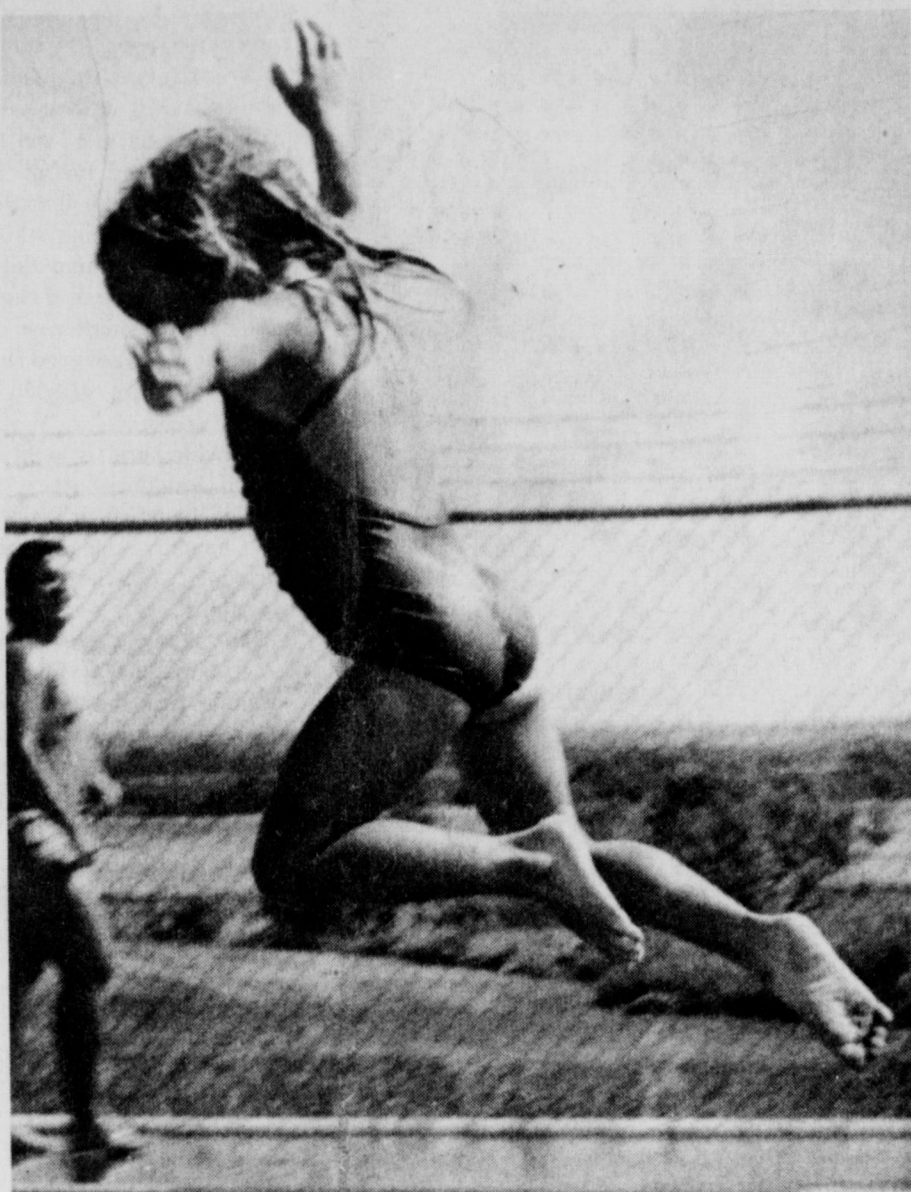
### Four complete gallon plateaus

## Ex Hawks organizing for fund-raising events

An athletic branch of the Iowa Park Ex-Students Association is being organized for the purpose of fund-raising to finance a scholarship created during the past year.

The Alumni Athletic Association (AAA) will have its own officers and budget, but will be associated with the parent organization, according to Jerry Spruiell.

Various activities, such as a softball game July 26 between the Alumni and a team composed of Fire Department and Police Department members, will be used to fund the Bertha McDonald Scholarship.

Other activities already tentatively scheduled will be basketball and volleyball games against members of the Police Dept.

An all-day membership registration for the AAA has been set Aug. 3, in the Texas Electric Reddy Room. At that time, members will also set up a calendar of activities for the year.

Open to memberships for both men and women, only those who played varsity athletics at Iowa Park High will be permitted to join and

participate in the fund-raising activities, Spruiell emphasized.

An unique team format has been set up for the July 26 softball game. There will be more players on the field, the number is not yet definite, but at least two women must be in the

field at all times. Team membership will be comprised of 10 men and five women.

Spruiell said some of the games, such as basketball and volleyball, will have age brackets, so some older players will not be competing with others much younger.

## Council to consider overriding mayor veto

A major portion of Monday night's meeting of the city council is a carryover from the June 10 meeting.

Aldermen will be given an opportunity to override a veto issued by Mayor Tim Hunter, concerning paving of a street in the south part of town, consider adopting rules of order which prompted the veto, and also discuss two ordinances which have in the past been only policies of the council.

The city meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Hunter said he did not veto the council's split vote approving a paving proposal because of the issue, but rather due to "procedural questions."

"The council does not recognize in its Code of Ordinances any procedural process such as Roberts Rules of Order," Hunter stated in his written reason for the veto.

The vote, concerning the city's participation in paving East Garden Drive, was approved by two aldermen voting for the motion, one against, one abstaining and one alderman being absent.

On Monday's agenda, aldermen will

have an opportunity to reconsider the mayor's veto, and consider an ordinance adopting Roberts Rules of Order for business sessions.

An allied ordinance to be considered would, if passed, require developers to pay all expenses for paving. This has been a practice of the city since 1978, when it was adopted by resolution, but is not binding on future councils.

Another outshoot from the previous council meeting will be the proposal of an ordinance concerning water service to residents requesting it to property adjacent to the city limits but not in the city.

This, also, has been a policy of previous councils, but never enacted as an ordinance.

Both the paving and water service ordinances are on the agenda as discussion items, and no action is to be taken on either at Monday's meeting.

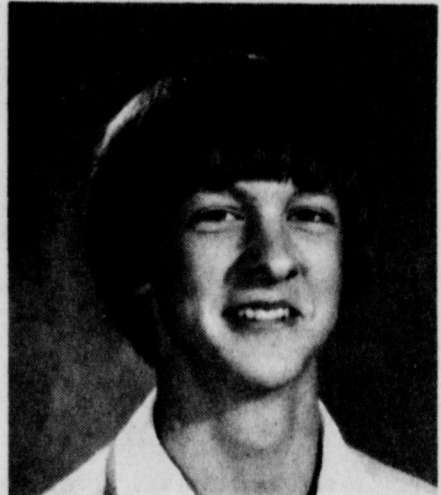
Finances appear in two different topics of Monday's agenda.

Council members will discuss a schedule for budget workshops, preparing for the fiscal year which begins in October, and also discuss establishment of a fund which would be dedicated to capital improvements, similar to one in use for water and sewer projects.

Other items on the agenda are consideration of bids to sell a police cruiser, and appointments of citizens to future goal task forces.

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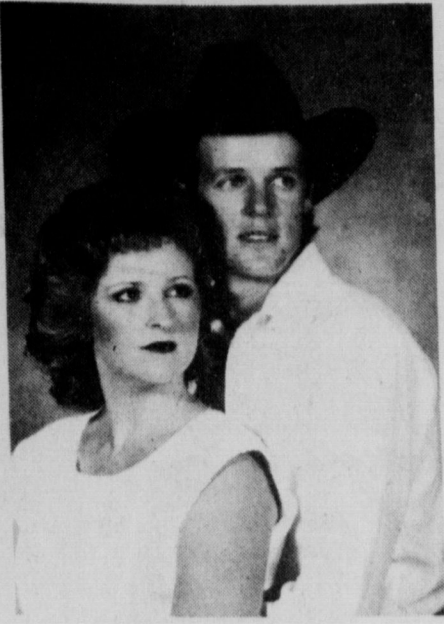

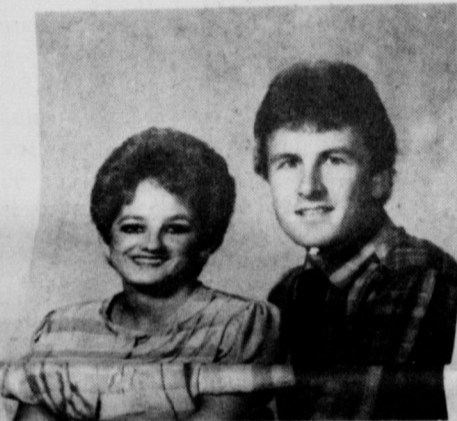

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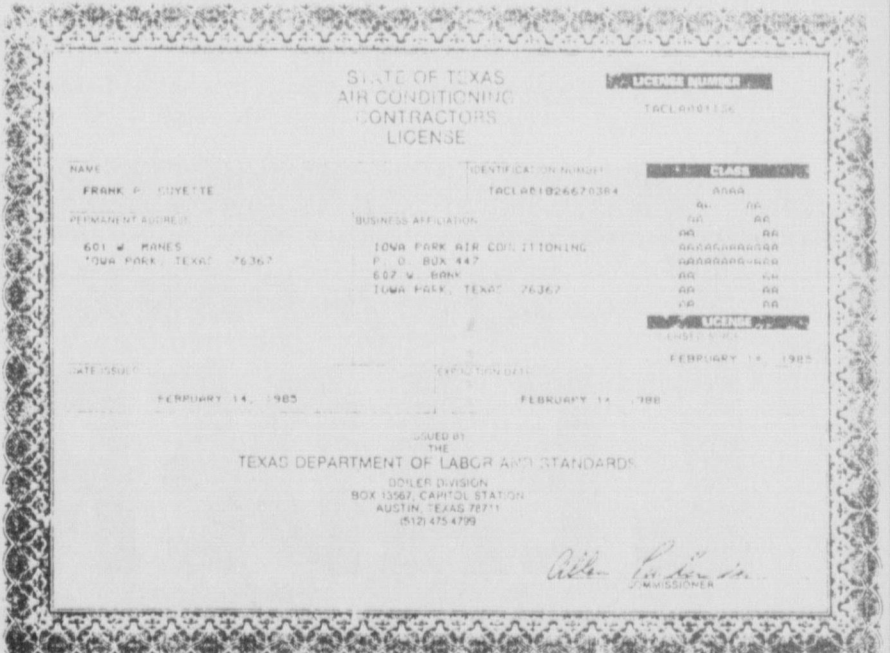


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# As I See It....

While many members of our state legislature, and the governor, are still breaking their arms patting themselves on the back about not raising taxes during the recent session, you folks who haven't been watching closely need to understand just what the august body did.

The fact is, they just shifted the burden of collections to local levels, and increased the flood of dollars to state coffers by hundreds of millions annually.

County Judge Tom Baucus put major emphasis on the topic when the commissioners' court met here Monday, by setting aside the agenda and commenting on facts to the audience.

He wanted the public to know that when the legislature, for instance, raised the cost of a marriage license from \$5 to \$25, only \$5 of that increase stays in the county.

"In many cases, 50 percent of increased user fees goes to the state comptroller as a tax," he said.

This is offsetting the state's repeal

of its ad valorem tax, legislators so often brag about, the judge stated.

And since approximately half the user fees have been used to finance county government in the past, and that money is not increased for local use, the only place the county has to get the increased costs of local government is through ad valorem taxes.

He didn't say it, but I'm taking it that our county tax rate will increase this year.

What "user fees" were increased by the state? Well, in part, annual auto inspections, which started at \$2 are now \$5.25, will go to \$7.75 for older cars and \$15 for new ones. Don't ask me to explain that one. The new ones should be the cheapest, I'd think.

That takes effect Sept. 1, as does the increase of drivers license from \$10 to \$16. And filing of a civil suit in a state district court went from \$25 to \$75, and probation fees from \$15 a month to \$40 a month.

Got some kids at home who plan to go to college? The tuition increase is said to be tripled, from \$4 per hour to

\$12. But goes on up to \$16 per hour in fall of 1986, and will increase \$2 per semester hour each two years until it reaches \$24 in the fall of 1995.

The Legislative Budget Board has estimated the bill would bring in revenue totaling \$285.8 million over the next two years.

Oh, remember that \$10 you may have paid for the personalized vehicle license plates when they were first offered? Well the fee is now \$75.

"You should be very careful about what they (the legislature) did. They brag about not raising taxes, but that's really what all this is," Judge Baucus said.

Seems to me the state also distributed the responsibility of collecting these new "taxes" to local levels, and therefore held down state costs for administration.

And if you want to see some more of the legislature's handiwork, concerning your tax dollars, I encourage you to read the letter written in this issue by Holliday School Superintendent Dan Owen. It's a real eye opener.

## Time to pay the tab

The 1985 regular session of the legislature is now history. There were very few changes in the reforms in education passed in the special session one year ago. These are the reforms better known as HB 72. A number of educators, parents and students felt several changes would occur in this session. About the only thing passed that affected education at all was the 30 minute duty free lunch period for teachers.

The main reason for the reform in education was due to the way Texas compared with the rest of the nation in test scores. Out of HB 72 came a complete re-organization of the education system in the state of Texas. This went all the way from the curriculum in the classroom to the complete change of financing. I feel it was the biggest change that was ever made in education. I know it has been in the thirty-one years that I have been in public school teaching.

The fire is out and most of the smoke has cleared from these changes for classroom teachers, Ag. teachers and administrators. The time now has come for the local tax payers to pay the tab. The cost actually started last year, but some school districts had some carry over money and were able to use some of it to keep the tax rate down. Now every school district in Wichita and Archer counties is facing the increase in this cost. As you know most of our legislative representation in this area said we would not see much of an increase in these reforms. When area administrators tried to tell these people, the remark from them was that "They do not understand what we are doing".

In this letter I am not taking issue with the reforms, whether good or bad. I feel we will have to wait and

see the effect of: teacher testing, no pass-no play rule, ten-day rule, tutorials, no social promotion, teacher career ladder, and teaching of essential elements. I do know that test scores will improve. The main reason for this improvement is that the weaker students will drop out. Any one can figure out that when you take out your students that make grades under 70, that it will raise the average of your remaining students. In past years, education has been working with the aim of keeping all student in school. Now we need to see what the effect will be on the ones who have dropped out. Will the reforms then have a large effect on the remaining students? Our taxpayers now must answer the question, "Is it worth the cost?" I also want our taxpayers to know the cost is high. Anyway, in this area it will be.

In my school, Holliday I.S.D., as an example:

(1) We have since last year raised our tax rate by .10 (approximately a 18% increase). We did not have the surplus funds to take off the burden.

(2) This coming year we are looking at a .12 increase. I want to explain why we have to raise .12 or another 18% increase. First of all the legislature set a new salary schedule in the special session last year. In the past the state has always paid from 70 to 80% of pay increases. The pay increases in the future will come entirely from local funds. This will figure a .05 tax rate for our school. When we add two teachers to meet the 1-to-22 ratio in grades Kindergarten, First and Second, and then add two more teachers to meet the new Chapter 75 reform, this will add another .06 cents. This is already .11 and does not include the extra cost shifted from the state to the local school districts cost of tutorial, extra

teacher retirement shifted to local districts, loss of a .6 of a teacher unit in the change. We would be lucky to get all of this done for another cent. It also does not include any extra construction of space to meet the 1-to-22 ratio. The cost of inflation has also not been figured into the total cost of running out school.

(3) During the year 1986-87, we are still looking at the automatic pay increase for teachers of \$1,140 for each ten month employee, with some additional pay for any work above the ten months. This will be another .05 increase. Also each year the state is raising the local fund assignment (cost of local share) by about 3% each year. For our district it would be another 3 cents. Therefore, we would be looking another .08 raise this year.

(4) For the 1987-88 school year the increase would be about the same as the previous year, another .08.

(5) For the 1988-89 school year you can expect another big blow. We work in this year be required to meet the 1-to-22 ratio in grades three and four. This will require an additional two or three teachers and you can figure on another three or four cent increase. You may add this amount to the automatic eight cents that it will take each year so you will be looking at a thirteen-cent increase. I know at this time we will be looking into some kind of building program. As you know local taxpayers pay the full amount of a building program.

In summing up the cost of these five years: 1984 through 1989, we would be looking at a tax increase of (10 plus 12 plus 8 plus 8 plus 13) for a total of 51 cents. At the end of this time 1989 we would know the results of the new HB 72. The taxpayers then would know if the increase would be worth the results.

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# Cook of the Week

Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Hayslip and their three daughters, Pam 14, Melody 11, and Linda seven, enjoy hunting, fishing and gardening together and claim them for their hobbies. It seems only natural that the principal ingredients in three of Carol's (Mrs. Hayslip) recipes this week are deer, dove and fish, respectively, and vegetables are the main ingredients in the other three.

Carol, who is employed at the Independent American Savings in Iowa Park, was graduated from Hirsch High School. She and her husband, who is manager of Brigadier Mobile Homes Sales in Wichita Falls, lived in San Antonio several years where he was manager for a mobile home sales company and she assisted him. They are members of Faith Baptist Church.

One of Carol's recipes this week is Deer Stew-Dee-licious. That intriguing title itself was the needed stimulus for bits of history about the animal. According to Foods by Waverly Root, man has been eating deer since prehistoric times, and there have been times when it was the principal human food. Excavations in the early cradle of man have shown that thousands and thousands of years ago, it was the third most important food, and that by 25,000 years ago it was number one.

The ancient Hebrews ate deer, (Deut. 14: 4-5) states "These are the beasts which ye shall eat - the hart, the roebuck and the fallow deer . . ." It was during the Middle Ages that the cult of the deer reached its greatest height for hunters and treachermen - no important repast was complete without venison.

When venison lovers reached America, they described it as "the home of the deer." Some species were found in wild abundance by the early colonists, but hunters managed to take their customary toll in due time. Massachusetts was obliged to impose restrictions on deer hunting in 1696, and all the colonies except Georgia followed by the time of the Revolution.

Toward the nineteenth century, when venison and the consumption of closed seasons improved the situation, and today, deer are the most plentiful large game animals in the country. People look forward to the deer season and some travel great distances to get their limit during the season.

### DEER-STEW-DEE-LICIOUS

Dice 2 large white onions and saute slowly in 4 tablespoons of butter or margarine. Use large soup or stew pot for this. Place 1 1/2 lbs. of chunked venison stew meat in pot with onions. Toss around and cook slowly until meat is brown. Be careful not to scorch onions.

Add: 2-8 oz. cans tomato sauce, stir, then add:  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
3 bay leaves

1 tablespoon vinegar, stir together. Let cook with pot covered over very slow fire about 1/2 hour. Then add 2 1/2 cups water and cook over slow fire for 1 1/2 hours. Add about 10 medium-size potatoes cut into chunk-size pieces, and 1 pkg. carrots sliced to stew mixture. May have to add extra water to make pot full. Cook 30 to 45 minutes more over medium heat. Serve with cornbread.

### CATFISH DELIGHT

Cut fish in nice thick fillets with no bones. Wash thoroughly and let stand in bowl of water.

Put yellow cornmeal in a bowl. Pour a jar of Picante saude (medium or hot) in a bowl and marinate fish fillets five minutes. Dredge fillets in corn meal and dip back in Picante sauce, then dredge once more in cornmeal. Place these fillets in deep fryer or frying pan and fry until crispy brown.

### HOT FRENCH QUARTER POTATOES

6 medium-sized potatoes  
1/4 lb. butter or margarine, melted  
1 clove garlic, crushed  
1/2 tsp. Tabasco  
Cayenne pepper  
Paprika

Pre-heat oven to 400 degrees. Wash potatoes, but do not peel. Cut lengthwise into eighths. Score each spear into bite-size sections, cutting halfway through. Combine 6 tablespoons melted butter, garlic, Tabasco.

Brush on potato spears. Sprinkle with a dash of cayenne pepper and some paprika. Bake in an open pan in the oven 30 minutes, basting with remaining butter halfway through the baking. Makes 14 servings.

### 24 doves

4 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1/2 tsp salt  
Dash Tabasco  
Dash black and red pepper  
1 cup shredded carrots  
1/2 cup sliced green onion  
1/2 cup chopped parsley  
1 cup long grain rice  
3 cups chicken broth  
Strip of bacon to cover each dove

Salt and pepper dove breasts on wax paper. Brown doves in butter; set aside in bowl. In same skillet, cook carrots, onion and parsley by sauteing slowly until just tender. Add rice and stir; add broth, salt, pepper and Tabasco. Pour this mixture into large casserole dish or pan greased with butter. Place dove breasts in mixture. Sprinkle with a little more salt and pepper. Top each dove with a short strip of bacon. Cover and cook 325 degrees 1 1/4 hours. Chicken or quail can be substituted.

### WILTED SPINACH SALAD

Ingredients:  
Young spinach  
Green onions  
Salad oil  
Garlic  
Bacon  
Sugar

1 egg  
Tarragon vinegar  
Red wine vinegar  
Salt and pepper

Cut roots and tough stems from 1 lb. young spinach. Wash thoroughly in cold water, being careful to remove all sand. Drain and shake out all moisture and blot dry on paper towels. Tear leaves into bite-size pieces. Mince 6 green onions and mix with spinach in large wooden bowl. Mash 1/2 clove garlic and cover with 1 tablespoon salad oil. Let stand about 30 minutes. Trickle 1 tablespoon garlic oil over spinach and let stand.

### BACON DRESSING

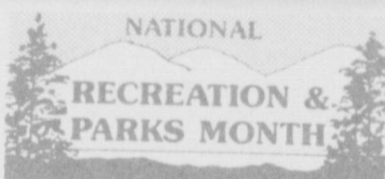
Saute 3 slices bacon until crisp. Remove from pan and drain on absorbant paper. Reserve bacon fat. Beat together: 1 egg, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 tablespoon Tarragon vinegar and 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar. Pour slowly into warm bacon fat, stirring constantly until mixture has thickened. Slightly season with salt and pepper, not much salt. Pour over spinach and mix well. Crumble bacon pieces and sprinkle over salad.

### SQUASH FRITTERS

1 cup sifted flour  
1 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
1 egg, separated  
1/4 cup milk  
1 cup cooked squash  
1/4 cup shortening or cooking oil

Wash, slice and cook 2 medium-size yellow squash until tender; drain well. With a fork, mash squash until mixed fairly well. Into a medium-sized bowl, sift flour, baking powder, salt and pepper. Beat the egg yolk and milk and mix with squash; then add to the dry ingredients and mix well. Beat egg white until stiff and fold into the squash batter.

In a skillet, heat shortening or cooking oil. Dip spoon into hot grease to grease, then drop several tablespoons of batter into hot grease and fry until nice and brown. These may be deep fried. Drain and serve warm.

Youngest player in the tournament was an eighth grader. Also making up the list of contestants were players from Germany and Canada. Two women competed against an all-male field.

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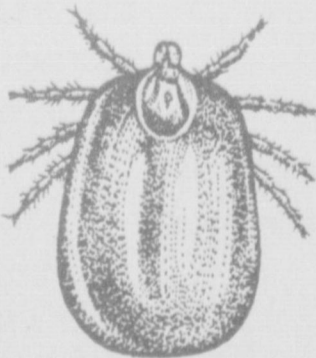


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## Area oil, gas report

The Wichita Regular Field gained a new producer when LocMae Co. of Ft. Worth completed the No. 19 Lochridge "B" four miles southwest of Iowa Park.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of seven barrels per day on a 1 25/32 choke. It was taken to a 1,888-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations 691 to 710 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 217-acre lease in the L. Netherly Survey, A-240.

The well is 1,190 feet from the east line and 3,000 feet from the south line of the lease.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 5S S.L. Denny "A", a 1,400-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operation will be located two miles southwest of Iowa Park in a 133-acre lease in the Cowherd Brothers Subdivision, Blk. 27. The operator is Arcadia Refining Co. of Wichita Falls.

Location is 450 feet from the west line and 1,179 feet from the north line of the lease and survey.

The No. 9 George North has been finished by World Oil Corp. of Dallas.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, four miles southwest of Burkburnett. Drillsite is in a 38-acre lease in the TE&L Survey, A-292.

Daily potential of four barrels was indicated by the Railroad Commission.

The well went to a 1,630-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations located 1,570 feet into the wellbore.

The well is located 525 feet from the west line and 150 feet from the north line of the lease and survey.

Drilling Inc. of Iowa Park plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the W.T. Field. The operator has 144 acres leased, with drillsite in the N.E. Meade Survey, A-535, and has designated the venture as the No. 18 W.T. Waggoner Estate "G". Drillsite is three miles south of Electra.

The well will be located 2,175 feet from the west line and 345 feet from the south line of the lease and 2,175 feet from the west line and 2,022 feet from the south line of the survey.

A Kamay-based operator has staked location for the No. 4 A. Weeth, a developmental well to be located three miles north of Iowa Park. With projected total depth of 1,800 feet, the well is in an 81-acre lease in the Wichita Regular Field, SPRR Survey, A-277. The operator is Omer L. Fulfer Well Servicing Inc.

Location is 600 feet from the east line and 1,000 feet from the north line of the lease and 1,100 feet from the east line and 1,350 feet from the north line of the survey.
