# Officials encourage safety for holiday

Of all the holidays during the year, officials are most concerned about what takes place during the annual Fourth of July celebration.

The concern is expressed at all levels, from the sale and handling of fireworks to driving on the highways and around bodies of water.

July 4th is observed by almost all Americans, and it is the volume of celebrants that concerns officials.

Residents are reminded not only

of the safety necessary in setting off fireworks, a tradition among Americans, but where they are used.

For instance, there is a long-standing city ordinance which prohibits both the sale and setting off of fireworks inside the city limits of Iowa Park.

"It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, offer for sale or explode any type or kind of fireworks, including firecrackers, torpe-

does, rockets, roman candles and any other types of explosives commonly used for such purposes, within the city," states the ordinance.

Members of the Iowa Park Voluntary Fire Department are always on alert during the holiday, because so many grassfires are started by careless setting off of fireworks in the rural areas.

This is especially true during years like the area has experienced,

when frequent spring rains have made the weeds and grass grow tall, and then turn dry as it is now.

Those wishing to set off fireworks have in the past been encouraged to go to the two city lakes, Iowa Park and Buffalo, and shoot them out over the water where they can land and not ignite fires.

However, residents should be reminded that Gordon Lake, in the northeast part of town, is inside the city limits, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

Because of the hot weather, many venture to lakes for enjoyment swimming and boating. Officials point out that all boating safety rules should be observed, such as wearing of life vests, and a close watch should be made by experienced swimmers, especially when youngsters are in the water.

Because July 4th falls on a Friday this year, making it a long holiday weekend, the Texas Department of Public Safety is expecting extra heavy traffic on highways.

The DPS will be conducting "Operation Motorcade" from 6 p.m. today through midnight Sunday, and officers will be closely watching for the drinking and speeding drivers.

"Everyone should know the



most dangerous time to drive is on weekends, during the summer, and on holidays. This July 4th is going to combine all three," stated Maj. V.J. Cawthon, regional DPS commander.

While a few businesses will

keep their doors open for the public Friday, all governmental offices, including city hall, will be closed.

A large percentage of local businessmen have said they plan to not reopen their doors until Monday.

## Council sees budget; approves hall project

In a called meeting of the city council Monday evening, changes in plans for the exterior renovation of city hall were approved, and members got their first look at the proposed 1986-87 budget.

Changes proposed by architect Don Daugherty were sought by the council, in order the trim the cost of the project.

While the changes failed to get the price of the project down to the anticipated level, they did save some \$9,000 from the lowest of bids received at bid opening, submitted by M&F Littiken.

Primarily, the changes included using a smaller tile than originally proposed, and painting the east side of the building rather than plastering.

Cost of the project is \$70,882. A conference was tentatively set today with the contractor to discuss anticipated quality of work, as well as scheduling.

Administrator James Barrington said he expects work to commence in about two weeks.

Work on the exterior of the old structure is the final phase of a project commenced several years ago.

The renovation work has includ-

ed converting the old firemen's meeting hall into council chambers; closing in the four-bay fire department and creating offices, storage, rest rooms and conference room, and most recently remodeling the original portion of the structure and adding a drive-up utility payment window.

Also approved, under an emergency measure, the expenditure of \$6,000 to replace an engine on a trash collection truck.

The preliminary budget for next year calls for deficits in both the general fund, \$135,330, and water and sewer fund, \$57,218.

A \$200,000 carryover is anticipated for the general fund, down some \$100,000 from last year, and with anticipated revenues of \$1,287,000 and expenses projected at \$1,442,330, the deficit created, Barrington explained.

## Two men jailed twice

When police stopped a vehicle on a traffic check just before midnight last Thursday, the occupants wound up in jail, twice.

While checking on outstanding warrants against driver Gilbert Scott Couto, 25, officers learned he was wanted on an outstanding warrant by the Department of Public Safety in Wichita Falls for "rider not secured by safety belt" and failure to appear.

And then Couto and passenger Guy Barnett McNeely Jr., 24, were charged with possession of drug paraphernalia.

Both were released shortly after 10 the next morning after signing pledges to appear yesterday morning in municipal court. McNeely was released on his own, but Couto to a DPS trooper.

After paying \$100 fines in municipal court on misdemeanor charges, the two were again arrested in court and taken before Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill on felony charges of possession.

After Judge Hill placed each under a \$5,000 bond, they were transported to Wichita County jail.

Two other arrests were also post-

Revenues of \$802,500 are expected for the water and sewer department, where a \$600,000 carryover is projected from the current year. The expenses, which do not include an anticipated 40-percent increase in water rates from Wichita Falls, were

set at \$859,718.

During a discussion on the budget, it was pointed out each cent on the tax rate generates about \$9,000. To increase tax revenues to cover the anticipated \$135,330 in the general fund, a 15-cent increase would be required.

Eventhough the city has not had a tax increase in some five years, aldermen generally agreed they wanted to cut every area possible to hold the rate as close to the current rate as they can.

Because monies cannot, by law, be transferred from the water fund to the general fund, as many costs as can be attributed to water department expenses as possible will be made, Barrington told the council.

He explained portions of salaries of all city hall personnel would be shared by the two departments.

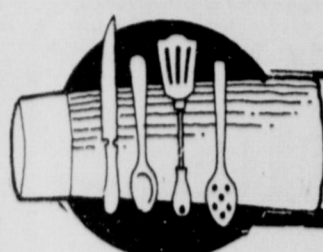

## Cook of the Week

A certain woman paid tribute to her wonderful grandmother's ability to cook by describing her this way "If there is such a thing as a kitchen green thumb," my grandmother has it. She asked her to share her mealtime recipe with her and this is what she said, "refresh the spirit, please the eye, tickle the nose and tease the appetite to satisfy body needs."

A friend enthusiastically described Polly (Mrs. Ben) Story, as a fantastic cook. It was easy to imagine that she has a degree in every department of cooking and a master's degree in cake baking from what the friend said.

When we interviewed Mrs. Story to be this week's cook, we learned that cooking is her main hobby and that she particularly enjoys baking cakes and preparing other desserts. Four of her recipes this week are of the "sweet tooth" kind and each one calls for sugar as one of the main ingredients.

Housewives today think nothing of going to the grocery store and purchasing a five or ten pound bag of sugar. In the nineteenth century, sugar was such a prized commodity it was included in a list of rare and precious gems presented as a wedding gift to Maria Theresa, the future queen of Hungary and Bohemia.

Hundreds of years before the birth of Christ, the people of India learned how to make sugar from sugar cane. Not until the time of the Crusades was sugar introduced by the Arabs into Europe. At first it was a great rarity and even used for medicine.

Ben and Polly Story and their sons, Greg 11 and Colby 7, moved to Iowa Park from Wichita Falls about a month ago. He is a Baptist evangelist and she has worked as a certified surgical technologist at Wichita General Hospital five years. They are members of the Pleasant Valley Baptist Church.

She was graduated from Wichita Falls High School. In addition to cooking, she enjoys canning fruits and vegetables and collecting cook books.

### GERMAN CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup Crisco or 2 sticks butter or margarine
- 1/2 t. salt
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 t. soda
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 pkg. German Sweet Chocolate melted in 1/2 cup hot water
- 4 egg whites (use yolks in frosting)

Cream butter or Crisco and sugar. Sift flour, salt and soda together. Add flour mixture and buttermilk alternately. (If you don't have buttermilk, add 2 T. vinegar to 1 cup milk.) Add German Sweet Chocolate and water mixed together. Mix well. Add 4 beaten egg whites, folding in well.

Pour into 3-9 inch greased and floured cake pans. Cook at 350 degrees 25 or 30 minutes according to your oven.

### ICING FOR GERMAN CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup coconut
- 1/2 cup pecans, chopped
- 4 egg yolks, beaten well
- 1 large can Pet milk
- 1/4 lb. oleo margarine
- 1 t. vanilla

Mix all ingredients in 2 qt. sauce pan and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until it bubbles and thickens. Spread between layers and on top of cake while still warm. Keep covered to keep moist.

### APPLE BUTTER

- 15-18 apples, peeled and chopped
- 2-2 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/3 t. allspice
- 1/3 t. cloves
- 2-2 1/2 t. cinnamon

Combine all ingredients and cook on low in crock pot 8-10 hours. Dip apples out of crock pot with slotted spoon. Put about 1/3 of apples in blender; blend on puree or mix for about a minute or until consistency of apple butter.

### SOUR CREAM POUND CAKE

- 1/2 lb. butter or margarine
- 3 cups sugar
- 3 cups flour

- 6 eggs, separated
- 1/4 t. baking soda
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 t. lemon extract

Cream butter and sugar, add egg yolks and mix well. Alternate adding flour and sour cream. Whip egg whites with dash of salt till stiff peaks form. Fold egg whites in with spatula. Do not use mixer. Grease and flour tube pan. Bake in 350 degree oven an hour and 10 minutes. Cool about 10-15 minutes, then remove from pan. Cover while still warm.

### CHICKEN EVERY SUNDAY

- 1 fryer cut up
- 1 cup long grain rice (not minute rice)
- 1 can Campbell's onion soup
- 1 can Campbell's celery soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 3 t. curry powder
- Salt and pepper to taste

Pour uncooked rice in bottom of 13x9x2 pan. Place pieces of chicken on top of rice after salting and peppering. Sprinkle 3 t. curry powder over this trying to get some on every piece of chicken. Do the same with celery and chicken soup. Cover with foil and cook 30-45 minutes in 375 degree oven. Remove foil and cook 15 minutes longer or long enough to slightly brown top. Remove from oven and enjoy.

### PUMPKIN NUT CAKE

- 3 cups sugar
- 1 cup shortening (2 sticks oleo)
- 3 eggs

Beat above ingredients well, then add:  
2 cups pumpkin and blend well. Add the following sifted together:  
3 cups flour  
1/2 t. baking powder  
1 t. soda  
1 t. cinnamon  
1 t. nutmeg  
1 t. cloves  
1 t. allspice  
1 t. vanilla

Mix well, add 1 cup pecans and mix well. Pour into greased and floured 10-inch tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour and 15 minutes. Cool only 10 minutes. Remove from pan and cover while still hot to retain moisture.

Well now you can get ready for higher state taxes. Yep, those same fellers in the legislature who passed the school reform bill and handed down a bunch of changes for the local districts to finance themselves, are in financial trouble.

We've been reading all sorts of dim predictions about the financial health of the state from the comptroller's office, ever since the price of oil went into its world-wide slump.

Well, Saturday down at Kerrville at the Texas Press Association, I got the word from the, excuse the term, horse's mouth.

Stan Schlueter of Killeen, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, plainly told us this state is in one heck of a fix, money-wise.

And since it appears it's going to take a couple of billion dollars just to bail the state out this year, not even looking ahead to next year, you can expect to see your pocket shrink daily.

I'm talking sales tax.

Schlueter mentioned the possibility of an increase in sales tax, but he spoke mainly about broadening of the sales tax base.

Shucks, the legislature did that in its last session, including removing exemptions on services, newspapers, etc.

Just to meet the current standard of state services, it is possible that all items and services presently exempted from sales tax will be put on the tax block.

If anything, from what I gathered from his talk, could be exempted it might be health care. But that's not a sure thing.

That's my impression. He didn't say that.

Looking ahead, I'd say the only way all exemptions aren't removed from sales tax, is the fact that we have an election coming up in November. And in that case, higher tax on those items already taxed may be their solution.

I didn't know exactly what to expect, my first time to hear the representative from Killeen. He's a businessman and rancher with a master's degree in economics who is supposed to be pretty hard-nosed and plain-spoken.

Well, plain-spoken he certainly is. I like him. This guy tells it like it is, to the point of being a Democrat and openly criticizing Mark

White and others in Austin.

Bless his heart. He's one of those exceptions holding elected office who apparently speaks through only one side of his face.

You might not like what he says, but you can believe him.

According to Schlueter, who pointed out the state's major source of revenue is from sales tax and not petroleum, he has been warning that Texas was going to get into money trouble, even before Bob Bullock!

And while on the subject of taxes, let me make a mention about this thing that has been going on several years. It's called Federal Revenue Sharing.

First of all, I've never been able to understand how, with the deficit the federal treasury has had all these years, they've been able to shell out money.

But my point is, I keep reading about all the crying the governors, county judges and city mayors are doing about that program being cut.

Anyone you hear say it's unfair for the feds to cut out the Federal Revenue Sharing fund is publicly admitting he doesn't have the guts to raise his own taxes, but would rather blame someone else for high taxes, while he spends it himself.

Anyhow, any way you figure it, the cost of living is going up, and it won't be due to higher wages or profit for the store where you do your buying.

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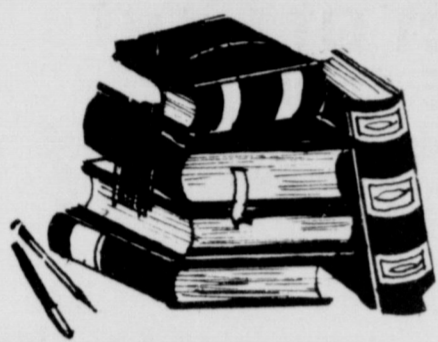

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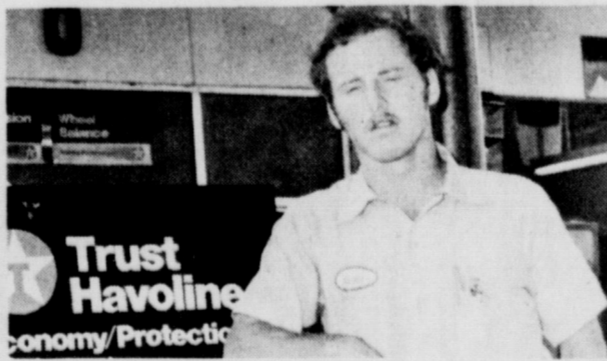
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## Tips On Dental Health

PORCELAIN FACINGS

A few years ago, if your teeth were stained, the only way you could correct the situation was with porcelain veneer crowns. Even though the teeth had not a single cavity, they had to be ground down in order to fit the crown.

Many people objected to grinding, the shot, the time, and sometimes the shades that were available for the porcelain crowns. I don't really blame them, however the dentist has to work with the materials that are available.

Now, thanks to continued research - things have changed. The dentist now has porcelain laminates or facings to work with. These very thin laminates made of porcelain gives the tooth the look and luster of natural tooth enamel. These facings can be fabricated then bonded to the front of the teeth with the relatively new light activated composites. Unless the teeth are unusually out of alignment, rotated, or severely broken these facings can be placed without shots or grinding.

We have used them to close spaces between the front teeth, cover stained and discolored teeth, correct alignment and change the shades of teeth. We have found them to be very durable and cost less than a full crown.

# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

The Wichita Regular Field gained a new producer when J.C. Wells completed the 5-L Ella Schulz two miles south of Clara.

The well indicated ability to pump 18 barrels of oil per day, plus 25 barrels of water. It was taken to a 1,050-ft. bottom, and will produce from a set of perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 960 to 972 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is located in a 63-acre lease in the HT&B Survey, A-474.

Drillsite is 2,755 feet from the north line and 1,925 feet from the east line of the lease.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 1 P.G. Krohn Inc., a 4,500-ft. wildcat well in Wichita County. The operation will be located two miles north of Electra in a 574-acre lease in the Waggoner Colony S/D Survey, Blk. 248.

The operator is Tom Swanson of Electra.

The well will be drilled 330 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the west line of the lease.

At a location six miles southwest of Burkburnett, Mobil Producing has finished a new oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 34 D.E. Holcomb, pumping oil at the rate of three barrels per day, plus 208 barrels of water.

Located one mile southwest of Iowa Park, the well was originally completed April 22, 1961 by Catlin & Ryan. It produced from perforations at 817 to 826 feet into the wellbore. The well's original total depth was 922 feet.

Drillsite is in a 23-acre lease in the H&GN Survey, A-23.

Location of the well is 150 feet from the most southerly south line and 1,475 feet from the most westerly east line of the lease.

Bohner Oil of Wichita Falls is planning to drill two 600-ft. developmental wells at drillsites two to four miles south-southeast of Burkburnett. The Nos. 20-R and 21-R Fresno-Roller will be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field in a 63-acre lease in the W.A. Grady Survey, A-367.

The 20-R well will be drilled 150 feet from the most northerly north line and 1,549 feet from the east line of the survey.

The 21-R well will be located 450 feet from the most northerly north line and 1,549 feet from the east line of the survey.

finaled by Thorn Oil.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, nine miles east-southeast of Burkburnett. Drillsite is in a 71-acre lease in the G. Wheelwright Survey, A-320.

Daily potential of one barrel of oil was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 1,242-ft. bottom, and production will be from perforations in the Thomas Formation, 1,194 to 1,199 feet into the wellbore.

The well is located 937 feet from the south line and 1,987 feet from the east line of the survey.

A new producer has been brought on line in Wilbarger County's Bryant-Dobos Field, with Sage Energy as the operator.

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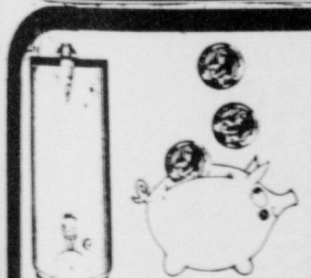
