Food Interactions
Consumers should be advised to watch what they eat when they take certain OTC and prescription medications to avoid interactions that may enhance, reduce, speed up or prolong the action of the drugs, according to Brian L.G. Morgan, PhD, of the Columbia University Institute of Human Nutrition Here are some of the more common food/drug interactions and the suggested advice to consumers.

ASPIRIN - take with some food to avoid gastric irritation. Do not take with large meal, which slows absorption.
ACETAMINOPHEN - avoid taking Vitamin $C$ in excess of 500 mg per day, which prevents excretion of acetamin-ophen.

ALUMINUM HYDROXIDE - take between meals.

CALCIUM CARBONATE - avoid taking multivitamin supplements.
TETRACYCLINE - take on empty stomach. Do not take within 2 hours of eating or ingesting ofsupplements high in calcium, iron, zinc or magnesium.

PENICILLIN - take on empty stomach. To prevent nausea side effect, take with fruit juice.

ANTIHISTAMINES - avoid eating large quantities of alkaline foods (dairy products, fruits, vegetables which can increase drug potency. - Vogue

If approved by Texas voters,
HJR 2 would allow HJR 2 would allow local govern-
ments to seek reimbursement from the state comptroller if funds are not provided to pay for required programs.
"The legislature cannot continue
to ignore the tax burden it is shifting to ignore the tax burden it is shifting to local government," Finnell said. "Rural Texans are being squeezed hard enough without having to pay them in recent years."
Finnell said he opposed HB 72 in 1984, because the state decreased local control of education and failed to provide funding for the extensive public school changes mandated by be bill.
He said HB 72 and the state's from overflowing county jails have cost Texans millions in local property tax increases.
"It's time the state lives up to its obligations to local government," he said. "State fiscal problems should not be translated into local fiscal problems."
