Rating is roadblock

A project of upgrading water service in the south part of town has taken at least a temporary setback, according to a report made Monday night at the city council meeting.

Several months ago, Iowa Park filed application for a \$100,000 matching grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs, to help fund the project.

A similar application was filed last year, but Iowa Park did not receive high enough priority to be funded. This time, however, an expert in

working on such applications was hired to assist Administrator James Barrington. And it initially appeared successful.

Two weeks ago, the Regional Review Committee of the Nortex Regional Planning Commission reviewed applications, and Iowa Park was rated to receive full funding.

However, Barrington told the council, the same committee met last week "to 'correct' the ratings because of a 'misunderstanding' on the part of the committee about the method of awarding points. The result was a reduction in our points and in our relative position so that we are no longer in the group prioritized high enough for funding.'

The council authorized Barrington to write a letter of appeal on the "reranking" in hopes of another reversable. The letter was delivered to Ed Daniel, executive director, and express mail to the Department of Community Affairs.

Barrington stated in the communication that he felt the committee overlooked the fact that Iowa Park is proposing to upgrade and improve service rather than simply repair and

With matching monies, the city intends to increase the eight-inch line along S. Wall to a 10-inch, and in other areas, such as East Cash and S. Wall, increase six-inch lines to eight-inch.

Additionally, valves are planned to be installed which would permit only small sections to be cut off from service while line breaks were being repaired. As it is now, half the city must suffer during repairs.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, aldermen gave their approval to four proposed ordinances.

One changes the zoning of the north half of Block 17, Texas Addition, from light industrial to R-2 residential.

Another makes an ordinance out of a resolution passed in 1978 in which developers are required to pay all costs of street openings and development.

Alderman appointment postponed

An appointment to fulfill the unexpired term of City Alderman Don Decker was not forthcoming during Monday night's meeting of the city council.

Council members held a 47-minute executive session to discuss the appointment, after which Mayor Tim Hunter explained the group had only reduced a list of names "as long as my arm" to about five for consideration.

A called meeting has been set Monday, at 7 p.m. in council chambers, at which time Hunter said he expected to propose the ntment for council ratification. at the June 24 meeting, explaining he was moving to Pleasant Valley Estates, outside the city limits to the east, and therefore would be unable to continue holding the elected position.

In the council's search for a replacement, Hunter maintains the position he would like to find someone willing to work and serve, but who has not previously been on the council. He explained he felt "new blood" would be beneficial and more productive.

Monday's meeting will also serve as a budget working session for the

In a called meeting Tuesday night, members of the school board met with new superintendent Glen Mitchell for a "get acquainted" session, as well as hiring a new teacher and hearing maintenance reports.

Martin taught three years at Clarendon, one at McLean and the past five at Silverton, a school experiencing a rapid decline in

Summer maintenance at the two school football stadiums was discussed.

Mitchell said new bleachers have been installed at the junior high field. but work must still be accomplished to replace wiring to the scoreboard and repairs are needed on the concession stand and restrooms. Also, additional lights moved from the high school stadium may be used to supplement existing lights.


Nicholson pitched the entire fame, fanning 15 Olney batters.





reporter/photographer Kevin Hamilton got his feet wet with an experience Tuesday night which has plagued me for years: a combination of misunderstanding and ignorance concerning strobe lights on cameras.

He was attempting to cover the Senior All Star game between Iowa Park and Sheppard, at the base, when he was first ordered far from action and then off the field.

The reason, he was using the electronic flash which, in the minds of at least two Sheppard people, would hinder play of the athletes.

Kevin had positioned himself near the first base coaching box where he still had some benefit from the sun to his back. He took one picture, and the Sheppard coach, according to Kevin, came flying out of the dugout and complaining to the umpire.

The umpire told Kevin he would have to back up to the fence, which he

But then a woman, identified as Toni Thelan, told him he had no business on the field taking pictures, especially with a strobe. The fact he was a member of the working press made no difference. And he was ordered off the field.

I could see how Sheppard's coach might feel Kevin could get in the way of play. He couldn't have known Kevin has played the sport some 20

But the woman, with her complaint about the strobe flash was totally out of place. I couldn't help but wonder if she did, or would have done, the same same thing had a television camerman been in the same location.

Few people seem to understand that a strobe light duration lasts only 1/25,000th of a second, and therefore is not blinding like a flash bulb or tv camera light.

Unless one is looking absolutely directly into the flash, he is hardly, and often almost never, aware of the flash when it goes off.

I've been accused by opposing coaches at football games of having blinded receivers on passing plays. But I've conducted tests, as well as asked players after games, and without exception they've never known when the flash went off.

Additionally, I would hardly think the strobe's flash would be brighter than the sun over Kevin's shoulder.

Sports photographers for small newspapers have gotten some bum raps over the years. I'm thinking about a recent UIL ruling that we must be several feet off a football field sideline which, like the umpire's pushing Kevin back to the fence. would require a long-range camera to get action.

People apparently don't understand small newspapers are unable to afford expensive cameras. They also don't seem to understand we know our way around sporting events and can take care of ourselves. And we are also ready to accept the consequences when we don't.

I hope we can reach an understanding with the Sheppard people, and cover other games there without harrassment.

concerns requirements to be met by property owners outside the city limits when requesting water and/or sewer service, but not wishing to be

A request must be accompanied by . . a registered surveyor's plat indicating the plat of the area and its relationship to the City of Iowa park and showing all proposed water and sewer lines and their relative locations to existing water and sewer lines. Such plats must be accompanied by an engineer's letter giving a professional opinion on the capacity of the existing system to handle the proposed additions. Additionally the plat must show any dedicated streets, alleys, and/or easements and their relationship. . . with the city limits."

The fourth ordinance passed amends the employee ordinance, requiring of administrators to make written reports on work and progress of employees, which can be used for promotions merit pay and even as documentation when firings are necessary.

Tabled was a proposed ordinance calling for the abandonment of 20 feet of East Lafavette right of way on the south side. A required petition was not available.





School rejects offer from city on building

Holliday school board Monday night approved the resignation of a veteran teacher, hired a replacement, and declined an offer from the City of Holliday to construct an administrative building to include office space for both the city and school, in major action taken during the board's regular meeting for July.

Evelyn Timms, an 11-year teaching veteran in Holliday and former career ladder committee member, resigned her position with Holliday Schools to relocate with her husband near San Marcos, where she was raised. Board approved the resignation, and moved to hire Sherry Davis, subject to assignment.

Davis, a resident of the Holliday School District, formerly taught in Archer City. According to superintendent Dan Owen, the hiring completed the personnel requirements for the 1985-86 school year. CITY REQUESTS

A request from Holliday city administrator Gary Jones for the board to consider combining city and school administrative offices in a new building near the clinic was declined by trustees. The board dissapproved the move, which reportedly would have cost from \$60,000 to \$65,000, because of potential problems arising from two entities owning the same building.

A second proposal from Jones, for the board to arrive at a figure the school would charge to collect taxes for the city, was also considered. The

board approved a figure of \$300 per month to collect the taxes, if approved by the city council, or cameras, 16mm film projector, film

strip projector, two overhead projectors, and two audio-visual the career-ladder committee, picked from the entire faculty, to act in an advisory role, with the board itself considering nominations to the career-ladder program. In other business, the board approved the depository bank for 1985-86 school year, approved the spending of Chapter II Funds, discussed policy changes in the band policy and career-ladder policy.

First State Bank of Archer City was approved once again as the depositor for Holliday I.S.D., with other bids received from Parker Square Bank and InterFirst, both of Wichita Falls. Rusty Lindeman, representing First State Bank, was present at the board meeting to answer questions from trustees. Owen told the board, "I'd like to say we have been satisfied with the service they've given us in the past."

The board approved expenditures in Chapter II funds totalling \$5,000 for the 1985-86 school year. The funds, initially meant for remedial programs in the school system, can be spent in other areas due to a loophole in the program's requirements, Owen told the board. The money was approved for purchases of a video

A suit now pending against Larry Ledbetter, formerly of Ledbetter Enterprises, received the go-ahead nod from trustees during Monday's meeting. Owen gave a brief history of the school's problems with Ledbetter, who was contracted to place a sealant on the porous exterior walls of the high school in order or stop leakage, which failed. When it was apparent that the work done by Ledbetter would not work, he was approached concerning his full guarantee, and a second attempt was made to stop the leakage, which also failed.

Since that time, 'Owen said, Ledbetter declined an out-of-court settlement involving the payment of \$12,500 interest-free to the school. The suit now pending is asking for \$27,000, which is the amount appraised by a firm for the estimated cost to stop the leakage.

In considering policy changes in the band policy and career-ladder policy, the board agreed to return the proposed band policy book asking for revisions in the grading system to comply with state law, but also commending the new band director for the policy's overall concerns.

In the career-ladder policy, the board moved to have two teachers in

variety tests for 1984-85 for Wichita County. There were two different tests planted this year. One was located on Highway 287 and Rifle Range Road by Freddie Daume's on Nov. 18. The other test was planted on Oct. 18 on County Line Road by the Lalk Brothers from Electra.

The Lalk plot had 24 varieties and the Daume plot had 25 varieties. Twenty-three varieties were the same with the exception of triticale and elbon rye at the Daume plot and Durum wheat at the Lalk plot. In harvesting the plots, David and I

cut 13 foot length of row per variety and threshed these at Chillicothe and then took the data. However, we found it much easier to harvest the Lalk test as Gerald Hobson helped us with the aid of his combine with a 41/2 foot header. He cut 50 feet for this test.

The top variety at the Freddie Daume plot was Bounty 205, which yielded 57.6 bushels per acre. Golden Acres 5221 was a close second at 57.3 bushels per acre. In third place was the Pioneer 2157 with a yield of 52 bushels per acre.

The other top 10 yielders included Payne - 51-2 bushels, Bounty 201 -50.3, Lancota - 48.8, Bounty 202 - 47.6, Bounty 100 - 47.5, Chisolm - 45.6 and TAM 101 - 44.9 bushels.

A Bounty variety also topped the list at the Lalk demonstration plot
