## Chamber needs members

The U.S. Marine Corps isn't the only outfit around looking for a few good people.

Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce is also needing some.

A serious slack in memberships was discussed during Monday's monthly meeting of the Chamber's board of directors.

Ruth Pirkle, chairman of the membership committee, expressed frustration with a lack of response she and others on her committee have received when contacting businesses and individuals who are not maintaining their memberships.

"Our primary source of income is from dues," she pointed out, "and when people don't maintain their

memberships by paying their dues, we are in financial trouble."

While the organization receives much of its dues in monthly and quarterly payments, the Chamber's bank account was less than \$1,000 at the time of the meeting.

A list of nine businesses and five individual members who have dropped their memberships was studied by the board.

Directors were led in a discussion by President Kenneth Via on how the Chamber might develop a new source of revenue with which to pay its bills, but no decision was reached.

Besides dues, additional income is received from booth sales at the

annual Whoop-T-Do, ticket sales at the annual banquet, and projects such as sponsoring an aluminum can recycling concession.

As part of the Chamber's plan to improve relations with Sheppard AFB, a fish fry was held last month for some base personnel, and Via reported on the outcome of that event.

H.M. Nipper told of a fund set aside to finance such projects, which was contributed to by State National Bank, Parkway, Settle Drug and Phil Welch Insurance.

Directors voted to name Via the Chamber's official liaison to the base.

## No age limit for model airplane hobbyists

It may come as a shock to some, but an activity they associate with being a juvenile is now a very active hobby for adults.

And for the very serious and devoted hobbyist, their investment can be well into the thousands of dollars.

Model airplanes have been a fascination for youngsters a long time, but radio control of model airplanes wasn't begun until the 1940s.

It has grown into an international hobby, with competition for both the young and adult.

And it's a serious hobby for one Iowa Park resident, Jerry Denton of 4 Surrey.

A member of the American Model Association (AMA), and National Miniature Pylon Racing Association (NMPRA), as well as the Wichita Falls Radio Control Club, Denton has company with other Iowa Parkers, Mike Negri, Jim Pappas and Jack Cummings.

Two rooms of the Denton home are devoted exclusively to his hobby, which he enjoys with his 11-year-old son Mark, who is getting into radio-controlled gliders.

The smaller of the two rooms is

equipped with miniature power tools, including a band saw, table saw, drills, grinder, belt and disc sander, and others.

In the larger room are numerous cabinets in which spare parts are filed, a work bench, and its walls, as well as the other room's, are hanging areas for assembled planes and wings.

Denton began his hobby as an aeromodeler in the early 1970s, but had recently married his wife, Margaret, and it became apparent the cost was too great for newlyweds, so he dropped out.

But he picked it back up in 1982 and quickly advanced to Formula One competition, in which modelers fly their small crafts in excess of 200 miles per hour over a 2.5-mile, three pylon course.

But, as much as he enjoyed that form of competition, he dropped out after a year. He explained, "You are looking at about \$10,000 a year to be competitive."

Now he's involved in "Quickie 500" events, which is flying radio controlled (RC) planes over a two-mile, three pylon course. Because the RCs are smaller and don't fly as fast, the cost is not prohibitive, he said.

Quickie events take about a minute, 20 seconds to make 10 laps, flying the RCs 30-40 feet above the ground at 120-130 MPH.

In fact, he's working late into the evenings this week, preparing a new RC for competition this weekend at Frisco.

He's competed in Houston, Georgetown, Seagoville, Gainesville, Wichita Falls, and even in Arkansas.

The District AMA meet will be Sept. 9-10 in Wichita Falls, and national sometime in October in California.

Quickie 500 RCs must meet specifications set by the AMA, such as a minimum weight of 3.5 pounds, square inch wing area, and use a muffled stock .40 engine.

Dues to the AMA are \$40 per year, for which the 140,000 members receive a monthly magazine and a \$1-

## Major highway projects told

A senior design engineer with the Texas Department of Highways has confirmed two major projects are about to be announced for the Iowa Park area.

Mike Murphy said an overpass is to be constructed on Peterson Road and U.S. 287, and Loop 370, better

known locally as West Highway, is to be widened for a third lane.

Murphy said bids will be let in August for construction of the overpass, which will correct the only at-grade road crossing of 287 between Wichita Falls and Electra.

In widening Loop 370, a third lane for left-hand turning will be pro-

vided, which will accommodate better flow of traffic.

The project will be from FM 368, or Pacific Ave., to Johnson Road. To the east, the former 287 roadway is four lanes.

October has tentatively been set for bid letting on that project.

## 4 young locals arrested on drug-related charges

## Mesquitoes causing run on repellents

At the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Cravens in Kamay, a swim party and cookout for members and families of the Kamay Volunteer Fire Dept. was in progress. Midway through the festivities, a gunshot could be heard in the distance.

In a moment of silence, a voice spoke, "sounds like someone just killed another mosquito."

With the recent onslaught of rain in the past few weeks came a batch of mosquitos, not just in rural areas, such as Kamay, where water has been standing in the fields and ditches, but also in Iowa Park.

Wherever the mosquitoes lurk, local carriers of mosquito repellent have reported a marked increase in their sales of the product, some selling out more than once in the last two weeks.

An employee at King's Food, Peggy Logan, reported the store's near-sellout of repellent, with some customers buying two or three cans at a time. She, like employees at B&R Thriftway, Parkway True Value and Settle Drug, said customers have commented on the size of the pests being "huge."

A clerk at Wal-Mart said that customers had commented that the mosquitos are "huge...as big as the tip of a finger." Although the mosquitos are of larger than normal size, many believe that the larger one's bite is not as severe or as irritating as that of the smaller breed.

Sue Goodknight of the city's Public Works Department confirmed that the city was doing their part in the battle. She said since the first of June, weather permitting, the city has sprayed for mosquitoes six hours a day, every day, covering every inch of the city limits.

A spokesman for the Wichita County Health Mosquito Control Unit said his department is trying to keep up with the demand for spraying in rural areas, and are planning to spray in the Kamay-Valley View area by the weekend or the first of next week.

He contributed the severity of the problem to the rain in the area leaving pools of water, where mosquitos breed.

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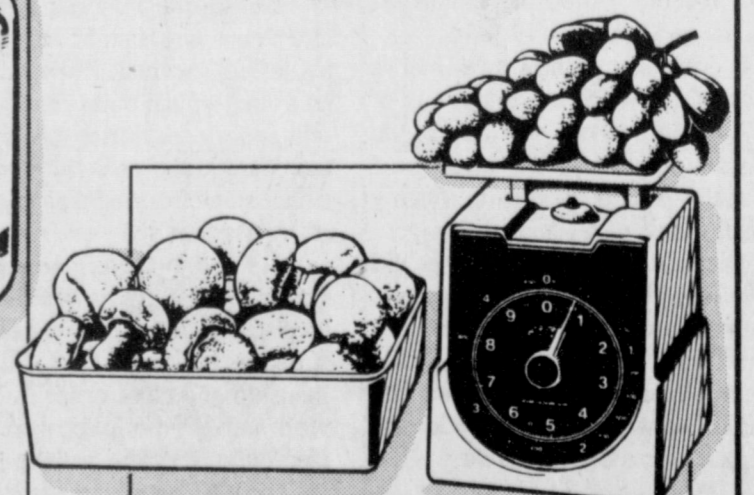

Boy! If you ever want to find out something around here, just make a mistake in an article.

No, I'm not complaining. I'm actually happy to learn, and happy I can set the record straight.

You may recall, a few weeks ago I wrote that Dan Fannin was the first Iowa Park graduate to receive an appointment to the Air Force Academy, and you may recall that I followed up with a correction that the actual first to that fine institution in Colorado was Robert Richard Pastusek.

Well, a couple of more interesting points have since come up.

I forgot that Dale Pitman did in fact receive an appointment to the Academy, and did in fact attend one year. He didn't graduate there.

Now comes a welcomed note from one of our loyal subscribers, Dennis Mitchell, who has for the past few years been living down at San Benito.

He tells me that Pastusek is not only a full colonel still on active duty in the Air Force, but made an historical flight a couple of years ago.

Pastusek was reportedly the leader-in-charge of that air raid over Libya, the one that just almost did

the world a favor and knocked off the loudmouth Khadafi.

Mitchell credits that information to Royce Kimberlain, who told the story at a class reunion last summer.

after graduating IPHS. He spent eight years in the Corps, and would have remained until retirement.

Having reached the rank of staff sergeant, John was up for reinstatement. He decided he'd check out his next assignment, should he sign on the dotted line.

When told it would be shipped to Beirut, Lebanon, he asked his superior if it were necessary. John had been 15 months away from his family at that point.

Unable to get the assignment changed, he gave up on reinstatement, and took his discharge.

Within weeks, he learned the sad news. His outfit was in the barracks that was bombed, killing most of his outfit.

# Worth Quoting

There is not a church in Perryton that does not have the problem of raising enough money to meet its budget. Every church needs the financial support of its members in order to carry out the programs of the church and it seems that there is always more demand for funds than money to pay for everything. What if your church were to be spared the need of raising money? Would your church then be better off or worse off than it is today?

In the Scandinavian countries, as well as West Germany and other European countries, there is a "church tax" which is paid by workers out of paychecks and given to the church. In Sweden, Finland and Denmark they have this system

and the Lutheran church is the main recipient of the church tax. We asked people in these countries how they like this arrangement and they like it fine. The church tax is entirely voluntary and does not amount to much, only about one half of one percent of your salary. If you do not wish to have this amount deducted you file a statement declaring that you are an atheist and do not believe in God and do not wish to support any church. The vast majority of people in these countries don't want to file such a statement and declare themselves church members and financial supporters.

Yet we were told in each Scandinavian country that while more than 95 percent of the people belong to church, less than three percent attend church services. The churches are generally old and beautiful and well maintained, but obviously empty. There is no sense of personal religion and no church fellowship as we in this country know it. Of course, the United States was founded by those who wanted religious freedom and relief from the state Church of England. We have many denominations in this country and freedom of religion is a right cherished perhaps more than any other.

But it is obvious why our churches are better attended and better supported. If you don't put something into it, you don't get much out of it, and that applies to church perhaps more than anything else. Those church members who band together in a common effort to keep their church going, who give to its programs, who take part in its activities, are the ones who benefit from church membership. Those who are merely a name on the church roll and who use the church only for rare occasions such as marriage or funerals don't get much out of it.

This figure of less than three percent of church members actually attend church sounds absurdly low. But we might be surprised to take a poll in Perryton and see just how many of those listed on a church roll attend church each Sunday. We might find that our figures are not too far removed from those in Scandinavia or other European countries. We suspect that church membership and church attendance is not something held in high esteem. People do not oppose the church, they merely ignore it. That is the challenge of the church whose members take seriously the Biblical command to take the Word to all nations.

It can be argued that those who go to church regularly and give to it regularly are no better than those who stay completely out of it. Who is to say which individual has higher moral character, the church goer or the non-goer? Some individuals maintain that they can commune with God better on the bank of a pond fishing than in church, and maybe they can. But there are millions to whom church membership and regular church attendance and worship means something in their lives. And when you get right down to it -- would America be better off or worse off if the churches were to become as dead as those in Europe?

The former saying helped shape this country into the great nation it is today. However, the later saying expressed more today is going to lead to the financial downfall of this country if it is not changed.

As soon as the announcement was made, the Chamber of Commerce and the Mayor of Abilene began crying about the detrimental economic impact that the changes would have on Abilene. We can see the negative impact that the Air Force's move will have on Abilene, but we can also see the negative impact that the budget deficit has on this entire country.

President-elect George Bush will become President Bush Friday and after reciting the oath of office, he will inherit the largest budget deficit in this nation's history. He will have to face tough decisions in making budget cuts and tax changes. However, it is not the President's sole responsibility to make these changes. The responsibility lies with the members of Congress and every citizen of this country.

We will never get the deficit under control as long as we continue to want unlimited funding for all the programs that have an impact on us.

## Pressure picking up on workers comp bill

Rep. Charles Finnell says he hopes lawmakers will resist special-interest pressures in the special session that began Tuesday, and produce legislation that makes reasonable changes in the state's beleaguered workers compensation system.

And based on the amount of news releases and suggested editorials received during the past 10 days at the office of the Iowa Park Leader, the Holliday resident and other members of the state legislature must be feeling considerable heat.

Gov. Bill Clements called the special session for the expressed purpose of finishing work on legislation concerning workers compensation, because, as members of the house and senate said, "time just ran out."

The 71st regular session expired at midnight on May 29.

"It's unfortunate that time ran out because that means new workers comp bills will be filed in the House and Senate," Finnell said. "The hearings and negotiations will have to start all over again."

Finnell said reform legislation must give Texas small employers a break from soaring insurance rates and provide decent payments to Texas workers, who receive below-average benefits.

He said workplace safety also must improve in Texas, which has the nation's highest industrial accident and death rates.

"We have to protect workers and relieve small business of these back-breaking premiums," he said.

Small businesses, however, are not the only ones complaining about high workers comp premiums. Large employers have said over the past few months they might be forced to move to other states, because of the high cost of such insurance.

Finnell said special interest groups must be flexible on workers comp because the legislation that ultimately passes probably will not satisfy any one group completely.

## News Briefs

### Help solicited to solve theft

Elaine Wells is hoping someone saw a vehicle at her home sometime between 12-noon and 3 p.m. Saturday, and can recall its description.

The Bud Wells home, just west of FM 369 on FM 367, was broken into during that time frame, and a

portable television set, VCR and all her jewelry stolen.

The intruder kicked in the front door to gain entry.

Mrs. Wells asks that anyone who might have seen a vehicle parked at the home that day call either her or the county sheriff's office.

### Franchise taxes to city, school

The city of Iowa Park and the school district have been sent checks totaling \$19,673.40, collected by the state comptroller's office in bank franchise taxes.

The city's check was \$10,021.29 and the school's \$9,652.11, according to a release from the state comptroller's office.

The allocation represents franchise taxes paid by banks that do bus-

iness in Texas. Banks must file a report with the comptroller's office by March 15 each year.

The bank franchise tax rate is the same as the state's corporate franchise tax rate -- \$6.70 per \$1,000 of taxable capital and surplus, with a minimum tax of \$150.

The state legislature authorized the tax in 1984, and it was first collected in 1985.

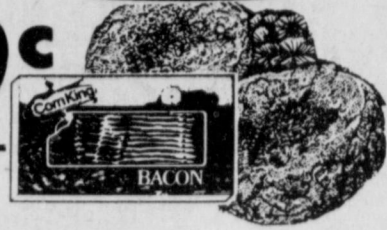

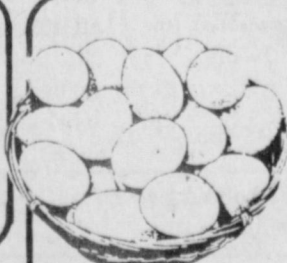

She described his work in Portland, which is enabling him to live a productive life as he is reaching young people, ministering to the

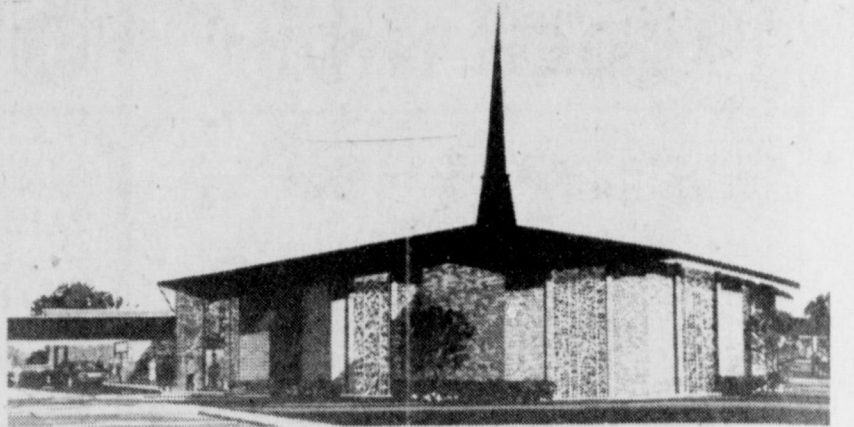
down and out, witnessing in the streets, planting and starting new churches.

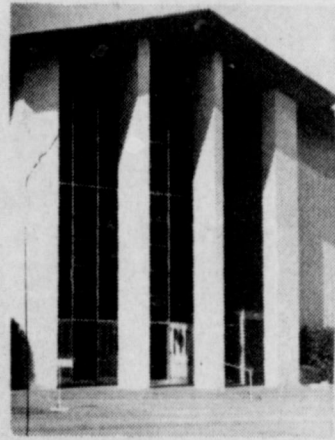

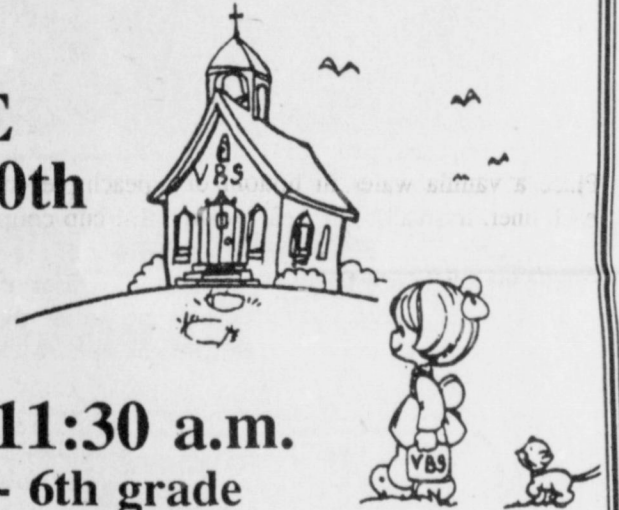

**THAT FIRST PUNCH**

One time heavyweight champion, Jack Dempsey once said, "I was always scared before a fight, but when I threw my first punch, I knew I was in business." ### MINIATURE CHEESECAKES

24 cupcake liners  
24 vanilla wafers  
2 pkgs. (8 oz. each) cream cheese, softened  
3/4 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1 Tbsp. lemon juice  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 can peach, blueberry or sweet cherry filling  
1/2 cup sliced nuts (optional)

Line cupcake pan with liners. Place a vanilla wafer in bottom of each liner. In small bowl, beat cream cheese, sugar, eggs, lemon juice and vanilla until light and fluffy.

Fill each liner 2/3 full with cheese mixture. Bake in preheated 375 degree oven 15 to 20 minutes or until set. Top each with a spoonful of filling and nuts. Chill. Makes 24

### SQUASH CASSEROLE

4 cups summer squash  
1 med. onion, sliced and separated  
3 tomatoes, peeled and sliced (1 used canned)  
1 green pepper, sliced  
2 Tbsp. butter

Salt and pepper to taste  
1 cup cracker crumbs, crushed  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Alternate layers of vegetables in casserole dish. Season and sprinkle with cracker crumbs. Bake uncovered 45 minutes. Uncover and brown the top.

### CHOCOLATE OATMEAL COOKIES

1 stick butter  
1/2 cup milk  
2 cups sugar  
1/4 cup cocoa  
Bring to a boil and cook one minutes. Remove from heat and add: 1/2 cup peanut butter  
1 tsp. vanilla  
3 cups instant oats  
1/2 cup nuts  
Stir together and drop on wax paper.

### CHOOSE A FRUIT TWIST

3-4 oz. pkgs. refrigerated crescent rolls  
1-3 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened  
1/3 cup raspberry, cherry, apricot or peach preserves  
1/4 cup chopped almonds, pecans or walnuts.

Unroll crescent roll dough, seal perforations to form 2 rectangles from each package. Pat each into an 8X4-inch rectangle.

Spread cream cheese on rectangles, top with preserves and chopped nuts. Cut each rectangle into four eight-inch strips (24 strips total).

Fold each strip in half crosswise and twist. Transfer twists to a lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in 375 degree oven for 8 to 10 minutes or until golden brown. Cool and store in airtight container.

### BAKED PORK AND BEANS

4 slices bacon  
16 oz. can pork and beans  
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/4 tsp. garlic salt  
1/4 cup catsup  
1/2 tsp. dry mustard

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In medium skillet, fry bacon until crisp. Reserve 2 Tbsp. drippings.

Combine drippings and remaining ingredients in one quart casserole dish. Sprinkle with crumbled bacon. Bake uncovered 25 to 30 minutes.

Wes Ward of Iowa Park was one of five Midwestern State Univ. mass communications students awarded \$1,000 scholarships recently.

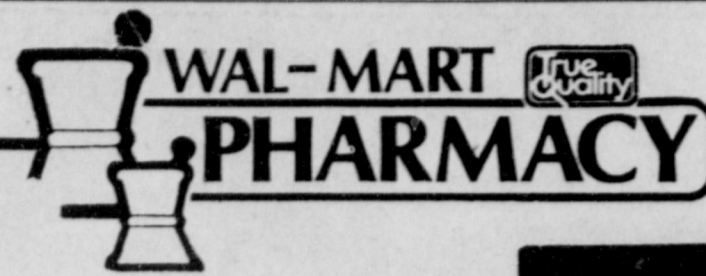
Ward is a sophomore public relations minor.

## COMMONLY USED MEDICAL TERMS USED BY YOUR DOCTOR THAT PERTAIN TO YOUR HEART...

**BLOOD PRESSURE** - The force exerted by blood as it flows through the blood vessels

**SYSTOLIC PRESSURE** - The higher of the two numbers in a blood pressure reading. Refers to the pressure while the heart is pumping blood, or contracting.

**DIASTOLIC PRESSURE** - The lower of the two numbers in a blood pressure reading. Measured when the heart is relaxing.

**HEART MURMUR** - Noise coming from the heart, usually caused when heart valve doesn't close properly or doesn't open completely. A murmur can be normal.

**ANGINA PECTORIS** - Pain in the chest caused when the heart is not receiving enough oxygen, due to blockage or narrowing of blood vessels.

**CORONARY BYPASS SURGERY** - Stitching large blood vessel taken from the patient's leg, onto heart muscle, thus bypassing narrowed vessel supplying the heart.

**MYOCARDIAL INFARCTION** - Heart attack caused when the heart's blood vessels become narrowed and blocked and cut off blood supply to part of the heart muscle, destroying it.

**ARTERIOSCLEROSIS** - Hardening of the arteries, marked by a thickening and loss of elasticity.

**BETA BLOCKERS** - Drugs used to reduce or alleviate abnormal heart rhythms or angina and to control high blood pressure.

**CARDIAC ARREST** - Condition in which the heart stops beating completely or contracts irregularly and doesn't pump blood.

**FIBRILLATION** - Ineffective, rapid heart contractions.

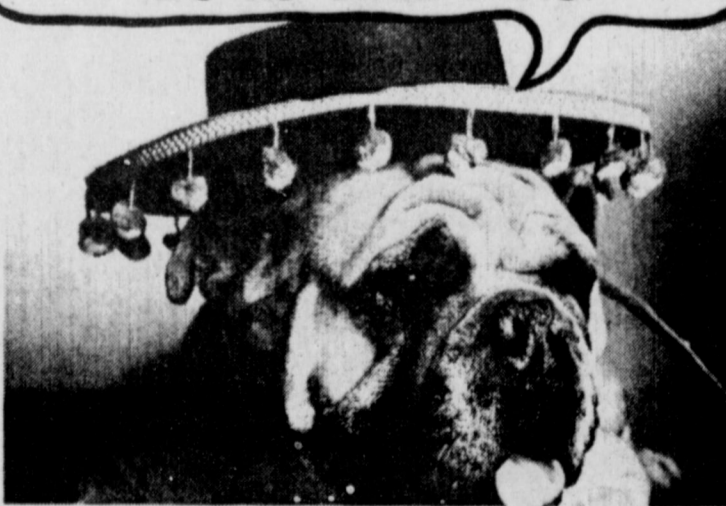

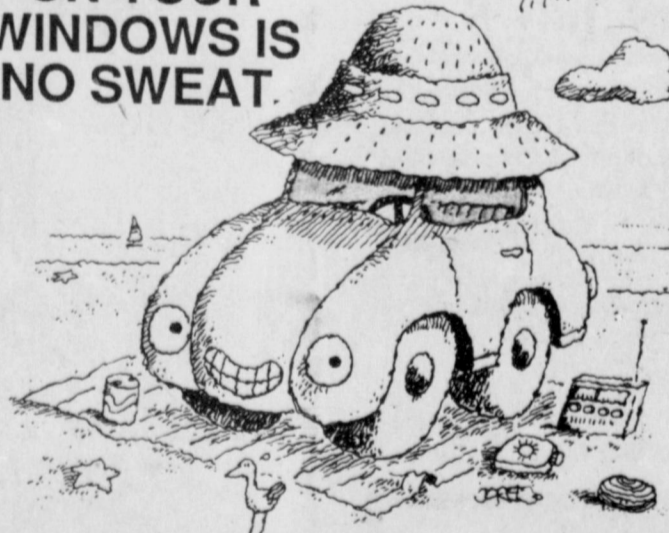

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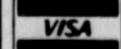

A public appearance has been granted Bud Thompson, former chief and city alderman, who will ask for

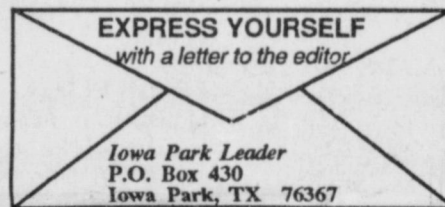
reconsideration.
