The police radio dispatcher was asked to summon wreckers four different times Sunday to assist stranded motorists, according to the police blotter.



Consumers should be advised to watch what they eat when they take certain OTC and prescription medications to avoid interactions that may enhance, reduce, speed up or prolong the action of the drugs, according to Brian L.G. Morgan, PhD, of the Columbia University Institute of Human Nutrition. Here are some of the more common food/drug interactions and the suggested advice to consumers.

ASPIRIN - take with some food to avoid gastric irritation. Do not take with large meal, which slows absorption.

ACETAMINOPHEN - avoid taking Vitamin C in excess of 500 mg per day, which prevents excretion of acetamin-ophen.

ALUMINUM HYDROXIDE take between meals.

CALCIUM CARBONATE avoid taking multivitamin supplements.

TETRACYCLINE - take on empty stomach. Do not take within 2 hours of eating or ingesting of supplements high in calcium, iron, zinc or magnesium.

PENICILLIN - take on empty stomach. To prevent nausea side effect, take with fruit juice.

ANTIHISTAMINES - avoid eating large quantities of alkaline foods (dairy products, fruits, vegetables which can increase drug potency. - Vogue



The call, made from the Wichita Falls Community Center, was a formality. It also was part of an informational program to educate the public of the emergency phone system.

A small fee is added onto all telephone bills to pay for the system, but that's only the tip of the iceberg as far as expenses are concerned.

There are a lot more hidden costs connected with the program than most people would know about. And those costs will be borne for a long time to come.

One of the big costs will be the changing of everyone's rural address.

Those who answer emergency calls in the rural areas say they need more than a mail box number on some undesignated road, if they're going to make a quick response.

So, every rural residence is to

have a numbered road address. And that's part of the problem and expense, as well as one big headache.

The 9-1-1 office reportedly began to set up addresses for all the rural dwellings. But it was done without any contact, I'm told, with the postal department people, who have to work with those addresses every day, not just in emergencies.

So, I understand after considerable squabbling, the postal people won out. But after the 9-1-1 people had spent an awful lot of time doing their own numbering system.

Then, armed with road names provided them, the postal people got into the numbering act. That project is almost completed.

But we're talking a big area, to cover all the rural areas of Wichita and Wilbarger counties, which make up the communications district.

Some road names were changed, because they were similar or confusing with other street and road names in the counties.

I've already had a number of address changes from subscribers who live on Huntington Lane. Iowa Park area addresses haven't been changed, officially, but will be soon.

And there is where the hidden expense comes in.

Every rural resident must notify all the people who send him newspapers, magazines and other types of mail of the new address.

That is an expense to the resident, and then the real expense is to the mailers.

The extended time period to which I referred is all those magazines and other mailers outside the area. Locals, like the Leader, will be able to accomplish the change in fairly quick order. But the national and regional magazine people aren't so

quick.

If you've ever moved, you'll know what I mean.

We're happy to cooperate with the address changes. And I only hope it's all for nothing.

If it's for nothing, it'll mean our rural people haven't had an occasion of emergency.

Let me pass along what all the emergency response people tell me, however. Don't call 9-1-1 unless there is a life or property threatening situation.

And if you do have to call that number, stay on the line until the dispatcher on the other end tells you to hang up.

Again, hopefully none of you will ever have to use the number.

Merchants learn of available services

Iowa Park retail merchants heard Tuesday night a lengthy presentation of services local businesses can receive through the Small Business Development Center at Midwestern State Univ.

Tim Thomas, assistant director and former employee at Crvovac, was the speaker for the monthly meeting of the branch of Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

"We can do seminars on virtually any business topic," he told the group.

Purpose of the Center is to help small business start, expand or survive, and the measure of the Center's success is the creation of jobs, he said.

Initial projects to be explored, as requested by members, is to have an economics survey made of the community, and one or more seminars on advertising.

The Center, which is operating this year on a budget of \$160,000, has not yet charged for any services it has provided to area businesses, Thomas said.

The gospel is a message of salvation from condemnation. It is the greatest gift ever received by any living person. In every sense of the word it is good news, and should be presented joyfully.


