Chamber directors vote to support bond issue

The \$2.75-million school bond proposal got a boost Monday when the Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted their support.

An unanimous vote approving a motion "to support passage" of the bond election was counted following an informative address by school board president Jerry Reed.

While explaining the major needs of the school district over the next five years, based on a 10-month study, Reed said the bonds will be used to improve education which also will help the community.

"A great number of people move to Iowa Park rather than somewhere else in the area, because of our schools and the education their child-

ren can receive here," Reed said. Reed admitted, however, that the additional classroom space and other improvements have been based on projections of known student population, and does not take into consideration any additional families moving into the district who might be involved in the closing of Chanute AFB and transferring to Sheppard AFB.

In other business, Chamber president Kenneth Via appointed members to two committees.

To serve with him on the nominations committee are Gene Jordan, Jan Clapp and Leon Stevenson.

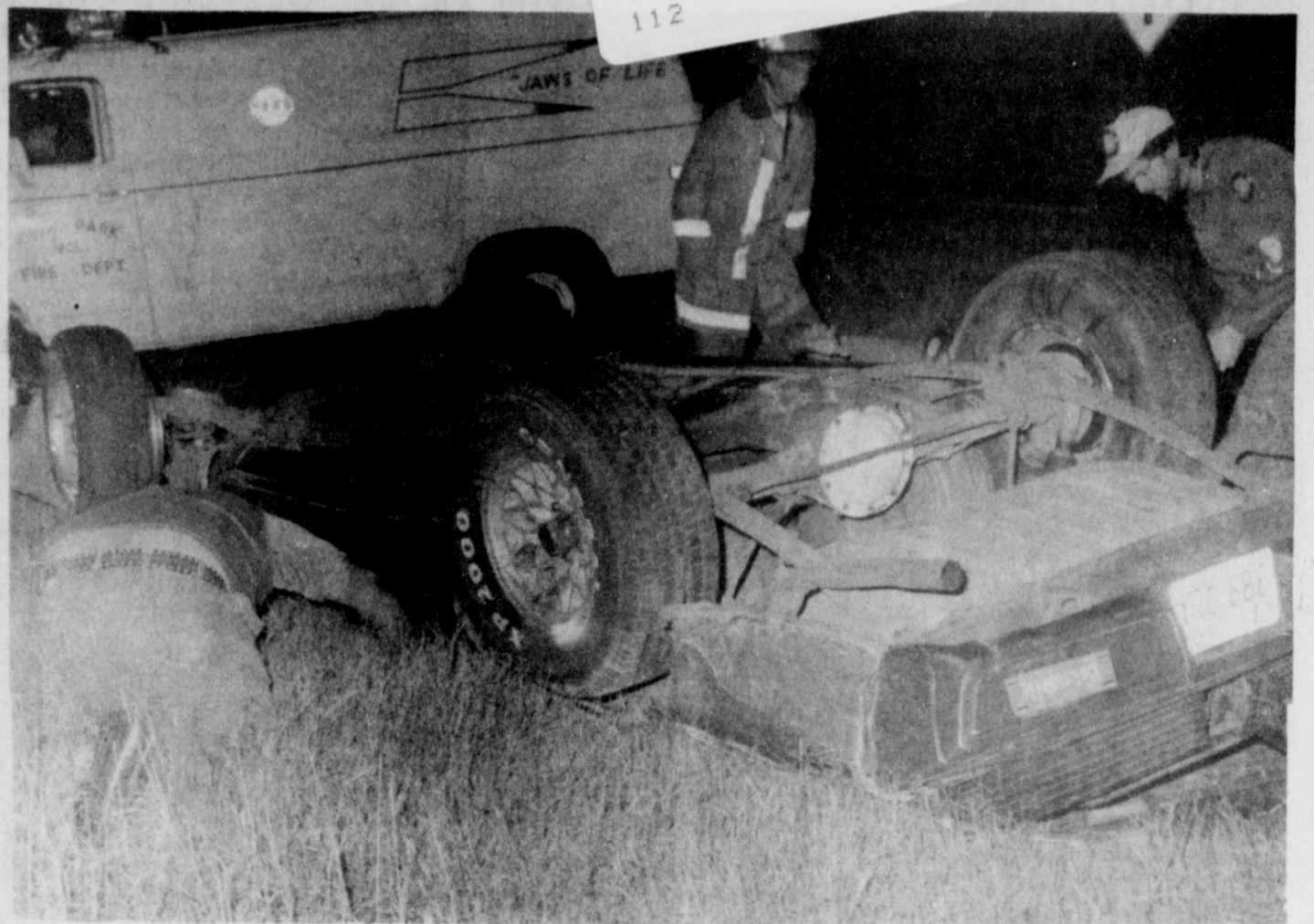
Named to a committee to revise rules concerning participation in the

annual Whoop-T-Do were Harold Smith, vice president who will be the coordinator of the 1990 event, Joe Hughes, Bob Hamilton and Ruth Purkle.

The nominations committee is to make its report at the annual all-membership luncheon Nov. 20, at which time voting is held. Those elected will take office at the annual Chamber banquet.

Jordan, a member of a committee appointed to study the organization's dues structure, recommended no change be made. The report was accepted by the board.

Annual dues are \$24 for individual, \$60 for non-profit organizations, \$60 for the first year of a new business, and \$120 for all businesses.

Bulls can't be overlooked May have one Horne too many

If the Hawks need any incentive in preparation with tomorrow's game at Bridgeport, they can remember what it was like last year to lose to a team for the first time in the school's history.

Iowa Park had never lost a football game to Bowie, until 1988. The same situation faces the Mean Green when they take on the Bulls, because in their previous five confrontations, Iowa Park is undefeated.

And the Bulls will have little difficulty remembering they provided the only victory of the long 1988 season for Iowa Park.

Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m., as it is for all Dist. 5-AAA games. It will follow a dedication ceremony the Bridgeport school will hold, and the teams are to leave the warmup field

at 7, to allow for the program.

When the Bulls took on Decatur last week, they were the underdogs, with a 2-3 record. But they forgot to lay down, and battled the powerful Eagles to a 12-7 decision.

"We moved the ball up and down the field all night, but couldn't score," commented Decatur mentor Bobby Atkinson.

One of the major reasons for the Bulls' success was two-way starter Mike Horn, who plays quarterback and safety.

Horn completed seven of 11 passes for 100 yards, and added 46 more on 16 carries.

In Bridgeport's 14-8 season-opening win over Olney, Horn passed for one touchdown, ran two, and had a 44-yard interception called back on a

penalty.

In game two, the Bulls fell to AAAA Northwest, 41-13, but one of the touchdowns was a 12-yarder by Horn to Daniel Derington.

The Bulls lost 7-0 to Electra, giving up an 89-yard drive in the fourth quarter.

The Bridgeport field general had both his club's scores in the 14-13 win over Lake Dallas. One was a five-yarder and the other covered 72 yards.

All 26 points of the Holliday game two weeks ago were made in the second half, with the Eagles coming out on top, 14-12. Bridgeport out-gained Holliday rushing, 235-210, but fumbled the ball away three times. Horn completed three of nine passes for 31 yards.

Iowa Park and Bridgeport began playing each other when they became members of the same conference, in 1984. The Hawks have won all five games, 35-13, 24-0, 35-28, 56-14, and last year, 28-14.

Following last week's hard-played game against Bowie, several of the Hawks were limping early this week. But all are expected to be in uniform Friday.

United Way progress reported

Iowa Park's donations to the United Way of Greater Wichita Falls campaign stands at 57 percent of its \$36,667 goal, it was reported last week.

Overall, the campaign is 60.5 percent complete, with \$1,030,488 in donations and pledges received toward the goal of \$1,702,000.

Division chairmen reported the following percentages toward goals: Burkburnett, 96; Business and Industry, 69.4; Combined Federal Campaign, 75.6; Commerce, 55.3; Enterprise, 35.3; Leadership, 69; Professional, 72.4, and Public Service, 31.5.

Student pilot ejects before car launches

A 21-year-old NATO student pilot from Sheppard AFB survived an early-morning accident Saturday at the Johnson Road overpass, but his vehicle was completely destroyed.

But it was more than two hours after the accident was reported that authorities found the driver.

Iowa Park volunteer firemen were called out at 5:35 a.m. to the scene of a wrecked vehicle, reported by a passing motorist.

They found the overturned vehicle in the median on the west side of the overpass, but no driver.

Emergency workers were frustrated when their hydraulic equipment malfunctioned, and they were unable to force open the door of the vehicle, which was resting on its top.

Not until Sam Fairchild arrived with his wrecker were they able to upright the car, raise its top, and see that there was no one inside.

Firemen were dispatched in all directions, in an effort to find a body or someone afoot, in the area. Using flashlights, the area was thoroughly combed, but without success.

It was during the search police were able to determine how dramatic the accident was.

The driver was heading west on US 287 when, as he was approaching the overpass, apparently veered off the road onto the median, and strad-

dled the low area of the guard rail.

The car appeared to have continued on two wheels a distance of 75 yards and became airborne at the concrete embankment.

There were no markings indicating the vehicle's travel except in the southbound lane of Johnson Road.

The vehicle apparently sailed, and rotated, landing on its hood nine feet beyond the middle curb, and then proceeded to slide on its top up the concrete embankment on the west side, which is approximately 24 feet high, coming to rest 39 feet beyond, on the grass.

(One of the first things noticed by viewers was a bumper sticker on the back of the vehicle, with the word "Batmobile.")

There was question among the emergency workers as to what time the accident had happened, because the car's motor was almost cool to the touch.

At 8:10 a.m., the police dispatcher received a call from authorities at Sheppard AFB, requesting an officer to accompany a base officer to 1601 Karen.

The resident of the home, Dan Love, said soon after sunrise, he noticed a man staggering in the alley behind his house. "I at first thought he might be drunk, but then I noticed the blood on his face and head, and

knew he must have been injured," Love explained.

The injured, identified as Neils H. Leist, of Denmark, was treated by Iowa Park emergency medical personnel and then transported by Life Line Ambulance to the base.

Leist, who's next birthday will be Dec. 21, had reportedly arrived in the United States Oct. 6, eight days before the accident.

He told Mr. and Mrs. Love he had been in an accident, and believed he had exited the vehicle through the door.

However, emergency workers said he could only have been ejected through a window of the car, probably when the car impacted the guard rail, as indicated by the glass in his face and forehead.

The car, a Pontiac Firebird, was either a 1980 or 1984 model. The inspection sticker on the windshield said 1984, but the recently-issued insurance policy said it was an '80 model.

Whichever, Leist's problems did not end there. Police were notified Sunday that someone had entered Sam's Body Shop fenced area, and removed a stereo, mag rim and tire, and license plate.

The airman, according to one source from the base, will be returned to Denmark as soon as he is able to travel.

Police clear burglary case

Two young Iowa Park males have been charged with theft of tools taken in the August burglary of a garage on South Wall.

Michael Omar Stevenson, 17, and a 14 year old were taken into custody this week after the tools were recovered by Iowa Park police.

The burglary at 201 S. Wall reportedly happened in August, but not reported to police until Oct. 6. Taken were an electric saw and torque wrench.

Both tools had been sold and resold, but were recovered over the weekend.

Since Stevenson was a juvenile at the time of the alleged offense, he and the 14 year old will be referred to the juvenile department.

Allsups reported a case of "theft over \$20" Friday evening, when a man reportedly got less than \$2 of gasoline and left. The increased cost was because he allegedly left with the pump nozzle.

He is described as having being dressed in a flowered shirt, shorts, dark hair, mustache, and driving a brown over white pickup with a white camper shell.

A 16-year-old male was arrested in the 700 block of East Bank at 2:04 a.m. Sunday, accompanied by

two juvenile females, on a charge of public intoxication.

The trio is believed to have been at a drinking party earlier at Lake Buffalo.

The girls were turned over to their parents, but the male was taken first to Wichita General Hospital and then to the county juvenile detention center.

Also arrested on a charge of pub-

lic intoxication, at 2:38 a.m. Wednesday, was Elbert Leon Martin, 48. He was released after posting bond.

Oscar Celerino Riano was taken into custody Tuesday at municipal court, where he had been summoned on two traffic violations, because he said he could not pay his fine. He was taken to county jail, by order of the judge.

West Texas Street on agenda

For their third consecutive meeting, members of the city council will consider two actions concerning West Texas Street, when they meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Aldermen, according to the meeting agenda, will consider an ordinance authorizing four-way stop signs at West Texas and First streets, and also a resolution accepting the work of a contractor in rebuilding two blocks with concrete.

Another ordinance to be considered deals with employee retire-

ment policies.

Bids received to purchase a rubber tired loader/backhoe will be considered by the council. The council will be asked for authorization to purchase a replacement barrier around the intake structures at Iowa Park and Buffalo lakes; consider accepting a 25x225-foot strip of land as a gift from Andy Arrington, and hear a request from State National Bank to reduce the fees for monitoring financial institutions' alarms in the police station.

Mitchell to speak for FFA Boosters

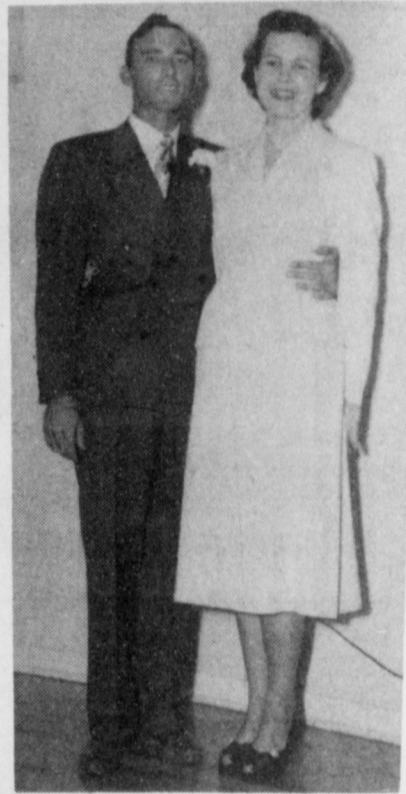
Supt. Glen Mitchell will be guest speaker at the FFA Booster Club meeting to be held at 7 p.m. Monday at the high school vocational agriculture building.

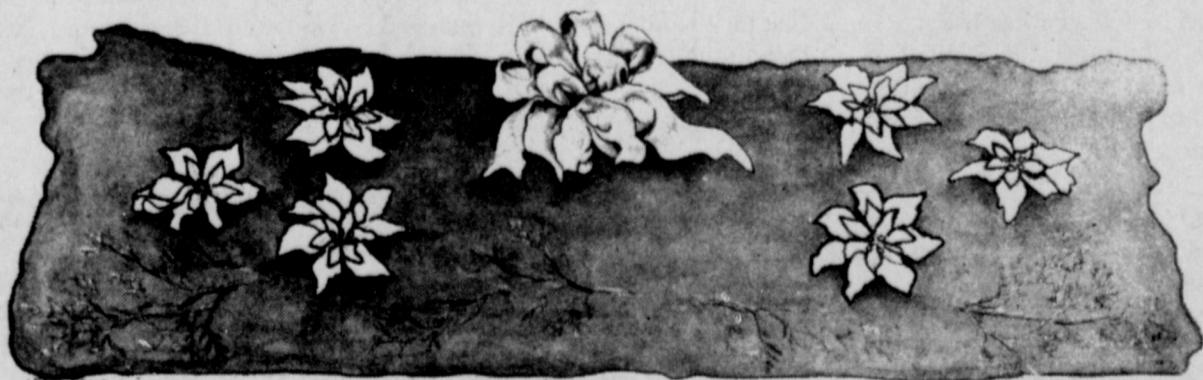

Cook of the Week



Mrs. Joe Hrcirik

With the weather finally changing from sultry to a more seasonal cool, this week's featured cook, Wanda (Mrs. Joe) Hrcirik of Holliday, has submitted some timely recipes.

Although Wanda says she doesn't do much cooking since her children have married and left home, her recipes should be ample proof that when called upon, she can whip up a tasty main course, side dish or dessert.

The recipe she gives for "Joe's Kolachos," is Czechoslovakian and one she got from her husband's mother. Although she's never made it herself, she has watched her mother-in-law prepare it, and says it is one of her husband's and children's favorites.

Wanda and her husband, Joe, have a son, Brent of Iowa Park, and a daughter, Judy Ayres of Holliday, and four grandchildren.

Mrs. Hrcirik works with her daughter-in-law, Darleta Hrcirik, and daughter at Upsy-Daisy Floral and Gifts, owned by her son and daughter-in-law. Mr. Hrcirik is a masonry contractor. The couple are members of Lady Queen of Peace Catholic Church in Wichita Falls.

In her spare time, Mrs. Hrcirik enjoys t-shirt painting, crafts, ceramics and needlepoint.

JOE'S KOLACHOS
2 pkg. yeast or 1/4 cup fresh yeast
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup butter-flavor shortening
1 can evaporated milk plus enough water to make 2 cups
2 egg yolks
1 Tbsp. salt
4 to 5 cups flour

Soften yeast in 1/2 cup water and 2 Tbsp. sugar in a large bowl. After yeast is dissolved, add the sugar, shortening, milk, egg yolks and salt. Add flour about one cup at a time and mix well after each addition.

Mix and knead until dough becomes soft and glossy. Sift a little flour on top to keep from making a crust. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Beat dough down one time and let rise again until doubled. Divide dough into small portions with a spoon and form into balls.

Place on a greased baking sheet about 2 inches apart. Brush each with oleo or butter. Let rise until light. Make indentations on each ball of dough for fruit filling. Let rise a few minutes. Bake about 20 minutes or until slightly brown at 375° to 400°. Brush with melted butter.

Canned fruit or dried fruits that have been cooked and seasoned to taste can be used for the fruit center. You can also fix a cream cottage cheese center.

For pecan rolls, do the same as for fruit kolachos, but instead of making indentations, take the raised balls and roll flat to about 1/4-inch thick and oblong shape, about 3X6-inch. Make a mixture of 2 egg yolks and 1/2 cup melted butter or oleo, and mix well. Brush the mixture in the center of the dough and top with sugar and chopped pecans. Roll up tightly and pinch ends as you roll to keep mixture inside.

Place on a greased sheet, brush

SAUERKRAUT SALAD

1-#2 can sauerkraut, drained
1 green pepper, cut thin in circles
3 ribs celery, sliced thin
1 cucumber, sliced thin with peel
2 red onions, sliced thin circles
Boil five minutes:
1 cup sugar
1 cup vinegar
2 Tbsp. pickling spices
Cool and strain, pour over vegetables.
Refrigerate and let set about six hours before serving. Be sure and seal in tight container to lock in flavor.

CHICKEN LAS VEGAS STYLE

3 chicken breasts, skinned and deboned
1 slice ham (per breast)
1 slice bacon (per breast)
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can water
1 tsp. salt
1 cup uncooked rice
Roll chicken in ham. Wrap one slice bacon around ham. Mix soup, water, salt. Put rice in casserole: lay chicken in rice. Cover; cook 1 1/2 hours at 350°

WANDA'S PICANTE SAUCE

5 qts. tomatoes (6-28 oz. cans)
5 tsp. garlic salt
1/4 cup non-iodized salt
3/4 cup sugar
3 lbs. yellow onions
1/2 lb. jalapeno peppers
4 bell peppers
Fresh calantra (1/3 of bunch)
Chop all together, bring to rolling boil, turn fire down and simmer one hour. Put in hot jars and seal. Water bath 15 minutes.

NIEMAN-MARCUS COOKIES

2 cups butter, no substitutes
2 cups sugar, white
2 cups brown sugar
4 eggs
2 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. salt
5 tsp. baking powder
2 tsp. soda
3 cups chopped nuts
4 cups flour
5 cups oatmeal (put in blender until fine)
1-8 oz. Hershey bar, grated
24 oz. chocolate chips
Preheat oven to 375°. Cream butter and both sugars. Add vanilla and eggs. Mix baking powder and soda. Add to first mixture. Add oatmeal, chocolate chips, candy bar and nuts. Roll into balls and place two inches apart on cookie sheet. Bake 6 minutes at 375° Makes 12 dozen. Recipe may be halved.

BANANA BREAD

1 cup butter
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
6 bananas, mashed
4 cups flour
2 tsp. soda (sifted in flour)
2 cups nuts
2 cups raisins (opt.)
1 Tbsp. vanilla
Cream butter and sugar together. Add eggs, one at a time. Then add bananas, sifted flour and soda, and

mix well. Add nuts, raisins and vanilla. Pour into a greased loaf pan and bake at 350° 30 to 40 minutes. Makes two large loaves.

Research supported

The Wichita County Young Farmers recently donated \$1,000 to support research on a relatively-new

oil seed crop, Canola, that could compliment wheat production in the area.

Mack Reeves, chapter president, presented the check to Dr. Earl Gilmore, superintendent of the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center which is carrying on the project at Chillicothe, Vernon and Munday.

The money completes the matching funds required to receive a grant from the Texas Dept. of Agriculture, to carry out the research, Dr. Gilmore said.

George Martin, Iowa Park Vocational Agriculture teacher and advisor for the Young Farmers, said the local farmers were "looking for alternative crops and interested in supporting this research."

Objectives of the research is to identify varieties adapted to the area, cultural practices and insect and control methods.

The seed can be crushed at a cotton seed oil mill without major modifications, Dr. Gilmore said.

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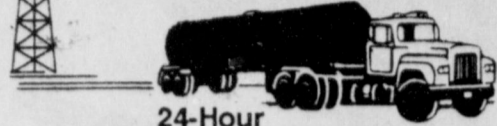
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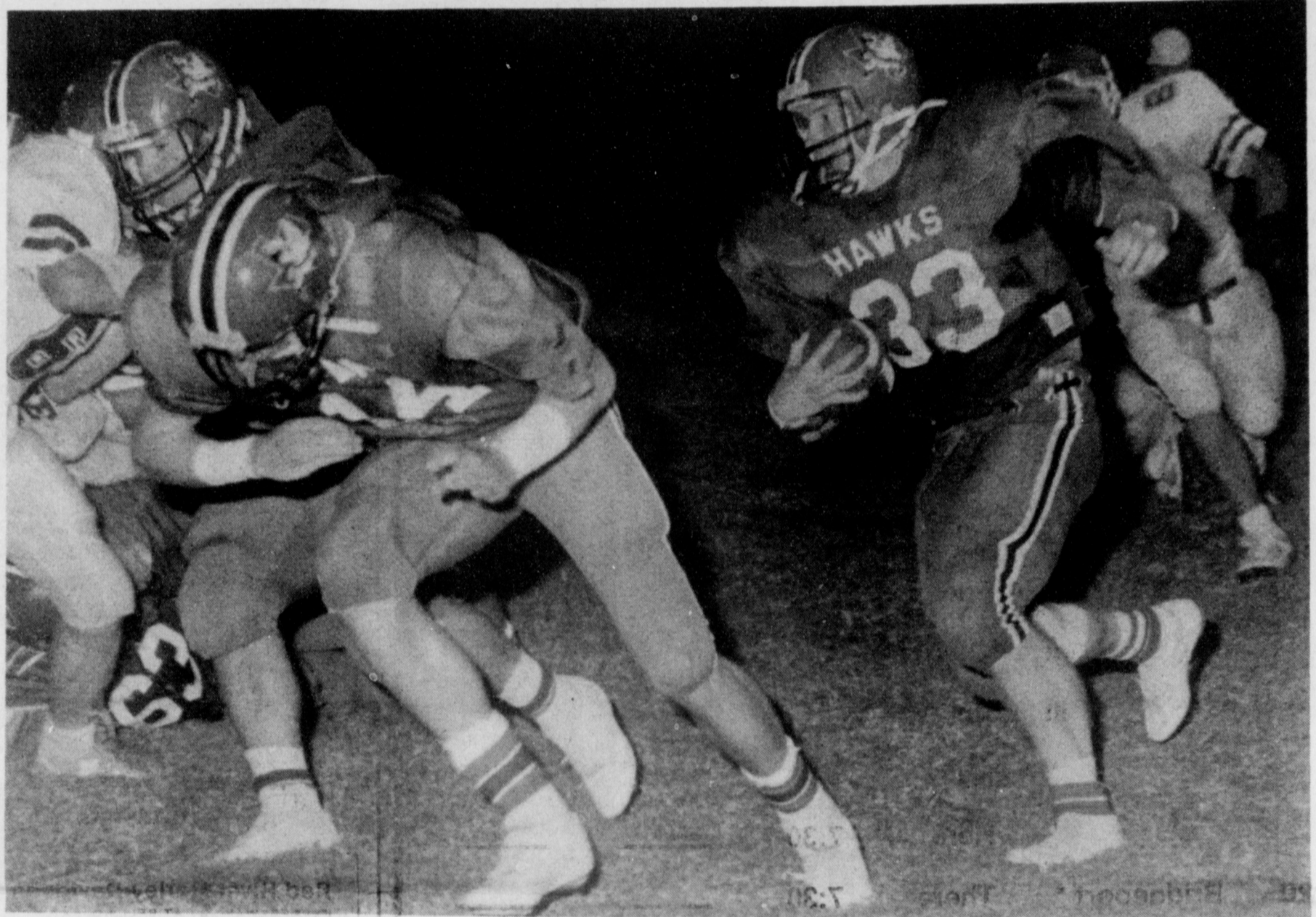

Hawks overcome stubborn Hares

Bowie's defensive platoon lived up to the expectations of Head Hawk Len Williams, who told his club before the game that the Jackrabbits were a much better team than their record indicated.

And outscoring the Montague County visitors was tough. But the Hawks got their revenge for last year's first-ever loss to Bowie, winning by a 28-7 margin.

Each team made mistakes to offset those of the opponents: Bowie had six turnovers, three fumbles and three interceptions; Iowa Park was flagged 10 times for 106 yards in penalties.

When the Hawks scored on their first possession of the ball, it brought back memories of previous 68-0 and 70-0 wins over Bowie, because the score appeared to be so easy.

Bowie took the opening kickoff, and three plays later had advanced three yards to the Rabbit 16 yard line. The Hawks set up shop on the Bowie 41, and needed only four plays to score, with Matthew Blackman carrying 17, 7, David Slack 1, and Blackman scoring on a 16-yarder.

Kelly McClure's extra point kick gave the Mean Green a 7-0 lead with 9:11 yet to play in the first quarter.

But there would be no more scoring for another 22:43. And then there were 28 points put on the board within a brief, 4:27 period. During that scoreless period, Bowie lost the ball three times on turnovers and the Hawks were penalized seven times for 85 yards, and neither team so much as threatened to score.

The Hawks broke the scoring stalemate soon after the second half kickoff. On the third play of the half, quarterback Jimmy Duggins spotted tailback Marc Cruz all alone about 20 yards downfield, and pitched him a perfect strike. The senior outran the Rabbit defenders to the end zone for an 84-yard touchdown. McClure kicked the extra point.

But Bowie lit up its side of the scoreboard almost as quickly as did the Hawks. In fact, after returning the kickoff to the Hawk 41, the Rabbits appeared to have scored on the first play, a pass, but that was nullified by a motion penalty. Three running plays and a 23-yard pass took the ball to the Hawk 13, and they finished that off with another pass for the score. The extra point kick narrowed the score to 14-7, with 7:53 left in the third period.

The Hawks were forced to punt, having gained only two yards on three plays, to Bowie's 33 yard line. On the second play, Chuck Brown's tackle caused a fumble, and McClure claimed it on the 29. McClure's number was dialed on the first play, and he scampered untouched to the goal line. The senior then tacked on the PAT.

Both teams then exchanged punts and, just after the final quarter got underway, linebacker Jimmy Nicholson's tackle forced another fumble, and this time it was Chuck Brown covering it, on Bowie's 28.

The Hawks drove, with the help of a 17-yard catch by tight end Steve Brown, to Bowie's one-yard line where, on fourth down, Blackman again

scored on a line plunge.

Sophomore Todd Pulley, who was recently called up from the junior varsity, was allowed to kick the extra point, as well as the following kickoff. He also had to make the tackle on the kickoff return.

Stephen Brown, who also was credited with covering a Bowie fumble, had two big tackles during the game. Chuck Brown had two, as did Nicholson, who also had an interception. McClure and Steven Ace teamed up late in the game to throw a Rabbit carrier for a six-yard loss.

Bruce Palmer had two of the three pass interceptions. The second was late in the game, stalling a Bowie drive, on his own 11.

Blackman was called upon 25 times to carry the ball, and he had a net 136 yards rushing. McClure gained 39 and Cruz 10.

Duggins was able to complete only three of his 11 pass attempts. Besides the catches of Cruz and Stephen Brown, Nathan Perry had the other.

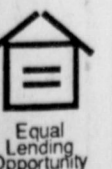

Junior high improvements explained

A new building will be constructed on the site of the old W.F. George structure at the junior high campus, if voters approve the Nov. 14 bond election.

It will include eight new classrooms, restrooms and a science laboratory, as well as a new office area.

One of the major benefits of the new facility would be the moving of all classes out of the blue metal building, constructed over 20 years ago as a "temporary" facility, said Jimmy Alsup, school principal.

Additionally, one classroom in the north end of the west wing would be converted into a second restroom. Alsup emphasized the need of the additional restroom, because the small existing facility currently is used not only by more than 400 students, but the faculty as well.

The Texas Education Agency has deemed the old science laboratory as being undersized, with not enough stations for all the students attending classes.

Greater emphasis is being put on science, and seventh and eighth grade students are required to spend 40 percent of classroom time in the lab, with the balance in lecture, Alsup

said. While there are currently 410 students enrolled on the junior high school campus, the five-year enrollment is projected to increase to 490.

None of the elementary classes are as small as the sixth and eighth grades, 127 and 129 respectively. The two largest elementary classes are the fourth grade, with 178, and first grade, 172.

Also included in the needs to be financed by the bond issue are the replacement of the airconditioner units and remodeling of the band hall.

The units installed when the junior high building was remodeled some 15 years ago are heat pumps, which are not as efficient as new units would be.

The band hall, which is used by two bands and the sixth grade beginners' band, as well as the choir, has not undergone a major renovation in more than 20 years. More than 300 students use that small building each day.

The room currently used as the office area, occupied by the principal and secretary, would become a book room and audio/visual facility.

The room serving as the counselor's office would be converted into the school nurse's office, Alsup explained.

Five classes are now being held in the old "blue building," as it is affectionately called by all school people. They include three resource rooms and two history.

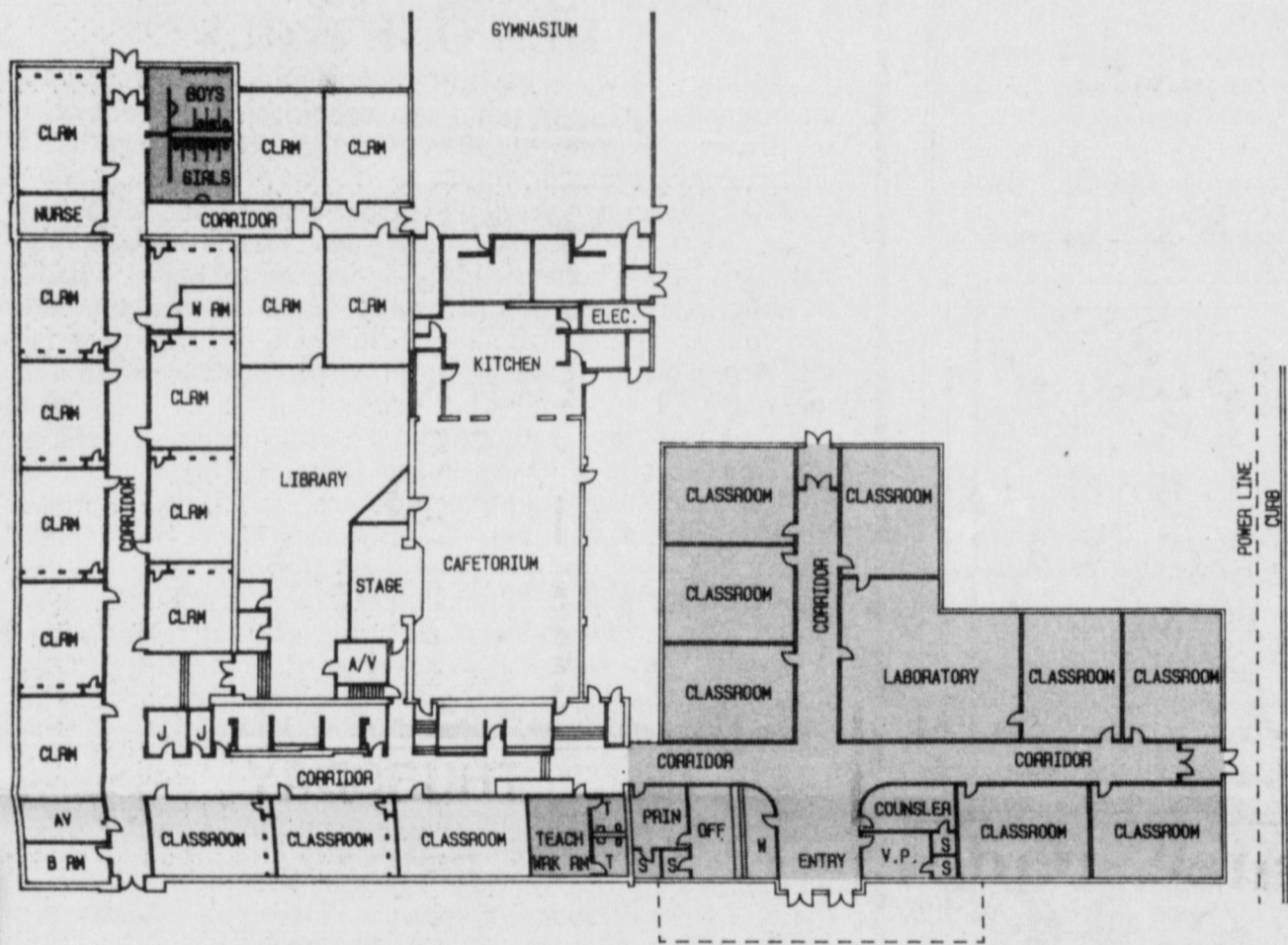
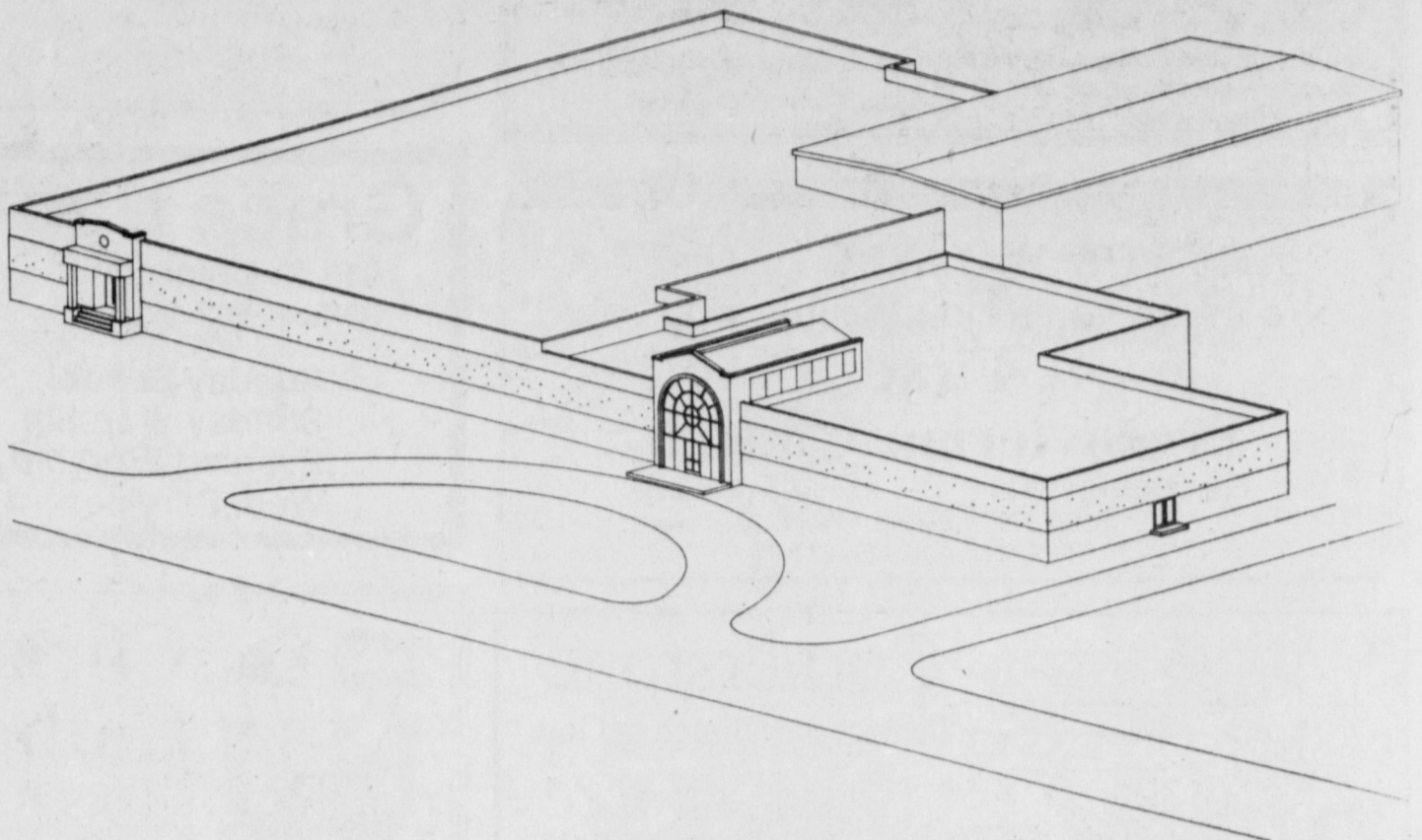
Plans call for the metal building to become the district's principal storage facility for all records, which must be kept. Part of them already are housed in the structure.

Anticipated cost of the junior high project is \$737,000, which includes \$370,000 for eight classrooms, \$50,000 for restrooms, \$80,000 for the science laboratory, \$10,000 for fixed equipment, \$80,000 for office area, \$35,000 for site preparation, \$12,000 for furniture, \$80,000 to replace the air conditioner units, and \$20,000 to remodel the band hall.

When asked what he would have to do to accommodate the anticipated increased enrollment on his campus, should the bond issue fail, Alsup said, "We would have to line up those temporary buildings all over the place."

He didn't have an answer of how

that many students would be accommodated with rest room facilities.

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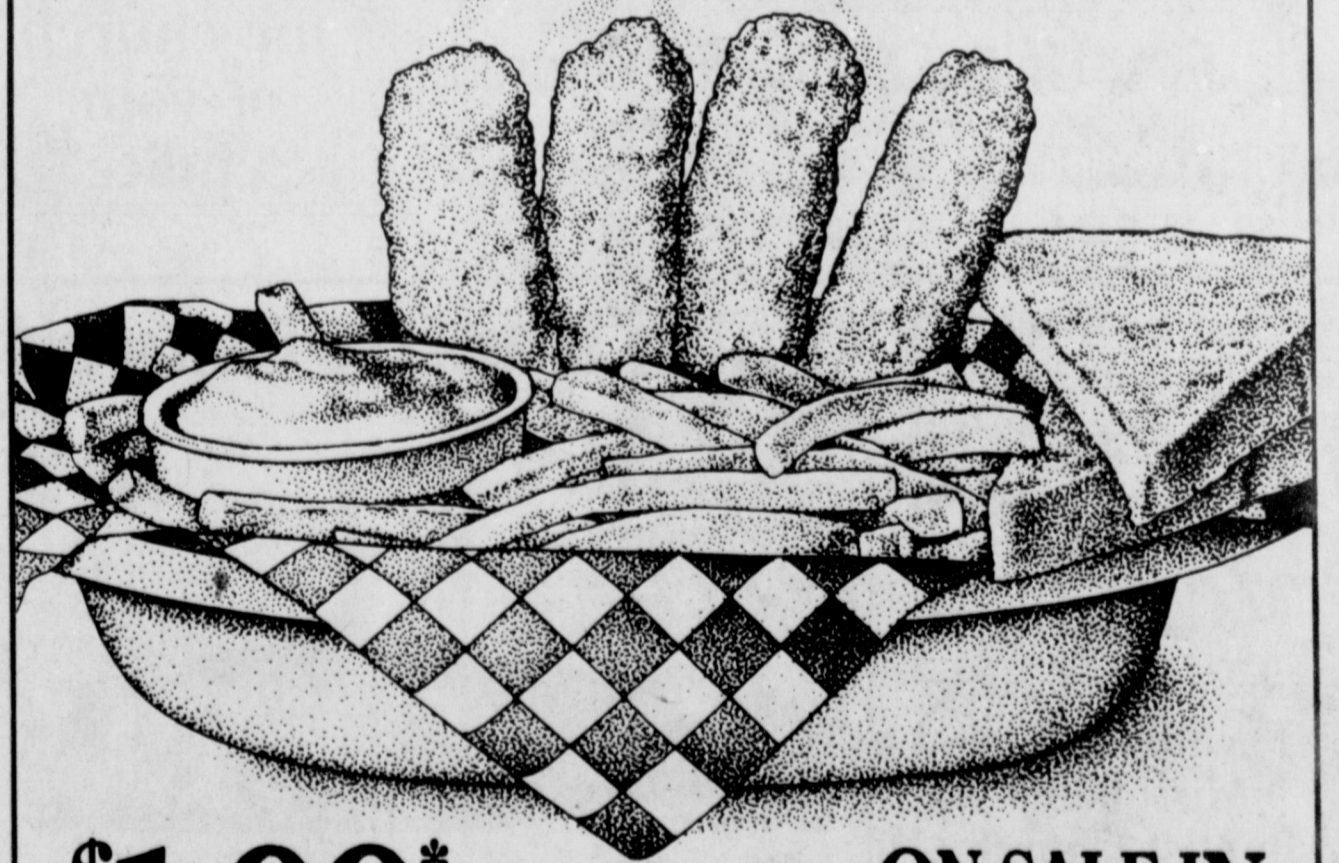

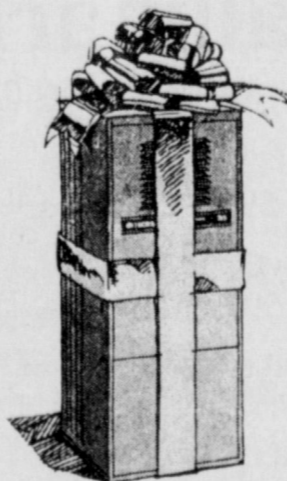

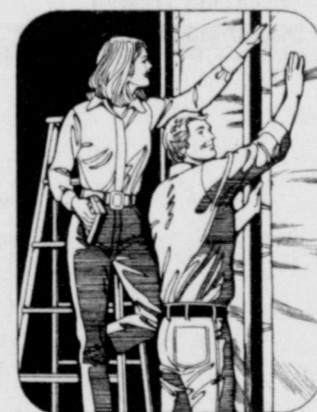
