stretched something like five miles.

Every intersection of the route hrough Wichita Falls to US 28 onto the northbound highway from hat point to Vernon was blocked by police, county deputies or firemen. All along the route, oncoming
vehicles, with very, very few excepvehicles, with very, very few excep-

And, a great number of people lined the highway, standing with hand over heart, silently saluting. Rev. Frank Ashby, who became a close friend to Tommy several years ago when he pastored the Kamay Baptist Church, delivered one ever heard.
The family had wanted Ashby to officiate, but reaching him was a difficult task.
Now the pastor of Northway Baptist Church in Dallas, Ashby was on a project of building a church in a remote, isolated community deep in
