FRIDAY AT VERNON

Hawks either win or season's over

It's all on the line Friday night at Vernon, when the Hawks take on the Lions in an important Dist. 5-AAA contest.

Vernon is in the driver's seat, without a loss in four conference starts, while Iowa Park carries a 3-1 record onto the field.

A win by the Hawks would insure them a ticket into the state playoffs. A loss, unless offset by Bowie beating or tying Decatur, would end the season for Iowa Park.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. This will be the 20th consecutive meeting between the two evenly-matched schools. Since they started playing each other in 1970, each team has won nine games, and the 1984 battle ended in a scoreless tie.

Each team has an outstanding ball carrier: Derrick Richardson for the Lions and Matthew Blackman for the Hawks. Both are juniors, and both are listed as 170 pounds.

Richardson has carried the ball 133 times in nine games and gained 1,013 yards, a 7.6-yard average. A big-play maker, his 18 touchdowns have accounted for 501 yards.

Blackman, on the other hand, has carried 210 times for 1,053 yards for the year, a 5.0 average. He has scored 20 touchdowns, and tacked on three two-point conversions.

Coach Leo Brittain, now in his 14th year at the helm of the Lions, counts heavily on his ground game and very little on his passing.

Quarterback Ken Collums has attempted only 80 passes this year, completing 35 for 726 yards. He has been intercepted four times, two of those by Bowie.

Iowa Park has had a more balanced offense this season, and does count on the passing arm of quarterback Jimmy Duggins.

He has completed 53 of 110 attempts for 1,051 yards, but has been intercepted eight times.

The Lions lost their season opener to Oklahoma power Altus, 21-24, and then suffered a 13-13 tie to Ever-

man. Then they knocked off San Angelo Lakeview, 35-7, and Burkburnett, 48-6, before losing to Wichita Falls Hirschi, 7-6.

All Vernon's non-conference games were against AAAA teams.

Vernon beat Graham, 28-7, a team the Hawks edged last week, 12-

7. The Lions found Bowie somewhat tougher, winning by only 16 points, 27-11. The Hawks beat the Jackrabbits 28-7. Bridgeport fell 48-6 to the Lions, and 34-13 to the Hawks.

Last week, Vernon knocked off

School bond issue on ballot Tuesday

Voters of the Iowa Park school district will make their decisions at the ballot boxes Tuesday on a proposed \$2.75-million bond election.

Voting polls, to be opened at 7 a.m. and closed at 7 p.m., will be at the two elementary campuses and at Valley View.

Because classes will be underway at the two schools, the cafeterias will not be used as voting places for this election.

At Kidwell Elementary, the music room will be the poll. It is located between the cafeteria and office area. At Bradford Elementary, the box and voting tables will be in the front foyer.

Parking at both elementary campuses will be allowed in the circle drives, usually reserved for buses, on Tuesday only for voters, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

At Valley View, the poll will be in the West Wichita Coop building, which is the metal structure north of the school buildings.

Cost of bonds

Based on current values, a tax rate increase of 11-cents per \$100 valuation will be required to pay for the bonds. The current rate is 81-cents, which is one of the lowest school tax rates in this part of the state, according to studies.

The increase would be \$55 a year for a home valued at \$50,000.

Each homeowner is entitled to a \$5,000 tax exemption from the value of the property, under the homestead act.

Disabled persons are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption. Persons 65 years of age and older are entitled to an additional \$15,000 exemption and their total taxes cannot be increased unless property valuations are made.

The school district is completely out of bonded indebtedness. With one more year's payment to be made on an existing bond, the money is already on deposit for that payment, school officials report.

Finances needed

Prior to calling for the bond election, the school board made an extensive study of the district's needs over the next five years. The study lasted more than six months, and included hiring of an expert to assist in the assessment.

During the past month, trustees have made an unprecedented effort to inform the electorate of the needs of the district, by speaking at numerous meetings, and answering questions from their audiences.

At each presentation, brochures were distributed and architectural plans exhibited to assist in the presentations.

Though no organized effort has developed against the bond issue, a significant demonstration of support has surfaced, including a lengthy list of individuals in an advertisement in this issue of the *Leader*.

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce board of directors went on record by voting to encourage passage of the election.

Facility needs

While most of the needs include additional classrooms to meet the demands of a growing enrollment, as well as mandates imposed by the state legislature, some of the costs are for long-needed improvements.

At Kidwell Elementary, the long and open front porch will be enclosed to enable students to go from class to the cafeteria in bad weather without having to wear coats.

A physical education building to be used during bad weather will also serve as a storm shelter. Additional teacher work space will be included, as well as a library and music room.

Furniture and gym equipment will be acquired.

The projected cost for Kidwell's needs are \$419,000.

Five additional classrooms will be built at Bradford Elementary, and

the library will be doubled in its size.

Those projects, along with completing the unfinished storm proofing of the gymnasium, additional furniture and other work make the projected cost at that campus \$304,000.

Eight new classrooms and a science laboratory are the heart of the improvements for the junior high school, along with adding a second restroom and new offices.

With the furniture, remodeling of the band hall and replacement of all heat pump air conditioner units, the junior high building's projected costs are set at \$737,000.

Three additional classrooms, a teacher workroom and an addition to the music department are in the plan for the high school, as well as replacing the building's 20-year-old roof and all air conditioners.

At the school's agricultural laboratory on East Ruby, a new cattle and lamb barn are proposed.

Remodeling of the high school and additional furniture, as well as an elevator to the underground floor, are included in the \$848,492 projected costs of that project.

An all-purpose weight room is proposed for the south end of the high school field house.

In part of the addition is a new restroom for both males and females, which will be available for baseball games and tennis matches, along with a small concession stand.

Also, needed storage space is included in the plans for football, track and baseball sports.

Those projected costs have been set at \$142,000.

The final inclusion in the plan is to construct a new bus maintenance and storage facility in the area south of the high school. The area would include a large refrigerated food storage area, for which the district now leases space in Wichita Falls.

That project is estimated to cost \$96,000, which is to purchase materials and supplies only. School personnel are to do the construction.

IPHS graduate listed on sunken ship crew

Dave Dyer, a 1977 graduate of Iowa Park High School, was among seven Americans on an American oil company ship that captized Saturday in a typhoon in the Gulf of Thailand.

Confirmation of Dyer's presence on the ship was made by former *Leader* reporter Kevin Hamilton of Fort Worth.

Hamilton quoted another classmate, Ricky Sidlauskas of Gainesville, who had been in contact with Dyer's father.

The Seacrest, a 351-foot drilling ship owned by Unocal, a California-based energy company, was capsized when struck by Typhoon Gay which carried 100 mph winds.

"The eye of the typhoon passed directly over the Seacrest," Unocal spokesman told United Press International. "This caused very rapid and violent changes in wind and sea conditions resulting in the capsizing of the vessel." Search teams were immediately

dispatched to cover a 600-square-mile area of the gulf.

The ship's crew was made up of 97 people. Besides the Americans, the crew was composed of 64 Thais, five Britons, four Australians, three Filipinos, three Singaporeans, two Malaysians, two Indonesians, two Canadians, two Danes, one West German, one New Zealander and one Norwegian.

Reports as of Tuesday indicated 85 crew members were yet unaccounted for.

Sidlauskas flew out of D/FW Airport Wednesday to join Dyer's father and brother, Daryl, in Bangkok. The trio plans to assist in the search.

There are reports of some isolated fishing villagers, where no radio communications exist, having found survivors and bodies. These are not confirmed, however. Dyer had been working for the

company about three years, and reportedly was planning to return to the United States next year to retire on the tax-free money he had earned.

The Dyer family had moved to Iowa Park during 1975 from Cheridan, Iowa. Soon after Dave's graduation, his parents returned to their native state.

Dyer and Sidlauskas hired on with Swanson Drilling Co. soon after graduation. The two later hired on with overseas drilling firms, with Sidlauskas going to Africa.

Dyer reportedly has a Thai wife, a two-year-old son and a daughter that was born recently.

Navy officials estimated that 400 sailors, including 85 from the Seacrest, were missing at sea. The governor of the hardest-hit province in southern Thailand said at least 71 people were killed in villages flattened and flooded by the storm, according to a wire report published Wednesday.

Students challenged for drug awareness

A major effort will be launched this week to develop among young students in Iowa Park the dangers of drug and alcohol abuse.

The Iowa Park Police Department is coordinating contests for stu-

dents of Iowa Park schools, and the prizes will be provided by local businesses and corporations.

Elementary students will be encouraged to participate in a poster-making contest, while junior and sen-

ior high students will have the opportunity to compete for numerous prizes in essay contests.

Both Kidwell and Bradford students will have their separate poster contests, with the two grand prize winners receiving a bicycle provided by Wal-Mart.

Each grade's first-place winner will receive a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond, provided by Cryovac, and photos of all winners will be published in the *Iowa Park Leader*.

The contest is to begin Nov. 27, and all entries are to be turned into the student's homeroom teacher by Dec. 15. Judging of the posters will be based on neatness and creativity.

The essay contest for junior high students is to begin Nov. 13 and be turned in to the students' English teachers by Dec. 8.

Essays are to be between 200 and 300 words, in three paragraphs, handwritten or typed, and double spaced. They will be judged on originality, correct spelling and punctuation and neatness.

A \$100 U.S. Savings Bond, donated by State National Bank, will be awarded the grand prize winner. Second prize will receive a Sigma 105 desk/wall telephone and third place a Sharp elsimat calculator, both donated by Parkway TrueValue.

Winners will be published in the *Leader*.

High school essay entries will be 300 to 500 words, in three-paragraph form, and typed double spaced.

That contest also will begin Nov. 13 and must be turned into Mr. Collins by Dec. 8.

Judging will be based on thesis and analysis, supporting material, organization, expression and literacy.

Plaques will be presented to the top four entries, as well as special prizes.

The special prizes include:
First place - a Spiedel quartz

watch from Louis Jewelry and the Iowa Park Police Dept., and a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond from Cryovac.

Second place - a 35mm focus-free camera from Iowa Park Police Dept., and a \$75 U.S. Savings Bond from Cryovac.

Third place - a clock radio with cassette player from Iowa Park Police

Dept., and a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond from Cryovac.

Fourth place - a clock radio from Iowa Park Police Dept., and a \$25 U.S. Savings Bond from Cryovac.

Also, as in the case of the junior high's winning essays, the top four from the high school will be published in the *Leader*.

Red Cross to sponsor cholesterol screening

The Wichita County Chapter of the American Red Cross will sponsor a cholesterol and glucose screening clinic Friday and Saturday at the Iowa Park Church of Christ.

Screenings will begin at 9 a.m. both days, and end at 7 p.m. Friday and 6 p.m. Saturday.

A donation of \$5 per screening is requested.

Mayor Tim Hunter this week signed a proclamation designating the two dates as "Know Your Number Days" in Iowa Park and urged all citizens "...to take time to be made aware of their cholesterol level in the fight against heart disease."

Similar screening dates have been set up during the month in all Wichita County cities. The teams will be in Electra Sunday and Monday, and the following Friday and Saturday at Burkburnett.

Cardiovascular diseases -- high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, heart attack, stroke, rheumatic heart disease, congenital heart defects and congestive heart failure -- will claim the lives of nearly one out of every two people if present trends are allowed to continue, the Red Cross states.

Elevated cholesterol level, smoking and high blood pressure have been named by the National Institutes of Health as leading factors in heart disease.

Bazaar, stew supper slated on Saturday

Mrs. Woodfin directed a short business meeting introduced by Mrs. Patterson who was in charge of the missionary birthday prayer calendar.

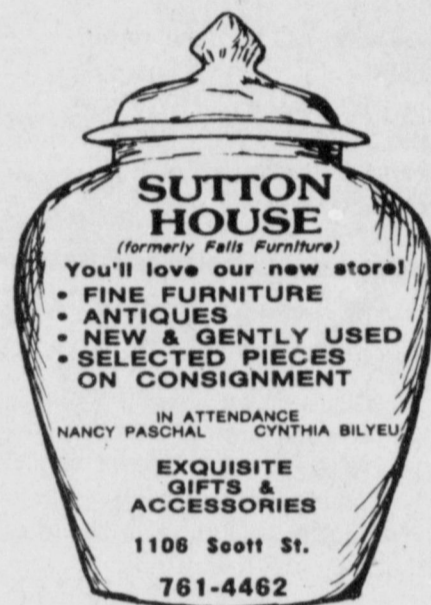
ESA plans benefit dance

As I See It...

I guess I owe you readers an apology. But I'm darn sure the county judge and commissioners' court does.

In our story last week leading up to this week's election on the state constitution amendments, I neglected to mention the proposed increase in sales taxes for Wichita County.

I neglected to mention it, because I knew absolutely nothing about it.

The first I knew that it would be on the ballot was when Thursday's issue of that paper came out, quoting the county judge as saying he feared voters may ignore the proposal on the ballot.

Not knowing about it, there was no way I had of warning you it would be on the ballot....way back on a separate page all by itself.

The reason is simple. There is no way a newspaper with a staff as small as ours can devote the time to travel to Wichita Falls and cover the meetings of the commissioners court.

Those meetings are open to the press and the public, of course. But that can happen only if we have the time and manpower to do it.

We had absolutely no contact by Judge Nick Gibson, our Commissioner Gordon Griffith, a secretary or anybody, concerning the issue being on the ballot.

The Burk Burnett Informer/Star did not mention the issue being on the ballot, apparently for the same reason.

It was in the Electra Star/News, however. That's because, according to a story concerning the election, that paper had printed the official legal notice for the county. Otherwise, I suspect, they wouldn't have mentioned it either.

I hope, in the future, we can have better communications between our newspaper and the county. Especially when it comes to something as important as a county-wide issue on which our residents are being asked to make a decision.

No, I don't need them to do my work. That's not what communications is all about.

I noted with interest that the issue failed by four votes, county-wide. It's interesting that it failed by 12 votes in our Precinct 32 box, which is the largest box in Wichita County.

It passed by 11 in Precinct 33.

And I'm proud of our voters in our area, for turning out on such an important voting opportunity as the amending of the state constitution.

There were 639 votes cast in 32 and 33. Not a real good turnout, but it was 6.6 percent of all the votes cast in the county (9,724).

And the five precincts in our area, which includes 34, 35 and 60, had 788 votes, or 8 percent of all the votes cast Tuesday.

I'm hoping we have a much, much larger turnout next Tuesday, for the Iowa Park school bond issue.

Regardless of whether you agree with me and others, that the proposals are good and worthwhile, you need to cast your ballots.

And, while I'm on it, I want to commend the members of our school board and administrators, for all the hard, hard work they've done on the studies leading up to the calling of the election, and their work since.

I've never seen a group so eager to get the message out to the voters than these people have been.

If anyone has any questions left unanswered, it's not been the fault of the trustees and school people.

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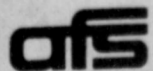
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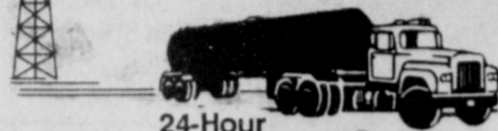
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Palmer key in Hawk victory

None of Bruce Palmer's 20 pass receptions this season have been more important than his last Friday night against the Graham Steers.

But it wasn't for a touchdown. Rather, it possibly saved one by the visiting Steers.

Trying to protect a scant 12-7 lead, with the Steers on a drive that had taken them all the way to the Iowa Park 16 yard line, the Hawks had their backs to the proverbial wall. On second down, needing seven yards for a first down and less than two minutes remaining in the game, a Steer touchdown would leave hardly enough time for Iowa Park to make a comeback.

Graham called a play to lateral the ball to the right sideline, and that player was to throw a lofted pass far into the left side of the end zone. But Palmer, in his assignment as safety, had stayed at home. He intercepted the ball, killing the drive and whatever hope Graham had of defeating the Hawks, with 1:18 remaining on the scoreboard clock.

The victory kept the Hawks' hopes for a playoff position alive, with one more game remaining on the regular-season schedule.

After the interception, fullback Matthew Blackman ran two plays to pick up a first down on the Hawk 33. And from there, quarterback Jimmy Duggins killed the rest of the time on the clock, and Graham's remaining times out, on three plays.

The interception wasn't all Palmer contributed to the victory, however. He made two others, one of which led to the second Iowa Park touchdown in the third quarter. And, when Graham's talented Shawn Cauble had broken 20 yards deep into the Hawk secondary and appeared to be on his way to a certain touchdown, Palmer stripped the ball from his grasp and then covered the fumble. Added to all that, Palmer caught three aerials from Duggins for 40 yards. He also made a saving tackle on the Hawks' 46, when Graham returned a blocked extra point kick, which is allowed under a recent rule change and would have been good for two points. And, on a fake extra point kick, carried the ball to the goal line, only to be knocked out of bounds inches from the two-point conversion.

Palmer played all 48 minutes of the game, never leaving the field, even on specialty teams. He has, in fact, caught 20 passes this season. But only 13 of them have been thrown by his own quarterback. The other seven have been interceptions, including two each against Bowie and Abilene Wylie.

Linebacker Chuck Brown claimed the other Steer turnover, a fumble. He leads the Mean Green defense in fumbles claimed this season with six, including three against Breckenridge and two in the Mineral Wells contest.

The Hawks had driven deep into Steer territory twice during the first quarter, but without success. The first time, thanks to Brown's covering of a bobbled punt, they reached the 18. Then, after a shanked punt to the Steer 45, they drove to the 29 before Duggins suffered an interception.

Iowa Park's initial touchdown, a 17-yard pass reception by Marc Cruz from Duggins, capped a 75-yard drive that was kept alive when a Steer was ruled to have roughed Duggins on a punt. Kelly McClure's kick for the extra point was blocked, but the Hawks had the lead, 6-0, with 6:28 remaining in the half.

The Steers came roaring back, however, by

returning the following kickoff all the way to the Hawk 21 yard line. Chris Cook made that tackle. Graham needed only four plays to score, on a 15-yard pass play. The visitors took the lead, 7-6, by kicking the extra point at 5:23, 55 seconds after the Hawks' score.

Graham threatened in the final minute of the half, but defensive plays by tackle Steve Ace and cornerback Dave Slack put an end to that at the 27 yard line. Ace sacked the quarterback for a seven-yard loss, and Slack knocked down a fourth down pass.

Palmer's second interception of the game gave the Hawks possession on the Steer 33 yard line. On the first play, Matthew Blackman roamed 17 yards, but the ball was taken back to the Steer 41 on a clipping penalty. Kelly McClure gobbled up 16 yards, and then Blackman carried five consecutive plays, scoring on a four-yarder. The junior, who gained 142 yards on 29 carries during the night, had been apparently stopped on the fourth-down play at the two, but his patented second effort allowed him to reach the goal line.

McClure finished the night with 32 yards on four carries, Cruz had 18 on 10, Bunkie Imboden eight on one, Palmer three on one. Duggins wound up with a minus 24 yards and Slack minus five.

Cruz caught two passes for 11 yards and Stephen Brown one for three.

The Mean Green defense held Graham to only 160 yards rushing on the night, and allowed only seven receptions of 29 pass attempts for another 72 yards.

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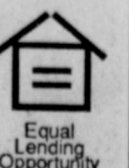

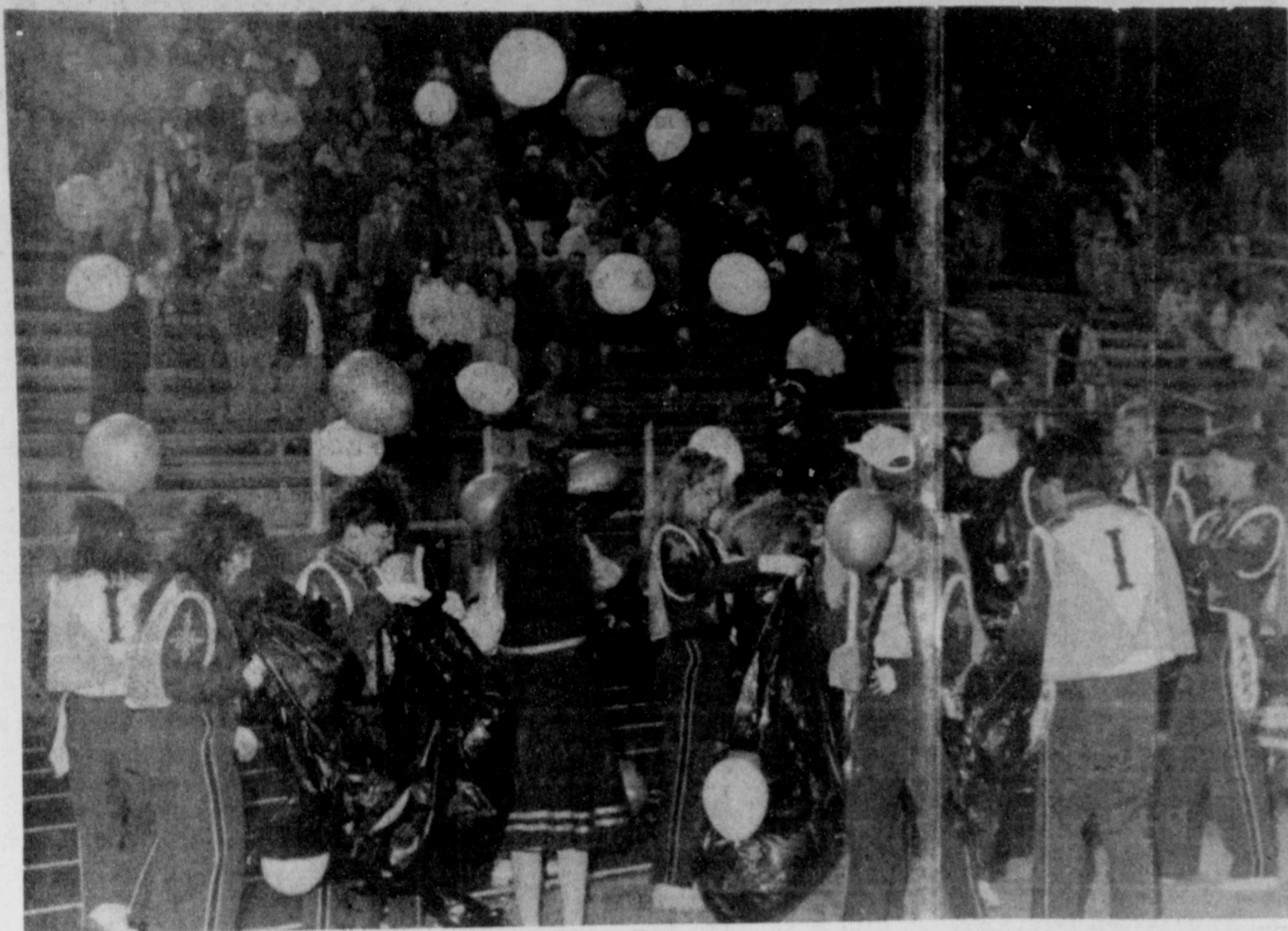

Vernon completely dominated the first half of the Eighth Grade game, taking a 14-0 lead. Iowa Park had run only five plays from scrimmage and punted during that period.

But, on the first play from scrimmage after the midway break, Don Ellis broke for on a 65-yard run, setting up a five-yard score by Scott Byrd, who also ran for the two-point conversion.

Vernon came right back with eight points, making the score 21-8.

Tony Lozipone's pass to B.J. Murray covered 48 yards and tacked on six more points for the young Hawks. But the extra point attempt failed, and the visitors led 21-14 going into the final period.

Lozipone again hit Murray for a touchdown, covering 30 yards, and Byrd's run lifted Iowa Park into the lead, 22-21.

Later, Byrd broke on a 45-yarder to set up an eight-yard TD run for himself. The extra point failed.

Mickey Mayo scored the only touchdown in the Seventh Grade game, a three-yard run.

Iowa Parkan Charles Perry continues to be a leader in Texas Tech's football success this season. The Red Raiders knocked off the Univ. of Texas, at Austin, 24-17 to advance their season record to 6-2 and conference record to 3-2. Perry is the third-leading tackler on the defense, with 65 tackles (35 unassisted and 30 assists), two for losses. He also has four quarterback sacks, 13 pressures, and 20 big plays on the year.

Title or playoff slot in hands of Hawks

The fate of the Hawks' title hopes and playoff chances rests squarely in their own hands tomorrow night, as they take on the league-leading Vernon Lions.

Because of a tie-breaking rule approved by Dist. 5-AAA representatives prior to the season's start, the flip of the coin will not decide which team's advance and which stays home.

Iowa Park would be declared district champion if the Hawks beat Vernon by a margin of nine or more points. A victory by a margin of one to seven points would make the Hawks district runners-up.

But, should Bowie defeat or tie Decatur Friday, Iowa Park would be in the playoffs, regardless of its outcome against Vernon.

Going into Friday night action, Vernon has no losses in district play, while Iowa Park and Decatur each have lost one game.

Iowa Park came out of the Decatur game with two minus points, and Decatur two plus points. But after last week's 15-point loss by Decatur to Vernon, Decatur now has 13 minus points, and Vernon 15 plus points. A nine-point win over Vernon would give Iowa Park seven plus points, and cut Vernon's plus points to six. Any plus points for Iowa Park against Vernon would give Iowa Park a better point standing than Decatur, and therefore a playoff ticket.

Imboden 29th at region meet

Jonathan Imboden, the Dist. 5-AAA individual cross country champ, placed 29 among 93 competitors Saturday at the Region One meet held in Lubbock.

Imboden's time was 18.01, above his 17:17 clocked here the previous Saturday.
