Trustees frustrated over higher budget

School trustees met four hours in a called meeting Monday, going over hudget proposals for 1985-86 with the superintendent, principals and denartment heads, and wound up

cutting just under \$6,000 from a \$5.6-million budget.

It was their second look at the budget, and the outlook appears to be an increase of at least 33 percent in taxes, and still have a hefty deficit. In fact, the budget trustees looked at Monday was \$544,409 higher than the first draft they saw the previous week. Half a million dollars was added for construction of classrooms

dated teacher/pupil ratio of 1/22, and additional utility expenses. What has the heads of the trustees whirling is the fact that if they increase the tax rate from 53-cents to 71-cents, an increase of 33.96 percent. the school will still cut into its

anticipated \$1.4-million surplus by a

at Kidwell, to meet the state-man-

whopping \$798,140. By cutting that much into the surplus, the anticipated carryover at the end of the next fiscal year would be \$621,860. Supt. Glen Mitchell, agreeing with former Supt. Harold Cowley, says the district needs \$1-million to safely start school in the fall, without having to borrow money.

In addition, it was pointed out, that the surplus funds being held in an interest-bearing account, contributed the equivalent of four cents on the tax rate. In other words, without the revenue from the surplus, this year's rate would have been 62-cents, instead of 53-cents.

According to Mitchell's figures, in order to retain a \$1.2-million carry over, the tax rate for next year would have to be 96-cents, or 88-cents to retain a \$1-million carry over.

And with the loss of the interest earned by the surplus, the tax rate would have to be increased for 1986-87 to meet the built-in cost increases, as well as making up for the revenue lost from interest.

Supt. Mitchell told the board that if the tax rate was set at 71-cents, taxes on a home valued at \$50,000 would

increase \$90, from \$265 to \$355. He also said an 88-cent rate would increase that same home's taxes by

\$175, or at 96-cents by \$215. Broken down, the \$5,616,597 expenses would be as follows: \$3,430,761, payroll; \$648,662, pur-\$507,366, supplies and materials; \$131,209, other operating expenses; \$190,002, debt service; and \$708,597, capital outlay.

During discussions on the budget, trustees often referred to the

possibility of "fat" being built into the figures. Two board members, Rusty Rusk and Ray Hicks, both said they wouldn't be able to recognize the fat in the figures, and said they have to rely on the administrators to keep costs cut as closely as possible.

Responding, Supt. Mitchell told his principals that any savings experienced during the year should be reported to him so those cuts could be reflected in the following budget.

It was also pointed out that monies not expended in one area of the budget should not be moved to another area, and expended just so a zero balance could be reported.

The result of the board's study of the budget resulted in cutting of five personal computers and four tables, a cost estimated at \$5.950.

Four computers and the tables were proposed for the high school math department. The other computer was requested for Kidwell Elementary.

Numerous areas of cost increases in the budget were quizzed by trustees, but in almost every case the principal or department head appeared to have justified the need.

The salaries budget of \$3.4-million, which represents 61 percent of the

total budget, appears to be one destined to increase annually, because of House Bill 72 setting annual teacher salary increases at \$1,400. This does not include the career ladder figure.

Additionally, the capital outlay budget, 12 percent of the proposed budget and second largest of the six budget categories, could possibly be a continued growth area, in order to meet the teacher/pupil ratio dictated by the reform bill.

Trustees are to meet tonight to set Aug. 27 for a public hearing on the proposed tax rate, and then set Sept. 3 for a public meeting to vote on the

Kindergarten classes changed to all-year

Kindergarten classes at Kidwell Elementary will be half-day, all-year, instead of all-day half-year, according to Ron Woods, principal.

The change was made due to an 11th-hour decision by the state school board, followed by a denial of a waiver sought by the local administration.

Classes are to commence Sept. 3. The younger students, as determined by birth dates, will attend class from 8:15 to 11:15 in the mornings. Older student classes will begin at 12-noon and dismiss at 3 p.m.

For those students who qualify, bus transportation will be provided, but only on a one-way basis because buses will not run during the mid-day. Parents must provide transportation when the buses do not run.

Morning class students who qualify will be transported to school by buses and afternoon students who qualify will also be transported by buses. But morning students must be picked up by parents, or designated adults, and afternoon students must be taken to school the same way.

"The morning students must be picked up promptly at dismissal time, as we do not have space or personnel to accomodate students after their dismissal time," Woods wrote in his letter to parents.

PRE-SCREENING

Parents who plan to enroll their children in kindergarten, but who have not had their children pre-screened, should contact Woods by calling 592-4322 for an appointment.

Pre-screening for these students will be held next Wednesday. Those who make appointments

must accompany their child, and have with them the child's birth certificate and shot record.

Any parent of kindergarten children who has not received a letter from the Kidwell principal by Monday should contact his office.

Because of space limitations at Kidwell, the administration had planned to continue its schedule for kindergarten this year of all-day,

The 40th anniversary of dropping the atomic bomb on Japan has really given meat to the do-gooders of our national television networks.

While some say all the interviews, the replays of films, the medical reports, etc. are to call attention to the threat of future nuclear war, I feel like others that the intent is to create a guilt complex for having used the bomb.

Almost without exception, when members of that bomber crew was interviewed, they were asked about their moral thoughts for having dropped the bomb.

The two atomic bombs that we dropped on Japan in 1945 were the right thing at the right time against the right enemy.

In all the interviews, nothing was mentioned about all our unsuspecting military personnel, as well as all the civilians, who died in the bombing of Pearl Harbour.

Not one mention was ever made about the thousands of deaths that took place during the Death March. None of those tv personalities

bothered to ask the American prisoners who were working at forced labor, starving, sick and freezing, in the mines of Japan what they thought about whether we were right or not to wipe out Hiroshima.

Apparently, one must have been living during that terrible war, or be

a student of its history, to know how right that bombing was.

It's fine to second guess. . . as long as you're living in a free nation.







PREGNANCY CAUTIONS

To reduce the risk of acquiring the parasitic disease toxoplasmosis, pregnant women should avoid cleaning up their cat's litter or eating undercooked meat, according to the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

Toxoplasmosis, if acquired during pregnancy, could cause spontaneous abortion, stillbirth, or birth defects.

Cats' feces and spoiled meat are common sites where the parasites are found. As a preventive measure, pregnant women should wash their hands after handling raw meat, eat only well-cooked meat, and should get someone else in the family to clean the litter box.

"Motorists have had a summer vacation of sorts, too, and are not accustomed to seeing the school buses pulling onto the highways or stopping to let school children on and off."

The driver shall not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or the bus driver signals to proceed. This does not apply when the driver and the school bus are on separate roadways and where pedestrians are not allowed to cross the roadways.

There are 38 school districts plus a number of private and parochial schools operating buses in the nine-county area of District Three of the department, many of which travel rural highways as well as city streets.

In an effort to increase school bus safety, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation sponsors special schools for bus drivers and even for student riders. A typical region trains upward of 215 drivers in safe bus driving operations each year. Last year, statewide, some 810 drivers and 70,000 students underwent safe bus procedures training.

And the training is paying off. "When you consider that school buses traveled more than threemillion miles in Texas last year and there were only eleven fatalities, the record is pretty good," Stacks said. "At the same time, the number of accidents is on the rise, primarily as the result of having more vehicles of all types on the highways."

"That is why it is so important that Texas motorists become aware that

the school buses are about to return to the highways, and that they know the rules about stopping. Perhaps, with the motorists' cooperation and a little luck, we may reduce the fatality figure to zero for this year," Stacks



Hot weather takes toll of pecans

By DAVID FINLEY

County Agent People who were looking for hot weather have certainly found it. It is so hot the butter is melting in the refrigerator! With hot weather comes problems for trees, shrubs and plants, and some around here have really got problems.

I would like to examine a few points on heat stress and how it affects plants. First, is the pecan tree. Most an excellent crop. However, some are to experience some problems with dropping green

In talking with M.F. Ladnier of Wichita Falls, the problem hasn't hit him yet but it could. Ladnier lives in the old Wichita Gardens and has several pecan trees. His varieties include Burkett, Western Schley and Comanche. He is watering his orchard heavily, and that is the key to holding pecans on the tree in this type of

A lot of water applied slowly is the best way to keep the tree healthy. As the soil becomes dry, the tree will shed its fruit to protect itself. The leaves will also turn yellow to brown and then completely die.

Many times scorch or stress on leaves can't be prevented no matter what is done. What happens is that hot, blowing winds remove moisture from the leaves faster than the roots can put it up in them. This causes the margins of the leaves to turn brown. As this condition progresses, the entire leaf will turn brown and fall off.

Hot, dry weather also causes leaf drop on our shallower rooted trees like mimosa, cottonwood and fruitless mulberry. Since most of the feeder roots of these trees are close to the

Lawns are showing severe stess as well. Bermudagrass will begin to turn blueish in color and will show footprints when it is too dry.

Some lawns have "hot spots" in them that are showing up now. These are usually circular and turn whitish in color. Areas such as this need materials like gypsum or Cal-Sul applied to them. In most cases, the soil is much tighter in these areas,

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
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



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Locals have interests in Texas Ranch Roundup

Iowa Parkans can get fully involved in this weekend's Texas Ranch Roundup, to be held at the rodeo grounds on FM 369, because some of their own are competing in the popular two-day event.

Cowboys from the Burnett Ranches, the Triangle and 6666, will be matched up with representatives of 11 other of the largest and most legendary ranches in the state, competing at 7:30 p.m. both Friday and Saturday evenings.

Activities will include special roundup competition between the ranch cowboys, a ranch foods cookoff, a ranch first lady contest, talent competition, and special country music entertainment.

Proceeds from the event will benefit the North Texas Rehabilitation Center and three state charities. Cowboy competition will include saddle bronc riding, team roping, team branding, wild cow milking, team penning, wild horse race, jackpot roping and barrel racing.

Contestants and alternates must be full-time employees of their ranches and must have been employed for a minimum of six months. They must use their own horses or one belonging to the ranch. Admission either night will be \$4 for general admission, \$9 for reserved seats, and \$5 per person

for the dance. Saturday afternoon events will be \$3 for adults and \$1 for children.

Tomorrow's schedule calls for competition to begin at 7:30 p.m., followed at 9 by the dance.

Jackpot roping will be held from 8 to 11 a.m. Saturday, barrel racing from 11 to noon, cooking contest from noon to 2 p.m., talent contest at 2, first lady at 3, competition at 7:30, dance at 9 and awards presentation at 10:30.

FOUR SIXES AND TRIANGLE [BURNETT RANCHES]

The Four Sixes and Triangle camps of the Burnett Ranches are known as much for their legends as they are for their historical contribution to Texas ranching.

Legend has it that ranch founder Capt. Samuel Burk Burnett won his initial property with a poker hand of four sixes, hence the name, "Four Sixes." Actually, sometime in the early 1870s, Burnett purchased a small herd of cattle already with four sixes and then decided to extend the brand to the ranch name.

"Capt. Burk," as he was fondly called, turned his initial investment into one of the largest cattle empires in Texas. His herds grazed in northcentral Texas and in the Apache, Kiowa and Commanche Indian territories of Oklahoma.

Much of the land used by Capt. Burk and other ranchers was leased from Indian Chief Quanah Parker, whom they considered both friend and business associate.

The Burnett holdings soon extended beyond the legendary Four Sixes ranch. Under Capt. Burk's watchful eye, his son Tom developed the famous Triangle Ranches.

Tom's training for ranch life included service as Commanche translator and wagon boss for his father's cattle drives through the


great plains.

The younger Burnett's desire for establishing a ranch of his own was realized when he purchased land near Iowa Park. He would eventually add 100,000 acres to the Triangle Ranch

properties.

Tom's love of ranch life led him to develop other talents during the 1920s. He became a rodeo producer, developing some of the best rodeo talents in the world. His performances thrilled audiences in Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls and even Iowa Park.

The modern 6666's and Triangle Ranches spread over more than 400,000 acres in Texas. The ranches are primarily Hereford operations.




