Ordinances vetoed

Two of the eight ordinances passed Monday night by the city council were vetoed Tuesday morning by Mayor Tim Hunter.

One concerned establishment of rules and regulations for Lake Iowa Park, which was annexed into the city at the same meeting, and the other was a revision of the animal control policy.

This is the second time since Hunter has been in office that he has vetoed an action taken by the council.

"The ordinance as adopted restricts the public's use of public lands and places unfair restrictions on citizens who exercise their rights to use the lake for recreational purposes for which it has served along with being a source of water for the citizens of Iowa Park," Hunter stated as his reason for vetoing the ordinance on lake rules and regulations.

He gave as his reason for voiding the animal control ordinance was that the item was not listed on the posted agenda as an ordinance, but only to "consider a revised animal control policy procedure."

Hunter said adoption of the ordinance could "...be construed as a violation of the open meetings act."

The lake regulations ordinance would have prohibited any hunting until the ordinance was amended in the future, and that was the thrust of Hunter's objection.

Hunting has been allowed at the lake, but restricted to only shotguns and when fowl hunting was in season.

The mayor announced after votes were counted that passed the motion, that he would veto the ordinance, insuring the subject would be back on the Feb. 27 meeting agenda.

Hunter said he had no objection to the animal ordinance amendment, which pertains to quarantining of rabid animals and animals which have bitten persons, but only to the fact of how it was listed on the agenda.

This year's city election was called for May 6, at which three council seats will be decided.

In quick order, aldermen approved a rate increase request by Lone Star Gas Co., and authorization to have a gazebo constructed on the grounds of the Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Lone Star's request was heard at last month's meeting, but action was delayed until details were explained to the school administration. The packaged request included dropping of a special rate for the school which accepted a provision for curtailment in cases of service shortage.

Mrs. W.A. George, representing the Friends of the Library, said her organization wanted to build a gazebo at the library.

The council not only approved the funding, but volunteered to wire the structure for night lighting, and then agreed to provide \$500 to be used toward purchase of drapes for the upstairs floor.

After hearing a request from Tommy Key to relax a requirement for a fire wall or fire door between his two leased buildings in the 100 block of West Cash, council members tabled the request for further consideration.

Two other ordinances adopted at the meeting related to Lake Iowa Park.

The first established Lake Iowa Park as a "P-2" zone, establishing it as a public use district.

The other prohibits climbing on water intake stands, both there and at Buffalo Lake, and prohibits consumption of alcoholic beverages in city parks, and designates city parks.

A city park, known as the George Hammonds Park, is located on the east side of Lake Iowa Park.

Besides that park, others listed where alcoholic consumption is now prohibited, include: City Hall Park; Murphree Park; Hope Park; Rotary Park; Crawford Park; Foley Park; Oscar Park; Will Burnett Park; Gary

Compton Softball Field; Senior League Ballfield; David Kinsey Soccer field; Pace Park; Block 31 Texas Addition; library grounds, and Lake Gordon.

A large tract of undeveloped land at the intersection of West Highway and Johnson Road, owned by Johnny Crawford, was rezoned from R-2 (residential), to C-A/R (automotive, commercial and commercial recreation).

Also approved by the council were:

- * a proposal to consolidate certain funds in the bank into one account;

- * accept the annual audit and pay \$8,000 for the service;

- * approved advertising for bids to repair a trash truck, at an estimated cost of \$8,500;

- * approved a proposal to advertise for bids to build housing for two large pieces of equipment at the landfill;

- * took no action on a plan to buy a one-year public official liability insurance supplemental plan;

- * approved plans for improvements at the RAC ballfield, setting of policies and programs;

- * approved purchase of a lift pump to be placed on South Texowa;

- * authorized an auction sale of surplus property;

- * and approved hiring of an intern, Richard Ford who is a graduate student at Midwestern State Univ.

Following a 20-minute meeting held in closed session, Mayor Hunter said there would be no action taken.

The meeting was held with Police Chief Alan Sheffield, and was titled on the agenda as "deployment of security devices or personnel."

Burl Yoder was recognized as the city's "Employee of the Month."

Trustees hear costs to handle enrollment

In order to meet the space needs of Iowa Park's growing school enrollment over the next five years, the school district may have to spend from \$1.5- to as much as \$2.5-million.

That was the preliminary report given the school board Tuesday night by a specialist, Gary Keep, who was engaged by the district to make a study of future district needs.

Based on projected increases in enrollment at all four campuses, Keep presented his impressions of the number of classrooms and other facilities the district will need by the school year 1993-94.

He based his figures on the five-year enrollment reports and projected numbers of students, though admitted there was no way of accurately projecting the space needs at Kidwell Elementary without a survey of preschool children in the district.

He pointed out that Iowa Park's "percentage of retained ratios," students who remain in school here by either not moving or dropping out, "is above most schools I've worked."

Even though the district has just added four classrooms at each of the two elementary campuses, he said at least four more were needed.

As he discussed campus-by-campus, he gave alternatives and their estimated costs.

Besides the additional elementary

classrooms, required by state mandate of teacher-pupil ratios, the greatest needs for expenditures Keep said were at the junior high school and a new roof at the high school.

He also pointed out that more work and storage room is needed at the administration building, and a study of a new bus maintenance barn should be included.

Because it would be less cost-effective to do the work over a period of time, and paying cash as projects were completed, he told trustees they might consider a bond issue. That would possibly lower the per-foot costs offered by contractors.

Another, more detailed and finalized report, will be given by Keep to the board in the near future.

While his report was a major part of Tuesday's meeting, it was by no means the only subject taken up by the board, which did not dismiss until 12:12 a.m.

Following an executive session that was closed to the public an hour and 27 minutes, trustees quickly acted on motions to renew the yearly contracts of key personnel, including the assistant superintendent, principals and assistant principal, athletic director, counselors and tax collector.

Other business included:

- * approved a request from the Iowa Park Athletic Alumni Association to hold a tournament Feb. 24-25 in the junior high gymnasium to benefit the Bertha McDonald Scholarship Fund;

- * approved application of a class

size waiver for the spring semester for the fourth grade, which has six more students than will meet the 22-1 student-teacher ratio;

- * approved a request to offer calculus as an honor course at the high school next school year (no additional personnel required);

- * approved calling the trustee election May 6 and designating the election polls;

- * recorded into the minutes the required trustee training hours: Jimmy Howell and Gary Fielding, 23; Wendall House, 24; Sheri Kennedy, 20.75; Don Decker, 28; Jerry Reed, 28.5, and John Sibley, 54 hours.

- * approved a resolution supporting a proposal to continue the University Interscholastic League as a separate entity and not be placed under the Texas Education Agency;

- * approved a fund-raising project for the junior high band, to again sell subscriptions to the Iowa Park Leader;

- * approve a penalty and interest waiver on delinquent taxes (\$64.71), requested by George Lebus;

- * set Feb. 27 as a date for a board/administrators' planning retreat and Mar. 13 as the regular meeting date next month.

The board took no action on a new health insurance plan, deciding to await a reaction from personnel.

In making his enrollment report, Supt. Glen Mitchell pointed out the district this month has 65 more students than the same month last year: 1,874, up from 1,809.

Sales taxes take slump

While it's still too early to determine, some local observers' fears that sales taxes could begin lowering here may be indicated by February's sales tax rebate check from Austin.

City hall this week received a sales tax rebate check from the state comptroller's office for 15.44-percent less than the same month in 1988.

Fears had been expressed ever since Wal-Mart opened a new store and Sam's in Wichita Falls that the two new facilities would have a disastrous effect on business here.

This month's check, representing taxes collected by monthly filers in December and reported by Jan. 20, was \$21,145.88. This is compared with \$25,008.23 received the same month last year, and before the Wal-Mart opening down the road.

Those observers had said they felt the local area shoppers would continue doing business in Iowa Park, but the attraction from shoppers outside the local trade area might be reduced.

Support for the theory could be indicated by the fact that Burkburnett, which also has a Wal-Mart, was down 8.98 percent this month, and Wichita Falls had the only increase

in the county, a plus 6.37 percent.

For the two months of the young year, Iowa Park has received a total of \$34,358.32, which is down 7.39 percent from \$37,098.25 reported this time last year.

Burkburnett is down 4.62, Electra a minus 10.31, and Wichita Falls up 11.99 percent for the two months.

Badly-needed rain received

Iowa Park's rainfall for the week is an even two inches ... and counting.

Virgil Woodfin reported Wednesday morning he had measured an even two inches at his home.

Meanwhile, reports over the immediate area are equal or more.

Farmers are especially happy with the heavy moisture, not only to support the young wheat crop, but because their stock tanks are filling.

This is the heaviest rain here in several months.

And weather forecasters are giving high percentage chances for more to fall before the system moves out of the area.

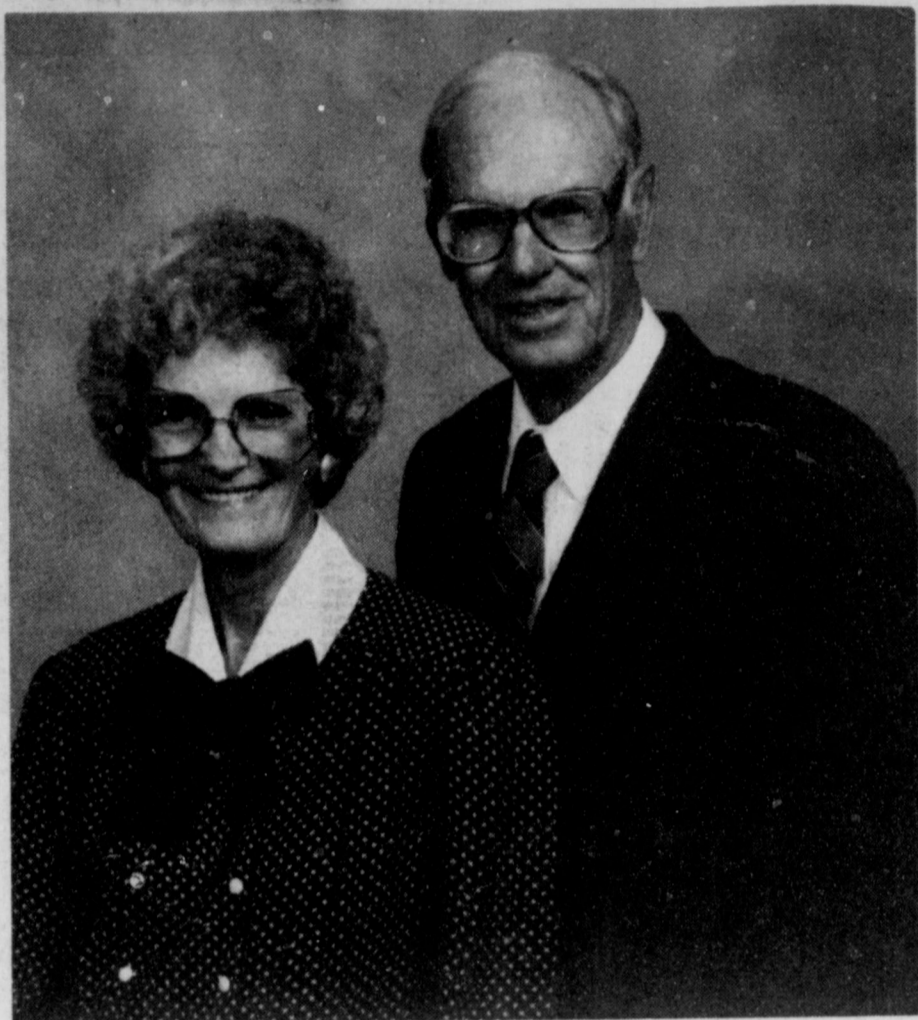

Amity Club makes Valentine favors

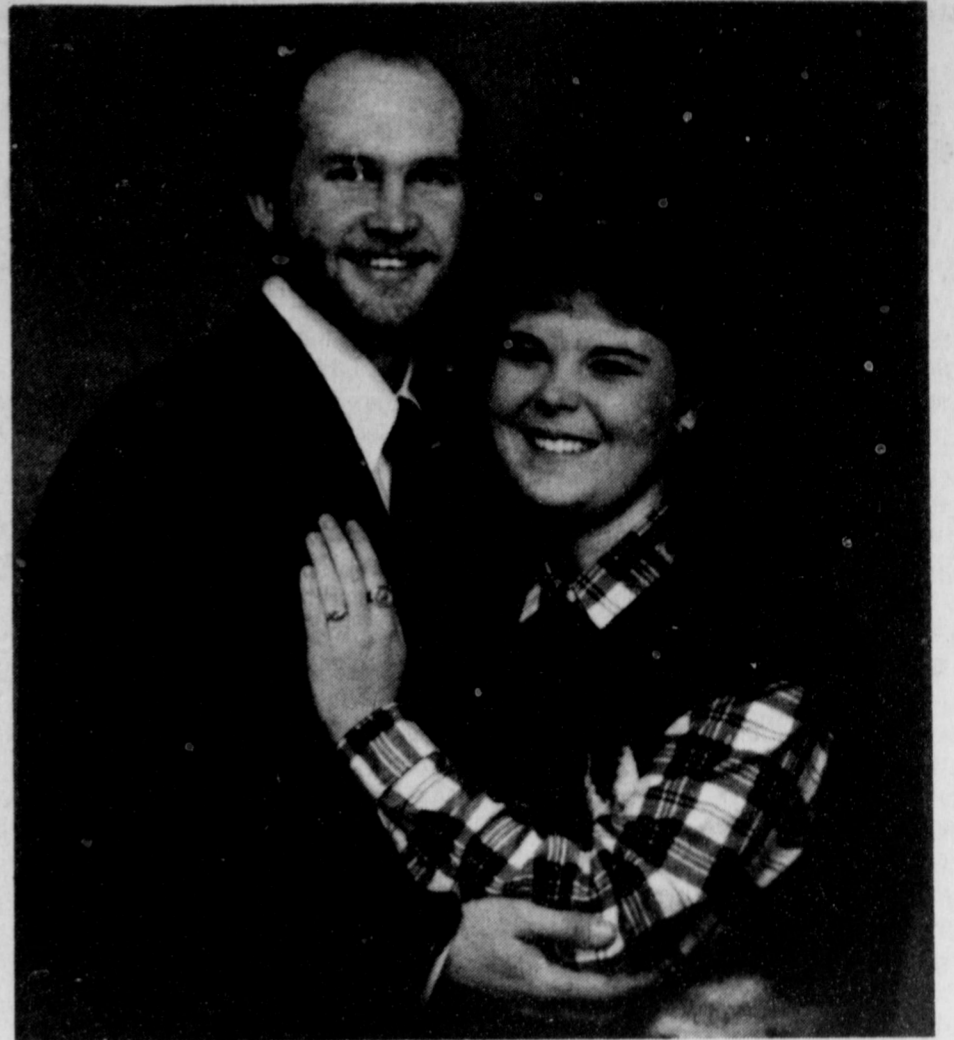
Members of Amity Study Club made Valentine favors for residents of Heritage Manor Nursing Home during a meeting Monday evening in the home of Judy Brown.

I'd like to use this space this week to discuss my displeasure with the dates set for the annual project show and confusion of why the city council passed a particular ordinance.

The 4-H and FFA Project Show will again this year be held on school nights, namely Tuesday, Mar. 14 and Thursday, Mar. 16.

I'm fully aware of the tradition that the local show be held the day before the county show, so the freshly cleaned and groomed entries can be carted right on over to Wichita Falls.

But, based on the number of entries and the lateness of judging, I can't agree with the practice. To me, the project show should, as it always was in the past, be held on a Saturday.

Again, I understand the theory of "stress" on the animals, handling and hauling them so often, as would be the case of holding the local show a week before the county show.

But I'm more concerned about the stress of students, many of them in junior high and even elementary school, being up so late on a school

night. This is the only school-sponsored event I know of that encourages elementary children to stay up so late on a school night.

Some parents aren't too happy about the hours, either. It's tough on some who have to help their young children at the show to get up early the next morning to make it to work.

And I'm sure a lot of the workers who belong to the Young Farmers, whose help is vitally important to the success of both shows, have a problem with the late weeknight hours, also.

Hopefully, this will be changed in future years, to allow students and adults alike to face a weekday after a full night's sleep.

I wasn't aware there was a drinking problem in our city parks.

For that reason, I'm kinda confused as to why the council Monday night passed an ordinance prohibiting the activity.

It's not that I encourage such activity. But I've always felt "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

Was the ordinance brought up

because the Wichita Falls council passed one like it a couple of years ago?

If so, I'm glad our neighbors to the east didn't attempt to enact a law against smoking in the same parks. We might have had one like it.

The fact that the Wichita Falls council enacted such an ordinance doesn't mean that it will stand the test of court. Lake Arrowhead and some other actions prove that point.

From what I've read, there is apparently some confusion as to whether such an ordinance will stand the test of court.

A couple of months ago, according to an article in the Fort Stockton Pioneer, that city's council was asking its city attorney about the possibility of such an ordinance.

He told them Attorney General Mattox had handed down an opinion that the state (and city) had no right under the Texas constitution to tell people where they could and couldn't drink alcohol, according to the article.

Drinking on public property, I'm told, is not against the law until the consumer becomes a public nuisance.

But, like I said, I'm not arguing for the right to drink in public. I'm just scratching my head trying to figure out why the subject was brought up in an ordinance in the first place.

Fans should practice restraint

While Iowa Park Athletic Director Len Williams actually had in mind the shouting and abusive language used in the gymnasium Thursday night by those in the visitors' stands, he may have had a premonition of what was to happen Friday night at the Wichita Falls Texans' basketball game in MSU's gym.

Some of our visitors from Bridgeport got down on the officials pretty hard, prompting Williams to look up what the University Interscholastic League handbook had to say about that sort of thing.

And, wouldn't you know it. A near riot broke out at the professional team's game.

I'm going to print what the coach researched, just in case some dumb nut thinks the Wichita Falls thing might be fun and try it at a high school event sometime in the future.

The rules concerning "protection and courtesy to game officials" apply to all high school sports, and not just basketball, by the way.

The code states, in part: "It means to accept the decisions of officials without protest; to see that officials are extended protection and courtesy, by players, school personnel and laymen (fans); to treat your opponents as your guests, and to put clean play and real sportsmanship above victories."

Williams prepared a letter for his coaching staff which stated:

"During the years the State Ex-

ecutive Committee has had to inflict more penalties on member school coaches and players for misconduct relative to game officials than for any other rule violation. The committee realizes there can be no athletic activities without game officials, and unless they are protected, the fine educational achievements in athletics could be denied to many of our high school pupils.

"It is the responsibility of the coach to set the example of proper conduct toward game officials. Experience has shown that the coach through his actions, generally sets off the 'spark' which results in misconduct of lay people towards the officials. The coach is all important, in regards to setting the proper example in conduct, to the pupils of the schools and to the citizens of his community. As the coach is a member of the school faculty, his conduct is evaluated very critically by the League, in any case of mistreatment of game officials.

"If, regardless of all game arrangements, an attack or threat of an attack should occur on a game official, then the school administration and the school board should take immediate steps to see that the person or persons making the attack or threat on the official or officials is arrested and prosecuted before the proper court of law. There should be a sincere attempt on the part of the school to see that the guilty person or persons are brought to justice.

Token punishments will not carry much weight with the State Executive Committee.

"The State Executive Committee is making an urgent appeal to all school administrators, coaches, and teachers to take proper precautions to see that all game officials are protected and extended courtesy while on their school premises, and are urgently requested, in case of any misconduct by a fan, player or a coach to follow-up by prosecuting this person to the legal limits. Proper preparation can prevent most situations which results in misconduct relative to officials.

"NOTE: If extreme verbal abuse is directed toward an official or if an official is struck, pushed, bumped, or handled in any way or threatened by any of the mentioned, there shall be a penalty assessed by the State Executive Committee. This penalty will be either: 1) public reprimand; 2) disqualification; 3) suspension from coaching."

9-1-1 For emergency only

Even before the 9-1-1 emergency telephone program is officially put into effect Mar. 5, there appears to be confusion by some as to when the number should be used.

As the term "emergency" implies, the number should only be used when an emergency exists, according to Police Chief Alan Sheffield.

"Emergency" is tough to define as it means different things to different people," Sheffield said.

"As far as the emergency services are concerned, emergency means 'life or death' situations and situations requiring an immediate, hurried response.

"If the dispatcher receives a call that is not an emergency status, the dispatcher will advise the calling party to call back on 592-2181 and terminate the call by activating a message that repeats that 9-1-1 is exclusively for emergency use.

"This is necessary to allow the line open for actual emergency calls. It should be noted that our regular, average response time is under three minutes," Sheffield said.



The chief encouraged parents to educate their children on when and how to use 9-1-1.

"The department's crime prevention unit is currently active in the schools, teaching the correct use of 9-1-1 and we appeal to parents to follow up on this at home," he said.

Parents can help eliminate an unnecessary visit from the police, which is their response when the emergency number is dialed. The address of the call's origin is listed on a computer screen.

"It is a violation of the law to dial in a false report on the telephone," Sheffield said.

Actually, the 9-1-1 emergency phone is available only for testing now. Its activation date is not until March 5.

And therein lies an interesting tidbit.

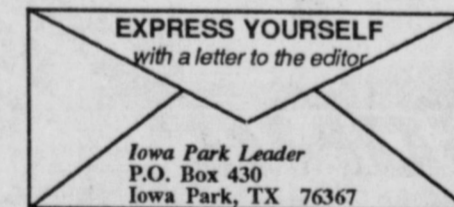

DENTAL COST
If you have not been visiting the Dentist regularly and have been putting it off because of fear that it will cost too much--there is a way to find out the approximate cost before you begin.
Make an appointment with the Dentist for an examination that will include full mouth x-rays. This will enable the Dentist to prepare a treatment plan (a list of things that need to be done) and from this, the estimated cost of the repair to be done.

If you have dental insurance, many times the insurance company will pay for your examination and send you an itemized statement showing how much they will pay on each item. Most insurance companies will not pay the whole fee, but usually pay anywhere from 50 to 80%.
The fee for the examination, x-rays, diagnosis, and estimate should cost about \$45.00 to \$60.00 depending on how complex the treatment and time spent making the diagnosis. Many times the need for repair is not nearly as bad as the person thinks it is and therefore the cost is much less than is expected. 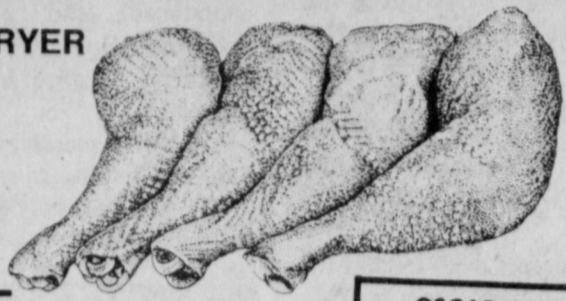
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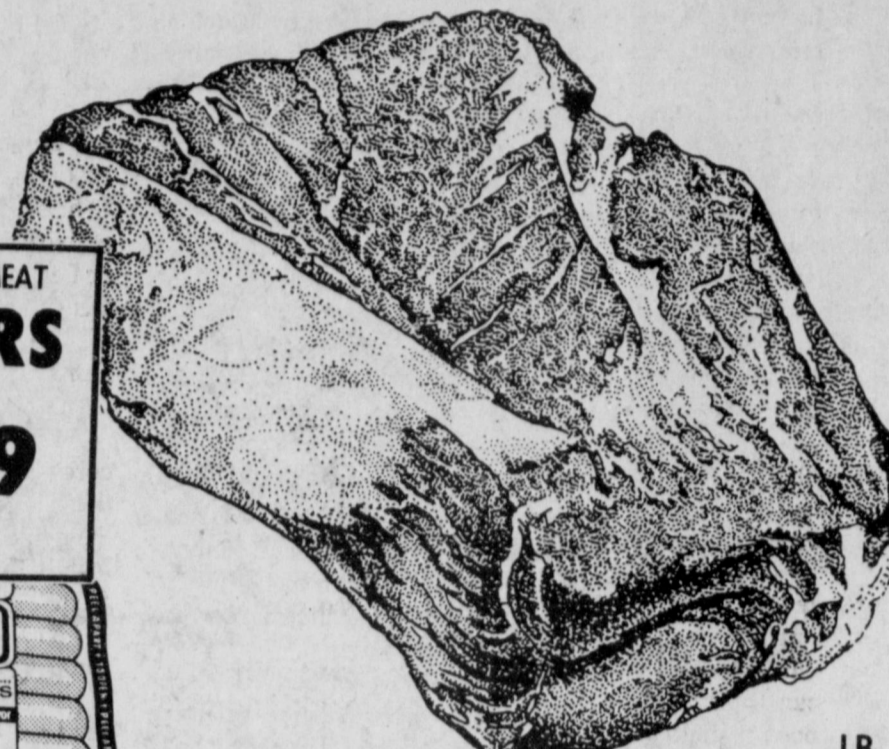

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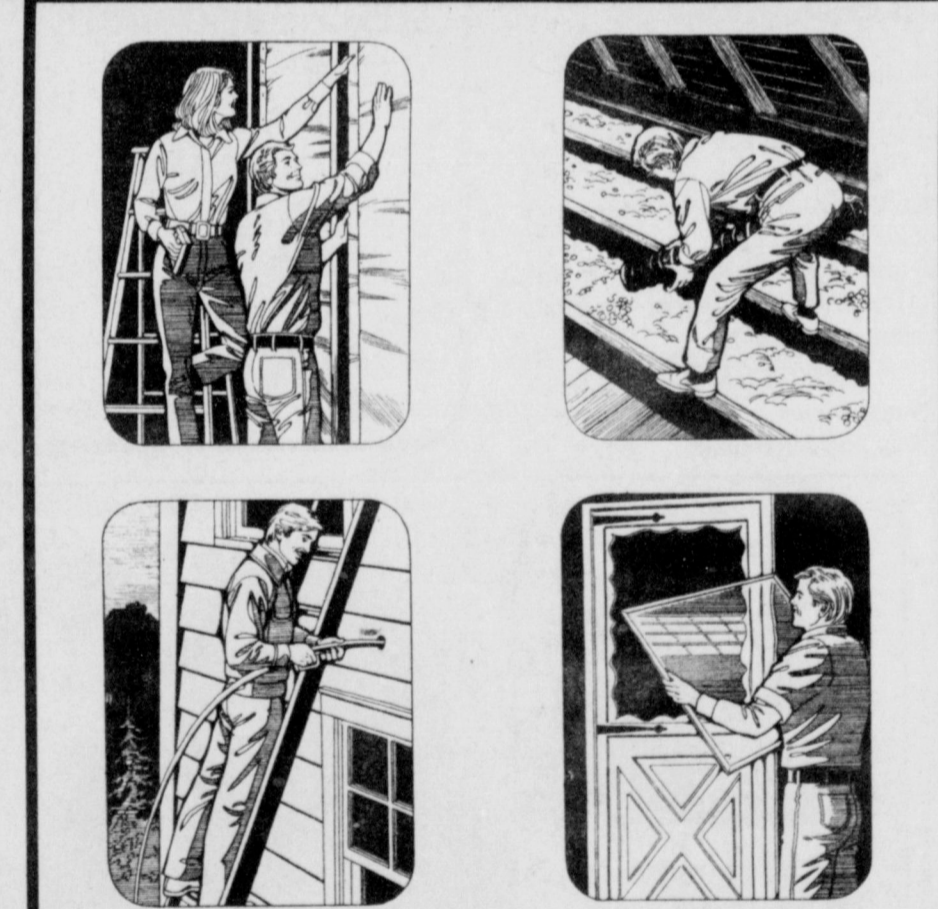
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Cook of the Week

NO-SUGAR APPLE SAUCY OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup applesauce (no sugar)
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup fresh apples (chopped)
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine (softened)
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 3/4 tsp cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. nutmeg
- 4 packets Sweet and Low

Mix all together. Drop by rounded tablespoon on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 23 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 2 dozen cookies. NOTE: Omit fresh apple - increase applesauce to 1 cup.

ARTIFICIAL EGG

- 24 egg whites
- 1 cup powdered milk

- 1 med. onion
- 4 or 5 tsp. garlic
- 2 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. pepper

Brown beef and onions and add cabbage, garlic salt and pepper. Cook until cabbage is tender. Drain fat and set aside to cool. Put mixture in roll recipe.

ROLLS

Dissolve 2 pkgs. yeast in 2 1/2 cups warm water. Add 3/4 cup sugar, 3/4 cup shortening, 2 1/2 tsp. salt and 4 to 4 1/2 cups flour. Pour out and knead until smooth. Let rise twice, then roll out and pinch off enough for a roll. Roll out flat, put tablespoons of meat mixture inside dough and pinch edges together. Place on ungreased baking sheet and bake 20 minutes at 375 degrees.

CHICKEN FRIED RICE

- 3 or 4 chicken breasts, cooked
- 1/4 cup butter
- 3 cups cooked rice
- 1 bell pepper, chopped
- 1 onion
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- Dash of pepper
- 2 Tbsp. Soy sauce
- 1 medium can mushrooms, drained
- 2 eggs, beaten

- 1/2 cup oil (no cholesterol)
- Yellow food coloring
- Mix in blender. Or for a smaller serving:
- 1 egg white
- 2 1/4 tsp. dry non-fat milk.
- 2 tsp. oil (no cholesterol)

BEEROCKS

- 2 lb. beef
- 1 head cabbage, chopped

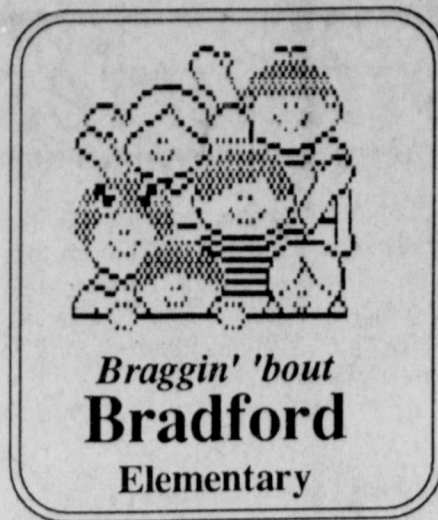
Cut the chicken in small pieces. Melt butter in wok, add meat and cook three minutes. Add rice, bell pepper, onion, mushrooms, soy sauce, salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly. Make hole in center of rice and stir in egg. Cook until eggs are done, stirring constantly. Serve while hot.

Add any other ingredients that you like - green onions, bean sprouts, pea pods, etc.

CHEESY FISH ROLL-UPS

- 1 1/2 cups (6 oz.) mild Cheddar cheese
- 1 1/4 cups fresh bread crumbs
- 2 Tbsp. real mayonnaise
- 2 tsp. prepared horseradish
- 1 lb. sole fillets
- 1 Tbsp. margarine, melted

Combine 1 cup cheese, crumbs, mayonnaise and horseradish; mix lightly. Spoon mixture evenly over fish; roll up, starting from narrow end. Secure with wooden picks. Place fish, seam side down, in 10X6-inch baking dish. Drizzle with margarine. Bake at 350 degrees, 30 minutes or until fish flakes easily with fork. Sprinkle with remaining cheese; continue baking until cheese is melted. Remove wooden picks before serving.

Mrs. McClure received a plaque and was honored at a banquet held at the Wichita Falls Activity Center for her efforts.

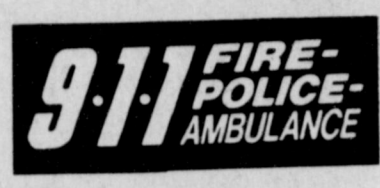

It was no surprise, because she scored more points during the season, 241, than anyone else on the team.

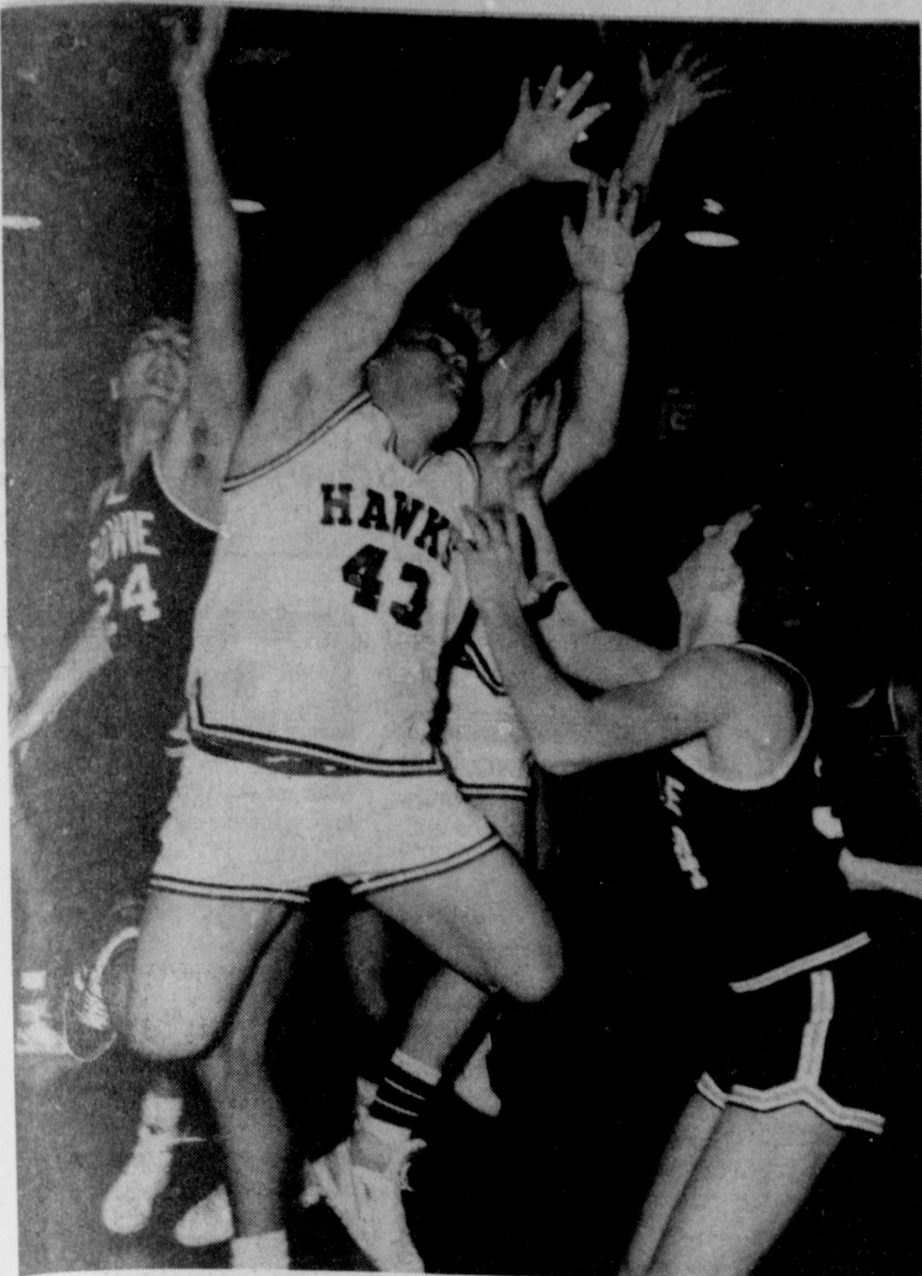
Second-high scorer for the team this season was Tomi Sue Cockburn with 155, and Shonna Weaver had

The Hawks, in order to complete their season on schedule, were forced to play on two consecutive nights last week.

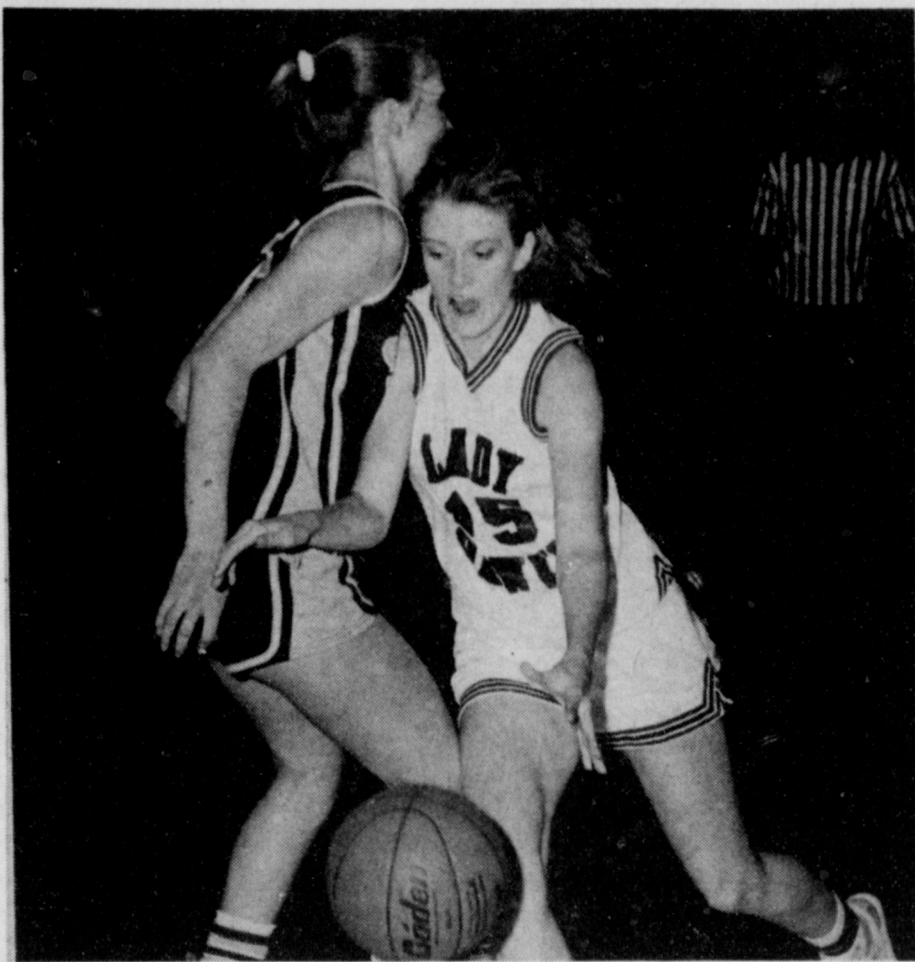

Third place will be determined at a 2:30 p.m. Saturday tipoff, and the championship will begin at 5:30.

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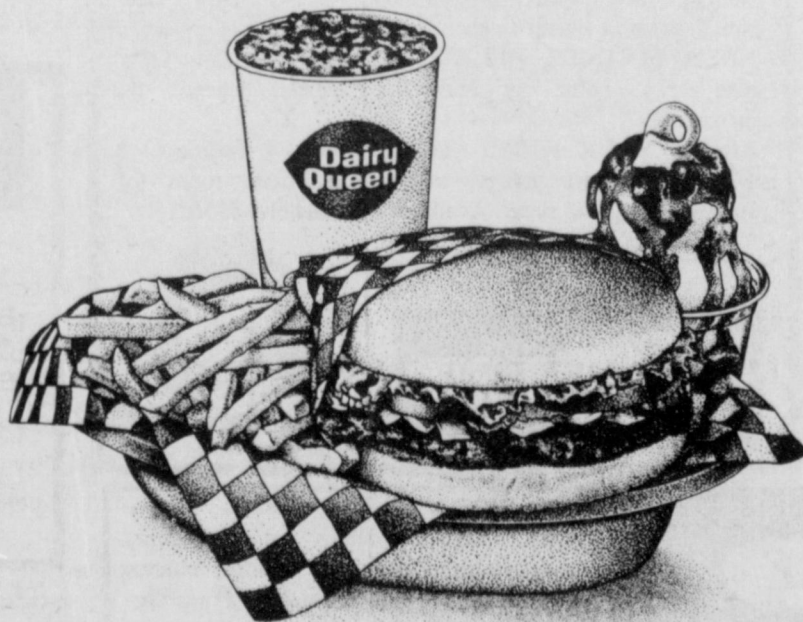

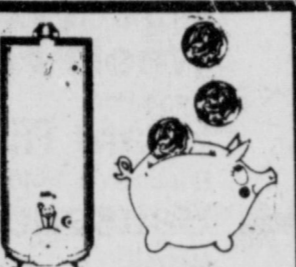

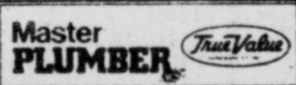

Don Lucy submitted his resignation as head football coach and athletic director at Holliday High School during Monday's meeting of the school board.

Trustees elevated first assistant Matt Robinson to the position, effective Tuesday, according to Supt. Dan Owen.

Lucy, who launched his coaching career in Iowa Park and became one of the area's most successful in high school ranks, said he "just wanted a change ... at least for a while."

He will continue to teach math, Supt. Owen reported, and emphasized there was no pressure on Lucy from board members, administration or fans to make the move.

The 52-year-old Lucy is a graduate of Valley View High School. He started his career in Iowa Park Junior High under Tommy Watkins, and moved up to the high school when Grady Graves, now his next door neighbor, succeeded Watkins.

Since taking over the head Eagle slot, Lucy's teams have amassed an inveable record of 116-46-2.

That included the 1988 season, which wound up 6-4. "A couple of those losses were by one and two points, or we could have won eight," he recalled.

Lucy admitted the change in his lifestyle will probably be difficult to adjust to.

"After 21 years of coaching, it will take some adjusting to," he said.

While his wife, Kay, says she already has a lengthy list of "honey-dos" prepared for him, she added he will likely get to spend more time on the golf course. Lucy is an ardent golfer.

Robinson has been on the coaching staff 11 years.



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
