## Soothing Oils

The increased use of vegetable oils not only may reduce risks for cardiovascular disease, it may be responsible for the decline in incidence of stomach ulcers, according to Dr. Daniel Hollander of the University of California at Invine.
Dr. Hollander pointed out that the incidence of stomach ulcers has been steadily declining over the last two or three generations
He attributes this decline (during a period of ulcercausing turbulence) to the dietary switch from animal to vegetable fats.
He states that linoleic acid - found in safflower, corn, cottonseed, sunflower-seed, sesame and sesame oils - protects the gastrointestinal tract. Linoleic acid stmates the production of prostaglandins, bilch, in turn, prevent ulcerations caused by aspirin, healing of existing healing of existing ulcers.

"A Time to Mourn" was the topic of the program presented in a slide show by two men from the slide show by two men from the Texas Department of Texas Department of Human Re- sources. They commented that "Our elderly face new trials daily, the problem of 'Elder Abuse' which is a problem of 'Elder Abuse' which is a festering sore." The program stressed festering sore." The program stressed how the use of violence has become how the use of violence has become acceptable and common in some parts of society, and that the horror stories in the newspapers, magazines and on television are often real. The slides and commentary showed how the elderly face showed how the elderly face problems with abuse, neglect problems with abuse, neglect and exploitation, and of the three, neglect is most often reported. The adult Protective Sources for the Aged and Disabled receive approximately 1,000 reported cases per month. <br> The program showed the abusers to be those on drugs who are often involved, those with emoter involved, those with emotiona problems, and even the caretaker wh can no longer deal with long-term illness of the elder. <br> In answer to the question "Wh can we do," these suggestions were made: first, to become aware of the made: first, to become aware of th elderly in our community elderly in our community and familiar with how they live and their caretakers; also, to put them and their family members in touch with helpful agencies. <br> <br> T <br> <br> T <br>
