

Wichitan killed in freak wreck

Rain-slick pavement contributed to a freak accident that took the life of a 43-year-old Wichita Falls man early Wednesday morning.

The incident took place shortly before 3 a.m. on FM 367, just east of Bridwell Road.

Pronounced dead at the scene by

an official of the sheriff's department was Kenneth Foreman of 3020 Pool.

Also involved in the accident were Helen Admire, who resides at Colonial Heights Apartments, and Emily Birdett of Rt. 3, Iowa Park.

Admire said she was riding with Foreman earlier, and as they neared the accident scene, Foreman swerved to avoid two dogs.

He lost control of the vehicle, apparently on the slick surface, and it rolled onto its side in a deep ditch on the north side of the pavement.

Neither driver nor passenger was injured. They were able to get out, but unable to upright the vehicle.

Admire accepted a ride to Iowa Park with a passing vehicle, to get her car. She returned, they hooked a chain onto the wrecked vehicle in another attempt to upright it, but still were unsuccessful.

The Admire car was parked on the pavement, facing west, when she saw the lights of an oncoming car from the west.

She said Foreman stepped into the middle of the road, attempting to flag down the car, which was driven by Mrs. Birdett.

Again, the pavement's slick surface came into play.

When she applied her brakes, the car skidded, striking Foreman first, and then the Admire car.

When the Birdett car came to a halt, its front wheels were almost on the pavement. It's rear wheels were in the north ditch, and Foreman's body beneath them.

The Birdett car also stopped only a couple of feet from the front bumper of the Foreman vehicle.

The Iowa Park volunteer rescue unit was summoned, to use its Jaws of Life to lift the vehicle from the victim. Wichita West volunteers also were called to the scene with its equipment.





Despite the fact the state comptroller has said the state will have an increase in state revenues of more than \$1-billion, there are those elected officials who have been telling us more than a year that "we've got to have more money," but the billion is only half enough.

A so-called "poll" was taken of Texans on what they felt the best means of raising additional revenue for state government would be. And wouldn't you believe it, a corporate income tax just hit the spot.

It's that old deal of "let someone else pay the tab, I'm paying enough."

Some folks just don't seem to understand that anything charged to businesses is passed on to the consumer, or the business ceases to

I have no idea what will be done

to increase state revenues, but you can bet your bottom dollar (and that may be all that's left when the legislature gets through) that something is going to cost us more so we can fund state government.

In a meeting of the appointed state school board members with the elected replacements, the first of shots was fired Monday.

Bill Hudson, the retired superintendent from Electra who is now our district's representative, said he didn't like the amount of student testing that is going on.

"I don't think the people of Texas understood the constitutional amendment the way it was written on the ballot," he said.

Worth Quoting

Two agencies of the federal government, FDIC and FSLIC, are wellknown here in West Texas.

They're the cats who walk in and take over failed banks and savings and loan institutions, merge them with healthier institutions, or find new buyers after swallowing all the

They're the people who are guaranteeing your account at the bank or savings and loan up to \$100,000.

We've been a close observer of the actions of these two agencies ever since they wiped out a lot of stockholders in banks at Seminole, Snyder, Lubbock, Midland and Odessa. We've read of their actions at 40 or 50 other institutions in Texas and it rankles.

The two agencies seem to have a bias against West Texas and the oil patch in general and small town institutions in particular.

In almost every instance when they take over a bank or savings and loan out here, the excuse is given that the institution failed because of bad loans, bad judgement, mismanagement, greed, or self-serving actions on the part of the bank's or savings and loan officers.

Never, never, do you read of any admission of fault by the FDIC or the FSLIC. Nosirreeee-bob.

Yet, every bank, every savings institution that is a member of FDIC or FSLIC is audited regularly by those agencies -- and those loans were approved and okayed as good by the agency auditors. How come when the loans go sour because of falling crude oil prices or real estate, suddenly it's the institutions' fault? How come the auditors of those two regulatory agencies, who approved those loans year after year, are not held accountable, and not prosecuted, are not held equally responsible? We can well remember back in 1984 and the early part of '85 that nearly everyone in the oil patch was in agreement that oil could easily go to \$90 per barrel. Economists with the major oil companies, forecasters with banks and with savings and loans, federal reserve officials, and most experts with the top agencies in this country, were predicting \$90 per barrel oil, and our Texas legislature was spending every dime collected because tomorrow there would be even more

taxes flowing in. Yet when everything turned sour, when the price of crude fell rather than climb, and loans turned bad, suddenly the whole disaster was blamed on the lenders. Certainly, lenders were at fault but it seems to us, in all fairness, that the regulators, the auditors, of the FDIC and FSLIC who for years okayed those loans, ought to be held accountable.

There's enough blame to go around for all -- and those two agencies ought to admit they were just as gullible as everyone else in the financial world.

News media, both television and print, had a field day with McGregor last week over the old application for membership that had been used by the McGregor Volunteer Fire Depart-


The yellowed form said in eightpoint type that only "white males, 21 years of age or older" need apply for membership. Everyone should know that those days are gone forever, and rightly so.

Anyone who thinks the sky is the limit has no imagination. The sun if so large that if it were hollow, it could contain one million worlds the size of earth. Safe toys for safe tots this holiday season

Christmas just wouldn't be the same without toys for the children.

But each year many children are injured by cute, seemingly harmless playthings meant for their joy and entertainment.

Texas Safety Association offers the following safety guidelines to help you make the smart choices during your holiday season buying.

* When selecting toys for babies or toddlers, choose those made of washable, flexible materials. Toys constructed of glass, brittle plastic, or other hard materials should be avoided.

* Toys should not be small enough to fit in mouths, ears, or noses.

* Avoid toys with cords or strings that could wrap around a child's neck.

* Select brightly colored toys elements.

that are light enough not to cause injury if dropped on the child. Mobiles, squishy stuffed dolls, or squeeze toys make good choices.

*Avoid toys with sharp edges, small detachable parts, or electrical or toxic components.

* Check stuffed toys for internal wires, or small pieces such as eyes that might be pulled off and swallowed.

Purchasing toys for older children require a safe approach, as well.

* Be sure that playthings are well-constructed and strong enough to withstand hard use.

* If you purchase electrical toys, make sure they bear the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) label. You can eliminate shock and cord hazards by buying battery-operated toys, instead.

* Avoid toys that have heating

* If used with the chemicals provided in the set, chemistry sets are generally a safe buy.

* Avoid toys that shoot a projectile, such as arrows, rubber-tipped darts, disks, or other hard materials that could injure an eye.

After all the gifts have been opened and the wrapping thrown away, show your children the safe way to play with their new toys, and how to store them when they are finished.

Remind older children to keep their toys out of reach of smaller children, and if a broken toy can't be fixed, throw it away.







MEXICALI MEAT PIE

6 slices bacon

1 lb. ground beef 1 cup drained corn

1/4 cup chopped onion

1/4 cup chopped green pepper

1/4 cup corn meal

1/2 t. oregano

1 t. chili powder

1 t. salt 1/8 t. pepper

1-8 oz. can tomato sauce

1 egg

1/4 cup milk

1/2 t. dry mustard

1/2 t. Worcestershire sauce 1 1/2 cup Cheddar cheese, shredded

4 stuffed olives, sliced

Fry bacon until crisp. Break into large pieces. Chill 1/3 cup drippings until firm. Brown ground beef, drain, stir in corn, green pepper, onions, corn meal, oregano, chili powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper, and tomato sauce. Prepare a pie crust. Place meat mixture in pastry lined pan. Bake at 425 degrees 25 minutes. Combine egg and milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, mustard, Worcestershire sauce and cheese. Spread on pie. Top with bacon and olives. Bake five minutes or until cheese melts. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Serve with tomato sauce.

PIE CRUST

1 cup flour 1/3 cup bacon drippings 2 T. corn meal

3 or 4 T. cold water

HOLIDAY DIP

1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese

1 T. mayonnaise

2 T. canned milk 1/2 t. salt

1 small onion, minced

1/2 T. celery salt

5 slices bacon, crumbled 1/2 cup salad olives, finely chopped

Cream cheese, mayonnaise and milk until smooth, add remaining ingredients and mix well. Add more canned milk until dip acquires desired consistency. Chill one hour before serving. This may also be used as a sandwich spread.

MEXICAN FRUIT CAKE

2 cups self-rising flour

2 cups sugar

2 eggs

2 t. soda 20 oz. can pineapple, undrained 1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans

Mix together and bake at 350 degrees 30-35 minutes.

FROSTING

2 cups powdered sugar 1/2 cup or 1 stick margarine 5 oz. pkg. Philadelphia cream cheese Beat and frost cake while still

20-MINUTE FUDGE CAKE

2 cups flour

2 cups sugar

2 sticks margarine

5 T. cocoa 1 cup water

1/2 buttermilk 1 t. soda

1 t. vanilla

Stir together flour and sugar. In a saucepan, bring margarine, cocoa and water to a boil. Pour over flour and sugar. Mix adding buttermilk, soda, eggs and vanilla. Bake at 400 degrees 20 minutes. I cook mine in a bundt pan.

FROSTING

2 T. cocoa

5 T milk

3/4 stick margarine 3/4 box powdered sugar

1 cup pecans

Five minutes before cake is done mix cocoa, milk and margarine. Bring to a boil. Add powdered sugar and pecans and pour over hot cake.

HOT GERMAN POTATO SALAD

6 medium potatoes 6 slices bacon

3/4 cup chopped onions

2 T flour

3/4 T sugar

1/2 t. celery seed Dash pepper 1/4 cup vinegar 3/4 cup water

Cook potatoes, cool and dice. fry bacon, drain. Brown onions in bacon fat until lightly browned. blend in flour, sugar, salt, celery seed and pepper. Cook over low heat until smooth and bubbly, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in vinegar and water. Heat to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil one minute. Stir in potatoes and crumbled bacon.

WALDORF ASTORIA CAKE

1/2 cup Crisco

1 1/2 cups sugar

2 eggs 2 cups cake flour

1 T. cocoa

1 t. salt 1 cup buttermilk

2 oz. red cake coloring



AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Century Resources of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 1,700-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The operator has 140 acres leased, with drillsite 640 feet from the north line and 1,730 feet from the west line of the J.B. Johnson Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 16 High Reilly "A". Drillsite is five miles southwest of Burkburnett.

A completion rig has been called in at the No. 78-A M.J. Owens in the Wichita County Regular Field. four miles southwest of Burkburnett. The well has been drilled to total depth of 1,750 feet with ATAPCO as the operator. The well is in a 188acre lease 250 feet from the south line and 2,300 feet from the west line of the RRVL S/D Survey

Ray D. Shinpaugh of Wichita

Falls is testing for potential at the No. 22 C. Flusche in the Wichita County Regular Field. Located three miles south-southwest of Electra, the well was spudded on July 27 and is bottomed at a depth of 1,100 feet.

The operation is located in a 112acre lease 1,407 feet from the south line and 3,250 feet from the west line of the FI&TC Survey.

ATAPCO of Midland is testing for potential at the No. 76-A H Reilly in the Wichita County Regular Field. Located two miles southeast of Clara, the well was spudded on November 3 and is bottomed at a depth of 1,750 feet. The well is located in a 2.100-acre lease 1,300 feet morth and approximately 250 feet west of southwest corner of the L.C. Dennison Survey.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 1 Shivers, an 8,400-ft, wildcar well in a Hardeman County location. The operation will be located two miles south of Medicine Mound in a 40-acre lease 2,380 feet from the north line and 1.385 feet from the east line of Sec. 49, Blk. H in the WANW Survey. The operator is Paul DeCleva Inc. of Wichita Falls.

Drilling operations are nearing the 8,600-ft, mark at the No. 1 Brown "85" in a Hardeman County wildcat location. Spudded on November 2, the venture is in a lease three miles west of Medicine Mound in a 672-acre lease 2,270 feet from the north line and 374 feet from the west line of Sec. 85, Blk. H. of the W&NW Survey. Paul DeCleva Inc. of Wichita Falls is the operator.

Oil patch haulers call for changes in pricing

The president-elect of Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association called on the Railroad Commission of Texas at Victoria Tuesday to allow trucking rates and service terms to be determined in the marketplace.

Rob Looney of Austin, speaking on behalf of the Coalition for Competitive Oil Field Transportation, told the inaugural State of the Transportation Industry Conference sponsored by the RRC that "restrictive Commission rules and procedures impede flexible responses to the changing marketplace."

Looney said the Coalition was formed out of a common concern that Texas' regulated trucking rates are abnormally high in comparison with widely available, interstate contract

Looney noted that a report by the Coalition has concluded that the disparity between interstate and intrastate trucking rates may be as much as 30 to 60 percent.

For example, the cost of shipping rigs and pipe from Denver City to Midland is \$194 per mile compared with a cost of \$111 per mile to ship an identical cargo from Lovington, New Mexico, to Midland.

Likewise, the cost of shipping lube oil from Baytown to Texarkana is \$2.38 per mile while the same shipment from Baton Rouge, Louisiana, to Texarkana costs \$1.84 per

"Such high Texas shipping rates reduce the ability of Texas petroleum service and supply industries to compete for business in Texas. Missed sales can translate into losses of jobs, payrolls and tax receipts, thus hurting the state's economy as well as the Texas oil industry. "In the face of oil price adversity

beyond our control, we hardly can tolerate self-inflicted injury to the competitiveness of the Texas petroleum industry. We need transportation tiveness through provision for competitive oil field transportation pricing and flexible terms of service," Looney added.

"The member companies represented by the Coalition do not feel

they need to be protected from the carriers and they do not believe the carriers should continue to be insulated from competition with one another. The Coalition supports ICClike economic deregulation of Texas' oil field trucking industry as the ultimate solution," he said.
