City, school meetings scheduled next week

In their regularly-scheduled meetings next week, the city council will discuss street construction plans for the year and school trustees will consider renewing the superintendent's contract.

The city's meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, and the school's at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

Among the street construction plans for the year to be discussed is the rebuilding of South Wall, a project to be undertaken by the state sometime in May.

Another paving project aldermen will be asked to consider is the alley south of the 900 block of Van Horn.

The Lady Hawks will carry a 6-10 season record into their first Dist. 6-AAA game Friday night at Decatur, and will host their first conference contest Tuesday against Bowie.

After wholopping Archer City here Dec. 30, Iowa Park found competition tough in the Archer City tournament, winning only one of their three games.

The Lady Hawks opened tourney play with a 43-30 win over Windthorst, behind Lori Allen's 17 points and 10 from Laurie Espinoza.

Friday, they lost 66-48 to Graham, despite a 14-point effort by Paige Knight and 10 more from Allen, dropping them into the third place final Saturday.

Archer City found home court to

its advantage, however. After losing 63-37 to the Lady Hawks here, the hosts edged Iowa Park 62-60 for the third place trophy. Allen and Knight were high scorers for Iowa Park, with 20 and 13 points, respectively.

In that game with Archer City here, Espinoza had the hot hand, scoring 21 of Iowa Park's points. Wendy Trantham had 14 and Allen 12.

The game started on a slow note, with Iowa Park leading only 6-5. But the Lady Hawks caught fire the balance of the game, leading 31-11 at the half and 49-25 going into the final period.

Espinoza and Amy Payton each had eight steals.

The Lady Hawk JV also won, 40-

The groom's father wrote the wedding vows and officiated the ceremony.

The focal point of the sanctuary decor was a fifteen-point fan-shaped candelabra with spiral candelabra attached at each side in the center of the altar. Heart-shaped candelabra flanked the grouping. The unity candlestick stood at one side of the main altar and the prayer bench was diagonally located to the center candelabra. Each piece of the altar equipment was decorated with silk greenery and floral sprays in the bride's colors of royal and white.

The side banisters of the altar were lined with votive cups, and votive pew markers extended the length of the sanctuary.

**Calcium Effect**

Calcium may not only contribute to the health of teeth and the strengthening of bones (to prevent osteoporosis), it may also play a role in preventing hypertension. In a retrospective study conducted in the Netherlands, Dr. Frans J. Kok measured the blood pressure of 2,300 men and women, and interviewed them about their dietary habits. He found those with normal blood pressure ate foods considerably richer in calcium than those who had high blood pressure. The scientist ruled out other factors that might contribute to hypertension -- smoking, alcohol and excess weight. He found a strong association between between low calcium intake and hypertension, especially in women.

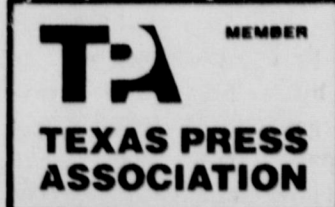

# As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



We all have problems of one sort or another, but there are a bunch of rural property owners over in Wise County who've got about all they can handle.

They've got fields of tires. About two million of them. And so far they haven't found a way to get rid of the old things.

I've been following stories about their problems the past couple of months in the Wise County Messenger, the Decatur newspaper.

For a period of time, a couple of owners have apparently been letting one or more dealers from big cities dump their old tires on their land. The properties apparently were isolated and not being farmed.

Then, a couple of months ago, following some of those big rains, some neighbors northwest of Decatur who were cultivating some good bottom land, noticed they had fields apparently sprouting big, black tires. Thousands of them!

Then they found the tires hadn't sprouted, but rather had been washed down a slope, onto their land. And the tires had taken out fencing to cross onto their property.

A little later, another similar situation was discovered east of Bridgeport.

The owners of the property where the tires had been dumped at first denied any knowledge of their existence. They later promised to help remove the tires from the offenders' properties.

Well, some of the fencing has been repaired, according to the paper. But the tires, all of them, are still where they were carried by the rushing runoff water.

Now the problems are multiplying.

First of all, the original property owners didn't have state permits for the tires to be dumped on their land.

The neighbors are wanting to work their land for spring planting,

but can't because the tires are still in place. And they don't feel obligated to do the removal work for someone else who contributed the problem.

The county attorney has been called into the case to assist the abused neighbors. So far, she's found someone who will haul off the old tires...at \$3.50 per.

That may sound high, but consider, the tires are partially filled with water and mud, to add to their already weighty existence. That's a lot of stuff to be picking up, and hauling it to some other place that will accept them.

Now the attorney has come up with an idea that can only signify she's a Democrat. She's going to contact the federal government for funds to clean up the mess.

This could be an on-going story. I'll try to keep up with it...just so we will know what to do in case we find a couple million old tires washing down Buffalo Creek or Wichita River.

which for years has been a particular problem for trash trucks because part of it parallels a deep drainage ditch.

Administrator James Barrington said paving of that alley would also serve to carry water into the ditch. The water washes the alley as it enters the ditch, he explained.

Also to be discussed is the timetable for the election, which has been changed to permit election of aldermen by place, rather than at-large.

The council will be asked to consider authorizing the administrator to advertise for a parks maintenance contract for this year's spring and summer, as well as a proposal to purchase used Department of Public Safety vehicles for city use.

Also to be considered are proposals to authorize travel expenses to three events in Austin: Legislative Seminar, Feb. 2; Economic Development Workshop, Feb. 4-5, and Future Fund Symposium, Mar. 4-6.

Consideration of extension of the school superintendent's contract is a regular item on every January agenda of the school board's.

Trustees are to go into executive session to discuss the contract, and also "personnel matters," according to the agenda.

Also to be considered is a revision of the board's building-use policy and a proposal to amend the present student dress code.

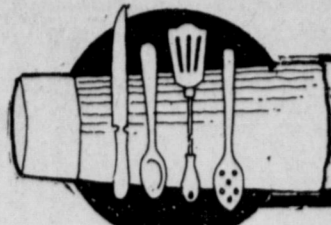

### RINDSROULADEN (Beef Rolls)

15 thin slices of top round beef  
1 lg. onion, finely diced  
1 lb. Canadian Bacon, finely diced  
2 Tbs. instant beef bouillon crystals  
1/2 lemon  
1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Trim the fat from each slice of the top round. Pepper each slice and add finely diced onions and bacon. Roll each slice and hold roll together with toothpick. Brown two rolls at time in butter. Be careful not to burn. Make gravy from the butter with added water in the pan.

Remove rolls to a large pan and add gravy. Continue until all rolls are browned. Add the juice of half a lemon, 2 tablespoons of instant beef crystals and 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg to the meat and gravy. Simmer 2 1/2 hours or bake 2 1/2 hours at 325.

### WARMER KARTOFFELSALAT MIT SPECK (Hot Potatoe Salad with Bacon)

10 med. boiling potatoes, scrubbed but not peeled  
1/2 lb. bacon, finely diced (1 1/2 c.)  
1/2 c. finely chopped onion

1/2 c. white wine or cider vinegar  
1/2 c. water  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. ground black pepper  
2 Tbs. finely chopped parsley

Drop unpeeled potatoes into boiling water. Boil but do not over-cook. Drain in colander, then peel and cut into 1/4-inch slices. Set aside. In heavy 8 or 10 inch skillet, cook bacon over moderate heat until crisp. Drain on paper towel. Add onion to the remaining fat in the skillet, and cook stirring frequently for 5 minutes until soft and transparent.

Stir in wine or vinegar, water, salt and pepper and cook, stirring constantly for a minute or so. Pour the hot sauce over the potatoes and coat them evenly. Stir bacon pieces into the salad. Set aside at room temperature or serve at once. Top with parsley and taste for seasoning.

### ROTKOHL MIT APFELN (Red Cabbage with apples)

2 - 2 1/2 lb. red cabbage  
2/3 c. red wine vinegar  
2 Tbs. sugar  
2 tsp. salt  
2 Tbs. butter  
2 med. cooking apples, peeled, cored and cut into 1/8 inch thick wedges.

1/2 c. finely chopped onions  
1 whole onion peeled and pierced with 2 whole cloves  
1 sm. bay leaf  
5 c. boiling water  
3 Tbs red currant jelly (optional)

Wash the head of cabbage under cold running water, remove the tough outer leaves, and cut the cabbage into quarters. To shred the cabbage cut out the core and slice the quarters crosswise into 1/8-inch wide strips.

Drop the cabbage into a large mixing bowl, sprinkle with the vinegar, sugar and salt, then toss the shreds about with a spoon to coat them evenly with the mixture.

In a heavy 4-5 quart casserole, melt the butter or lard, over moderate heat. Add the apples and chopped onions and cook, stirring frequently for 5 minutes or until the apples are lightly browned. Add the cabbage, the whole onion with cloves and the bay leaf; stir thoroughly and pour in boiling water.

Bring to a boil over high heat, stirring occasionally, and reduce the heat to its lowest possible point. Cover and simmer for 1 1/2 to 2 hrs. or until the cabbage is moist. If it seems dry, add a tablespoon of boiling water. When the cabbage is done, there should be almost no liquid left in the casserole.

Just before serving remove the onion and bay leaf, and stir in the currant jelly. Taste for seasoning, then transfer the entire contents of the casserole to a heated platter or bowl and serve.

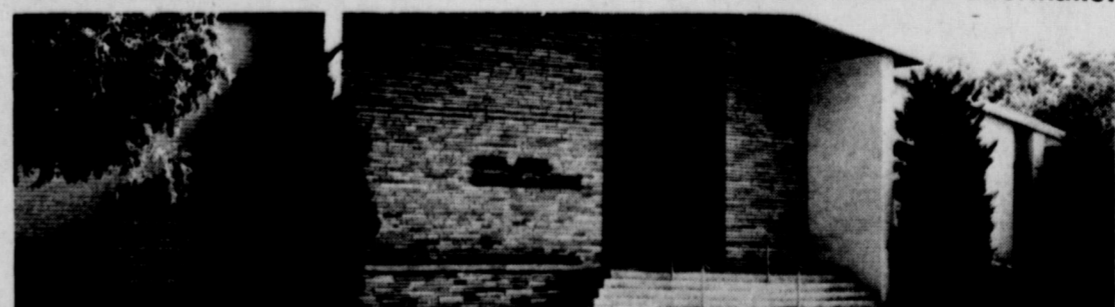

## Iowa Park School Scene

All information prepared by Iowa Park School Counselors.

The guidance program constitutes an integral part of the total school program. The most frequent way of perceiving guidance is by defining the specific services provided in the school. These services are considered to be related to, but differentiated from, teaching and administrative services. Guidance services should extend to pupils, teachers, administrators, parents, and the community.

New students entering the school frequently are in need of orientation service in order that they may feel secure in their new surroundings. The buildings, the teachers, the regulations, the grounds, the principal, the student body, are all strange to them. The counselor attempts to give all new students the special attention needed to ease the transition and acquaint them with their new surroundings and school personnel.

The placement service involves mainly educational placement. Routine scheduling of students comes under this service as well as assignment to special classes.

Counseling is only one phase of the total guidance program. However, it is the heart of the program. Counselors at every level are obligated to serve every child, to help him meet his own needs, and to arrive at his own solutions in an intelligent manner rather than to provide solutions for him. One of the main objectives of the counseling service is

the prevention of problems rather than the solution after they have already developed. Early identification is crucial to an effective guidance program. Iowa Park is very fortunate to have a guidance program at the elementary level to help detect small problems before they grow.

The counselor also serves as a resource person to disseminate all special kinds of information useful to the pupil but primarily information about occupations, educational opportunities, and information concerning common problems of youth.

Appraisal might be defined as the analysis of the individual student. When a child enters the school system, a cumulative folder is started. This folder will contain the developmental record of that student throughout his total school life.

Measuring the achievement possibilities of the individual students is one of our most valuable guidance procedures. Various standardized tests are administered to provide valuable information describing the individual student.

The goal of the guidance staff at all levels - elementary, Jr. High, and High School - is to assist students in making a better overall adjustment to school, to themselves, and to society.

The guidance team of the Iowa Park CISD is composed of Herman Escue, High School Counselor, Colleen Roberts, Jr. High Counsel-

or, and Pat Davis, Elementary Counselor. If you have questions or concerns regarding school or if you would like to have a particular subject addressed in this column, please contact the appropriate counselor.

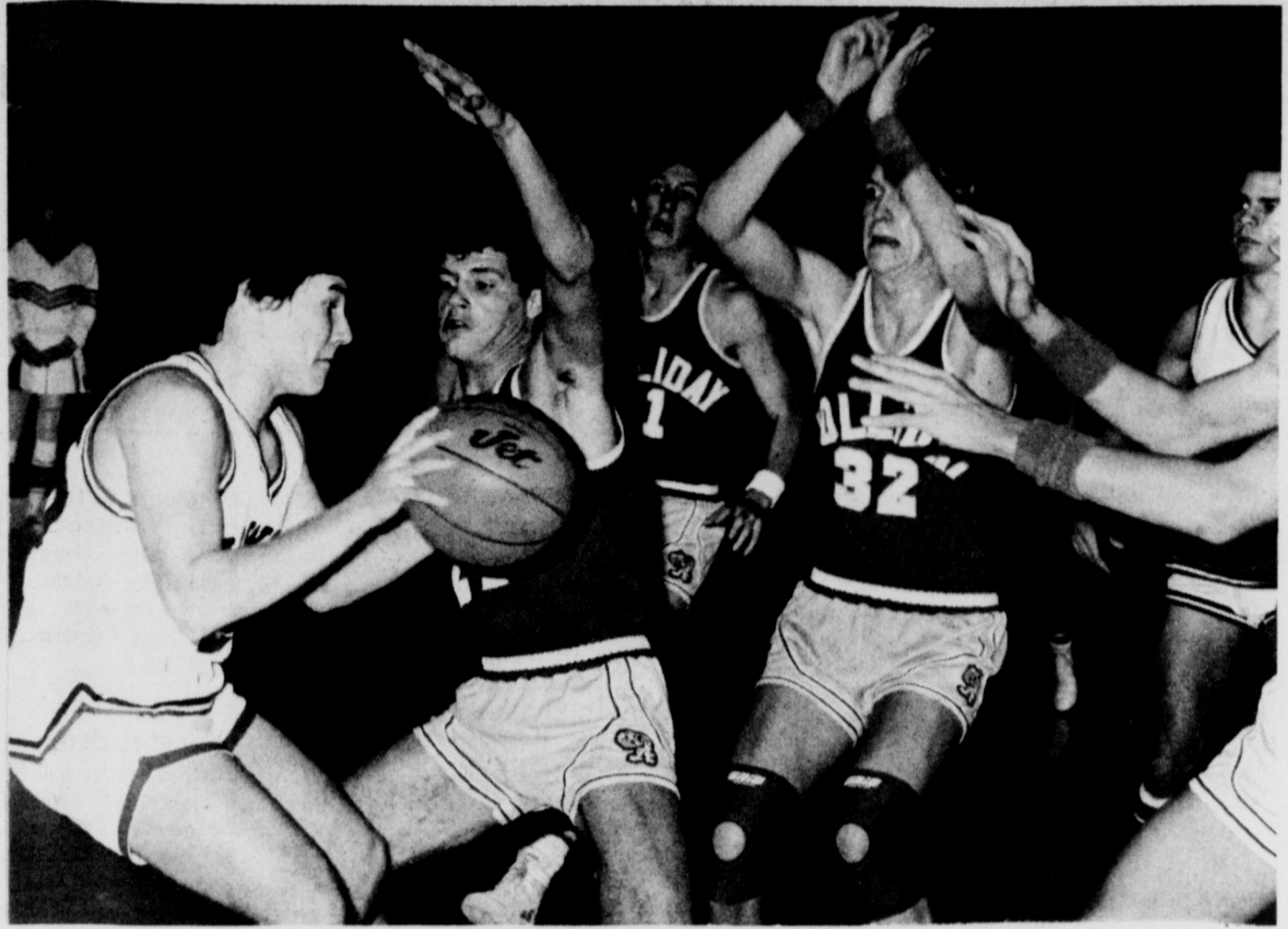
