David, 24, and Ann, 22, Bernard arrived at the 2-J Horse Ranch on FM 369 Tuesday afternoon, and a full schedule awaited them.

Mrs. Barnard's father and another Australian were here in the early 1960s, having stopped on an unusual trip to foreign countries to learn how sheep raising and related agriculture

Her father raises sheep, cattle, wheat, some sorghum and legumes.


A busy itinerary faced the couple upon their arrival, according to Mrs. Williamson.

Trustees okay calendar, continue building study

Trustees of the Iowa Park school district Monday night approved the 1989-90 school calendar, and took another step toward deciding how much construction is needed to meet future needs.

Passage of the calendar did not

receive the usual smooth-sailing vote as it usually does, but was approved by a split vote.

Three variations, including starting and ending dates as well as holidays, of calendars had been offered to the faculty for preferences. The votes were similar, ranging from 31 to 44.

But the calendar receiving 35 faculty votes was the one finally adopted by the board, primarily because of two previously-scheduled activities at which some faculty members were obligated.

The board held its fourth study session Monday on proposals, and also heard from a financial consultant Ken Smith regarding procedures and his potential services if and when the board decides to call for a bond issue to pay for the work.

Projected costs given the board at its third session was \$3,181,460, but Supt. Glen Mitchell's report, based on the last meeting and cuts made with architect Don Daughterity, the cost projection given Monday was down to \$2,763,720.

More cuts were suggested by board members during the meeting, but the cost result was not tallied.

Broken down by areas, the most recent projections included \$679,000 at the high school, \$733,000 junior high, \$328,000 Bradford, \$427,000 Kidwell, \$180,000 field house, \$72,000 administration and \$140,000 maintenance and bus barn, for a total

Added to that are \$25,590 for a contingency fee and \$179,130 architect fees.

Mitchell pointed out to the board that \$417,740 had been cut from the third proposal studied."

Possible months during which a bond election might be called, based on discussions during the meeting, were September, December, or sometime during next spring.



The Borens were married May 30, 1939, and lived in Wichita Valley Farms from 1945 to 1974, when they moved to Graham.



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

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

DENTURE CARE

Dentures profit most from a good scrubbing. Use a brush with soap and water or some toothpaste. Soaking with the drug store tablets should always be followed by brushing. If possible they should be brushed after each meal and certainly at bedtime.

An inexpensive solution to use to help get the tartar off is household vinegar. Soak the dentures overnight then brush and rinse throughly. Always fill the basin part way with water so that if you drop the denture the water will cushion the fall. Some of the newer metal alloys and all of the new vinyl permanent soft liners will react with chlorine bleach. Be sure you do not soak your denture in bleach if it is of this type. If you don't know...ask your dentist. However, if your denture does NOT contain these materials, certain stains such as tea, coffee and tobacco stains can be removed by soaking the dentures in a solution of 1 part bleach and 2 parts water for 1 hour...then brush.

It is advisable to hold the lower denture by one side at a time while brushing...some people will tend to squeeze harder and harder as they brush until the denture snaps in the middle. Prepared in the interest of better dental health. Richard Carver D.D.S., Phone 592-

This hay, called Old Scarecrow, while made entirely from locoweed, is alluringly described as a blend of old straw aged in the cornfield. And suppose that the manufacturers of Old Scarecrow are making a tremedous profit out of all of this trouble and tragedy they cause the farmer.

How would you expect the farmers to take to all of this? Would you expect them to take it sitting down? Or would you expect them to stand up and say to the producers of Old Scarecrow "That ain't hay", and then put forth an effort to protect their cows by banning the advertising and promotion of Old Scarecrow from the range. And now just suppose that you cared as much about your children and your fellowmen as you would expect the farmer to care about his cows! What do you suppose you would do about drinking?
