





Calcium may not only contribute to the health of teeth and the strengthening of bones (to prevent osteoporosis), it may also play a role in preventing hypertension.

In a retrospective study conducted in the Netherlands, Dr. Frans J. Kok measured the blood pressure of 2,300 men and women, and interviewed them about their dietary habits.

He found those with normal blood pressure ate foods considerably richer in calcium than those who had high blood pressure. The scientist ruled out other factors that might contribute to hypertension -- smoking, alcohol and excess weight.

He found a strong association between between low calcium intake and hypertension, especially in women.

Drop the cabbage into a large mixing bowl, sprinkle with the vinegar, sugar and salt, then toss the shreds about with a spoon to coat them evenly with the mixture.

In a heavy 4-5 quart casserole, melt the butter or lard, over moderate heat. Add the apples and chopped onions and cook, stirring frequently for 5 minutes or until the apples are lightly browned. Add the cabbage, the whole onion with cloves and the bay leaf; stir thoroughly and pour in boiling water.

Bring to a boil over high heat, stirring occasionally, and reduce the heat to its lowest possible point. Cover and simmer for 1 1/2 to 2 hrs. or until the cabbage is moist. If it seems dry, add a tablespoon of boiling water. When the cabbage is done, there should be almost no liquid left in the casserole.

Just before serving remove the onion and bay leaf, and stir in the currant jelly. Taste for seasoning, then transfer the entire contents of the casserole to a heated platter or bowl and serve.

New students entering the school frequently are in need of orientation service in order that they may feel secure in their new surroundings. The buildings, the teachers, the regulations, the grounds, the principal, the student body, are all strange to them. The counselor attempts to give all new students the special attention needed to ease the transition and acquaint them with their new surroundings and school personnel.

The placement service involves mainly educational placement. Routine scheduling of students comes under this service as well as assignment to special classes.

Counseling is only one phase of the total guidance program. However, it is the heart of the program. Counselors at every level are obligated to serve every child, to help him meet his own needs, and to arrive at his own solutions in an intelligent manner rather than to provide solutions for him. One of the main objectives of the couseling service is the prevention of problems rather than the solution after they have already developed. Early identification is crucial to an effective guidance program. Iowa Park is very fortunate to have a guidance program at the elementary level to help detect small problems before they grow.

The counselor also serves as a resource person to disseminate all special kinds of information useful to the pupil but primarily information about occupations, educational opportunities, and information concerning

common problems of youth. Appraisal might be defined as the analysis of the individual student. When a child enters the school system, a cumulative folder is started. This folder will contain the developmental record of that student through-

out his total school life. Measuring the achievement possibilities of the individual students is one of our most valuable guidance procedures. Various standardized tests are administered to provide valuable information describ-

ing the individual student. The goal of the guidance staff at all levels - elementary, Jr. High, and High School - is to assist students in making a better overall adjustment to school, to themselves, and to






