# Trustees seek to build 17 new classrooms

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday evening ended an exhaustive study of needs required to educate the growing enrollment of the district, and selected a course of action that will lead to a \$2.75-million bond election.

The study, which has extended over several months, has consumed the time and energies not only of board members, but administrators, faculty, architect and a paid consultant.

"It's time that we present one (of

the seven proposals studied) to the public," commended board chairman Jerry Reed.

Adopting a theme of "An Investment in the Future," study of the needs was commenced in January when a district-wide improvement

committee was appointed to develop goal areas for development.

"The committee studied all areas of the school system and submitted three goal areas," Supt. Glen Mitchell stated. "These areas were facilities, student performance and curriculum. The school board adopted these goal areas at the November 1988 board meeting.

"During January, February and March of 1989 the district-wide committee met again and developed the objectives and activities.

Reports Six and Seven, requested at the last meeting of the board, included proposals for \$2,750,021 and \$2,496,302. Report Five, studied by trustees at the last meeting, was for \$3,317,178.

Tuesday's decision was reached by compromise, with trustees almost evenly divided on the three amounts.

While there was a leaning of the more conservative members toward the lowest amount, the final decision was based on the need to build the

classrooms that will be required over the next five years, 17.

Projected costs included in Report Six includes: \$661,000 high school; \$187,492 high school remodeling; \$142,000 field house; \$737,000 junior high; \$304,000 Bradford; \$419,000 Kidwell; \$96,000 bus barn and maintenance building; \$25,464 contingency and miscellaneous, and \$178,254 architect and engineer fee.

Eliminated from early consideration were the show barn, energy management system, expansion of the administration building and closure of windows at the two elementary buildings.

Meetings will now be held with small groups of "key communicators," to explain the projects and seek their support to spread the word throughout the community.

Trustees are expected to officially call the election in September, to be held in November.

Projects which had been included in various reports but not in the final

plan should be kept on hold for the future, Reed said.

Explaining her reason for wanting all the proposals in Report Five, Trustee Sheri Kennedy said, "I want more for my children than I had, and my children are going to the same junior high and high school as I did, which are no better than they were when I was there. I can live with less than \$3-million, but rather not."

She emphasized, however, that she would work equally as hard for the passage of the adopted project, and was joined by Denny McCarthy in pledging support.

Trustee Don Decker had said he would have liked the lesser costing plan, but agreed with the others that all the classrooms proposed are needed.

The next meeting of the board will be Aug. 8, when they will not only accept bids for supplies during the 1989-90 school year, but take their first close look at the new budget.

### Man attempts suicide

An Iowa Park man survived an apparent suicide attempt here Thursday afternoon, according to the police blotter.

Police were called to 300 E. Emerald at 5:51 p.m. where a 55-year-old man had apparently shot himself in the left, upper chest with a .25 caliber automatic pistol.

He was transported to Bethania Hospital.

Officers continue investigations into four thefts reported during the past week.

A woman told police Friday she had five \$20 bills taken from her purse while visiting that afternoon at Heritage Manor.

A man told police that same day he had paid another man who lives in the 500 block of N. Second \$55 for a pair of boots, but the recipient refused to provide the boots.

A customer called police at 6:37 p.m. Sunday from the service station at Pacific and US 287 after he found the door unlocked and no one in attendance.

Owner Gene Pollard told police he had hired a man to work there who apparently left the building unlocked.

Approximately \$15 in change was alleged to be missing from the cash drawer.

Someone apparently went to a lot of trouble for virtually nothing during the early morning hours Tuesday.

A large window on the southwest corner of Golden Fried Chicken was broken out. The thief apparently rushed through the building, and grabbed five bank bags before exiting

through the back door, which he left standing open.

There was no money in any of the bags, police said.

Three cases of criminal mischief and one of criminal trespass were reported during the week to police, and two of those cases concerned swimming pools.

Two male juveniles were reported in a swimming pool of a vacant house in the 1100 block of Cornelia Friday afternoon. Police identified the youths and released them with a warning.

An above-ground pool at a home

in the 1100 block of Louisa was reportedly torn down while the owner was away. A friend of the occupant discovered the demolished pool Wednesday.

Someone reportedly threw a flower pot through a plate glass window at Wal-Mart sometime Sunday night, and shattered another pot in the parking lot. The damage was discovered by an officer at 3:20 a.m. Monday.

The front window of a home in the 1300 block of Sunset was said to have been shattered by someone Tuesday.

### Proposed plant concerns citizens

At least four property owners of land northeast of Iowa Park have expressed concern over a proposed site for a metal reclamation furnace.

Public notice was published in Friday's and Saturday's Wichita Falls newspapers concerning an application filed by a firm listed as LVP Co.

The plant, according to the notice, would be located one-half mile east of Bell Road on Rogers Road, which is just north of US 287 between Bell and Peterson.

One resident of the area said he would file a letter of concern with the Texas Air Control Board offices in Abilene and Austin.

The resident said others who own property in the area have indicated they also would protest.

The plant's furnace will emit "Nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide and particular dust," according to the published notice.

"A copy of all materials submitted by the applicant is available for public inspection at the Texas Air Control Board Abilene Regional Office at 1290 South Willis Street, Suite 205, Abilene, Texas 79605, telephone (915) 698-9674, and at the Texas Air Control Board, 6330 Highway 290 East, Austin, Texas 78733," the notice stated.

## Engagement announced

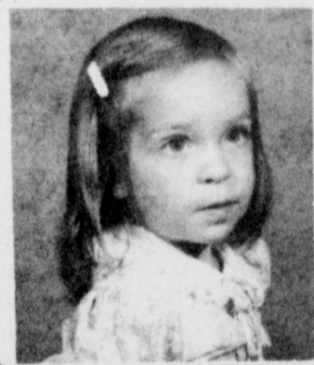

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**How to Avoid Drug Interactions**

In some instances, when a patient takes two or more medications, one medication may affect the other. This is known as a drug-drug interaction. Interactions between drugs and food, caffeinated beverages and alcohol also occur.

The possible ineffectiveness of birth-control pills are a source of concern for females. But there is also concern that another medication will reduce "the pill's" effectiveness and result in pregnancy. Medications most prone to interact with "the pill" are antibiotics, analgesics and medications for tuberculosis, epilepsy and depression. Additional possible interacting medications include ulcer medicine, diuretics, vitamin C and thyroid hormones.

Alcoholic beverages can act in several ways with medications. If alcohol is taken with other medications that cause drowsiness, such as tranquilizers, barbiturates, pain medication or antihistamines, their effect will be enhanced. Therefore, you should take precautions while driving or operating machinery and equipment that require mental alertness and judgment. Alcohol can also interfere with blood sugar and cause problems for the diabetic. The medication for diabetes may interfere with the ability of the body to eliminate the alcohol, and unpleasant symptoms such as flushing, headache, heart problems and nausea and vomiting may occur.

Women who smoke and take birth-control pills are at greater risk of stroke, heart attack, and other heart-related problems. The danger increases with age (over 35) and with frequent cigarette use (more than 15 cigarettes daily). Cigarette smoking increases the risk of stomach ulcer disease, working against many of the medications the ulcer patient takes. It also interferes with the effect of insulin in the insulin-using diabetic. Smoking increase the body's need for Vitamin C. It also changes the rate at which the body uses some prescription medications and doses double that of nonsmokers may be required.

Caffeine found in coffee and tea may also affect the action of medications in your body. Aspirin or other nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medications often used for arthritis may interact with caffeine to either cause or increase stomach-related problems. When taken at the same time as iron supplements, caffeine reduces the amount of iron that the body will be able to use. Tea has the ability to bind with dietary iron as well as iron in vitamins. Individuals using it may suffer iron-deficiency anemia. Caffeine also affects such medications as antidepressants and tranquilizers.

**Food-Drug Interactions**

Food may interfere with medication or the medication may interfere with the food. Food and drink usually slow the body's absorption of medicine. For instance, calcium from dairy products will cause tetracycline antibiotics to be less effective. Foods can also cause medicines to break down before they should; this might happen if you drink acidic fruit juices or cola drinks with your medication.

Medicines can also interfere with vital nutrients. Diuretics (water pills) are often used for heart problems. They may cause a loss of the vital element potassium. Your physician may prescribe a supplement with potassium, or your pharmacist may suggest that you increase your intake of potassium-rich foods such as tomatoes, oranges and bananas.

Vitamins are a particular concern. Birth control pills lower the body's stores of some vitamins, although in healthy women with adequate diets it may not be of concern. Mineral oil, sometimes used as a laxative, can interfere with the body's ability to absorb vitamins, A, D, E and K. Patients taking anticoagulants (blood thinners) should be especially careful of their daily Vitamin K intake because it can interfere with the effect of the anticoagulant.

**Non-prescription Drugs**

When a new medication is prescribed for you, it is essential that the physician be made aware of the over-the-counter medications you take. Vitamin C affects the acidity of the urine and can affect the body's ability to eliminate some medications. Use of antacids, aspirin, laxatives and other non-prescription medications is so common that many people do not consider them to be medications. However, they may interfere with other medications in a variety of ways. To help prevent interactions, you should choose a pharmacy and patronize it regularly.

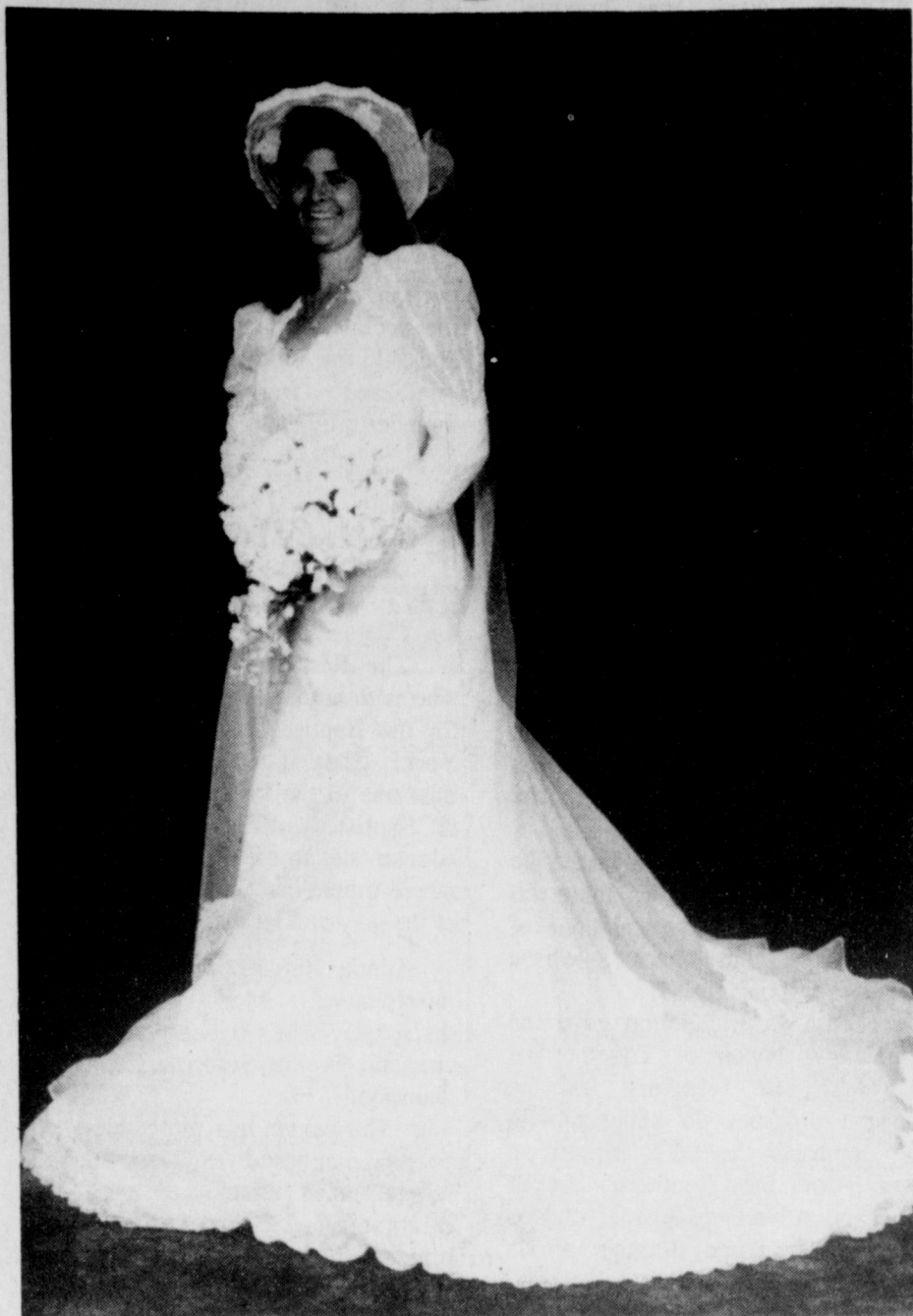

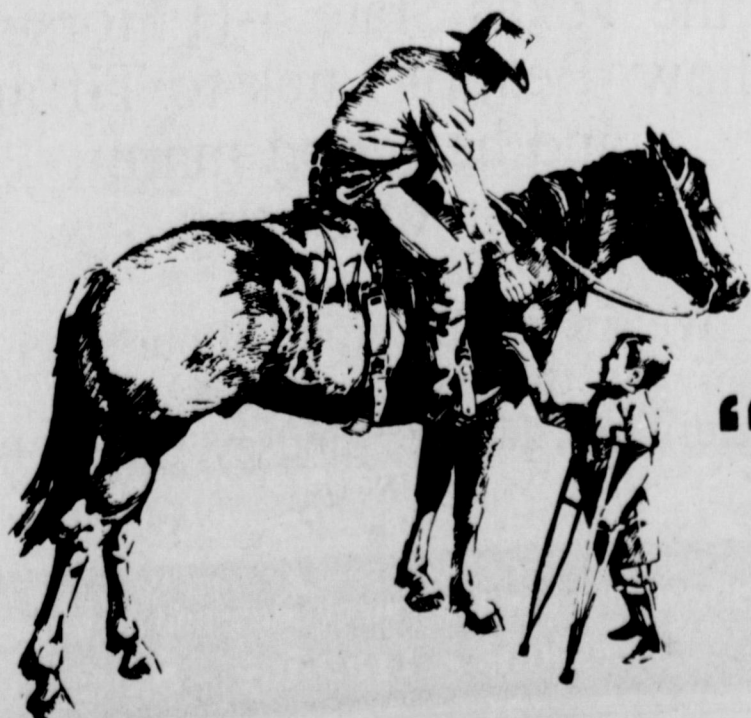

# As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



Iowa Parkans have always been great about helping someone in need or a project in trouble.

And right now, there's an old, necessary, loyal and beneficial organization that is in trouble.

I'm speaking about the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

Folks, the organization is broke.

The pity is, there are at least 40 businesses, small, medium and large, in this community that are not dues-paying members. And there are even more individuals who don't belong.

I suppose the Chamber is just something we all take for granted. It's the first expense we might tend to cut, as far as dues are concerned, when times get a little tough.

And, I understand, there are some who not only couldn't care less about the Chamber, but are outright ugly about it when the name is brought up.

I say the Chamber might be taken for granted, because there are some who say they don't know why there is even a Chamber of Commerce.

Let me refresh your memories.

The Chamber has saved every property owner in Iowa Park and the Iowa Park school district money. Big money!

A wing of the Chamber is the Industrial Development Corporation. Every member of the IDC board is a member of the Chamber. That's in the IDC's charter.

What has the IDC done for us?

Well, it was the driving force that brought Cryovac to Iowa Park. The firm not only provided hundreds of jobs here, it has provided, and continues to provide, tax money for the school system, and also contributes to the city causers even though it is not inside the city limits.

I don't know exactly what portion of the school's revenue Cryovac pays, but I'm informed the firm's increased taxes for this year alone represents over one cent of the school's 81 cent tax rate.

The increase this year alone is right at \$3,000 in new taxes for the school.

What does this mean to you, the taxpayers? It means your taxes, both school and city, would be considerably higher, if this plant the Chamber recruited, were not here.

The IDC was also the force that made it possible for Wal-Mart to open its doors in Iowa Park. Land on which Wal-Mart is located belonged to the IDC.

While some independent merchants are not too happy with the big chain store being here, one must admit Wal-Mart generates not only a lot of ad valorem taxes, but sales taxes as well.

And sales taxes are what's used to pay for for all the city's street projects.

Let's look at other benefits Iowa Park derives from our Chamber.

The organization was the first to suggest, and received the wholehearted co-sponsorship, of the annual Clean-Up Week project. And that's been going on almost two decades.

If you don't think that is a benefit to Iowa Park, I encourage you to remember what the roadways and parks look like the week before all the trash is picked up.

And it's done with no tax money.

Then, the Chamber each year holds its annual banquet, at which worthy persons are recognized for their unselfish contributions in four different categories to others and the community.

Additionally, the annual banquet is recognized as the community's social event of the year.

And then there's the annual Whoop-T-Do, which is Chamber-sponsored and coordinated.

Every community wants and needs an annual event at which its citizens can get together and enjoy themselves.

But there was a void left in Iowa Park following the burning and closure of the old annual Texas-Oklahoma Fair. The Whoop-T-Do filled that void.

Worth mentioning, also, is the fact that the Whoop-T-Do provides an event at which every non-profit organization in our community can have a major fund-raising project.

Coordinating a Whoop-T-Do is no small task. Ask anyone who has ever served as its chairman.

The Chamber provides a meeting place for organizations and functions which might need its meeting room.

In fact, it was space in the old Chamber office that was provided by the organization where Iowa Park's library was first begun.

The Chamber's secretaries over the years have been kept busy responding to inquiries from people in other communities and states, about our town.

One of the first steps for many of our new residents is the Chamber office, by persons wanting to learn about their new home town and what it has to offer.

The Chamber needs your membership, either as a business or an individual. Annual dues are \$120 and \$25, respectively.

Dues are the organization's primary source of revenue which is needed to keep the doors open.

I encourage you to join. The Chamber needs you, possibly even more than you might think you need it.

The Chamber has earned its place, is earning its place, and will continue to earn its place... with your help.

It is located three miles south of Electra in a 77-acre lease in the Seale and Morris Survey, A-393. Location is 150 feet from the north line and 2,150 feet from the west line of the survey. The original operator was W.A. Lofton and the well was known as the No. 1-VV W.T. Waggoner Est. The operation was completed as an oil producer in 1958, with bottom-hole at 1,984 feet.

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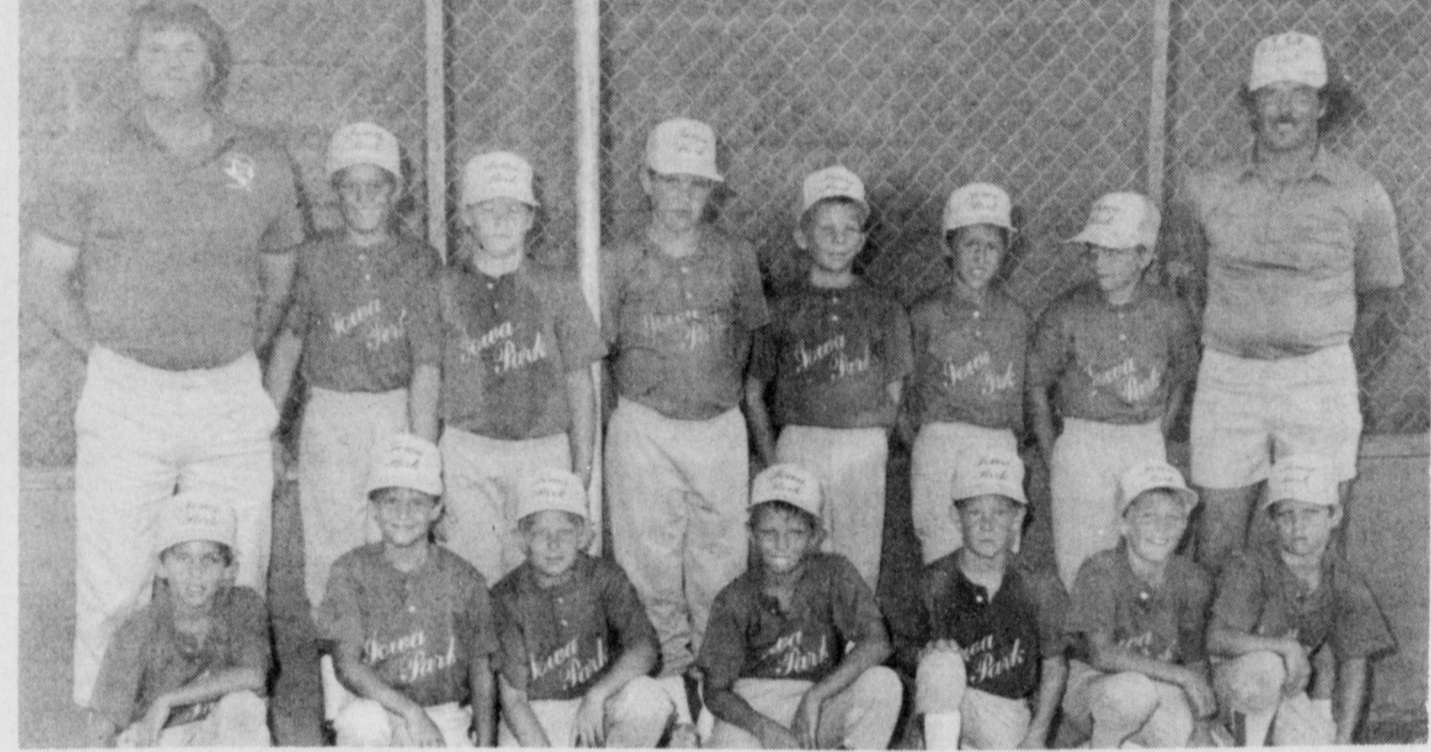

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### NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

1. Notice is hereby given that Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas, 754 Vella Road, Palm Springs, California 92264 has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period and by the method summarized hereinbelow. Similar weather modification operations have been conducted in the area specified below under Texas permits on several occasions in the past, most recently in 1986.  
2. Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas has a valid Texas weather modification license that was issued in May 1972 and renewed each year to the present (current License Number 89-3).  
3. The purpose of this weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect and benefit rangeland and agricultural interests of the client. The period of the permit is for four years with the first year from about August 1, 1989 until about December 31, 1989, and with continuation of the program during periods beginning about March 1 of 1990, 1991 and 1992.  
4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of Comanche County Weather Modification Association, Inc. (c/o Security Bank and Trust, P. O. Box 489, Lawton, Oklahoma 73502).  
5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area of Comanche County, Oklahoma. The operational area is that area described as the Texas counties of Hardeman, Wilbarger and Wichita, as well as the Oklahoma counties of Caddo, Comanche, Cotton, Grady, Jackson, Jefferson, Kiowa, Stephens and Tillman.  
6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area described as Comanche County, Oklahoma.  
7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: a licensed cloud seeding meteorologist/technologist will use standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and plume dispersion models to initiate the release of the seeding particles (silver iodide crystals) from a network of ground based generators at a time calculated to affect the formation of cumulonimbus clouds.

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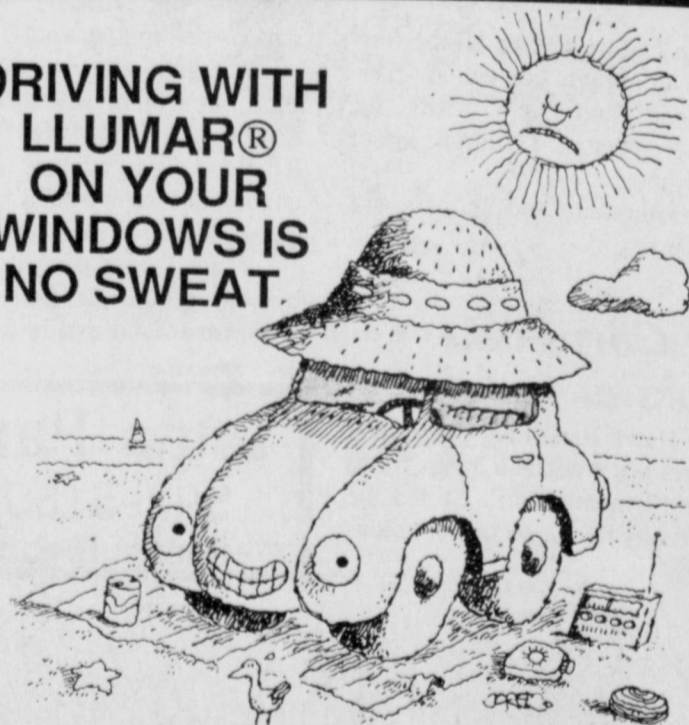

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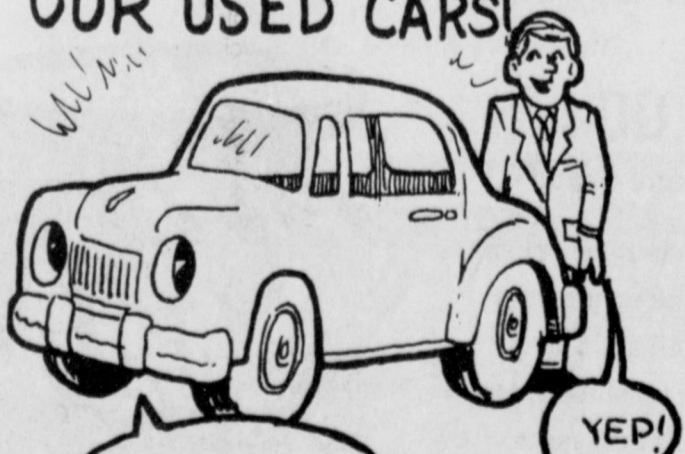
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### Football camp starts Monday

2 pkgs. strawberry Jello  
2 cups boiling water  
2 small cans crushed pineapple  
1 small pkg. frozen strawberries  
2 mashed bananas  
2 cups pecans  
1-8 oz. carton sour cream

Pour 1/2 mixture in Pyrex pan and let set. Spread sour cream over first layer. Pour balance of mixture and put in refrigerator to set.

### STRAWBERRY BREAD

2-10 oz. pkgs. frozen strawberries  
4 eggs  
1 1/4 cup oil  
3 cups flour  
2 cups sugar  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. soda  
3 tsp. soda  
3 tsp. cinnamon  
1 1/4 cup chopped pecans

Mix together undrained strawberries, eggs, and oil. Mix dry ingredients into strawberry mixture, saving 1/2 cup flour. Stir nuts into reserved flour and add to mixture. Bake one hour at 350 degrees in two loaf pans.

### CHICKEN BREASTS

4 chicken breasts  
1 stick margarine  
1 to 4 cloves garlic, minced  
1 onion, chopped  
1 can cream of celery soup  
1/2 cup water  
1 cup chopped mushrooms, drained  
1 bell pepper, sliced  
Paprika

Melt margarine in skillet. Rub chicken with garlic, salt and pepper. Dredge with flour. Let chicken brown and remove from skillet. Combine soup, onions, mushrooms, green pepper and water in bowl. Stir sauce over chicken in clean skillet. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Cover and simmer 45 minutes. Good with rice. Makes four servings.
