RAIN!!!

1.64 measured following early-morning storm

A loud and brilliant thunderstorm moved over the area early Wednesday morning, leaving in its wake welcomed rain.

The storm, that struck Iowa Park shortly after 2:30 a.m., deposited 1.64, according to the measurement made by Virgil Woodfin.

The Kamay area received 1.4. Woodfin said Wednesday's rain was the first he had recorded since April 19, when he received .25.

A severe thunder storm approached the area from the west early Tuesday evening, but split, sending part of the clouds to the north and most of them to the south.

Though residents of the northwest part of the city reported hail in the late-night storm, no damage was reported.

There was some flooding, however, in the West Cash business block, apparently caused by a clogged

drain under the old highway.

Owners of Bangs and Thangs and Designer Graphics both reported their businesses were flooded from the backup.

A city crew cleaned and flushed out the drain Wednesday.

City Administrator James Barrington said city hall had considerable water on its floors when they opened the building Wednesday. A repairman was contacted to determine its cause.

Light turnout feared at polls

Both city and school officials have expressed concern about a light turnout at their election polls Saturday.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. at Kidwell and Bradford Elementary schools, where both city and school voting boxes will be available, and at the Valley View campus for school voting only.

The reason for expressing concern is that only five absentee ballots have been cast, and all of them were in the school election. None was cast in the school election, as of the deadline Tuesday afternoon.

While two trustee seats are on

the ballot, only one of them, Place 5, is contested. Incumbent Jerry Reed is unopposed in his bid to return to Place 4.

Place 5 has been held by Jimmy Howell, who did not seek re-election.

Four candidates are seeking that vacated seat. They are, as their names appear on the ballot, Carmen Lozippone, Larry Godwin, Keith Fisher and Denny McCarthy.

In the city election, incumbents Virgil Woodfin, Place 1, and Johnny Coker, Place 3, are unopposed.

Incumbent Diane Robnett, who has held Place 5 two terms, has drawn opposition from Ira Ham-bright.

Free dog dip today, courtesy of the city

In conjunction with "Be Kind to Animals Week" (May 1-7), the city is offering a free dog dip service today for residents.

Beginning at 12-noon, the dog will be available at the pavillion behind city hall. It will end at 5 p.m.

City animal control personnel will be on hand to assist in the dipping process, as well as answer any questions owners may have concerning animal care and control.

Sue Hatcher, animal control warden for the city, said "Dipping animals now is extremely important

since the summer months seem to be the worst time that parasites can plague all animals."

Hatcher also encouraged owners to keep up all their pets' rabies vaccinations.

She said the shots not only protect animals from contracting disease but also protect family health, and could also save animals a trip to the animal shelter.

When vaccinated, identification tags are issued to animals which assists in locating owners should the animal become lost.

Police arrest two persons

Only two arrests were noted on the Iowa Park Police Department blotter for the past week.

One was for no drivers' license and the other for assault.

Police arrested Lelia Kinnett, 21, in the 700 clock of S. Penn at 8:09 p.m. Sunday, after her car had reportedly driven through a yard at Ruby and Lafayette.

Assisting police with the arrest was a Department of Public Safety trooper, who took Miss Kinnett into custody, transported her to the county sheriff's department and administered

a breathalyzer test.

She was then charged by the DPS with driving while intoxicated. Local police issued her a citation for driving without a license.

Arrested at 1 a.m. Tuesday in the 300 block of S. Texowa was Kelly Odell McCullough, 33, after a domestic disturbance.

McCullough was taken to county jail on an assault charge filed by his wife, and she was taken to Wichita General Hospital for treatment of facial injuries and released.

One dead, one critical following accident

A party Saturday evening, which included a keg of beer, at Lake Buffalo ended in disaster, with one young man killed and another still in a coma, when their car rolled as they were returning to town.

Declared dead at the scene by Grady Smith, medical examiner for the sheriff's department, was David Shelton Koch, 27.

Eighteen-year-old Carl Leon

Robertson Jr. was rushed by ambulance to Wichita General Hospital, and was said to remain Tuesday evening in a coma.

The two men were alone in the car when it crashed about a quarter of a mile west of Johnson Road, on the gravel-surfaced Van Horn Road.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Mike Dink, who investigated the accident, said the official report stated Koch was driving the car,

which is registered to his grandmother, Mrs. Mae Shelton.

Koch and Robertson had been at a gathering of young people, which reportedly had begun in the late afternoon, and were following another when the accident occurred about 3:30 a.m. Sunday.

The DPS officer said he was told the two cars were the last to leave the party site.

In the other vehicle were two brothers, Mark and Steve Swanson, and Elizabeth Duke.

Steve Swanson reportedly pulled Robertson from the vehicle and held him until emergency medical people arrived.

Trooper Dink said the car appeared to have left the roadway three times before it came to rest on its top and broadside in the road.

According to the tracks, the car went into the south ditch about 500 feet from where the car stopped, then went into the north ditch and again in the south ditch.

When the car swerved into the ditch the third time, the rear end dug out dirt on the shoulder next to a fence and as it started out of the ditch became airborne, coming to rest about 100 feet to the east.

Members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department had to use hydraulic power equipment to open the crumpled vehicle enough to extract Koch's body.

Robertson had very few apparent injuries, but was having difficulty breathing, it was reported.

Koch was apparently killed when his head struck the dome light, causing a massive injury to the back part of his skull.

City, school meetings set

Canvassing of Saturday's election results, administering of oaths of office and finishing up the required paperwork will be first on the agendas of next week's meetings of the city council and school board.

Aldermen are to meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, and trustees will start their meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

A public hearing will be held by the council, concerning a home at 908 E. Highway, to determine if the structure constitutes a nuisance.

Council members have two bid requests on their meeting agenda.

The first is to consider authorizing the city administrator to advertise for bids to purchase a new pumper truck and related equipment for the fire department.

Replacement of the old pumper is required by the state, in order to hold down insurance rates in the community, according to firemen.

The other request is to authorize the administrator to advertise for proposals for repair work on the sewer treatment plant. Along with the work it will be necessary to lease a piece

of equipment that will continue to process wastewater while repairs are being made, according to James Barrington, administrator.

Aldermen will be asked to authorize participation in a new program for law enforcement training which, if approved, will save considerable expense over a three-year period.

Council members also will consider increased city participation in insurance premiums for employee dependents, as well as setting a date for this year's budget and goal setting workshop.

Travel expenses will be requested for two meetings. The first, if decided to be necessary, would be to attend a hearing of the Texas Water Commission, relating to increased service area of the Wichita Valley Water Supply Corp.

The other would be for Barrington's trip in June to Tyler for the Texas City Management Association annual meeting, at which he will be installed as this region's director.

An executive session also is on the tentative meeting agenda, concerning "lease of real property."

School trustees have two items concerning personnel on their tentative agenda for Tuesday.

The first is to employ new per-

sonnel, and the other is to accept resignations.

Two presentations are on the agenda. The first is for a plaque to be given Jimmy Howell, who has not sought re-election to a fourth term of office on the board. He has been serving as chairman of the board.

The other is a special recognition of students who have competed in state-level competition.

Following the board's canvassing of ballots and administering the oath of office, the annual reorganization of the board will be held.

Kindergarten screening set

The annual screening and registration program for Iowa Park kindergarten-age children will be held May 17-18 at Kidwell Elementary, according to Ron Woods, principal.

All children who will be five years of age on or before Sept. 1 this year are eligible. Parents who have not yet received an appointment time through the mail are asked to contact the school, 592-4322.

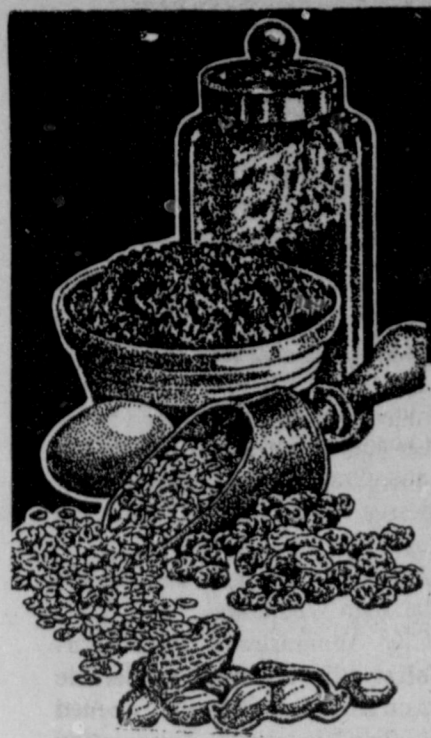
A full year of special education is available for the three- and four-year-old children with a physical or learning deficiency (sight, hearing, speech, mental maturity or a physi-

She worked for the TG&Y Store in Big Spring seven years, and is employed here as office manager at King's Food. Bobby works for Dyna-Corp at Sheppard Air Force Base.

Peggy said she likes working on woodcrafts, sewing, cooking and yardwork.

Each of the recipes, she said, are tried and true, and added that her husband's favorite dessert is the Fruit Parfae'.

FRUIT PARFAE'
Vanilla wafers
1/3 cup lemon juice
2-20 oz. cans crushed pineapple
Coconut
2-8 oz. Cool Whip
2 cans sweetened condensed milk
3 to 4 large bananas
Cherries
Pecan chips

Layer in this order:
A) Crush 1 1/2 cups vanilla wafers.
B) Slice bananas, to cover pan
C) In separate bowl, mix condensed milk and lemon juice well, then pour evenly over banana layer.
D) Drain pineapple well and spread evenly.
E) Spread Cool Whip evenly.
F) Sprinkle coconut and pecan chips over all.
G) Decorate with cherries as desired.
Set and chill, preferably overnight. Then you have a gourmet's delight.

NO COOK DIVINITY
1 pkg. fluffy white frosting mix
1/3 cup light corn syrup
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup boiling water
1 pkg. (16 oz.) confectioners sugar
1 cup chopped nuts
Combine frosting mix (dry), corn syrup, vanilla and boiling water

Frosting
3 cups sugar
1/2 lb. butter
2 cups cream
3 dozen marshmallows

Cream butter and sugar, add eggs and buttermilk to which soda has been added. Sift together dry ingredients. Add to butter-sugar mixture. Add pecans, cherries, raisins, pineapple and apricot preserves. Bake in round cake pans, at 350 degrees 35 to 45 minutes. Cool and frost cake.

Frosting: Bring sugar, butter cream, and marshmallows to soft ball stage and beat; Cool slightly before using.

BEEF A LA DEUTSCH
1 1/2 lb. beef top sirloin, cut in one-inch strips
1 cup mushrooms, sliced
1/2 cup green peppers, chopped
12 cup onions, chopped
2 Tbsp. margarine
1/4 cup flour
1 1/2 cup sour cream
1/4 cup chopped pimento
Salt and pepper to taste
1 qt. beef broth or consommé
Saute onions and green peppers in margarine until tender. Add mushrooms and beef and saute until meat

is slightly browned. Add salt and pepper. Remove from heat and add flour. Mix well and add stock. Simmer slowly until meat is tender and gravy has thickened. Remove from heat and add sour cream and pimento. Bring to a slow boil. Remove from heat 15 minutes before serving. Serves six.

WEINER SCHNITZEL
4 thin veal cutlets (about 6 oz. each)
3 Tbsp. lemon juice
Salt and pepper
1/2 cup flour
1 egg
1/2 cup dried bread crumbs
2 Tbsp. butter or margarine
1 Tbsp. vegetable oil
4 lettuce leaves
1 lemon, cut in quarters

Wipe cutlets with a damp cloth; pound. Sprinkle with lemon juice and let marinate about 10 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Dip in flour and shake off excess. Dip in the egg, which has been beaten with a fork. Dip in bread crumbs. Heat the butter and oil in fry pan; brown the cutlets well about three minutes on each side. Serve on a bed of crisp lettuce with a wedge of lemon on top of each cutlet. Four servings.

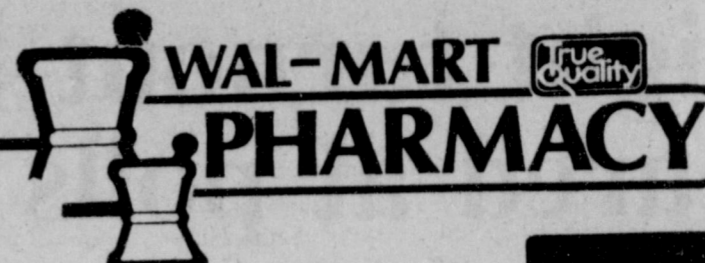
Jim Grove gave an outline of the club's activities in the community, citing youth activities and community service projects.

For Your Health

HANDS ON: Touching, caressing and massaging is good for babies. In fact, a study at the University of Miami showed that premature babies thrived with the hands-on approach. These babies, who were caressed and massaged for 15 minutes three times a day for 10 days, gained weight 47 percent faster than preemies who were left untouched in their incubators. In another study, a scientist at Purdue University concluded that babies who are held a lot in their first six months of life are likely to have an advantage in mental development over babies who are held less.

SWEATING OFF EXCESS POUNDS MAY BE DIFFICULT, DANGEROUS

Strenuous exercise, done on a hot day, can produce as much as two quarts of sweat per hour, according to Bryant Stamford, PhD, of the University of Louisville School of Medicine. In an arid climate, sweat evaporates quickly.

If the fluid loss goes unnoticed, it can lead to dehydration, which reduces the ability to sweat and may lead to a dangerous increase in body temperature. Chronic dehydration can occur over several days and is an insidious danger because it can be easily overlooked. In a humid climate, sweat is not evaporated rapidly and lack of evaporation can cause body temperature to increase enough to cause heatstroke, permanent injury or even death, Dr. Stamford said.

Although weight loss from sweating can occur, this is water loss (several pounds of water can be lost in one hour of exercise) and this loss is temporary.

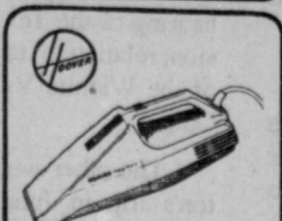

Mrs. Bradley gives program for Evening Lioness meeting

"I'm glad that I had the opportunity to go to China but I would not want to go back," Mrs. Lois Bradley said Thursday evening when she presented the program for the Evening Lioness Club through slides and narration. She was introduced by Lem Tate.

She expressed appreciation to the country with its teeming millions of inhabitants for its spectacular natural and manmade beauty in many spots, architectural pageantry, historical landmarks, temples, ancient ruins, but displeasure for the poverty-stricken areas with lack of housing facilities, food and jobs in so many areas.

Mrs. Bradley gave a brief history of China to precede the presentation of the slides and commentary, then focused attention upon some of the most outstanding beauty spots chosen from the Suchow, Peking and Jade Foundation Gardens that showed varieties of rock formations, waterfalls, pagodas, bridges, caves, flowering shrubs and ming trees.

She described her visits to Hangchow Temple, Temple of Heaven built in 1420 A.D. and other temples, the Summer Palace, Forbidden City, the town country with its many rice fields near the Yangtze Delta where she saw a water buffalo, the shops, communes, a school and hospital in Shanghai.

Mrs. Bradley, like most tourists, was interested in seeing and walking on part of the Great Wall of China which is several thousand miles long. A highlight of the tour was to see some of the terra cotta warriors and horses that were used to ward off enemies from the emperor's mansion in the early years of China's history. They have been excavated during the recent decades.

The climax of the tour for Mrs. Bradley seemed to be when she and the tour group arrived in Hong Kong, a British colony on the southeast of China, as they returned to the United States. They arrived there just in time to see the Dragon Races.

The club voted to give a monetary gift to First Step in honor of Mrs. Bradley.

Special guests were Mrs. Zoe Ackerman of Wichita Falls, sister of Mrs. Bradley, Mrs. Lawrence Williams of Abilene, sister of Mrs. V.I. Woodfin, and several husbands of club members.

During the business directed by Mrs. Sam Hunter, Mmes. W.E. Karstetter, Herman Daymude and Lem Tate were elected to serve as directors for the 1989-90 year.

The meeting was held at the Lions building and the hostesses were Mmes. Joe Kennedy and Woodfin.

As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



In case you didn't read my comment in this space a few years ago, or you haven't thought about it, we in the smaller communities and rural areas are being victimized by the big city legislators in Austin.

It's just a plain fact that the vast majority of the state's population now comes from the cities, and more particularly five of them.

I fully recognize that our state constitution, like the national constitution, bases representation on population.

But to use a common term that I normally despise, we in the smaller towns are being discriminated against.

One shining example is funding of our public school system. Every small-town superintendent I know has told me more than once that HB 72 was drafted to give higher priority to big-city schools.

They gave a lot of examples, such as a higher salary for teachers, "...because it costs more to live in the larger cities," superintendents were told.

I got another example out of Wednesday's issue of the Dallas Morning News, in an article written by Christy Hoppe, who covers the legislature while in session.

Please note:

"There was little doubt Tuesday who had helped Sen. Eddie Bernice Johnson, D-Dallas, piece together her amendment on education finance. Ms. Johnson was asking for extra funding to prevent school dropouts. And the bill's author, Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, asked her to postpone her amendment to work out an equitable statewide funding formula. He waited for an answer as Ms. Johnson's eyes searched the Senate bal-

cony. "I have to get a signal from the gallery," she said. Finally, Dallas school district lobbyist Robby

Collins stood up, with his pointer finger raised -- the universal "yes" vote in the House and Senate. That'll be fine, she told Mr. Parker, who smiled. He'd already seen her answer."

Does that give you some idea about how legislation is affected by the big city votes.

There's another shining example of big-city voting that has caused our farmers and ranchers no little trouble.

Again, I'm fully aware that our constitution calls for the state's commissioner of agriculture to be elected.

But, folks, the plain fact of the matter is that this office is now in the process of serving labor, consumers and environmentalists. Not the producers of agriculture.

Jim Hightower, who now holds the office, calls himself a "populist." That means, he goes with those who yell the loudest.

Having Hightower in that office is like having a union leader named to head the state's department of commerce.

Gov. Bill Clements says he is considering a veto of a bill to extend the life of the Department of Agriculture, and House Speaker Gib Lewis is quoted in yesterday's Dallas paper as knowing he would not have the support to override the veto.

I agree with the governor. If the electorate is not sensitive to the fact that agriculture in Texas needs proper representation in that office, then the office should be abandoned and the commissioner's post appointed.

Gov. Clements should be told by folks from the rural area that they support him.

Finnell bill would help elderly

Thousands of elderly Texans could become eligible for nursing home aid under a bill co-sponsored by Rep. Charles Finnell and recently passed by the House of Representatives.

The 80th District representative is co-sponsor with Rep. Betty Denton of Waco of legislation that raises the state income limit for Medicaid eligibility from the current \$715 per month to the federal cap of \$1,104 monthly.

The bill also sets \$1,104 as the income limit for home-based community care services for the elderly.

"House Bill 318 will help 5,000 more elderly and disabled Texans qualify for Medicaid nursing home assistance," Finnell said. "Older Texans earning \$800 or \$1,000 a month have been hard-pressed to afford decent nursing care."

Finnell welcomed the recent announcement by Comptroller Bob Bullock that lawmakers will have an

extra \$210-million in state revenue for the 1990-91 budget period.

He said Bullock's revised revenue estimate gives lawmakers a little more breathing room in making tough budget decisions.

"I'm sure everyone has their own ideas about how the money should be

spent. I would like to see part of it used to get more federal funds for aid to the elderly and disabled," he said.

Finnell said spending an additional \$50-million for Medicaid and other services could bring in about \$100-million in federal matching funds.

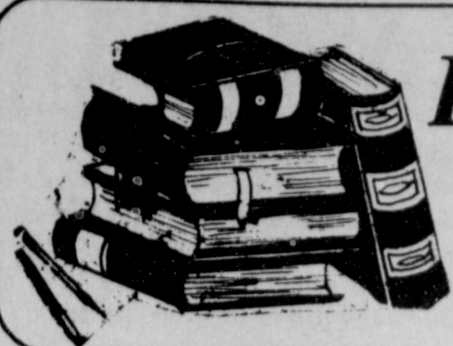

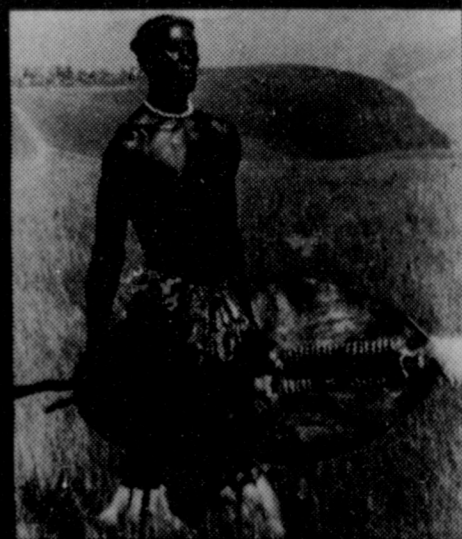

Man Caught With Classified Information

**Claims information
regularly published**

Neighbors today were surprised to learn Melvin Kline, a seemingly quiet, well-mannered man was making extra money with classified information. When questioned earlier this morning, Kline professed surprise that everyone wasn't using the classified section to earn extra income and get rid of unwanted items.

"It's common," he said. Recent studies tend to bear Kline out. Consumer Data Service reported that over 85% of the public read the newspaper and over 80% of those read the classifieds. Kline claimed widespread use was being made of the classified information. "But you have to act quickly," he remarked.

"If I have something to sell, I can be in the paper by tomorrow. I do that a lot now," he confessed. "With classified, whether I'm buying or selling, I can reach a large market instantly. And it's easy... just pick up the phone."

When asked if price mattered at all, Kline stated he was in possession of Consumer Data Service documents that indicated newspaper readership increases as income increases. "The more money they make, the more they read the paper," he said, "and I can prove it."

Asked for a last comment, Kline replied "No matter what you're looking for, a new job, a great car, merchandise, or even a home, take a long look at the classified section.

The information's all there." Response Analysis Corp. studies indicate the public does exactly that, with 98% preferring the newspaper over radio and 68% preferring the newspaper instead of TV.

Four tracksters heading for Austin

Iowa Park will be represented by four Lady Hawks May 12-13 at the University Interscholastic League's state track and field meet in Austin.

Kerri Dorner will be competing in the long jump, and then join Shonna Weaver, Kristy York and Angie Turner in the 400-meter relay.

To qualify for the state meet, an athlete or relay team must place first or second at the regional level.

Dorner won the long jump last week in the Region One meet at Odessa, with a school record 18 feet, 2 inches.

She then joined Weaver, York and Turner to win the 400-meter relay with a time of 50.68.

And had it not been for a mistimed handoff in the 800-meter relay,

Iowa Park would have had another team at Austin.

Weaver, Turner and Dorner are joined by Courtney Kirkpatrick to make up that foursome, and they set a new school record of 1:45.32 in Friday's preliminaries to go into the finals.

But the handoff miscue cost precious ticks on the clock, and the Iowa Parkans finished with a 1:47.7. It still put them in third place.

Dorner also earned third place in the 200-meter dash. She ran a 25.2 Friday to get into the finals, and was edged out for second place Saturday when she was clocked in 25.6.

The defending 5-AAA champs had a third relay team at Odessa, in the 1600 meters.

Weaver, Deann Warren, Turner and Kirkpatrick qualified Friday for the finals, with a school record time of 4:14.68.

But the winds cut them back Saturday to a 4:17, and fifth place.

Coach Loma Klinkerman praised

the foursome for its improvement over the season, when they were timed in 4:32.

York's 16.52 in Friday's preliminaries in the hurdles failed to qualify her for the finals Saturday.

Tomi Sue Cockburn competed Saturday in the triple jump, but her 31-4 best wasn't enough to go into the finals.

Warren and Kirkpatrick will be listed as alternates for the sprint relay team at the state meet.

Sophomore Patrick Birk was the only Hawk to qualify for the Odessa meet. He ran the 800 meters Friday in 2:08, but did not qualify for the finals the second day.

The Lady Hawks placed third in region, with 52 points. Perryton won the meet with 80 points, and Post, winner of the 800-meter relay, edged Iowa Park with 62.

Eventhough the Graham Steers placed third behind Decatur and Vernon in the district meet, held here two weeks earlier, the Young County club won the regional meet.

The Steers amassed 58 points to edge out Kermit, 55, and Breckenridge, 53.

Coach Klinkerman will take her state qualifiers Friday to a meet in Abilene. Competition will begin at Abilene Christian Univ. in the long jump at 4 p.m., and running events will start at 6.

Gerstner and Bartow were eliminated by Perryton's Kimmy Thomas and Brad Butler, 6-4, 6-2.

Hawk district singles champion Chris Blalack lost out in the first

round to Ryan Hewett of Comanche, 6-4, 6-4.

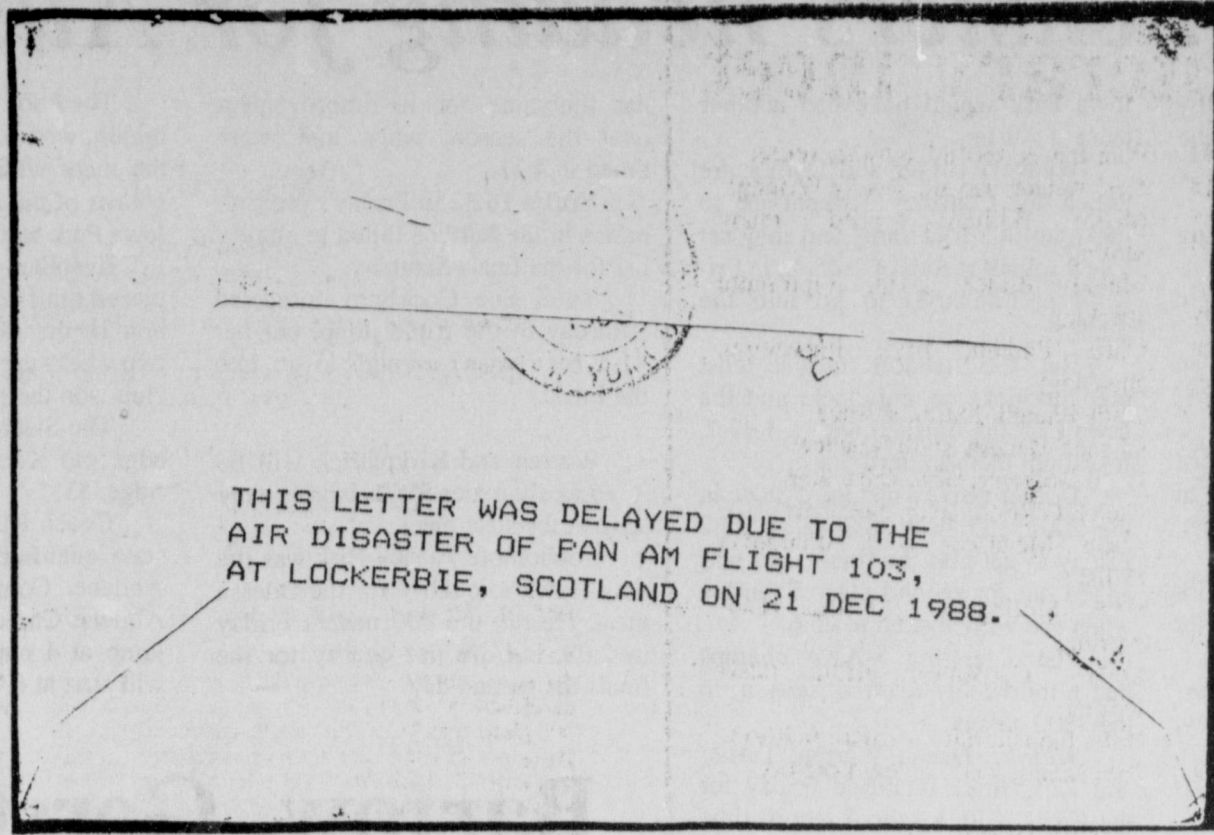
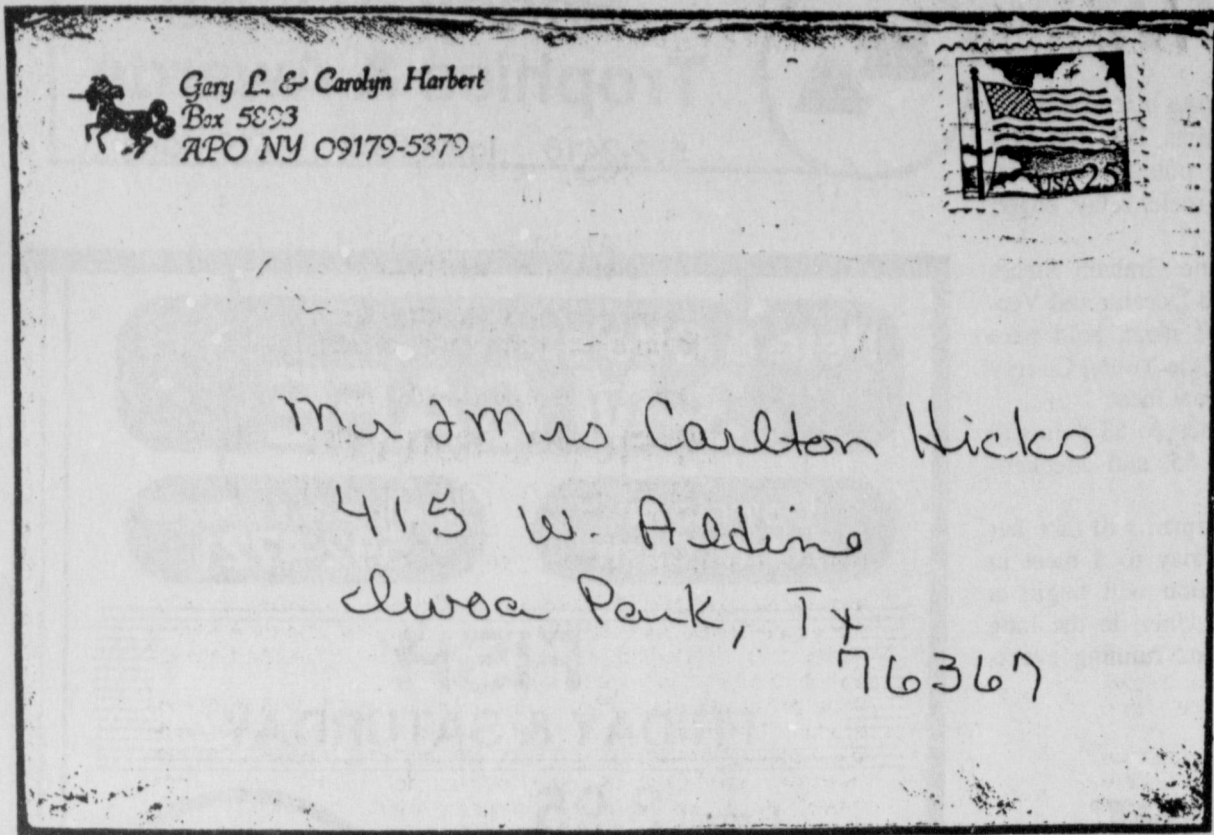

It had been on PanAm Flight 103 that went down in Scotland because of a terrorist's bomb. No one survived. The envelope, other than smudges of mud on the edges, was in good condition. The envelope was mailed by Gary L. and Carolyn Harbert. Mrs. Harbert is the niece of Mr. Hicks.

Credit card owners warned

The Better Business Bureau of North Central Texas has warned both retailers and consumers about a dangerous new virus-like fraud, "credit doctors," showing up in communities across the country.

Essentially, "credit doctors" are computerized con artists who steal personal data on people with good credit histories from local credit bureaus computer files and sell it to people with bad credit records.

Companies unwittingly grant credit to those poor risks and end up footing the bill when a credit applicant stops making payments or vanishes. Innocent people find that they're asked to pay for items they never bought and negative information often goes into their credit records.

Houston has been hit especially hard. Automobile dealers are particularly vulnerable to the scam. Unscrupulous salesmen furnish "credit doctors" names of "patients" to increase their sales.

A Houston dealer sold cars to 93 customers who had used "credit doctors." The dealer lost more than \$1.5-million. Beyond autos, Houston police have found more than \$15-million worth of items obtained by this brand of phoney credit ranging

from small merchandise to homes. Here's how the "credit doctors" operate.

First, they swipe or buy the code numbers merchants use to get access to computers maintained by local credit bureaus. Then, with home computers and telephone modems, the "credit doctors" use the computer codes to access files of the local credit bureaus.

Credit files of consumers in other cities can also be accessed. Unscrupulous people who wish to get credit by any means hear about a "credit doctor" from a friend or salesperson and they, "the patients," make the contact.

The "doctor" accesses the credit bureau files and when he finds a similar name with a favorable credit history, he illegally appropriates the information, including the social security number, the job history, and the credit history. Then he sells the information to "the patient."

Finally, the "doctors" teach the "patients" how to fill out credit forms they submit to lending institutions. Charges for such "patient care" usually run from \$500 to \$1,500.

One "credit doctor" recently convicted and sent to jail had records in

his home personal computer of 2,000 people he served.

To guard against problems, consumers should periodically contact their local credit bureau and check their credit records. If errors are found, consumers should ask the credit bureau to reinvestigate and remove the erroneous information.

The best way to control the problem is through local businesses. Many companies granting credit to consumers don't make an effort to verify whether the personal information on a customer's application is actually the applicant's.

When granting credit, business should compare the name and the birth date on the applicant's driver's license with the information on the application and on the credit bureau report. They should also take the

time to confirm the employment history.

The Better Business Bureau promotes ethical standards of business practices and protects consumers through voluntary self-regulation and monitoring activities.

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

A new producer has been brought on line in Wichita County's Regular Field with West Landrum of Burkburnett as the operator.

Located 1.5 miles southeast of Clara, the well is in an 80-acre unit 12,540 feet from the south line and 550 feet from the east line of Block 5 of the HT&B Survey. It is designated as the No. 2-E Fred Thom "C."

The well flowered 16 barrels of oil per day, plus 72 barrels of water. Bottomed at 1,789 feet, it will produce from a perforated interval in the Gunsight Sand, 1,608 to 1,718 feet into the hole.

Wichita County's Regular Field gained a new producer when Atapco of Midland completed the No. 85-A H. Reilly, two miles southeast of Clara.

The well indicated ability to pump oil at the rate of 12 barrels per day, plus two barrels of water. It was taken to a 1,750-ft. bottom and plugged back to 1,709 feet. Production will be from a set of perforations in the Gunsight, 1,526 to 1,534 feet into the hole.

The operation is in a 2,100-acre lease in the L.C. Dennison Survey.

The No. 1 HBJV-Turkett, an 8,400-ft. wildcat well, is scheduled to

be drilled in Wilbarger County. Trio Operating of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 182-acre lease two miles north of Farmers Valley. Location is 1,076 feet from the north line and 1,714 feet from the west line of Section 44, Block 16 of the H&T&C Survey, A-1880.

Plug-and-abandon orders were issued for the No. 3 Andrews, a developmental venture of Singleton Production of Iowa Park in the Wilbarger County Regular Field. Spudded April 4, the well had reached 1,972-ft. total depth. Drillsite was nine miles south of Vernon in a 40-acre unit, 2,510 feet from the south line and 971 feet from the east line of Section 80, Block 14, of the H&T&C Survey, A-904.

JHR Corp. of Plano has bottomed its No. 6 Rainwater at a depth of 5,550 feet in the Rainwater Field, Wilbarger County, and has called for completion tests. The well is located six miles west-southwest of Harrold.
