Local group to open bank in Wichita Falls

North Central Texas Bankshares, based in Iowa Park, will open a new banking center in Wichita Falls, Stanley Williamson, chairman of the corporation's board, announced Tuesday.

Location of the facility has not yet been decided, nor has an opening date been set.

Dick Waggoner was named president of the holding company and chief executive officer of the future facility.

Waggoner served as president and

chief executive officer 17 years at Parker Square Bank and its holding company. He also was vice president and trust officer four years of City National Bank, now NCNB Texas Bank of Wichita Falls.

"We are real excited about Dick joining our team. His experience and expertise will add a great deal of stability," stated Williamson.

"We have already made our application for the necessary federal regulatory approvals" for the Wichita Falls banking center, Williamson

said. But the regulators are waiting on the directors to select a site before proceeding with approval.

North Central Texas Bankshares is officed in the annex building next to State National Bank.

It is the parent of State National Bank, as well as the banks in Electra, Windthorst and Memphis, with branches in Holliday and Turkey.

North Central Texas Bankshares' total deposits increased from \$122-million in June 1988 to \$137-million in June 1989.

Iowa Parkan classmate of Marine Col. Higgins

An Iowa Park native and others are developing a scholarship fund for the daughter of the late Marine Lt. Col. William Higgins, who was reportedly hanged by Pro-Iranian Shiite Moslem captors.

Jim Gard and other members of Class 6-67 of The Basic School at the Marine Base in Quantico, Va. had collected \$17,000 in pledges by Aug. 9, and were only starting.

Gard, the son of Mrs. Ruth Gard, now lives at Newalla, Okla. He is on the advisory board of the foundation.

Higgins and Gard were members of class of 494 students who underwent the 21-week officer training course that ended in November 1967. Most of them went on to serve in Vietnam.

Col. Higgins was to have attended a reunion of his classmates in August 1987, but only days before received orders to go to Lebanon as a member of the United Nations Peace Force.

He was taken captive in February 1988 by a group calling itself the "Organization for the Oppressed on Earth," and last week was shown on national television news broadcasts as having been hung.

Immediately after the report, one of the classmates of Higgins and Gard, Austin attorney Pat Mullen began the scholarship fund campaign.

Higgins' daughter, Christine Lynne, is 19 years old. The fund is envisioned to develop to a point where it will benefit her education,

and dependents of other Marines who are killed in action.

"Ignorance caused this," Mullen was quoted in the Austin American-Statesman. "Let's see if education can

stop it."

Contractor bid accepted to finish tower project

A contractor was named Monday night to make the final connection that will put the newly-located water tower into operation, and residents will be given the opportunity to add a voluntary donation to the cemetery.

Those actions and others took place during a short but active city council meeting.

Poteet, Inc. of Wichita Falls submitted the lowest of five bids to connect the water tower on Emerald to the main lines.

The tower's move corrected two major problems the city had experienced more than 10 years.

At its old location on Lake Gordon, it was rendered useless when the tower was constructed on Johnson Road, because its elevation was lower. Automated refilling of the Johnson tower prohibited any withdrawal of water from the lake tank.

Secondly, the new location will greatly enhance the pressure at homes in the south and east part of the city, according to the city's engineer.

Poteet's bid was \$25,244, and the highest of the bids was \$44,500.

Aldermen approved a resolution to permit the addition of a 10-cent donation to Highland Cemetery on all monthly utility bills, as has been the practice about four years for funds

to purchase Christmas decorations.

The addition is strictly voluntary and can be either deleted or increased by contacting the city hall.

Administrator James Barrington told the council the change should be completed on the city's computer in time for Sept. 1 billing.

Highland Cemetery Association had asked for financial assistance of the city. Rather than budgeting tax money for the cemetery, however, aldermen felt voluntary donations would be more appropriate.

Collections will be turned over to the Association each month.

In other business, aldermen named a lay representative to the North Texas Library System board, accepted a bid to sell for removal a house on West Texas; passed an ordinance increasing the fee for a public hearing before the Board of Adjustment; passed a resolution for mutual aid with area cities; and gave the go-ahead on lights for the volleyball courts.

Pauline Emils was re-appointed the city's representative to the area library board for a second term.

Monty Britt submitted the only bid, \$250, to purchase the city-owned house at 102 West Texas, which includes its removal.

The house had previously served as a home for the water superintendent, then storage, and more recently as an office for public works.

Because of costs involved, the fee for a public hearing before the

Board of Adjustment was increased from \$15 to \$50, according to the ordinance changed Monday.

A mutual aid agreement which has been in effect several years with area communities and Sheppard AFB was updated by a resolution approved during the meeting.

The agreement has been put into effect several times, such as when major business fires have occurred here and at Holliday, and when Wichita Falls was hit by a tornado.

Aldermen approved a request to have lights installed at the volleyball courts on the block between Third and Fourth streets.

A survey of residents in the immediate neighborhood indicated no major objection: eight for it, one against, three with no opinion and four unable to contact.

The lights to be used are those that were replaced at the girls' softball fields.

No city funds will be used for the project, it was pointed out. The money for the expenses is being raised by tournaments, aldermen were told.

Aldermen agreed to hold their second budget study session next Monday. This one will be at the council chambers, however, instead of the library meeting room.

The final action of the 18-minute meeting was to recognize Sue Hatcher, animal control officer, as the city's Employee of the Month.

Vocalist Joetta Weaver offered "Wind Beneath My Wings" during the ceremony, and traditional wedding marches were used.

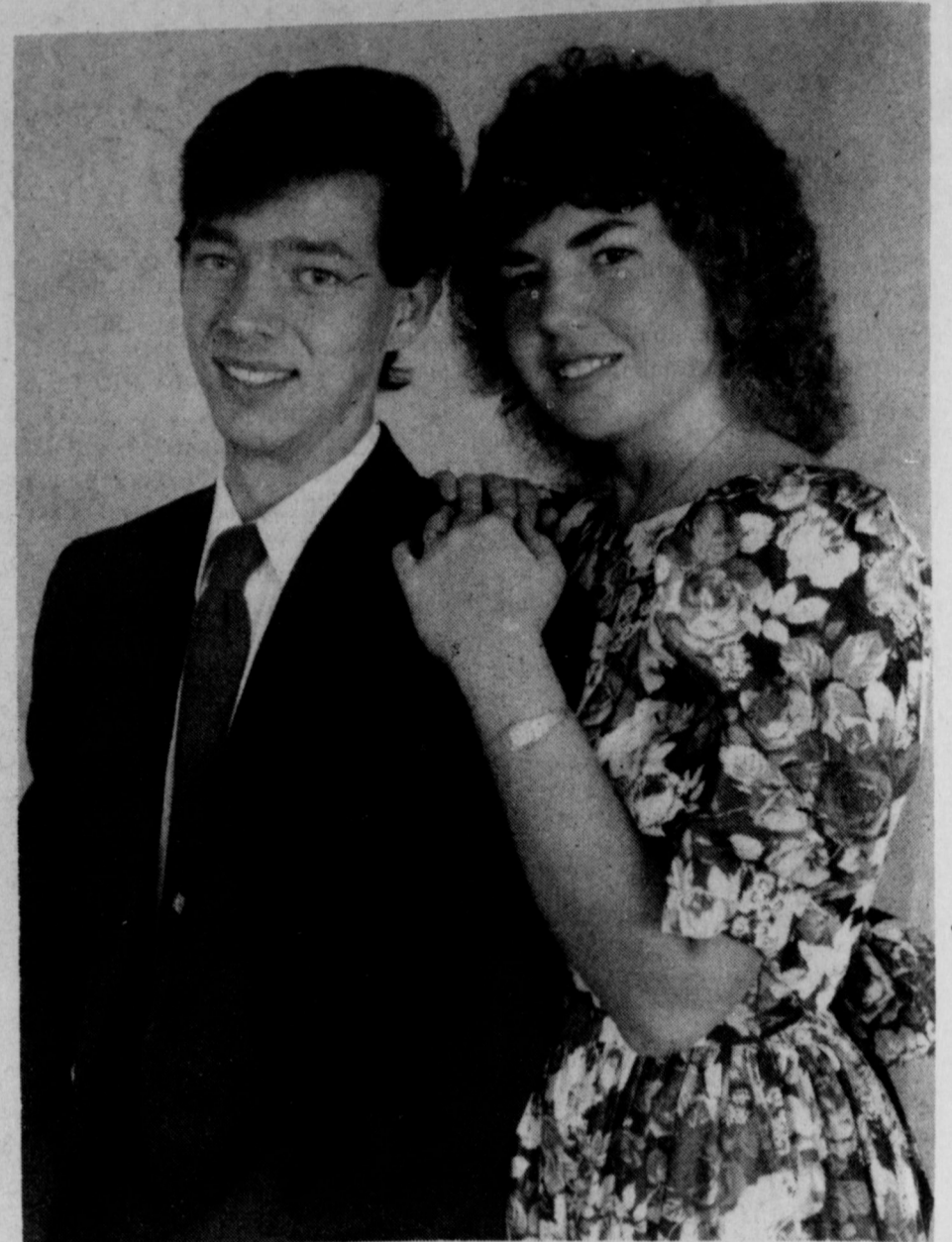
A reception to fete the couple was held at the church following the ceremony.

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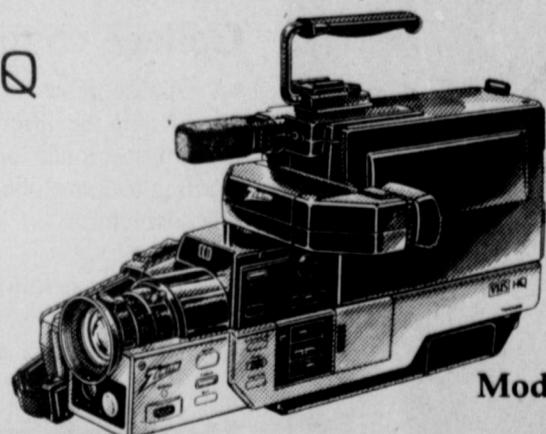
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Hodges, Watson exchange nuptials in double-ring ceremony Saturday

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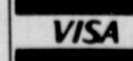
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Rural schools' homecoming set Aug. 26

As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



It's "I told you so" time. A few years ago, some joker on the neighboring community's newspaper printed an unfounded article about the high taxes in Iowa Park. When the error was explained, there was never a correction printed.

The real estate people had a field day, using the clipping to point out to prospective home buyers that they should locate in Wichita Falls, thus saving tax money.

I'll quote from my column of Aug. 20, 1984: "...Wichita Falls, whose trustees were proud to stay at 73.8-cents. But a bond election Tuesday, if approved, would necessitate an 11-cent increase next year....I'll just about bet a steak dinner it won't stop at 11-cents...."

And then Aug. 22, 1985, I wrote: "I still say the Wichita Falls school district bought time last year by getting that big bond issue

passed. What's their's now? 87.4-cents, and I'm betting it'll raise more next year, after they've spent the interest off those bonds they've had on deposit all year."

Well, it took two years, instead of one. But now the Wichita Falls trustees are proposing an eight-percent increase for the 1988-89 school year, that will raise that district's rate to .9168.

Iowa Park's budget, which is to be acted on at a meeting Aug. 29, is based on retaining the previous year's rate of .81-cents.

I must admit, however, that the board is biting the bullet so the rate will not be increased.

And it's also a fact that, unless some major funding changes are made on the state level, our rate will have to be raised almost to that of Wichita Falls' for the 1990-91 year if our badly-needed bond election this fall is approved.

Our schools are growing, and need all the additional classrooms that are on the drawing board for the next five years.

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Krot Oil Company of Burkburnett has completed three new oil producers in the Wichita County Regular Field. The Nos. 3, 4, and 6 Embry are located three miles southwest of Burkburnett. Drillsites are in the Red River Valley Land Survey; 800 feet from the east line and 150 feet from the south line, 1,200 feet from the east line and 556 feet from the south line, and 2,000 feet from the east line and 556 feet from the south line, respectively.

The operations pumped oil at the combined rate of 29 barrels per day, plus 140 barrels of water. Production will be from perforations ranging from 1,800 to 1,806 feet into the wellbores.

A 2,000-ft. developmental well is planned by Ray Craighead of Wichita Falls at a drillsite five miles south of Electra, Wichita County. The location is in a lease 710 feet from the north line and 150 feet from the west line of the GC&SF RR Company #2 Survey A-758. Well's designation is the No. 9 J.D. Melton Estate. It is in the Wichita County Regular Field.

A new producer has been brought on line in the Wichita County Regular Field with F.T. Felty Operating Co. of Burkburnett as the operator.

Located five miles southeast of Burkburnett, the well is 820 feet from the north line and 1,030 feet from the west line of the H. Hastie

Survey. It is designated as the S.M. Daniels.

The wells indicated ability to pump five barrels of oil per day, plus ten barrels of water. Production will be from dual-zone perforations, 1,300 to 1,304 and 1,315 to 1,319 feet into the hole.

The No. 5 Chilson has been finaled by Fennell Oil Company of Wichita Falls.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. Drillsite is seven miles south-southwest of Iowa Park. Location is in the Denton CSL Survey, 480 feet from the west line and 1,200 feet from the north line.

Daily potential of 12 barrels of oil and 35 barrels of water was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well will produce from perforations, 688 to 694 feet into the hole.

Pumping 103 barrels of oil per day, along with 40,000 CF caninghead gas, the No. 3 W.G. Walther was completed in Hardeman County's Huanah Field by Texaco Producing Inc. of Midland.

Drillsite is 2.5 miles north of Quanah.

It will produce from a perforated interval 5,900 to 5,910 feet into the wellbore. The well also made 51 barrels of water per day.

The location is in a lease in the HW&N RR Survey, 2,425 feet from the south line and 850 feet from the west line.

He traveled at his own expense to the meeting, which is the only annual meeting of legislators from all 50 states.

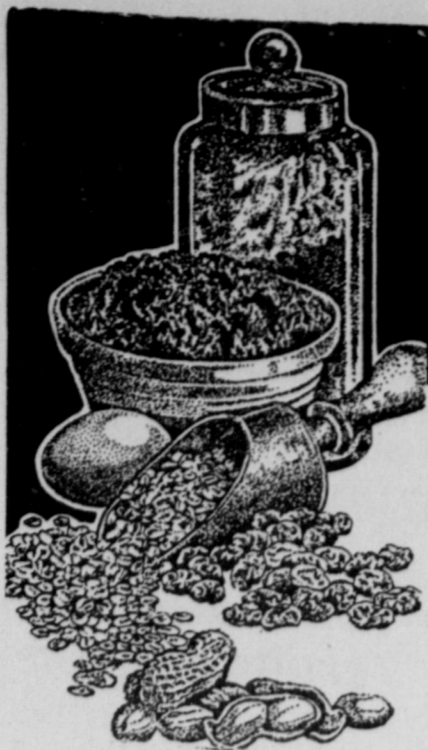
He participated in panel discussions on energy issues, the ongoing U.S. savings and loan crisis and the 1991 legislative redistricting.

- 2/3 cup (small can) undiluted evaporated milk
- 1 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1 1/2 cup miniature marshmallows (or 16 medium marshmallows, diced)
- 1 1/2 cup chocolate chips (1 1/2-6 oz. pkg.)

Combine milk, sugar and salt in saucepan over medium heat. Heat to boiling. Cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add marshmallows, chocolate chips, vanilla and chopped nuts. Stir 1 to 2 minutes until marshmallows melt. Pour into a 9-inch buttered square pan. Allow to cool. Cut into squares. Makes about 2 pounds.

UNCLE CLAUDE'S "NO-COOK" CHOW-CHOW

- 3 or 4 hot peppers
- 1 gal. green tomatoes
- 10 large green sweet peppers
- 12 large onions
- 6 pods of garlic (if desired)
- 1 large cabbage head
- 8 cucumbers
- 6 cups vinegar
- 4 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup salt
- 2 tsp. cinnamon
- 2 tsp. celery salt
- 2 tsp. celery seeds
- 2 tsp. tumeric
- 2 tsp. nutmeg
- 2 tsp. pickling spice
- 2 tsp. allspice

Grind first 7 ingredients and let juices drip out. Combine vinegar, sugar, salt and spices. Mix well. Pack in hot pint jars. Seal with a good hot jar seal. It's best to let chow-chow set for 4 to 5 weeks before eating it. Makes about 16 pints.

AUNT DAWSON'S PUMPKIN BREAD

- 2 cups pumpkin
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup oil
- 2/3 cup water
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
- 2 tsp. soda

Mix pumpkin, eggs, oil and water. Add flour, sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt and soda. Mix very well. Add nuts. Bake in 2 greased and floured loaf pans (or in large Bundt pan, or may use 3 or 4 (1 pound) coffee cans). Bake at 350 degrees one hour or until toothpick inserted in middle comes out clean. If using coffee cans, they will bake faster.

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MISSISSIPPI MUD CAKE

- Cake:
- 4 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 sticks oleo, softened
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 4 Tbsp. cocoa
- 2 cups chopped nuts
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 jar marshmallow creme
- 1 can coconut (optional)

- Frosting:
- 1/3 cup evaporated milk
- 1 stick oleo
- 1 box powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup cocoa
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Cake: Mix eggs, sugar, butter. Mix dry ingredients in container. Combine with egg mixture. Pour in greased and floured oblong cake pan. Bake at 350 degrees. Spread marshmallow creme over hot cake. Pour frosting over marshmallow creme while hot.

Frosting: Heat milk, add margarine, sugar, cocoa and beat. Add vanilla and nuts and pour over cake.

Note: Coconut, when used, is added to cake batter with dry ingredients. It may also be added to frosting, if desired.

MICROWAVE CORN CASSEROLE

- 1 large package (or 3 small boxes) frozen corn
- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 stick margarine
- 1 small can chopped green chili peppers

In a large round or oblong microwave baking dish melt stick of margarine on medium temperature.

Add frozen corn and microwave on high, stirring several times until corn is heated through. Add cream cheese, which has been cut into small pieces. Continue to microwave on high until cheese is melted. Add green chili peppers and salt and pepper. Heat until bubbly around edges. Total preparation time approximately 15 minutes.

RANCH POTATOES

- 5 or 6 medium new potatoes
- 3 small green onions, with blades
- 1 small bottle Buttermilk Ranch Salad Dressing
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Bacon bits (if desired)

Boil new potatoes with peelings on. Boil until just tender. Slice potatoes. Melt stick of margarine in large non-stick skillet. Add sliced potatoes and chopped green onions. Salt and pepper to taste. Saute potatoes and onions about 10 minutes. Add bottle of Ranch Dressing and bacon bits. Heat thoroughly and serve. Serves approx. 4 to 6.

Note: I have used sour cream and about 1/2 package of Ranch Dressing mix instead of the bottled dressing.

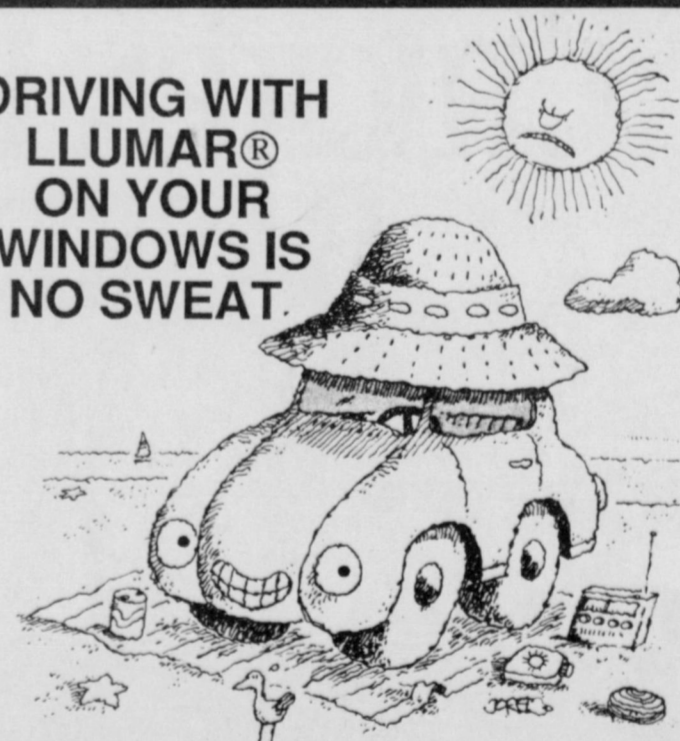

'Delinquents' win tourney

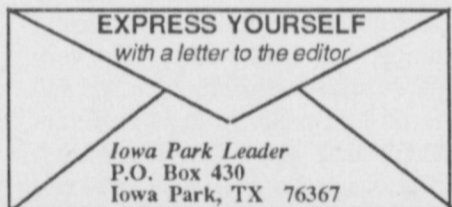
The Juvenile Delinquents were winners of last weekend's "Raise the Lights" volleyball tournament.

On a scale of 1-5, Williams rated the players' condition as a 4.

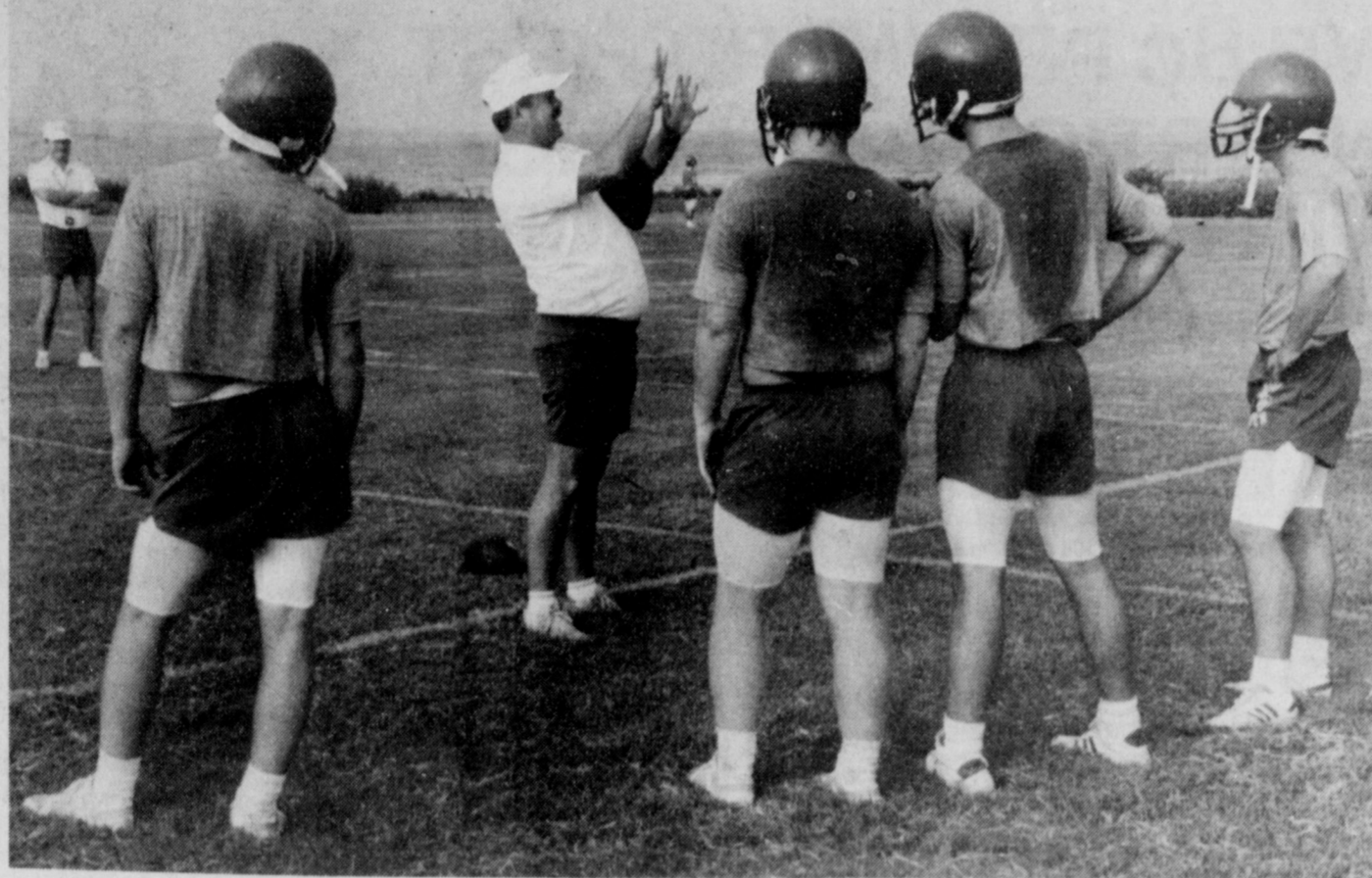
Because they are in such good physical condition, more time can be spent during sessions to work on offensive and defensive techniques, he said.

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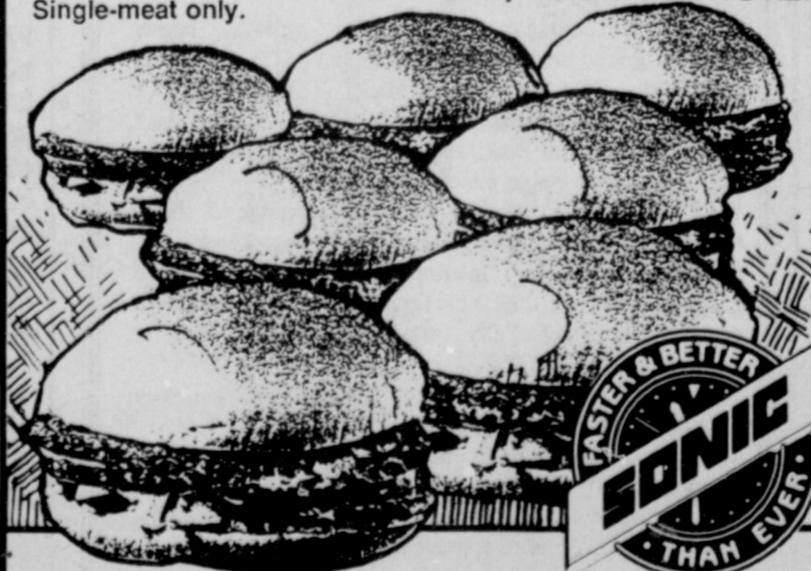
