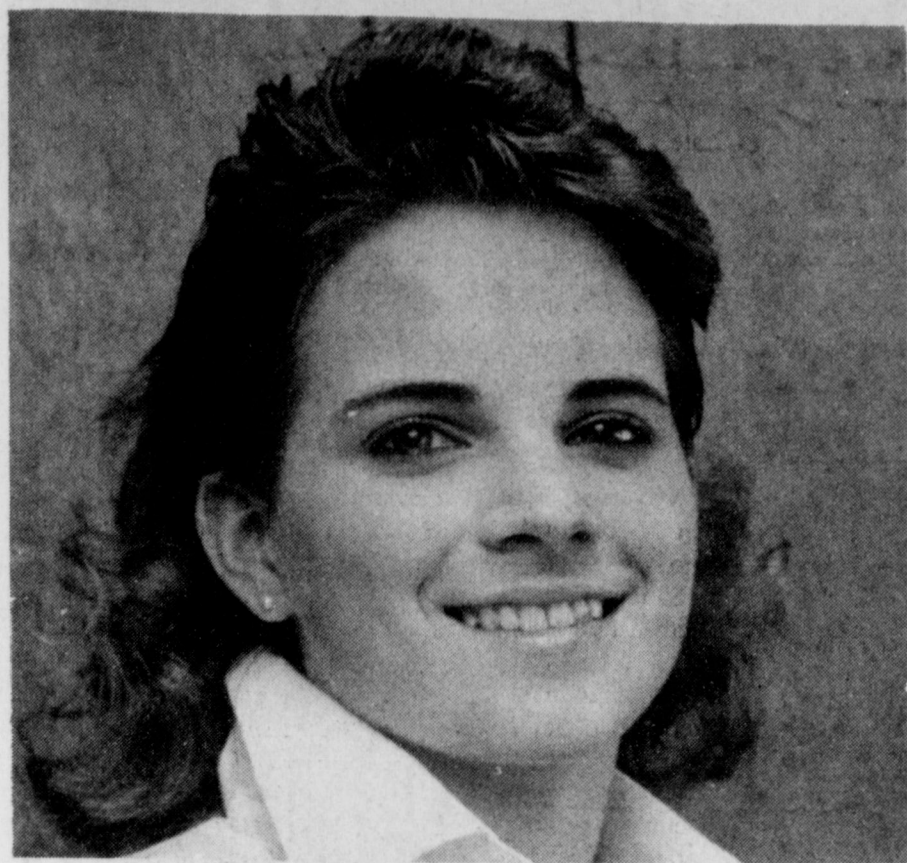

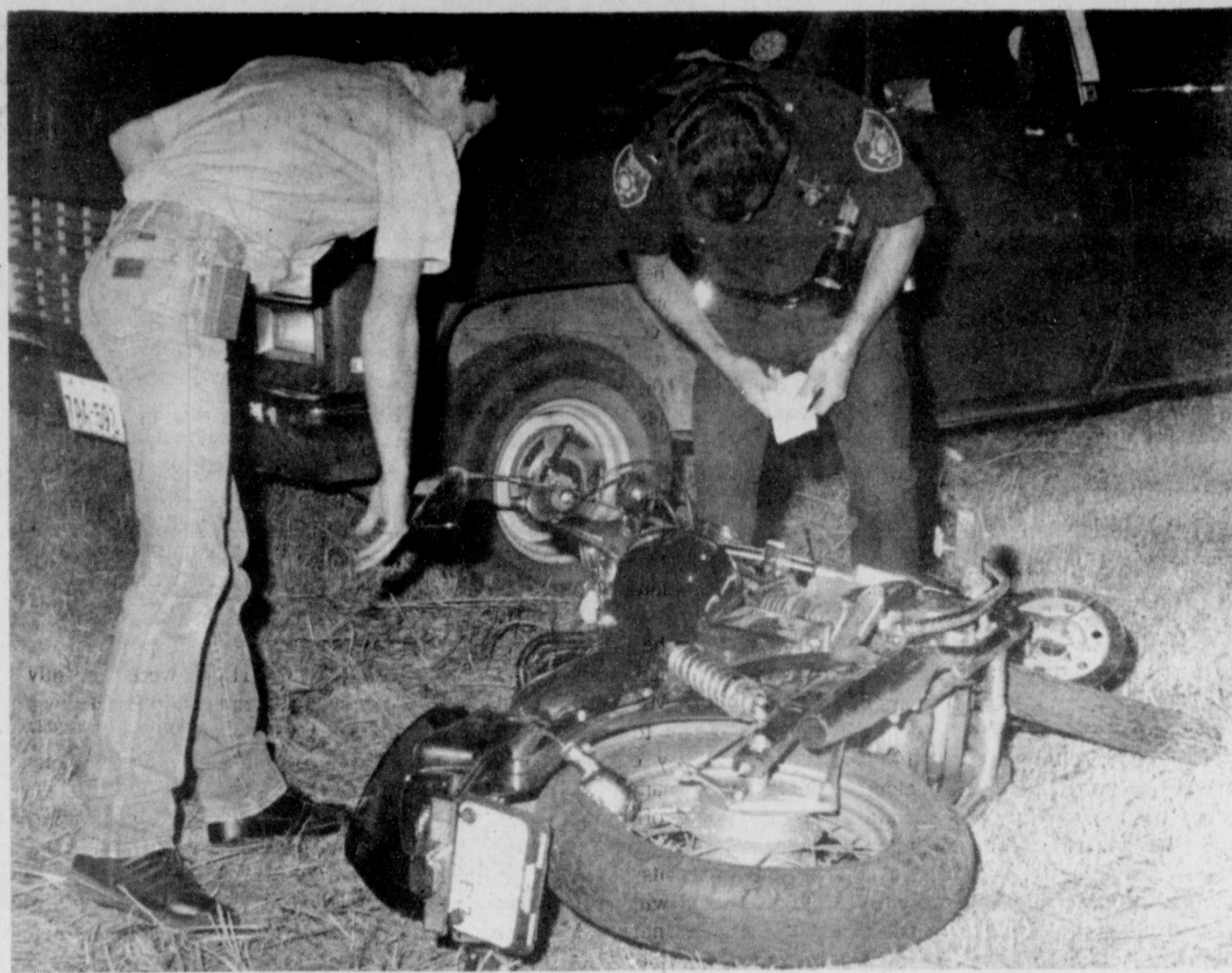

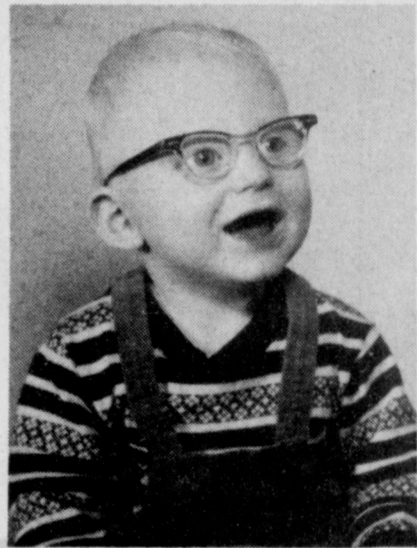

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# Fire prevention tips for holiday season decorations

Displays in department store windows are the first sure sign that the holiday season is here. Soon, Christmas trees and decorations will be appearing in homes, and houses will be strung with colorful lights.

While you are decorating your home, remember that festive decorations can be hazardous.

Texas Safety Association warns that more residential fires occur during the holiday season than at any other time of the year.

The following safety tips can help keep your holidays safer, healthier and happier.

\* If you buy a real Christmas tree, look for a fresh one with a

strong pine scent and flexible branches. A tree can be a real fire hazard, especially if it has been allowed to dry out. Bounce the tree on the ground two or three times -- if more than a few needles fall, it is too dry.

\* Before you set up your tree, cut about two inches from the end of the trunk, place the tree in water, and stand it in a cool place. When you are ready to set it up, choose a location away from heat sources (fireplaces, heaters), and out of the normal foot traffic areas. Use a strong, water-holding tree stand and check the water supply each day.

\* Try to place your tree near an electrical outlet -- avoid using exten-

sion cords if possible. Use lights and electric cords that have the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) mark. Inspect them for bare wires, loose connections, broken sockets and dead bulbs.

\* When decorating, use a sturdy stepladder. Don't hang breakable ornaments on lower branches where children or pets might pull them off.

\* Always unplug your lights before going to bed or leaving the house.

\* Keep decorative seasonal candles away from flammable materials, and out of reach of children. Don't place Christmas greenery on mantels over working fireplaces, and avoid hanging stockings too close to a fire.

\* Avoid burning wrapping paper in your fireplace -- some gift wraps contain materials that are toxic when burned.

\* Keep a fire extinguisher in an easily reached place.

\* Make sure that you have smoke alarms, and that they are in

good working order.

\* Keep plants such as poinsettia, mistletoe, holly, Jerusalem cherry, and amaryllis away from children. These plants are poisonous if eaten.

If you think your child has eaten one, call your local poison control center immediately and follow their instructions.

Texas Safety Association is a

non-profit, non-governmental organization whose members work in government, private industry, and as individuals to prevent accidents and needless loss of life and property.

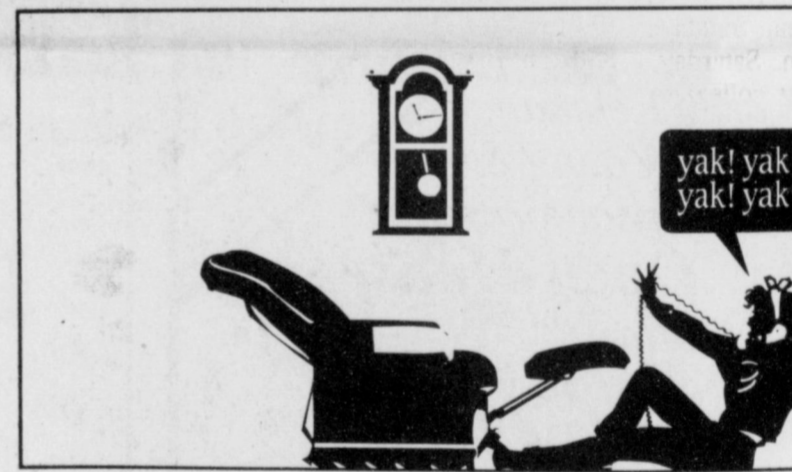

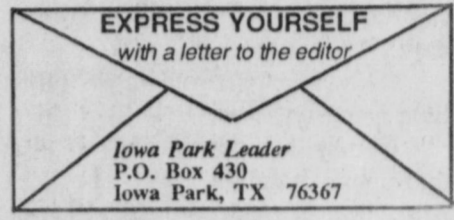
Iowa Park High's varsity basketball teams will begin competing today in a three-day tournament at Graham.

The Junior Varsity breezed to a 53-18 win, but the Freshmen had to scrap for a 41-39 decision.

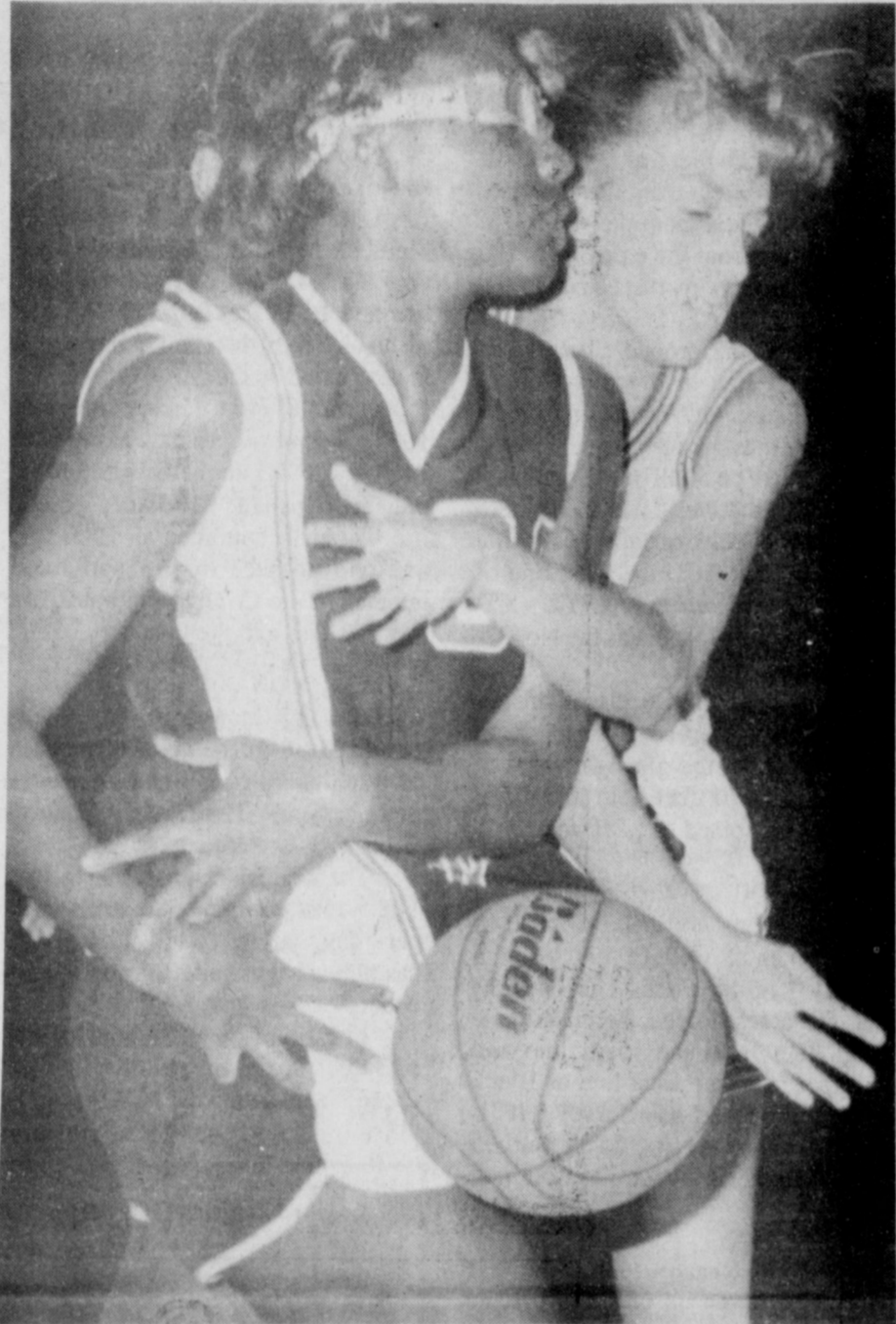

Two state legislators, Senator Hector Uribe and Representative Ron Wilson, have prefiled a bill in Austin that, if passed, will give the citizens of the state the chance to vote on a state lottery for Texas.

The bills call for a constitutional amendment that would remove the prohibition against games of chance. The measure requires that two-thirds of both houses of the Legislature vote for the amendment and then it must be approved by a majority of voters in the state.

If the amendment passes, then a Lottery Commission would be appointed to oversee the operation of the lottery.

In the last session of the Legislature a similar bill passed the Senate, but was defeated in the House by a narrow margin. If the measure passes early in this session, it could be on the November statewide ballot.

The pro-lottery group points to 29 other states that have a lottery and the huge amount of money raised by

the games. Eight states are collecting over \$1-billion each year from their lottery operations.

Uribe has estimated that Texas would make over \$300-million in the first year of operation and could double that amount in later years. With the problems of funding school districts, prison construction and mental health facilities, the prospect of increased revenues looks very good to some lawmakers.

With so many opinions on both sides of the issue, the Legislature should pass the amendment and let the people of Texas decide if they want a lottery. A statewide vote in November would settle the matter and if defeated would stop future Legislatures from wasting time discussing lotteries.

If the amendment passed, then a new source of revenue would be added to the state coffers. I suspect that a lottery would raise substantially more than \$600-million a year.

The idea of a state lottery is appealing. When you dutifully pay your six percent sales tax at the checkout counter and ante up your forty or fifth dollars for car tags there is absolutely no chance of ever seeing that money again.

With a lottery, even with the chances of one in a million, there is a chance that some of that money will find its way back to your pocket. Some people will overspend on lottery tickets, but those same people are now finding some other way to waste their paychecks.

Above all the lottery would be a voluntary tax. If you did not want to play, no one would force you to buy a ticket.

A voluntary tax with a chance of a return may be just the answer to give the rest of us some relief from growing state taxes.

If the shooting is drug-related -- and extends to both sides of the border -- it drives home the growing realization that this country in general and Texas specifically is losing the drug war.

It sent us looking through the papers on our desk for a report sent

out by the governor's office a couple of weeks ago. If you think that drugs in Texas are something pedaled by teen-agers to friends on parking lots, think again.

According to the criminal justice division in the governor's office, illegal drug operations in this state are big and sophisticated.

Last year, police in McAllen stopped a 1986 Chevrolet Blazer because of an unsecured seatbelt violation driven by a known narcotics trafficker.

The untrained eye would think the Blazer looked normal. Closer inspection, however, revealed bullet-proof windows, steel plating and Kevlar floor matting -- armour designed to stop direct hits from high-powered bullets.

Electronically detonated tear gas ports were hidden behind fake reflectors and aimed laterally from each side of the front and rear fenders. The tear gas could be fired from switches marked "safe" on a control panel below the steering wheel.

Also found in the vehicle was a cache of automatic weapons and one ounce of cocaine.

In another stop, according to the report, the West Texas Multi-County Narcotics Trafficking Task Force in El Paso confiscated 15 AK-47 semi-automatic rifles manufactured in Communist China, along with 14 bayonets, 3,000 rounds of ammunition and \$14,000 in cash. The weapons were said to be traded for drugs in Mexico.

While making an aerial survey in Lamar County, a helicopter flown by a DPS agent was fired upon and hit two times by a man with rifle guarding what appeared to be a field of marijuana.

A cougar was part of the security arrangements which included the latest high-tech surveillance equipment at a clandestine lab in East Texas. The task force there confiscated \$5-million worth of methamphetamine.

Concluded Governor Clements: "No longer are we dealing just with the back-alley pusher. Drug traffickers have graduated to more sophisticated operators, and law enforcement must respond in kind."

# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Commonwealth Production of Dallas has posted first production figures for a pair of new wells in Wichita County Regular Field, 3.5 miles northeast of Clara.

The wells are designated as the No. 16-C and 20-C C. Birk.

The No. 16-C showed ability to pump 12 barrels of oil per day plus 30 barrels of water and a slight show of gas, while the No. 20-C pumped 48 barrels of oil daily and 10 barrels of water, after being bottomed at 1,692 and 1,687 feet, respectively.

Production intervals will be in the Gunsight Sand at 1,629 to 1,644 feet into the wellbores.

The wells are located in a 160-acre lease 305 feet from the south line and 1,440 feet from the east line, and also 640 feet from the south line and 810 feet from the east line of the F. Huseman Survey, respectively.

A new oil producer has been brought on line in Wichita County Regular Field, with West Landrum of Burkburnett as the operator.

Located one-half mile northeast of Kamay, the well is in a 314-acre lease 1,830 feet from the south line and 1,700 feet from the west line of Block 30 in the KWVFL S/D Survey. It is designated as the No. 27-L Bailey.

It pumped 21 barrels of oil per day plus 43 barrels of water from perforations in the gunsight Sand at 1,762 to 1,770 feet into the hole. The well bottomed at 1,810 feet.

Texo Oil of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The operator has 60 acres leased, with drillsite 2,075 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the west line of Block 5 in the SA&MG Survey. It is designated as the No. 31 S.B. Burnett "B." Drillsite is two miles south of Fowlkes.

Commonwealth Production of Dallas has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 17-C Birk "C." It was a developmental try in the Wichita County Regular Field. The location was 3.5 miles northeast of Clara. Drillsite was in a 160-acre lease 305 feet from the south line and 810 feet from the east line of the F. Huseman Survey.

Spudded on September 6, the well had reached a dry-bottom total depth of 1,674 feet.

Perkins-Prothro of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 4,250-ft. wildcat well in Foard County Regular Field. The operation is located 775 feet from the north line and 2,500 feet from the west line of block A in the H&TC Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 1 Bildstein-Barrera Unit. Drillsite is one mile northeast of Margaret.

A new oil producer has been brought on line in Hardeman County's Kadane Cato Field, with Paul DeCleva Inc. of Wichita Falls as the operator.

Located five miles southeast of Medicine Mounds, the well is in a 40-acre lease 1,348 feet from the north line and 1,555 feet from the east line of block 16 in the H&TC Survey. It is designated as the No. 1 Grange.

On an 8/64-in. choke, it flowed 100 barrels of oil per day, along with 74,000 CF casinghead gas. Flow pressure registered 910 PSI.

The well bottomed at 8,300 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Cordell Sand at 9,194 to 9,388 feet into the hole.

At a location five miles northeast of Quanah, Trio Operating of Wichita Falls has finalized a new oil producer in Hardeman County's Groesbeck Creek Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1-A Wells, pumping 38 barrels of oil per day, along with 12,400 CF casinghead gas and 63 barrels of water.

Location is in a 285-acre lease 2,622 feet from the south line and 2,210 feet from the west line of

section 96, Block H in the W&NW Survey.

Bottomed at 8,796 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Chappel Formation, 8,676 to 8,683 feet into the wellbore.

Kadane Oil of Wichita Falls has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 Travis Cato. It was a wildcat try in a Hardeman County location. The location was five miles southeast of Medicine Mounds. Drillsite was in a 145-acre lease 1,521 feet from the south line and 662 feet from the east line of Section 102 Block 16 of the H&TC Survey.

Spudded on September 22, the well had reached a dry-bottom total depth of 8,358 feet.

## ESA benefit dance slated Sunday

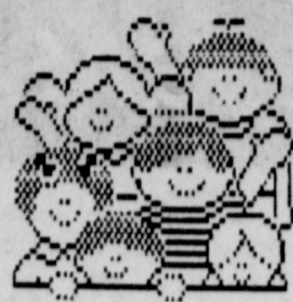


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
