Council makes move to increase tax rate

The city council Monday night took the first of three required steps toward increasing the tax rate in order to fund next year's \$2,832,500 budget.

An ordinance was passed which schedules a public hearing Sept. 11 on a proposed tax increase. Then on Sept. 18, a called meeting likely will be held to adopt the new tax rate and budget.

To generate \$42,000 additional revenue, aldermen are proposing to increase the tax rate from .84 per \$100 valuation to .885.

Both the general operating fund of \$1,757,500 and water and sewer fund of \$1,065,000 are considered as "balanced," by using carryover funds from this year's budget.

The general operating expenditures include \$3,98,375 for administration, \$724,180 public works, \$565,420 public safety and \$79,525 library and Recreational Activities Center.

Revenues budgeted for the coming year, which begins Oct. 1, include \$1,714,000 for the general operating fund and \$975,000 water and sewer.

A public hearing was held to determine if a house at 908 E. Highway owned by Cora Blevins, damaged by fire in the spring, had been brought into compliance with city codes.

Darrell Jolly, speaking for Mrs. Blevins, asked the council for more time after explaining efforts to sell the property included a lowering of the asking price.

He said Mrs. Blevins has been unable to do more to clean up the damaged structure, other than hiring someone to mow the grass and having an old car removed, because she is 70 years of age and lives entirely on her Social Security.

Jolly asked for an extension of six months, and when the council appeared ready to grant that time, the mayor, Tim Hunter, said he would

survey the neighborhood and if his findings indicated dissatisfaction, he would veto the council's vote.

All five aldermen voted approval of a six-month extension.

The council also approved the 1990 budget of Nortex 9-1-1 Communications District, which calls for expenditures of \$524,300.

Included in the budget, which must be approved by all entities in the district, is a capitol expenditure to purchase an office building at 906 Travis in Wichita Falls.

All council members voted for the budget except Bud Burch, who abstained because he also is a member of the 9-1-1 board and helped prepare the budget.

Calvin Lippard's request to buy water for his farming operation on the southwest edge of town drew approval, with the provision he lays his own line and places his meter inside the city.

No action was taken on proposals to build a new RAC building between Third and Fourth streets, as the issue was tabled.

A request to abandon part of West Park to provide adequate setback space was denied, but the council took an alternate route to satisfy the property owner's needs.

Chris Powell has purchased the property on the corner north of Scobee's and east of B&R Thriftway, to relocate his small engines business.

Aldermen approved re-zoning the property in order to meet the needs of Powell, who now operates his business on the Kamay Highway.

A request to replat property on West Clara, owned by Lita Watson, received council approval.

An ordinance amending the city code concerning definitions of terms for the control of animals and fowls

School bells signal summer's end

Summer vacation for Iowa Park students ends Tuesday, when classes resume for another year.

As has been the district's policy in past years, all classes will dismiss one hour earlier than normal on the first day, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

All high school students are to report at 8:05 a.m. in the auditorium, and later report to their respective first-period classes, Richard Davis, principal, said.

School buses will observe the same routes and stops they used last spring, Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, said.

Palmer also said all lunchroom

prices will be the same as last year.

Motorists are reminded by Chief Alan Sheffield, of the Iowa Park Police Dept., that extra caution should be used as students begin walking to their campuses.

Drivers are also reminded of the speed limits around schools, crossings that are marked on major roads in the city, and of the state law that motorists are to honor lighted signals of school buses.

Sheffield said officers would be on the alert, especially around the schools, to make certain drivers are observing both speed limits and crossing areas.

Crossing guards will be on duty

to assist students at both elementary campuses.

When a school bus is stopped on the side of a street or road, with its red lights blinking, it is not to be passed by following or on-coming traffic, according to state law.

The next holiday students will look forward to is Thanksgiving, which will be Nov. 22-27, according to the school calendar.

After that, the next holiday will be Dec. 21-Jan. 2, for Christmas.

The teachers began their preparations for school's opening Friday of last week, and are continuing in-service training through tomorrow.

Trustees set budget; no tax hike required

Iowa Park school trustees voted Tuesday night to retain the 1988-89 tax rate of .81 cents per \$100 valuation to fund the 1989-90 budget of \$6,025,710.

The vote was taken after a very brief public hearing on the budget, which attracted no persons other than

Fielding quits board post

First-term Iowa Park school trustee Gary Fielding informed the board at the end of Tuesday's meeting, he was resigning his position and would not be present at the Sept. 12 meeting.

Fielding, whose term is to expire in the spring, gave no reason and said he would have no comment on

the surprise announcement. Because the topic was not on the board's called meeting agenda, no action could be taken.

Board Chairman Jerry Reed said trustees at the next meeting will decide whether to name a replacement to fulfill the term, or leave the seat open until the next election.

school personnel and the press.

Because the district has the entire \$133,000 needed to pay off its bonded indebtedness over the next two years, the entire 81-cents in the budget is dedicated to the maintenance and operation fund.

Over the past few years, 3.5-cents has been budgeted for the interest and sinking fund, it was pointed out.

The budget is the result of numerous board meetings and cuts in requests at all four campuses.

A brief reception was held prior to the meeting, during which members of the board were introduced to all eight new faculty and staff members.

Trustees also approved proposed teacher appraisal dates and appraisers, concession stand contracts, and one student transfer.

Appraisal (required under HB 72) dates will be Sept. 19-Jan. 18, for level one teachers; Jan. 29-May 25, level one teachers, and Sept. 19-May 25, level two and three teachers.

It was noted that "formal observations shall not be conducted on the last instructional day before any official school holiday."

Appraisers other than principals will be Glen Mitchell, superintendent, Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, and Weldon "Doc" Bates, retired superintendent from Bryson.

Contracts for concession stands included the Band Boosters, the football stadium, and Iowa Park Booster Club for the gymnasium.

Brandi Lynn Brown's request to transfer here from the City View School District was approved. She moved to that district after an earlier list was approved by the board.

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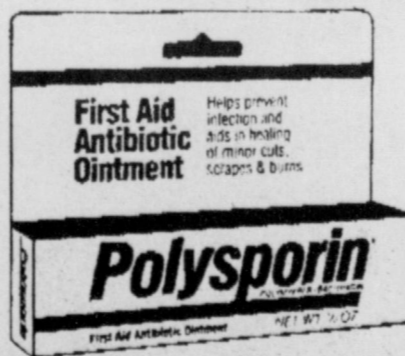
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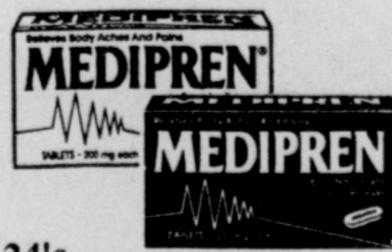
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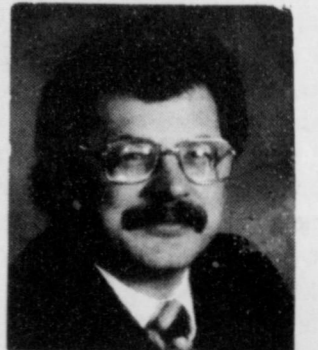
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* Frequently Used Phrases That May Be Confusing *

ACUTE CONDITION - Usually short-term illness. Comes on suddenly and is severe in nature.

CHRONIC CONDITION - Usually lasts for some time. May be indefinite in length and often has to be lived with.

FUNCTIONAL SYMPTOM OR CONDITION - The result of the way the body works. Has no known or detectable physical cause, such as injury or infection.

SELF-LIMITING DISEASE OR INFECTION - Usually runs predictable course and ends within certain amount of time. Cold or flu.

SECONDARY INFECTION - Affects entire body. Usually begins in major organ, causing malfunction there, which spreads throughout the body.

LOCAL INFECTION - Centralized and doesn't spread, unless it is ignored and permitted to get out of hand.

SYMPTOMATIC TREATMENT - Alleviates symptoms but doesn't treat cause itself. Done commonly with self-limiting infections, such as viral infections, since no cure for them has been established. May also be used when treating infection.

Praise. Boos. Oooohs! The praise is for our school trustees, who have managed to hold down our taxes to the point where we are one of the lowest-taxed school districts in the entire state.

This is evidenced by the fact that our tax rate for 1989-90 will be only 81-cents per \$100 valuation, as set by the trustees Tuesday night.

And at the same time, it is believed the same level of excellence in education will be maintained, without any cuts hurting the students.

The Boos? Well, that goes for all the elected officials who voted for House Bill 72, which mandated so many costly programs, but at local expense and unfunded by state.

Among the leaders pushing the bill were former governor Mark White (can you imagine him even giving consideration to running for re-election?), Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby (he's not going to run for another term, because he surely feels the heat now that HB 72 has cost taxpayers so much money), and former senator Ray Farabee (same thinking as Hobby).

Now, for the Oooohs! We receive about 35 newspapers from across the state weekly, and this exposure gives me an idea of what is happening to school taxes.

He questioned why board members would approve a request at 716 W. Alameda, and reject one at 514 W. Alameda.

And one additional note. Remember that school down around San Antonio, Edgewood, that is a leader of "poor" school districts in suing the state of Texas on the constitution-

ality of the present school financing system?

Well, according to the records, Edgewood, the school that just can't seem to put up enough money for its students, had a tax rate in 1988-89 of 90-cents.

But, the catch is, real property in the Edgewood district is valued at only 87.8% of its real value (Iowa Park is 99.4%), which made last year's real tax rate only 79-cents.

I think the judge who's hearing the suit ought to take that into consideration.

Maybe he'll want to send some of our school trustees and administrators down to Edgewood to help those people out of their bind.

Thanks for article Dear Bob:

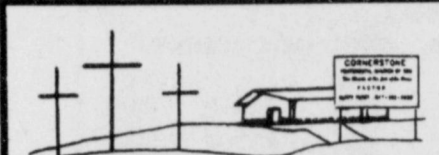

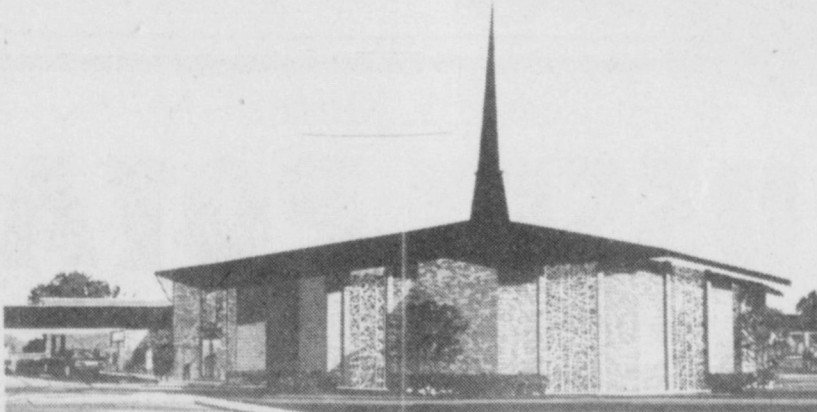

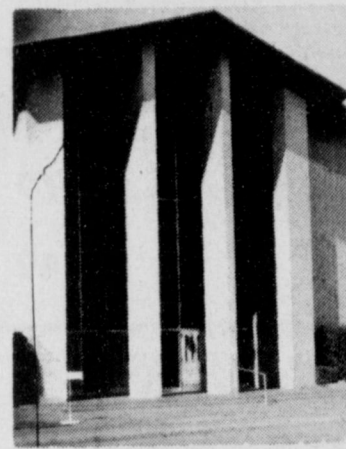

VOYAGER 2

A reception followed the ceremony at the Fellowship Hall of the Church.

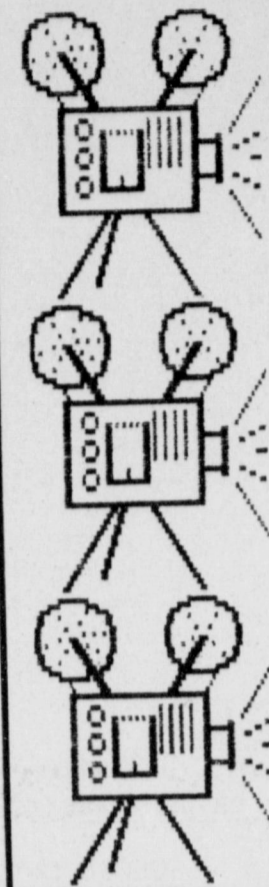

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INCOME ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES

1989-90

(These guidelines should be used by the school to determine eligibility for free or reduced-price meals and should be provided the media for public release.)

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.00, \$1.10, or \$1.25 and breakfast for 75¢. Children from households that meet federal income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

HOW AND WHERE TO APPLY: A separate application must be filled out for each child you want to receive free or reduced-price meals. The completed application must be returned to that child's principal. One application form is attached, but you may obtain additional forms from any principal if you have more than one child for whom you want to apply. If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact your child's principal.

FOOD STAMP/AFDC HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive food stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household. (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None." (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Glen H. Mitchell, Superintendent, Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District, P.O. Box 898, Iowa Park, Texas, 76367.

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

A separate application must be filled out for each child for whom you are applying. The application must be returned to the principal of the school. (Additional application forms may be obtained from the school principal.)

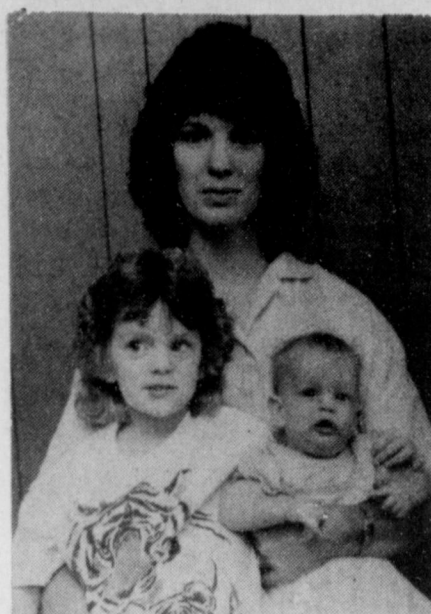

(2 1/2 or 3 oz.) sliced almonds; pour over cake. Let cool.
Cut into squares to serve. This cake may also be frozen.

SHEET CAKE
1 stick oleo
1/2 cup Crisco
4 Tbsp. cocoa
1 cup water
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. vanilla
2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1 cup buttermilk
2 eggs

Bring oleo, cocoa and sweet milk to a boil and add sugar, vanilla and pecans. Put on cake while still hot.

1 lb. lean ground beef
1/2 cup green pepper, chopped
1/2 cup onion, chopped
1 clove garlic, minced
1 can (16 oz.) tomatoes
1 can (7 oz.) whole kernel corn, drained
1 to 3 Tbsp. chili powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1/3 cup yellow cornmeal
1/3 cup water
1/2 cup chopped ripe olives
1 cup (4 oz.) shredded Colby cheese

Brown beef, onion, and garlic. Drain off drippings. Add vegetables and seasonings. Cover, simmer 10 minutes. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Blend cornmeal with water; stir into meat mixture. Cook until mixture boils and thickens. Stir in olives. Pour into 11 3/4 X 7 1/2-inch baking dish. Bake 20 minutes. Sprinkle cheese over top of casserole. Bake 5 more minutes.

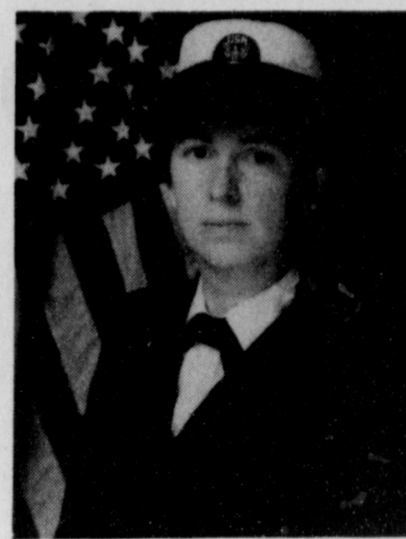

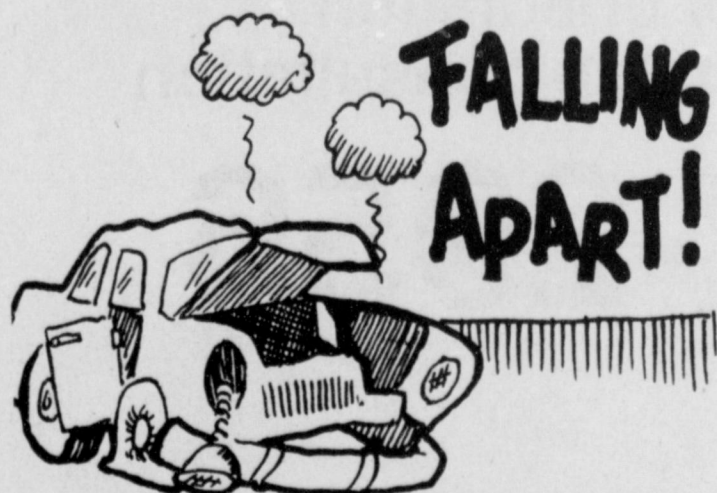
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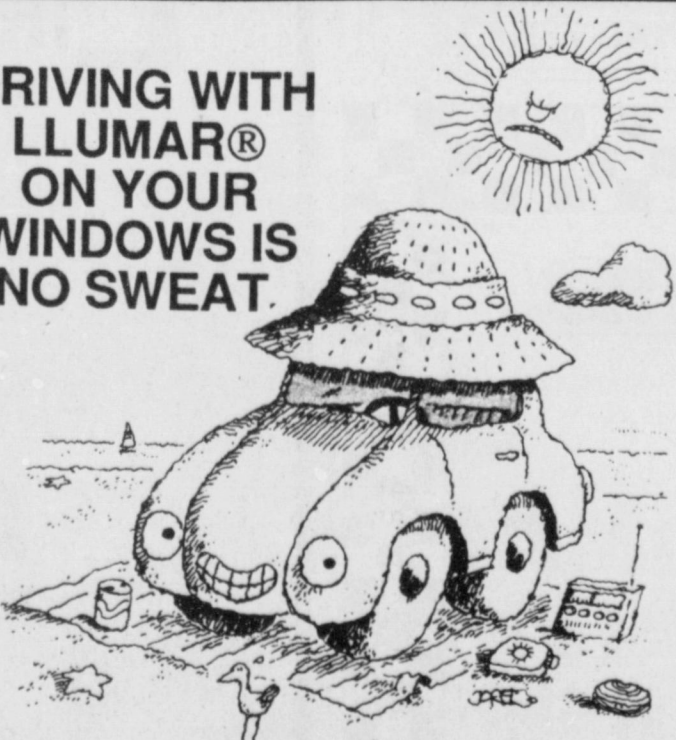
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Coach sees positive side in scrimmage

"Some very positive things came from" Friday night's scrimmage between the Hawks and Holliday's Eagles, Coach Len Williams said this week.

He added that some observers may not have noted them, however, because the smaller school came out on top statistically.

Williams was making his annual "State of the Hawks" report Tuesday before the Iowa Park Lions Club.

Iowa Park travels Friday to take on Olney in the final pre-season scrimmage, in preparation for the season opener the following week against Burkburnett.

Both varsities scored once, but Holliday led in first downs, 11-8, and total yardage, 179-168.

Each team had the ball on 20-play sessions, supposedly rotating their first and second units both offensively and defensively.

Iowa Park's yard total could have been considerably more, but two passes were dropped.

On their final five offensive plays, quarterback Jimmy Duggins put the ball in the air. Two catches netted 15 yards, two were dropped, and one was uncatchable.

The Hawks scored on their first possession of the ball, when David Slack outraced the Big Red defenders 50 yards. Holliday's score was a 10-yard run during its second series.

Iowa Park's freshmen and junior varsity easily dominated the visitors. The freshmen led in first downs, 8-1, and scored twice, while the JV went

11-2 in first downs and scored three touchdowns. Neither Holliday squad was able to score.

"We're anticipating a good season," Williams told the civic club. "It's important for a coach to expect the best from his players, and we do."

While pointing out the thin ranks that reported for football at the high school, 72, Williams said 82 players had signed up for the two junior high teams.

To start the season, all players on the varsity are either juniors or seniors. "We're trying to leave the sophomores on the JV," he said.

Twelve lettermen make up the core of the varsity, with five starters returning to the defensive and offensive platoons.

Three newcomers will be heavily counted on, including Steve Brown, Nathan Perry and Slack. Brown and Perry are tight ends and linebackers, Slack a running back and defensive secondary.

Going into the season, offensive starters include Chris Cook at center, Gary Green and Jay Loggins at guard, Steve Ace and Robert Cargal at tackle, Brown at tight end, Bruce Palmer at split end, Duggins at quarterback, Matthew Blackman at fullback, Bunkie Imboden at wingback, and Marc Cruz at tailback.

Defensively, Green and Loggins will start at tackle, Kelly McClure and Ace at end, Jimmy Nicholson,

Perry and Brown at linebacker, Palmer, Cruz, Slack and Brian Luney in the secondary.

"Depth will be our main weakness, with seven or eight going two ways," Williams said.

The Head Hawk acknowledged he faces a strong schedule this season.

He said the opener against Class AAAA Burkburnett is always an important contest for Iowa Park, setting the tone for the season.

Non-conference games with Breckenridge and Gainesville also ap-

pear to be a major test, since the Buckaroos have a line that averages well above 200 pounds per player, and the Leopards are ranked among the top four teams in the state in three different polls.

The schedule-ending opponent is Vernon, which is ranked second in two polls and third in the other.

First and foremost, however, the Hawks are aiming toward a much better season record than last year's 1-9, which was Williams' first year at the helm.

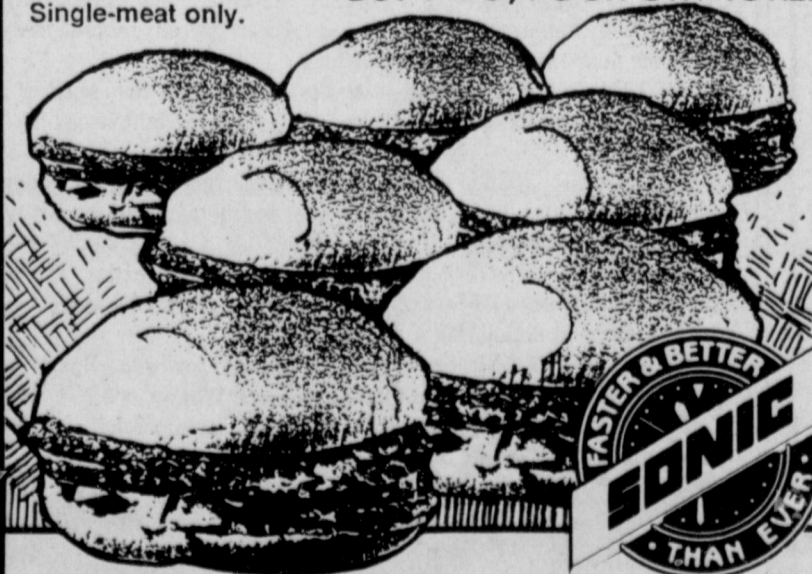

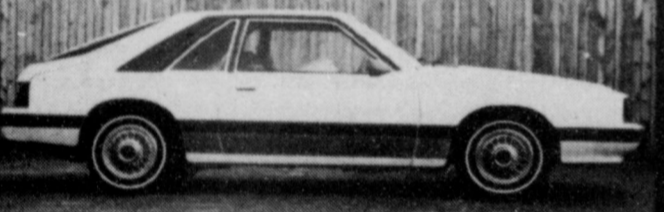
