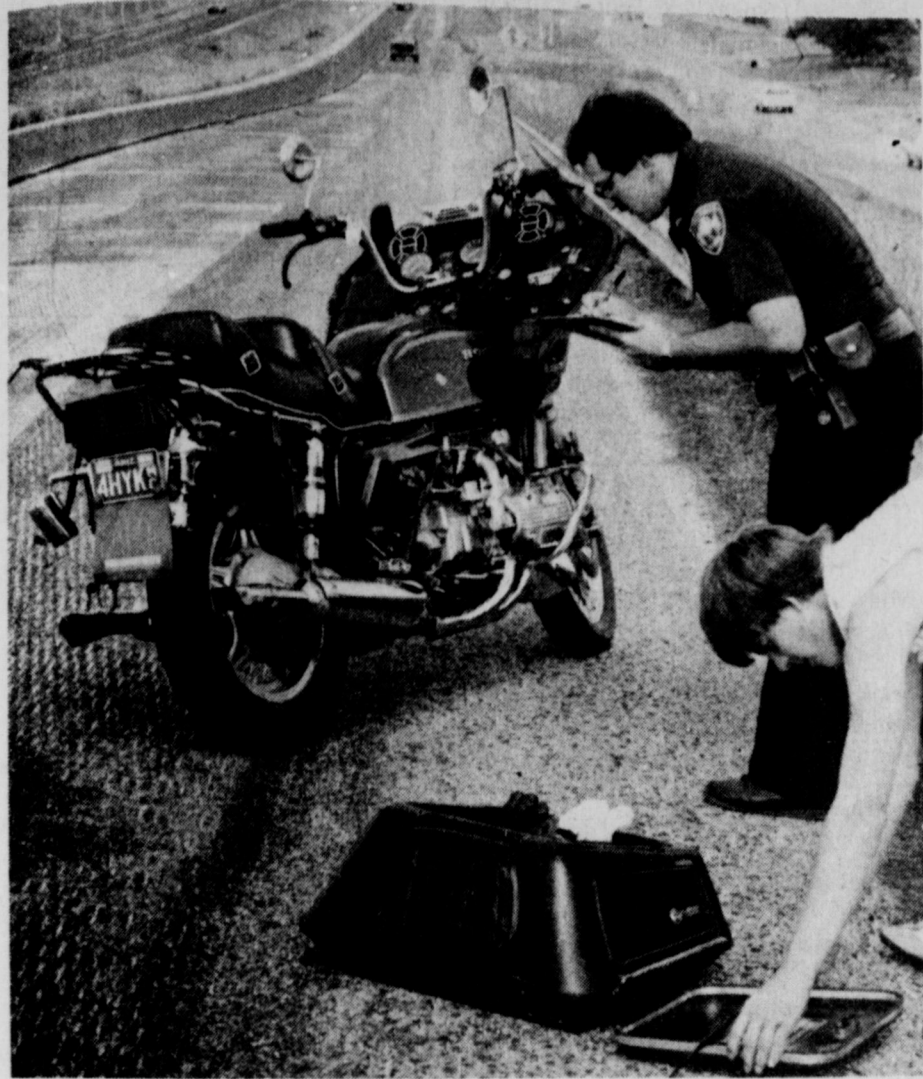

Rating is roadblock project

A project of upgrading water service in the south part of town has taken at least a temporary setback, according to a report made Monday night at the city council meeting.

Several months ago, Iowa Park filed application for a \$100,000 matching grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs, to help fund the project.

A similar application was filed last year, but Iowa Park did not receive high enough priority to be funded. This time, however, an expert in

working on such applications was hired to assist Administrator James Barrington. And it initially appeared successful.

Two weeks ago, the Regional Review Committee of the Nortex Regional Planning Commission reviewed applications, and Iowa Park was rated to receive full funding.

However, Barrington told the council, the same committee met last week "to correct" the ratings because of a "misunderstanding" on the part of the committee about the method of

awarding points. The result was a reduction in our points and in our relative position so that we are no longer in the group prioritized high enough for funding."

The council authorized Barrington to write a letter of appeal on the "reranking" in hopes of another reversible. The letter was delivered to Ed Daniel, executive director, and express mail to the Department of Community Affairs.

Barrington stated in the communication that he felt the committee

overlooked the fact that Iowa Park is proposing to upgrade and improve service rather than simply repair and replace.

With matching monies, the city intends to increase the eight-inch line along S. Wall to a 10-inch, and in other areas, such as East Cash and S. Wall, increase six-inch lines to eight-inch.

Additionally, valves are planned to be installed which would permit only small sections to be cut off from service while line breaks were being repaired. As it is now, half the city must suffer during repairs.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, aldermen gave their approval to four proposed ordinances.

One changes the zoning of the north half of Block 17, Texas Addition, from light industrial to R-2 residential.

Another makes an ordinance out of a resolution passed in 1978 in which developers are required to pay all costs of street openings and development.

The third ordinance adopted

Superintendent, board get better acquainted

In a called meeting Tuesday night, members of the school board met with new superintendent Glen Mitchell for a "get acquainted" session, as well as hiring a new teacher and hearing maintenance reports.

Mitchell, who officially took the reins of the school system July 1, replacing Harold Cowley, asked that the meeting be held so he could become better acquainted with trustees and learn their ideas of goals.

Other than monitoring a couple of board meetings while Cowley was still in office, Mitchell said he had met only a brief hour with trustees during his interview.

During the business session, the board accepted the resignation of Vocational Agriculture teacher Billy Johnson, and hired George Martin as his replacement.

Johnson has accepted a similar position with the Canyon school system, just south of Amarillo.

Martin, a nine-year veteran in education, will come here from Silverton, which is some 50 miles south of Canyon. Martin taught three years at Clarendon, one at McLean and the past five at Silverton, a school experiencing a rapid decline in enrollment.

Summer maintenance at the two school football stadiums was discussed.

Mitchell said new bleachers have been installed at the junior high field, but work must still be accomplished to replace wiring to the scoreboard and repairs are needed on the concession stand and restrooms. Also, additional lights moved from the high school stadium may be used to supplement existing lights.

At Hawk Stadium, dirt work and hydromulching on the east berm has been completed and crews are watering the area daily. Work has also begun for the underground drainage system, trustees were told.

A representative of the Zack Burkett firm looked at the condition report back in the near future on proposals to make temporary repairs.

Mitchell reported the loss of several commodity food items that spoiled when the refrigeration system at the high school cafeteria failed over the weekend.

He said the walk-in vault was checked and apparently working Friday, but Monday the failure was discovered.

The new superintendent asked that the August board meeting date be changed. He explained that the second Tuesday, which is the 13th, will be his 30th wedding anniversary, and the board voted to meet the 15th.

All Star teams show talents

Two of Iowa Park's three entries in the Little League All-Star Area Tournaments remain undefeated going into tonight's semi-final matchups, with the 13-year-old Senior League All-Stars waxing Burkburnett 16-7 at Burk, and the Senior League All-Stars nipping Sheppard 7-6 at Sheppard AFB in games played Tuesday night.

The Major League All-Stars from Iowa Park, meanwhile, lost to Burkburnett 8-7 Tuesday, after rallying in the final innings when trailing 6-0.

Burk pitcher Brad Owens went the distance against Iowa Park, but his bat was the telling difference in the game. Hitting two home runs, including a second inning grand slam, Owens ended the Iowa Park rally in the sixth inning with one out and the bases loaded, by fanning the next two batters.

Vance Edwards was the hot hitter for the Major League All-Stars, belting two home runs of his own, including a three-run homer. Pitcher Danny Tatom fanned 10 batters for Iowa Park.

The Major League All-Stars were to play Sheppard last night, with the winner playing Burk tonight at 7:30.

13-YEAR-OLDS
Jimmy Duggins and Jimmy Nicholson were both instrumental in wins in the 13-year-old Senior League All-Star tournament, with Duggins going the distance on the mound Tuesday night in a 16-7 win over host Burk. Nicholson, meanwhile, had a sizzling performance at the plate, going five-for-five with two triples, two doubles and a single. In Monday night's 11-1 win over Olney,

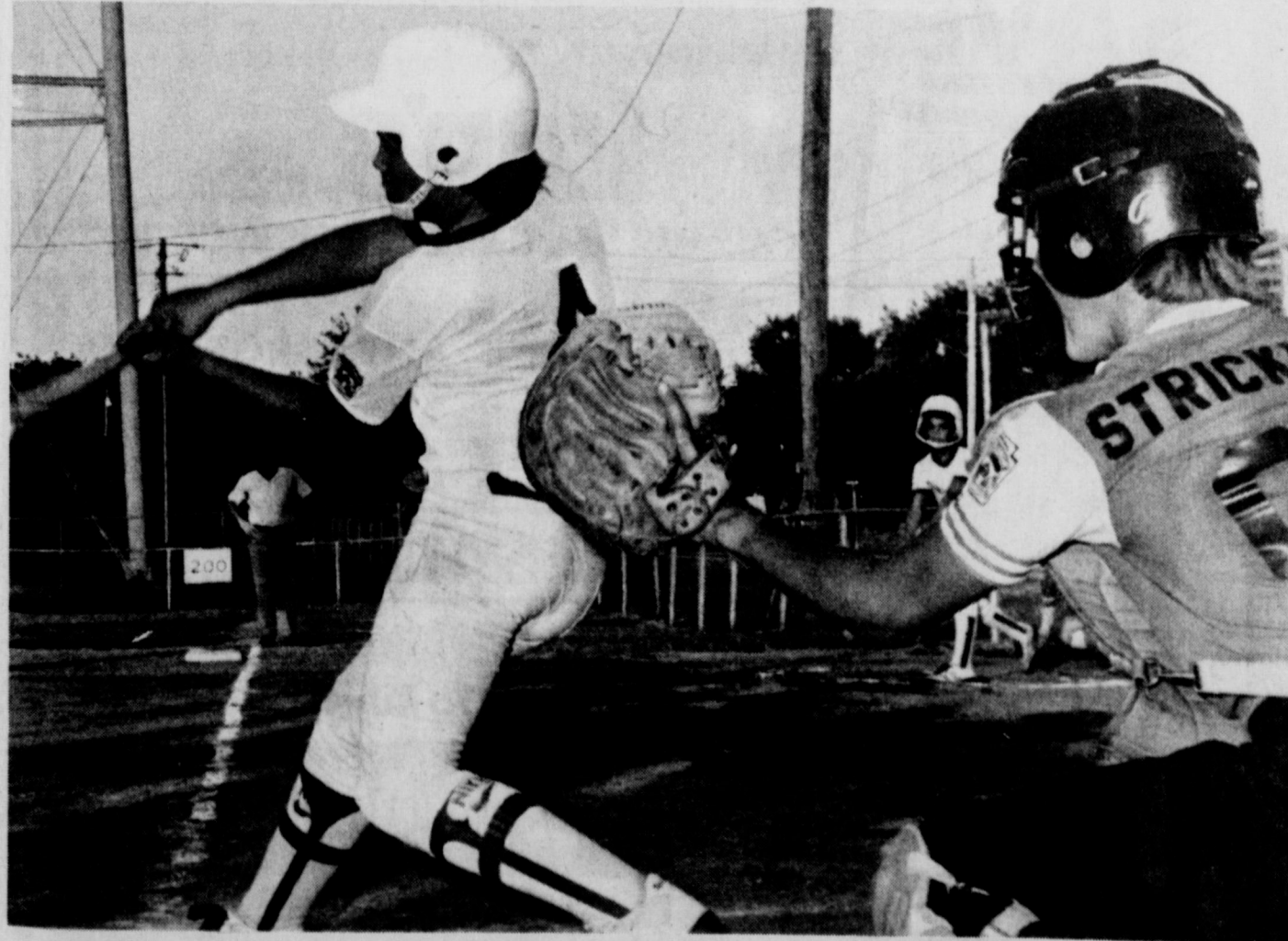
Nicholson pitched the entire game, fanning 15 Olney batters.

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As I See It....

Leader reporter/photographer Kevin Hamilton got his feet wet with an experience Tuesday night which has plagued me for years: a combination of misunderstanding and ignorance concerning strobe lights on cameras.

He was attempting to cover the Senior All Star game between Iowa Park and Sheppard, at the base, when he was first ordered far from action and then off the field.

The reason, he was using the electronic flash which, in the minds of at least two Sheppard people, would hinder play of the athletes.

Kevin had positioned himself near the first base coaching box where he still had some benefit from the sun to his back. He took one picture, and the Sheppard coach, according to Kevin, came flying out of the dugout and complaining to the umpire.

The umpire told Kevin he would have to back up to the fence, which he did.

But then a woman, identified as Toni Thelan, told him he had no business on the field taking pictures, especially with a strobe. The fact he was a member of the working press made no difference. And he was ordered off the field.

I could see how Sheppard's coach might feel Kevin could get in the way of play. He couldn't have known Kevin has played the sport some 20

years, and knows how to handle himself in such situations.

But the woman, with her complaint about the strobe flash was totally out of place. I couldn't help but wonder if she did, or would have done, the same same thing had a television cameraman been in the same location.

Few people seem to understand that a strobe light duration lasts only 1/25,000th of a second, and therefore is not blinding like a flash bulb or tv camera light.

Unless one is looking absolutely directly into the flash, he is hardly, and often almost never, aware of the flash when it goes off.

I've been accused by opposing coaches at football games of having blinded receivers on passing plays. But I've conducted tests, as well as asked players after games, and without exception they've never known when the flash went off.

concerns requirements to be met by property owners outside the city limits when requesting water and/or sewer service, but not wishing to be annexed.

A request must be accompanied by . . . a registered surveyor's plat indicating the plat of the area and its relationship to the City of Iowa park and showing all proposed water and sewer lines and their relative locations to existing water and sewer lines. Such plats must be accompanied by an engineer's letter giving a professional opinion on the capacity of the existing system to handle the proposed additions. Additionally the plat must show any dedicated streets, alleys, and/or easements and their relationship . . . with the city limits."

The fourth ordinance passed amends the employee ordinance, requiring of administrators to make written reports on work and progress of employees, which can be used for promotions merit pay and even as

documentation when firings are necessary.

Tabled was a proposed ordinance calling for the abandonment of 20 feet of East Lafayette right of way on the south side. A required petition was not available.

A proposed resolution which would have permitted Barrington to sign a change order for remodeling work on the Tom Burnett Memorial Library was tabled for more information.

Mayor Tim Hunter said "I'm not opposed to spending money, but I want to know what it's being spent on." He asked that an architect be present at the next meeting to explain the changes.

The council is to meet at 6:30 p.m. Monday at the library, where members can see renovation progress as well as those areas where the change order is requested.

Following the meeting there, the group will return to council chambers

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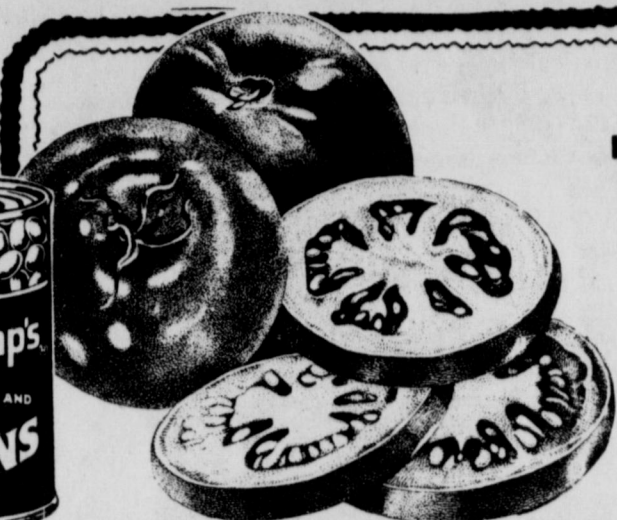
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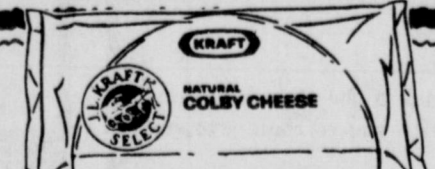
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School rejects offer from city on building

Holliday school board Monday night approved the resignation of a veteran teacher, hired a replacement, and declined an offer from the City of Holliday to construct an administrative building to include office space for both the city and school, in major action taken during the board's regular meeting for July.

Evelyn Timms, an 11-year teaching veteran in Holliday and former career ladder committee member, resigned her position with Holliday Schools to relocate with her husband near San Marcos, where she was raised. Board approved the resignation, and moved to hire Sherry Davis, subject to assignment.

Davis, a resident of the Holliday School District, formerly taught in Archer City. According to superintendent Dan Owen, the hiring completed the personnel requirements for the 1985-86 school year.

CITY REQUESTS

A request from Holliday city administrator Gary Jones for the board to consider combining city and school administrative offices in a new building near the clinic was declined by trustees. The board disapproved the move, which reportedly would have cost from \$60,000 to \$65,000, because of potential problems arising from two entities owning the same building.

A second proposal from Jones, for the board to arrive at a figure the school would charge to collect taxes for the city, was also considered. The

board approved a figure of \$300 per month to collect the taxes, if approved by the city council, or

The funds, initially meant for remedial programs in the school system, can be spent in other areas due to a loophole in the program's requirements, Owen told the board. The money was approved for purchases of a video

projectors.

A suit now pending against Larry Ledbetter, formerly of Ledbetter Enterprises, received the go-ahead nod from trustees during Monday's meeting. Owen gave a brief history of the school's problems with Ledbetter, who was contracted to place a sealant on the porous exterior walls of the high school in order to stop leakage, which failed. When it was apparent that the work done by Ledbetter would not work, he was approached concerning his full guarantee, and a second attempt was made to stop the leakage, which also failed.

Since that time, Owen said, Ledbetter declined an out-of-court settlement involving the payment of \$12,500 interest-free to the school. The suit now pending is asking for \$27,000, which is the amount appraised by a firm for the estimated cost to stop the leakage.

In considering policy changes in the band policy and career-ladder policy, the board agreed to return the proposed band policy book asking for revisions in the grading system to comply with state law, but also commending the new band director for the policy's overall concerns. In the career-ladder policy, the board moved to have two teachers in

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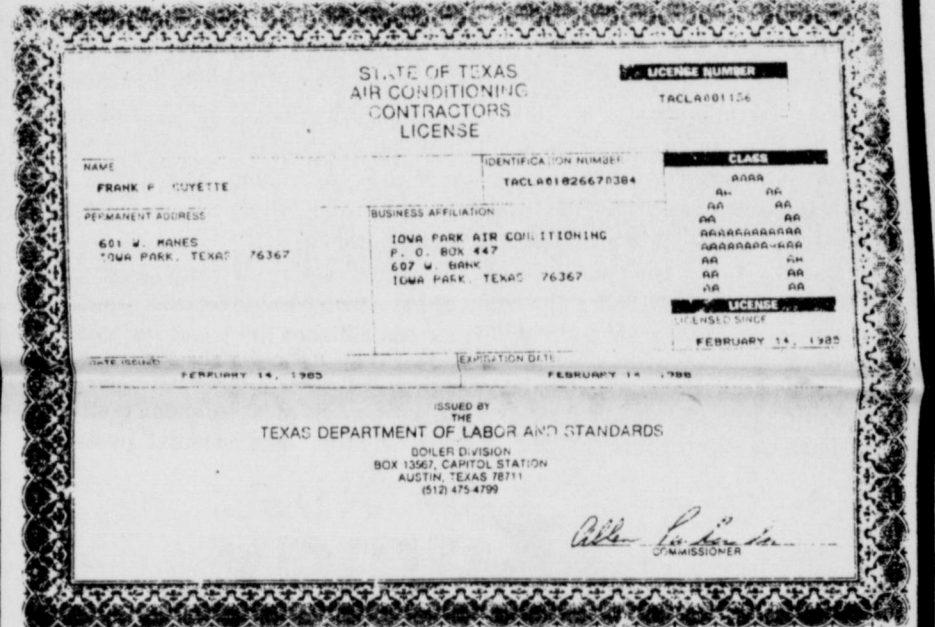

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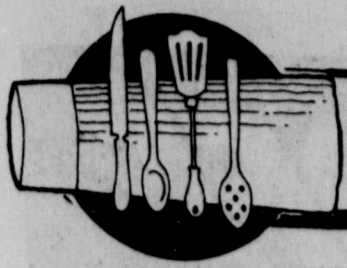
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Cook of the Week

Chess pies have been a favorite dessert of people for many years. They were originally called "chest" pies, perhaps because our grandmothers baked them, sometimes stacked them, then stored them in old fashioned chests until they were ready to serve them.

The name was eventually changed from chest to chess, but changing the name did not take away from the tastiness or popularity of the dessert, neither did the extra ingredients that have been added through the years to the original recipe.

Her recipes today sound like she must enjoy cooking - in fact, her husband celebrated his birthday Tuesday and she baked his birthday cake.

ITALIAN CREAM CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup oil
- 5 eggs, separated
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup coconut
- 1/2 tsp. butter flavoring
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Cream sugar, shortening and oil. Add egg yolks one at a time, beating after each addition. Stir soda into buttermilk. Add buttermilk alter-

nately with flour to batter. Fold in coconut. Beat egg whites and fold into mixture. Add flavorings. Pour into 3 greased and floured 9 in. pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Cool before icing.

Icing for Italian Cream Cake:

- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 - 1 lb. box confectioners sugar
- 1/2 cups chopped pecans
- 1/2 tsp. butter flavoring
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Cream cheese and margarine. Beat in sugar gradually. Add pecans and flavorings.

PINEAPPLE CHESS PIE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup butter
- 4 eggs
- 1 Tbls. flour
- 1 Tbls. cornmeal

1 can crushed pineapple, drained
Cream sugar and butter, beat until light and then add eggs. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well. Bake pie shell for 10 minutes at 400 degrees. Fill shell with filling and cook for another 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Then cook for 50 minutes at 300 degrees.

FROZEN YOGURT PIE

- 1 graham cracker crumb pie shell
- 1 to 1 1/2 cups yogurt (any flavor, suit to taste)
- About 1/2 large carton Cool Whip
- Fresh or frozen fruit as desired (strawberries are great!)

Simply mix well the yogurt and

cool whip. Pour filling into shell. Add fruit as you wish. Freeze. Serve only slightly thawed. May serve with Cool Whip added on top. Is great for the summer and is much lower in calories than ice cream!

CRUMBLY CHICKEN

- 1 frying chicken, cut in serving pieces
- 1 1/2 sticks melted butter
- 1 cup bread crumbs
- 1 cup parmesan cheese, grated

- Salt and pepper to taste

Dip each piece of chicken in melted butter. Mix together crumbs, cheese, garlic salt, salt and pepper. Roll chicken in mixture. Arrange in shallow baking dish and bake for 1 hour at 350 degrees.

CHICKEN ENCHILADA CASSEROLE

- 1 whole chicken
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can chopped green chilies, chopped
- 12 corn tortillas
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Boil chicken; bone. Saute onion and chiles in small amount of butter. Stir in the soups, broth and chicken, heat thoroughly. Layer chicken mixture and tortillas in an 8x12 dish, ending with chicken mixture. Sprinkle cheese over top. Bake at 350 degrees, 30-40 minutes.

PUNCH

- 1 large can of grape juice
- 1 small can of orange juice
- 1 small can of lemonade
- Mix all three adding half as much water as required for each can. Add water further to suit taste.

Wheat variety test results are reported

The results are in on the wheat variety tests for 1984-85 for Wichita County. There were two different tests planted this year. One was located on Highway 287 and Rifle Range Road by Freddie Daume's on Nov. 18. The other test was planted on Oct. 18 on County Line Road by the Lalk Brothers from Electra.

The Lalk plot had 24 varieties and the Daume plot had 25 varieties. Twenty-three varieties were the same with the exception of triticale and elbon rye at the Daume plot and Durum wheat at the Lalk plot.

In harvesting the plots, David and I cut 13 foot length of row per variety and threshed these at Chillicothe and then took the data. However, we found it much easier to harvest the Lalk test as Gerald Hobson helped us with the aid of his combine with a 4 1/2 foot header. He cut 50 feet for this test.

The top variety at the Freddie Daume plot was Bounty 205, which yielded 57.6 bushels per acre. Golden Acres 5221 was a close second at 57.3 bushels per acre. In third place was the Pioneer 2157 with a yield of 52 bushels per acre.

The other top 10 yielders included Payne - 51.2 bushels, Bounty 201 - 50.3, Lancota - 48.8, Bounty 202 - 47.8, Bounty 100 - 47.5, Chisolm - 45.6 and TAM 101 - 44.9 bushels.

A Bounty variety also topped the list at the Lalk demonstration plot

but this time it was Bounty 201. It yielded 52.8 bushels per acre. Bounty 202 and 100 tied for second place each, yielding 50 bushels per acre.

The other top 10 yielders were Payne - 48.2 bushels, Pioneer 2157 - 47.6, Wrangler - 46.6, Chisolm - 45.3, Mustang - 43.6, Sturdy - 40.3 and Golden Acres - 5221 - 39.7 bushels.

Across the Rolling Plains, the top 10 yielding varieties were Bounty 202, Bounty 201, Bounty 100, Payne, Pioneer 2157, Bounty 205, Chisolm, Mustang, Golden Acres 5221 and Wrangler.

Wheat producers should be reminded that these are only a one-year test, and more data should be obtained before planting one particular variety.

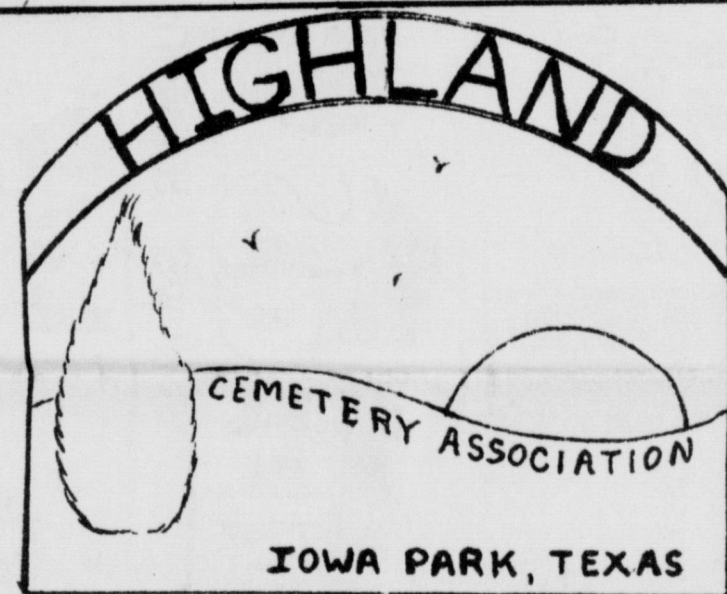
