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Baugh going to Snyder

Search underway for new head coach

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday night accepted the resignation of David Baugh, head football coach and athletic director of Iowa Park High School.

Baugh, who had been here 10 years (half his coaching career), the last seven as head coach, has accepted a similar position at Snyder, a member of Dist. 2-AAAA.

The motion approved unanimously by the board, stated "...that we accept Coach Baugh's resignation as of Feb. 1, 1988, and take this opportunity to commend him for his leadership and dedication, professionalism, hard work and effort in making the Athletic Department an outstanding program during his 10-year tenure."

Baugh signed his contract Thursday night at Snyder, with the provision he would succeed in receiving a release from his contract here.

He tendered his written resignation Friday afternoon.

His new board will permit him to hire three new assistants. However, none of his staff here has yet said they would make the move.

Mrs. Baugh, an elementary teacher, will continue working and living here until the end of the school year.

"I really enjoyed my stay here," he commented. "This is a great place to live, and I've had a lot of support and encouragement from the people and administration."

"I think we brought Iowa Park back to where it is well respected in the state. We took over a good program from Tommy (Watkins), and I feel we've improved on it some more," Baugh said.

Baugh moved to Iowa Park as an assistant to Watkins in 1978, and was moved into the head position in 1981 when Watkins was hired at Uvalde.

During those three seasons, the Hawks played .500 ball, winning 14 games, losing 14 and twice tying.

Since he took over the reins as Head Hawk, Baugh has won 66 percent of his games, including three years while still a small enrollment school in Class AAAA.

His record as head coach of the Hawks is 49-25-4. Against district opponents during that time, he was 24-13-2, and guided his teams into the state playoffs the last three years.

Baugh's staff in 1981 included

James Ivey, Ray Sefcik, Jim Clapp and Earnie Reusch.

Ivey is now head coach at Seymour and Clapp retired from the teaching profession. Sefcik and Reusch remain.

While Baugh was head coach, his teams scored 1,580 points while allowing his 78 opponents only 952.

He said his 1987 team was "most remarkable."

Returning only two offensive and three defensive starters from 1986, he said the club "surprised me, how many games they won."

Speaking at the annual football banquet, he told the players, "You overcame lots of adversities. I never saw a team with so many severe injuries to keep going week after week. You've got great character."

Iowa Park school trustees decided to accept applications for the open position until Feb. 1, and expect to make a decision on a replacement within two weeks from that date.

Assistant Dean Kirkpatrick will serve as acting athletic director until a replacement is hired, and will be paid \$200 compensation.

Athletic directors all over Texas are facing scheduling problems at this time. The University Interscholastic League is currently preparing its biannual redistricting format, and has announced it will release new district alignments the afternoon of Jan. 27.

However, schools are forbidden to contract games with any other Texas school before Feb. 25, during which time the UIL accepts and considers protests and requests for changes in either classification or district assignments.

Baugh said he has made some tentative contacts with schools for potential games, but is having difficulty finding anyone willing to play the Hawks in pre-conference games.

Chamber of Commerce banquet set Saturday

Tickets remain on sale at the Chamber office, at \$8 per person.

Keynote speaker will be Dr. Arthur Beyer, a professor at Midwestern State Univ. who has been a leader in the area in attracting industrial jobs.

During the ribeye steak dinner, which will be prepared by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners, music will be provided by Dave Bridges.

A post dinner musical entertainment program will feature the Show Choir of IPHS.

Four individuals will be recognized, as will a local business.

The four will be singled out as the Outstanding Citizen of the Year, Outstanding Senior Citizen, Outstanding Agriculturist and Outstanding Educator.

Woman is victim of check scam

Iowa Park police are investigating a case in which an elderly local woman was allegedly bilked out of \$275 by two white males.

The woman reportedly issued a \$175 check Dec. 29 for yard work the pair had done for her.

The following day, according to the report, both men returned and told her they had lost the check and ask that she issue another.

A second check was signed by the woman, but left blank for the two to fill out.

When the woman's bank statement was received, it was determined the first check had been cashed on the date it was issued, and the second check, which was filled out in the amount of \$275, was also cashed the date of issuance.

The name of one suspect, according to the report, is Tim Holida.

Changes in codes to be proposed

City aldermen will consider four ordinances updating and revising codes, when they meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The codes affect building, gas, mechanical and plumbing.

Aldermen will also consider authorizing the city administrator to advertise for bids for lighting fixtures for city hall park.

Under "administrators report" on the council agenda, aldermen will consider amending contributions to the fire department and firemen's pension fund, and also a proposal to make Texowa and Diamond one-way traffic during school hours.

Chamber looks to busy year

Besides observing Iowa Park's 100th anniversary, this will be an unusually busy year for the Chamber of Commerce.

President Robert Palmer, during Monday's regular meeting of board members, called for a suggestion of a possible project from each attending.

A list of 18 potential projects were proposed, from which Vice President Kenneth Via and his project committee will select and assign priorities.

The proposals ranged from fundraising activities for the Chamber to long-range improvements to the

community.

Proposals included:

- * hold a leadership seminar for young adults in the community, to get input from them on direction the Chamber and community might take;
- * resume an annual fair, similar to the old Texas-Oklahoma Fair that was for many years held here, sponsor a talent show, and hold an old-fashioned community day;
- * sponsor a "taste of the town" event at which all business people would provide their personal favorite recipe results for the general public;
- * have a costume contest in conjunction with the homecoming parade;

Chamber sponsor a raffle to raise funds;

- * develop a new community map, complete with old photos and business advertising;
- * sponsor a reception annually for school faculty members at which the public could meet them;
- * coordinate an annual meeting of all presidents of organizations in the community;
- * develop a recreational vehicle camp site, possibly at Lake Iowa Park, to capture tourist dollars that travel along US 287;
- * purchase a telephone answering machine for the Chamber office to take messages during hours the office is closed;
- * be more aggressive in attracting high school football playoff games here;
- * put on a feed for big rivalry football fans at local games;
- * develop a project to offer prizes for newcomers who visit local businesses;
- * revitalize the appearance of the downtown business district;
- * encourage more participation of organizations in the state's "adopt a highway" program;
- * start decorating the Tom Burnett Memorial Library at Christmas time;
- * have commemorative plates with the library featured, as part of the centennial observance project;
- * and solicit the use of movie films made by residents of events in the community, to be transcribed onto video tape which could be kept at the library for reference and appreciation of historical facts.

Gilmore re-elected Association head

Bill Gilmore was returned to the office of president of the Highland Cemetery Association Thursday.

The largest crowd ever to attend a meeting of the association reportedly overflowed seating capacity at First Christian Church.

Gilmore received 137 votes and Frank Hardin 72, according to recording secretary Josephine Patterson.

C.E. "Bud" Thompson was elected vice president with 136 votes and C.B. Smith 70.

Annette Shook was named treasurer, having received 133 votes. Peggy Potter, the other nominee, received 69 votes.

Francis George, Lowell Short and Betty Lowe were elected to the board of directors, with 133, 124 and 101 votes, respectively.

Other director nominees and their votes were: Don Richter, 64; Sam Fairchild, 62; David Potter Jr., 53; Fred Parkey, 30, and Bob Aulds, 28.

Bradford expansion plans are approved

Iowa Park school trustees Thursday evening approved the architect's plans for an addition to Bradford Elementary, set a schedule for construction bidding, and also extended the superintendent's contract.

Architect Don Daugherty provided detailed plans to add four new classrooms, along with rest rooms, at the elementary campus.

The additional space is needed, Supt. Glen Mitchell told the board, to meet the mandated 22:1 teacher-pupil ratio.

While all the rooms will not be necessary next year, they will be by the 1989-90 school year, when the larger classes move there from Kidwell Elementary.

A fifth room, which had been discussed earlier that would serve as the Bradford library, was deleted.

The overall addition, which will be attached to the north end and will extend to within 16 feet of the cafeteria, will increase the size of the building by 4,920 square feet, Daugh-

erty explained.

Because the written specifications will require about a week to prepare, as the architect explained, the bids will be put out for prospective contractors Jan. 25, opened Feb. 11, and the contract awarded Feb. 16.

Supt. Mitchell's contract was extended through June 30, 1991 at an annual salary of \$55,500, with \$3,600 for in-district travel.

Using similar dates of the month to compare, there are 1,845 students in classes, as compared to 1,794.

By campus, enrollments and increases are: Kidwell, 473, up 13; Bradford 411, up 15; Junior High, 420, up 24, and High School, 530, up five.

Also presented for board members to study and approve, were the annual performance report and policy changes.

Wall rebuilding to get underway

Traffic will be interrupted on a part of South Wall Street this week, as a project of rebuilding the major traffic artery gets underway.

Workmen will cut the pavement at Diamond, where a new culvert will be laid, according to Terry Edwards,

owner of Seymour-based Terry Edwards Construction Co.

Weather permitting, that phase should be completed in one day, and then Diamond will undergo the same interruption, again for one day.

At a later time, another cut will be made on Wall at Daisy, followed by side roads being worked on at their intersections with Wall.

Edwards said he would make an announcement through the Leader in advance of major disruptions in traffic, to keep residents in the south part of town aware and make plans in advance for travel routes.

The rebuilding of Wall is being funded by the Texas Highway Department, as part of a project to assist

communities to upgrade their streets. First contact with the city was made on the project more than two years ago.

The project is to be completed by April 15, with paving expected to commence about April 1, Edwards said.

Iowa Park received .08 of an inch precipitation during a shower Monday evening, according to Virgil Woodfin.

The shower, caused when a cold front passed over the area, also dropped some pea-sized hail for a brief period.

The groom's parents hosted the dinner in connection with rehearsal for the wedding at the Olive Garden in Wichita Falls.

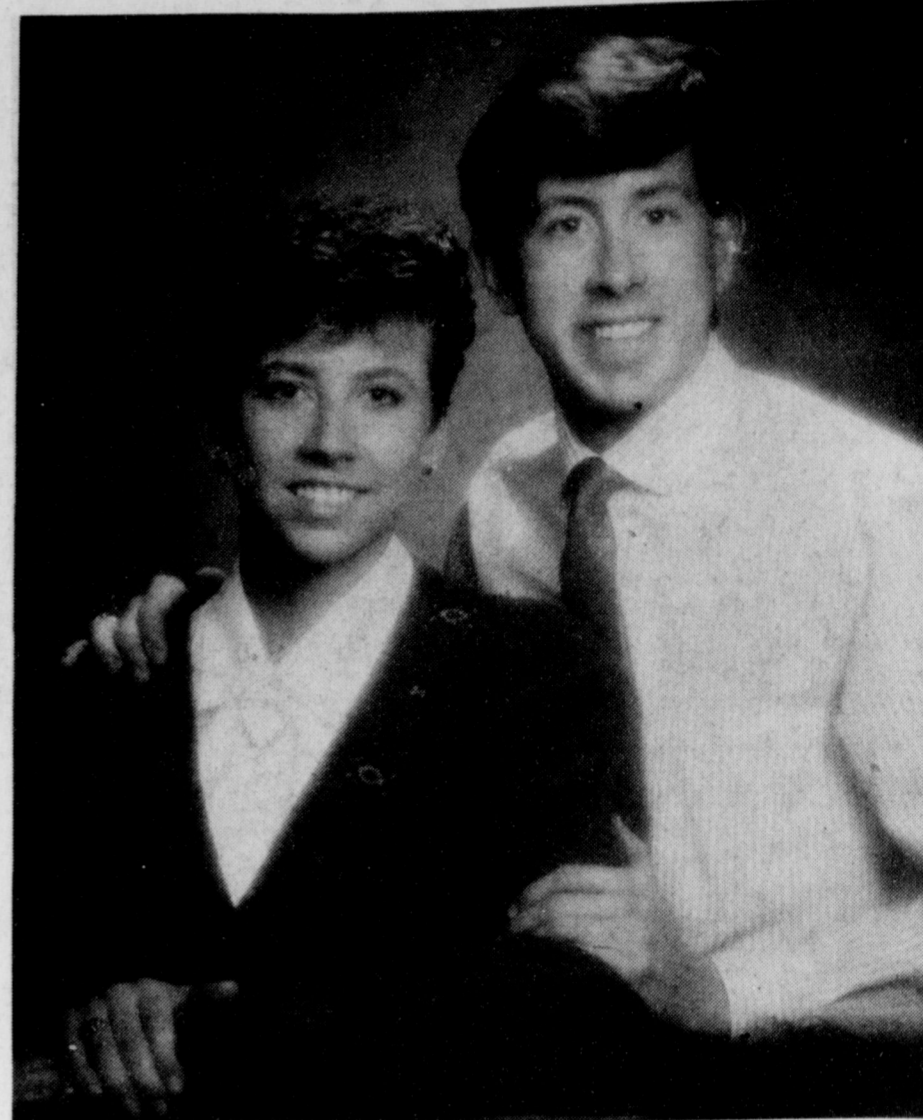

'Yard of the Year' is announced

The first meeting for 1988 of the Iowa Park Garden Club was held Friday and highlighted with presentation of the "Yard of the Year" award. Mrs. R.L. Good, chairman of the "Yard of the Month" committee, presented the plaque to Mr. and Mrs. James Vestal, who live at 800 N. Bond.

The Vestal yard was chosen from the others who received the "Yard of the Month" awards beginning in the spring and continuing through the fall of 1987. It was noted that the Vestal yard was consistently maintained during the year.

Following the presentation, Mrs. Don Decker, vice president, introduced Jimmie Foster, owner of J. Foster Landscape, who presented a program on "Landscaping with Azaleas in North Texas." He stated that most people will not consider using azaleas in a landscape because they have been told that they will not survive harsh winters or hot dry summers.

He said that if they are properly planted and maintained, the azaleas will do quite well in this area, and that the secret is planting the dwarf variety on the north and east sides of the house where they will receive

partial shade. Foster said that the bed must be prepared properly, and since the plants need good drainage they should be planted in a raised bed 18 inches deep with at least three inches of gravel in the bottom.

Continuing the planting of azaleas, he said that they should be planted 12 inches apart in late March and the bed should be filled with straight moss, no soil. "Since our soil is alkaline, the peat moss will insure that the plants get the acid soil they need to grow and bloom," he said. He advised that they should be pinched back two or three weeks after they bloom.

Foster told the group that during the second year of growth, the plants should be covered with a fine-ground bark mulch or pine needles, sprayed with a general insecticide spray in the spring, and fertilized with a fertilizer that is high in phosphorus. In conclusion, he stated that once the azalea is established, it is a low maintenance plant that will produce an abundance of beautiful blooms for about six weeks, beginning in late March and lasting until May.

Mrs. Bemice Compton presided during the business meeting following the program. Mrs. Dave Davis

gave the thought for the day stressing that one cannot walk on the water unless he gets out of the boat.

Officers for 1988-89 were elected and they will be installed in May. The new slate includes: Mmes. Don Decker, president; Robert Illingworth, vice-president; A.E. Young, recording secretary; Dorwin Wooten, treasurer; Dave Davis, corresponding secretary; and Billy C. Gilmore, historian.

With David Baugh's moving to Snyder, this will be my fifth time to watch the school board seek a new head football coach and athletic director for Iowa Park High School.

And I don't relish it, one bit. First of all, I like Dave and his coaching technique, as well as his staff of assistant coaches.

Baugh was raised at Rotan, near Snyder, and has always considered the head job there to be appealing.

His parents live on a ranch, and are reaching a time in life when they can't operate it. Dave will be the closest of his brothers to Rotan, and able to help when needed until he retires in about three years or so. I can certainly respect that.

I tried to convince Dave that going to a school that won only two of its varsity games last season wasn't encouraging.

Even with a successful program he has here, he once commented to me, "I have to force myself to get out of here (the fieldhouse)."

He's a workaholic when it comes to the coaching profession.

I tried to convince him how little he will enjoy those long bus trips to ball games. If Dist. 2-AAA remains with its present membership, after the UIL realignment is done, he'll be traveling to distant lands such as Pecos, Fort Stockton, Andrews and San Angelo.

The government makes people take shots who aren't traveling that far.

Other than the difference in the coffee talk, Dave's leaving is very similar to 1972, when Tommy Watkins resigned to go to Andrews.

Like Tommy, Dave has his program built to a point where it is respected and known in all areas of this big state. And he's got a wealth of really good talent coming up from the lower grades.

You'll remember those first three years of Grady Graves', who followed Watkins, were consecutive 8-2 seasons, and in the next larger classification at that. That was real talent.

I can see outstanding talent all the way down to our Top of Texas footballers, so the new coach should have a series of outstanding years.

Another coincidence is that Dave is leaving here to go into the same

district Tommy moved to.

One of the sideline things I'll miss, frankly, is the fun I have answering someone's question about "Who's this guy Baugh, your coach?"

It's been a kick to come back with, "Oh, you've probably heard of his daddy, Slingin' Sammy."

Unlike the times when Watkins, Graves, Pat Tone and again Watkins moved on and a new coach was being sought, I've heard more comment and coffee talk about a replacement than any of those times.

In fact, the talk exceeds all those other times, put together.

I can tell you one thing, there are a lot of people interested in this coaching position. There were five requests for applications in the mail Tuesday morning, I understand.

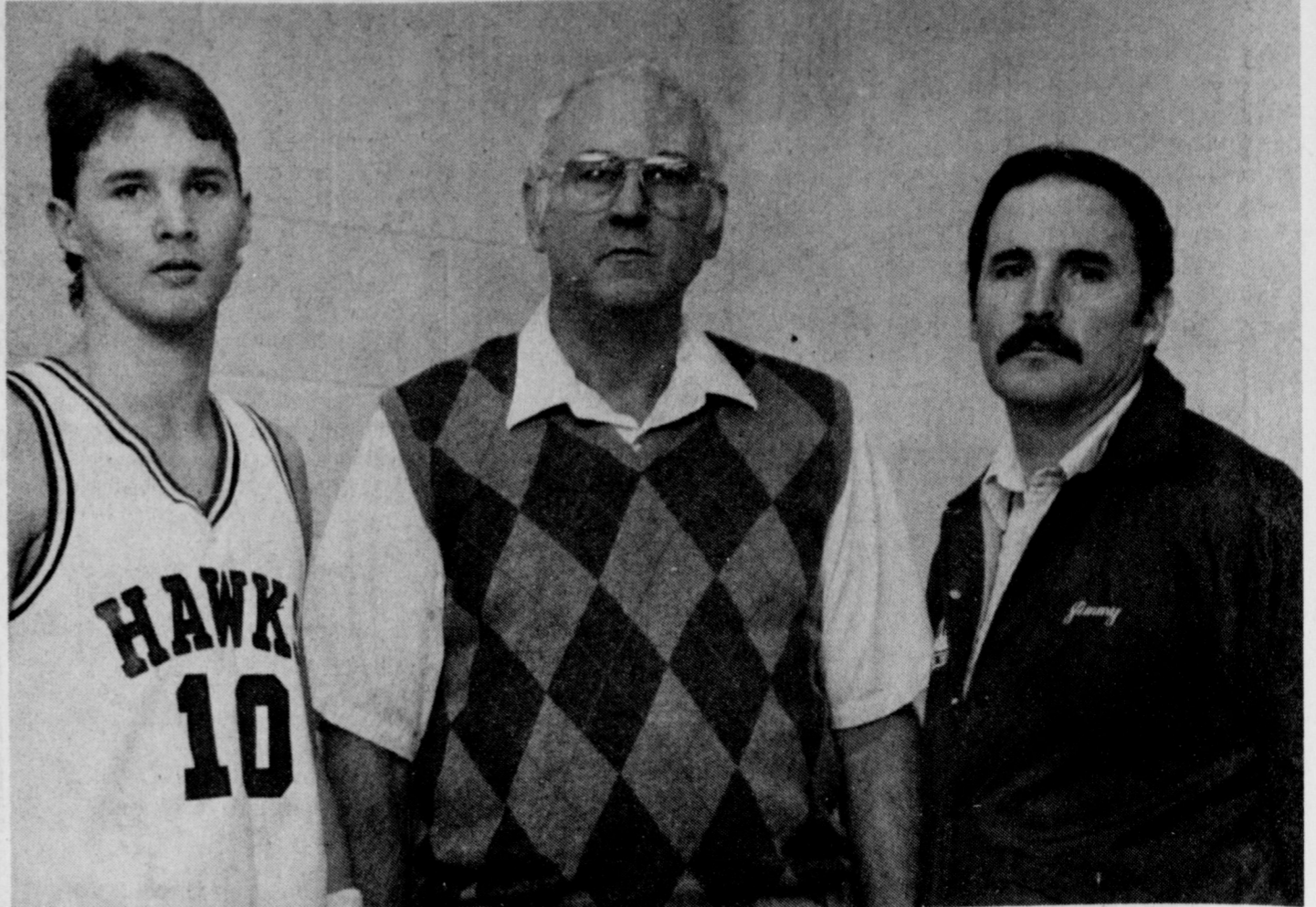
Bud Mercer, who's on the city council, said he got a call one night from someone who thought he was on the school board, who wanted to offer the name of a prospect.

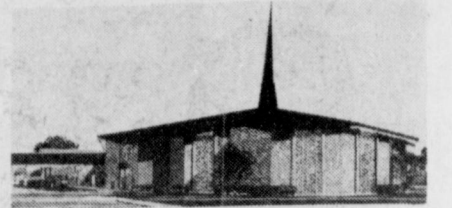

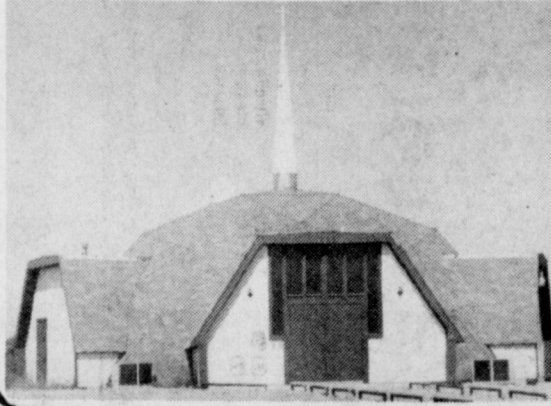

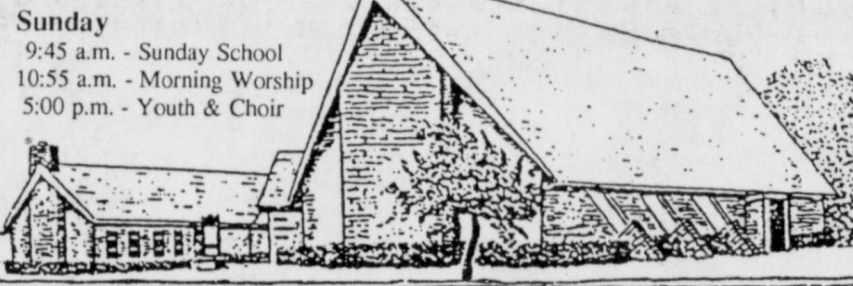

FUDGE BROWNIE PIE

2 eggs
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
1/3 cup cocoa
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cupped nuts, optional
Beat eggs in small mixture bowl. Blend in sugar and melted butter. Combine flour, cocoa and salt, add to butter mixture. Stir in vanilla and nuts. Pour into lightly greased pie pan. Bake at 350 degrees 25 to 30 minutes or until almost set (pie will not test done). Cool. The pie can be iced or served with Hot Fudge Sauce or the sauce and ice cream.

HOT FUDGE SAUCE

3/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup cocoa
1-5 oz. can evaporated milk
1/3 cup light corn syrup
1/3 cup butter
1 tsp. vanilla
Combine sugar and cocoa in small saucepan; blend in evaporated milk and corn syrup. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture boils. Boil and stir one minute. Remove from heat, stir in butter and vanilla. Serve warm.

CHEESE AND NOODLES

1 package egg noodles
1 can chicken or mushroom soup
1/2 can warm water
3/4 stick oleo
1 cup shredded cheese
Cook noodles till tender, drain. Spray a 7x12 pyrex dish with Pam. Spread noodles in dish and pour soup and water over them. Put chopped up oleo on top. Sprinkle cheese over top and cook in 350 degree oven until cheese melts and starts to brown.

APRICOT UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

Mix favorite yellow cake mix as directed.
In heavy skillet (3x10 inch), melt 3/4 cup butter, add 3 cups of brown sugar, mash down and mix with fork. Spread as evenly as you can.

Drain 1 large can of apricots and place them evenly over brown sugar mixture. Pour yellow cake mix over apricots. Bake at 350 degrees until a toothpick comes out clean, 1 to 1 1/2 hours usually. When cake is done, set out 10 minutes then turn over quickly in large plate.

GARDEN SALAD

2 large tomatoes
2 large cucumbers
1 or 2 onions
Cut tomatoes and cucumbers in large chunks. Peel onion and slice to make rings. Season to taste. Put 2 tablespoons sugar in middle of the vegetables, then pour 1/2 to 3/4 cup vinegar over sugar. Don't stir. Set aside. Place plate or dish over bowl. Let set about 30 minutes, then stir; the sugar will probably be dissolved. Put in refrigerator until ready to eat. This usually keeps several days.

Note from Mrs. Johnson "I usually make this in the summer when I have my garden."

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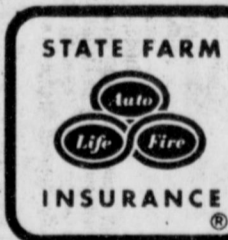

Hawks set single-game scoring record: 119

Both the Hawk and Lady Hawk varsity basketball teams swept Jacksboro here Friday night, but dropped close games Tuesday to Breckenridge. And sandwiched in between, the girls lost a makeup game to Decatur Saturday.

The Hawks now stand 1-1 in Dist. 6-AAA play, while the Lady Hawks are 1-2.

High school teams scoring 66 points are usually in position to post a victory, but that wasn't the case for Jacksboro Friday.

The Hawks set an apparent new school record by racking up 119

points.

Establishing a 32-20 lead by the end of the first period, Iowa Park surged ahead, outscoring the visitors 30-16 in the second period for a 63-36 lead.

Sophomore center Jimmy Duggins sank a 14-foot jump shot with 4:38 remaining in the game to break the century mark, and the other sophomore on the team, Jimmy Nicholson, put up a long shot at the final buzzer that added to the final score.

Three senior starters were benched when the century mark was exceeded.

They were Bill Chandler, who finished with 34 points, Marc Johnson, with 28, and Toby Brown, who had 10. Duggins also had 19.

That was the second time this year the Hawks have scored 100 or more points. They opened the season with a 100-45 win over Byers.

In both century games, Coach Earnie Reusch had only eight players suited out.

The Lady Hawks rebounded from their latest game, an 82-19 loss to Bowie, to defeat Jacksboro 54-44.

After opening the first period with a 21-17 lead, they extended the

lead to 38-27 by halftime, and fought off a rally by the visitors to enter the final frame leading by 10, 46-36.

Lori Allen, who missed the Bowie game, was high scorer with 22 points. Amy Payton and Shonna Weaver each had nine.

Breckenridge edged the Hawks 60-59, with a major difference coming from the charity line.

Playing in the Buckaroo gym, Iowa Park drew 26 whistles and the hosts, who were called only 19 times, canned 21 of 30 free shots. The Hawks hit 13 of 18 shots from the line.

Brown and Nicholson both left the court via the foul route in the fourth period.

Iowa Park had led 33-30 at the half, but the Bucks pulled into a 43-43 tie by the end of the third quarter.

Johnson finished with 23 points and Chandler had 22.

The Lady Hawks had trailed 14-8 after the first quarter, but battled back to tie the score at 22-22 by the half.

But a cold third period proved

their downfall, as they gained only two points in the third, while the hosts racked up nine.

Breckenridge held the lead at the final buzzer, 42-34.

Allen, who had to watch much of the second half from the bench because of fouls, and Tomi Cockburn

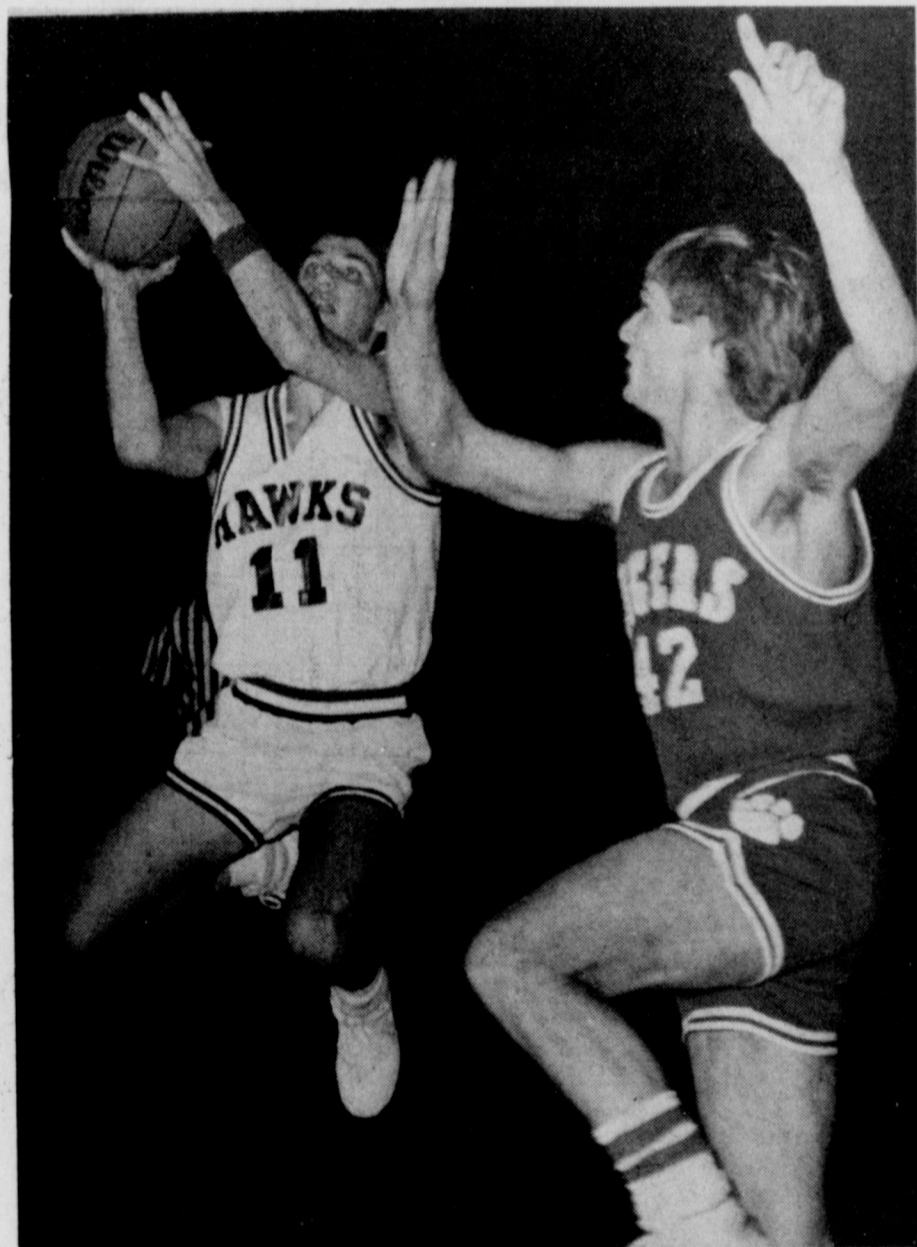
each had 11 points.

Decatur, ranked fifth among Class AAA girls' teams in the state with an 18-2 record, rolled to a 73-33 win in Saturday's game.

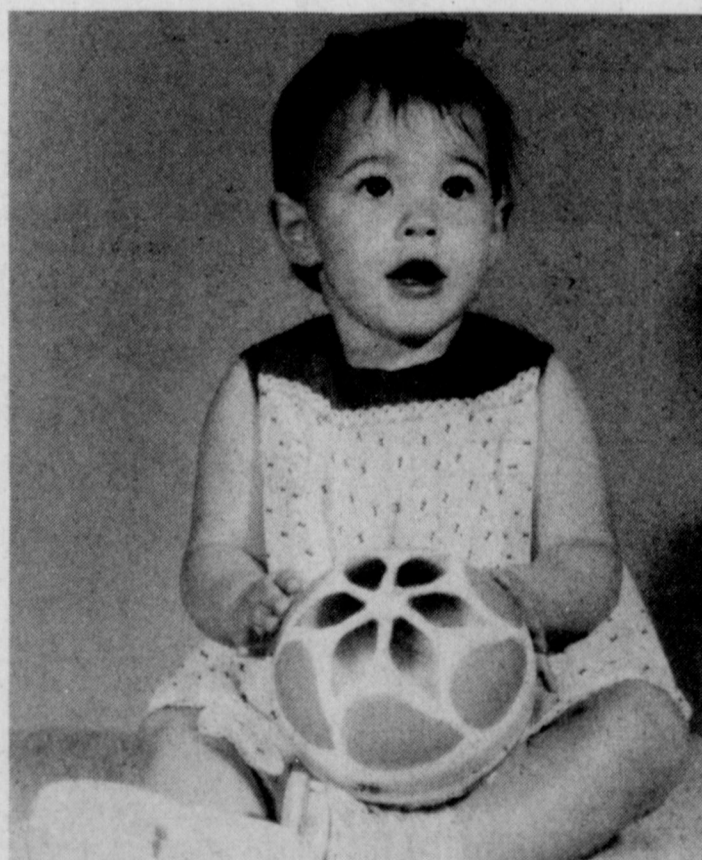

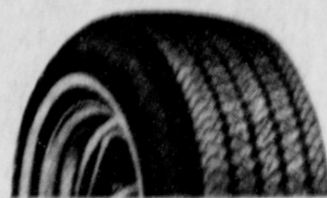
