## Garbage costs could double in future

The cost of taking care of the city's garbage could double, if the city is unable to convince the Texas Department of Health that its new regulations on the local sanitary landfill are not necessary.

Members of the city council were told Monday night of new requirements for the pits in which trash is buried.

The state, it was explained, has changed its opinion about preparation of pits, and in order to meet the new requirements, additional expensive equipment will be required, as well as higher costs for operators.

Each time a new pit is dug, a soil sample is taken by engineer Kerry Maroney, and sent to the state office. All samples have been approved for the current type of operation, with the latest approval as recent as six months ago, Maroney said.

But since then, an official in the state's office has ruled the pits must

have walls and flooring must be compacted clay, covered by a foot of dirt, and when completed, four feet of dirt cover, applied six inches at a time, each saturated with water and compacted with a roller.

To excavate the trenches and build the liners, a self-loading elevated scraper, costing approximately \$115,000, would be required, Mike Price, public works director, told the council.

It was decided to invite the state official, at local expense, to examine the city's sanitary landfill, in hopes to convince him the additional work was not necessary.

Price also presented a list of streets evaluated as top priority for major work this summer, along with cost estimates.

The list included:  
1. East Washington, from Victoria to Bell, \$104,000;  
2. East Diamond, from Wall to Tex-

owa, \$58,000;  
3. South Texowa, from Diamond to Ruby, \$80,000;  
4. East Ruby, from Texowa to Victoria, \$24,000;  
5. South Victoria, from Ruby to railroad tracks, \$36,000;  
6. West Texas, from Pacific to Third, \$136,000;  
7. North Third, from West Highway to Magnolia, \$20,000; and  
8. North Third, from Magnolia to Access Road, \$128,000.

Already scheduled work to be done by the state is the rebuilding of Wall from the railroad tracks to Garden.

Aldermen approved surfacing the alley in the 900 block of Van Horn, to correct problems the city had experienced since the addition was built and also to assist in carrying water from private property to the drainage ditch.

Cost of the project was estimated at \$4,200.

Accepting the recommendation of the new police chief, Alan Sheffield, council members approved the purchase of two used vehicles from Park Ford, rather than discarded Public Safety vehicles.

Sheffield pointed out that the local dealer's prices were in line with the cost of the DPS vehicles, but a more desirable warranty was available here.

Both vehicles will be used in the police department.

Also approved was a proposal to advertise for bids maintenance of city grounds, but extending the contract period from one to three years.

## Renting, dress code policies amended

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday night approved amendments to the building use and student dress policies, and also extended Supt. Glen Mitchell's contract one year.

The major change in the building use policy was to discontinue the cooking services of cafeteria personnel for non-school associated groups.

This, explained Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer, was caused primarily by a wage-hour ruling and excessive numbers of hours cafeteria personnel had to work when requested.

The cafeterias will be available for rent by groups, with the salary of one custodial worker included, at \$75 with three-hour minimum and \$20 for each additional hour at the high school; \$40 with three-hour minimum and \$10 each additional hour for the junior high; and \$25 with three-hour minimum and \$7.50 for each additional hour at both elementary schools.

The high school practice gym and junior high girls' gym can be rented at \$40 for a three-hour minimum and \$10 for each additional hour, and the Bradford gym fee is \$30 for a three-hour minimum and \$8 for each additional hour. Wood floor

gyms will be available for rent by specific school board action only.

Reservations for use of school facilities must be made with the school principal at least 72 hours in advance, but requests from groups from outside the district must be approved by the school board.

The amended policy will become effective Feb. 1.

In order to better meet the needs of the varying ages of students in the schools, a blanket dress code will no longer be used.

Instead, a district dress code committee has been formed, with different committees for each individual campus. All decisions of the committees will be subject to the approval of the board.

During an earlier discussion on the subject, it was pointed out that the very young girls at Kidwell, for instance, should be permitted to wear shorts to class. This was because there is no dressing facility for them in which they can change for physical education periods.

Additionally, the new policy requires each principal to inform the parents of his students in May, what the dress code will be for the fall semester. This, it was pointed out, will assist parents in their pre-school clothes purchasing.

Supt. Mitchell's contract extension was voted on following a 51-minute executive session of trustees.

In other business, the board received a "Treasure Chest Kit" for student instruction, presented by Joe Singer, representative of the American Heart Association.

The board approved a request of the Iowa Park Athletic Alumni Association to use the junior high gymnasium for a basketball tournament to benefit the Bertha McDonald Memorial Scholarship Fund. The event is to be held Feb. 28, according to the request.

The board's recognition certificates were presented to six students,

Tina Escue, Donna Gibson, Missy Logan, Kyle Long, John Teel and Andy Jacobi, for competing for placement on the All State Choir.

Former board member, Fred Parkey, who has served the past 13 years on the Region Nine Service Center board, reminded trustees of the services available through the regional facility.

Parkey, who complimented the board by saying, "You people are doing a tremendous job," mentioned the district's tax value was only \$10-million when he was first elected a local trustee.

Tax collector Allen Shewmake, in making his monthly report, told the board 41.22 percent of the current taxes had been collected Jan. 6, but that was increased to 65 percent a few days later when Cryovac paid its tax.

Shewmake said Cryovac's payment of over \$300,000 was within \$10,000 of the total assessed to the area's oil industry.

A booklet of condensed information concerning information on state colleges and universities, prepared on computers at the high school, was presented by Counselor Herman Escue.

He explained the booklet would be helpful to students, as well as their parents, planning to continue their education after graduation.

For larger families, add \$248 per person if head of household is over 60, or \$195 if under 60.

## Sales tax check down

After leading all Wichita County communities through the year in sales tax receipts, Iowa Park's sales apparently fell through the floor during November.

January's sales tax rebate check from the state comptroller's office was 55.76 percent less than the same month in 1985.

The check, \$5,000.29, represented taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to the comptroller by Dec. 20.

Last year's check was \$11,302. First payments for 1987 were down almost nine percent over the state, according to the monthly report.

Electra, \$6,022.58, was down 48.12 percent; Burkburnett, \$13,714, minus 22.44 percent, and Wichita Falls was down 19.9 percent.

Holliday's rebate check was down 61.77 percent from the same month last year (\$2,737, \$7,159).

Health Tips -from Jerel Kerby

Soothing Oils The increased use of vegetable oils not only may reduce risks for cardiovascular disease, it may be responsible for the decline in incidence of stomach ulcers, according to Dr. Daniel Hollander of the University of California at Irvine.

Dr. Hollander pointed out that the incidence of stomach ulcers has been steadily declining over the last two or three generations.

He attributes this decline (during a period of ulcer-causing turbulence) to the dietary switch from animal to vegetable fats.

He states that linoleic acid - found in safflower, corn, cottonseed, sunflower-seed, sesame and sesame oils - protects the gastrointestinal tract. Linoleic acid stimulates the production of prostaglandins, which, in turn, prevent ulcerations caused by aspirin, bile acids and alcohol. Prostaglandins also promote healing of existing ulcers.

### Abuse of elderly topic of Philia Study Club

The Philia Study Club held its January meeting Monday evening in the home of Mrs. Helen Burrell with Mrs. Jimmie Kasperek serving as co-hostess.

Mrs. Ron Barnes provided the meditation and Mrs. David Springer was in charge of the business meeting.

"A Time to Mourn" was the topic of the program presented in a slide show by two men from the Texas Department of Human Resources.

They commented that "Our elderly face new trials daily, the problem of 'Elder Abuse' which is a festering sore." The program stressed how the use of violence has become acceptable and common in some parts of society, and that the horror stories in the newspapers, magazines and on television are often real.

The slides and commentary showed how the elderly face problems with abuse, neglect and exploitation, and of the three, neglect is most often reported. The adult Protective Sources for the Aged and Disabled receive approximately 1,000 reported cases per month.

The program showed the abusers to be those on drugs who are often involved, those with emotional problems, and even the caretaker who can no longer deal with long-term illness of the elder.

In answer to the question "What can we do," these suggestions were made: first, to become aware of the elderly in our community and familiar with how they live and their caretakers; also, to put them and their family members in touch with helpful agencies.

Club members were reminded that it is the law to report all suspected cases of abuse, and that the reporter is protected by the law if they act in good faith and without malice. The Abuse Hotline number is 1-800-252-5400, and all calls will be acted upon within 24 hours.

The program closed on a solemn reminder that civilization will be judged by how it cares for its children and the elderly, a question and answer period and passing out related literature.

### Tributes recalled

# As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



The problem of funding the operation of the state over the next two years is being undertaken by the state legislature, and I wouldn't want to be in any of their shoes.

Frankly, I have no idea how the state can generate an additional \$5.8-billion over the next two years without bankrupting everything and everyone.

In my opinion, it's not going to come from cutback in state spending. Virtually every agency that receives state funds has for some time been sending out signals of gloom and doom for those they serve, if any of their funds are cut.

We are told the quality of life, the future of our nation, and indeed the very lives of Texans will be jepor-

dized if any cuts are made.

So, if state spending is retained as is, then that means new taxes, atop all the new ones we've assumed over the past two years.

Since almost half the state's money comes from sales taxes, then it would probably be safe to assume that is where the legislature will look for its greatest increase.

But, spending is down. Sales tax collections in November, the last to be reported by the state comptroller, were down nine percent over the state.

One could quickly point out that a broadening of the sales tax would increase state revenue. Just put those items and services currently excluded.

But that would presume that the

people who are paying sales taxes on the present items and services would not be effected. A new group of people would start paying taxes.

Possibly. But those already spending nine percent less would also be included. And I doubt they've stopped buying goods and services by nine percent just because they wanted to save money.

We've got a lot of people in the state who are either unemployed or working at jobs paying lower salaries than they once received.

And there was probably a pretty good reason those items and services presently exempted were not taxed.

We're not facing a no-win situation. But whatever the legislature does is going to put an even heavier burden on the residents of Texas.

I look for a token cutback in funding state agencies and programs. And I see a whopping cost of living for persons who buy anything from a store or receive any type of service.

If this does come about, I think we can look for people who live near a state border to do a lot of buying outside Texas. And I think there will be a revival of the old barter system, where we trade our possessions and services with someone, and no money changes hands.

No sir. I wouldn't want to be a member of the state legislature. The proud state of Texas and its citizens is more a load than I'd want to shoulder.

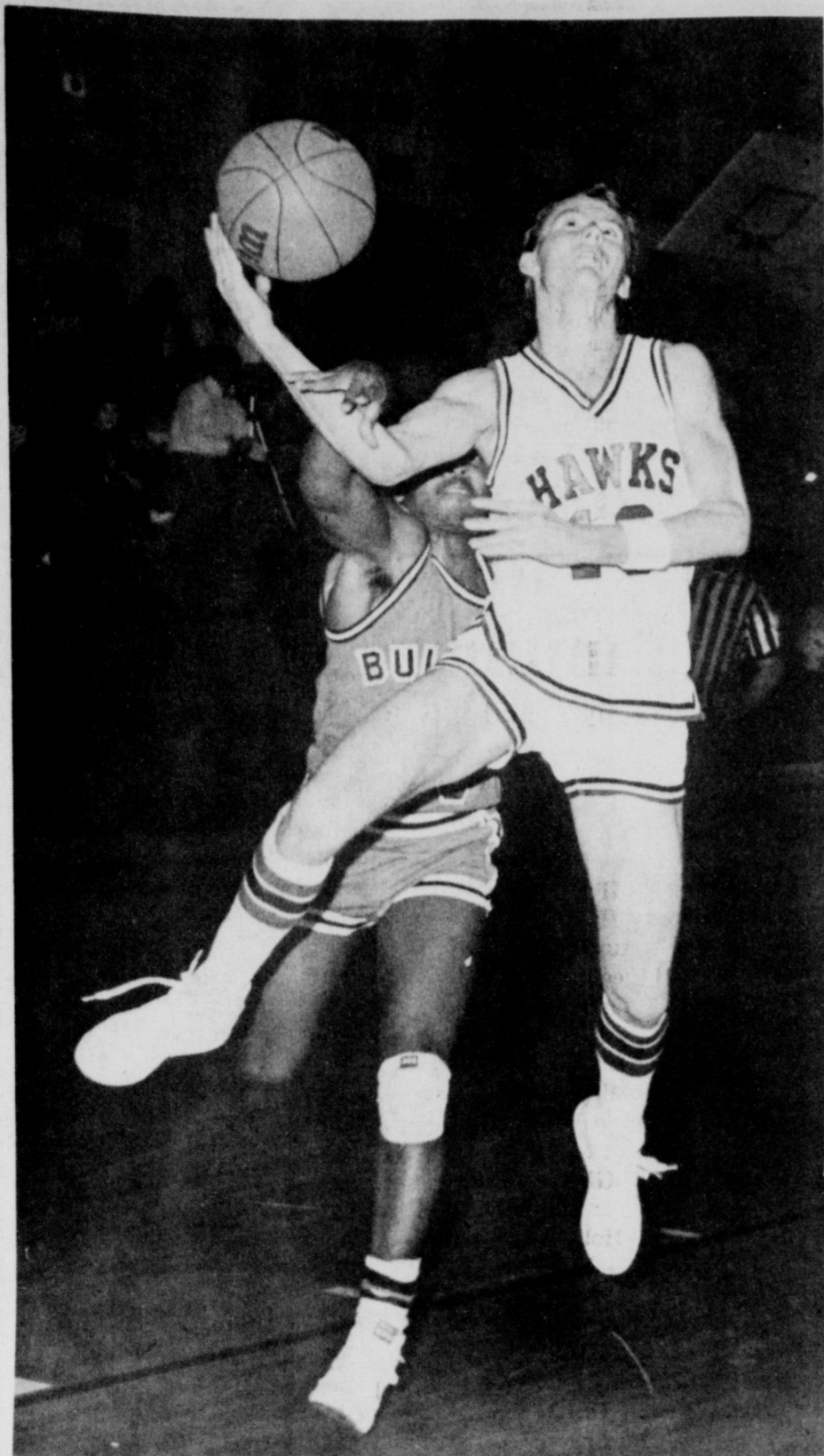

# Hawks beat Bulldogs, open district Friday

The Hawks, still fresh from a 76-70 win Friday over Burkburnett, will travel Friday night to Jacksboro to open their 1986 campaign for the Dist. 6-AAA title.

Iowa Park's roundball season was shortened by an extended football
