

SESQUICENTENNIAL SOWING - Jacky Lemon of the highway department sowed bluebonnet and crimson clover seed along US 287 Tuesday, near Highland Cemetery and at the Fourth Street intersection. The seed was purchased by the Wichita County Historical Commission and Wichita County Commission. Four different areas in the county, one in each county commissioner's precinct, were seeded Tuesday.

Hawk-Lion ti-528 W. CLION ti-10WA PARK matches two even teams Iowa Park and Vernon will be

competing for the lead in Dist. 5-AAA tomorrow night at Lion Stadium.

The Hawks and Lions are the only undefeated teams in conference play going into the 8 p.m. kickoff. And though a loss doesn't put Friday's loser out of the state playoffs, it makes getting there a lot harder.

Vernon and Iowa Park are about as equal as any two clubs can be. Both dropped back to Class AAA from AAAA last year, and the two figured to go on into the playoffs.

They fought to a 0-0 standoff in Hawk Stadium, and the Lions went on with the district title under their belts to advance as far as the state semifinals, losing to Daingerfield

But the Hawks were upset by Decatur and Springtown, and stayed at home nursing a 7-2-1 record.

Over the past 15 seasons, Iowa Park has won seven times, Vernon has won seven, and of course they tied last year. Six of Vernon's seven victories came in a row, speading from 1975 through 1980. The last time they defeated the Mean Green was 1983, when they humiliated the Hawks 42-0 at Vernon.

To take the eveness even further, each team lost a reserve player under the "no-pass, no-play" rule. And each team has lost key players through

The Hawks lost tight end Wayne Oltman early last week with a broken wrist, and linebacker Jeff Tucker hurt his knee against Bowie and required surgery.

Two Lion two-way starters sidelined for the season with injuries are Matt Elliott, fullback and defensive end, and Willie King quarterback Dan Buesing having an outstanding season. Last week, he completed 10 of 15 attempts for 93 yards, as well as rushing seven times for another 43 yards.

Buesing's favorite target was split end Ron Cook, who snagged seven for

Iowa Park's secondary has nine

interceptions thus far.

This likely will be the last time Iowa Park and Vernon will compete on the district level for a few years. Vernon, according to Superintendent Jerry Cook, will be moved back to Class AAAA next year, unless the minimum is raised considerably. He gave his board of trustees that report back in September.

The Lions and Hawks have met three similar opponents. Vernon beat

Burburnett 17-15. Breckenridge 28-14 and Bowie 21-0. Iowa Park lost its opener to Breckenridge. 14-28. but took measure of Burkburnett 9-3 and Bowie 35-14.

The Lions also lost their season opener, 6-21 to Altus, but bounced back and won 13-12 over Lawton MacArthur, 25-17 over Borger and opened district play with a 21-6

decision over Springtown.

Next week, the Lions are not figured to have much of a problem with Bridgeport, but they must face Decatur Nov. 8, the same night Iowa Park travels to Bridgeport.

So, midway through the district schedule, the conference championship and playoff spots are still hanging. And the next three Fridays will determine who goes on to area and who stays at home.

Council plans tour

Burnett Memorial Library is on the city council's agenda Monday, before they take up regular business at the council chambers.

Council members are to see the progress of renovating the Burnett home, and hear how much more must be accomplished before it is opened, fully-stocked, to the public about mid

The tour is to begin at 6:30 p.m., and the business session at council chambers is expected to start about 7.

Aldermen are to consider annexations of two tracts of land that have been petitioned to come into the city. One is on Smith Road, for a new church, and the other on Johnson Road, for a new housing addition.

Water rates are on Monday's agenda, but Iowa Park residents are not expected to experience any

Following negotiations with Wichita Falls, which first proposed an increase of some 40 percent for city, a contract will be considered to increase the rate some 15 percent. Iowa Park has been paying slightly more than 49-cents per 100 cubic feet of water, and the new contract calls

for a rate of .5575. Should a resolution be approved to accept the new rate, two more resolutions are to be proposed, increasing the rates to Iowa Park's two major water purchasers, Wichita Valley Water Supply Corp. and

residents at Horseshoe Lake. The contracts for both the major purchasers calls for them to pick up the increase asked by Wichita Falls, according to Administrator James Barrington.

Another resolution to be considered would, if approved, authorize a lease agreement for the northwest corner at West Highway and Fourth Street, where another eating establishment is proposed.

The city's insurance policies are up for renewal. The subject was touched

on briefly at the last meeting, when the council was told its liability increased in cost, and the coverage

Barrington has made a study of the insurance costs and is to report back Monday, as instructed.

The council will be asked to approve a proposal to have two radio antennas installed atop the water tower at city hall, where they are now located midway up the stand.

The move would improve radio communications for both the police department and fire department. Additionally, one of the antennas displaced is proposed to be relocated at the auxiliary fire station in the south part of town, as a backup in case of a disaster.

Council members will consider accepting a grant, offered by Bethania Hospital through Wells Fargo, for improvements to the

Students are sidelined under new grades rule

six-weeks testing completed, several students have found themselves ineligible under the state-mandated

"no-pass, no-play" rule. The figures of total students who failed one or more grades, which is now a minimum grade of 70, are similar between Iowa Park High School and Junior High.

At the high school, 110 of the 529, or 20.7 percent, failed at least one subject. At the junior high, 83, or 20.8 percent, failed one or more subjects.

What does that mean to students participating in extracurricular subjects? Well, they cannot participate the entire second six-week period, during which time they must bring all their grades up to passing or continue

Vocational Agriculture was the hardest hit at the high school, where 25 students failed at least one subject.

Mrs. Weiler observes 90th birthday

A lovely courtesy was extended to Ruth (Mrs. Chauncey) Weiler, who will observe her 90th birthday Oct. 30, Sunday afternoon by eight close friends and neighbors.

Hostesses for the reception held in the Fellowship Hall of First United Methodist Church were Mmes. Bill Solomon, Everett Stephenson, Charlie Lee, China B. Smith, James Owens, Don Owens, Gene Owens and Erwin Soell.

Mrs. Weiler was born in Dallas. In the fall of 1915 after she was graduated from high school that spring, she entered Southern Methodist Univ., which opened that year, as a freshman student, and she was a member of the first graduating class in 1919, graduating with summa cum laude honors.

She realized the value of getting a good education and was willing to pay the price to get it. She lived with her parents on the east side of Dallas. The family did not have a car, few people did at that time, and to get to the university Mrs. Weiler had to ride a street car to downtown Dallas, change to another street car that took her to Highland Park where she transferred to the "Dinky," a small car that took her to the campus.

Following graduation, she was employed as an instructor in the biology department at SMU. She was a member of Sigma Kappa sorority. and when a chapter was organized at Midwestern State Univ. she helped install the officers. For a Phi Beta Kappa to be established at a college or university, the school has to prove itself. One was not established at SMU until 1950, but when it was established, Mrs. Weiler was selected among the alumni to be initiated with the charter members.

At the reception Sunday, she was surprised and honored by a personal letter from L. Donald Shiels, president of SMU, which read in part

"We have had very few of our graduates achieve a milestone which you are celebrating today on your ninetieth birthday -- on behalf of our entire university community we extend congratulations."

In addition to the letter, the president sent her a copy of the book,

"Southern Methodist University -Founding and Early Years" by Dr. Mary Hosford Thomas, whose father was in the same class with Mrs. Weiler at the university. She also received a letter of congratulations from the president of the SMU Alumni Association.

Music Company, a special group of singers from the A Cappella High School Choir directed by Allen Andrews. For their closing number, they gathered around Mrs. Weiler and sang "Happy Birthday."

A banner spread above the doorway of the Fellowship Hall read "The McCartys Wish Ruth Weiler a Happy Birthday." It was sent from Mr. and Mrs. Dick McCarty of Agoura, Calif., close friends of Bill Weiler, son of the honoree who is in Singapore.

Having visited his mother recently, Bill was unable to come back for the birthday celebration, but he had a big part in it by providing a beautiful fall arrangement of fresh bronze, gold and orange mums, carnations, daisies, eucalyptus and wheat for the centerpiece on the refreshment table covered with gold lace. He was also responsible for her corsage highlighted with a gold orchid surrounded with gold mums.

The gold and orange colors were noted in decorations on the birthday cake and in the other refreshments. The table decor was completed with

crystal services, mints and napkins in bronze and gold.

Mrs. Weiler and her late husband came to Iowa Park in 1946 from Electra where she was made a life member of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers. She taught Spanish and English in the Iowa Park High School from 1947 until 1960.

Many of her former students came from several places in Texas to attend the reception.

She is a member of the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd. In addition to Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Alpha, she is a member of Delta Kappa Gamma and a life member of the 23 Study Club.







As I See It.... By BOB HAMILTON



Mrs. Moore, who wrote to the editor last week expressing her concerns about the proposed charter. should be commended for her interest. She may have been speaking for others in her letter, and she raised some issues which should be addressed.

Mrs. Moore is right the fact that there are 254 counties in Texas. According to the Texas Municipal League, there are actually 252 cities in the state which are Home Rule. Again Mrs. Moore is almost right.

The statistic she was apparently unaware of is the fact that only 35 cities in the state are eligible, because of population, to be Home Rule and are not

Rather than pointing to the desire of most cities to refrain from Home Rule, this would point to the opposite since 88 percent of the cities which can consider being Home Rule have chosen to do so. Furthermore, of the 35 which are not yet Home Rule four are considering Charters at this time.

The second point addressed in Mrs. Moore's letter is the "Powers of the City" section in Article II. Mrs. Moore is again correct in stating that most of the powers outlined therein are for the City Council to exercise. It should be noted that any form of self-government is based on the assumption that the voters are intelligent and informed enough to vote wisely on the issues and candidates placed before them.

To say that the Charter would provide for greater rule by the Council and lesser rule by the people is to make the assumption that the people are incapable of electing qualified representatives to the Council. This retains the responsibility each voter has to do his part in electing the most qualified people to

The final point Mrs. Moore makes is that under General Law the state. In examining the proposed Charter, we find that Article VIII provides for legislation by the people and virtually immediate recall of any elected official who proves to be unworthy of the confidence placed in him by the public.

The state does not provide any such provisions in the General Law Charter. Furthermore, there is no state agency which is responsible for overseeing the administration of the General Law cities. I thank God for

Any appeals to the "state" concerning the operation of General Law cities would be to the Legislature or to State District Court. Both avenues are open to the citizens under Home Rule as well as under General Law.

Also, any citizen who has experience with trying to get changes made through the City Council as opposed to the Legislature will know which is easier.

Issues such as these should be raised by concerned citizens. That is the foundation of local self-government. Voters should go to the polls Nov. 5 to decide the issue.

Statistics over the last several years indicate that in all likelihood less than 500 voters will turn out to vote. If the citizens of the city are interested in how their city is to be run in the future they should go to the polls. Home Rules provides the mechanism for greater self-determination. Whether the voters use the rights they have remains to be seen.

In voting for or against the Charter, please do so from a position of knowing what the issues are; and vote your convictions based on factual information, not hearsay.

For the past several years, we've all clucked our tongues and whistled with envy over the huge sums awarded by juries in lawsuit cases.

"Boy, that'll teach them to respect the law," we'd say, or "Man, that ole boy has got it made the rest of his

losses were covered by insurance. now. Insurance companies aren't

writing coverage for high-risk truckers and cities, more in particular their police departments, are having their premiums tripled for less

Iowa Park's blanket liability insurance policy of \$2-million cost a premium of \$7,000 earlier this year. Now the premium is doubled and the coverage is \$1-million, if the city accepts the coverage.

Some major cities are banding together to form a pool, and will have self-coverage because they can't afford the premiums.

Let me give you an example of the type of damage award that is killing insurance coverage.

Recently a three-year-old boy in southwest Texas was awarded \$2.5-million, because his mother was killed in a highway accident involving an oilfield truck.

There's no question that the boy's life will be changed, denied his father's care. But how do you put a figure, financially, to it. Will the boy's earning ability after he reaches manhood be damaged to the point he must be cared for with the insurance

Would the father have earned \$2.5-million during the boy's lifetime that would have become the boy's

I think juries often set such high amounts to teach others a lesson to obey the law. That happened recently in a case involving a Decatur area woman, who was awarded several millions of dollars following an accident with a rock hauler.

What's really happening, though, is that we all must share in the huge settlements. I can guarantee you the payments are made up through higher insurance premiums.

The City of Iowa Park won't be paying those higher liability coverage premiums. Neither will the Cities of Holliday, Wichita Falls, Electra, etc. No sir, the residents of all communities pay the higher premiums, through taxes.

So, every time you see in a paper where a jury has fixed a big cash figuring how much higher it will be in the future to pay what the jury

Raise wages, lower profits

Mr. Hamilton.

The following is an excerpt from (being in rebuttle to your Chrysler editorial) an address made during a People's Lobby luncheon and broadcast over the Columbia Broadcasting System, Saturday, April 24, 1937. Delivered by Dr. Mordecai Ezekiel. . .

We are in no danger of the astronomical kind of inflation which carried the values of the American continentals, the French assignats, the old German marks, or Russian roubles, to zero. Rather, the only type of inflation that might threaten us is such a rapid rise in speculative values, as in 1928-1929, or in commodity values, as in 1918-1919, as might eventually plunge us again into a major depression like those of 1920

The first method, and probably the most desirable one, is one that businessmen themselves can adopt. It is for them to put into action the program recommended to them by the Brookings Institution in its book. "Income and economic progress." That method is very simple: Use the reduced costs of production arising from technological improvements and full-capacity operation primarily to lower the selling price of the product, and to raise wages of labor: and only in small measure to raise profits. In that way the buying power of workers can be kept rising, more workers will be employed, and production and consumption will rise together. Also, that will avoid the vicious circle of rising wages, rising

which many industries seem to be starting today. In the essence, this program boils down to this: Increase pay rolls faster than you increase profits; and pay higher wages out of lowered costs. rather than passing them on as higher prices. Unfortunately, our leading corporations seem to be going in the opposite direction. From 1935 to 1936, industrial pay rolls increased only a little over 10 percent, while the profits of reporting corporations increased more than 50 percent. If businessmen continue to increase profits out of all proportion to pay rolls, disaster is sure to follow.

But I feel we, as the people of this great nation, can put our foot down to certain laws that protect and actually nourish some of our so called great and all powerful corporations to the extent that they are able to get away with the immoral and fradulent exercizes involving such legalized practices in ritualism as Bankruptcy, Corporate Reorganization, using certain tax laws and loopholes to actually gain by reporting an imaginary loss which by some means or another is always confirmable. I believe that debts contracted fraudulently should be exposed and treated as such. Fraud. Let's convict and sentence those responsible for such practices in the righteous courts of our land and yes even if it causes a little more unemployment for our people put them out of Business.

Education makes more thinking men. A free press guides them. Unlimited public discussion aids them in coming to their unemotional and unbiased decisions.

Without the almost universal acceptance of this concept of the "thinking man," the debate about the merits of Capitalism v. Fascism would be impossible.

No Mr. Hamilton I am not for nor do I discredit all "Unions. . ." I think it's highly disgraceful that in certain corners of our land the men and women of our working class should have to protect, with unions, such basic needs as making a decent living from those who would suppress them. I feel that the common working men/women in our country are the well of our nations prosperity and if the demagogues in control of our great industries and corporations don't stop throwing the bucket in, then one day the bottom is going to drop out. Again.

General Law: A government by the people, for the people, directly or through representatives, freedom of speech, equality of rights, opportunity, and treatment of all.

Home Rule: In my opinion is in essence a totalitarian form of government, pertaining to a central-

ized government, to bring under one system, or under one control which is our City Council. With the election of the wrong people (power seekers) to our City Council could result in the dereliction of the residents of Iowa

Submission of Charter: (Ref. "Texas Constitution and Civil Statutes", Art. 1167) States in preparing the "Charter" the commission shall as far as practicable, segregrate each subject so the voter may vote "Yes" or "No" on the same. From the Proposed Home Rule Charter. Section 9, it states it is impracticable to segregate each subject. I disagree, and feel each Section could and should have been answered "Yes" or "No". Refer to Article II, of the Proposed Home Rule Charter, for the powers of the city government. NOTE! Article II, paragraph 2, is this not the fine print of the not yet mentioned powers that will eventually surface as time prevails, if Home Rule should pass.

Read and study the Proposed Home Rule Charter, and VOTE to retain our General Law form of government, which is for the people and by the people.

In all, 64 students are listed as being ineligible on the 13 organizations, but several of them are duplicates and the actual number is less, but unknown.

Eight players on the Eighth Grade football team lost eligibility, but none on the Seventh Grade. Two Eighth Grade girls on the basketball team were lost for the grade period, and one Seventh Grader and one Eighth Grader were ruled ineligible from

Those participating in choir were not counted, since there are no choir activities this semester, according to the school counselor.

The competency test will be administered statewide on March 10, 1986. The exam will test teachers' knowledge of basic literacy in a reading and writing skills test. The reading test will ask teachers to identify a main idea; identify details; distinguish fact from opinion; draw inferences; use and select reference sources; and comprehend job-related vocabulary.

On the writing test, teachers must identify proper mechanics of writing, including capitalization, punctuation and spelling; recognize proper English usage; identify erros in sentence formation; and produce a written composition.

ATPE is Texas' second-largest teacher association with approximately 42,000 members statewide. Approximately 94 percent of ATPE members are classroom teachers, but administrators, paraprofessionals, students and retired teachers also belong to the association.





Holliday receives grant

Holliday has been named recipient of yet another state grant, according to city administrator Brown Hudson, speaking to Holliday city council during its final bi-monthly meeting for October.

Also during Monday's regular meeting at the Holliday Community Center, Hudson also informed council members of a recent sanitary survey to the city's treatment plant by state's department of health. Three major areas of improvement were cited, Hudson conferred, and steps were now being taken to improve the situation.

letter from the health department's chief of surveillance and technical assistance branch, James E. Pope, said, "We are pleased to note the efforts which have been made to assist your employees in becoming certified and hope that they will be able to obtain the required "C" license as soon as possible.

"As a result of this survey, your attention is directed to the following corrective actions necessary to bring your system into compliance with State Statutes and this Department's "Rules and Regulations for Public Water Systems":

1. The ground storage reservoir should be inspected and the exterior surface spot painted so that the paint systems will continue to provide adequate protection for the reservoir.

2. The overhead bulk water station available for use by the general public must be provided with a vacuum breaker which is located at the highest water flow elevation and downstream from the water valve.

3. Safety chains should be provided to secure the chlorine bottles when they are stored.

Hudson said all efforts are being made to correct those areas, and that

the new grant amounting to \$110,000 would greatly assist the program.

An October 8th letter from state governor Mark White congratulated Holliday for being named recipient of the grant to "improve the public sewer system to serve residents along West and South Avenues.'

Governor White also wrote, "This award is made available through the third annual competition for funding under the Texas Community Development Program. A representative of the Department of Community Affairs will contact you concerning the contract agreement. The effective date of the contract will be approximately four to six weeks from the date of this letter.

"Thank you for your continuing efforts on behalf of the citizens of Holliday. Please feel free to call my office. . . if we can be of assistance during the course of this project."

Hudson told the council that the grant, \$100,000 from the state and \$10,000 from the city, will greatly improve the system. "Every effort will be made to properly supervise the project from start to finish," Hudson commented.

In other business, liability insurance for the city was tabled until the first meeting in November, the council finalized an agreement with the department of health and mental retardation for use of the community center as a meeting place for the "Outreach" program, and the city administrator reported that work to the Cypress Street Plant in Wichita Falls necessitated a shutoff of water for Tuesday, and that the city had adequate storage to accomodate the

Insurance representative Don Talley of Holliday met with council to discuss the current liability policy held by the city, and to give advice on renewal of the policy. Council tabled the discussion until the next meeting.







On Tuesday, October 22nd, Iowa Park High School will administer the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude test for interested Juniors and Seniors. This test is composed of verbal and mathematics; and is a short verison of the Scholastic Aptitude test which is a college entrance exam. The test is excellent practice for the college entrance exam; as well as being a must for all juniors and seniors who wish to be considered for National

Honor Society. Cost of the test is \$5.00 and it takes approximately two hours to take.

Juniors and Seniors who plan to attend college upon graduation from high school should be thinking seriously about taking the appropriate college entrance exam. College exams are offered several times a year by two testing companies. The

choice of a college usually dictates the proper test to be taken. The best testing date depends upon the deadlines set by the chosen college as well as the individual student's particular schedule. Students should plan ahead as each test date has a deadline for registration that will be approximately a month prior to the test date itself. Information and registration packets are available in the high school Counselor's office.



CORDLESS PHONE RINGS CAUSE HEARING LOSS

The increasingly popular cordless telephone may create a hazard to vour hearing.

Dr. George Singleton told members of the American Otological Society that there have been 28 documented cases of permanent hearing loss attributed to the "hazardously loud" bells of the cordless phone. The ring causes immediate pain, loss of hearing, and tinnitus.

Dr. Singleton explained that most people are used to having the phone stop ringing when the receiver is picked up. The cordless phone requires the user to flip a switch to turn off the ring.

Ringing noise level is in a range of 137-141 decibels [hearing loss can occur when decibels exceed 120]. The telephone ring noise is equal to that of a gunshot blast or a jet airplane at takeoff, he said.
