School trustees slate called meeting Friday

School trustees will be focusing their attention at a called meeting tomorrow evening on the budget for the coming year, as well as personnel, improvements at the two football stadiums, personnel, and a possible major change in scheduling of kindergarten classes.

The meeting is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Members are to see preliminary budget figures for the 1985-86 school year, and review a schedule for adopting the budget and setting the tax rate.

Scoreboards at both football stadiums are on Friday's agenda. Trustees are to accept or reject bid specifications for a new scoreboard at Hawk Stadium, and act on recommendations to upgrade the junior high's scoreboard.

Also on the agenda, trustees are to consider recommendations for upgrading the lighting at the junior high field, and consider replacing the concrete bleacher seats in the reserved section at Hawk Stadium with aluminum seats.

Under personnel, board members are to be asked to accept resignations of some teachers, including high school science teacher Wilbert Wynn, and hire new personnel.

Three items on the agenda concern kindergarten and the effects of recent state school board rulings.

A ruling was received recently from the appointed state board that kindergarten class scheduling must be changed from that which has been observed locally. Instead of all-day, half-year scheduling, the state board

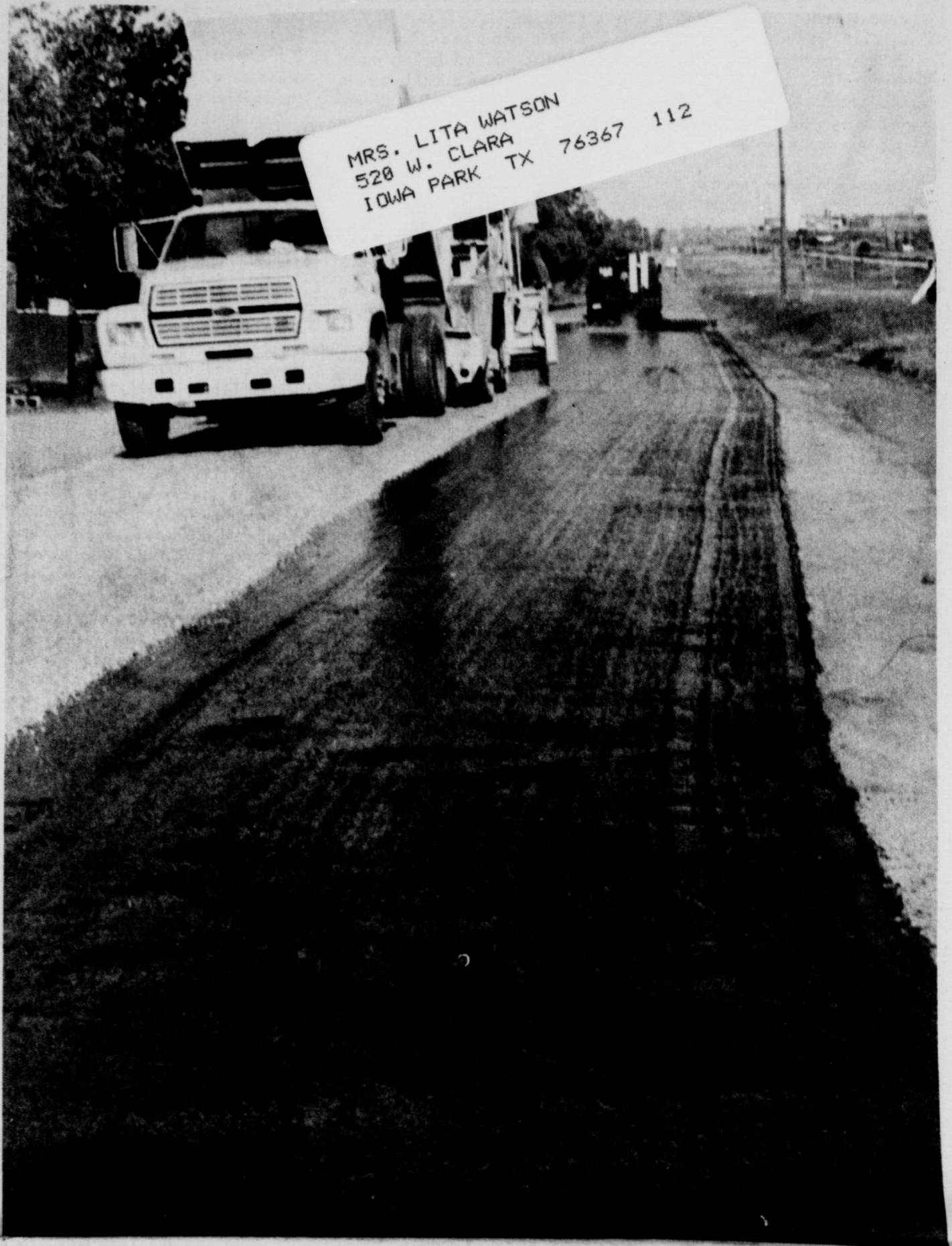
now says classes must be either half-day all-year or all-day all-year.

An appeal has been made to state to permit present scheduling, due to the lateness of the ruling. Additional classrooms would have to be constructed to have students attend all-day all-year, and other schedules changed if the half-day all-year must be implemented.

Supt. Glen Mitchell is to report on both the required change and status of the appeal.

Also to be reported is the enrollment response to the pre-kindergarten class, as well as a review of current and future classroom needs.

Trustees have already been looking at additional classroom needs at the Kidwell campus, which will be needed to meet the state-required Teacher-pupil ratio.

Certified tax rolls bring good, bad news

Certified tax rolls have been provided Iowa Park city and school governing bodies for computing their tax rates for the coming year, and it's one of those "good news, bad news" situations.

The appraised values are up for the city, which could possibly forestall a rate increase, depending on what needs the council feels are necessary to operate the coming year.

But at a time when school costs are escalating, primarily due to House Bill 72, the school district's tax values have fallen.

Led by a decrease in oil values of almost \$6-million, the school district's values have dropped some \$9-million, to \$244,182,187.

A review of recent school district appraisal values includes:
1985 - \$244,182,187
1984 - \$253,146,379
1983 - \$259,573,276

Besides the major decrease in oil values of the school district, personal property dropped by \$2.26-million, and real property values were lowered by \$750,000.

A review of recent city appraisal values includes:
1985 - \$91,033,908
1984 - \$89,400,596
1983 - \$84,036,788

Real property values were increased this year in the city by

almost \$4-million, from \$73.7-million to \$77.5-million. Real property values in 1983 were \$68.3-million.

Meanwhile, personal property values decreased \$2.1-million, from \$15,419,362 in 1984 to \$13,300,363, in the city.

Street work is underway

Traffic in the 800 block of Van Horn will be closed Aug. 12 and reopen Aug. 20, weather permitting, for the pavement to be reconstructed, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

After a meeting with contractors, it was decided to close off the street throughout the entire process. Residents of the block will park either in the alley or on Third and Fourth streets.

The plan calls for the asphalt paving to be removed and replaced with concrete, which should be poured Aug. 15. The additional time is to allow for curing.

Iowa Parkan to teach on island of Samoa

Eleanor Bell, a four-year volunteer member of the Mission Service Corps of the Home Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention, will leave Dallas Aug. 16th enroute to America Samoa for a year's assignment as a third grade teacher at a school a few miles out of Pago Pago.

In Hawaii, she will be joined by five more teachers, a principal, and possibly a nurse and a cook, all from the United States, who will be working with her as volunteers. The Home Mission Board will pay their fare from Hawaii to America Somoa,

but, after that, they will bear their own expenses.

Mrs. Bell, who was an elementary school teacher in Iowa Park 15 years, was graduated from a high school in Houston. She received a B.A. degree from Rice Univ. and has done graduate work on Guam where she taught eight years, and Midwestern State Univ. She did her first teaching at Saw Pit, Colo.

Her first appointment with the Mission Service Corps was in 1981 at a women's shelter in Tulsa, Okla. Her second appointment was at the Women's Crisis Center in Atlanta,

Ga. During the past year, she has done volunteer work at the First Baptist Church in Iowa Park, helping Bob Stewart, minister of youth and activities, with his newsletters and in the children's church.

During the year, she has also taught English as a second language for International Friends, sponsored by the First Baptist Church in Wichita Falls, and served as a counselor at Inter-Faith Ministries.

Since she became a member of the Mission Service Corps, she has patiently waited for an opportunity to serve outside the U.S. In May, she heard of the possibility of her doing volunteer teaching in America Samoa, and when her appointment was confirmed in July she felt that it was an answer to prayer. She has already been to Atlanta, Ga. for a period of orientation.

"Ellie," as she is affectionately called by many, said she felt the experience she got from teaching English as a second language when she was on Guam, will be very beneficial to her in the new assignment. "I am excited and looking forward to a very rewarding year," she said.

During the morning worship service at First Baptist Church Sunday, Mrs. Bell was presented with a certificate of appreciation from the church by Rusty Stowe, minister of music. Following the service, she was the guest of honor at a covered-dish meal hosted by Adults V and VI Sunday School departments. Some of the classes presented her with a monetary gift to buy school supplies.

When Mrs. Bell says goodbye to her host of friends in Iowa Park and relatives at Henrietta, she will also be leaving her four children Chris and Gerry Lington of Houston, Evin Lington of Davenport, Iowa, and Marilyn Birzer of Harper, Kansas, and eight grandchildren.

She expressed her feeling about her work in these words: "I feel that being a volunteer has been very

rewarding and that all Christian service is volunteered, even paid staff having a volunteered portion. God has surely blessed me with an extra measure of time to share His love and forgiveness to all through Jesus, His Son. I have found that my work endeavors are easy when the Holy Spirit is in control."

As I See It....

Has the recent heat spell bothered you as much as it has me?

It just goes to show you how spoiled we can become in such a short period.

What have we had so far this summer, six days of 100 degrees or higher? We've usually had that many by the end of May, or even sooner!

Of course, every time the hot weather sets in, we hear talk at the coffee places about how someone's air conditioner in their home or car has gone out. And without exception, the question is posed, "What did we do before we had air conditioning?"

Well, for one thing, we slept out on the porch or in the yard, in order to catch whatever breeze there might be.

That always presented a problem, though, for those who lived in town. It was awkward, if you didn't get up before sunrise, trying to slip on some clothes while huddled under a sheet. No one wanted to offend his neighbors.

Some people might wonder why this demonstration of modesty was necessary, considering many people today can walk around in their back yards dressed in their birthday suits.

But they apparently are young enough not to realize that no one had privacy fences in those days. Privacy fencing didn't come along until the 1960s.

Thinking back, there wasn't a fence in all of Hereford, when I was a youngster, unless it was to contain chickens or milk cows.

Neither was there an air conditioner, except for the big "swamp cooler" at the theater.

And as far as air conditioning of automobiles went, we had a bunch of them. We had the window on the driver's side, the one in the passenger's side, and the back windows if they worked, and if we drove some of the earlier model cars, even the front window served as an air conditioner. Some folks had air conditioners on their cars in the late 1940s. They were evaporative units that turned by force of the wind while they were moving, and attached to the car door's window.

While they beat nothing, they were hard on a woman's hairdo, if mounted right beside her head.

While I appreciate the youthful age I had in those days, don't try to give me "The good old days." I'll run and hide.

And speaking of time, congratulations to Louis Sefcik, who is beginning his 30th year of business in Iowa Park. That's Louis' Jewelry, in case you miss the name.

Do you realize that Luther Shaw

(Shaw Motor Co.) is the only retail business older than Louis', still operating under the same ownership, in Iowa Park?

Cook of the Week

The spring and summer months in the United States afford an opportunity for people to enjoy vegetables to the fullest. Many people have their own gardens and others plant and cultivate them to market.

The vegetables not only have health-giving minerals and vitamins but add a bright note to meals, with the gold of the carrot, the refreshing green of peas and beans, the rich red of tomatoes and beets, etc. People have learned to cook, freeze, and can them so that they will keep their bright colors.

A suggestion of how English peas can add refreshing color to a meal is noted in Mrs. Steve Gray's Sweet Pea Salad recipe for this week. William Wallace Irwin said in The Garrulous Gourmet "There is nothing so innocent, so confiding in its expression as the small green face of the freshly-shelled spring pea."

It is said that peas of some kind are so ancient that the original ancestor and place of origin are unknown. Pierre Martyr said that Christopher Columbus planted peas in 1403 on Isabella Island. The Indians were growing them in Florida in 1602 and the first peas were planted in New England that year. By 1620, there were some planted in the governor's garden at Plymouth. These were described by Rev. Francis Higginson as "a store of green peas and as good as I ever ate in England."

The pea was one of Thomas Jefferson's favorite vegetables and he planted 30 varieties of them. The English pea is one of the earliest vegetables planted by gardeners in this area because it can withstand the cold better than many other vegetables.

2 cans English peas
2 hard-boiled eggs
Grated sharp cheese
Onion, diced to taste

Ask your doctor to call your prescriptions to

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Sweet pickle to taste
3 T diced pimiento
2 T Miracle Whip salad dressing
2 lids vinegar
2-3 T sugar
Salt and pepper to taste
Thoroughly mix all ingredients and the salad is ready to serve.

BARBECUED BEEF BRISKET

5 to 6 lbs. beef brisket
2 ozs. liquid smoke
1 bottle barbecue sauce (Hickory with onions)
Celery salt
Garlic salt
Meat tenderizer
Salt and pepper
1/4 to 1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce
The night before pour smoke over brisket and turn on all sides, sprinkle sauces on except salt and pepper; then wrap up tight in foil and refrigerate overnight. Next morning sprinkle both sides with salt and pepper and Worcestershire sauce; bake covered in 9x13 pan 5 hours at 275 degrees. Uncover and pour over 1/2 bottle barbecue sauce and bake one hour longer.

EASY SHERBET DESSERT

1 carton pineapple sherbet
4-5 sliced bananas
1 pkg. (12 oz.) blackberries or raspberries
Sliced almonds, if desired
Combine all ingredients. Will store in refrigerator until needed.

CINNAMON ROLLS

In dish, blend 1 cup warm water

and 2 pkgs. yeast, don't stir, blend:
2 eggs
1/2 cup margarine
1/2 cup sugar
2 t salt
1 cup milk
Work in 7-8 cups flour, then add yeast mixture.

Let yeast rise in warm water while mixing other ingredients, then add. Let rise double, punch down and roll out flat.

Topping for 1/2 dough: cinnamon, sugar and stick butter or margarine. Roll and cut, let rise 1 hour. Bake about 8 minutes at 400 degrees.

Ice with powdered sugar mixed with milk until spreading consistency desired, when taken from the oven.

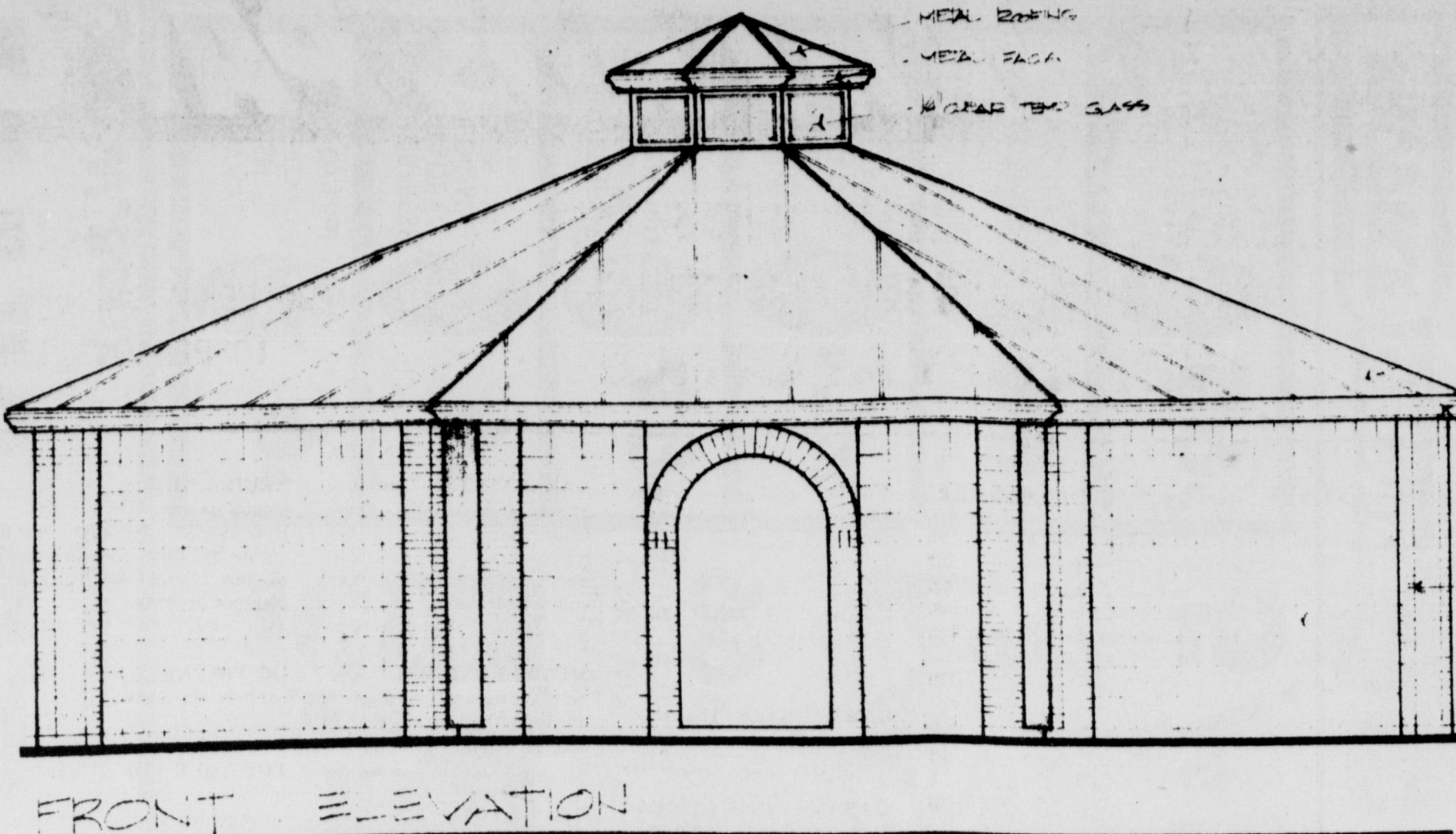

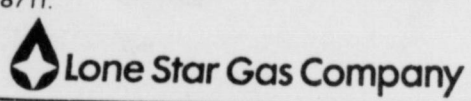
