5-CENT TAX HIKE

Trustees agree with need

Tuesday night they favor setting the tax rate for the 1988-89 school year at 81-cents, a five-cent increase. The rate, recommended by Supt.

Iowa Park school trustees said

Glen Mitchell, is to be officially set at a public hearing on the budget Aug. 18. Local maintenance portion of the

rate would be increased from 70-cents to 77.5-cents, and bonded and debt service decreased from six-cents to 3.5-cents. Net taxable values of the district,

\$255,510,685, are down almost \$4million from the previous year's values of \$259,107,052.

That, coupled with numerous state-mandated cost increases, was the reason Supt. Mitchell made his recommendation to hike the rate.

Even with the increase, Mitchell predicted the carryover at the end of the year would only be \$1,004,782, which, he said, was the minimum the district would need to start the 1989-90 year without having to borrow money from the bank.

Local revenues, based on a 95-

Park Ford among **UW Pacesetters**

Iowa Park's Park Ford has been selected among 16 "Pacesetters" that will kick off the 1988-89 Greater Wichita Falls United Way campaign.

The others are Burkburnett Wal-Mart, American National Bank, CertainTeed, Gates Molding Products, James Lane Air Conditioning, Mc-Alister Trucking, Red River Hospital, Sikes Senter Mall, Siemens, Stanley Proto, Target, Times Record News, United Way Agencies, Wichita Falls Clinic and Woodson Lincoln/Mercury.

A goal of \$290,966 has been announced, representing 16.5 percent of the \$1,760,000 total goal for the campaign.

'This year's Pacesetter's Campaign, as in past years, will be the barometer for the success of the overall campaign," said Mac McGee, regional manager of Southwestern Bell and Pacesetter chairman.

Tax rebates remain high

Sales taxes for the first seven months of this year are running 15.19-percent above the same period in 1987, according to the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park received a rebate check of \$20,147.46 this month, making the year's total to date \$118,570.38. At this same time last year, the city had received \$102,935.80.

The August check was 33.63percent greater than the same month's check last year.

Iowa Park continues to lead all other Wichita County communities in sales tax gains for the year. Burkburnett is 9.71-percent above this time last year, Electra 10.92, and Wichita Falls is only 2.09-percent.

Holliday is also showing a whopping gain over this time last year, with 41.23-percent. That city has now received \$43,596.86 after this months' check of \$7,536.92.

The August checks represent taxes collected by monthly and quarterly filers in June and reported to the comptroller's office by July 20.

percent collection rate, as well as other revenues and flow-through funds, are anticipated at \$2,868,182.

State and federal monies are expected to be \$2,813,809. That, added with the \$1.2-million carryover from the ending year, makes total funds available \$6,881,991, Mitchell told

Salaries of the district make up the major expenditure, \$4,247,903, or 72.28-percent of the budget, he

The administration trimmed almost \$94,346 from the proposed budget that was presented to the board at a called meeting last Thursday.

Mitchell said the board could adopt a four-cent budget increase and not have to hold a public hearing, as required by state law. He said, however, that the additional penny was

Cuts in the budget since it was first shown to the board trimmed the tax rate from 84-cents.

Should the 81-cent rate be put into place next week, a homeowner whose house is valued at \$50,000 will pay \$25 more in school taxes than last year, or \$405.

In other business, trustees approved bids for bread, milk and gasoline, accepted personnel resignations and hired new personnel, and heard recommendations that lunch prices be increased.

Low bidders included: Chester Wood Oil Co. for gasoline; Preston Dairy for milk, Oak Farms for ice cream, and Rainbo for bread.

Personnel resignations included David McCullar, choir; Caia McCullar, junior high resource; Meredith Long, eighth grade math, and Karen Whisnand, eighth grade science.

City asked to buy land from residents

Should the city government buy residential property that has been rendered virtually valueless because of an ordinance it has passed?

That is a question being studied by Iowa Park's city council following Monday night's meeting.

At issue is property in what has been determined by the federal government as a "floodway," located south and east of the Lake Gordon spillway.

The city passed an ordinance Nov. 29, 1982 that was written by a department of the federal government.

Passage of the ordinance followed a similar ordinance action by the Wichita County commissioners'

Beveraly Bohannon, a resident of the affected area who appeared before the council Monday as a spokesperson for her neighbors, told council members no building permits would be issued by city hall personnel, even in cases such as a garage needing repair because it is about to fall.

The ordinance requires an engineng study that is cost prohibitive to do any type of construction that requires a building permit, or even to locate a mobile home where one has been moved off.

The engineering study is required to show any improvements placed on land in the area would not affect other residences, in case of flooding, Mike Price, city public works director.

Engineer Kerry Maroney told the council a computer analysis and hydraulasis study are required, and the process is extremely expensive.

Bohannon, displaying frustration, stated, "In essence, we're just donating our property for everybody's benefit. The land is worthless."

After proposing the city buy the property so owners could relocate in areas not affected by the ordinance, she said "I don't feel like we (homeowners) should pay the premiums for the insurance (federal assistance in case of a disaster and others who qualify for flood insurance)."

Some residents in the affected area have even had their values increased recently, she told the council.

A neighbor said his value had been increased, but admitted he only talked with an assessor and did not appear before the county board that has the power to reduce assessed values.

At one point during the discussion, Mayor Tim Hunter looked at a city map to see if the area were on the border of the city, as a possible area that could be disannexed.

It was not on the border, however, and the idea was dismissed.

After a lengthy discussion, a motion to table the issue for further information was approved by council

In other business, aldermen approved purchase of computer hardware and software to replace that now being used by city hall and police

Total cost was set at \$44,500.

tion of extending the project further north, but the city could not insure completion before school's start. In order for the city to act as its

own general contractor in construction of the new Chamber of Commerce office building, the council approved, for the project only, raising the administrator's purchasing limit to \$5,000 from \$3,000.

Administrator James Barrington explained the temporary change would make it possible for him to order materials without time-consuming requests to the council.

Aldermen also approved a threeyear contract with the auditing firm of Gant and Toombs, which will hold the annual cost to \$8,000 per audit for that period of time, and could result in a savings over the period of the contract, Barrington explained.

Another required public hearing on the proposed annexation of a 28acre tract of land was held, without comment, and the final hearing will be in September.

The area to be annexed adjoins the road on the west side from US 287 to Lake Iowa Park.

Damage caused by the thieves as the items were taken from mountings was about as expensive as the cost of the stolen items, owner Rusty Rusk said later.

Several pieces of equipment belonging to the Iowa Park schools were also recovered Sunday.

Police were informed that the equipment was believed to be located on the property of Kenneth Watts, southwest of the city. An officer and two deputies went

to the location, where the items were

identified and turned over to school

The items included a 100-gallon sprayer, a power saw and scaffoling with boards and pins.

No charges have been filed in the case, police said.



As I See It ... by BOB HAMILTON

Before you blow your top about that five-cent school tax increase story on the front page, let me make a few comments.

If and when it is approved by the school board next Thursday, Iowa Park will still have the lowest rate I'm aware of, in this part of the state.

Our school tax rate this past year was 76-cents. Wichita Falls' was 82-cents, and that district's trustees are taking a hard look at raising their's.

Even if Wichita Falls doesn't hike its rate, which is almost a sure thing, our's would still be one-cent lower at 81-cents.

I've done some random collecting of current school district tax rates, which have been published in newspapers of the area.

Of 17 districts, all of which are in an area between here and Fort Worth except Slaton and Canyon up on the plains, Bowie has the next lowest rate to our's: 85-cents.

Decatur has the highest rate I could find, at \$1.39. That district's board is looking at possibly raising its rate to \$1.52. Alvord has \$1.65, Boyd \$1.45, and Springtown \$1.42. Bridgeport is \$1 and looking at \$1.24.

The average tax rate of the 17 school districts, not including Iowa Park, is \$1.10.

As I've said several times before, you can blame all these high tax rates on House Bill 72, the product of H. Ross Perot, former governor Mark "Whooeee" White and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, to name a few.

I had a chance to get some insight into the passage of HB 72 this week when State Sen. Bill Sarpalius was in my office. He's campaigning for the U.S. Representative post being vacated by Beau Boulter.

He admitted voting for HB 72, based on the fact he was a former teacher and response he received from writing every teacher in the Amarillo school district.

bill he didn't like when it came out of committee for floor vote, he said he was hopeful of making corrections in the following session.

Part of the reason he said he voted for the school reform bill was the fact that White, the guy people told me was "God's gift to the Democrats," stood before the joint legislature and said there would be adequate funding for the legislation.

There wasn't.

In fact, the mandates of HB 72 have cost Texans more dearly than the slump in oil. Far more. And it will continue, unless changed.

Anyway, Sarpalius said he was a big believer in vocational education. He believes that vocational training will keep more "at-risk students" from dropping out than any other program a school can offer.

Sarpalius credits all the cuts in state funding of vocational education to Perot, and charges that Hobby led the fight to cut the funds for the programs.

I asked Sarpalius what part he felt the federal government should, or could, play in public education.

He said the feds should not tell a district how to run its school, and then pointed out that the dropout rate on the national level was too high.

The federal government can make monies available to encourage kids to stay in school, primarily through funding of vocational education, he said.

On a political note, I asked the Amarillo legislator how his campaign was going, and he responded with a recent poll showing him ahead of Larry Milner, his Republican opponent also from Amarillo, by 13 percent.

He pointed to the fact that Milner is staying at home and not out campaigning the way he was.

I'll go along with that. Milner is a ghost who is trying to ride the shirt tails of Boulter and the national Republican ticket.



requires that it be recorded as an absence, not a tardy.

In order to benefit students, parents, faculty and staff of Iowa Park High School, we have developed the following objectives and procedures to correct attendance problems.

Objectives

1. Improve attendance and thus improve learning and grades.

2. Increase parent involvement in the process by keeping both student and parents informed of the status of the student's attendance.

Streamline the overall process by implementing new procedures.

Procedures

Beginning with the first day of school, the computer will be programmed to prepare a letter for the attendance office to mail to parents of students who have excessive absences based on the following guidelines.

First Semester

First letter will be sent after the student has accrued a total of four absences

Second letter - eight absences Third letter - 12 absences Fourth letter - 13 absences; notification of loss of credit

Second Semester
First letter will be sent after the student has accrued a total of four

Second letter - eight absences
Third letter - 12 absences
Fourth letter - 13 absences; noti-

fication of loss of credit.

Each of the four letters will notify the student and parents of the total number of absences accrued to that date. In addition, the letter will indi-

cate a date for the parents to meet with the attendance committee. These meetings with parents will be each Wednesday at 9:10 a.m. in the Iowa Park High School conference room. Parents will be expected to call and confirm the appointment by noon the Tuesday prior to the conference date.

The purpose of the conference will be to offer the students an op-

portunity to correct their attendance problem, to actively involve the parents in the process, to provide an opportunity for peer counseling, and to enable the staff to assist in correcting the attendance problem.

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TRUTH IN TAXATION/1988

This week's Cook of the Week, Pat (Mrs. Don) Duerson, is a cook who enjoys canning, and has included three of her canning recipes for Leader readers to enjoy.

Mrs. Duerson said she usually does her canning in July, when most fruits and vegetables are in season. The recipes she submitted for Bread and Butter Pickles, Lime Pickles and Spiced Peaches should prove to be a welcome addition to the supper table at any time during the year.

Christmas is another busy time for cooks, and Mrs. Duerson is no exception. She said the holidays usually bring some 40 members of her family to her home, no small order to fill for any cook. She also included two of her sons' favorite fudge recipes she makes at Christmas, Fudge Icing or Candy and Peanut Butter Fudge.

Mr. and Mrs. Duerson have been married 36 years and lived in Iowa Park 26 years. The couple have two sons, Ronnie, enlisted in the U.S. Navy, and Mike of Iowa Park; and three grandsons. Pat is employed at Bethania Regional Health Care Center, and Don at ABF Motor Frame.

In her spare time, Mrs. Duerson enjoys boating and swimming.

SPICED PEACHES

Combine 5 cups sugar, 2 cups water, 1 cup vinegar, 12 inches stick cinnamon (broken) and 2 tsp. whole cloves. Heat to boiling.

Into mixture drop enough small peeled peaches to fill approximately

five pint jars. Heat peaches in syrup about five minutes. Pack hot fruit in hot pint jars; add syrup to within 1/2inch of top and adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath 20 minutes, (time begins when water returns to boil).

BREAD AND BUTTER **PICKLES**

- 4 quarts sliced medium cucumbers 6 medium white onions, chopped
- 2 green peppers, chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1/3 cup salt
- 5 cups sugar
- 3 cups cider vinegar
- 1 1/2 tsp. turmeric
- 1 1/2 tsp. celery seed 2 Tbsp. mustard seed

Do not pare cucumbers; slice thin. Add onions, peppers and garlic. Add salt; cover with cracked ice, mix thoroughly. Let stand three hours. Drain well. Combine remaining ingredients. Pour over cucumber mixture. Heat to boil then cook about 30 minutes on low heat. Seal in hot jars.

LIME (CANDIED SWEET) **PICKLES**

Use 7 lbs. cucumbers (larger ones). Slice into quarters, peeling bad spots only. Put into crock with 2 cups canning lime and 2 gallons water.

Soak 24 hours.

Rinse real well three or four times. Slice to size you want pickles to be and return to crock. Soak covered with clear water three hours. Drain water off and cover with the following, which has been brought to boiling:

- 2 qts. cider vinegar
- 4 1/2 lbs. sugar
- 1 Tbsp. salt 1 tsp. celery seed
- 1 tsp. whole cloves
- 1 tsp. pickling spices.

LET STAND OVERNIGHT.

Next morning or approximately eight hours later, drain juice off the cucumbers and bring to boil again, adding a few drops of green food coloring. Then drop cucumbers back into juice and cook about 45 minutes to one hour, until pickles turn iridescent in color.

Store in sterilized jars and pour liquid into jars to approximately 1/4inch from top. Seal.

FUDGE ICING OR CANDY

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/4 cup Karo syrup
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 2 squares chocolate (or 3 Tbsp. cocoa)
- 1/4 tsp. salt Chopped pecans

Stir over low heat until all melts. Stirring constantly, bring to a boil, and boil three minutes. Remove from heat and beat until luke-warm. Add 1 tsp. vanilla. Pour over cake or

beat until good consistancy to pour into buttered dish.

PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

Mix following ingredients together in pan and cook slow until forming soft ball in cup of tap water: 1/2 cup brown sugar

- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup peanut butter 1/2 cup milk

Beat with spoon until mixture loses its shine and is hard enough to pour into buttered plate.

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Two new producers have been brought on line in the Wichita County Regular Field, with Commonwealth Production of Dallas as the operator.

The No. 6-C C. Birk is located four miles northeast of Clara in a 160-acre unit in the F. Huseman Survey, A-93. The well is located 1,240 feet from the south line and 1,075 feet from the east line of the survey. It pumped 64 barrels of oil per day, plus ten barrels of water. Bottomed at 1,670 feet, production will be from a perforated interval in the Gunsight Sand, 1,564 to 1,580 feet into the hole.

The No. 8-C Birk "B" is located in a 160-acre unit in the F. Huseman Survey, A-93, 1,440 feet from the south line and 1,900 feet from the east line. Drillsite is six miles northwest of Burkburnett. It indicated ability to pump 68 barrels of oil daily plus 40 barrels of water. Production will be from the Gunsight Sand at 1,592 to 1,595 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,670 feet.

McCormick-Gordon of Plano has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field, 2.5 miles northeast of Electra. The operator has 108 acres leased, with drillsite in the SPRR Survey, A-280. The well will be located 5,060 feet from the north line and 2,850 feet from the southeast line, and is designated as the No. A-29 J.H. Marriott.

At a location three miles southeast of Clara, Atapco of Midland has finaled a new oil producer in the Wichita County Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 61-A H. Reilly, pumping oil at the rate of 40 barrels per day. Production will be from perforations in the Gunsight Formation, 1,480 to 1,500 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,750 feet with plugback to 1,610 feet.

The No. 1 Brown Ranch "109", an 8,600-ft. deeper pool wildcat well, is scheduled to be drilled in Hardeman County. Baker & Taylor Drilling is the operator. At a location six miles northwest of Burkburnett, Commonwealth Production of Dallas has finaled a new oil producer in Wichita County's Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 9-C C. Birk "B", pumping at the rate of 29 barrels of oil per day. Location is 1,150 feet from the south line and 1,900 feet from the east line in a 160acre unit in the F. Huseman Survey.

Bottomed at 1,730 feet, the well will produce from the Gunsight Sand, 1,592 to 1,594 feet into the

The No. 15 J.H. Bentley has been finaled by F.T. Felty of Burkburnett.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. Drillsite is 3.5 miles south of Burkburnett. Locaiton is in a 170acre lease in the CTRR Survey,

2,721 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the west line.

Daily potential of four barrels of oil was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 635-ft. bottom, and production will be from perforations in the Cisco Formation, 571 to 581 feet into the wellbore.

The Wichita County Regular Field gained a new producer when Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett completed the No. 42 Tidewater 2.5 miles southeast of Fowlkes.

The well indicated ability to pump oil at the rate of three barrels per day. It was taken to a 2,000-ft. bottom with plugback to 1,000 feet. Production will be from a set of perforations in the Permian Formation, 884 to 898 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 158-acre lease in the SA&MG Survey, 2,440 feet from the north line and 2,430 feet from the west line.

Three new producers with combined ability to pump 89 barrels of oil per day have been finaled in the Wichita Regular Field about three miles southeast of Clara.

Atapco of Midland is the operator.

The wells are designated as the Nos 29, 62 and 63 Reilly "A".

They showed ability to pump 49, 22 and 18 barrels of oil per day, respectively along with widely divergent volumes of salt water. The No. 62 made 178 barrels of water per day, while the No. 49 and No. 63 produced seven and one, respectively.

Atapco bottomed the wells at 1,950, 1,750 and 1,750 feet, respectively. The No. 63 was plugged back to 391. 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Two 2,000-ft. developmental wells are planned by Tom Swanson of Electra at drillsites two miles south of Fowlkes, Wichita County. The locations are in a 140-acre lease in the SA&MG Survey. The No. 55 Burnett "D" is 150 feet from the south line and 1,554 feet from the west line. The No. 56 Burnett "D" is 1,050 feet from the south line and 1,479 feet from the west line. Both wells are in the Wichita County Regular Field.

A 2,000-ft. developmental well is planned by Cal Jeter of Wichita Falls at a drillsite eight miles eastsoutheast of Kamay, Wichita County. The location is in a 160-acre unit in the Denton CSL Survey, 1,000 feet from the north line and 1,150 feet from the west line. It is in the Wichita County Regular Field.

Joe Miller & Bobby J. Parker have given up their efforts to make producers out of the Nos. 5 and 6 D.G. Parker. They were developmental efforts in the Wichita County Regular Field. Locations were 5.5 miles south-southeast of Iowa Park. Spudded May 24 and May 25, the wells had reached 800-ft. and 1,396ft. total depth, respectively.

An undrilled location has been abandoned by R.L. Robertson of Iowa Park at a drillsite six miles northeast of Kamay, Wichita County Regular Field. The venture had been designated as the No. 26 F.M. Love. Location was in a 40-acre unit in the W.S. Kennard Survey, 500 feet from the north line and 150 feet from the west line.

Al King Petroleum of Wichita Falls has abandoned three undrilled locations in the Wichita Regular Field. The wells included the Nos. 18, 19 and 20 Goetze. The drillsites were nine miles northeast of Electra for the No. 18 and five miles southwest of Clara for the other two wells. Total depths had been projected to 1,900 feet at all three.

Operating out of Austin, Kingdom Resources has filed for permit to drill the No. 7 Guggisburg in the Wilbarger Regular Field, about five miles south of Lockett. The venture will be located in a 200-acre lease in the W.A. McKinney Survey A-1758. It is situated 775 feet from the north line and 2,900 feet from the west line of the survey. Total depth is projected to 2,999 feet.

Two developmental wells are scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field, about two miles southeast of Fowlkes, with Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett as the operator.

The wells will be known as the No. 16 Burnett "D", carrying permit for 1,000 feet of hole and the No. 43, scheduled for maximum depth of 2,000 feet.

The Burnett well is in an 80-acre unit in the SA&MG Survey A-430, 1,175 feet from the north line and 1,360 feet from the east line of Block 4. The Tidewater well is in a 158acre lease, same survey, 2,720 feet from the north line and 2,508 feet from the east line of Block 4.

A California operator will seek new field designation following the completion of a successful wildcat in Wilbarger County about one mile south of Oklaunion.

Elwood's Company's No. 1 Ramsey showed ability to flow 123 barrels of oil daily along with 50,000 CF casinghead gas on a 20/64 choke.

The Los Angeles company took the hole to total depth of 8,075 feet and plugged it back to 7,400. Production will be from Pennsylvanian Conglomerate perforations, 6,934 to 6,970 feet into the wellbore.

Two different operators have abandoned undrilled locations in Hardeman County. The aborted ventures include the No. 1 Wells, a deepening re-entry which had been slated about five miles northeast of Quanah, and the No. 1 Rapp-Koontz, a re-entry operation planned about one-half mile south of Chillicothe. The Wells well was a wildcat which had been written off as a dry hole with TD of 8,040 feet when finaled in October of 1952. The Rapp-Koontz had been completed as a flowing oiler in January of 1984, making 184 BOPD from Pennsylvanian Conglomerate perforations at 7,432 to 7,444 feet into the hole.

ATAPCO of Midland has revealed plans to drill five 1,750-ft. developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field. The operator has 2,100 acres leased, with drillsite in Wichita County's L.C. Dennison A-55 Survey and has designated the ventures as the Nos. 59-A, 60-A, 61-A, 62-A and 63-A H. Reilly. Drillsite is three miles southeast of

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 63 S.M. Daniels, a 2,000-ft. developmental oil well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operation will be located five miles southeast of Burkburnett in a 250-acre lease 820 feet north of the line and 1600 feet east of the line in the H. Hastie A-99 Survey, Wichita County. The operator is F.T. Felty of Burkburnett.

The Waggoner Estate has plugged and abandoned an unsuccessful developmental bid in the Wilbarger Regular Field eight miles south of Vernon. Designated as the No. 4 Jaconson, the well was spudded in the latter part of February and probed to a dry bottom at 2,100 feet.

Pumping 40-gravity crude at the rate of 38 barrels per day, the No. 7-C Birk "B" has been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field, about six miles northwest of Burkburnett.

The well was an exploration venture of Dallas-based Commonwealth Production Inc.

Commonwealth took the hole to total depth of 1,680 feet and perforated the Gunsight Sand for production at 1,606 to 1,607 feet into the hole. Water production totaled about 130 barrels daily.



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
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Ranch Roundup nears

Cowboys are alive and well on the Burnett Ranch outfits operating in the Iowa Park area.

Not the ones who ride across your television screen in Mercedes Benz and 10-gallon Stetsons. Or the ones who run up and down the plastic turf in helmets and shoulder pads. Or even the ones who ride bulls and broncs bareback in the professional rodeo arena.

But real, honest-to-God, ropin' and ridin', sunup to sundown cowboys. The lean, weathered kind immortalized by Remington. Wiry as buffalo grass and tough as mesquite. The kind who punch cattle on the open range for a living -- and because it's "the best kinda life there is."

August 19-20, working cowboys from the Burnett Ranches and 11 other well-known Texas ranches will meet in Wichita Falls to put their skills to the test, competing for braggin' rights as Best Ranch in Texas. The event: The eighth annual Texas Ranch Roundup.

It is held at the Wichita County Mounted Patrol Arena on FM 369.

Sponsored by Budweiser and the North Texas Rehabilitation Center, the Texas Ranch Roundup takes Old West fans back to the late 1890s and the cattle industry's inception on the Texas frontier.

During this time, entire ranch families would get together at the end of Spring roundup and let off steam, swap stories around the campfire, and watch as dads, brothers, cousins and hired hands competed against other outfits at working cattle.

Like these early "rodeos," the Texas Ranch Roundup pits real working hands and wagon bosses from real working ranches -- some of the oldest and most historic in the state --- against each other in events patterned closely after daily ranch chores.

There's roping, branding, penning, horse breaking (better known as bronc riding) and wild cow milking. There's also chuckwagon cooking (cowboys still make the best homemade biscuits in a pot on the ground) and a talent competition featuring painting and photography as well as favorite campfire songs and skits.

Despite modern technology, the cowboy's life and the way he works hasn't changed much in more than 100 years. It's still rough and romantic.

The Triangle and 6666 camps of the Burnett Ranches are known as

much for their legends as they are for their historical contributions to Texas ranching.

Legend has it that ranch founder Capt. Samuel Burk Burnett won his initial property with a poker hand of four sixes, hence the name, "Four Sixes." Actually, sometime in the



early 1870s, Burnett purchased a small herd of cattle already branded with four sixes and then decided to extend the brand to the ranch name.

"Capt. Burk," as he was fondly called, turned his initial investment into one of the largest cattle empires in Texas. His herds grazed in northcentral Texas and in the Apache, Kiowa and Comanche Indian territories of Oklahoma.

Much of the land used by Capt. Burk and other ranchers was leased from Indian Chief Quanah Parker, whom they considered both friend and business associate.

The Burnett holdings soon extended beyond the legendary 6666 ranch. Under Capt. Burk's watchful eye, his son Tom developed the famous Triangle Ranches.



Springtown superintendent of schools Conny Martin says an article in the Springtown Epigraph misquoted him, even after being repeated the second week. Iowa Park's Supt. When Springtown played here in 1986, that school's share of the gate was \$3,795.


