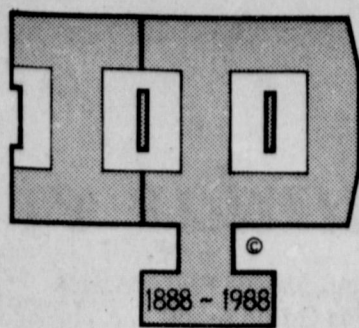

Records to fall here Saturday

A day of zany fun is promised for the second annual "World Of Records Day," scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. Saturday at the City Park.

Part of the "Summer in the Park" series, the day will include a myriad of record breaking events, some old and some new, suitable for all ages. The Iowa Park MuleSkinners will sell barbecue brisket sandwiches and iced tea from noon to 1:30.

Judging from participation in last year's events, those involved in planning the activities anticipate a good turnout Saturday.

Police Chief Alan Sheffield will be Master of Ceremonies for the events which will include brick throwing, bubble gum blowing, card throwing, knot tying, spitting

contest, frisbee throwing, apple bobbing, pea in the wind, whistling, harmonica, lip sync, water balloon fight, tug of war and hoola hoop contest.

The lip sync contest is an addition from last year, and Pat Raby, coordinator, said those wishing to enter that contest, which will be judged on originality, costume and lip sync, should provide his own tape.

The whistling contest should prove to be a challenge to even the most experienced whistlers, as Raby explained that whistlers will have to bite a lemon before competing.

All this fun will not go unrewarded, however. First, second and third place ribbons will be awarded in each event.

COMMUNITY CENTER

Council wants to know what citizens feel about it

Do the residents of Iowa Park want a community center, and if so, are they willing to pay for it?

That's what the city council wants to know.

Aldermen decided during their meeting Monday to have a master plan of developing a total community center in the extra large lot owned by the city between Third and Fourth Streets.

The plan will be published when developed, and public input sought.

Discussions have been ongoing for several months concerning the proposed center. Council members generally agree there is a need, but the cost and its financing are still up in the air.

At the last council meeting, a figure of \$1.2-million was used, and

reported in the Leader.

Mayor Tim Hunter said he had at least six persons to talk with him about the proposal, each opposing the project and each having a different use for the money.

However, Aldermen Bud Burch and Bud Mercer agreed that usually those who make the effort to complain about that type of project are not always in the majority.

Burch, referring to those who talked with Hunter said, "They took the time to comment for special projects and in opposition to the center, but were they thinking about the needs of the community as a whole?"

Aldermen discussed with the architect, Don Daugherty, what the minimum investment would be to construct a "bare bones" structure.

They were told approximately \$250,000, for a 9,800-square foot structure without finished walls and flooring, but providing the space, restrooms, airconditioning and a kitchen.

City Administrator James Barrington told the council a bond election would not be feasible for an amount under \$500,000, and a building costing \$250,000 could be built using certificates of obligation which could be retired over a period of time without a significant tax increase.

If the council wanted to pay for the building costing \$250,000 the first year, a 3.5-cent tax increase would generate the funds, he said.

A master plan drawing, showing how the city's land could eventually be developed with a community cen-

ter as the focal point, is to be drawn and presented to the public for input.

Though no date was set for a council meeting on the 1988-89 budget, Barrington said he and his staff have cut the initial deficit from \$134,000 to \$57,000, and are continuing to work on cuts.

"We're now looking a cutting some things we really want," he said.

A public hearing on annexing a 28.17-acre tract was held, but no one was present to make a statement on the issue.

A personal appearance that had been requested by Richard Mullins, in regard to a proposal to develop housing between First and Second streets on Alameda, but Mullins did not appear.

Absentee voting is underway here

Absentee voting for the special Dist. 30 State Senate election began Monday and will continue through Aug. 9 at the school/city tax collector's office.

The election will be held Aug. 13 to name a temporary replacement to fulfill the unexpired term created by the resignation of Ray Farabee.

On the ballot are Democrat Steven A. Carriker of Roby and Republican Bobby Albert of Wichita Falls.

Chamber to buy aluminum cans

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a one-day market Saturday for persons wishing to sell aluminum cans, brass and copper.

A repeat of a recent two-day market held last month, the Chamber will have a truck parked on the lot west of the city hall during the hours of 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Chamber leaders like plans for new building

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce unanimously approved a proposed drawing of the organization's new office building.

The structure, which would be located on the vacant lot across the street west of city hall, would be built by the City of Iowa Park in exchange for the present Chamber office.

Chamber President Robert Palmer, showed a drawing by Architect Don Daugherty of the proposed structure.

He said the building's exterior, if finally approved by the city council, would be completed in time for the annual Whoop-T-Do Oct. 22, but the interior likely would not.

Concerning the Chamber's plan to ask every organization in the community to have a special event or project sometime during the balance of the year, in conjunction with the city's 100th anniversary, Palmer said the 23 Study Club would participate.

The ladies' organization will have its yearbook dedicated to the centennial, with a special cover drawn by two members. Also, the Nov. 17 meeting would be special, with two or three early-day families recognized.

The Study Club's centennial chairman is Mrs. Jeanette Van Horn Short.

Chamber projects chairman Ken Via reported the organization raised about \$300 on its aluminum can project last month, and that another would be held this Saturday.

Directors approved purchasing a \$40 advertisement in the programs of both the Greenbelt Bowl and Oil Bowl football all star games in which Iowa Park players will appear.

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As I See It...

Forget the fact that the prisons of Texas are releasing dangerous inmates because there isn't enough space for their beds.

Forget the fact that there isn't enough state money available to fund state-mandated programs in public schools.

Forget the fact that Texas is one of the lowest-ranking states in the nation in public health funding.

Forget the fact that every business in Texas matches almost two percent of its payroll to finance the state's unemployment budget.

Forget the warnings of legislators that more and higher taxes are to come out of the next session.

And forget the fact that Texas is digging itself out of its worst financial slump since the Great Depression.

By golly, the National Audubon Society and Sierra Club members are happy!

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has announced it will spend a poultry \$8.8-million on a 336-square-mile patch of land for a new state park!

It's just a few miles from the huge Big Bend National Park, which is about three times the new park's size.

And why was it so important? Well, by golly, it includes the Solitario, an extinct volcano with an eight-mile diameter!

And the tract is known to provide habitats for at least 11 endangered species of plants and animals!

I suspect another reason is that it was owned by Humble Oil and Gas Co., and wasn't worth including in the firm's portfolio.

Located in Brewster and Presidio counties, the ranch is 215,000 acres in size. That almost doubles the entire state park land, which was 220,000 acres.

Palo Duro Canyon State Park was formerly the largest, at 15,104 acres.

The park is more than half the size of Wichita County, which has 612 square miles in its borders.

I'm not for sure how one will reach this treasure of a land mass, but apparently the family can turn south at Alpine on Highway 118, and find

it somewhere between there and the next town of Study Butte, which is right next to Terlingua.

Selling land to the federal and state governments has been popular down in that part of the country.

Besides the Big Bend National Park and whatever this monstrous tract will be called, there's the 3,840-acre Monahans Sandhills State Park, the 1,869-acre Davis Mountain State Park near Fort Davis, the 48-acre Balmorhea State Park in Reeves County, and the five-acre Fort Leaton State Park just outside Presidio.

Oh, back to parks commissioner Bob Armstrong. When he was state land commissioner, he had a deal working with the Humble owners to swap some state-owned land for this ranch. But the legislature nixed that one.

It seems about the only way this deal can be of benefit to Texans would be to require Armstrong to live there. And since it's such a treasure of open space and wildlife, he won't need a telephone, house or any of the things we're trying to pay for...after taxes.

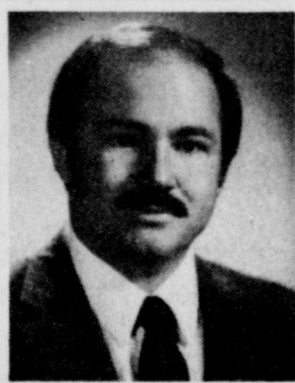
We realize that a political speech is supposed to cover all the bases, offering a little bit of something to everyone.

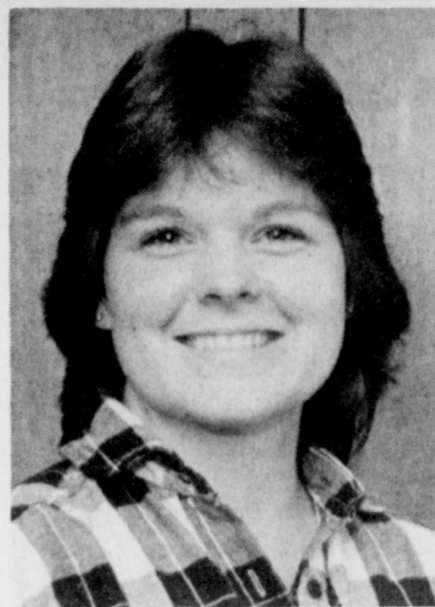
Mr. and Mrs. Vestal are graduates of Electra High School, and have lived in Iowa Park since their marriage.

ENCHILADAS

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 tsp. garlic powder
- 1 tsp. paprika
- 1/8 tsp. red pepper
- 4 dashes oregano
- 3 dashes cumin
- 2 (8 oz.) cans tomato sauce
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 (15 oz) can Ranch Style beans
- 2 cups water
- 12 large flour tortillas
- 1 lb. grated Cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese (or both)

Brown ground beef and onion. Drain fat. Stir in all the spices and water. Simmer 15 minutes. Stir in rest of canned ingredients. Simmer 10 minutes longer. Spoon into tortillas and roll up. Place seam side down in baking pan. Pour remaining sauce over enchiladas and add cheese. Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Excellent with picante sauce.

PICANTE SAUCE (Hot)

- 5 lbs. tomatoes, chopped fine
- 3 lbs. onions
- 1 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1 lb. jalapenos
- 1 pod garlic
- Salt to taste
- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch to thicken, if desired

Fresh or canned vegetables can be used. Chop all ingredients and put in large saucepan. Bring to a rapid boil, then cook at medium high heat 15 to 25 minutes. Put into canning jars. Makes about 8 pints.

SLOPPY JOES

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 medium bell pepper, chopped
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1/2 tsp. dry mustard
- Salt and pepper
- 1 (8 oz) can tomato sauce
- 2 Tbsp. ketchup
- 1/4 tsp. oregano

- 1/4 tsp. ground red pepper
- 1 can pinto beans (or Ranch Style)
- 4 jalapeno pepper, chopped

Brown ground beef, onion and bell pepper. Drain fat. Add all spices and jalapenos. Cook five minutes, then add rest of ingredients. Simmer until it thickens. Serve on toasted hamburger buns.

CHERRY CHEESE CAKE

- Graham cracker crust:
- 2 cups graham cracker crumbs (about 16)
- 1 stick butter or margarine, melted
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon

Mix all ingredients together. Pat into a nine-inch pie pan. Bake at 300 degrees 10 minutes. Let crust cool completely.

Filling:
1-8 oz. can cream cheese, softened
1-4 oz. can Eagle Brand milk (sweetened and condensed)
1/3 cup lemon juice
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1 can cherry pie filling

Cream cheese and Eagle Brand milk. Mix until smooth. Stir in lemon juice and vanilla. Pour into crust and chill three hours. Pour cherries over top and serve.

Bone as many chicken breasts as needed. Cut into small pieces. Prepare:

1 Tbsp. dried parsley
Salt, just a little
 - (2.) In a bowl
1 or 2 beaten eggs
1 Tbsp. milk
 - (3.) On a plate
Crushed Ritz crackers
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
- Dip chicken, in order, in numbers one, two and three. Freeze five minutes. Cook in skillet with 1/8-inch cooking oil on medium high heat until chicken is brown on both sides. Reduce heat, cover and cook five more minutes.

Iowa Park had to come through

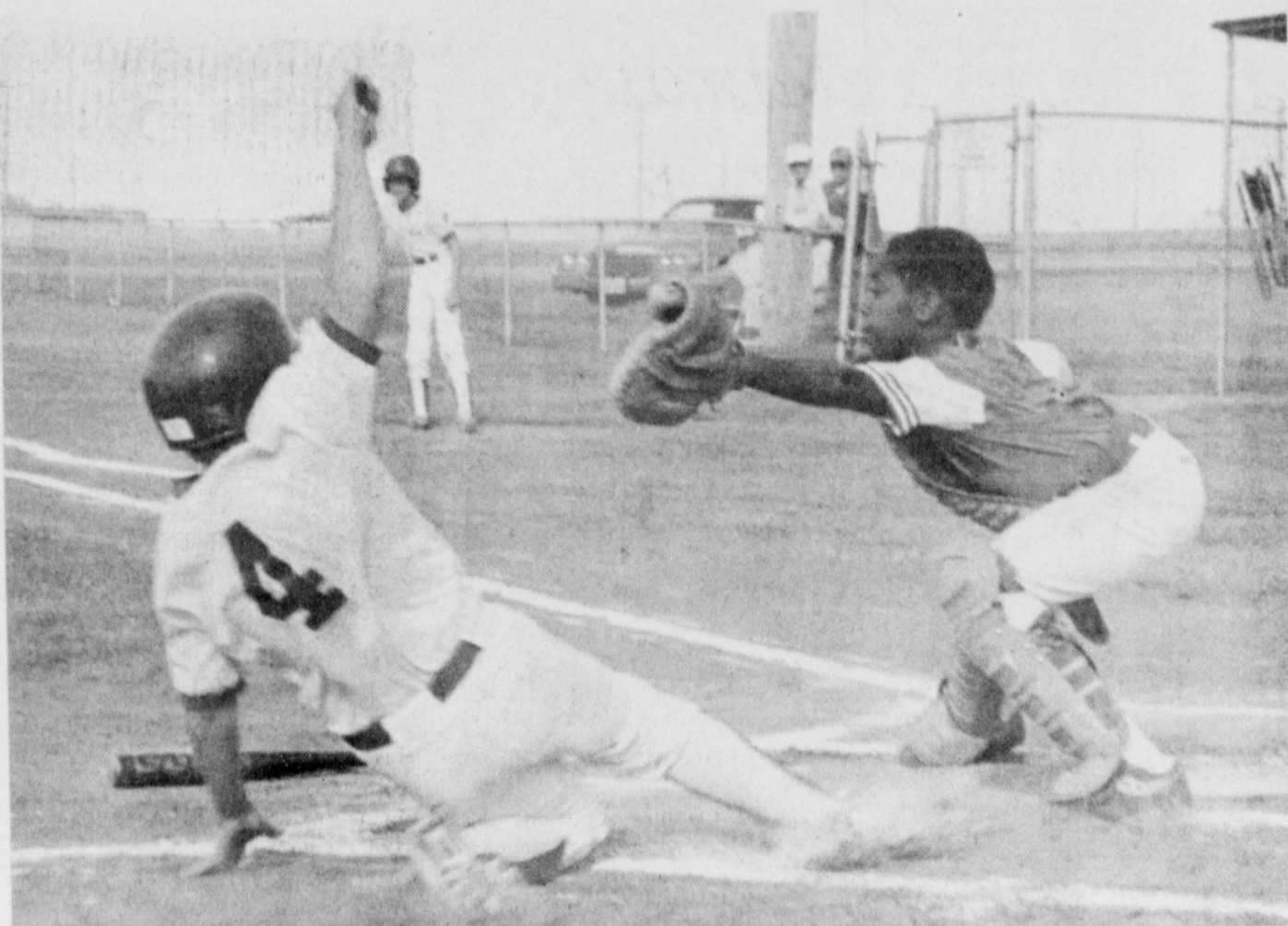
the losers' bracket, after dropping a 7-5 decision earlier to the Wichita Falls Colts, but won the next six games.

Former Hawks in bowl game

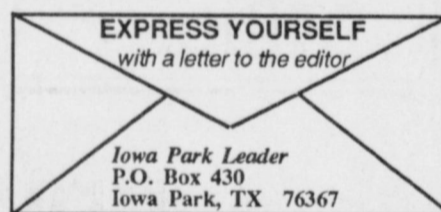
Two outstanding members of the 1987 Hawk football team have been invited to play in the 39th annual Greenbelt Bowl Football Classic at Childress.

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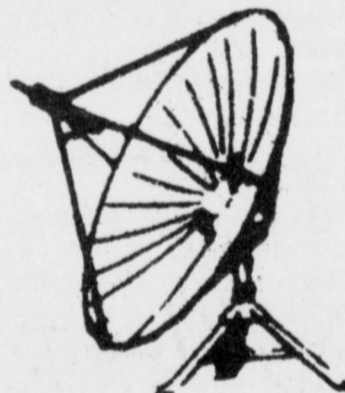
