**Iowa Park Man Wins Combat Badge**

Sgt. 1st Class Royce Barton, husband of Mrs. Alyne Barton, Box 144, Iowa Park, has been awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge in Korea while serving as an infantryman with the 7th Cavalry regiment.

This badge, which is only awarded frontline combat infantrymen, distinguishes the actual fighting man from the rear area and service troops in a combat zone. A soldier must be a member of an infantry regiment to be eligible to receive it.

The badge itself consists of a miniature replica of a Revolutionary flintlock rifle on a rectangular blue background superimposed over a wreath. It is worn by the soldier over his left breast pocket above his campaign ribbons.

Then the boys visited another dairyman, Floyd Hunkle, who had only three acres in the entire dairy. He is milking 16 cows and showing a nice profit. He stressed management and feeding.
