According to Chief of Police Alan Sheffield, Mrs. Conrad had called the police dispatcher requesting an officer accompany her to the apartment so she could get her belong-

The request was denied, Sheffield said, because the couple was still married and were both living at the same address.

Mrs. Conrad reportedly asked her boss, a Wichita Falls businessman, to accompany her, which he did. And when they arrived and entered, the husband shot her during an ensuing argument.

While investigating the incident, police learned several items in the apartment were alleged to have been stolen in Wichita Falls, and police in that city acknowledged suspicion that the allegations were correct.

City to move water tower

The city council took very little time in accepting a bid to move the water tower from Lake Gordon to a new location on West Emerald, when they were informed of bids Monday

The accepted bid was not only much lower than was budgeted, but the difference between it and the next lowest bid is enough to complete the project and pay the engineer's fee.

Pittsburg Tank and Tower Co. offered a bid of \$189,746. Next lowest bid was \$218,800, then \$224,300 and \$292,000.

There were five bids offered to build a new tower, of similar design, that ranged from \$254,990 to a high of \$356,250.

And as an alternate, bids were asked to construct a new tower similar to the new Wichita Falls tower on US 287. The two bids on that alternate were from \$373,400 to

Engineer Kerry Maroney told the council he had inspected the tower earlier that day, and declared it to be in "excellent condition, much better shape than the one we moved for the city of Wichita Falls."

He said any additional welding work that might have to be done, as well as site preparation, painting, fencing, and his fee would still leave money, from what was expected to







MAKE-AHEAD

CABBAGE SALAD 1/2 med. head cabbage, chopped 2 cups chopped tomatoes 1 cup chopped green pepper

1 cup sliced green onions, including 1 cup cubed mild Cheddar cheese

1/4 cup grated carrots 3/4 cup mayonnaise 1/3 cup milk

1/4 to 1/2 t. salt, if desired In large bowl, combine cabbage, tomatoes, green pepper, green onions, Cheddar cheese and carrots. Mix well. In small bowl, combine mayonnaise, milk and salt, whisk until smooth. Pour over vegetables, toss gently. Chill overnight. Serves 8 to 10.

SQUASH CASSEROLE

1 1/2 lbs. squash, cooked in salted water, drained and mashed 2 carrots, grated

1 small jar chopped pimiento 1 can condensed cream of mushroom or cream of chicken soup

1 medium onion, chopped 1 pkg. herb dressing mix, divided 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine,

Combine all ingredients except 1/2 of dressing mix and butter. Mix well and pour into casserole dish. Combine remaining dressing mix and batter. Spread on top of squash mixture. Bake at 350 degrees until brown, about 30-40 minutes.

MEATLOAF

2 lbs. ground beef 1 cup seasoned Italian bread crumbs 1/2 cup finely chopped onion

1/3 cup catsup

1/3 cup water 1 t. garlic powder

2 eggs Pepper to taste

Salt, if desired 4 strips bacon, if desired

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In large bowl, combine all ingredients except bacon. Shape into a loaf and place in 9x5-inch loaf pan. Arrange bacon strips on top of meat mixture, if desired. Bake at 350 degrees 60

minutes. Serves 6 to 8. TIP: To reheat, cover with foil, bake at 350 degrees 15 minutes, or until thoroughly heated.

PORK CHOPS & RICE

4 (1/2 inch) pork chops

1 1/2 cups pre-cooked rice 1 can condensed cream of mushroom

soup 1/2 soup can water

1 pkg. onion soup mix

1 T. chopped pimiento

Brown pork chops in frying pan. Mix rice, soup, water, soup mix and pimiento in 13x9x2-inch baking dish. Place browned chops on top. Place covered in 350 degree oven 20 minutes. Remove cover and bake an additional 10-20 minutes.

TEXAS HASH

3 large onions, diced

1 green pepper, diced 1 lb. hamburger meat

2 cups tomatoes

1 can baked beans

1/2 cup uncooked rice

2 cups noodles

1/2 tsp. pepper

2 tsps. salt 1 tsp. chili pwoder

Saute onions and green pepper in 3 T. oil. Add hamburger and brown. Stir in remaining ingredients. Pour into baking dish and bake at 350 degrees 1 hour.



As I See It ... By BOB HAMILTON

A growing problem in education is its problems in courts.

It seems any time someone has a different idea of how things should be done, and don't get their way, they rush down to the courthouse and file

That's one reason a bill has been introduced in the legislature to make the University Interscholastic League the absolute ruler on any issue involving the UIL activities.

A milestone case involving the UIL is to be ruled on in April. It involves a suit brought by the Dallas School District and one of its football teams.

Most of you have read about the Dallas Carter High School issue that made all the headlines last fall, when one of its players was ruled ineligible to compete on the team because of the "no-pass, no-play" rule.

Dallas supported its school by going to court and not only getting a delay in a ruling about the player, but about the team's continuing in the playoffs. The team eventually won the Class AAAAA title.

At issue was a teacher's grading of a star player, failing him because he did not turn in homework. Really, his grade was "NC" or not complete.

Boy, it hit the fan! The school's principal promptly changed the grade to passing, and the teacher complained to the state.

First the UIL ruled Carter not only had to forfeit its playoff games, because the player had competed, but would be ineligible to continue in the state playoffs.

Then, when Dallas' school complained, William Kirby, state Education Commissioner, involved himself. He also ruled the student to have failed.

That's when the Dallas schools found a judge to listen to both sides, and then delay a ruling until spring. Thus, Carter was able to not only continue playing, but to win, and with a player everyone except Dallas school people said was ineligible.

Dallas attorneys complained that the UIL and TEA has no standing in ruling on the eligibility of a student!

Carter has a predominately black student body. So what comes next? A couple of black legislators from the big city sounded off that the UIL and Texas Education Agency were making rulings based on race!

Carter's grading system gives equal balance to attending class, weekly tests, six-week tests and semester tests. In other words, a student gets 25 percent of a passing grade just by walking through the door each period.

I suspect Commissioner Kirby figured out that no other schools do their grading on that basis. I'm sure the UIL did also.

So, what happened was, while the Dallas school was demanding to compete in the football playoffs, and abiding with all the rules concerning the game of football, they didn't want to go by the same rules as all the other schools were using to determine their students' eligibility.

I suggest State District Judge Paul Davis just make a ruling that Carter keep its championship trophy.

Small town businesses depend on local residents to survive. But good roads, cheap gas and chain store advertising lure even the most civicminded small town citizen to drive a hundred miles to buy furniture, clothes, cars, even groceries.

Those of us in agriculture should understand. You know how we feel when our neighbors buy Argentinian beef or New Zealand lambs. "Buy it at home!" we say as we get in our Toyota, put on our Mexican boots and drive to the nearest big city shopping mall.

Small town businessmen have no God-given right to survive. They are not a protected species any more than farmers and ranchers. But we need each other. Our purchases, even little ones, are important in small towns. In a shopping mall you're just another blank face with plastic

TU Electric asks PUC permission to refund TU Electric recently filed an to meet demand.

TU Electric recently filed an application with the Public Utility Commission asking authorization to refund about \$46.6-million, including interest, to its customers.

The amount the company is asking to refund was overcollected through January this year. Primarily because the unseasonably warm weather experienced in the company's service area resulted in lower costs for fuel to generate electricity.

When weather is milder than normal, customers use less electricity. Therefore, the company uses less of its higher-priced fuel supplies

The refund would be made through a credit to bills. Under TU Electric's proposal, the refund would be made in May, and residential customers who use 1,000 kilowatthours will receive refunds averaging about \$10. The exact refund month will depend on when PUC approval is received.

TU Electric's rates have been lowered by more than 10 percent since 1986, primarily because of the decreasing cost of natural gas and the company's program to renegotiate gas contracts and make advantageous spot market purchases.





Finnell, Carriker bill would help rural hospitals

Rep. Charles Finnell and Sen. Steve Carriker have introduced legislation to encourage rural students to pursue medical careers and return after college to practice in their home communities.

HB 2951 and SB 1351 would combine support from rural communities and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to pay for the medical education of outstanding students who want to pursue healthservice careers.

Participants in the program would be selected from communitysponsored applicants in a special statewide competition.

"Rural communities across Texas are suffering from a shortage of doctors and other health-service providers," Finnell said. "The Outstanding Rural Scholar Recognition Program is an attempt to bring newlygraduated medical professionals back to the areas that need them most."

Sponsoring communities would have to agree to furnish 50 percent of the cost of a selected applicant's tuition, class materials and living expenses. The commitment would be in the form of scholarships, grants or private support.

The Higher Education Coordinating Board would loan the remaining 50 percent of college expenses to the selected applicants. One year of loan repayments would be forgiven for each year the graduated health professional practiced in a rural area.

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
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

The locations are in an 80-acre lease in the HT&B Survey, A127. The No. 1-L Fred Thom "C" will be 655 feet from the south line and 250 feet from the east line of Block 5, of the survey. The No. 2-E Fred Thom "C" will be located 1,540 feet from the south line and 550 feet from the east line of the same block. They will be in the Wichita County Regular Field.

The No. 44 Tidewater has been finaled by Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. Drillsite is two mioes southeast of Fowlkes. Location is in a 158-acre least 1,680 feet from the north line and 2,600 feet from the east line of Block 4, of the SA&MG Survey, A-

Daily potential of five barrels of oil and 29 barrels of water was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 2,000-ft. bottom and was plugged back to 1,085 feet. Production will be from a set of perforations in the Cisco Formation, 914 to 930 feet into the hole.



RENDER YOUR PROPERTY

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1989. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition:

· You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

· You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

 You can also file a report of decreased value, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1988. The district will look at your property before assigning a value

The deadline for 1989 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below

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
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
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
