

# State's education bill is good, bad news locally

The 11th-hour school finance legislation passed Monday evening in Austin provides both good and bad news for the Iowa Park school district, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

While he does not yet have a full printout on the bill and how it will apply locally, Supt. Mitchell said he appreciates an increase of \$453,846 in funding for the district over the next two years.

However, like HB 72 the legislature passed in 1985, the funding apparently does not fully fund the mandates of the legislation.

Iowa Park is to receive an additional \$148,085 for school year 1989-90, and \$305,761 for 1990-91.

But the additional funding does not completely pay for the pay increases the legislation provides for classroom teachers.

The bill, which was primarily the draft of Sen. Carl Parker of Port Arthur, increases the minimum starting salary for teachers from \$15,200 to \$17,000, and the minimum top step on the pay scale increases from \$26,600 to \$30,680.

Iowa Park has 26 teachers on its faculty who are at the top scale.

All teachers in Texas are to receive a blanket salary increase next year of \$1,800.

Those teachers who had been receiving a \$1,140 annual increase until they reached the top scale will not get that amount next year, because of the \$1,800 blanket increase.

The blanket increase will put a pinch on the school board's budget work for 1989-90, because the \$190,000 mandated increase for the 110 teachers in the system is more than the \$148,085 additional funding scheduled next year.

Local trustees are used to that, however. The annual increases mandated in the 1985 legislation also was not funded by the state.

"I'm pleased the teachers are getting the raise. It's a good, positive step," Mitchell commented, but added he was disappointed Rep. Jim Rudd's amendment to Sen. Parker's bill was not accepted by the legislature.

The Rudd amendment would

have been much more beneficial to the district, he explained.

The formula for funding is based on a projection of increased enrollment, Mitchell said.

Both legislators representing the Iowa Park district, Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday and Sen. Steve Carriker of Roby, voted against the final bill. And they were in the minority.

The bill, which was approved just minutes before midnight Monday, was approved 129-21 in the house and 25-3 in the senate.

Mitchell said the legislation included an increase of \$20 per ADA (average daily attendance per student), for the career ladder funding. He did not know, however, if that were in-

cluded in the \$453,846 increase designated for Iowa Park.

After the 1989-90 school year, teacher salary increases will resume at \$1,140 annually until the top step in salaries is reached.

The superintendent said he does not know how one portion of the bill, a measure insisted upon by Gov. Bill Clements, will affect the local district.

The governor's measure calls for a program of financially rewarding districts that improve on student achievement and decreased dropout rates.

The effect would be slight, however, because only \$10-million was included in the legislation, to cover

the entire state.

Also included in the bill were:

- \* require the TEA to establish new attendance rules for students and require districts to notify parents whenever their children are taught by uncertified teachers.

- \* require districts to provide remedial classes for certain low-achieving students.

- \* expands the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills to include questions about science and social studies, adds a writing section for the exit exam, and eliminates testing of first graders.

- \* lowers the mandated age from seven to six for starting school, and raises the mandated age to attend from 16 to 17.

### Seniors to graduate Friday

Commencement exercises for Iowa Park High School seniors will begin at 8 p.m. Friday in Hawk Stadium.

Should weather not permit the outdoor ceremony, it will be moved into the school's auditorium. Each of the 183 candidates has been issued eight tickets which will admit family members and guests, according to Richard Davis, principal.

The commencement address will be delivered by Jimmy Howell, who served nine years on the board of trustees. Howell is a former Vocational Agriculture instructor who was elected to the board after leaving the education field and entering private business.

The traditional presentation of the school key will be made by Scot Davis, president of the senior class. Bruce Palmer, 1989-90 student council president, will accept it.

Principal Davis will present the class for graduation to Supt. Glen Mitchell, and the presentation of diplomas will be made by John Sibley, vice-president of the board of trustees.

Invocation will be given by Richard Owens, and benediction by Regina Sullivan.

The school song, processional and recessional will be played by the Hawk Band, under direction of Greg Miller.

### Full-night activities planned for 'lock-ins'

For the second consecutive year, there's going to be an all-night party at the high school following Friday's graduation of the senior class.

It's free to class members and closed to the public.

Carol Venhaus, coordinator of the event, said 35 chaperones will be joined by more than 75 percent of the class, and their guests.

After the party starts at 10 p.m., the doors will be locked at 11, and no

one will be allowed to enter. Those who choose to leave will not be allowed to re-enter, Mrs. Venhaus said.

The "lock-in" was begun last year to give the graduates something safe and entertaining to do following their graduation.

Mrs. Venhaus said last year, "A lot of people felt something like this ought to be done for the seniors, rather than just handing them their diplomas and sending them on their way to find some sort of activity at which

to celebrate." The climax will take place at 6 a.m., when the final drawings for prizes will be held, and the Iowa Park MuleSkinners serve breakfast. The coordinators had a budget of some \$2,500 with which to work. The money was raised by a garage sale, a concession stand, cash donations by merchants, and also numerous merchandise gifts given by local merchants, Mrs. Venhaus said. "There are more than enough prizes for everyone to receive one at our drawings, which will be held every 10 minutes," she added.

Top prizes include a compact disc player, 13-inch color television, Nintendo game, necklace and a set of luggage.

Everyone attending will be put on one of four teams, and members will be identified by different colored t-shirts.

Besides the casino, there will be a dance, and competition in volleyball, basketball, water balloon fight, ice cream eating and a three-legged race.

noted on the blotter at 12:49, 1:32 and 3:17 Saturday morning.

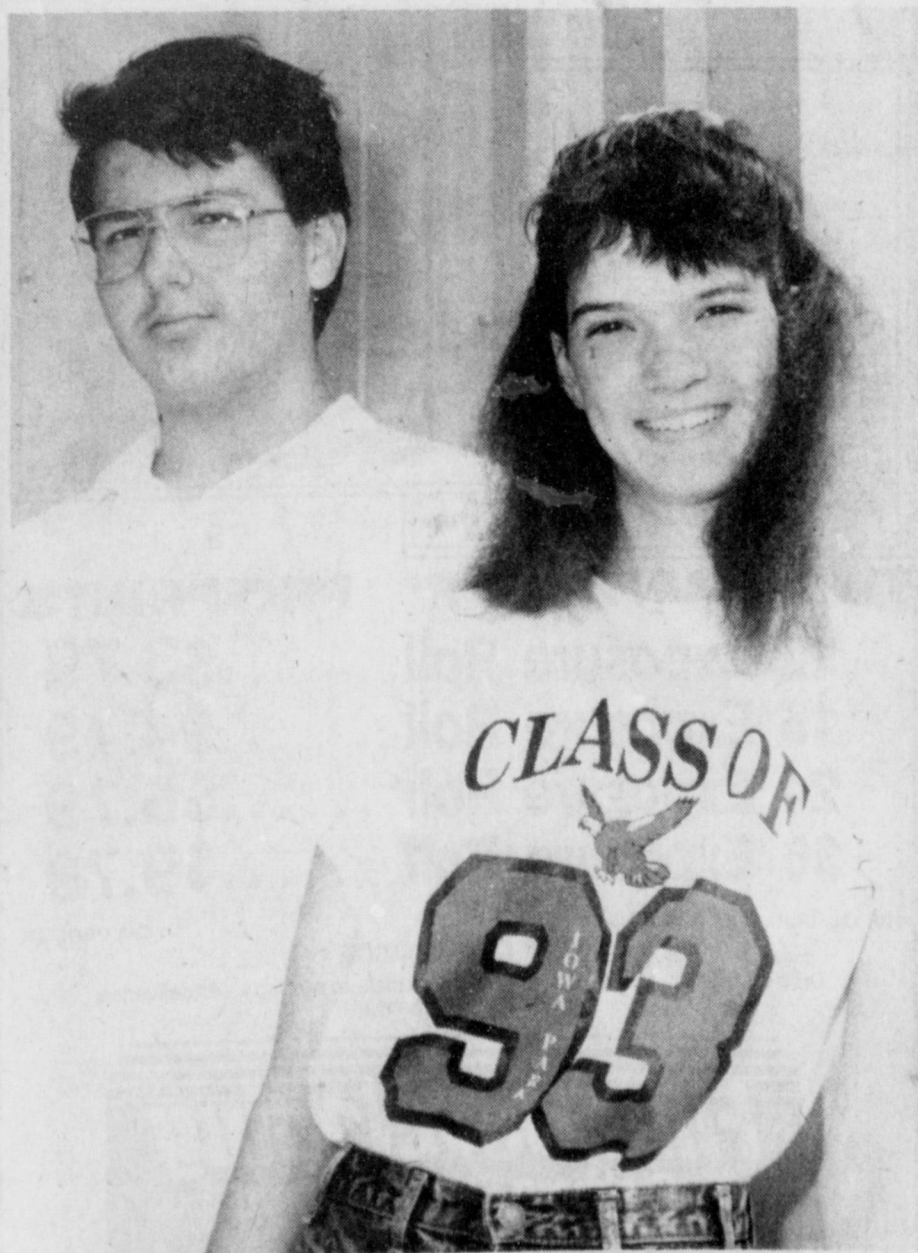
Two reports on the blotter were about dogs.

Following announcement of the top 10 scholastic students in the class by Principal Jimmy Alsop, the

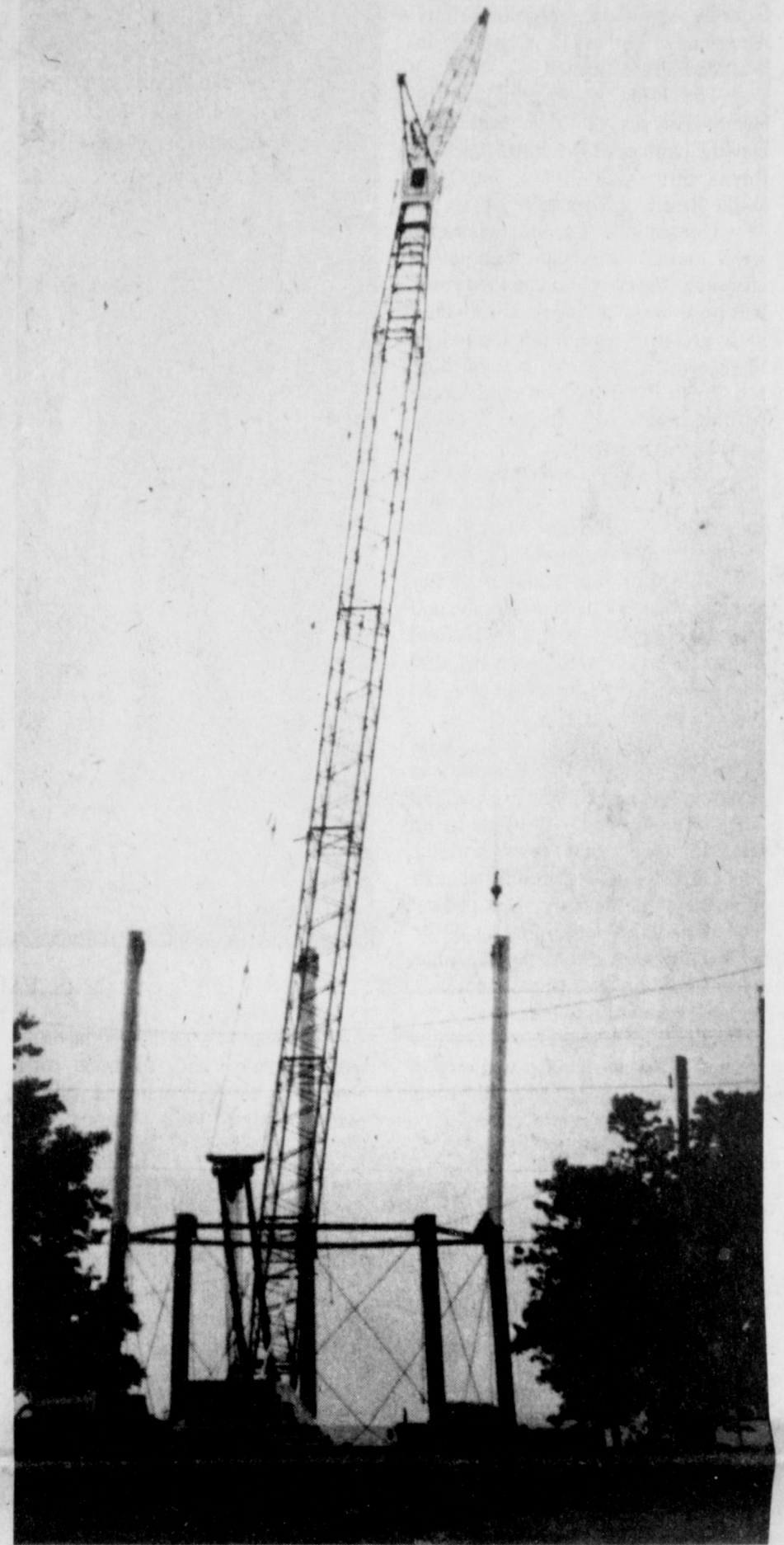
class will be presented to Richard Davis, high school principal.

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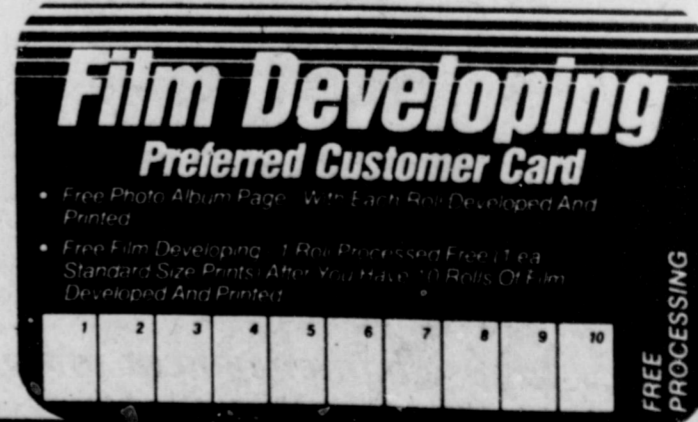
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## Evening Lioness officers installed

She received the MFA degree.

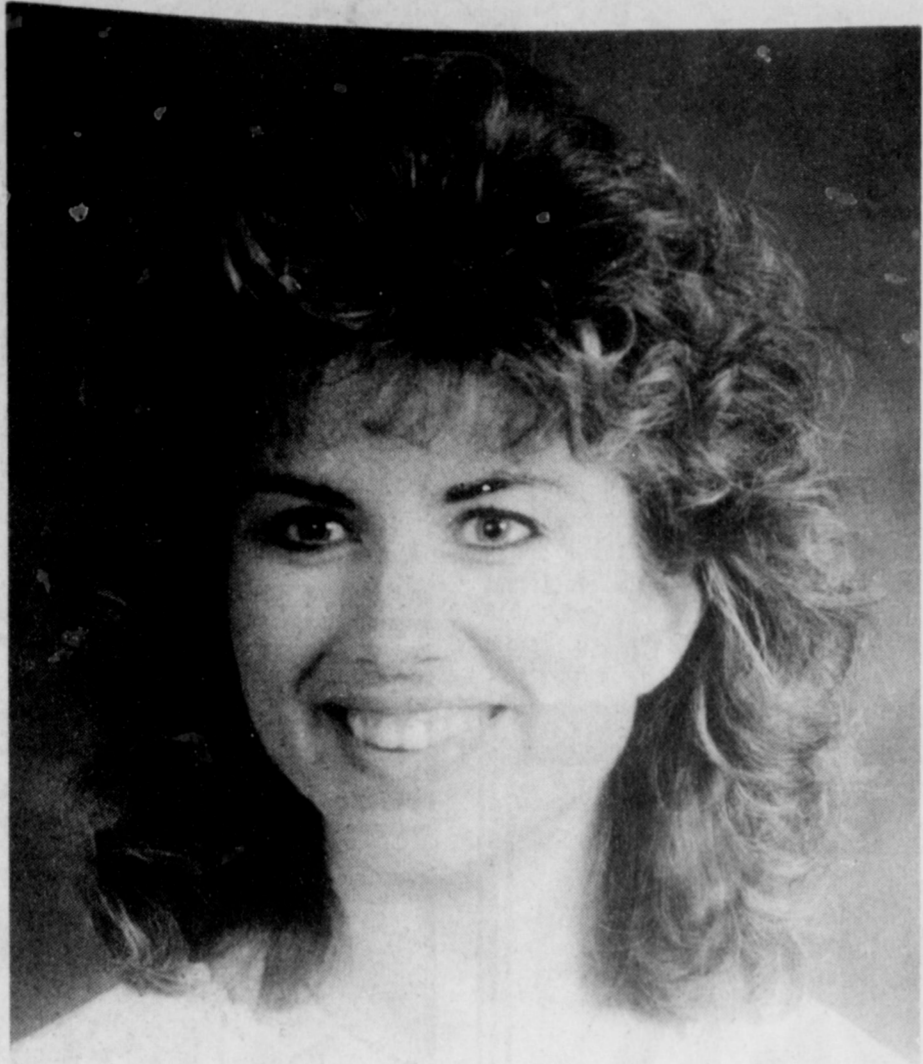

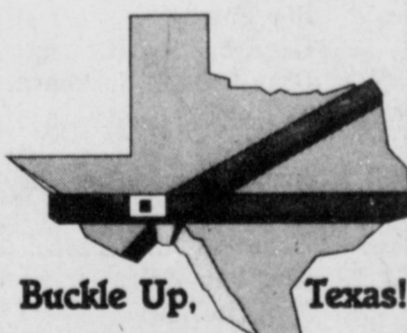

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# As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



I was planning to use this space this week to lay it on the Texas legislature. But I think I had better wait a week or so, to better digest just what is was that happened during the past session in Austin.

The two major points I was going to discuss was the legislature's inability to act on the very first bill introduced in the session. It was on workers' compensation.

The other was the failure to even get a bill out of committee, endorsed by virtually every school district and city in the state, to force legislation mandating programs, but not being funded by the state.

It could very well be that the workers' compensation bill, and/or

the amendments attached thereon, were so unworkable that it would not have been good for the state.

But I've long been critical of last-minute legislation being passed, and felt that, if anything were to be passed, it should be the very first put on the agenda.

I appreciate very much both Rep. Charles Finnell and Sen. Steve Carriker voting against the school bill that was passed.

This legislation, just like that piece of stupid writing called HB 72, mandates expenditures, but fails to fund it.

But there was good legislation passed in the session, as there was bad legislation.

I'll have more on the subject as information comes available.

One thing is for sure, however. If and when it is made available, it darned sure won't be reported in *that paper*.

Congratulations to our graduating seniors. We hope the best for each of you in the future!

both First Aid procedures and CPR for adults. Participants will be awarded certificates in both courses upon successful completion.

Babysitting classes will be held 9:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m. June 3 and 10, for boys and girls 11 years of age and older.

The Wichita County Chapter of Red Cross will hold its 72nd annual meeting and volunteer recognition at 6:30 p.m. June 9 at the Outdoor Education Center of Midwestern State Univ.

When the reader responded, he or she found out that it took \$5 to get the information and when this was sent, back came a catalog of government jobs, a publication available to anyone. There was no offer of a job and of course the outfit that placed the ad is making money from selling the publication. This is a ripoff, to be sure, but it is not illegal because no promises were made that were not fulfilled.

We do try to screen out classified ads that are obviously a fraud, such as the ones that offer \$100 a day for addressing envelopes. We toss many insertion orders in the waste basket and return others with checks attached.

Some years ago the late Jess Woodward, managing the Ellis Grain company, answered an ad in a trade magazine which promised a guaranteed greenbug killer for only \$5. In fact the advertisement guaranteed satisfaction and went even further by promising to pay double your money back if the product did not kill greenbugs as promised. Jess Invested \$5 in the product. In time he received a package in the mail containing a small wooden block, a small wooden mallet and a sheet of paper with instructions how to use the greenbug killer.

The paper said: A) Catch a greenbug. B) Place greenbug on wooden block. C) Smash the greenbug with the mallet. D) Catch another greenbug and repeat process. There was no question about the effectiveness of the greenbug killer. It did work. Thus there was no recourse and Jess Woodward had a good laugh on himself for having been a sucker. He brought his greenbug killer kit to a Lions Club meeting where everyone else had a good laugh out of it.

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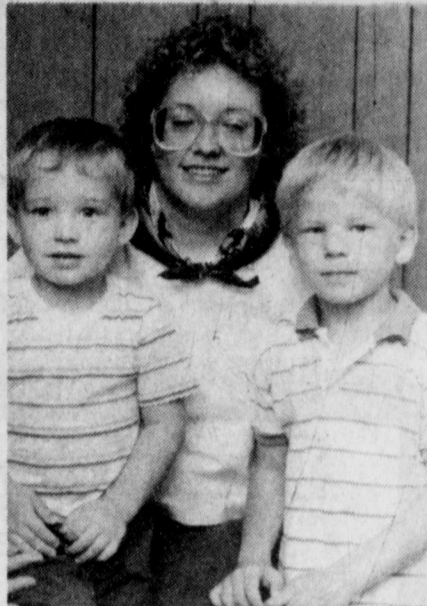
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# Cook of the Week

1 1/2 cups (6 oz.) shredded Monterey Jack cheese  
1 1/2 cups (6 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese

Chopped tomatoes (optional)  
Black Olives, sliced (optional)

Cook and finely crumble sausage with onion in 10-inch skillet; drain well. Stir in 1/4 cup of the picante sauce and cumin. Heat about 1/2-inch oil in small skillet until hot, but not smoking. Quickly fry each tortilla in oil to soften, about 5 seconds on each side. Drain on paper towels. Spoon about 2 Tbsp. meat mixture onto each tortilla and add small amount of both cheeses. Roll and

## SNICKER-DOS

1 1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup oleo  
1/2 cup shortening  
2 eggs

Mix above ingredients thoroughly.

2 3/4 cup flour  
2 tsp. cream of tartar  
1 tsp. baking soda  
1/4 tsp. salt

Blend together flour, cream of tartar, baking soda and salt. Stir into first mixture.

Shape dough by rounded teaspoons into balls. Mix two tablespoons sugar and two teaspoons cinnamon. Roll balls into sugar/cinnamon mixture. Bake 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet eight to 10 minutes at 400 degrees. The cookies will appear unbaked and soft when removed from oven. Can be baked six to eight minutes for soft, chewy cookies; or longer for crisp cookies.

## MAC SAUSAGE AND BROCCOLI BAKE

1 (7 1/4 oz.) pkg. macaroni and cheese dinner  
1 (10 oz.) pkg. frozen broccoli spears, thawed and drained  
1 lb. smoked sausage, cut into 1.2-inch pieces  
1 (10 3/4 oz.) can condensed cream of celery soup  
1/2 cup green onion slices

Prepare dinner as directed on package. Cut broccoli into 1-inch pieces. Add with remaining ingredients to dinner; mix well. Spoon mixture into 2 quart casserole; cover. Bake at 350 degrees 45 minutes or until thoroughly heated. Makes six to eight servings.

Variation: Substitute 4 cups 1-inch fresh broccoli pieces for frozen broccoli.

Make Ahead: Prepare as directed except for baking. Cover and refrigerate. When ready to serve, bake covered at 350 degrees 50 minutes.

Microwave: Prepare casserole as directed except for baking. Microwave on high 8 minutes or until thoroughly heated, turning dish after four minutes.

## PORK CHOP AND POTATO BAKE

6 pork chops  
Vegetable oil  
Seasoned salt  
1 can (10 3/4 oz.) condensed cream of celery soup  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1/4 tsp. ground black pepper  
1 pkg. (24 oz.) frozen O'Brien or hash brown potatoes, thawed  
1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese  
1 can (2.8 oz.) French fried onions.

Brown pork chops in lightly greased skillet. Sprinkle with seasoned salt and set aside. Combine soup, milk, sour, cream, pepper and 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt. Stir in potatoes, 1/2 cup cheese and 1/2 can French fried onions. Spoon mixture into 9x13-inch baking dish. Arrange pork chops over potatoes. Bake, covered, 40 minutes at 350 degrees. Top with remaining cheese and onions; bake uncovered five minutes longer. Makes six servings.

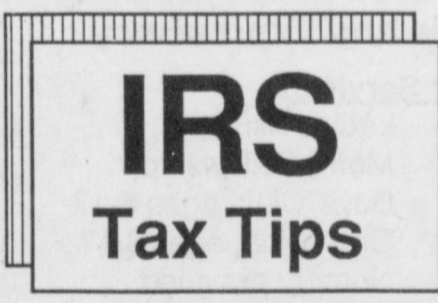
## Smallwood selected for Country Review

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Two successful developmental wells have been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field by KROT Oil Co. of Burkburnett.

The wells made a combined 21 barrels of oil per day. They are designated as the No. 13 and No. 14 Amelia, both located about two miles west of Burkburnett.

Production intervals are in the Gunsight Sand and ranged from 1,846 to 1,854 feet into the hole. The No. 13 potential at 10 BOPD while the other well made 11 BOPD. Water production totaled 22 and 26 barrels per day, respectively. Oil tested at 40-gravity.

Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 45 Tidewater in the Wichita Regular Field, about two miles southeast of Fowlkes. The well was spudded on March 22 and probed to a dry bottom at an even 1,000 feet. It will be plugged and abandoned.

The No. 1 Thom "D" is scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field with Singleton Production of Iowa Park as the operator. With total depth projected to 1,999 feet, the well is located four miles southwest of Kamay. It is in a 540-acre lease in the W.H. Spiller Survey, 840 feet from the south line and 560 feet from the east line of the survey.

Tom Swanson Oil of Electra has posted first production figures for a newly completed well in the Wichita Regular Field, 1.5 miles southwest of Fowlkes.

The well pumped 15 barrels of oil per day along with 25 barrels of waste water.

It probed to a total depth of 1,901 feet and will produce from a perforated interval in the Cisco Sand, 1,808 to 1,816 feet into the hole. Oil tested at 42-gravity.

The same operator has staked location for the No. 33 Tidewater-Sunray "B" in the Wichita Regular Field, 2.5 miles southwest of Fowlkes. It will be a 2,000-ft. test with drillsite in a 140-acre lease, HT&B Survey. Location is 150 feet from the south line and 450 feet from the west line of Block 1.

The No. 9 Burnett Oil has been completed as a pumping oiler in the Wichita Regular Field, about two miles southeast of Fowlkes. Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett is the operator.

On an open choke, the well pumped 10 barrels of 39-gravity oil per day.

It bottomed at 1,060 feet, was plugged back to an even 1,000 and will produce from a perforated interval in the Cisco Sand, 920 to 954 feet into the wellbore.

First production figures have been posted for a newly completed well in the Wichita Regular Field, about 1.5 miles southeast of Clara.

West Landrum of Burkburnett is the operator.

On an open choke, the well made five barrels of 42-gravity oil per day plus 20 barrels of waste water.

It probed to total depth of 1,800 feet, was plugged back to 1,670 and will produce from perforated intervals in the Cisco Sand, 775 to 1,621 feet into the wellbore.

J.C. Wells of Burkburnett has abandoned a pair of undrilled locations in the Wichita Regular Field, about one mile south of Clara. The wells had been designated as the No. 14 and No. 15 Ella Shulz.

Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett has plugged and abandoned an unsuccessful developmental bid in the Wichita Regular Field, about two miles southeast of Fowlkes. The well was known as the No. 45 Tidewater and was drilled to total depth of 1,000 feet with no commercial shows.

The No. 1 Lambert, an 8,400-ft. wildcat well, is scheduled to be drilled in Hardeman County. Trio Operating of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be spudded in an 80-acre unit four miles south of Chillicothe, 1,672 feet from the south line and 1,929 feet from the west line of Section 68, Block 16 of the H&TC Survey, A-1058.

Plug-and-abandon orders were issued for the No. 1 Shivers, a wildcat venture of Paul DeCleva Inc. of Wichita Falls in Hardeman County. Spudded March 26, the well had reached 8,324-ft. total depth. Drillsite was two miles south of Medicine Mound in Section 49, Block H of the W&NW Survey, A-508. Location was 2,380 feet from the north line and 1,385 feet from the east line of the survey.

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
