# WHOOPS--Not all the paint got on tower

The crew painting the relocated water tower apparently did some spraying when the winds were higher than they should have been, several car owners have complained.

City Administrator James Barrington confirmed yesterday that he has received numerous complaints from owners who report finding small specks of paint on the surface of their vehicles.

He said he is referring all calls to the firm of Biggs and Mathews in Wichita Falls, which handles all city

Specifically, Gary Jones and Kerry Maroney are the men to con-

tact, at 766-0156, Barrington said. Biggs and Mathews is not responsible for the painting, but did the engineering work on the tower's relocation from its former resting place at Lake Gordon, as well as drafting the specifications for the work.

Pittsburg Tank and Tower Inc. in Kentucky was the successful bidder on the project, but the painting is being done by a sub-contractor,

which has insurance coverage from a firm in Arkansas.

Maroney said there is no question of some cars being damaged, but at least one complaint he received could not have been related. The

color was wrong. Owners of both new car dealerships reported vehicles on their lots had small, light-colored specks on the paint which would not come off with buffing and other methods norm-

# School enrollment down from 1988

Iowa Park's two elementary schools were the only two campuses reporting an increase in enrollment over last year, when classes resumed for a new year Tuesday.

Enrollments reported Tuesday totaled 1,848, as compared with 1,872.

Iowa Park's record first-day enrollment was in 1970, when 2,292 pupils reported for classes.

However, the figures could be somewhat misrepresentative, because last year's total was taken the first day classes resumed following the Labor Day holiday, and are not firstday enrollment.

Iowa Park chose to not start its school year until after Labor Day this year, an option permitted by the Texas Education Agency.

Traditionally, many parents held their children out of school until after the long Labor Day weekend.

Kidwell reported a gain of 14 students, eventhough kindergarten was down by six. That campus had 477 students Tuesday.

Bradford had an increase of nine students, with 461.

The junior high's 406 students was 10 fewer than last year, but the high school reported only 504 students, which was a reduction of 37.

There were 25 fewer seniors, 17 fewer freshmen and six fewer juniors at the high school, with the only gain being in the sophomore class, where 21 more were enrolled.

# Daylight home burglaries are investigated by police

Police figure two bold daylight burglaries reported Monday in the same neighborhood were committed by the same culprit.

Two reports of burglaries of a habitation were filed Thursday, one in the 600 block of Clara and the other in the 500 block of Coleman.

In both cases, residents were out of town, the front doors had been kicked in, and there was no ransacking of the insides.

A large coin collection and jewelry was taken from the Clara home, and jewelry and a scanner radio from the Coleman residence. Nothing else was taken, though there was a lot of items left behind which are often taken in such cases, police said.

Police have talked with neighbors of the two homes, and one resident reported hearing a loud noise one day but believed it to have been a car door being slammed. The resident looked out a window and saw a car parked in front of one of the homes, but did not report it to police at the

In an unrelated theft, a woman told police \$2,300 in cash had been taken from her purse. The case was filed Saturday from a residence in the 1000 block of Pasadena.

Another theft report received Friday indicated a pearl necklace had been taken, but the owner, who lives in the 200 block of E. Jefferson, did not know exactly when it occurred.

# City, school meetings set

Members of the city council will decide what action to take on an issue vetoed by the mayor, and school trustees will hear reports from campus principals, at their respective meetings next week.

The city meeting will be at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers and trustees will start their meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

At the Aug. 28 meeting of the council, Mayor Tim Hunter warned aldermen he might veto their action concerning a requested six-month delay to demolish a fire-damaged home at 908 E. Highway.

Aldermen, however, voted unanimously to delay any action by the city against the property owner, Cora Blevins.

Hunter submitted his letter of veto Wednesday to Administrator James Barrington. It was the second time the mayor has exercised his veto power to void action by aldermen.

So, a second "determination hearing" on the property will be held.

Also Monday night, the city will hold a required public hearing on a proposed tax increase which, if finally approved, would raise the 1989-90 tax rate from 84-cents to .885 per \$100 evaluation.

Two ordinances and a proclamation are also on Monday's agenda.

One ordinance would add a chapter to the code for "Emergency Reporting Equipment and Procedures," and the other would increase fees for animal permits and change the effective year dates.

The proclamation would declare Alcohol and Drug Awareness Year in Iowa Park.

### SCHOOL BOARD

School trustees, now that classes have started for the new year, will hear annual reports from each of the school principals, as well as a report on enrollment from Supt. Glen

Trustees will also act on a letter of resignation received from Trustee Gary Fielding, who announced last week his intentions to resign.

An annual task of the board is to act on requests by organizations and classes for field trips and fund-raising activities during the year, which is on the meeting agenda.

An audit agreement with Nayland F. Smith and Associates will receive board action, as will a request for student transfer. The board is expected to call for

a bond election to do approximately \$2.75-million in construction and necessary improvements to buildings during the coming year. Members have spent approximately five months studying proposals.

Also to be considered is a proposal to dismiss school early Sept. 15, in order for students to be able to attend the varsity football game at Abilene Wylie.

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# As I See It ... By BOB HAMILTON



It seems impossible, but it's a fact. With this issue of the Leader, we are completing 20 full years of publication in Iowa Park.

It's an old cliche, but "My, how time does fly!"

I thought it might be interesting to those of you who weren't here, or might not remember, what the news was here back in September of 1969.

Well, our lead story was about the rejection of voters concerning zoning and urban renewal, with fewer than one-third the city's 2,079 eligible voters bothering to cast ballots.

Schools had just opened, after being delayed a week because the new high school building had not been completed on schedule, with 2,041 pupils.

Though classes hadn't started, the Hawks had opened their most successful season ever on Sept. 12 by wholloping Burkburnett 44-7, and were preparing to take on Decatur.

Banking was also in the news,

as it is on today's front page. Stanley Williamson confirmed all 200,000 shares of stock in a new bank he was proposing to start here had been sold. (The charter was never granted by the state banking commission.)

There were three of us on the staff that first issue. Dolores, me, and Annetta Reusch, our typesetter. (Mrs. Reusch is now the journalism instructor at Wichita Falls High.)

We had one wedding story in that Sept. 18 issue. It announced the marriage of Linda Kay Steger and James Robert Merrick. And one of the engagement stories announced the approaching marriage of Lynna Kay Nowell, daughter of then superintendent of schools Faris and Mrs.

And, just like is happening this issue, we announced a meeting for the organization of Camp Fire Girls.

Mike Hickey had just been elected president of the Iowa Park Chapter of Future Farmers. Chuck Dyer was vice president, Duncan Spruiell secretary, Jerry Spruiell treasurer, Mike Kelly reporter and Steve Holder sentinel.



### Restitution not enough



When the Special Called Session of the Texas Legislature drew to a close, the pivotal issue of the session and the reason for Gov. Bill Clements to call the assembly of the legislature, Worker Compensation reform was scheduled for a yes or no vote in the Senate. The vote never happened. The bill was sent to a conference committee for study, effectively killing the bill.

After months of political wrangling, a hand full of trial lawyers in the Senate destroyed all chance of the reform measures becoming law. If only five Senators would change their vote to favor the much needed of the state could move on to greater costs of future awards. economic opportunities.

The problem with our current system was stated by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby at the beginning of the 71st Legislture. He said, "The problem with our Worker Compensation insurance system in Texas is that it does not work and it does not com-

Texas is in the top five states in the amount of premiums paid by business, but in the lowest five in the amount of compensation that injured workers receive. The difference is primarily paid to a host of trial lawyers that, by law, receive onequarter of every dollar paid in compensation to injured workers that retain counsel.

Union allows lawyers to be involved in the Worker Compensation system as in Texas. The other 48 states use administrative hearings and a schedule of benefits to determine the amount of compensation an injured worker receives.

In Texas we have a system called trial de novo. After a perfunctory administrative hearing, either party can file suit in district court and demand a jury trial to determine compensation. With no schedule of benefits as a guide, jury awards vary widely across the state for the same injury.

Because of that uncertainty of reforms in the Worker Compensation award, insurance companies are forced system, then workers and businesses to set high premiums to cover the

Trial lawyers love the present system. They should, they designed it as a lawyer's paradise. They use the threat of a jury trial to coerce insurance companies to settle for higher compensation amounts to stay out of court. To the lawyer it all pays the same, 25 percent plus fees.

This lawyer's relief program is costing Texas jobs and business expansion. In some industries the premium for having a worker in this state as opposed to a neighboring state is over \$5,000 per employee. Many industries are not willing to pay that price to locate in Texas.

It is time to reform our Worker Compensation Insurance system. We cannot let five state Senators stand in the way of that reform. By refusing to vote for reform, they are holding the economic prosperity of Texas hostage to protect their own narrow interests.

### Drivers should be aware of school bus activity

What's yellow and black and has 144 feet? A loaded school bus.

Summer vacation is over and children across the state are returning to school, many aboard big yellow and black school buses. One of the most common sights on our roadways during the school year, these buses can carry from 71 to 83 seated students on any given trip each

"Yet as common as they are, every year there seems to be an unfortunate rash of accidents caused by drivers who fail to follow safe driving practices for a stopped school bus," stated Major Vernon Cathon, Regional Commander for the Texas Dept. of Public Safety.

State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children, to also stop until the bus driver has turned off the flashing red lights. This rule applies unless the vehicle is separated from the bus by a divided highway with a median strip.

The first few weeks of school are the most dangerous, according to Major Cawthon. "This time of the year presents safety problems for both the school children and the driver," he explained. "Many youngsters are attending school for the first time and others might be going to a different school, where they are unfamiliar with local traffic conditions. One problem seems to be that during the summer recess, some drivers have gotten out of the habit

of being alert for both school zones and school buses."

Public Safety officials are asking Texas drivers to begin thinking now about the safety of our school children, as the beginning of a new school year starts up. By observing the speed limits in school zones, being alert for increased pedestrian traffic, and watching for school bus activity, we can make this a safe school year for all.

### Rail crossing deaths down

Auto-train collisions at Texas highway rail-crossings are down 22 percent for the first three months of the year and Rep. Charles Finnell credits his safety legislation for much of the improvement.

Figures just released by the Texas Railroad Commission reported 145 auto-train accidents at rail-crossings in the first quarter of 1989, resulting in 15 deaths.

There were 186 accidents resulting in 18 deaths during the same period last year.

Finnell said his Rail-Crossing Safety Information Act has greatly reduced the number of auto-train accidents statewide by helping to report dangerous conditions at crossings on state highways.

The law established a statewide toll-free telephone number for reporting stolen or damaged crossing signals or other hazardous conditions at crossings.





HAWKS FIRE OUT ON SCRIMMAGE PLAY AGAINST OLNEY DEFENSE

# Improved Hawks topple Cubs

It was a much-improved green and white club that took the field Friday night, when the Hawks held their final pre-season scrimmage against a good club at Olney.

The improvement, over the previous week's scrimmage against Holliday, was mainly in the offensive line's blocking.

Iowa Park's varsity outscored its host team 2-1, had 295 total yards offense in 50 plays to Olney's 194, and led 16-9 in first downs. The Hawks rushed for 222 yards and picked up the other 73 passing. Olney was allowed 170 yards rushing and 24 passing.

Olney also lost the ball twice on turnovers, but the Hawks lost the ball only once. All turnovers were on fumbles.

To cap off the scrimmage, each varsity team was given the ball five plays to score from the five-yard line. Iowa Park scored three times, twice on runs and once on a pass. On the other two plays, the Hawks were two yards short of the goal line, and lost a fumble on the fifth. Olney was unable to score on any of its five plays.

And, like the previous scrimmage session, it was no contest for the Hawk freshman and junior varsity teams. Olney, extremely thin in its underclassman ranks, as was Holliday, had to

use its JV subs against Iowa Park's freshmen, and the same quarterback had to go through both sets.

The Frosh scored twice while holding Olney scoreless, and led in first downs 9-4. Both teams lost the ball once on turnovers, Iowa Park with a fumble and Olney by interception.

Three of the JV's first downs were touchdowns, and the defense held Olney to only one first down. Iowa Park didn't turn over the ball, but Olney lost a fumble and an interception.

Four Iowa Parkans were on the sidelines before the evening ended, including three varsity and one JV. However, none of the injuries were considered serious.

Bunkie Imboden sprained an ankle, Jimmy Duggins bruised a shoulder, and Gary Green sat out the last session with a bruised thigh. JV starter Greg Steger also sprained an ankle.

The first-unit varsity offense racked up 97 yards rushing, 47 passing on its first 20-play possession, and scored once. Olney, against the first-unit Hawk defense, was allowed 68 rushing and 13 passing. The Cubs scored on the final play.

Iowa Park's second-unit offense cruised 114 yards on the ground and added 17 passing, also scoring on the final play. Olney was held to 66 rushing and 11 passing, and no score.

During the last set with the ball, which was a 10-play series, the Hawk first platoon ran only three times, picking up 11 yards, and connected on but one of five pass attempts for nine yards. Olney picked up 36 yards rushing and did not complete its only pass attempt.








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

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

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# Volunteers search for fishermen who didn't drown

More than 30 persons became involved in a search for three possible drowning victims Sunday morning at Lake Buffalo, before finding their efforts were for naught.

Iowa Park Police Dept. radio dispatcher was notified at 3:36 a.m. that a man and two young boys had gone to the lake Saturday afternoon to do some fishing, and had not returned to their home in Burkburnett.

The father of one boy had gone to the lake, found the man's pickup and boat trailer, but not the trio, and turned in the report.

Members of the Iowa Park and Electra volunteer fire departments were summoned to lead the search which, by sunrise, included deputies from the sheriff's department, the county's mobile emergency command post, and even the Red Cross canteen.

Three boats were launched before dawn to scan the shoreline and several mobile units combed the roads and possible camping sites around the large lake.

And family members patiently awaited whatever news searchers had, taking up watch next to the pickup and trailer.

Mrs. Zoltan Szaloky said her husband and son, Jeffery, 14, had gone to the lake with Michael Woods, 13, about 3 Saturday afternoon, and had said nothing about staying the night.

The Steve Woods became concerned about 2:30 a.m., and went to search for the threesome. It was he who turned in the report to police.

"We've been in situations before when we stayed out on the water (of a lake) at night when it became too dark to find our way back to the landing site," Mrs. Szaloky said, as she patiently waited news.

The search boats combed the shoreline more than three hours, and then returned to the base to await the sunrise. Their lights had been unable to pick up any sign of the boat and

Shortly after sunlight, one of the boats headed back on its search, and soon after, another boat was seen heading to the launching site. It was the three fishermen.

Mrs. Szaloky was standing at the shore when the boat beached. Her words could be heard a couple of hundred yards up the hill, where the emergency command post was stationed.




