Police finish job begun last month

Iowa Park police are returning to a house in Wichita Falls to finish a job they started three weeks earlier.

Warrants for the arrest of three Sosebee brothers (Danny Ray, 38; Cletus Troy, 46, and Carroll Louis, 40) were sought yesterday, charging the trio with aggravated possession of a controlled substance, a second degree felony.

Officers, with the assistance of two Wichita Falls police, used a search warrant July 11 at 721 Powell, but came away with only a large jar of an unknown green liquid.

Results were received from the Department of Public Safety laboratory in Dallas yesterday morning.

Analysis of the liquid determined the jar contained 104 grams of amphetamine, which has an estimated street value of \$100 per gram.

Actually, the jar of liquid wasn't the only find during last month's search. Officers also found Billy Don Mills, 38, who had been sought on charges filed by another agency. He had been wanted for aggravated possession of a controlled substance.

When the term "aggravated" is included in such a charge, that means the possession is with the intent to sell the substance.

Police made a drug-related arrest in the 900 block of West Highway shortly after midnight Friday.

Stopped on a traffic violation, David Anthony Ferguson, 18, of Wichita Falls was issued a citation when officers found four drug-related items in the vehicle.

Found and confiscated were two pipes and two "bongs," generally used while abusing drugs.

Three women and three men were arrested during the past week, according to the police blotter.

The first woman arrested was Nina Kay Ledbetter, 45, who had been sought on a local charge of cruelty to animals.

She was taken into custody at 3:41 p.m. Wednesday of last week at 124 W. Garden, where the offense is alleged to have occurred. She was transported to county jail.

At 3:54 p.m. Thursday, police took two males into custody in the 400 block of West Jefferson, after a neighbor reported seeing them loading items into a pickup.

Mark Alfred Vickers, 33, was found to have an outstanding warrant against him, issued by the DPS, for speeding and failure to appear. He was released after posting a bond for \$154.

A male juvenile taken into custody with Vickers was released to his parents.

Police arrested John G. Edington in the 700 block of Johnson Road at 12:37 a.m. Sunday on a charge of military desertion. He was turned over to the county jail, according to the blotter.

Investigating an apparent accident at the corner of Cash and Victoria at 6:20 a.m. Sunday, officers found a woman behind the wheel and apparently unconscious.

The woman, Gena Marie Shoulders, 31, was aroused and identified. She was wanted on a local warrant, but did not want to go with the officer.

She was charged with resisting arrest and at 12:29 p.m. transported to county jail, according to the blotter entry.

The other arrest was at 2:54 a.m. Monday in the 300 block of West Bank, when Susan Dianne Case, 27, was taken into custody on a local traffic warrant.

She was later released after signing a personal recognisance bond.

Police are stepping up their investigation into juvenile problems in a neighborhood in the west part of the city.

A resident in the 700 block of

Mockingbird called police at 9:59 a.m. Monday after finding the right front tire of a vehicle slashed.

Then, Tuesday evening, a resident told police a young boy, about eight or 10 years old, had offered to sell him a "radio" he said he had found at an apartment.

The radio, it turned out, was a vehicle stereo unit.

The boy, described as having a shaved head, was reported to have ridden away from the 700 block of Park Plaza on a red bicycle before police arrived.

Chief Alan Sheffield last week issued a warning to residents living in the area of Mockingbird, Bluejay, Park Plaza and Edgemoor that several juveniles were causing problems, and owners should secure their properties.

A resident in the 700 block of S. Victoria notified police Sunday of having returned home and finding a door kicked in, and several items taken.

Student dies in wreck

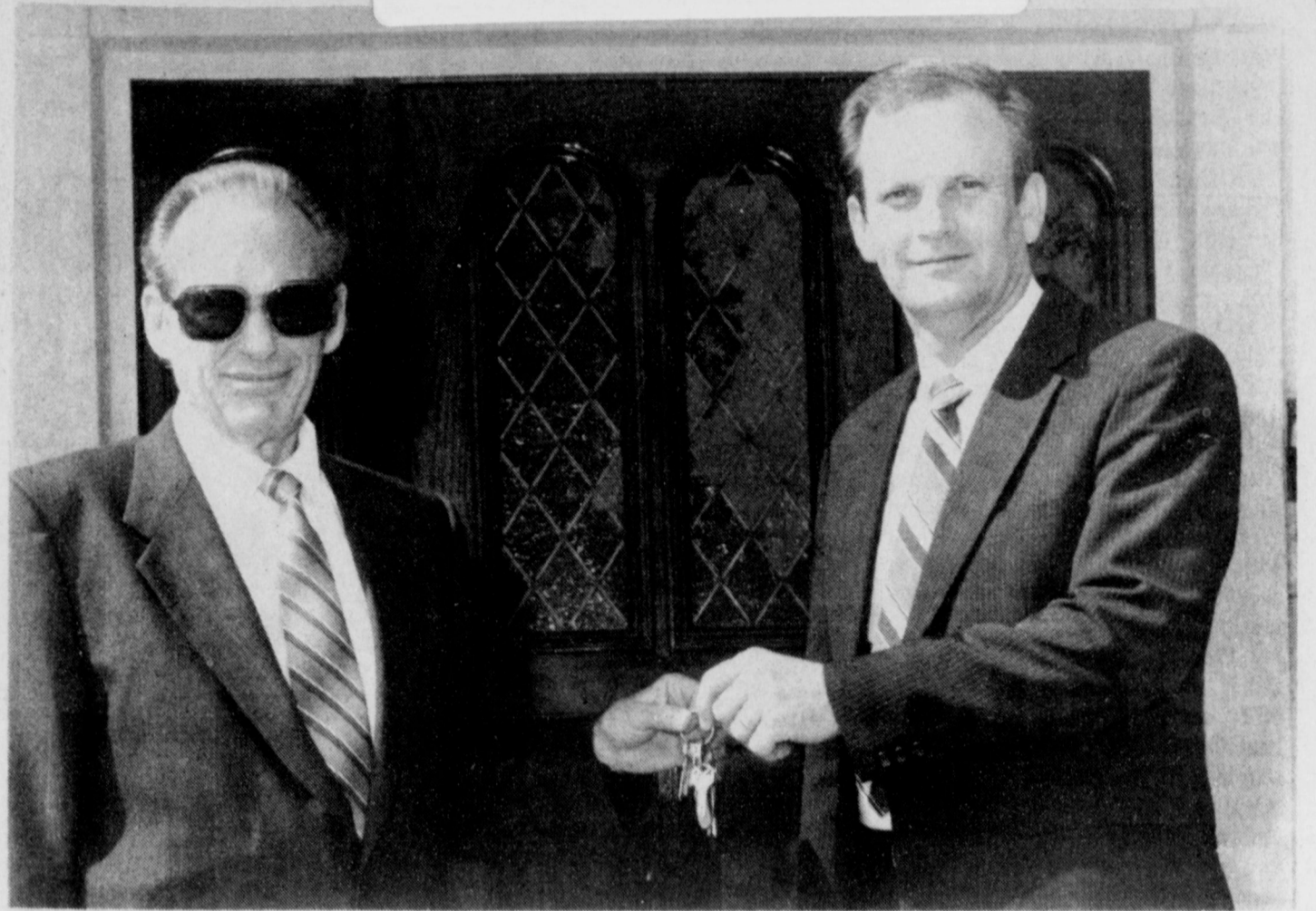
A one-vehicle accident early Sunday evening in the south part of Wichita Falls took the life of one local girl and injured two others.

Sheila J. Stewart, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Stewart, who live between Kamay and Valley View, died as result of injuries sustained in the accident.

Injured were Susan Michelle Howell, 18, of Valley View, and Tina Rene Abila, also 18, of 1007 Louisiana.

Miss Howell was driving a 1983 Mustang, which she acquired shortly before graduation from Iowa Park High School, in May.

Oldest business sold; 4th owner in 81 years

Larry Dutton has become the fourth owner in the 81-year history of Iowa Park's only funeral home.

Paperwork was completed Tuesday to complete the purchase from Keith Aulds, and the firm's new name is Dutton-Tanner-Aulds Funeral Home.

Dutton, his wife, Norma, and two of their three children, Kassie, 12, and Lynn, 10, will move here from Wichita Falls sometime in November, when their home lease

expires.

The Duttons are also the parents of Lori Parker, who is married and lives in Wichita Falls. Kassie will be in the seventh grade and Lynn in the fifth.

Mrs. Dutton has for a number of years worked as a legal secretary for a law firm in Wichita Falls.

Aulds, who has owned the business since Oct. 1, 1971, said he will continue to help his son, Mark, run the Ace Sewing Center in Wichita Falls. But he and wife Pat plan to do a lot of traveling.

They will continue to live at their home on north Johnson Road.

"We're coming here to work with the people of Iowa Park, and be involved in its activities," Dutton said.

His sister and her husband, Linda and Don Stell of Wichita Falls, are silent partners in the business.

Born at Ringgold, Dutton's father, Bub, moved to Electra in 1954, where he was a pipeline inspector for Mobile Oil. Mr. Dutton

is deceased, but Mrs. Dutton continues to reside there.

Dutton was graduated from Electra High School in 1966, and briefly attended Midwestern State Univ.

While serving in the U.S. Army 1968-70, he was wounded in Viet Nam and received a medical discharge. He is a life member of the Disabled American Veterans.

He was graduated from the Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science in 1977 and has worked or managed at five funeral homes, including Electra, Wichita Falls and Burkburnett.

Additionally, he owned and operated a body transport business for a brief period in Wichita Falls.

While living in Burkburnett, he was a member of the Boomtown Lions Club, and also served on the school board of trustees.

Dutton said he has no immediate plans for changes in management or policies at the present time, and will continue to observe office hours from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

News Briefs

Trash containers 'hot' items

With the theft of two portable trash containers this week on the city's northeast side, property owners who use the rollouts are being reminded to remove the containers from the street edge at the end of the collection day.

Mike Price, public works director, says people find the rollouts to be so convenient that they've become a "hot" item, literally.

The plastic rollouts, which are owned by the city, are usually stolen at the rate of three or four a year.

Price said city employees keep an eye out for rollouts in areas where

they don't belong, but the recovery rate is almost nil.

Price said he wants to remind the property owners using the rollouts that they are to be removed from the street edge by 7:30 p.m. on collection day, or be in violation of city code.

He said the rollouts have generally been problems for the city and that city employees have spent hours devising ways to reduce the city's expenses on the containers.

The rollouts are issued to residents where large, metal containers cannot be used.

Locals named UW pacesetters

Iowa Park intities will be more involved in this year's United Way "Pacesetter" fund-raising campaign than ever before.

Rev. John Mollett, chairman of the Iowa Park United Way campaign, said five intities from here will take part in the Pacesetter effort.

paign, as in years past, will set the pace for the success of the overall campaign. Through our Iowa Park Pacesetter groups, we hope to raise over 10 percent of the Iowa Park 1989-90 campaign goal of \$64,240."

Not more than one local firm has ever been a Pacesetter in an annual campaign.

The overall United Way campaign kickoff will be Aug. 30, using the theme, "Care and Share ... the United Way."

Officiating the ceremony was Father Michael Langston, O.S.D., Lt. Col. U.S. Army, assisted by Chaplain Wayne Mackirdy, Major, U.S. Army.

The parents of the couple are Col. and Mrs. Thomas R. Genetti of Weisbaden, and Mr. and Mrs. Earnie Reusch of Iowa Park.

For the ceremony, the chapel was decorated with large baskets filled with fresh pink gladioli and carnations and white daisies. Pews were marked with pink carnations accented with white ribbon, baby's breath and greenery.

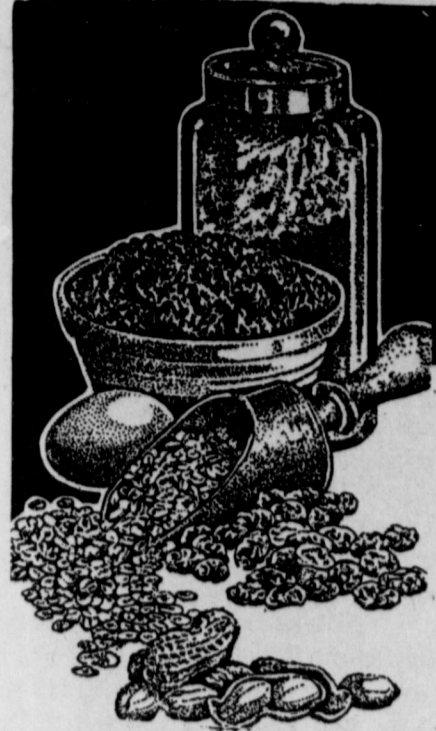

CARROT CAKE

- 1 1/2 cup Crisco oil
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 4 eggs
 - 2 cups flour
 - 1 1/2 tsp. soda
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 2 tsp. cinnamon
 - 2 cups grated carrots
 - 1 cup raisins
 - 1 cup pecans
- Combine oil and sugar. Add eggs, beating after each egg. Gradually add flour, soda, salt, and

cinnamon. Mix well. Fold in carrots, nuts and raisins. Put into a well greased and floured 9x12 in. pan. Bake at 325 degrees 45 to 50 minutes.

MEXICAN CORN BREAD

- 3 eggs, beaten
 - 1 can cream style corn
 - 1 large onion, diced
 - 2 or 3 canned mild or hot peppers, chopped
 - 1 cup grated cheese
 - 1 1/2 cups self-rising cornmeal
 - 1/2 cup cooking oil
- Mix all together and bake at 400 degrees in an iron skillet or muffin pan until brown.

CUSTARD PIE

- 4 slightly beaten eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/2 cups scalded milk
- Nutmeg

Blend eggs, sugar, salt and vanilla. Gradually stir in scalded milk. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Bake in 350 degree oven 35 to 40 minutes, or until knife inserted half way between center and edge, comes out clean. Cool on rack.

OKRA SALAD

Okra
Onion
Tomatoes

Cut up okra as to fry. I use Crisco oil. Corn meal the okra and fry it. Drain well. Chop or dice onion and tomatoes. Mix together, salt and pepper, and serve. Good hot or cold.

As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON

I was never so impressed with a demonstration of respect than I witnessed Friday afternoon.

The entire funeral and burial of Police Lt. Walter T. "Tommy" Collins was an unforgettable event.

To see the hundreds of officers from agencies ranging from Houston to Oklahoma City and as far west as Midland and Amarillo there to pay their last respects to the fallen Wichita Falls officer was impressive.

The motorcade from Wichita Falls to Vernon, where he was laid to rest, was an unbelievable ride, with motorcycle officers providing an escort for the hearse, followed by several marked vehicles with overhead lights spinning, and family and friends following in a train that stretched something like five miles.

Every intersection of the route through Wichita Falls to US 287 was blocked, and all but one entrance onto the northbound highway from that point to Vernon was blocked by police, county deputies or firemen.

That one entrance was at the rest stop on the west side of Iowa Park, but it also was blocked...by some private citizen in a blue sedan.

All along the route, oncoming vehicles, with very, very few exceptions, stopped on the shoulder of the southbound lane until the procession reached its destination.

And, a great number of people lined the highway, standing with hand over heart, silently saluting.

Rev. Frank Ashby, who became a close friend to Tommy several years ago when he pastored the Kamay Baptist Church, delivered one of the most memorable eulogies I've ever heard.

The family had wanted Ashby to officiate, but reaching him was a difficult task.

Now the pastor of Northway Baptist Church in Dallas, Ashby was on a project of building a church in a remote, isolated community deep in Mexico. Word somehow reached him, and he came as fast as he could, arriving late Thursday afternoon.

First United Methodist Church was filled to capacity with lawmen, firemen, city officials, Masons, family and friends. But I suspect there would have been even more, had there been space.

At Eastview Cemetery, I was witness to my first funeral provided by lawmen, complete with the firing of a 21-gun salute, taps played by a

police bugler and the flag-draped coffin, as well as last rites given by the Masonic Lodge.

I didn't need all that to bury my good friend. But it all will remain in my heart as a most cherished memory.

Don't ever, ever try to tell me that a police officer isn't respected.

Cancer detection unit to set up here Saturday

In an effort to find cancer at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women Saturday.

The mobile unit will be set up at Friendly Door Senior Citizens Center, located at 100 West Cash, and appointments may be made by calling the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce at 592-5441.

Based in Odessa, the unit has received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

The unit will administer mammographic examinations, using

modern state of the art x-ray equipment, which can detect cancers as small as a grain of rice, and well before it can be felt.

According to the American Cancer Society, one of every 10 women in the U.S. will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year, over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

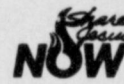
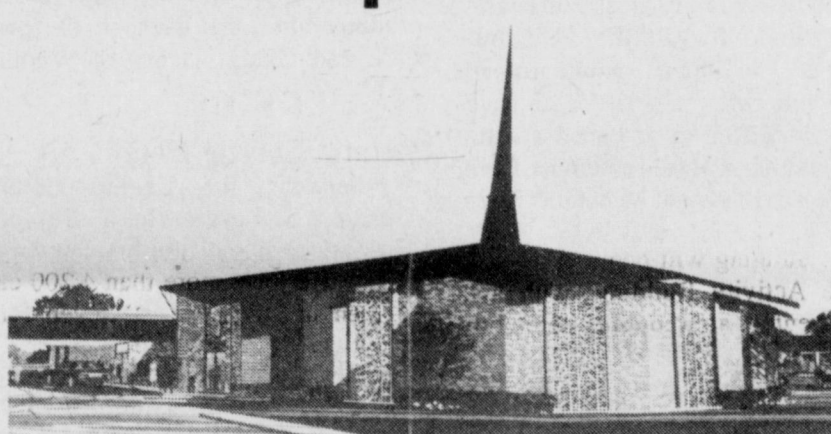

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

The Wichita County Regular Field gained a new producer when Scott, Stone & Stone of Holliday completed the No. 1 Jackson "A" three miles northeast of Holliday.

The well indicated ability to pump oil at the rate of 12 barrels per day, plus five barrels of water. Production will be from a set of perforations, 725 to 730 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a lease 150 feet from the west line and 200 feet from the north line of the DCSL Survey.

Four 1,999-ft. developmental wells are planned by Singleton Production Company of Iowa Park in the Wichita County Regular Field. The Nos. 1, 2, and 3 Munger "E" are located one-fourth mile northwest of Kamay in a lease in the KWVFL Survey while the No. 3 Munger "B" is located one mile north of Kamay in the Kemp's Wichita Valley Farm Lot 20 Survey.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 177 Ruyle, a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The operation will be located six miles north of Iowa Park in a lease in the SPR Company #2

Survey. The operator is Exmoor Oil & Minerals Inc. of Dallas.

The No. 1 Boucher, an 8,400-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in Hardeman County's Piarist Field. Paul DeCleva of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be spudded in a lease seven miles south-southeast of Chillicothe in the H&TC Survey A-1801, 467 feet from the south line and 467 feet from the east line.

A 9,000-ft. wildcat well is planned by Trio Operating Company of Wichita Falls at a drillsite 3.5 miles east of Quanah, Hardeman County. The location is in a lease 467 feet from the north line and 2,696 feet from the west line of the HW&NW RR Survey A-845. Well's designation is the No. 1 AOG-Dickey.

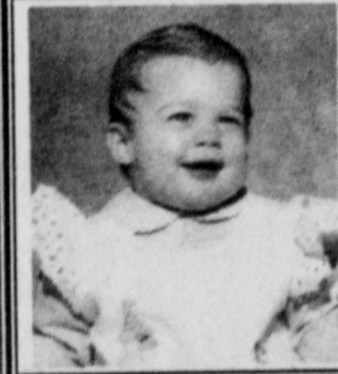

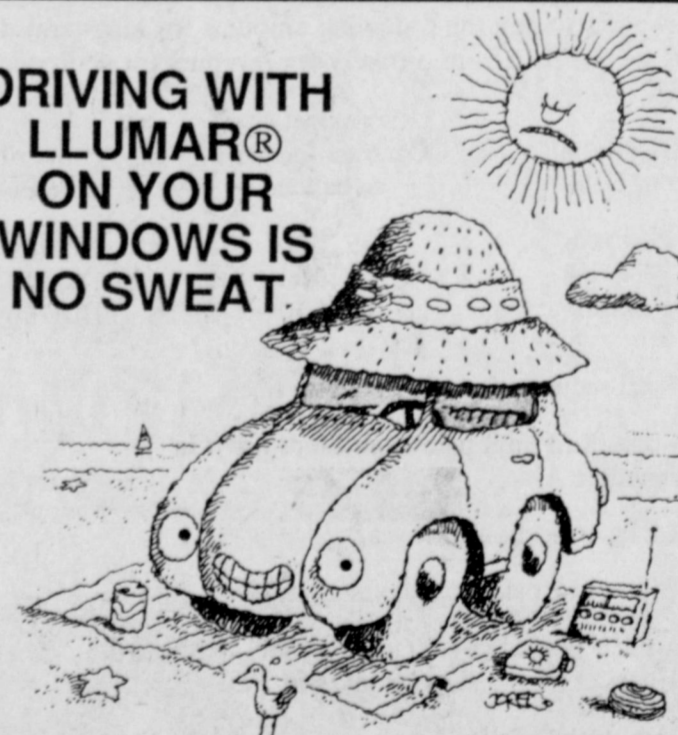

The office is open weekdays from 8 a.m. until 12-noon, and 1-4 p.m., according to Richard Davis, principal.

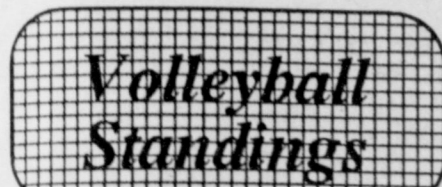

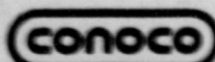
