Police seeking grant for needed personnel

Although the decision to ask the city council for permission to seek grants to fund a juvenile officer and crime prevention officer for the police department was made before this week, the police blotter shows clear need for both.

During the past seven days, four thefts were listed on the blotter, and eight complaints concerning juveniles.

The requests for grants to fund the two positions will be considered Monday at the council meeting.

The juvenile complaints received by police included:

* two youths had to be escorted from a store after refusing to leave when asked;

* vandalism in the 1100 block of Louisa;

* car egging in the 1300 block of Edgell;

* a five year old was found wandering in a street looking for parents, and had no clothes on;

* youths were shooting fireworks in the 100 block of Wood Circle;

* youths, possible intoxicated, were in the back yard of a home, but officers were unable to locate them after being called;

* two juveniles were taken into custody for shoplifting at a store Monday;

* a criminal trespass complaint

was filed against a 16 year old Wednesday morning.

The first of the four thefts reported was Wednesday of last week, when it was determined a battery was taken from a tractor in the metal building by the high school baseball field.

Friday, police were informed that a lawnmower and bicycle were taken from a carport in the 400 block of West Texas.

Someone reportedly cut the lock off a shed in the 100 block of North Hawthorne and took a set of brass cymbals, police were told Sunday.

A bicycle was reported as stolen from an apartment at 1001 Johnson Road, police were told yesterday.

Two arrests also were made by police during the week.

Herman Kenneth Crossman, 44, was picked up at East Highway and Hawthorne late Saturday night and charged with public intoxication. He was released four hours later, after paying his fine, to the Burkburnett wanted on outstanding warrants.

Police also took Larry Dean, 30, into custody Thursday after it was determined there were outstanding Department of Public Safety warrants against him.

TERRY DEATHERAGE

Weekend racer describes himself as 'real hyper'

Some call it guts. Some call it determination. Most call it crazy. But after 25 years of motorcycle and car racing and several serious accidents, Terry Deatherage still gets behind the wheel and takes more chances.

His explanation: "I'm real hyper."

A two-year resident of Iowa Park, he began racing motorcycles in the mid-1960s, and switched to round-track race car driving 10 years later.

His racing record has been peppered with great successes as well as serious injuries, and according to Deatherage, the thrill more than outweighs the risk.

"You just don't understand what it's like. Coming off the corner running third place and one lap to go and on the last lap coming off the corner for the checker in front of 10,000 people on their feet, and winning the race!"

During his racing career, Deatherage has heard the cheers of fans several times, winning over 100 races, 60 of them feature events.

While running with the United States Auto Club circuit in 1981, Terry was named Rookie of the Year, placing fourth highest in points. He came in second in lifetime points in the National Championship Racing Assoc., missing first by just nine points.

Deatherage said, "I do it as a hobby. A lot of the racers I race with make their living at it." And a dangerous hobby it is.

In 1970, Deatherage crashed during a race, breaking his neck in four places. After being in traction four months, and having to learn how to walk again, he re-entered motor-cycle racing in a year.

During only his second race after returning, Deatherage broke both shoulders and an arm in another accident, bringing the total to 18 broken bones during his career. He continued racing cycles until 1975, when he switched to stock cars.

He continued racing cars until 1977 when a racing shop he owned in Wichita, Kan., blew up leaving Deatherage in the hospital with third degree burns over 47 percent of his body.

"Everybody told me I couldn't race again. The doctors told me (I'd never race)," he said.

But they were wrong. After five surgeries and several months of physical therapy, in less than a year, Deatherage was racing again.

But not for long. In 1978, a month after his return and with previous burns still not healed, Deatherage was burned again in a racing accident, this time on his face.

He said, "The second time I got burned, I said, 'that's it.'" Deatherage sold all of his equipment and for six weeks sat around the house.

He was back into racing shortly thereafter.

"It (racing) is something I can do. I'm not the kind that can sit around and have a flower garden... can you see me raising tomatoes?" he laughed.

Since '78, the most serious accident Deatherage concedes to is broken ribs and a punctured lung, sustained in 1983.

Deatherage now races on two circuits, the NCRA and the World of Outlaws, traveling throughout the midwest on the weekends. Always traveling with him is 15-year-old son, Greg, who is his father's pit crew chief.

Although Greg has no desire to drive, he enjoys the mechanical work involved in racing. Said Deatherage of his son, "He knows more about racing than most adults."

Greg has been going to the races with his father since he was 12, and once asked his dad, "What do normal people do on the weekends?"

Terry and his wife, Mary Anne, have three children, Greg, Shana and Michelle.

Still, to Deatherage, his racing is just a hobby. During the week, he owns and operates Deatherage Certi-

fied Opicians in Wichita Falls.

He stressed, "I'm a professional during the week and a racer during the

Council decision seen on water tower project

Iowa Park city aldermen are to make a decision, based on bids to be opened today, on whether to buy a new water tower or relocate one now in inventory.

The decision is to be made when the council meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The city has advertised for bids to either construct a new, 250,000 gallon overhead storage facility or move a similar size tank.

Although the city has three overhead towers, only one is operational. When the tower was constructed on Johnson Road, it was erected at an elevation that renders the other two towers useless, because of automated refilling equipment.

The older two towers cannot be used until the Johnson Road tower is almost empty.

A study was made to change the

elevations of the existing towers, but it was determined the cost would be greater than moving or building.

A site has been selected in the south part of town for a tower. When two towers are serving the city, instead of one, pressure will be improved considerably, according to the engineer.

The tower to possibly be moved is the one located at Lake Gordon.

Council members will hear a report by Administrator James Barrington on priorities for street work to be accomplished this summer, as well as proposals for improvements to the Tom Burnett Memorial Library and its grounds.

Representatives of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department are to make a personal appearance before the council, seeking use of a city vehicle by the department.

Mayor Tim Hunter, according to

the meeting agenda, is to proclaim April 9-15 as National Building Safety Week in the community.

News Briefs

1.05 measured from rain, snow

Area gardeners and farmers are hoping Tuesday's snow signaled the end of winter, but welcomed more than an inch of moisture measured here during this week.

Iowa Park received .95 of an inch rain Sunday, accompanied by soft pea and marble size hail, as well as considerable lightning, thunder and high winds.

Then, about sunrise Tuesday, a two-hour snowshower produced slightly more than an inch of snow that melted to .10 of an inch moisture, according to Virgil Woodfin.

All toll, the two systems produced 1.05 in moisture, Woodfin said.

Monday was officially the first day of spring.

City's auction this afternoon

Among the items the city of Iowa Park will offer for bids this afternoon are three vehicles and 13 bicycles.

The public auction will begin at 5 p.m. at the public works complex, which is located near the irrigation ditch south of town on FM 368.

Two pickups and a car are the

largest items on the list, as are a 2,000 gallon fuel storage tank with pump on skids and 1,000 gallon fuel storage tank with pump on a stand.

Office items in the sale are a four-drawer cabinet, wooden desk, telephone, two electric calculators and an electric typewriter.

The bicycles are all sizes. Seven are 10-speed and one is a 12-speed.

Eventhough the local 4-H and FFA Project Show was smaller in numbers of entries than usual, Iowa Park area youngsters lived up to their reputation and had the lion's share of stock in the Wichita County Junior Livestock Show premium auction Monday night.

Of 167 head sold in the auction, 71 were from Iowa Park and Valley View.

The Iowa Park FFA had the most from the area, 45. Iowa Park 4-H had 15, Valley View 4-H 10 and Iowa Park Junior FFA one.

Rusty Downs exhibited his cross-bred hog to the grand championship, though it was chosen reserve grand champion at the local show. He's an FFA member.

Reserve grand champion rabbit was shown by Steven Raby, Iowa Park 4-H member.

Four candidates running for same trustee place

Voters will have to decide from among at least four candidates for one of the school trustee positions when they mark their ballots May 6.

During the past week, three more hopefuls joined Larry Godwin for the Place Five chair on the school board, being vacated by Jimmy Howell.

Godwin was the first to file, but his opposition now includes Carmen Lazipone, Keith Fisher and Dennis (Denny) McCarthy.

The filings were reported four hours before the deadline Wednesday, but at least one other application had

been requested but not returned.

Jerry Reed was unopposed to return to his Place Four on the board.

Although no one had filed for the city council election, other than the three incumbents, at least one filing form had been picked up by a possible candidate.

As of presstime Wednesday, the three incumbents, Virgil Woodfin in Place One, Johnny Coker in Place Three and Diane Robnett in Place Five, were unopposed.

Drawings for positions on the respective ballots is expected to take place today, in order for them to be printed.

Pioneer diary excerpts read at 23 Study Club meeting

The National Women's History Month inspired the date for the 23 Study Club's Texas-Guest Day meeting and program, held Thursday afternoon in the First Baptist Church chapel and Fellowship Hall.

The program featured a book review, "A Day At A Time," by Margo Culley, given by Mrs. Lydia Thomas of Wichita Falls, a retired librarian. Her presentation featured excerpts from 10 of the 29 diaries compiled by American women from 1760 until 1970.

The stories were marked with real clarity and clarified the constant pain and happiness of American women as they experienced life abroad, on a whaling vessel, traveling in oxen-drawn wagons, freezing in winter, terror of the Civil War to the present struggle for equal opportunities. Mrs. Thomas described these women as ordinary American women who made a mosaic of American history.

She presented the diary excerpts in such a way that her listeners could

see that the experiences of their grandmothers and great-grandmothers truly grasp the link between America's past and the personal present-day situation.

She reviewed the diary excerpts and dates of entry of the following women: Mary Vial Holejoke 1768; Abigail Abbott 1770; Margaret Van Horn 1810; Amelia Stewart 1853; Elizabeth Frances Andrews 1864; Ann Holmes Rickelson 1871; Mary Dodge Woodward 1885; a woman at a cannery 1912; Abigail Lewis 1945; and an Indian woman 1970.

Mrs. Erwin Soell, vice-president of the club, introduced Mrs. Thomas.

Mrs. Warren McDonald served as program chairman. Mrs. John Clapp presented the devotion on Friendship taken from "The Golden Gems of Life," a book that has been preserved through the years.

Mrs. Gary Zeitler, pianist, presented the fine arts number which was a medley of Texas songs followed by "Moonlight Sonata," a classical piece.

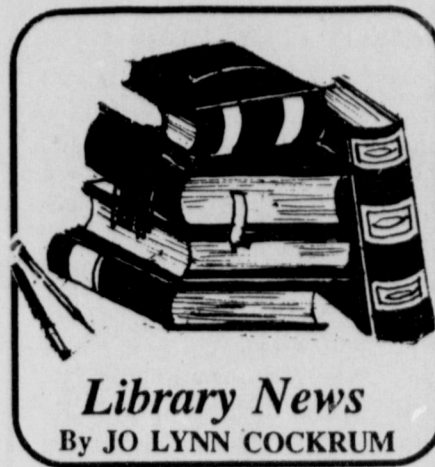

Black ministries studied at Baptist Women meeting

Twelve members of the Thelma Smith Baptist Women met at First Baptist Church Monday night for a home missions program given by Mrs. Carl McKinnon.

The program featured a review of the second chapter of "Together We Can" by Joe Westbury, a book which describes the efforts of Southern Baptists to spread the gospel through different program approaches and people of different races.

The review for the night focused attention on Lyman Alexander, a Black Church Ministries field representative for southern California, who is appointed by the Home Mission Board and the Baptist General Convention of California.

Mrs. McKinnon stated that Alexander estimates the lost black population to be 1.7-million and growing and says that they cannot be reached by store-front churches on the streets, so he is helping them to grow new Southern Baptist black churches. Many of these churches are started in homes, and the pastors have many problems that send them to Alexander.

He encourages them to seek Southern Baptist affiliation to stabilize declining membership and many of their problems. He is also trying hard to relate to the black pastors and grow black churches in metropolitan Los Angeles, and to get churches to sponsor growing churches.

Hostesses for the meeting were Mrs. S.B. Reaves and Mrs. V.I. Woodfin. An Easter theme was carried out in refreshment table decorations and featured a parade of dolls dressed in Easter attire, bunnies and baskets of colorfully-wrapped candy.

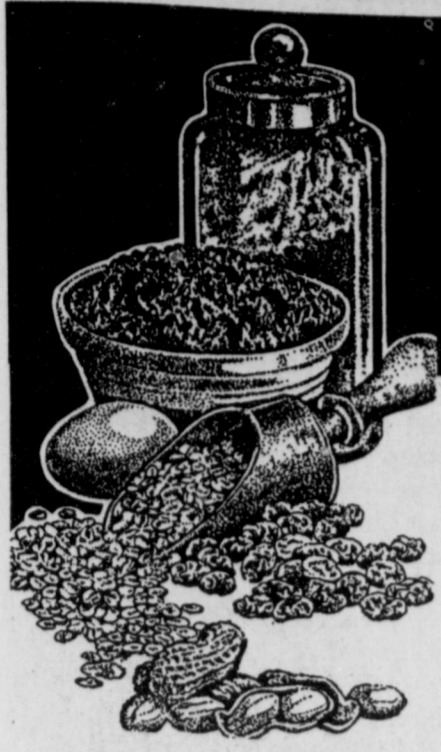

BUTTER ROLLS

- 1 recipe biscuit dough
- 1/2 cup butter (not oleo)
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- Milk
- Vanilla

Roll out biscuit dough to about 1/2-inch thick; cut into squares or circles (use a saucer). Sprinkle with 1/2 cup butter, 1/2 cup sugar and vanilla. Roll up and crimp ends. Place in a cobbler pan and sprinkle with remaining sugar. Cover with milk or cream and place in 300 degree oven. The dough will float; cook until top is brown.

SHRIMP AND RICE SUPREME

- 1 can cream of celery soup
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1/2 can small peas
- 1 can shrimp, drained
- 1 can sliced mushrooms
- 2 Tbsp. minced parsley
- 1/2 tsp. curry powder

Blend milk, water and soup. In 2 quart casserole dish, put rice, peas, mushrooms, shrimp, parsley and curry powder. Pour milk over and mix well. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Garnish with almonds.

SOUTHERN GINGERBREAD

- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 3/4 cup molasses
- 3/4 cup melted shortening
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 2 tsp. soda
- 2 tsp. ginger
- 1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. cloves
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 cup boiling water

Add beaten eggs to the sugar, molasses and melted shortening, then add dry ingredients which have been measured and sifted. Lastly add hot water. Bake in muffin pans or large shallow pan 30 to 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

NEVER FAIL MERINGUE

- 1 tsp. cornstarch
- 1 tsp. cold water
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 3 egg whites
- 6 tsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Pinch of salt

Blend cornstarch and cold water in a saucepan; add boiling water and cook, stirring until clear and thickened. Let stand until completely cool. Beat egg whites until foamy; gradually add sugar and beat until stiff, but not dry. Add salt and vanilla. Gradually beat in cornstarch mixture. Beat well. Spread meringue over cooled pie filling. Bake at 350 degrees about 10 minutes. This pie cuts beautifully and never gets sticky.

Jordan learned the art from her mother, and has taught some 150 people to tat at the Iowa Park RAC Center, YWCA and Midwestern State Univ.

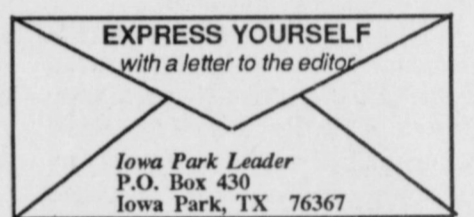
She then exhibited items she had made including Easter eggs, baskets, picture frames, doilies and Christmas ornaments.

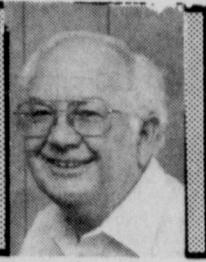
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As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



It appeared that this session of the state legislature was going to do something about workers compensation problems in Texas.

The first bill filed, House Bill 1 authored by Rep. Richard Smith, has business people feeling that all will be well, if and when the bill passes.

But, folks, we don't need what is in the bill as it goes over to the senate.

Workers' comp in Texas would continue to be elective, but this bill as it now stands will make it harder for an employer to not participate.

Employers either would have to provide workers' comp coverage for their employees or to file their intention not to provide coverage.

So what, you say?

Well, the business would fall into the category of "self-insuring," and, according to information I received this week from the Texas Research League, is hard to do.

If you are a small employer, please read the rest of this, which is a quote from the news release.

HB 1 would authorize a self-insurance program to be administered by the Texas Workers' Compensation Board's (TWCB) director of workers' compensation self-insurance. Any employer desiring to self-insure would have to meet certain criteria.

The TWCB would establish rules to determine that an applicant for self-insurance would have the necessary financial strength and liquidity to self-insure a workers' comp program. In determining the applicant's financial strength and liquidity, the TWCB would have to consider, at a minimum, the applicant's:

- * Organizational structure and management background;
- * Profit and loss history;
- * Workers' comp loss history;
- * Source and reliability of the financial information;
- * Number of employees affected by self-insurance;
- * Access to excess insurance market; and

*Financial ratios, indices, and other measures.



Following Up

Bob,

As promised Monday, I have investigated the matter of the Davis' in California missing five copies of the Leader. That date I wrote the Postmaster in Hemit and asked that a "Publication Watch" be done to determine when the papers are coming in there.

I have also spoken with Mrs. Davis and was informed that on the day their letter was mailed to you, they received three copies. Two still had not arrived. I assured Mrs. Davis there was a copy in the "California" bundle this date and I would telephone again later to see when it arrived.

At the quarterly Postmasters' meeting in Fort Worth, Tuesday, the question as to apparently erratic receipt of newspapers by delivery offices was asked by concerned Postmasters. We were told that the problem would be investigated and it was difficult to give a quick answer since some daily papers appear to "save up" and mail several issues at once.

I am forwarding a copy of your "Letters to the Editor" section concerning this and a copy of this letter to the Fort Worth headquarters for their information.

Thank you for allowing me to help with this problem and I am confident we will overcome whatever logistical problem has disrupted this service.

Employers meeting the established criteria would be eligible to apply for a certificate of self-insurance by submitting a nonrefundable \$1,000 application fee.

In addition, an applicant would have to present the board with a claims administration plan and a satisfactory safety program. If the applicant did not administer its own programs, the service contractors would have to be identified, and copies of the contracts would have to be submitted.

Self-insurers would have to provide security in an amount at least "equal to the greater of \$300,000 or 125 percent of the ... incurred liabilities for compensation."

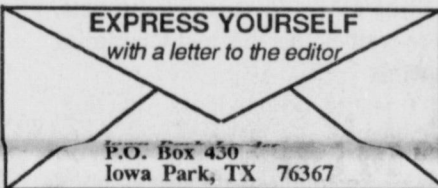
Self-insurers would have to provide excess insurance of at least \$1 million for specific coverage.

Self-insurers would be required to file an annual report with the TWCB. They would be required to pay premium taxes equal to that of an insurance carrier plus a maintenance tax. In addition, self-insurers would be required to pay an annual regulatory tax to cover the TWCB's costs in administering the self-insurance provisions.

Finally, HB 1 would establish the Texas Certified Self-Insurer Guaranty Association. All certified self-insurers would be required to be members of the association. All members would be assessed a fee to establish and to maintain a trust fund of at least \$1 million but not more than \$2 million.

Now, I ask you. Is there an alternative in that kind of legislation? Is there any way a small business can cope?

If the bill passes and becomes law, small business is virtually dead in Texas.

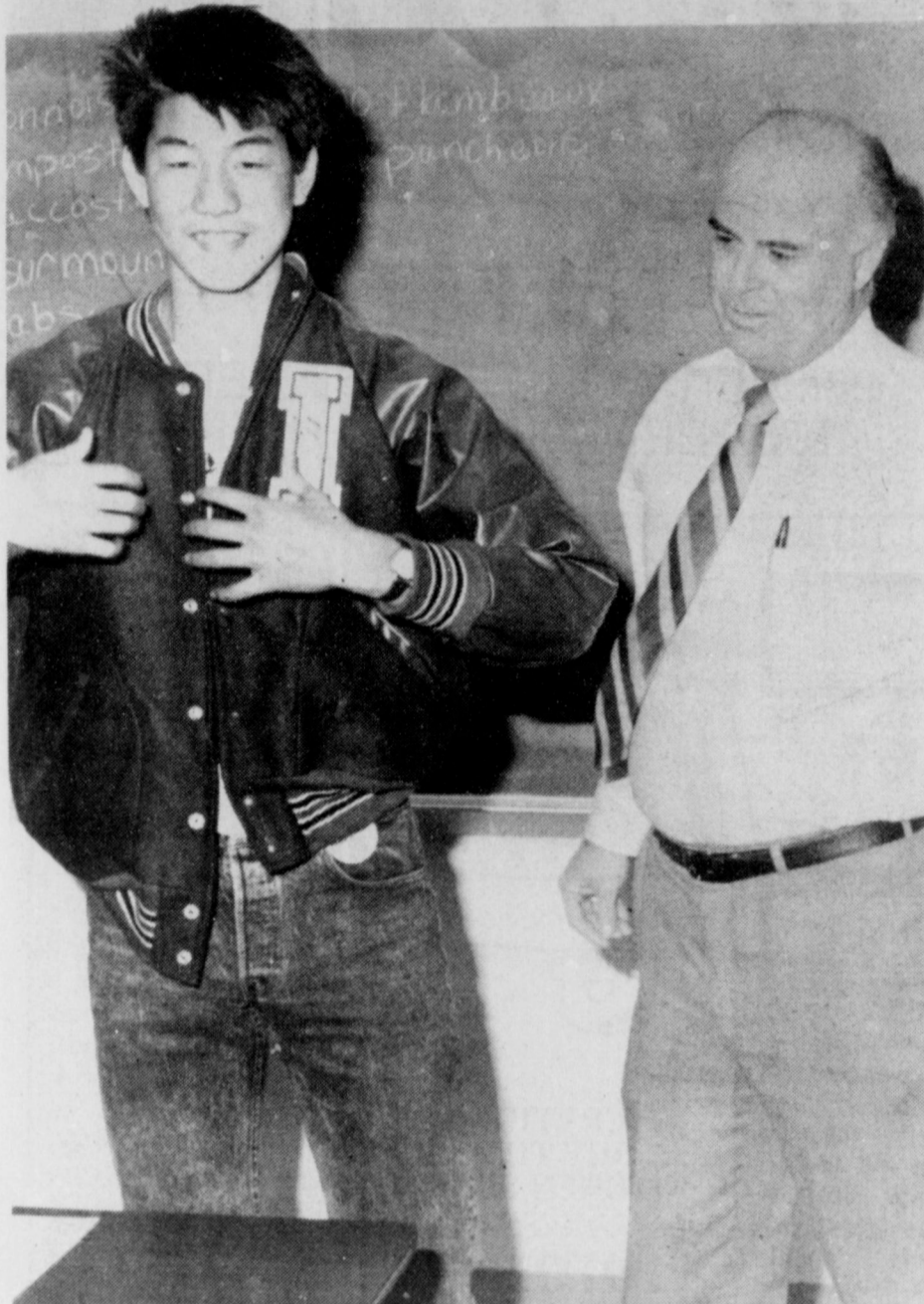

An engineer who made a study of the four campuses in town was asked to also estimate the cost of reopening the Valley View campus, and is to report on those findings at next week's meeting.

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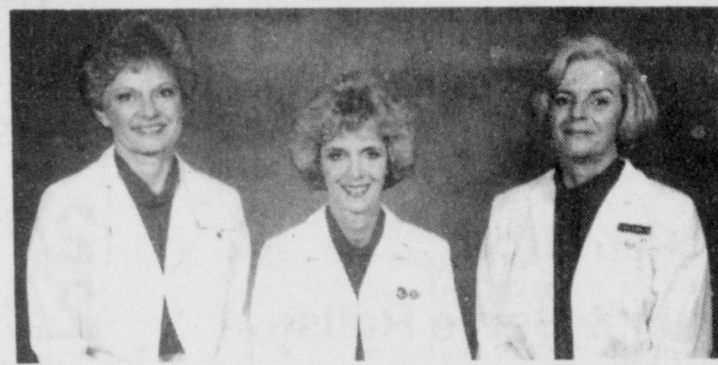
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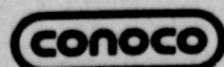
