## Trustees hear costs to handle enrollment

of Iowa Park's growing school enroll ment over the next five years, the school district may have to spen from $\$ 1.5$ - to as much as $\$ 2.5-\mathrm{mil}$ -
That was the preliminary report given the school board Tuesday nigh by a specialist, Gary Keep, who wa engaged by the district to
study of future district needs.
Based on projected increases in
arollment at four campuses, Keep presented his impressions of facilities the district will need by the school year 1993-94.
He based his figures on the five year enrollment reports and projected numbers of students, though admitte jecting the space needs at Kidwell Elementary without a survey of pre school children in the district.
He pointed out that lowa Park "percentage of retained ratios," stu dents who remain in school here by either not moving or dropping out, Eventhough the district has added four classrooms at each of the two elementary campuses, he said least four more were needed.
As he discussed campus-by-cam pus, he gave alternatives and their estimated costs.

of game officials.
"If, regardless of all game arran gements, an attack or threat of an attack should occur on a game official, then the school administration and the school board should take immediate steps to see that the person or persons making the attack or threat on the official or officials is arrested and prosecuted before the proper court of law. There should be
a sincere attempt on the part of the school to see that the guilty perso or persons are brought to justice.
