Members of the city council were told Monday night of new requirements for the pits in which trash is buried.

# Renting, dress code policies amended

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday night approved amendments to the building use and student dress policies, and also extended Supt. Glen Mitchell's contract one year.

The major change in the building use policy was to discontinue the cooking services of cafeteria personnel for non-school associated groups.

This, explained Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer, was caused primarily by a wage-hour ruling and excessive numbers of hours cafeteria personnel had to work when requested.

The cafeterias will be available for rent by groups, with the salary of one custodial worker included, at \$75 with three-hour minimum and \$20 for each additional hour at the high school: \$40 with three-hour minimum and \$10 each additional hour for the junior high; and \$25 with three-hour minimum and \$7.50 for each additional hour at both elementary schools.

The high school practice gym and junior high girls' gym can be rented at \$40 for a three-hour minimum and \$10 for each additional hour, and the Bradford gym fee is \$30 for a three-hour minimum and \$8 for each additional hour. Wood floor

gyms will be available for rent by specific school board action only.

Reservations for use of school facilities must be made with the school principal at least 72 hours in advance, but requests from groups from outside the district must be approved by the school board.

The amended policy will become effective Feb. 1.

In order to better meet the needs of the varying ages of students in the schools, a blanket dress code will no longer be used.

Instead, a district dress code committee has been formed, with different committees for each individual campus. All decisions of the committees will be subject to the approval of the board.

During an earlier discussion on the subject, it was pointed out that the very young girls at Kidwell, for instance, should be permitted to wear shorts to class. This was because there is no dressing facility for them in which they can change for physical education periods.

Additionally, the new policy requires each principal to inform the parents of his students in May, what the dress code will be for the fall semester. This, it was pointed out, will assist parents in their pre-school clothes purchasing.

Supt. Mitchell's contract extension was voted on following a 51minute executive session of trustees.

In other business, the board received a "Treasure Chest Kit" for student instruction, presented by Joe Singer, representative of the American Heart Association.

The board approved a request of the Iowa Park Athletic Alumni Association to use the junior high gymnasium for a basketball tournament to benefit the Bertha McDonald Memorial Scholarship Fund. The event is to be held Feb. 28, according to the request.

### Sales tax check down After leading all Wichita County communities through the year in sales tax receipts, Iowa Park's sales

apparently fell through the floor during November. January's sales tax rebate check from the state comptroller's office was 55.76 percent less than the same month in 1985.

The check, \$5,000.29, represented taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to the comptroller by Dec. 20.

Last year's check was \$11,302. First payments for 1987 were down almost nine percent over the state, according to the monthly

Electra, \$6,022.58, was down 48.12 percent; Burkburnett, \$13,714, minus 22.44 percent, and Wichita Falls was down 19.9 percent.

Holliday's rebate check was down 61.77 percent from the same month last year (\$2,737, \$7,159).

# Health Tips -from Jerel Kerby



Soothing Oils

The increased use of vegetable oils not only may reduce risks for cardiovascular disease, it may be responsible for the decline in incidence of stomach ulcers, according to Dr. Daniel Hollander of the University of California at Irvine.

Dr. Hollander pointed out that the incidence of stomach ulcers has been steadily declining over the last two or three generations.

He attributes this decline (during a period of ulcercausing turbulence) to the dietary switch from animal to vegetable fats.


He states that linoleic acid - found in safflower. corn, cottonseed, sunflower-seed, sesame and sesame oils - protects the gastrointestinal tract. Linoleic acid stimulates the production of prostaglandins. which, in turn, prevent ulcerations caused by aspirin. bile acids and alcohol. Prostaglandins also promote healing of existing ulcers.

They commented that "Our elderly face new trials daily, the problem of 'Elder Abuse' which is a festering sore." The program stressed how the use of violence has become acceptable and common in some parts of society, and that the horror stories in the newspapers, magazines and on television are often real.

The slides and commentary showed how the elderly face problems with abuse, neglect and exploitation, and of the three, neglect is most often reported. The adult Protective Sources for the Aged and Disabled receive approximately 1,000 reported cases per month.

The program showed the abusers to be those on drugs who are often involved, those with emotional problems, and even the caretaker who can no longer deal with long-term illness of the elder.

In answer to the question "What can we do," these suggestions were made: first, to become aware of the elderly in our community and familiar with how they live and their caretakers; also, to put them and their family members in touch with

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
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# As I See It...



The problem of funding the operation of the state over the next two years is being undertaken by the state legislature, and I wouldn't want to be in any of their shoes.

In my opinion, it's not going to come from cutback in state spending. Virtually every agency that receives state funds has for some time been sending out signals of gloom and doom for those they serve, if any of their funds are cut.

We are told the quality of life, the future of our nation, and indeed the very lives of Texans will be jepordized if any cuts are made.


So, if state spending is retained as is, then that means new taxes, atop all the new ones we've assumed over the past two years.

Since almost half the state's money comes from sales taxes, then it would probably be safe to assume that is where the legislature will look for its greatest increase.

But, spending is down. Sales tax collections in November, the last to be reported by the state comptroller, were down nine percent over the

people would start paying taxes.

We've got a lot of people in the state who are either unemployed or working at jobs paying lower salaries than they once received.

And there was probably a pretty good reason those items and services presently exempted were not taxed.

We're not facing a no-win situation. But whatever the legislature does is going to put an even harder burden on the residents of Texas.

I look for a token cutback in funding state agencies and programs. And I see a whopping cost of living for persons who buy anything from a store or receive any type of service.

If this does come about, I think we can look for people who live near a state border to do a lot of buying outside Texas. And I think there will be a revival of the old barter system, where we trade our possessions and services with someone, and no money changes hands.

No sir. I wouldn't want to be a member of the state legislature. The proud state of Texas and its citizens is more a load than I'd want to shoulder.







Still have leftover turkey from Christmas dinner in the freezer and wondering how to use some of it? Cindy (Mrs. Donald Wayne) Molsbee shares a good sandwich recipe with us today that calls for slices of

Turkey has been a part of the American diet for many, many years. Edward Winslow, one of the original Mayflower passengers, who later became governor of the Plymouth colony himself wrote that turkey had been successfully hunted for the first thanksgiving dinner the colonists observed. It was not really new to them since it had reached Europe a century earlier.

In the New World, wild turkeys were plentiful and easy to take. The Indians had never bothered to domesficate them because they were harvestable by bow and arrow and in the meantime took care of themselves.

When was the turkey domesticated? There are probably many answers to that question. One writer, lean M. Pindley wrote in his book that when the Indians began to plant grain the turkeys flocked enthusiasfically into the fields and it was necessary to post sentinels to keep them out. The birds became expert in getting into the granaries so the Indians hit upon the idea of shutting them up which, of course, entailed providing food and living quarters for

Today, the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners are planned around the turkey in most American homes, but the meat is good eating the year round, and inventive cooks have come up with a variety of ways to prepare and serve it.

16 slices trimmed white bread (Pepperidge Farm thin-sliced) 8 slices each of thinly sliced ham and

8 slices of Cheddar cheese squares 6 eggs, beaten

3 cups milk 1/2 tsp onion salt

1/2 tsp dry mustard TOPPING:

2 cups crushed cornflakes (almost all of a 6-oz. box)

1 stick melted oleo Make a single layer of 8 slices of bread in a greased 9x13 baking dish. Top each slice of bread with ham, cheese and turkey. Top with remaining slices of bread.

Mix eggs, milk, seasoning together and pour over sandwiches. Refrigerate overnight. Mix topping ingredients well and distribute evenly over sandwiches. Bake 1 to 1 1/4 hours at 350 degrees. Slice into 8 portions, serve hot. Optional: spoon a dab of hot undiluted cream of mushroom soup over each sandwich.

BLUEBERRY JELLO 2 small boxes grape or raspberry

2 cups boiling water

1 can blueberries with juice 1 small can crushed pineapple with

Dissolve jello in water, add fruit and congeal. TOPPING:

Beat together well in mixer: 1/2 pint sour cream, 8 ozs. very soft cream cheese, 1/2 cup sugar or sugar substitute, 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Spread over congealed jello and sprinkle with chopped pecans.

> MEXICAN CORNBREAD (Her husband's favorite)

1 cup yellow commeal 2 eggs, well beaten 1 cup milk 1/2 tsp. soda

3/4 tsp. salt

1 No. 303 can corn, cream style 1/2 cup bacon drippings

Mix all of the above and set aside. Saute 1 lb. hamburger meat, then drain on paper towel. Grease a large casserole dish, sprinkle with a little cornmeal and brown in oven. Pour 1/2 batter into hot casserole dish. Sprinkle chopped onions to taste on top, then add 1/2 lb. grated Cheddar cheese. Spread meat on top, then add other 1/2 of batter. Bake 45-50 minutes at 350 degrees.
