The 33 members of the department could join or reject the system. in all activities of the Department with near $100 \%$, be 55 years of age, minimum of 20 years activity and pay $\$ 5.00$ per year. At that time $\$ 5.00$ was imporwas $\$ 90.00$ to $\$ 1200$ sary then and not too many participated. We all worked to help maintain the department and cost the city very
little but I am told that the cost to the city is now around $\$ 48,000$ per
The Department was organized 1924 when the city hall was built. I joined the department in Oct.
1927 and retired Dec. 7, 1971, a total of 44 years, 2 months and 17 days
and for a time I received $\$ 12.00$ to $\$ 18.00$ of the $\$ 25.00$ I was supposed

Now, as to the action and comments at last weeks council meeting: First, we are referred to as the
earlier retirees. earlier retirees.
It was stated that we had a choice as to whether we would continue in
the old system or join in whereby we would receive $\$ 75.00$ per month for 18 years or $\$ 76.00$ for 19 years.

ters. Yet we were told in each Scandinavian country that while more than 95 percent of the people belong to church, less than three percent attend church services. The churches are gen erally old and beautiful and well main tained, but obviously empty. There is no sense of personal religion and no church fellowship as we in this
country know it. Of course, the United States was founded by those who wanted religious freedom and relief from the state Church of England. We have many denominations in this country and freedom of religion is right cherished perhaps more than
any other.
But it is obvious why our churches are better attended and better sup ported. If you don't put something ported. If you don't you don't get much out of it and that applies to church perhaps more than anything else. Those church members who band together in a common effort to keep their church going, who give to its programs, who take part in its activities
are the ones who benefit from churct are the ones who benefit from chur membership. Those who are merely
name on the church roll and who us the church only for rare occasions such as marriage or funerals don't get much out of it.
This figure o

This figure of less than three per cent of church members actually a tend church sounds absurdly low. But we might be surprised to take a pol

those listed on a church roll atten church each Sunday. We might find that our figures are not too far removed from those in Scandinavia or other European countries. We suspect that
church membership and church attenchurch membership and church atten-

members take seriously the Biblical members take seriously the Biblical
command to take the Word to all nations.
It can be argued that those who go to church regularly and give to it regularly are no better than those
who stay completely out of it. Who who stay completely out of it. Who
is to say which individual has higher is to say which individual has higher
moral character, the church goer or moral character, the non-goer? Some individuals maintain that they can commune with
God better on the bank of a pond fishing than in church, and maybe they ing than in church, and maybe they
can. But there are millions to whom church membership and regular church attendance and worship means something in their lives. And when you get right down to it -- would
America be better off or worse off if the churches were to become as dead as those in Europe?
