McCarthy only new elected official

Predictions of a light turnout by voters in Saturday's school and city elections proved correct, as only 236 votes were cast in the city boxes and 614 in the school's.

Denny McCarthy edged Keith Fisher for Place 5 on the school board, a position relinquished after nine years by Jimmy Howell, who decided not to seek re-election.

McCarthy drew 144 votes to Fisher's 121.

The other two candidates for the same position were Larry Godwin, who received 68 votes, and Carmen Lozipone, 12.

Incumbent Jerry Reed, who was unchallenged, received 254 votes to return for his second term of office.

Ten persons received write-in votes in the school box, but none got more than four votes.

Bradford (Precinct 33), and 57 at Valley View, where Godwin received 50 of his 68.

McCarthy won all three boxes, out-polling Fisher 105-94 at Kidwell, 34-22 at Bradford and 4-2 at Valley View.

All three incumbents in the city voting were winners.

Diane Robnett was the only candidate to be opposed, but she defeated challenger Ira Hambright 140-94, to return to Place 5.

Johnny Coker, the senior member of the council, was returned to Place 3 with 193 votes, and Virgil Woodfin polled 198 votes in his bid to return to Place 1.

Of the 200 votes cast at Kidwell, Robnett out-drew Hambright 119-80, and 21-14 of the 36 votes cast at

City seeking bids for new fire truck

The city council Monday night increased. approved a proposal to advertise for bids to purchase a new pumper for the fire department, and gave the owner of a house 90 days to correct the structure's non-compliance with city

The new pumper, if purchased after bids are received, would replace a 1960 model truck that has only 10,000 miles on it.

However, the council was told that the state mandates pumpers 30 years old must be replaced, or the "key rate" to insure homes and businesses in the city will be greatly

Chief of the Volunteer Fire Department, Danny Skinner, provided bid specifications for a pumper he estimated would cost \$140,000.

An alternate to the bid would be to take the '60 model truck as a trade

Responding to a question from the council, if the truck were ever used to fight fires, Skinner said no. The only time a pumper leaves the city limits is for repairs or to respond to a mutual aid call from a neighboring community, he said.

During a public hearing concern-

which was heavily damaged Feb. 24 by fire and has not been lived in since that time, a video film of the structure was shown to the council.

Mrs. Blivins explained she had been trying to sell the property, and Derrell Jolly, a real estate salesman, confirmed the statement.

Trustees commue study of future building needs

Continuing their studies into the future facility needs of the school district, board members Tuesday night spent as much time on the ongoing subject as they did in taking care of all the regular monthly

Trustees are expecting to set the priorities of what construction will be done, and determine how it will be financed, at a meeting in two weeks.

Architectual drawings were provided the board, showing where the proposed additions would be located, if approved, along with cost estimates, at Tuesday's meeting.

Should all the proposed building and improvements that are being considered be approved, the total cost is estimated at \$3,181,000. That is down from an earlier estimate of \$3,316,680, after some trimming was accomplished.

Newly-elected board chairman Jerry Reed took an unofficial poll of members concerning calling a bond election for the financing, and heard no negative comments.

"We won't vote the bonds," he explained about calling for the election. He said if bonds are approved, it will be the people doing it, not the board.

Following a canvassing of Saturday's election results, Denny Mc-Carthy was declared winner of Place 5. Then, he and Reed were adminis-

tered the oath of office. Outgoing trustee and chairman of the board, Jimmy Howell, chaired the election of the new chairman. He then was presented a plaque for his nine years service to the district.

John Sibley was then elected vice president and Sheri Kennedy was re-elected board secretary during the board's annual reorganization. The only voting of the evening

that was not unanimous was when the board considered the proposed amendment of the dress code.

Kennedy and Gary Fielding voted

against the code that was adopted. The change at issue was the length of attire, which is not to be

FIXED BRIDGES

A fixed bridge is an appliance made to replace a missing tooth or teeth. It is best to have the bridge made as soon as possible after the tooth has been

The teeth on both sides of the space are prepared by the dentist to recieve a crown. Impressions or imprints that are very accurate are then taken, a wax bite or other method is used to determine how long the teeth should be and how they will fit with the opposing teeth. Temporary crowns are then put on the teeth to protect them so the patient can go about their business until the bridge is ready to seat at the next visit.

The dentist will remove the temporary crowns, check for proper fit and make any adjustments that are necessary, them cement the bridge using a

Bridges can be made from solid dental gold, gold and procelain or gold and acrylic. Nowadays much of the metal used is a special alloy that is less expresive than the gold. The fixed bridge:







ARTHRITIS AND AEROBICS: Although the traditional approach to treating arthritis involves restricting a patient's activities, recent studies have found that, in fact, this may be detrimental by contributing to poor aerobic capacity and reducing the patient's functional status. When rheumatoid arthritis patients with only limited functional impairment participated in a short-term stationary bicycle exercise program at the University of Michigan, they had significant increases in maximum aerobic capacity and endurance as well as a decrease in disease severity, as indicated by the number of painful swollen joints. Because these types of exercise programs still are in their early development stages, it is not known whether regular aerobic exercise performed over long periods will have unexpected adverse effects. Additionally, the best type of exercise -bicycling, aerobic dancing, walking, swimming, stationary cross-country skiing, stationary rowing, or just participation in everyday sporting activities - has not been determined, although the common key is to minimize stress on weight-bearing joints. Probably two of the most important points are that participants should be supervised closely in the initial exercise period and they should be given constant encouragement to countinue to exercise.

Building Bones: When Mom said, "Drink your milk, it's good for your bones," she wasn't kidding. As one of the primary sources of calcium in the human diet, milk can be a major contributor to the prevention of osteoporosis, broken bones, and significant disability in older years. However, the key is to build up bones at a young age. By the time they reach age 35, most women begin to lose bone mass, and if they did not have a sufficient quantity before that time, they can become prime candidates for osteoporosis. Three glasses of milk plus some yegurt and cheese every day can supply the required daily allowance of calcium in young people, but researchers have found that milk is decreasing in popularity in this age group and, therefore, their calcium intake is dwindling. The shortage is even more acute among adults. For those who don't drink milk, calcium-fortified food products may provide an alternative. Calcium-carbonate tablets, on the other hand, are not always effective because they may not disintegrate enough to provide the needed calcium. The best osteoporotic preventive remains drinking plenty of milk early and all through life.





Now comes the big programs at high school and junior high. This is where the youngsters are recognized for their academics, leadership and other efforts.

Everyone likes to be recognized for what they've done, unless what they do is wrong. Then they don't want anything said about it.

Our goal at the paper is to give our kids all the recognition they have worked for. Often we fall short. Sometimes we are accused of only reporting the bad things that people

Whatever, recognition time is when this paper swells with the weight of names of youngsters who have done well. And this is the time when I get my biggest kick out of being in the business.

Let's set the record straight. I made a mistake in this space last week when I said the office of the state's commissioner of agriculture was in the state constitution.

The fact is, the commissioner of agriculture's post is the only statewide elected office not protected by the constitution. It was created by the legislature in 1907.

In other business, the council approved requests to have repairs done to city hall roof, subscribing to a televised law enforcement training netword, and authorized travel costs to attend a Texas Water Commission hearing in Austin.

Administrator James Barrington told the council considerable water was found on city hall floors Friday morning, following the previous evening's storm.

He said he was unsure if the water came from a leak in the roof, but some damage had been found and asked that it be funded for repairs.

Subscribing to the Law Enforcement Television Network will cost \$4,800, Police Chief Alan Sheffield told the council, but the savings of not having to send officers to other cities to receive state-mandated training will more than pay the cost.

Programming is transmitted 24 hours daily, but it can be recorded here for officers to view when they are available.

It would be illegal to record the same programs elsewhere, for viewing here, he explained.

Because Wichita Valley Water Supply Corporation is proposing to expand its lines into areas where the city might grow, Barrington told the council the city should be represented at a hearing Monday in Austin.

Aldermen had earlier expressed concern over the rural water supply cooperative's proposals, and already had determined the city should oppose the plan.

Council members were told that Blue Cross Insurance has given notice of a 32-percent increase for employee medical coverage.

The city administrator asked that he be allowed to continue premiums two months, during which an insurance consultant would search for an alternate company.

Visitor from New Zealand captivates Lions Club

Wendell Allen has been host to a house guest the past couple of weeks with whom he often speaks but until she arrived, he had never seen.

Lizzie Jury and Allen often hold conversations over their ham radios, and the visit, which ended yesterday, was one they both had long awaited.

Mrs. Jury lives in New Zealand. The vivacious mother of three was the guest speaker for Tuesday's meeting of the Iowa Park Lions

She explained her radio contacts were with ham radio operators all over the world, but it is with the Americans she most enjoys talking.

Her trip to the United States has been to visit three of those contacts. After a couple of weeks with a friend in California, she came here, and left Wednesday for Arizona, her final

After nine years of virtual confinement on their 1,150-acre ranch, giving birth to three children and having to work alongside her husband,

she explained she decided it was time for her to take a trip to visit some

So she did.

Her interest in ham radios developed during her confinement to the family ranch.

After describing her radio contacts with Americans as being very interesting, because they all have a sense of humor, she declared, "Texas is a blessing. Everyone is very generous," and told of numerous benefits she had received during her visit, such as parties, being taken flying over the area, and visiting Six Flags

"But you can keep your storms," she said.

A group of ham radio operators recently gave her an ice cream party and presented her with numerous certificates, including an honorary membership, and gifts.

She was looking forward to seeing the Grand Canyon.

The Jury ranch is located on the

southeast side of the north island of New Zealand, and is north of Wellington. They raise 5,000 sheep and 120 head of breeding cows.

Sheep are normally sheared twice a year. But when a rancher is strapped for money, shearing can be done as many as four times annually, she

Their hope is to leave the ranch eventually to the Drury's son, who would become the sixth generation of the family to operate the spread.

The economy in New Zealand has changed considerably since the Labor Party was voted into control, and she gave numerous examples.

While all subsidies to agriculture have been removed, costs for everything have risen. She explained that a \$50,000 tractor here would cost a farmer \$100,000 over there.

neighbors like a beer after a hard day of shearing sheep, she mentioned.

She related a case of when she and her husband had borrowed about \$250,000 to purchase shares in the ranch from family heirs, they had signed a note for nine percent interest, but the newly-elected political party voided the interest portion of the note and charged 18 percent.

Also, since the Labor Party has gained control, there is considerable anti-American movement in the coun-
