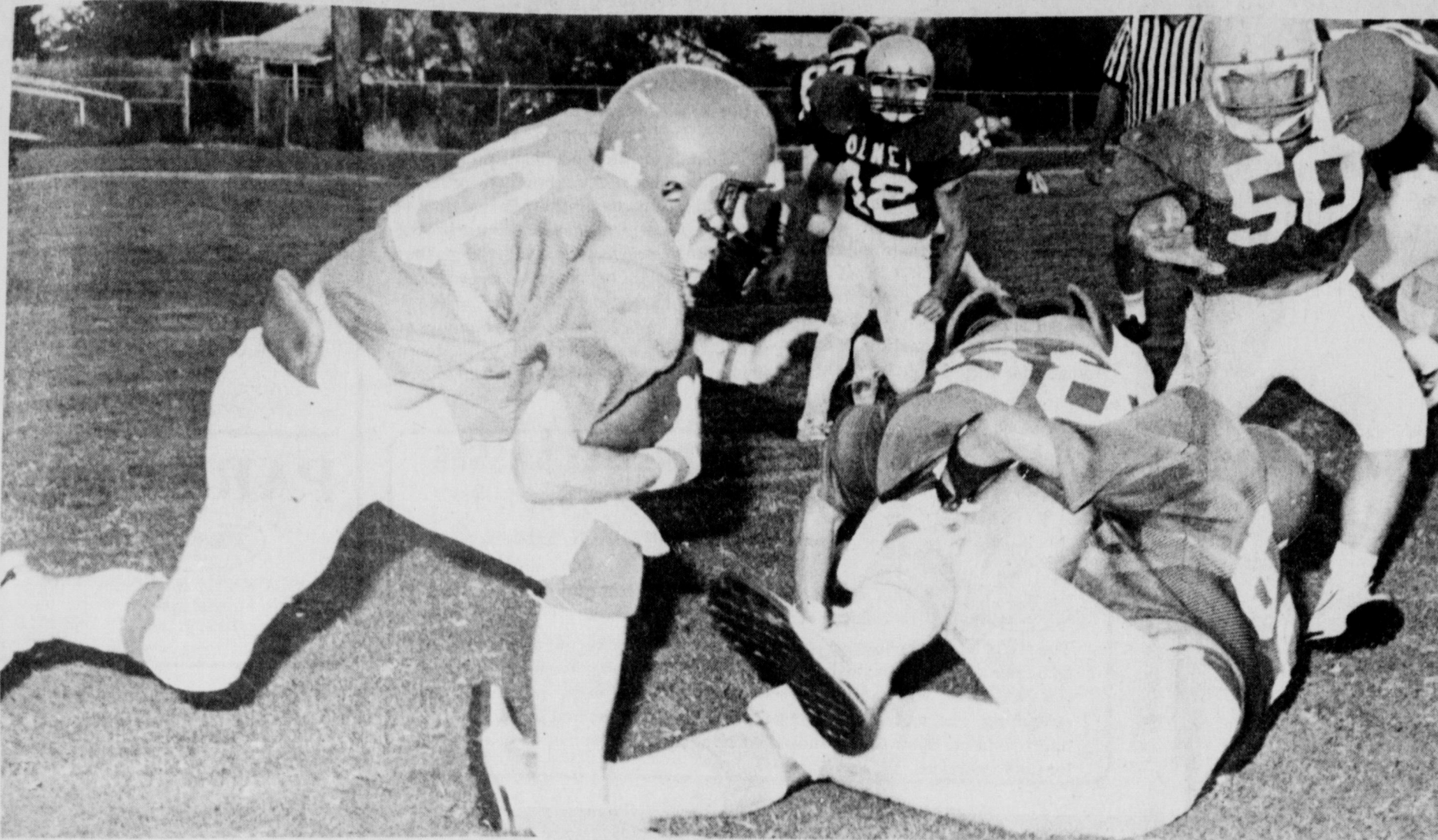

HAWKS PREPARE FOR SEASON OPENER WITH SCRIMMAGE AT OLNEY

The curtain goes up on a seven-home-game season at 8 p.m. tomorrow, when the Hawks host the Breckenridge Buckaroos.

This will be the sixth consecutive year the two clubs, both dressed in green and white and sharing the same school song melody, have kicked off their seasons against each other.

Iowa Park has won the past three contests, after the Buckaroos dominated the first pair. The Hawks won last year, 24-13.

Always a tough opponent, Breckenridge suffered a real setback in a recent scrimmage against Mineral Wells, when two starters reportedly were lost via knee injuries.

Quarterback John McElyea and two-way starter Rob Hagler, defensive end and tight end, reportedly will be out of commission six or seven weeks from the injuries.

But other than a few bruises, and loss of a lot of sweat from working out in the hot weather, the Hawks will be at full strength for the opening whistle.

With 15 returning lettermen, Iowa Park is aiming at improving at its 7-2-1 record last year.

Leading the Hawk defensive corps, which was hardest hit by graduation last spring, is returning all-district noseguard Robert Adams. Though only a junior, Coach David Baugh

says he is undoubtedly the best defensive player in the district. Adams also plays offensive guard and will handle kicking chores.

While the secondary is anchored by returning starters Ray Sefcik and Stephen Bidy, both of whom are two-way starters, all the rest of the defenders are new this season.

However, Baugh speaks confidently of defensive play by Shawn Price and Kevin Haney, who gained a lot of playing time last season.

"I think we will eventually be a good defensive team. We've been very aggressive in scrimmages, but made a lot of mistakes," Baugh said.

Once his fullback position is determined, Baugh will have his offensive backfield completed. He plans to start Sefcik at quarterback, alternate Scott Weaver and Scott Davis at tailback, use Danny Forman, David Kissner and Donald Young at wingback, and start Bidy at wide receiver.

George Blackwell returns as starting center.

Baugh says he plans to return to his "starburst" kickoff return, that puzzles the defenders, thrills the fans, and resulted in good return yardage. He had one return for a touchdown last year off the formation.

On their offensive sets, the Hawks have approximately 20 formations in which to set up, but all the plays are basically the same, Baugh said.

School tax rate set; enrollment reported

School trustees Tuesday night approved a 71-cent tax rate for the 1985-86 school year, and heard a first-day enrollment report that indicated the third grade class at Bradford is bulging at the seams.

The new rate reflects an increase over last year of almost 34 percent, for the local contribution to a budget of \$5,310,647, which includes a deficit of \$492,190 from excess fund carryover.

Vote on the budget was unanimous, but one member, Roy Boutwell, was absent.

First-day enrollment in Iowa Park schools was 1,750. This reflects the gradual decrease in enrollment since the district hit its record of 2,292 in 1970.

Trustees delayed any action to consider adding a sixth teacher for the third grade, until their next regular meeting Tuesday, after it was pointed out 148 pupils were in the five classrooms of that grade.

Should enrollment stay at approximately 30 per room through Tuesday, trustees indicated they would add another teacher.

Junior High principal Jimmy Alsup reported an extra large number of students in his school's science laboratory.

Though there is no maximum number allowed by the Texas Education Agency, Alsup said 25 should be the limit for proper instruction, instead of about 30 as he now has.

Though he proposed paying a teacher for an extra hour to cut down the class size, by using the hour before school opens as a conference period, Supt. Glen Mitchell suggested more study be made through this week on alternate solutions.

First-day enrollment figures are distorted somewhat, when comparing with previous year figures, because half the kindergarten numbers were not counted until this year. This was because half the class attended all day in the fall, and the other half in the spring.

Now that kindergarten students attend half-day, all-year, their total number makes the enrollment appear larger than previous years.

Kidwell Elementary has 401 students, compared with 354 reported last year and 342 in 1983. There are 71 kindergarten students attending class in the morning and 79 in the afternoon, for a total of 150 on the first day.

Principal Ron Woods also reported 124 in the first grade and 127 in the second.

Bradford enrollment Tuesday, according to Principal Kenneth Davis, was 404. This is an increase from 375 last year and 397 the year before.

There are 148 in the third grade, 122 in the fourth and 134 in the fifth.

Junior High enrollment is down from the two previous years, 407 as compared to 410 and 406. This includes 135 in the sixth grade, 130 in the seventh and 142 in the eighth.

First-day enrollment at the high school was up by one over last year. Principal Richard Davis said he had 538 in class Tuesday, as compared with 537 last year and 542 the year before.

High school enrollment includes 161 in the freshman class, 146 sophomores, 121 juniors and 110 seniors.

While administrators express anticipated increases at each of the campuses, they admit predictions of increases are more difficult this year than in the past.

This is because classes did not begin until after Labor Day holiday for the first time. Administrators always knew they would pick up more students after Labor Day in previous years, because some parents always waited until after the holiday to get their children into school.

An on-going subject at board meetings during the past month is the purchase of a tractor/mower. The issue was to be resolved, whether to purchase a Massey Ferguson or a

John Deere, yesterday afternoon when a committee of three was empowered to investigate the difference between the two at a demonstration and make a decision.

Prior to the end of the meeting, trustees called for an executive session, lasting 54 minutes, to discuss personnel. No action was taken after the meeting was re-opened to the public.

No tax increase planned by city

The city council is expected to approve a \$2,192,250 budget for 1985-86 and make no change in its 75.82-cent tax rate, when it meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Ordinances adopting the tax rate and budget are on the meeting agenda.

The budget calls for \$1,379,150 for the general fund and \$813,100 for the water and sewer fund, both including operations and debt service.

Also on the agenda is a report on action to purchase two lots across Wall Street, directly from city hall. At a meeting Tuesday night, part of which was for work on the budget, aldermen voted unanimously to purchase the property from owner L.E. Harris for a sum of \$14,450, the value assessed by the county appraisal district.

Harris was contacted by telephone, and a meeting was set this afternoon to work out details.

The intent of the council is to clear the property for use as a parking lot, not only by city employees but by members of The Friendly Door and shoppers.

Because of the deterioration of the structures on the lots, and the council's ambition to improve the

appearance of the business district, the two buildings in question have often been the subject of conversations in the past.

Three businesses, a beauty shop,

bait shop and appliance repair, would be displaced.

Another area in the same block, where a meat market burned and the city placed a lien against the property

when it undertook to clear the land, is also on Monday's agenda for discussion and possible action.

The council held an executive session 40 minutes Tuesday to discuss real estate and personnel.

Three other ordinances are on Monday's agenda, besides those having to do with the tax rate and budget.

One would revise portions of the existing ordinance relating to dangerous structures and repair of buildings within fire zones.

Another is concerned with regulating operations of the railroad within the city limits.

The third will call for a city-wide election Nov. 5 on the proposed home rule charter, the drafting of which was approved about a year ago by voters.

Three public hearings are on the agenda, all second hearings from the council's Aug. 26 meeting. They concern proposals for use of federal revenue sharing funds for next year and annexations of two tracts of land.

The council will consider purchasing a pothole patching machine and a resolution authorizing the administrator "to enter into a non-financial

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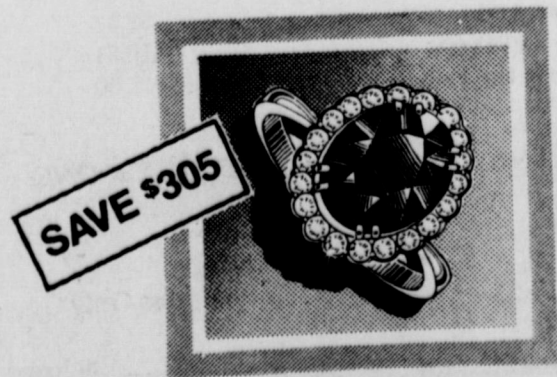

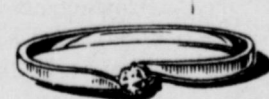

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SPECTACULAR ACCIDENT - A Vernon woman lost control of her car late Thursday morning, just east of the Bell Road overpass on US 287, and damaged two state vehicles besides her own, but no one was injured. Tractor hits, damages wall

Iowa Park police investigated an early Thursday afternoon accident in the 100 block of West Highway, in which a tractor loader ran into a brick building.

Damage to the rear of 117 West Cash was said to be extensive, when Bob Farris, an operator for D&W Associates, apparently lost control and drove the unit into the wall. A portion of the wall was caved in.

The owners, who reside in Archer County, were notified, according to the police blotter.

At 4:32 that afternoon, officers took into custody a white female juvenile alleged to have shoplifted at Wal-Mart. After being taken before Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill, who read to her the magistrate's warning, she was released to her parents.

A 43-year-old Wichita Falls man was taken into custody on two traffic warrants from the Department of Public Safety at Childress. He was later released after posting a \$93 bond, according to the blotter.

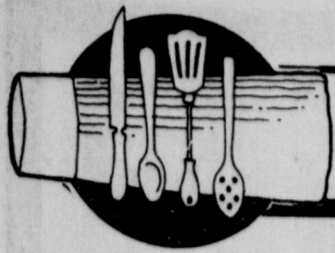

Cook of the Week

What are the characteristics of a good cook? Different people have different ideas, of course. Gervaise Markam described one as "She must have a good eye, a curious note, a perfect taste. She must not be butter-fingered, sweet toothed, not faint-hearted."

The recipes that Linda (Mrs. Robert) Scroggins shares with us today attest to her being a good cook. They certainly contain the essential body nutrients: carbohydrates, fats and proteins plus the supplementary substances, vitamins, minerals and condiments. The meat and chicken recipes use spices and vegetables to good advantage, and the desserts include fruits and nuts.

Her recipes show that she appreciates what cheese can do to enhance the flavor and nutritive value of various dishes.

The origin of cheese goes back into antiquity. Historians believe that it developed shortly after the domestication of the cow around 9000 B.C. It is believed that the Arabians probably took canteens of milk along their desert travels, and one source has it that the constant motion of the camels caused the milk to form curds and that could have been the world's first cottage cheese. Be that as it may, cottage cheese making today is a lot more scientific.

Mrs. Scroggins, the former Linda Lawrence, was born in Richmond, Va. She was graduated from Iowa Park High School. She is a hair stylist employed at Blackmon's King's and Queen's Hair Palace. She is a member of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Sewing and cake decorating are two hobbies that she enjoys the most.

Robert is a lieutenant with the Wichita Falls Fire Department. The couple have two children, Jason, six years of age, who is a first grade student at Kidwell Elementary School, and Dayna, three years old. Linda was a room mother when Jason was in kindergarten.

1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. oregano
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
Cheese Topping
1/4 cup chili sauce

Heat oven to 425 degrees. Prepare pastry for 9-inch one-crust pie as directed on package.

In medium skillet, cook and stir meat until brown. Drain off fat. Stir in salt, oregano, pepper, crumbs, 1/4 cup of the tomato sauce, onion and green pepper. Turn into pastry-lined pie pan. Spread cheese topping over filling. Bake about 30 minutes. Cut into wedges. Stir together remaining tomato sauce and the chili sauce and serve with pie. Makes 6-8 servings.

CHEESE TOPPING

1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/4 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. dry mustard
1/4 to 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
2 cups shredded natural Cheddar cheese, about 8 ozs.

Mix all together. Goes great with a pan of pinto beans or red beans.

CHICKEN BREASTS

Chicken breasts
Bacon slices
Dried Beef
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 cup sour cream

Fold and roll in slice of bacon one chicken breast per person. Place each breast on piece of dried beef in buttered casserole. Mix well the cream of mushroom soup and sour cream. Pour over chicken. Bake in 325 degree oven 2 1/4 hours uncovered. Serve with Pilaf Rice.

PILAF RICE

1/2 cup butter
1 onion, sliced
1 pkg. almonds, slivered
2 cups hot chicken broth
1 cup raw rice

Start oven at 375 degrees. Melt the butter and saute onion and almonds. Add the rice and mix well, add chicken broth. Bake 30 minutes or until done. Note: Pilaf Green Giant frozen rice can be used.

REESE'S COOKIES

1 cup shortening or 3/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup packed light brown sugar
1 tsp vanilla
2 eggs
2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1 cup Reese's Peanut Butter Chips
1 cup Hershey's Milk Chocolate Chips

Cream shortening, butter or margarine, sugar, brown sugar and vanilla until light and fluffy in large mixer bowl. Add eggs, beat well. Combine flour and baking soda and add to creamed mixture. Stir in Reese's Peanut Butter Chips and Hershey's Milk Chocolate Chips.

Drop by rounded teaspoonful onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool slightly before removing from cookie sheet. Yield: about 5 dozen 2 1/4 inch cookies.

CHICKEN ENCHILADAS

3 T butter
1 medium onion
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can chopped green chilies
1 (2-3 lb.) chicken, cooked and boned
1 pkg. tortillas
1 lb. grated Longhorn cheese
1 can chicken broth

Saute onion in butter until soft. Add soups, chicken broth, chicken and green chilies. In large casserole, place layer of tortillas, chicken mixture and cheese. Repeat. Bake at 350 degrees 30 to 40 minutes. Serves 6.

HUMMINGBIRD CAKE

3 cups all-purpose flour
2 cups sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. ground cinnamon
3 eggs, beaten
1 1/4 cups salad oil
1 1/4 tps. vanilla extract
1-8 oz. can crushed pineapple, undrained
1 cup chopped pecans
2 cups chopped bananas

Combine dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl. Add eggs and salad oil, stirring until dry ingredients are moistened. DO NOT BEAT. Stir in vanilla, pineapple, 1 cup pecans and bananas.

Spoon batter into 3 well-greased and floured 9-inch cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees about 30 minutes or until cake tests done. Cool in pans 10 minutes. Remove and cool completely.

CREAM CHEESE FROSTING

2-8 oz pkgs. cream cheese
2-16 oz. pkgs powdered sugar
2 tps. vanilla
1 cup pecans

Combine the cream cheese and butter and cream until smooth; add powdered sugar, beating well until light and fluffy. Stir in Vanilla and pecans. Yield: enough for 3-layer cake.

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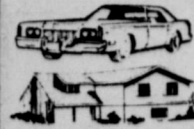

Hawk, Cub scrimmage ends in scoring tie

In their second, and final, pre-season scrimmage Friday, the Hawks tied Olney in scoring, 1-1, but showed more strength in goal line stand play.

Actually, Coach David Baugh demonstrated more desire to see how various combinations of players achieved, rather than trying to put points on the scoreboard.

But the Cubs, semifinalists in the Class AA playoffs last year, proved to be a good test for the still-developing

Mean Green. Especially Olney's fine passing offense.

Olney gained a net 99 yards rushing, with 105 yards being chalked up in the first of three offensive possessions. The Cubs were held to a minus seven yards during the second session and one yard on the third.

Olney racked up 15 yards in each of the first two sessions and eight in the third for 38 yards through the air. And the host team accounted for seven first downs.

But the Cubs scored one touchdown, a five-yarder over right

tackle, and had a 39-yard TD pass called back on a holding infraction.

The Hawks showed consistency in their running game, rolling up yardage of 98, 75 and 86 net in their three sessions, for 259 yards.

Passing didn't do much for the locals, with only one completion for 13 yards. In the first down department, Iowa Park accounted for 17.

Iowa Park's lone touchdown came on the final play of the third offensive session, when quarterback Ray Sefcik bootlegged 12 yards around left end,

cruising untouched into the end zone.

Each team was given five plays from the goal line in the final session. Olney was held scoreless, advancing to the two yard line only once.

Iowa Park scored three times from the five, twice running and once on a pass.

Iowa Park's freshman and junior varsity teams completely dominated their scrimmages. The freshmen outscored Olney's JV reserves 2-0, as did the Hawk JV reserves. The JV regulars had a field day, outscoring their hosts 4-0.



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
