Whoop-T-Do is Saturday

The 18th annual edition of the Whoop-T-Do, sponsored by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, is set to get underway at 9 a.m. Saturday in the area of Wall and Cash Streets.

The day-long activity was created by the Chamber of Commerce for two main purposes: to give persons who come back to Iowa Park for the annual homecoming event something to do between the Friday night football game and the Saturday night banquet; and the activity would be a carnival-like event at which nonprofit organizations of the community could hold their major fundraising activities.

Stevens will have on display his works from his Stompin' Grounds Gallery.

Hawks' opponent ranked among top teams in state

The Hawks will take on their first state-ranked opponent of the year Friday night in the '89 homecoming contest.

The Gainesville Leopards have been ranked among the top 10 Class AAA teams of Texas all year, even after dropping their first contest last

Kickoff time in Hawk Stadium is 8 p.m.

Iowa Park holds a 4-3 edge over the Leopards in their previous seven meetings, despite a disappointing 28-10 loss at Gainesville last year. The two teams first met here in 1972, with the visitors winning 33-24.

This isn't the same team Iowa Park faced last year, however. Of the 28 players listed on the Leopard roster, there are 11 seniors and seven sophomores.

And two of those seniors likely will not be playing tomorrow, including tailback Donald Lorne, who was the team's leading gainer against the Hawks last year.

Donald, who has a twin brother Ronald on the squad, sustained a knee injury in the third quarter of their 47-0 romp at Burkburnett two weeks ago, and isn't expected to be back in

But before he left the game, he had carried 13 times for 76 yards and scored a touchdown. He had 245 total yards before being lost.

The Leopards lost another valuable back in the same game. Neal Searcy, against Burkburnett, rushed for 149 yards, caught a 36-yard TD pass, and after being switched over to quarterback from wingback, threw a pair of touchdown passes.

But there are still five more backs on the Leopard roster, including sophomore sensation Paul Oatts, who had a 67-yard touchdown run among his six carries for 109 yards at

And last week, in their 29-28 loss to undefeated Allen, Oatts carried 24 times for 11 yards and two touchdowns, as well as being credited with making six tackles and covering a

The Leopards edged Dallas Hillcrest of Dist. 11-AAAA in their sea-







As I See It ... By BOB HAMILTON

This being the 20th anniversary of Iowa Park's first state championship in football, I'm somewhat disappointed that a reunion of that outstanding group of men was not arranged for homecoming Friday.

It would have been appropriate.

But while the memories of that glorious fall are still reasonably fresh, I realize there are a wealth of people living here now who didn't follow the '69 Hawks on their path to glory.

Let me tell you some about the team, and it was a team.

They started off by kicking the

stuffing out of Burkburnett, 44-7, and Decatur, 34-7, before a squeaker here with Hirschi.

The Huskies were well inside the Hawks' five yard line and apparently were going to score, when a jarring tackle shook the ball loose and a Hawk covered it, all with less than 30 seconds remaining in the game.

Obviously, the Hawks, who went undefeated that season, won. The final outcome was Iowa Park 21, Hirschi 14.

Close? Exciting? It sure was! So much so, that a Hirschi fan died of a heart attack in the stands, just about the time the final buzzer sounded.

We laid claim to being the overall high school state champions that season, because Hirschi was the only team to beat the Coyotes of Wichita Falls High, which won the big school championship that same year.

Then, the Hawks wiped out Wellington 68-6, Seymour 53-7, Electra 41-0, Memphis 80-8, Childress 41-14, Quanah 63-0, and wound up the regular schedule on a bitterly-cold

night at Shamrock, 31-6. By the way, Childress coach Charley Johnson has never agreed to play Iowa Park in a non-conference game since that season.

The Hawks humbled Dalhart 61-16 for bi-district and Floydada 35-6

year was on another cold night, at Lubbock, when they met Reagan County in the quarterfinals. The score was 7-7. The Hawks were behind in the statistics and had lost starting quarterback Jim Clapp with a concussion.

Then, junior tailback Jeff Mc-Donald was called to run an end sweep around the left side. Every player on the field converged about the left end position, it seemed, but no one was on the ground and the whistle hadn't blown.

All of a sudden, the smallest player, McDonald, burst out of the 22-player cluster and dashed more than 50 yards to score, and the Hawks advanced to the semi-finals with a 14-7 victory.

Their next-to-last game of the season was played on the field at Midwestern State Univ., against Jacksboro, which was then coached by Dan Owens, now superintendent of Holliday schools.

Owens' team had just earned him his 100th career victory by defeating Gladewater 9-7.

As usual, it attracted a standing room only crowd. And, also as usual, the Hawks won -- 21-0.

Then, the state championship was set up with Houston Klein, a team which also had walked across

all comers and, according to all the big-town experts, were just too much for little ole Iowa Park. They had players who allegedly could start as freshmen the following season for any Southwest Conference school.

It was played in the University of Arlington stadium, and it was so foggy that punts disappeared. Even the fans in the stands could hardly make out what was taking place on the field, and certainly couldn't see those in the upper seats on the oppo-

Well, obviously, Iowa Park won and handily, 31-14.

If you've not been doing your addition, the Hawks outscored their opponents in those 15 games, 638-

Like I said, it would be most fitting to have the team's members here for this particular weekend.

Besides the 20th anniversary, the Hawks are going into Friday's game with a perfect, 4-0 record.

City, School meetings set

* consider new applications for student transfers;



Hawks shear Rams, 21-13

Iowa Park effectively combined ball control and tenacious defense to beat Mineral Wells, 21-13, before a delighted near-capacity crowd Friday night in Hawk Stadium.

The Hawks extended their season record to 4-0 by executing 70 offensive plays, of which Matthew Blackman carried 40 times and caught two passes, to the Rams' 48. Blackman finished the game with 179 yards rushing and tacked on 17 more on pass receptions.

Meanwhile the hard-hitting Mean Green defense claimed five turnovers, two fumbles covered by Chuck Brown and the others by Mike Dungan and Michael Arredondo, and an interception by Jimmy Nicholson.

So effective was the defense that the Rams' quarterback, John Ruelas, a third-year starter who last season completed 88 of 176 passes for 1,137 and came into Friday's contest with 24 completions out of 44 attempts, was held to only six of 18 for 87 yards.

The Hawks scored twice in the first half, including the first time they had their hands on the ball. Starting from their own 39 yard line, the Hawks called on Blackman to carry eight times and catch a 10-yard pass, with one carry by Marc Cruz mixed into the series, before sending Blackman over right guard the final two yards to score.

Blackman scored again with 56 seconds remaining in the second quarter, this time on a fiveyard plunge. The drive was set up by Nicholson's interception on the Hawk 18.

Mineral Wells, on that series, had driven to the Iowa Park four yard line where, on third down, the Rams were penalized five yards on a motion penalty, and then lost nine yards when Chuck Brown and Kelly McClure broke through the line of blockers and pounced on the carrier.


Possession of the ball would change hands five more times before the teams went to the dressing rooms at halftime.

McClure grounded his kickoff following the last Iowa Park TD, bouncing it off a Ram lineman, which Arredondo covered on the 50 yard line. Three plays later, a pass from Jimmy Duggins bounced out of Bruce Palmer's hands and was caught by a Mineral Wells player, who returned it to the Hawk 25. Three plays later, with six ticks remaining on the clock, the Rams attempted a 42yard field goal, which fell short. And Palmer took the snap from center to kill the remaining time.

It didn't take long for the margin in the score to be narrowed, once the teams returned to play the second half. In fact, only 32 seconds and four plays, as the Rams scored on a 40-yard run and kicked the extra point.

The two teams exchanged possession twice before Duggins punted to the Ram 23 yard line. On the second play, Brown claimed his second fumble at the visitors' 30. Five plays later, Blackman bulled his way over from about the one-inch line. Cruz had almost scored on the previous play, carrying 15 yards around end.

Mineral Wells caused tension in the stands during the last four minutes of the contest, by scoring on an 84-yard drive with 1:26 left on the clock on an 11-yard pass play. But a pass attempt for two points failed. And had the Hawks not been able to pick up a first down after the following kickoff, on a drive that started from their own 12, the Rams were still a threat to pull the game out of the fire.

But two carries by Blackman, sandwiching a six-yarder by Duggins, who was limping badly with a twisted ankle, ate up both Mineral Wells' remaining times out, as well as time on the clock.

The Rams had threatened to score early in the final period. They had returned the Hawk kickoff near the end of the third quarter to the Mineral Wells 42. The drive, with the help of an unusual 15-yard penalty against the Hawk coaching staff for being in the way of the line official, advanced to the Hawk 27. On fourth down and needing one yard for a first, Chuck Brown and Robert Cargal set the runner back for a two-yard loss, and the Hawks took over the

Two key Hawk backs were not suited out for the game: David Slack with a rib injury, and Brian Luney, a sprained ankle.

Cruz carried nine times for the Hawks, and gained 25 yards. Duggins picked up 26 yards on five carries; Nicholson two for five, Palmer (who took

over quarterback to relieve Duggins because Luney is the backup signal caller) gained seven yards on three carries, and Bunkie Imboden one for two yards.

Palmer snagged two passes for 24 yards, while tight end Stephen Brown caught one for eight. Because of turnovers and stalled drives, there were only three punts in the entire game: two

Kidwell improvements explained

Projected cost of improvements at Kidwell Elementary has been set at

One of the major expenditures is for a project which has been discussed more than 10 years by the local school trustees: a physical education structure that can double as a shelter for students in case of a tornado or extremely dangerous storm.

The structure, along with a music room, library, office and storage space is projected to cost \$314,000.

Trustees have long recognized the fact that the Kidwell building has more exterior glass than any other structure in the district, and the hallways are simply not enough protection in case of a dangerous storm.

The PE building is designed to withstand a direct strike by a tornado funnel, once a dirt berm is completed around its exterior, as is the design of the similar structure erected a few years ago at the Bradford campus.

But the space would be utilized as a recreation and exercise area for students when the weather does not permit students to utilize the playground. A classroom is now being used for that purpose, which would be freed for instructional usage when the PE building is completed.

Student comfort also would be improved with the renovation funds, primarily by enclosing the covered walkway that extends the full width of the building's front.

Students, during cold or blowing rain periods, must wear coats just to reach the school cafeteria. Enclosing the walkway would create a comforta-

Cost of enclosing that area is estimated at \$40,000.

The music and library rooms also would free space currently used, and allow for the projected growth of enrollment.

The campus currently has 479 students. Enrollment has grown steadily from 425 in 1985-86 to 469 in 1986-87 to a high of 485 in 1987-88. It decreased to 478 last year, but projections are for that number to rise to at least 490 over the next five


Without more current census figures than every 10 years, when it is done by the federal government, school officials have only previousyear figures on which to base their estimations. This is unlike projecting enrollments at the other campuses, where in-school attendance is

The district constructed, out of existing funds, four classrooms and two rest rooms on the south wing a few years ago, hoping that would take care of the building's space needs. However, their estimations of enrollment fell short, and space is already a major problem.

"Lack of space," points out Ron Woods, school principal, is a major need of the facility. "The proposed addition will give us a work room for the teachers, a volunteer work room, and additional office space for the

A portion of the present entry area would be taken in for the secretary's office, as well as the teacher workroom. At present, the secretary's office walls are lined with stacks of boxes and papers, allowing only for a walk area.

The same is true for the principal's office. Graduate teaching students benefits of 'just saying no'

An Iowa Park High School graduate is taking on a sideline to his work as a lawman, teaching.

But he's not instructing the skills of being a lawman, rather the benefits of staying away from drugs and alcohol.

Sgt. Danny Sargent, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Sargent of Iowa Park, is a security policeman with the Military Air Command at Scott AFB near Freeburg, Ill.

Freeburg Elementary School is one of four school districts in St. Clair County which has been selected to operate "Project D.A.R.E." and is sponsored jointly by the Illinois State Police, Illinois Board of Education and Dept. of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse.

Project D.A.R.E., according to an article in the Sept. 21 issue of The Freeburg Tribune, is to "help students recognize and resist the many subtle pressures that influence them to experiment with alcohol and marijuana. In addition, program strategies are planned to focus on feeling and relating to self-esteem, interpersonal and communication skills, decision making, and positive alternatives to drug abuse behavior."

Scott AFB is loaning to the

school the services of Sgt. Sargent, who will teach sixth graders once a week for 17 weeks at the Carl L. Barton School.

He will talk about the different types of drugs and their effects and consequences, while covering resisting pressures to use drugs, building self esteem, assertiveness, managing stress without taking drugs, decision making, alternatives, support systems, intimidation and peer pressure.

Sargent will also speak to other classes of other grades," the article said. "In addition, he will meet with teachers in the lounge and children in the cafeteria and on the playground. Already, Sgt. Sargent is quite popular with the students as he eats lunch with them and joins them in play at

D.A.R.E. was founded in 1983 as a cooperative effort between the Los Angeles Unified School District and Los Angeles Police Dept. The program has reached three-million students in grades five and six and this year will be taught in 50,000 classrooms in all 50 states.

Dr. Clarence Haege, superintendent of Freeburg schools, said, "In no way do we suspect a drug or alcohol problem in our school, but we must do all that we can in order to prevent any problem developing. This is the goal of D.A.R.E. We believe that ur school is fortunate to have Sgt. Danny Sargent and the D.A.R.E. Program in our school."

"We recommend that customers avoid using the telephone during electrical storms," said Adams. " We use protective measures to limit electrical surges entering your home, but absolute protection from lightning is impossible."

The company used a variety of techniques to protect phone users from electric and acoustic shock. Since Southwestern Bell Telephone does not sell customer premises equipment, protective measures are limited to the local network.

Central offices and telephone lines exposed to lightning are equipped with protective devices designed to conduct excessive current harmlessly to the ground, according to Adams.

However, when lightning strikes, extremely high energy and voltage is unleashed, making it virtually impossible in the event of a nearby lightning strike to ensure complete protection from this powerful natural phenomenon.

"We use insulating materials in telephone wires and a grounder shield surrounds the outside cables. The interface connecting outside wiring to a customer's inside wiring also is grounded to prevent an electrical surge into the customer's premise,"

said Adams. "The bonding of the telephone ground, power system ground and metallic materials in the home, such as pipes, help prevent the build-up of voltage between any two of them."

As a general rule, electrical parts of a telephone are wrapped in insulation to eliminate obvious shock hazards, explains Adams. A phone, as a low-voltage, low-current device, is no way comparable in hazard risk to home appliances operating on household current.

"Southwestern Bell Telephone has no record of recent claims (withing the past 10 years) involving electrical shock during a thunderstornm" Adams said. Such claims are very rare.



First United Methodist Church observing 100 years in Iowa Park

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is a reprint of the First United Methodist Church's 100 year anniversay booklet, edited by Annetta Reusch.)

One hundred years of Christian Service through worship, education community service, and fellowship will be celebrated this year by the First United Methodist Church of Iowa Park.

Organization

Methodism started in Texas around 1850 near Clarksville, but Wichita County was not organized until 1881. In 1887, the Ft. Worth and Denver Railway had built a section house west of the small town of Wichita Falls and named it Dagget Switch was changed to Iowa Park. Only one year after the creation of the mission, the preaching point at Dagget Switch that same year, but remained a mission until it became a self-supporting church in 1907. Even then it remained a circuit for some years.

Two Churches

In 1889 there were two Methodist Churches in Iowa Park as a result of the separation in the church caused by the differing ideologies concerning slavery. The North Church was located north of the railroad tracks with James P. Dimmit as pastor, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was located south of the tracks at the corner of South Wall and Lafayette. The parsonage was on the corner, across the street and one block west of the church.

The session of the North Texas Conference, which convened in Greenville in the fall of 1889 and which was presided over by Bishop Joseph S. Key, created a new charge in the conference, which was called Red River Mission. In that charge was included Iowa Park, and the charge embraced Wichita County except Wichita Falls and Allendale. The church was organized some time during 1889, and the Rev. R.M. Kerr supplied the charge that year with Rev. W.W. May as presiding elder of the Montague district, in which Wichita County was located at the time.

Name Changed

At the next session of the conference, at Texarkana, Bishop Atticus G. Haygood presiding, the name of the charge was changed to Iowa Park Mission, and the Rev. L.L. Naugle was named as preacher in charge, with W.S. May again presiding elder. An allocation of \$300 was made for the Iowa Park Mission by the conference that year. In 1891, when the conference was held in Terrell with Bishop Hendrix presiding, the Rev. T.J. Minnis was appointed to the Iowa Park Mission, and the Rev. W.S. May was again returned as the presiding elder. The journal reports that \$75 was paid as an appropriation which meant the money was for a building since it came from church extension. The mission showed 195 members.

In 1892, the conference was held in Sherman with Bishop Hargrove presiding. The Rev. T.H. Morris was appointed to the Iowa Park Mission, and the Rev. R.M. Powers was named presiding elder. Methodist journals show that the mission had a building worth \$1,500, a parsonage worth \$200 and other church property worth \$300. The pastor's salary was shown as \$240.85.

"On Sunday mornings, the sound of the church bell mingled with sounds from other church bells and made beautiful music which remains in the memory of those who heard it. On the way to church, we passed the livery stable and the Christian Church and walked under a grove of bois d'arc trees," Eunice Sewell said.

"Two brothers were given the duty of ringing the bell in the old church. Sometimes they would allow their little sister to ride the rope up. These brothers were also given the task of cleaning the church," Mrs. Sewell said.

In 1893, the conference convened in Wichita Falls, Bishop A.W. Wilson presiding. The Rev. W.D. Mountcastle was appointed presiding elder of the Montague district, and the Rev. T.J. Minnis was reappointed to the Iowa Park Mission.

The sessions of the conference convening at Bonham in 1894, at Gainesville in 1895 and Paris in 1896 each appointed the Rev. C.C. Williams to the Iowa Park Mission with W.D. Mountcastle, presiding elder the first two years and Rev. F.O. Miller the last year.

District Changed

In the fall of 1895, the name of the district was changed from Montague to Bowie. The conference held at Dallas in 1897 with Bishop Granbury presiding, Greenville in 1889 with Bishop Galloway presiding and at Honey Grove in 1899 with Bishop Hargove presiding sent the Rev. I.N. Crutchfield (Uncle Ike) for three successive years to the Iowa Park Mission. The Rev. F.O. Fuller was presiding elder the first two years, and Rev. E.W. Alderson was presiding elder

The Rev. C.C. Davis was appointed to serve Iowa Park in 1900 by Bishop Candler at the Denton Conference. He served four successive years. The Reverends J.M. Peterson, F.O. Miller and T.R. Pierce were presiding elders. During these days, pastors of the church were also Circuit Riders to surrounding Missions. Some of those served by Iowa Park pastors included Beaver Creek, Bacon Switch and Weeth School. Iowa Park pastors who served thee missions were T.J. Minnes, C.C. Williams, I.N. Crutchfield, C.C. Davis and F.L. McGehee.

Monument dedicated to Circuit Riders

A bronze marker was placed at Beaver Creek Cemetery to mark the graves of early day Methodist ministers who served the circuit as a part of the United Methodist Bicentennial Aug. 6, 1985. Rev. D.J. Powell (Thelma Gay's grandfather), Rev. C.C. Davis (Mrs. Eunice Sewell's father) and Rev. C.C. Williams (Delbert Todd's great-grandfather) are included.

The conference at Bonham in 1904 appointed the Rev. John Moore, and Rev. F.L. McGehee served the charge in 1906-07. During this time, the missionary appropriation was discontinued and the charge became selfsupporting. The Rev. C.P. Martin was appointed to the charge in 1908 and served two years. It was during his ministry that the old frame building was torn down, and the first brick church building in Iowa Park was erected at the present site of the church.

The church was built on land donated by Bradley Winfrey that was centrally located near the business section of town and, at that time, was considered the most modern brick building for a house of worship. Mr. Winfrey was unhappy when part of the land was sold to a lumber yard. His sons Charlie and Homer hauled river sand to be used in the church building. This building consisted of a large auditorium, pastor's study and two separate Sunday school rooms. A modern parsonage was also erected at that time near the church. At the time of its erection this brick church building, a 67x70 ft. structure, was one of the best in the county outside of the city of Wichita Falls and adequately

served the congregation. Stained Glass Windows

Mr. Winfrey also donated one of the stained glass windows found in the present church. Other windows were donated by Mrs. Mattie Parker, Iowa Park Lumber Co., Iowa Park Lodge #407 K of P, The Working Juniors, The Philothea Class, Iowa Park Lodge 713 AF&AM, Iowa Park Gin Co., The Bargea Class and the Juvenile Workers. The Busy Bee window on the north side of the church was given by a group of little girls in Mrs. Cummins (Lula) Ralston's class who earned money selling candy Mrs. Ralston made.

Early Records

Hellen Elizabeth Crutchfield and Martha Elizabeth Moore were recorded as the first baptised in the church in 1899 and 1900 respectively, and the little son of C.H. Clark was the first funeral in the new church in 1911.

The church I remember was a red brick building with stained glass windows, and, as I recall, entrances were on the east and west about where the stairs are now. The ceiling wasn't as high, and there was no upstairs. A partition in the center could be raised or lowered. Long curved pews and a large choir loft completed the church. Two large coal stoves provided heat, and two large lamps were still hanging from the ceiling even though they had gotten electricity in about 1913. If the electricity went off, it might be off for 12 hours or longer. East of the church was a water well, barn and parsonage.

"After the remodeling in about 1926, a stage was built on the east side of the church. A door opened out on the stage where the choir and the pulpit were located. They would roll a piano onto the stage from the church. Long wooden benches were placed facing the stage. The seats were very uncomfortable and a lot of people would bring pillows to sit on," Elgin Denny said.

The Rev. H.B. Johnson served the church for four years from 1910-1913. He was succeeded by Rev. W.E. Barbee. The Rev. T.R. Pierce was returned as presiding elder in 1904-1906 with the Rev. J.E. Roach serving four years and Rev. T.H. Morris four years. It was in 1910 at conference that the Wichita Falls district was created. When the conference met at Bonham in 1915 with Bishop McCoy presiding, the Rev. Sam Barcus was named presiding elder and served four years. The Rev. P.S. Warren served this charge in 1915, being succeeded by the Rev. A.P. Bradford who resigned about the middle of the year. he was followed by the Rev. L.L. Carter who served until 1917 and was followed by the Rev. O.E. Moreland who remained two years.

In 1918, the name became Iowa Park Circuit including Burkburnett and Electra. The conference which met at McKinney in 1920 with Bishop Ainesworth presiding sent the Rev. C.W. Dennis to Iowa Park. He served the charge for three years. Rev. H.C. Hand succeeded the Rev. Dennis and served four years. It was during his tenure that the red brick structure was remodeled and expanded. The rapid growth that was experienced from 1918 to 1926 caused the church to seek some relief so that they could "do the work that was expected of us." Jerry M. Schaefer of Wichita Falls was employed as architect to design a new building.

New Building

The new structure built on East Bank Street on land donated by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Kolp covered an area 100X112 feet, was two stories high with modern basement for coal, storage and heating plant only. The sanctuary included a stained glass window in the choir loft depicting a life-size Jesus, the good shepherd. It was donated in memory of John R. Pace and Lula Pace by their five sons. The structure had a seating capacity of 700 with an overflow into adjoining Sunday school rooms and 30 rooms equipped with "modern equipment and facilities of the very best type of religious instruction." The building of 1910 constituted the basic area of the new sanctuary. A modern kitchen was provided with an electric stove and other conveniences.

The building was dedicated April 11, 1926, by Bishop John M. Moore.

The Woman's Missionary Society under the leadership of Mrs. J.B. Sisk, was responsible for the carpeting of the aisles and rostrum and for the landscaping of the grounds of the church. They also repapered the parsonage and helped to buy a bedroom suit and a piano.

Membership of the church at the time of dedication stood at 350. The building valued at \$50,000 was fully paid for, and the annual church budget was \$10,000.

Leagues

Three areas of work during the twenties included leagues organized through the church. The Senior League was organized in 1901 and reactivated in 1919 with Mrs. Curtis Sewell as president. The Junior League was started in 1915 with Mrs. D.E. Holcomb as the superintendent. The Junior League was later called the Epworth League. Mrs. Walter Denny became the superintendent in

The youth of the church would work up plays and take them to other towns such as Byers. A small fee was charged for putting them on, and the money we made helped to buy pews for the church," Thelma Gay said.

In September, 1927, what is believed to be the largest number of certificates ever claimed by a single congregation in the Southern Methodist Church were awarded to 302 members by the Rev. Paul E. Martin at exercises closing the Standard Training School at the Iowa Park Methodist Church. Community Service

Community Service has always been a part of the Methodist Church, and in 1943, one of the highlights was the program to pay tribute to the 292 people who were serving in the armed forces. The patriotic ceremony featured a service flag of slipper satin made by Mmes. J.M. George, M.O. Cheves, Hugh Thompson, and J.E. Keller. It was bordered in red and contained 285 blue stars representing those in service, and the seven gold stars placed in the form of a cross in the center of the flag represented the two that had lost their lives and the five reported missing. The words "For God, Home, and Country" completed the flag.

The Woman's Missionary Society was organized in 1900 with Mrs. Jeff Waggoner as leader, and the women have contributed greatly to the work of the church since that time. They had the responsibility to buy the pews and piano for the new church in 1910. This was accomplished under the leadership of Mrs. T.D. Phillips. Another outstanding leader of the Women's Society was Mrs. C.H. Clark. During the joining together of the home Mission and Foreign Mission Societies, her able leadership helped bridge the trying time.

The WMS has provided services to the community of Iowa Park since. A food booth at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair providing pies was just one of the ways of serving. The Wesleyan Service Guild also provided a way for the women to be involved in the community.

One of the places to be on Tuesdays in 1933 was at lunch at the Methodist Church for the Noon Lions Club. People came from miles around to eat the wonderful home-cooked meals provided by the Women's Missionary Society under the direction of Mrs. L.H. Teal, Food for the meals was donated by church members and members of the community, and women had to carry blocks of ice and sometimes kill and dress the chickens for the meal.

"This sounds like a lot of work, but we had fun, and I feel blessed that I had the privilege of working in the church with women, especially the older women, who were an inspiration to me because of their dedication and faithfulness to the church," Elsie Sullivan said.

They continued to serve the Lions until 1952, and under the leadership of Maggie Mahler, the Christian Workers Class continued to serve breakfasts, luncheons, dinners and banquets. They also served turkey dinner in November for the public, sometimes feeding 600 people.

"Maggie was a good leader. She worked harder than anyone but was always cheerful and comfortable to be around, and we had a good time. When we were about finished in the kitchen, she would dance a little for us, and we would

laugh and forget our aching feet," Elsie added. The Mens' Fellowship which was organized in 1928, met for breakfast and provided services to the church and to the membership. Pancake suppers were a common way to raise money, and the men bought lawn mowers and sponsored basketball teams and Boy Scout troops.

"We had the prettiest suits in town. Maybe not the best players, but the prettiest suits," Wayne House said.

"I remember that we had some activity at the church almost every night, and we went in groups to someone's home on Sunday for lunch," J.C. Ralston

said. New Parsonage

A new parsonage was built in 1952. It was brick veneer with eight rooms, two baths, a breezeway and a double garage and was valued at \$25,000. The Rev. Guy E. Pardue was the pastor at the time. The parsonage was dedicated Feb. 22, 1953, debt free. Again, the Woman's Missionary Society provided many of the furnishings.

At the same time, new hardwood floor was put in the church at midyear at a cost of about \$4,800. Some of the French doors were removed to be replaced with permanent walls.

"Rev. Kirk Beard was the last pastor to live in the old parsonage. After he and his wife moved in, Miles Hines and I went over to see about some repair work that needed to be done. During the 1940's and 1950's, the choirs were especially active. Choirs included graded choirs from the very young to the senior choir. Besides cantatas, the senior choir instituted a money-making project - a yearly Mexican Fiesta. Money derived from this project was given to the church. Fellowship Hall

The fellowship hall, kitchen, classrooms, and the connecting hallway to the sanctuary were built in 1957. It was at this same time that a chapel was built within the original structure. Dr. and Mrs. Gordon Clark provided the funds for this chapel, and it was dedicated to the memory of their son, Randolph Duvall Clark. Mrs. Charles (Harriett) Coppock gave an organ for the chapel in memory of her husband. Included in the construction was air conditioning for the sanctuary. The 5,600 square feet of new building housed the church offices, the pastor's study, two nurseries, four classrooms, a chapel, a choir room, a large kitchen, and the fellowship hall with a capacity of aproximately 200. These additions were consecrated Feb. 2, 1958 and dedicated debt free in 1970. The structure was built by Carl E. Sullivan.

On April 23, 1968, the Methodist Church joined with the Evangelical United Brethren Church to form the second largest church in Protestantism-the United Methodist Church.

Renovation The remodeling of the sanctuary in 1975 at a cost of \$170,000 brought the structure to its present beauty and included the addition of the cross-topped copper steeple donated by W.M. (Bill) Owens. Modern mouldings and white paint were added to brighten the interior, and the sanctuary was recarpeted and pew cushions were added. The French doors upstairs were removed, and the choir loft was enlarged. A bride's room was included along the restrooms near the entrance of the church. The Rev. Boyd Sawyer and Rev. Jim Connatser were pastors of the church during the renovation. John Mixon was chairman of the building committee. Indebtedness on the remodeling was paid off in December 1978.

Improvements

A bank of chimes was given by the W.F. George family in 1963 in memory of their daughter Hazel Larimer. The chapel was refurbished by the United Methodist Women in 1983. A new Baldwin electronic organ was donated in the memory of Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Owens in 1979. The library was also refurbished at that time in their memory. A mural by Mrs. Travis Smith was given by the Chrisitan Workers Class in memory of her husband in 1982. A two-octave set of hand bells was donated to the church in 1983 by the Ted Anderson family in memmory of their son, Steve. A third octave was added in 1987. A circular driveway and covered entrance were added to the rear of the structure in 1987-88. The nursery was remodeled in 1989.

The present facilities include 16,800 square feet. Membership stands at 453, and the operating budget is \$102,197. A full-time director of family ministries was employed in 1989, and, as a result, the youth program has expanded to include community service through the Adopt a Highway program, delivering Meals on Wheels as well as improved activities. Community Service is continued by the United Methodist Women through assistance to the state hospital and missionary work to other lands.

As a direct influence of the church, six young members entered the ministry. These were Bob McDonald (1944), Betty Hatten Jackson (1947), Mike Thornberry (1962), Larry George (1964), Don Yeager (1971), David Whittington (1979) and Billy Ray (1979).

Many people in the service of the Lord have given of themselves during the last 100 years so that the First United Methodist Church of Iowa Park still stands as a monument of Christian Service through worship, education, community service and fellowship.

To commemorate this occasion, a meditation garden will be dedicated to the many fine people who have served God through the First United Methodist Church of Iowa Park. **Pastors**






