School trustees slate called meeting Friday

School trustees will be focusing their attention at a called meeting tomorrow evening on the budget for the coming year, as well as personnel, improvements at the two football stadiums, personnel, and a possible major change in scheduling of kindergarten classes.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Members are to see preliminary budget figures for the 1985-86 school year, and review a schedule for adopting the budget and setting the tax rate.

Scoreboards at both football stadiums are on Friday's agenda. Trustees are to accept or reject bid specifications for a new scoreboard at Hawk Stadium, and act on recommendations to upgrade the junior high's scoreboard.

Also on the agenda, trustees are to consider recommendations for upgrading the lighting at the junior high field, and consider replacing the concrete bleacher seats in the reserved section at Hawk Stadium with aluminum seats.

Under personnel, board members are to be asked to accept resignations of some teachers, including high school science teacher Wilbert Wynn, and hire new personnel.

Three items on the agenda concern kindergarten and the effects of recent state school board rulings.


A ruling was received recently from the appointed state board that kindergarten class scheduling must be changed from that which has been observed locally. Instead of all-day, half-year scheduling, the state board

now says classes must be either half-day all-year or all-day all-year.

An appeal has been made to state to permit present scheduling, due to the lateness of the ruling. Additional classrooms would have to be constructed to have students attend all-day all-year, and other schedules changed if the half-day all-year must be implemented.

Supt. Glen Mitchell is to report on both the required change and status of the appeal.

Also to be reported is the enrollment response to the pre-kindergarten class, as well as a review of current and future classroom needs. Trustees have already been looking at additional classroom needs at the Kidwell campus, which will be needed to meet the state-required Teacherpupil ratio.





bring good, bad news

Certified tax rolls have been provided Iowa Park city and school governing bodies for computing their tax rates for the coming year, and it's one of those "good news, bad news" situations.

The appraised values are up for the city, which could possibly forestall a rate increase, depending on what needs the council feels are necessary to operate the coming year.

But at a time when school costs are escalating, primarily due to House Bill 72, the school district's tax values have fallen.

Led by a decrease in oil values of almost \$6-million, the school district's values have dropped some \$9-million, to \$244,182,187.

A review of recent school district appraisal values includes:

1985 -- \$244,182,187 1984 - \$253,146,379

1983 - \$259,573,276

Besides the major decrease in oil values of the school district, personal property dropped by \$2.26-million, and real property values were lowered by \$750,000.

The plan calls for the asphalt paving to be removed and replaced with concrete, which should be poured Aug. 15. The additional time is to allow for curing.


RESURFACING Resurfacing of numerous asphalt

She expressed her feeling about her work in these words: "I feel that being a volunteer has been very





The room plan was judged on originality, furniture arrangement, selection of furnishings, selection of interior finishes and surfaces, color schemes, layout, neatness, proper use



finish in second place behind champion Arlington.

Coach Jimmy Duggins said Tuesday that the locals were without the pitching corps of other teams, playing four games in three days.

All-stars win tourney

A local all-star team consisting of nine and ten-year-old boys captured the championship trophy in a recent tournament at Sheppard AFB. remaining undefeated throughout the tourney.

Teams from Iowa Park, Olney, Sheppard, Burkburnett, Tri-County, Notre Dame, Fowler Elementary and Fain Elementary Schools competed, with the tournament lasting five davs.

Wearing the local Astros team jerseys of blue and grav, with gray hats with an "IP" insignia, the Iowa Park representatives won their first game over Olney 11-10 the first day of the tournament, then blasted Notre Dame 16-5 the following night.

From there, the locals drew a bye in the third round, then met Fowler Elementary, winning 3-2. On Saturday, July 27, Iowa Park defeated host Sheppard AFB 13-12, coming from behind with a furious rally after trailing at one point 11-2. Coached by Ralph Dillard, Pat Kennedy and Billy McNealy, the team consisted of Ken Cooper, Chuck Bullock, Jason Dudley, Tony Lozapone, Brent Brown, Ralph Dillard, Timothy Denton, Chad Thompson, Jason Miller, Scott McNeely, and Greg Kasparek.

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"We had Jimmy Duggins and Jimmy Nicholson pitching well for us, but we didn't have the depth needed to compete against teams like Carrollton and Arlington, which have many times the players to pick from for an all-star team," Duggins said.

In addition, the officials at the tournament apparently felt Nicholson's method of pitching was a bit too unorthodox, calling the local standout for balking six times, and two illegal pitches, all in the first two innings in the first game against Carrollton at Carrollton. The host team prevailed 7-2. Local slugger Dewayne Parks hit a two-run homer for the only Iowa Park score.

In Iowa Park's second game, the all-stars defeated Childress 5-2 behind the pitching of starter Mark Cruz and relief from Jimmy Duggins in the second inning. Meanwhile, Carrollton had lost to Arlington, setting up a rematch against Iowa Park and the host team.

Iowa Park avenged the loss with a 7-3 win in what Duggins says is the best game the locals played in the

tournament. Nicholson was the winning pitcher, with Bruce Palmer and Parks making great defensive plays. Palmer made a diving catch at the fence with the bases loaded in the final inning of the game to squelch a Carrollton rally.

In the fourth and final game for the locals, Arlington prevailed 15-4. although the score was tied 2-2 until the middle of the fifth inning. Tim Grieve, son of Texas Rangers general manager Tom Grieve, was a standout for the Arlington team, Duggins said.

"We did real well, considering the depth and talent of the Arlington team," Duggins commented.

In comparing the quality of the teams in the tournament, Duggins mentioned that Iowa Park took all 13-year-olds in the senior league. totalling 14 players, while Carrollton had seven 13-year-old teams to pick from. Arlington had even more.

"On behalf of the officers for the 1985 Little League in Iowa Park, we want to thank all the local merchants for their support," Duggins said. "Without them, this all would have been impossible.

Season tickets for present ticketholders will remain on an option


basis until Sept. 3, when all tickets will then go on sale on a first-come, first-serve basis.




