Fannin to continue family tradition

Twenty seven days after his graduation from Iowa Park High School, Daniel Paul Fannin II will become the first from here to enroll at the Air Force Academy.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Childs was notified in April by Col.

Thomas C. Wilkinson, director of admissions, of his appointment.

He will become the third generation in his family as a member of the U.S. Air Force. His father is a retired Lieutenant Colonel and his grandfather, Gregory L. Ross of Iowa Park, is a retired Chief Master

Sergeant.

Fannin was nominated by former Cong. Beau Boulter.

He is to report June 29 to the Colorado Springs institution for basic training, and then go into his academic year, he said.

Excerpts of Col. Wilkinson's

letter were:

"Congratulations! On behalf of the Superintendent, it is my pleasure to announce your appointment to the United States Air Force Academy as a member of the Class of 1993. You will be joining a select group of our nation's finest young people as you take this challenging and rewarding step toward becoming a professional Air Force Officer...."

"Daniel, you have earned a rare opportunity to participate in one of this country's finest officer training programs. This scholarship is awarded to less than 15 percent of our applicants. Your previous accomplishments indicate you have the potential to meet the demands and challenges of the Academy. I compliment you on an excellent record of personal achievement and look forward to welcoming you to the Cadet Wing on June 29, 1989."

Fannin was also nominated by Cong. Boulter and accepted to West Point Academy, but opted to accept the appointment to the Air Force Academy.

City, school meetings Monday

Both the city council and school board have scheduled separate meetings for Monday evening.

The council, which will be meeting in regular session, has only two items on its agenda: consider suspending the "no parking" zone on First Street temporarily for construction work, and discuss traffic flow on First and Second Streets at Cornelia, Coleman, Rebecca and Manes.

Aldermen are to convene at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

The school board's meeting has been called to consider an ongoing

study of facility needs, as well as to consider revision of the 1989-90 school calendar.

Trustees have for two months been making a study of facilities needed over the next five years, and when they make the determination, a bond election will likely be called.

Revision of next year's school calendar will likely be made since the governor has signed legislation that permits schools to commence before the first day of September.

The board meeting is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Sales taxes still above 1988

Iowa Park's sales taxes are still slightly above this time last year, according to this month's report from the state comptroller's office.

The city this month received a check for \$16,398.59, which is only a 0.12-percent increase over the same month in 1988.

But for the year, the rebate checks total \$71,477.83, which is 1.40-percent more than \$70,491.05

for the same time period last year.

Wichita Falls is reporting a whopping 17.61-percent increase for the year, and Burkburnett is a plus 7.10. Electra is a minus 7.77 percent.

Holliday, having received checks amounting to \$34,596.11 for the year, is 25.28-percent over 1988.

May's checks represent taxes collected in March by monthly filers.

Area receives more than 4-inch rainfall

Iowa Park had received 3.44 inches of rainfall during the past week, as of Wednesday morning, according to measurements made by Virgil Woodfin.

Woodfin's measurements included 1:34 inches Saturday and 2:10 Tuesday.

But areas to the west got more than that in one night, Monday.

Richard Davis, who lives on Harmony Road, said he has a four-inch rain gauge that was running over when he checked it Tuesday morning.

Joe Tom Collins, who lives a mile north of Kamay, measured 4.9 inches the same morning, but Stanley Williamson reported only an inch at his home on FM 369.

Most of the farmers are reporting filled stock tanks, muddy fields and a heavy infestation of mesquitoses.

Lake Diversion was reportedly six inches above its spillway yesterday morning.

No flooding of homes has yet been reported in the Iowa Park area, but some homeowners who were having their roofs repaired have complained of leaks during the storms.

7 arrests keep police busy

Nine persons were arrested during the past week by Iowa Park police, including one for possession of marijuana and one for assault.

Police arrested Vergie Renee Merrick, 31, at 11 p.m. Thursday in the parking lot at Cryovac, on a misdemeanor possession of marijuana charge.

Because the plant is outside the city limits, a sheriff's deputy was with the officers, and he transported the suspect to the county jail.

Officers took Richard Lynn Lyles, 35, into custody at 7:03 a.m. Monday in the 500 block of N. Victoria, after his wife filed charges against him for assault.

Lyles was transported at 9:17 to

county jail, according to the police blotter.

Darryl Lynn Jones, 44, was arrested at 5:40 p.m. Friday in the 300 block of East Highway after it was determined the Department of Public Safety had outstanding warrants against him. He was turned over to a DPS trooper.

The tickets will primarily be to attend a concert by the recording group Alabama, which was named the Country Music Association's "Artist of the Decade."

Tickets will be available in Iowa Park at the Chamber office, starting June 1. The price is \$15 per person.

Alabama, which holds the record for most consecutive number-one records at 21, is currently on tour and

visiting military bases across the country.

Chamber President Kenneth Via gave a report of another base-related event in which he recently participated. He, along with Chamber Director Leon Stevenson and Don Daugherty, were among 39 area guests of the Air Force on a trip to Peterson AFB, Norad Center, Falcon AFB and the

Air Force Academy in Colorado.

In other business Monday, reports were given on landscaping of the Chamber office grounds, membership, maps, and a Drug Free Workplace Seminar.

The local Chamber will co-sponsor the seminar between 11:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. next Thursday at the Wichita Falls Country Club.

Mrs. Norma Fortner read "A Tribute to Mother" for the thought for the day.

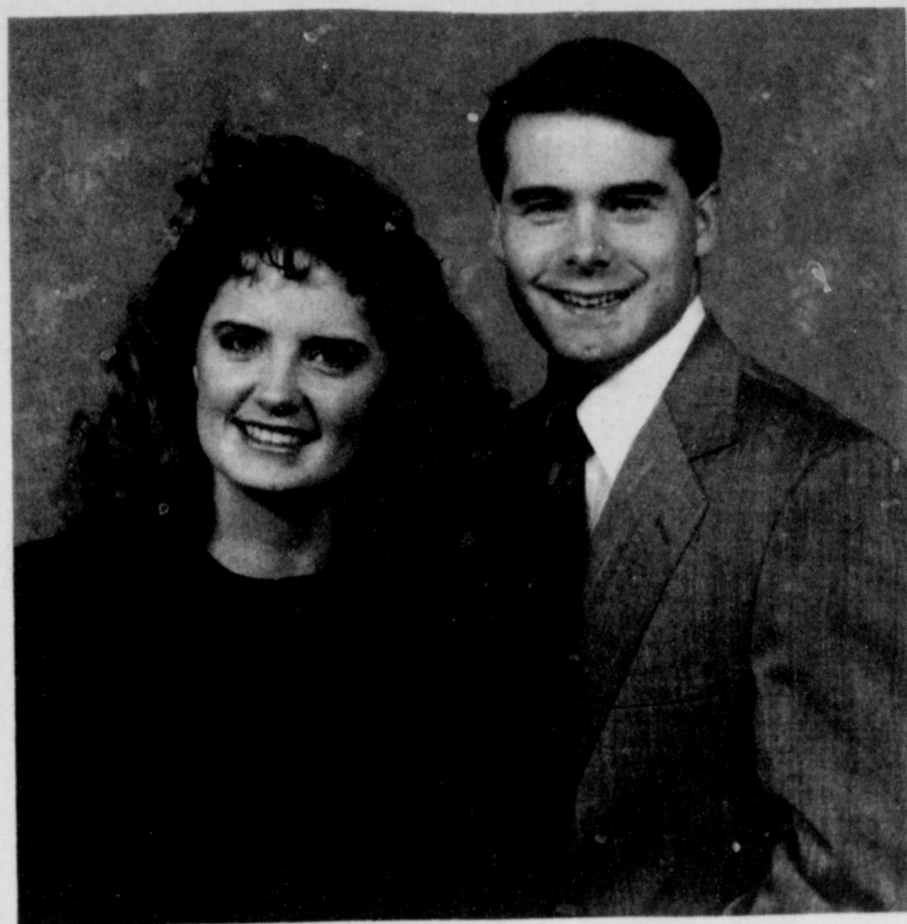
Seventeen members answered roll call with their favorite hanging basket, and Mrs. B.J. Gilmore was welcomed as a new member.

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**Summer's too short
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Men's knee busters,
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As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



With the activities I've experienced during the past week, I'm reminded of a beer commercial that says, "It just doesn't get much better than this."

Golly, I've enjoyed myself. For the 29th consecutive year, I attended the state high school track meet in Austin Friday and Saturday. There, I saw what I expect every year to see: the cream of Texas' high school athletes in competition.

It was a real kick watching two vaulters go 17 feet for new records, both within 27 minutes of each other; a girl clearing 6-1 in the high jump, a boys' division in the high jump where all three medal winners cleared seven feet, and numerous champions from last year coming back to repeat.

And, of course, experience the pride of our school being represented by four very dedicated and talented girls.

Then, Tuesday night Dolores and I were the guests of Sheppard AFB for its annual Community Appreciation Dinner.

Everything was great, but the entertainment was absolutely outstanding! It was by an Air Force organization called The Strolling Strings.

This is a 26-member group of musicians who play violins, violas, cellos, double base and accordian, but during their performance, all but one

of the violins is scattered around the room.

Without a director, but because of constant practice, the group is capable of playing the most difficult music, without a single hitch of mistiming, and completely captivates its audience.

There's a lot of work and long hours that go into producing a weekly newspaper, but when one gets to spend pleasant hours such as I have experienced over a five-day period, it's all worth while.

Seeing and hearing so much talent in such a short period of time is overwhelming.

Worth Quoting

The Department of Education issued its sixth annual "report card" on public education in the 50 states this week.

Among the key findings were the fact that high school graduation rates dropped from 71.6 percent in 1986 to 71.1 percent in 1987.

Average national scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test dropped from 906 in 1987 to 904 in 1988.

Average scores on the American College testing program rose from 18.7 in 1987 to 18.8 in 1988.

And average per-student spending reached \$3,977 in 1988 -- up substantially from the \$3,165 level in 1982.

Texas improved its high school graduation rate and its average score on the SAT -- the graduation rate in 1987 rose from 64.3 the previous year to 65.1 percent and the SAT score from 875 to 879.

"The good news is that the schools are not worse; the bad news is that we are not making progress," Education Secretary Lauro Cavazos said.

As you might expect, the experts disagreed on the need for corrections.

"We are already spending more money per student than our major foreign competitors, Japan and Germany. And yet our students consistently fall behind the competition in competitive testing," Dr. Cavazos said. "Money alone is not the answer to our education deficit."

And the National Education Agency people disagreed about the money comment. "What we are seeing now is the direct result of the educational neglect supported by the Reagan administration," said NEA President Mary Futrell.

Texas ranked 17th in the SAT scores and 43rd in the graduation rates.

It's a subject that is conveniently overlooked at both the national and state level but we believe that population makeup has more to do with the standings than money.

Take the graduation rate, for example.

Minnesota leads the nation with a graduation rate of 96.5 percent, followed by Wyoming, North Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa and Montana.

At the bottom of the barrel is the District of Columbia with the worst graduation rate, 55.5 percent. Florida is next worst with a rate of 58.6, Louisiana 60.1, Michigan 62.4, Georgia 62.5, New York 62.9, Arizona 64.4, Mississippi 64.8, and Texas 65.1.

What's the major difference between those states with the best rates and those with the worst? The makeup of their populations.

Minnesota is 96.5 percent white, Wyoming 95.0, North Dakota 95.7 percent, Nebraska 94.9, Iowa 94.4, and Montana 94.0 percent.

Contrast those figures with those for Texas. Texas census shows 78.6 percent of the population is English speaking, California 76.1, Louisiana 69.2, New York 79.5 percent.

It's evident that those upper tier states do not have to contend with language differences.

Critics of public education in this nation are always pointing to Germany, Japan and England for comparisons as to how poor our schools are doing.

They should go a step further and point out that in England 98 percent of the students are English speaking, in Germany the ratio is 93 percent, and in Japan a whopping 99.4 percent of the population is Japanese.

Common sense dictates that it is more difficult to teach English, math, and science to non-English speaking students than to those whose native tongue is English.

In 1987 the Texas Legislature enacted a law requiring school districts to have a 95 percent graduation rate by 1998.

To achieve that goal, it would seem that priorities should be established to do a better job of making more students fluent in English at an earlier age.

It's a problem that Minnesota and Wyoming do not have to cope with but one that Texas must.

Finally curiosity got the better of me. I decided to call the Texas Comptroller of Public Account's office and find out why the state needed all the new information. Was there some bill passed in the last legislature that I didn't know about?

True to form my friend in the Comptroller's office, Glen Castleberry, didn't know about the new information form either. The upper management of the state tax office had heard nothing about the new information form, but Glen dove into the bureaucracy to find out why Texas corporations needed to list, of all things, the driver's license number of officers and directors.

After a few hours, Glen called back with, as is his usual nature, the hard, unvarnished truth about the great form fiasco of 1989. It seems there is a small committee, deep in the bowels of the Comptroller's office, that decides what will be included on the various tax forms the state sends to taxpayers.

Normally this committee is limited to designing forms that can be read by the large collection of various electronic and optical scanners that the Comptroller's office uses to read returned forms. They are not supposed to make any kind of policy decisions, but this one slipped through the cracks of state government.

The Comptroller's field agents had requested that the home address and telephone number be included on the information form so that they could contact the right person in a large city with many people that have the same name. They also wanted the social security number to help identify taxpayers. How the request for a driver's license number got on the form is anybody's guess.

To add to the confusion, the information is not even required to complete the form. The stipulation, that all blanks must be completed, applied to the information report only, not the franchise tax return.

The happy ending to the form fiasco of 1989 is that the Comptroller's office has issued a blanket apology to all franchise tax paying corporations and has already removed the request for the additional information from all forms issued by the department.

That is government responding to the will of the people.

Looking for faster highways

Rep. Charles Finnell has introduced a resolution directing state officials to prepare for 65 mile per hour speed limit on four-lane divided highways.

The Holliday resident said the 55-mph speed limit on those highways especially penalizes rural Texans, who must drive farther to work, recreation, shopping and medical care.

He wants the state to promptly raise that speed limit contingent on the passage of federal legislation that

has been filed to allow states to do so without the loss of vital federal highway funds.

"Nobody in Texas wants to jeopardize \$900-million in federal highway money," Finnell said. "But if and when congress lets us raise the speed limit to 65 on four-lane divided highways, we should be ready to act immediately."

Finnell said U.S. House Resolution 773, introduced in congress by U.S. Rep. Larry Combest of Lubbock, would allow states to raise the maximum speed limit on four-lane divided highways.

Finnell's resolution directs the Texas Highway Department to set a 65 mph speed limit on those roads as soon as the federal legislation is passed.

"Texas has the best roads in the nation," he said. "The Highway Department attests that our four-lane divided highways were certainly built to accommodate 65 mile-per-hour traffic."

Unfortunately, one of the major conversation items in the Capitol these days is not whether the governor is going to call a special session, but how many.

One of many reasons this is regrettable is because the Legislature has had more than enough time in regular session to deal with the state's pressing needs. But time and again, the process has been slowed by posturing from powerful special interest groups, and intervention by the governor's staff.

One of the most critical areas in which the Legislature must act is the complex issue of workers compensation reform. There's simply no reason why the Legislature cannot approve a meaningful reform package by session's end on May 29.

Legislators agree on the need for safety programs to reduce the chances for worker injury, more accountability by insurance companies, and that small employers need to receive credit for good safety records.

While the special interests argue over how much they're going to "get" and how much they'll have to "give," it's unforgivable not to deal with the areas we all identify as problems in the workers compensation system.

Efforts to help rural health care are also getting bogged down in politics.

There are a number of vitally needed measures we must enact to stem the tide of hospital closures. But some interest groups are clearly attempting to stall progress on the issue in order to inject unrelated issues into the mix.

A couple of weeks ago, it was widely reported that key groups were nearing an agreement on rural health when an angry member of the governor's staff interjected himself, insisting that the negotiators start over.

This kind of game playing makes a special session seem even more imminent.

But while one or more special

sessions may give Governor Clements an opportunity to make his mark in his last term, such unnecessary maneuvers will also undoubtedly leave a dent in the taxpayers' wallet.

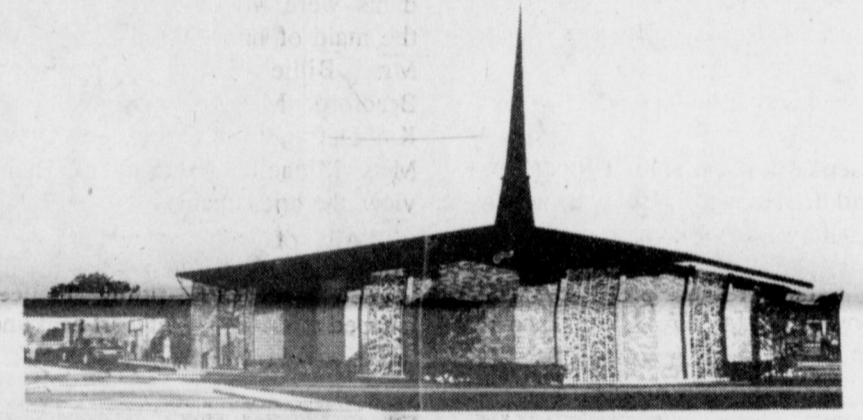

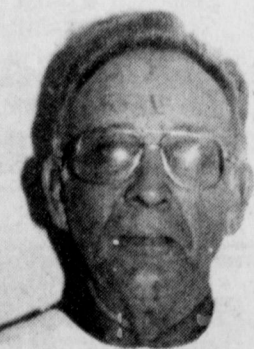

who jumped 17-6.5.

Dorner's other five jumps, in order, were 16-9, 16-8, 16-11, 15-9 and 17-2.

Parker is a member of the MSU Media Club and the Church of Christ Student Center.

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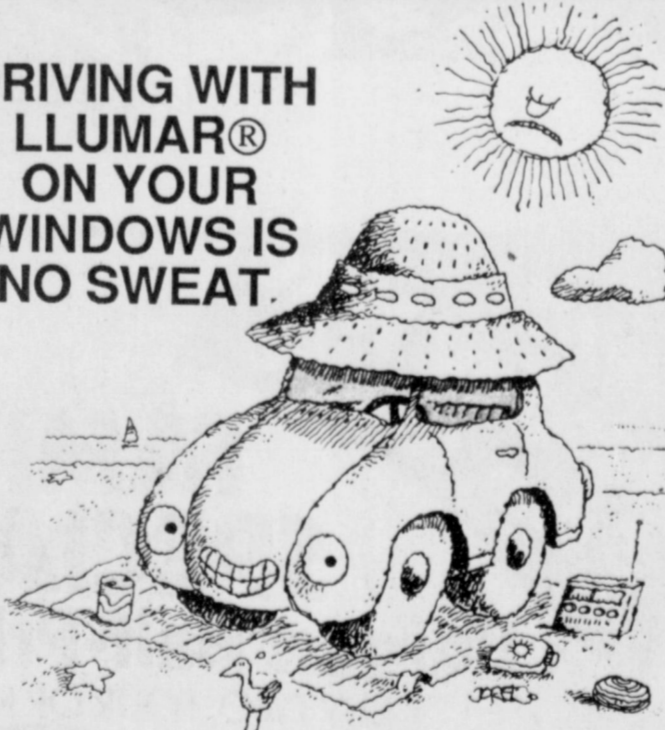
