Decker resigns post

First-term City Alderman Don Decker has resigned from the city council.

The announcement was made at the end of Monday's council meeting, when Decker's letter was read aloud by Mayor Tim Hunter.

Decker whose term would expire next April, explained he was moving to Pleasant Valley Estates east of the city, and therefore would not be able to continue serving in an elected office.

His letter read:
"It is with deepest regret that I submit my resignation as alderman to

the Iowa Park City Council effective July 1, 1985. The reason for my resignation is that I will be moving my residence to just outside the city limits of Iowa Park.

"I consider it a privilege to have had the opportunity to serve the citizens of Iowa Park on the city council. The current council has set some progressive long range goals, which will benefit every citizen of our town.

"The other members of the council, the city manager, department heads, and other city employees have been great to work with. All of these key people working together on common goals will lead the citizens of Iowa Park to a better quality of life.

"Please don't forget me because Iowa Park will still be my home. I remain with the same desires to see Iowa Park grow and prosper."

Decker retired a few years ago as county agricultural agent. He became manager of Farmer's Grain, remaining in that position until the firm sold to Texoma Fertilizer this spring. He has not yet announced his plans, but indicates he will remain in the immediate area.

The mayor said he would be prepared by the July 8 meeting to

nominate someone to fill the unexpired term. He indicated he would likely not propose anyone who has formerly served, rather he said he would seek someone with new, fresh ideas to serve the city.

Sesquicentennial activity dates set by committee

Two dates in 1986 for activities celebrating the Texas Sesquicentennial were established by the local committee Tuesday, and will be published in a state directory.

March 2, Texas Independence Day, will be observed with the dedication of the Texas Historical Section at Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

A highlight of the event will be burial of a time capsule, to be opened 50 years later when Texas observes its 200th anniversary.

A sunrise religious service will be held July 4 at Hawk Stadium, marking the 95th anniversary of Iowa Park.

The Mar. 2 event will be held outside the library, weather permitting. Otherwise, everything except the capsule burial will be held in the upstairs meeting room.

Numerous other events are planned during 1986 by the local committee, but dates have not yet been established, such as the Whoop-T-Do.

One event is planned this fall, however. That will be the planting of bluestem seeds along the highway and in certain city-owned areas, so they will be in full bloom during the state's anniversary year.

Aldermen override veto, but mayor doesn't object

Members of the Iowa Park City Council Monday night voted unanimously to override a veto of the mayor's but the vote indicated harmony rather than a split of the council.

At its June 10 meeting, council members narrowly approved a motion to require concrete paving of East Garden Drive, and to assist the developer by contributing a maximum of \$4,000 to do the work in concrete rather than asphalt.

Mayor Tim Hunter vetoed the decision, but on a technical point. Because the council has never adopted procedural rules, and because the issue was approved by two votes with one against, one abstaining and the fifth alderman absent, Hunter said the issue should be reconsidered.

Saying an override vote would not hurt his feelings, the mayor called for a vote, and all five approved it.

This leaves developer, Ray Townsend, with an edict from the council, with the requirement to pave the street with concrete. The offer of \$4,000 to assist in the cost still stands, but only for a 30-day period, as of June 24.

The council offered the financial assistance after recognizing Townsend's proposal to pave the street was "grandfathered," meaning discussions had commenced before an ordinance was passed requiring all new streets to be built of concrete.

Aldermen feared paving East Garden Drive as asphalt because the area often stands in water and did not feel paving of any sort other than concrete would withstand conditions.

Following the vote on that point, the council then approved an ordinance establishing "Roberts Rules of Order" as the order of business at its meetings.

OTHER BUSINESS

Council members approved a resolution calling for the demolition of an abandoned and unsafe house at the northeast corner of Colorado and Lafayette.

Administrator James Barrington said an acknowledged certified letter sent 120 days earlier to owner Ray Admire of Holliday had never been answered, that the structure remains unsecured and failing to meet most building standard requirements.

After Mike Price, public works director, responded to a question as to how soon demolition could be accomplished, by saying it could be done by Friday, Alderman Johnny Coker asked for a 30-day delay.

Coker wanted an additional notice sent to the owner. His request was accepted. Coker commented, "He (Admire) may or may not know of our capabilities of demolition."

Aldermen also approved a resolution authorizing the city administrator to sign a waiver for installation of an elevator at Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Part of the structure does not meet national standards of clearance between the top of the elevator and the roof, it was pointed out. The contractor requires a waiver in such cases.

A third resolution, giving an easement to Texas Electric Service Co. on a portion of a small tract south of Valley Farms Community House, was approved.

No bid was received in response to an advertisement to sell an excess police car, so the council voted to re-advertise its availability for sale.

A discussion was held whether to adopt ordinances to replace resolutions concerning development of street costs to be borne by the developer and also one concerning sale of water and sewer service to residences adjacent to the city limits.

The council voted to consider at its next meeting ordinances covering both issues.

Concerning a proposal by the

mayor that a capitol fund be established under the general fund, similar to one which has worked successfully in the water and sewer fund, no vote was taken but aldermen unofficially agreed it should be established.

Two appointments were approved by the council, when the mayor proposed Don Decker as a member of the Gordon Lake, Oscar Park task force and Ruth Welch to the civic center task force.

Expressway resurfacing work is begun this week

A reconstruction project was begun Monday on US287 from Wichita Falls to Iowa Park. The project will take some 170 working days to completion, a period that will modify driving conditions for motorists.

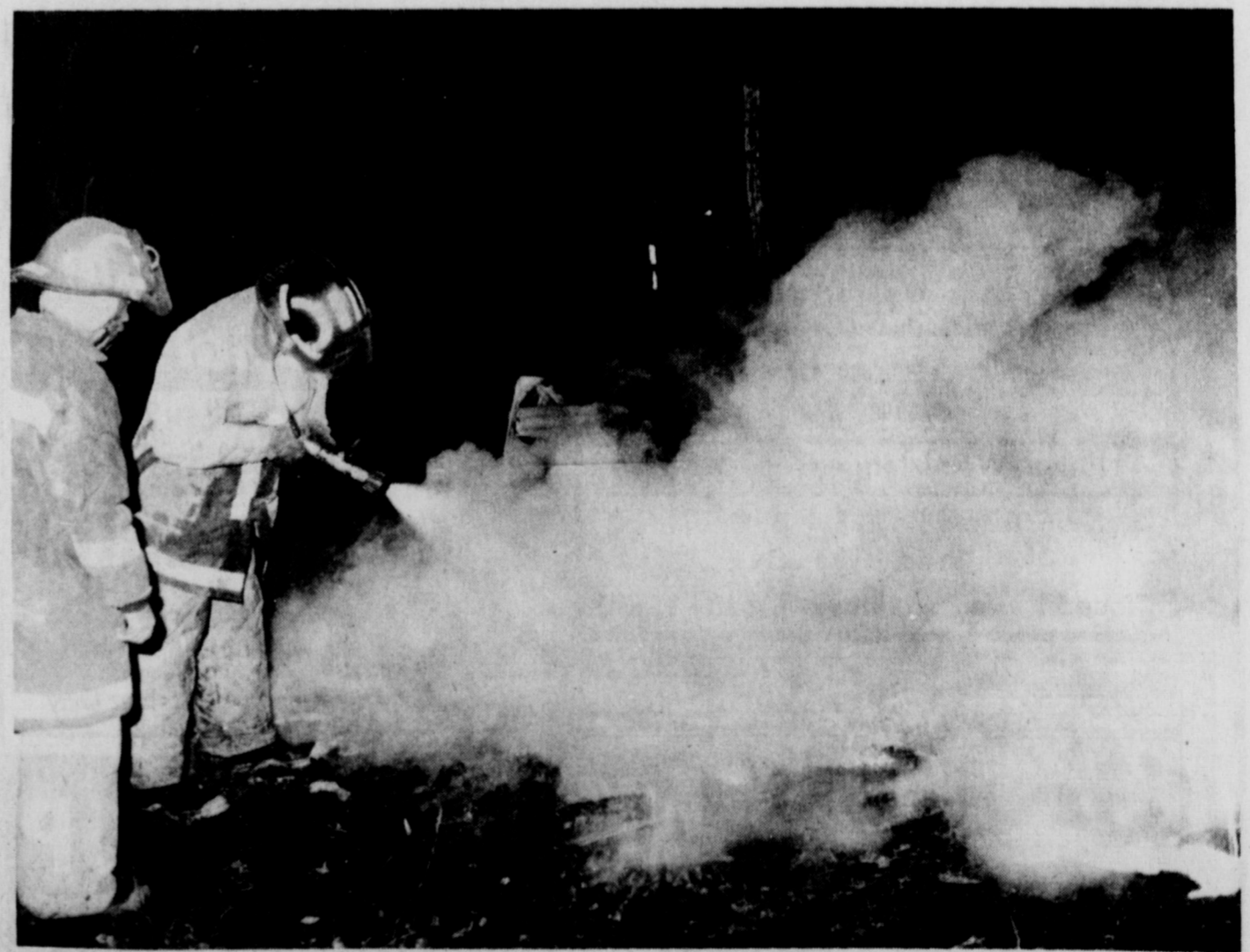
Plans call for the right lanes, both ways, to be roto-milled down to the original pavement, have all joints sealed, then have a new 2-1/4 inch asphaltic concrete overlay on all lanes both ways. The Timmins-Anderson Corporation, of Wichita Falls, was low bidder for the work with a bid of \$3,495,493. The project is funded

entirely with state funds.

A construction speed zone of 45 miles per hour has been set for the limits of the work and the speed limit will be enforced according to department officials.

The limits of the project extend from 0.5 miles west of Johnson Road in Iowa Park to the US277-281 Interchange in Wichita Falls on US287.

The completed project will provide a smoother and safer surface for motorists that the existing roadway which is a number of years old and starting to deteriorate from age and wear.

The table also held a silver punch bowl and an arrangement of peach flowers and candles.

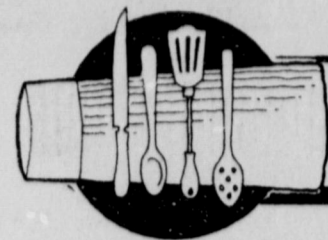

Cook of the Week

Having been back in the states a little over a month, this week's cook, Vicki (Mrs. George) Huckaby III, is happy to be home with family and friends.

The Huckabys recently returned from a four-year stay in England where George was stationed with the United States Air Force. Their first two years in England were spent living in Chicksands, then in High Wycombe, a city near London, for the next two.

While in the Air Force, George was a Staff Sergeant and telephone switching equipment specialist. Vicki worked in a daycare center in Chicksands and was a switchboard operator in High Wycombe.

Vicki's favorite part of living in England was the travel. Among the countries they had a chance to visit were Switzerland, Germany, Austria, and Holland.

She originally learned to cook in Virginia, where her husband was stationed for two years before moving to England, but it was in England where she learned to make her specialty - bread. For her recipes this week, she has given Whole Wheat Bread, Corn Bread Mix, Carrot Bread, and Can-Do Quick White Bread with cheese bread and pan roll variations.

The Huckabys have been married seven years and are currently living in Kamay. Together, they collect and sometimes restore antiques.

In her spare time, Vicki enjoys cooking and needlecrafts.

CARROT BREAD

- 1 cup finely grated raw carrots
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 Tbsp. melted shortening
- 1 cup boiling water
- 2 eggs
- 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cup flour
- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Combine carrots, sugar, baking soda, and shortening in a large bowl. Pour in boiling water and stir to mix. Set aside until cool.

Beat eggs with a fork and add to carrot mixture. Stir in remaining ingredients.

Pour into greased loaf pan and let stand 5 minutes. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Remove from pan and cool.

WHOLE WHEAT BREAD

- 1 pkg. yeast
- 1/4 cup warm water
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 2 1/2 cups lukewarm water
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 3 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 cups white flour

Sprinkle yeast into 1/4 cup warm water and stir to dissolve. Dissolve sugar and salt in

lukewarm water. Add shortening, whole wheat flour and 1 cup white flour. Beat to mix well.

Stir in remaining flour. Shape into ball, place on floured surface, cover and let rest 10 minutes. Knead until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes.

Place in greased bowl; turn dough over to grease top. Cover and let rise until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours.

Punch down, divide in half, shaping each into a ball. Cover and let rest 10 minutes.

Shape into loaves and place in greased loaf pans. Let rise about 1 1/4 hours.

Bake at 375 degrees about 45 minutes, covering loosely with foil during last 20 minutes.

CORN BREAD MIX

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 2 1/2 cups cornmeal
- 1 1/2 cups powdered milk
- 1/4 cup baking powder
- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cup shortening or lard

Sift dry ingredients together in a large bowl. Cut in shortening with a pastry blender.

Place in a jar or canister, cover and store in a cool place for up to 6 weeks.

CORN BREAD

- 1 1/2 cups Corn Bread Mix
- 1 1/4 cup water
- 2 eggs, beaten

Place mix in bowl. Combine water and eggs and add to mix, stirring just to moisten.

Pour into greased 9x9" pan or a cast iron skillet. Bake at 425 degrees for 25 minutes.

CAN-DO QUICK WHITE BREAD

- 2 pkgs. yeast
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 1 1/4 cup buttermilk
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 2 Tbsp. sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 2 tsp. salt
- Soft butter

Grease a 9x5x3" loaf pan. Dissolve yeast in warm water. Add buttermilk, 2 1/2 cups flour, shortening, sugar, baking powder and salt. Blend with electric mixer until well mixed. Stir in remaining flour to make a soft and slightly sticky dough. Knead 5 minutes.

Shape into a loaf and place in prepared pan. Brush lightly with soft butter. Let rise about 1 hour until doubled. (Dough should rise about 2" above pan.)

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. On low oven rack, bake bread 30-35 minutes. Remove from pan and brush with softened butter.

VARIATIONS

CHEESE BREAD: Follow recipe for White Bread except omit shortening. Stir in 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese with second addition of flour.

PAN ROLLS: Follow recipe for White Bread, but roll dough into a 13x9" rectangle and place in 13x9x2" greased baking pan. Score dough 1" deep with knife to make 12 rolls. Let rise until doubled and bake 20-25 minutes.

The couple will live in Chico when they return from a wedding trip to Colorado. The bride chose a two-piece red suit for her going away costume.

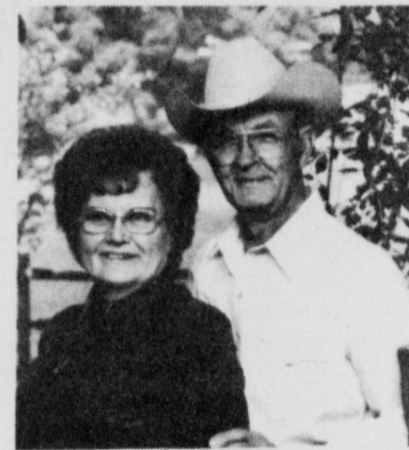

As I See It.... By BOB HAMILTON



Wichita Falls has a policeman who should not only be fired, but sued and further prohibited from ever being allowed to ever again serve on a law enforcement body.

I'm referring to an incident that occurred Wednesday night on Kemp Street in that city, which was reported in a story buried on the third page of section D in Saturday's issue of the Record News (yes, I do read the paper though I don't endorse it).

The officer, and I use the term loosely, not only arrested a photographer of the Midwestern State Univ. paper, The Wichitan, but exposed film in his camera after pictures had been taken of officers arresting young people in a parking lot.

I have stayed away from commenting on arrests of youths in Kemp Street parking lots, even though several from Iowa Park have been involved, because it's a Wichita Falls issue. They make their laws there.

But when a policeman takes the action this unnamed officer did, I feel an intimidation as a newsman and I recognize a violation of the First Amendment of our nation's constitution.

I have received confirmation from the photographer's faculty adviser, Roy Allen, that Tim Roden, 22, had told the officer twice before the camera was opened and film exposed that he was a staff photographer for the newspaper.

Such actions by a law enforcement officer cannot be tolerated. If an officer has no respect for the First Amendment, has he respect for other laws of the land?

And if the officer felt intimidation or pressure, because several young people were on the lot at the time of the situation, what would be his reaction in face of a demonstration? Would he draw his gun and begin firing?

I understand officers on the Wichita Falls Police Dept. are Civil Service, and that nothing can be done as to firing someone under such

circumstances. Since when does Civil Service override the Constitution of the United States?

Policemen who react as this officer did have no business serving the people of the United States. He would feel comfortable, however, in a Communist country.

As a journalist and a citizen, I call for the dismissal of the policeman by the Wichita Falls City Council. Nothing less is acceptable.

But nowadays in the cities a 15 per cent tip does not seem to impress service people. Waiters think 20 per cent is more like it and 25 per cent if possible. Hairdressers think 20 per cent is fair. But 20 per cent tips don't appear to be the rule yet, other than perhaps wishful thinking.

waitresses get a lot smaller tips than that. Most people tip cab drivers but a lot don't tip at all. Some barbers get tips but in Perryton tips to barbers are not very likely even though beauty operators may get them. Bellhops in city hotels expect a tip of \$1 per bag but probably don't always get it. The doorman who opens the door and perhaps hails down a cab for you expects 50 cents or a dollar for performing this chore.

FIRST-AID KIT: DON'T LEAVE HOME WITHOUT IT
It was a classic case of shoemaker's children going barefoot. They had thrown the sleeping bags and the fishing gear in the car and headed off for a weekend camping trip with the Cub Scouts.

Now, here was their own Cub Scout hobbling, barefoot and crying, down the splintered lakeside dock they had been diving from. He had a long splinter in the bottom of his foot, and to the father's dismay, he realized that they had left their first-aid supplies at home.

Luckily, one of the other parents was much better-prepared and offered the safety pin and tweezers the father needed to get the splinter out.

By the end of the weekend, they had encountered three more splinters, itchy bug bites and a couple of cuts and scratches — overall not a bad track record for the Cub Scouts. But they'll never leave home again without a properly packed first-aid kit.

First on their list is adhesive bandages in assorted sizes and shapes — enough to cover anything from the smallest scratch to a good-size abrasion. Cotton balls, gauze pads, adhesive tape and an elastic bandage also come in handy.

A good pair of tweezers is indispensable, and there's a world of difference between any old tweezer that will do for plucking eyebrows and the precision kind you ought to have for removing splinters.

A needle, scissors and a safety pin are a must. They will do double duty sewing on buttons and fixing torn blue jeans.

Take along some disposable alcohol wipes for cleaning your medical equipment. You also may want some hydrogen peroxide, which can be helpful for cuts and scratches.

While you're at it, a tube of antibiotic ointment, such as Polysporin or Terramycin, should be included as well as a steroid cream like Cortaid or Lanacort for itches and rashes.

An ounce or two of prevention should definitely go into the traveling medical kit. Sunscreen with an adequate SPF [sun protection factor] number [8 or higher for most people] and insect repellent containing DEET [diethyltoluamide] are essentials.

Make sure you include all your regular vitamins and prescription drugs.

There are lots of over-the-counter drugs you might want to take along to cover yourself for any contingency.

Liquid or chewable acetaminophen [Tylenol or Panadol] can be useful for kids with pain or fever. Advil or Nuprin [ibuprofen] can reduce pain and inflammation for adults who suffer sprains or strains.

And don't forget the antacids. Chances are good that you will encounter a fair amount of junk food on a vacation trip.

Lots of folks discover that traveling can produce constipation, so you might want to take along a mild laxative such as Metamucil, Maltsupex or Mitrolan.

Sleeping pills with DPH [diphenhydramine] such as Nytol with DPH or Sleep-Ese 3 can do triple duty. This antihistamine can relieve insomnia, help hay fever and hives as well as soothe motion sickness.

With a well-stocked first-aid kit, you should be ready to head off for an exciting adventure or a relaxing vacation and follow the boy Scout motto, "Be Prepared."

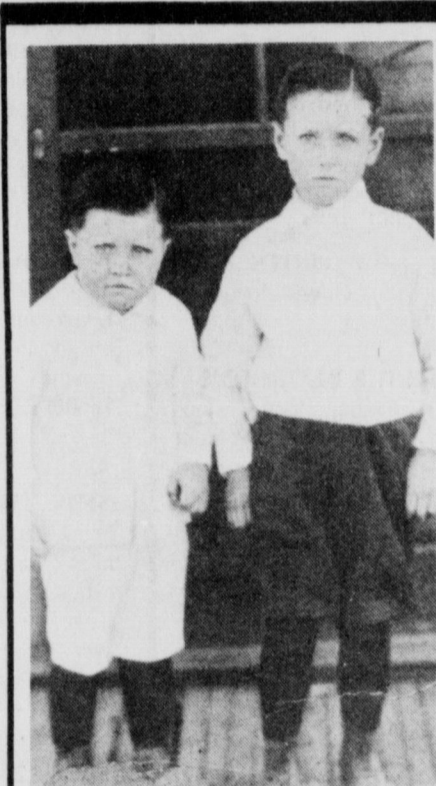

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City accepts resignation it hasn't yet received

Controversy has arisen at city hall in Holliday, following a special called meeting of the city council Sunday afternoon where members apparently accepted the resignation of public works superintendent Morganna Thorn.

However, Thorn, a five-year

employee for the city, stated Wednesday morning that she has not resigned her position.

"I haven't quit yet," Thorn asserted. "I am currently taking compensation time due me and two weeks vacation," she said. Thorn added that she had accumulated 18 days compensation time with the city, and, due to a recent accident resulting in an injury to her back, she felt the time was right to utilize those days in order to recuperate.

Yet another reason for her decision is a growing conflict between her and contractor John Lewellan, who recently was awarded the bid to install new water lines in the city under the community development block grant for water improvements.

Council held an emergency called meeting last Tuesday afternoon to discuss the 1985 water improvement project grant, which Thorn, Lewellan, and city engineer Kerry Maroney attended. Tone of the conversation in open session at Holliday Community Center became heated soon after Maroney began his report on

progress of the project.

Stating that he had conversed with both Thorn and Lewellan, Maroney suggested that a conflict existed between the two concerning terms of Lewellan's contract with the city. Lewellan stated that an agreement existed for the city to help the contractor locate lines not designated on the city map. In addition, if a line was cut, the contractor would repair the line and the city would furnish materials.

Yesterday, Thorn claimed the real dispute began when she contacted Maroney to discuss the concrete work being done by Lewellan. "Maroney told me before the meeting last Tuesday that the problem was political and personal," Thorn said, adding that she understood that Lewellan had become angered when he learned of Thorn's conversation with Maroney regarding his work.

At the Tuesday meeting, Lewellan asserted that Thorn was incapable of performing her duties as public works superintendent, despite holding a license, and that she was not fit to do her duties.

As a result, Thorn requested the council to give her a vote of confidence, but the motion to do so by alderman Jim Virdell died for lack of a second. However, council members verbally commended Thorn for her

performance, but they would give her a verbal vote of confidence only.

On Wednesday, following the meeting, Thorn said she remarked to city administrator Gary Jones that she was considering quitting, but, upon return to work later that afternoon, she informed the administrator that she had ruled out resigning, but instead would take her compensation and vacation leave "in order to sort things out."

Thorn said she reasserted her position to mayor Don H. Duke that evening, and that he agreed with her decision to take a leave from work. However, an agenda was drawn up the next day calling for the special called meeting on Sunday, reportedly by mayor Duke, in order to straighten the matter out. The mayor was absent from the emergency meeting earlier that week.

Absent from Sunday's meeting was Thorn, who said she never received an agenda or verbal request to attend the meeting.

SUNDAY'S MEETING

Two items appeared on the agenda for the special meeting, one a request from former councilman John Goforth to be placed on the next meeting's agenda to discuss the possible water rate increase for the city, and personnel discussion.

Council went into closed executive session after hearing Goforth, and upon return to open regular session, a motion was approved "to accept the resignation of Morganna Thorn, upon receipt of letter from Thorn, council to pay 18 days compensatory time as agreed by previous council. Also, two

weeks vacation. All to be paid upon receiving letter of resignation," read the minutes of the meeting.

"Also, council to sign letter of recommendation for Thorn," the minutes allowed.

In further action, council agreed to give Jones the authority over all city personnel, with the power to hire and fire all employees except for chief of police. Previously, Thorn was in charge of all employees in the public works department.

After serving relatively the same city administration and city council before the last election and resignation of city administrator Jim Hamill, Thorn now says that the present council is split, and cannot decide what duties they want her to perform. "With the last council, my job description was clearly outlined, and I performed my duties the way they requested," Thorn commented. "But now it seems they can't decide just what they want me to do."

The accident several weeks ago at Ayres Oil Co., where Thorn slipped and fell into a gasoline storage tank, resulted in an injury to the superintendent's back and neck, reportedly the same type injury she suffered in a fall at city hall three years ago. Though Thorn admits that the injury has been a prolonged one, she says it has not affected her performance.

In a previous meeting of the council this year, Thorn's use of the city-owned pickup was questioned by resident Rudy Molina, but council agreed that she was not violating any rules and would continue using the vehicle as she had in the past.

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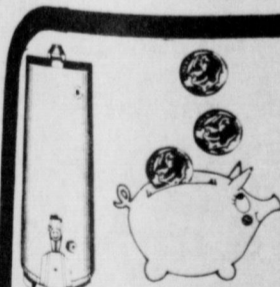
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Area oil, gas report

The Wichita Regular Field gained a new producer when Mobil Producing of Houston completed the No. 142 SMA Unit "B" one mile southeast of Clara.

The well indicated ability to pump 19 barrels of oil per day, along with 205 barrels of water. It was taken to a 2,056-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 1,734 to 1,774 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is located in the HT&B Survey, A-127.

Drillsite is 2,400 feet from the south line and 1,200 feet from the east line of the lease, and 1,070 feet from the north line and 1,200 feet from the west line of the survey.

A new producer has been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field, with Landrum West, Inc. as the operator.

Located five miles southwest of Burkburnett, the well is in a lease in the J. Walschmidt Survey, A-570. It is designated as the No. 30 W.W. Viles.

The well pumped oil at the rate of 12 barrels per day. It reached a total depth of 1,420 feet, and will produce from a perforated interval in the Cisco Sand Formation, 470 to 506 feet into the hole.

Finnells hosting supper tonight for commission

The Interstate Oil Compact Commission, a conservation-conscious group of 36 oil and gas producing states, is holding its annual meeting in Austin this week.

This year's meeting will mark the 50th anniversary of the energy forum. As part of the official program, Rep. Charles Finnell, a member of the commission, and wife Kay were asked to host an outdoor country supper tonight for the participants.

The annual meeting site was selected for historical reasons. Austin is the capital of a state with I.O.C.C. roots. In 1933 "Alfalfa" Bill Murray, governor of Oklahoma, called out the state's national guard to restrict wasteful production of oil in the Oklahoma City field, while south of the Red River, the Texas Rangers were first attempting to enforce proration and conservation measures in the East Texas field.

Subsequently, in 1935 the I.O.C.C. was founded by then-Gov. Jimmy Alfred of Texas and then-Gov. E.W.

Marland of Oklahoma in order to prevent federal government intervention.

In keeping with this long-standing tradition Gov. Mark White of Texas and Gov. George Nigh of Oklahoma are joint chairmen of this Year's 50th conference. Delegations including the governors of all energy producing states are expected for the three-day meeting.

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
