## Police charge two men with series of thefts

Two Iowa Park men were arrested Friday and charged with felony theft over \$750.

Warrants were issued on the pair after numerous items, ranging from table saws to motorcycles, were recovered from a house two weeks ago on Huntington Lane, north of US 287.

Timothy Clark Bookout, 19, and Bryan Wayne McMahon, 20, were taken into custody Saturday morning and transported to Wichita County jail.

A 35-year-old woman, Mary Ann Hill, was arrested Monday afternoon and charged with shoplifting shoes and jeans at Wal-Mart. She also was taken to county jail.

Two other thefts were reported to police this week, according to the police blotter.

The owner of a pickup reported his tailgate being taken Sunday while parked in the 1100 block of Cornelia.

Tuesday, a resident in the 1000 block of Lincoln told police someone had taken a trailer-mounted meat smoker from his back yard, as well as a child's wagon. The items were valued at over \$750.

Four cases of criminal mischief were reported last week to police, three of them within a two-hour period Saturday.

Someone reportedly threw two bricks through a large plate glass window at Allstar Communications, 1502 Johnson Road, causing about \$2,000 in damage.

When the glass shattered, it fell into three sets of drum traps, causing heavy damage.

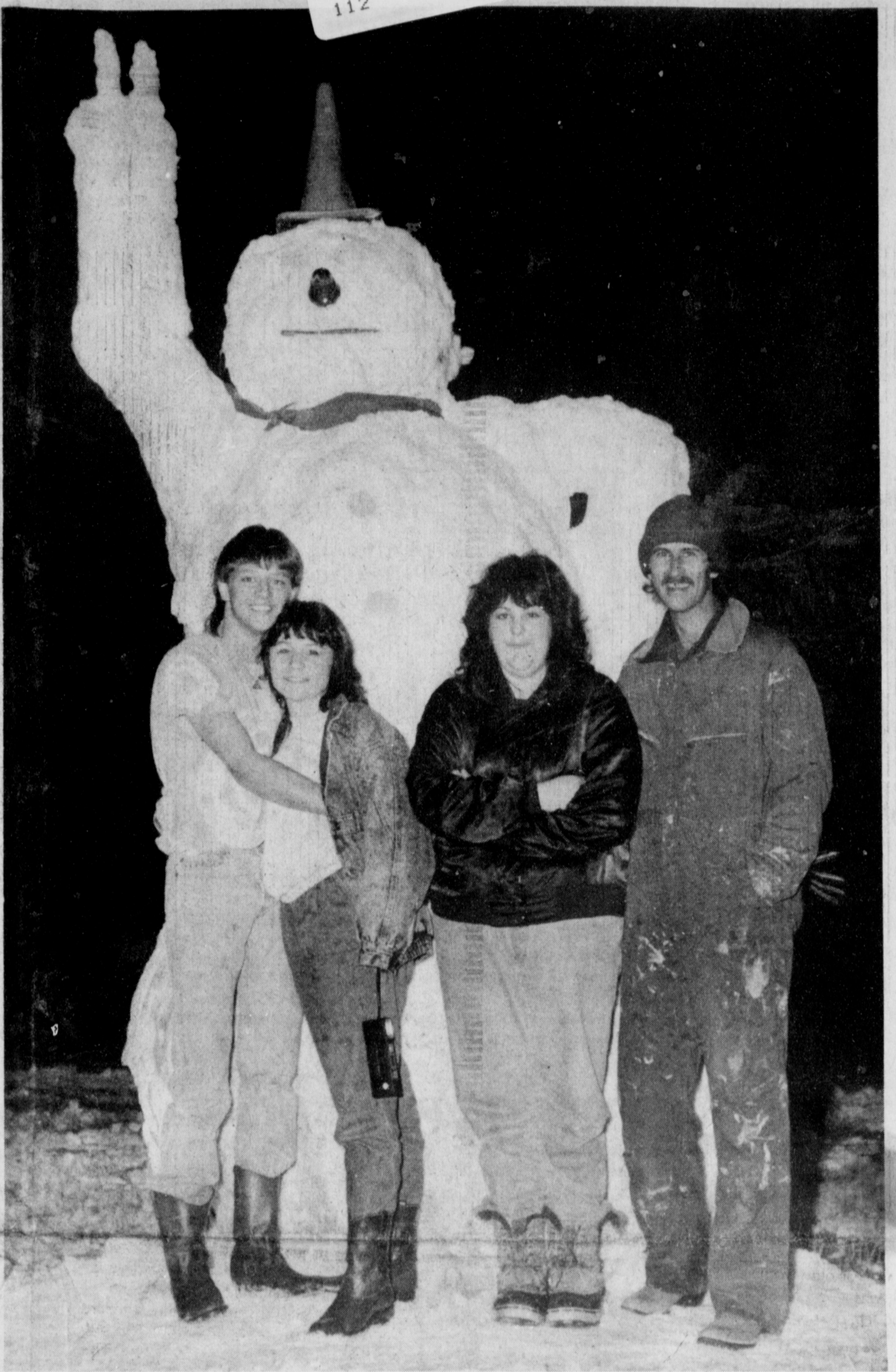
A brick that appeared to match those used to break the window was thrown through a window of a pickup parked in the 700 block of South Colorado. That incident also was reported Saturday morning.

In between those reports, a resident in the 1500 block of N. Victoria told police three mail boxes had been knocked over.

## Student's bird brings \$18,000

Earning enough money is one of the major goals of any high school student, and Iowa Park senior Susan Howell reached her goal last week.

Her reserve champion turkey at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo was sold for \$18,000.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Howell of Valley View has had a champion or reserve champion turkey in the Wichita County show every year since she was nine years old, most of the time competing

with her brother, George, for top placings.

Last year was her first time to enter the huge Houston show, and it "didn't even make it through the first sift," she said.

But Thursday morning, her tom was judged best of show and then placed reserve champion to a hen entered by Lisa Rode of San Antonio.

At Friday's sale, the 41-pound Iowa Park bird was purchased by four Houstonians, Larry Davis Western Wear, E.H. Nettles, Alice Elliott and Kathleen L. Wright. Their price was reportedly about twice what was paid from the 1988 reserve champion.

The most she had ever received for one of her champions in the past was \$750, she said.

The San Antonio girls' grand champion brought \$25,000.

The Houston show requires that all entries in the turkey judging be

purchased from the Texas A&M Univ. facility at Temple. All the birds are hatched at the same time, and identified with a tattoo.

Susan bought five for this year's shows, and figures she has about \$500 tied up in feed thus far.

Susan, who's father is a former vocational agriculture teacher at Iowa Park High and is currently president of the school board, said Tuesday she plans to use her prize money to enroll at Texas Tech Univ., where she wants to study to become a nurse.

## City, school meetings Monday

Because of a conflict in schedules for some members of the school board, trustees will be holding their regular monthly meeting Monday, the same evening as the city council, instead of on Tuesday.

Trustees held a lengthy work session last week to hear principals of the district express their opinions of future facility and personnel needs over the next five years.

One of the items on Monday's agenda is further consideration of a district improvement plan.

The board several years ago adopted a policy of acting on all teacher contracts during the March

meeting, and that also is on the agenda.

Other items on the board's meeting agenda are: to consider a request from the Red Cross to use school buildings and grounds in case of a disaster; adoption of the textbook committee report; consider a bid for a new pickup; act on a proposed school calendar for 1989-90, and consider a revision of the board policy on health insurance.

Trustees are to meet at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

City aldermen, who will meet at 7 p.m. in the council chambers, are to consider revisions in the animal control policy and policies to be used at Burnett Softball Field.

Two public appearances are on the agenda, including one that was heard and rejected a year ago.

Danny Haynes, according to the agenda, will ask the city for water service to the car sales lot he operates on city property at the corner of W. Highway and Fourth Street.

Mrs. Mary Wilson is also scheduled to appear and request sewer service to a residence at Saratoga and E.

## Blizzard buries area

No one apparently knows for sure how much snow Iowa Park received Sunday, but everyone knows it was considerable.

Wichita Falls is reporting 10 inches and Electra one.

But the problem is, the snow was accompanied by high winds that caused drifts up to five feet, while leaving some areas of level, unprotected grown almost clean.

Iowa Park's unofficial observer,

Virgil Woodfin, admitted he couldn't find an area where an "average" measurement could be taken, and his rain gauge caught only .10 of an inch after melting.

"It was a wet snow," he added. If 10 inches of snow fell, and was wet, that should equate to one inch of moisture. It takes 12 inches of "dry" snow to produce the same amount of moisture, Woodfin explained.

A front struck the Iowa Park area

about midnight Friday, with thunder, lightning, sleet and high winds.

Temperatures dropped dramatically from the high of upper 60s Friday and did not reach above freezing until Monday afternoon. Coldest reported temperature was eight degrees.

Harsh, cold weather forced cancellation of the track meet at Iowa Park High Saturday.

Saturday night the snow began blowing into the area, and drifted to a point where few vehicles could maneuver on the streets Sunday.

Iowa Park and most of the other schools of the area cancelled classes Monday, because of bad roads.

The cold weather prohibited city workers from clearing the streets with heavy equipment until Monday. Administrator James Barrington said employees worked all day Sunday to get the equipment running, but not in time to roll that day.

Volunteer firemen took shifts manning the fire station all day Sunday, in order to have a quick response in case of need. They were never called, however.

Some firemen in their personal vehicles had to be pulled from drifts in their driveways and streets, in order to reach the fire station.

The police radio dispatcher was asked to summon wreckers four different times Sunday to assist stranded motorists, according to the police blotter.

Other than that, the only other weather-related problems was a minor accident Sunday, and complaints Monday and Tuesday of juveniles throwing snowballs at passing motorists and at houses.

Oldtimers said Sunday's storm was the worst blizzard they'd seen here in more than three decades.

## No new names added to ballots

There are still only five candidates for the five city and school seats to be voted on, according to election officials.

As of last week, both the seats on the school board election had candidates, including incumbent Jerry Reed for Place Four and newcomer Larry Godwin for Place Five.

Only incumbents have filed for the three seats to be decided on the city council. They are Johnny Coker, Place Three; Diane Robnett, Place Five, and Virgil Woodfin, Place One.

Deadline to file for a place in the May 6 election ballots is March 22.

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## Food Interactions

Consumers should be advised to watch what they eat when they take certain OTC and prescription medications to avoid interactions that may enhance, reduce, speed up or prolong the action of the drugs, according to Brian L.G. Morgan, PhD, of the Columbia University Institute of Human Nutrition. Here are some of the more common food/drug interactions and the suggested advice to consumers.

**ASPIRIN** - take with some food to avoid gastric irritation. Do not take with large meal, which slows absorption.

**ACETAMINOPHEN** - avoid taking Vitamin C in excess of 500 mg per day, which prevents excretion of acetamin-ophen.

**ALUMINUM HYDROXIDE** - take between meals.

**CALCIUM CARBONATE** - avoid taking multivitamin supplements.

**TETRACYCLINE** - take on empty stomach. Do not take within 2 hours of eating or ingesting of supplements high in calcium, iron, zinc or magnesium.

**PENICILLIN** - take on empty stomach. To prevent nausea side effect, take with fruit juice.

**ANTIHISTAMINES** - avoid eating large quantities of alkaline foods (dairy products, fruits, vegetables which can increase drug potency. - *Vogue*

Freshmen selected were enrolled at MSU for at least 12 semester hours and maintained a 3.60 or higher grade point average.

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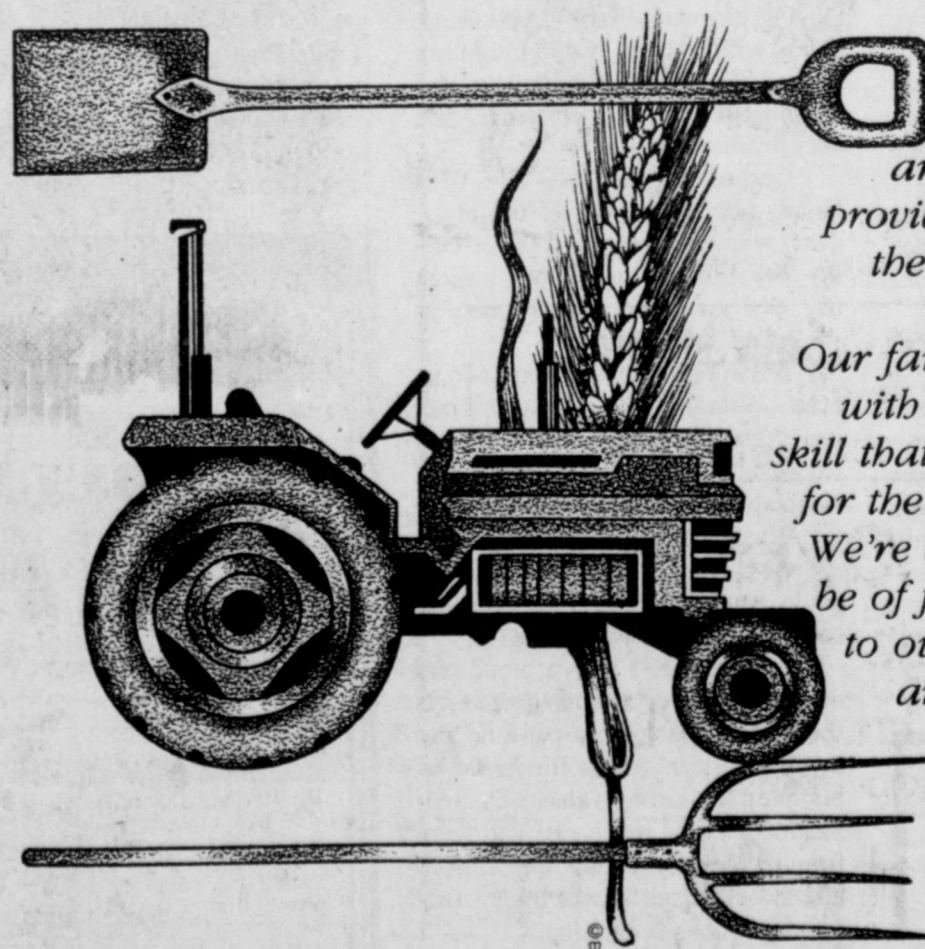
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# As I See It...

Bud Burch, Iowa Park city alderman and a member of the 9-1-1 Communications District, placed a call to the Iowa Park police department at 10:25 a.m. Saturday, and informed the dispatcher that the 9-1-1 emergency telephone system was officially in service.

The call, made from the Wichita Falls Community Center, was a formality. It also was part of an informational program to educate the public of the emergency phone system.

A small fee is added onto all telephone bills to pay for the system, but that's only the tip of the iceberg as far as expenses are concerned.

There are a lot more hidden costs connected with the program than most people would know about. And those costs will be borne for a long time to come.

One of the big costs will be the changing of everyone's rural address.

Those who answer emergency calls in the rural areas say they need more than a mail box number on some undesignated road, if they're going to make a quick response.

So, every rural residence is to

have a numbered road address. And that's part of the problem and expense, as well as one big headache.

The 9-1-1 office reportedly began to set up addresses for all the rural dwellings. But it was done without any contact, I'm told, with the postal department people, who have to work with those addresses every day, not just in emergencies.

So, I understand after considerable squabbling, the postal people won out. But after the 9-1-1 people had spent an awful lot of time doing their own numbering system.

Then, armed with road names provided them, the postal people got into the numbering act. That project is almost completed.

But we're talking a big area, to cover all the rural areas of Wichita and Wilbarger counties, which make up the communications district.

Some road names were changed, because they were similar or confusing with other street and road names in the counties.

I've already had a number of address changes from subscribers who live on Huntington Lane. Iowa Park area addresses haven't been changed, officially, but will be soon.

And there is where the hidden expense comes in.

Every rural resident must notify all the people who send him newspapers, magazines and other types of mail of the new address.

That is an expense to the resident, and then the real expense is to the mailers.

The extended time period to which I referred is all those magazines and other mailers outside the area. Locals, like the Leader, will be able to accomplish the change in fairly quick order. But the national and regional magazine people aren't so

quick.

If you've ever moved, you'll know what I mean.

We're happy to cooperate with the address changes. And I only hope it's all for nothing.

If it's for nothing, it'll mean our rural people haven't had an occasion of emergency.

Let me pass along what all the emergency response people tell me, however. Don't call 9-1-1 unless there is a life or property threatening situation.

And if you do have to call that number, stay on the line until the dispatcher on the other end tells you to hang up.

Again, hopefully none of you will ever have to use the number.

## Merchants learn of available services

Iowa Park retail merchants heard Tuesday night a lengthy presentation of services local businesses can receive through the Small Business Development Center at Midwestern State Univ.

Tim Thomas, assistant director and former employee at Cryovac, was the speaker for the monthly meeting of the branch of Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

"We can do seminars on virtually any business topic," he told the group.

Purpose of the Center is to help small business start, expand or survive, and the measure of the Center's success is the creation of jobs, he said.

Initial projects to be explored, as requested by members, is to have an economics survey made of the community, and one or more seminars on advertising.

The Center, which is operating this year on a budget of \$160,000,

has not yet charged for any services it has provided to area businesses, Thomas said.

Seminars, courses and workshops on such topics as marketing strategies, entrepreneurial opportunities, personnel management, how to start a business and financing alternatives, are available, according to the brochure Thomas distributed.

Kenneth Via, Chamber president and coordinator of the retail merchants' group, said the Center's offer

of programs will be utilized at the group's regular, first-Tuesday meetings in the future.

Thomas is well acquainted with the area, having lived here since 1973, retiring from the Air Force, worked two years at Cryovac and operated his own engineering consultant service before joining the Center.

He said the retail merchants can best function by establishing problems, setting goals and seeking help.

**GOSPEL PREACHING**  
Let a man stand in the pulpit, preach "hellfire and damnation" to sinners, denouncing the sins of everyone except himself, and someone will leave the assembly saying, "Now that is what I call gospel preaching!"  
I am bothered by that assessment. It's not that I disagree with the wicked being punished. Jesus and Paul spoke clearly on the subject. The word I am troubled by is the abuse of the word "gospel".  
Jesus came preaching the "gospel of the kingdom of God"; Ephesians speaks of the "gospel of your salvation" and Paul told the elders of Ephesus that his purpose is "to testify to the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24). Always the gospel is spoken of with great joy. The gospel is "good news". Coming from the Greek it means "good tidings". In English it literally becomes "the good story". I take it when man is preaching the gospel he is sharing good news with his audience.  
In speaking to the Corinthians Paul declared "the gospel which I preached to you...I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins...He was buried, and He was raised on the third day..." (1 Cor. 15:1-4). What better news could there be than we learn that we can be saved by death, burial, and resurrection of Christ?  
The gospel is a message of salvation from condemnation. It is the greatest gift ever received by any living person. In every sense of the word it is good news, and should be presented joyfully.  
When this great message is presented eagerly, enthusiastically, and with love, I call that "gospel preaching."

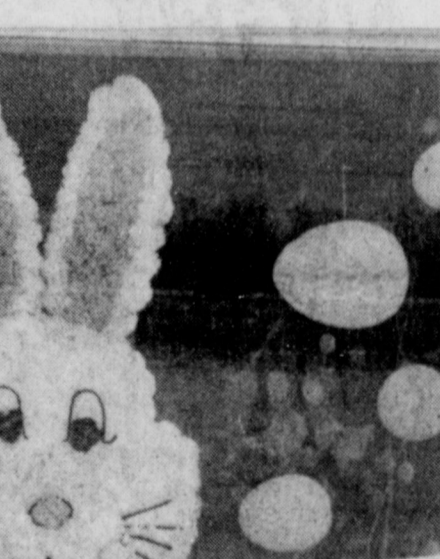
