

Americanism program highlights meeting

The 23 Study Club meeting Thursday afternoon was highlighted by an Americanism program directed by Mrs. Sam Hill. It featured the choral reading of the American Creed by club members, a piano-organ duet by Mrs. John Rentschler and Mrs. B.G. House, a brief history of the Statue of Liberty and the Liberty Centennial Campaign to restore it and Ellis Island by Mrs. Erwin Soell, and a patriotic talk by Mrs. Homer Blalock.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Soell with Mrs. Travis Smith, the co-hostess.

For the performing arts number, the musicians played "Panis

Angelicus" by Cesar Franck.

To refresh the memory of the members, Mrs. Soell said that the Statue of Liberty was designed and created by a French sculptor at a cost of \$400,000, and paid for by contributions from the French. She said that the completed statue was presented to the American ambassador by the people of France July 4, 1884, dismantled and shipped to America in 1885 where the pedestal to install it was built, and finally dedicated by President Grover Cleveland on October 28, 1886.

She discussed the needs and plans to restore and preserve the Statue that has suffered deterioration and corrosion through its one hundred years, stating that the initial phase of construction now being underway.

Mrs. Blalock brought the Texas Sesquicentennial theme that is being emphasized in the club programs this year and the Americanism theme closely together in a patriotic talk that gave opportunity to show that Texas and Texans have played a fundamental part in the growth and progress of America.

Following the program, Mrs. Keith Auld directed the business, Mrs. Smith, federation counselor, gave the highlights from an address "You Are The Key" by the TFWC president, Mrs. Harold Green, and a message from Mrs. Wendell Winger, GFWC president, on impressions of Texas and federated clubwomen gleaned

from the recent national convention held at Houston.

A nominating committee composed of Mmes. Rentschler, China B. Smith and L.E. Brooks was elected.

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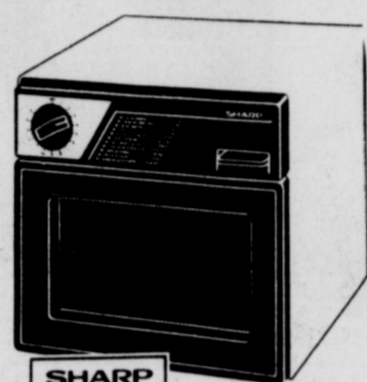
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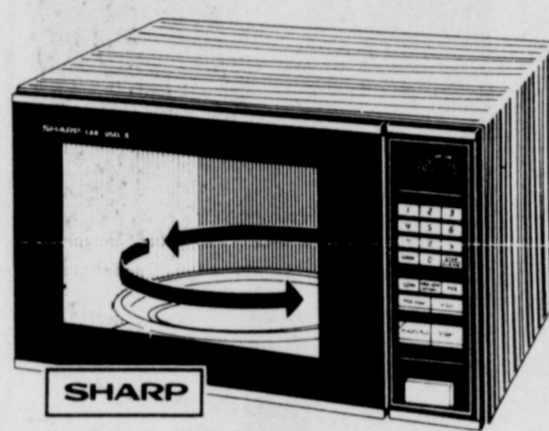
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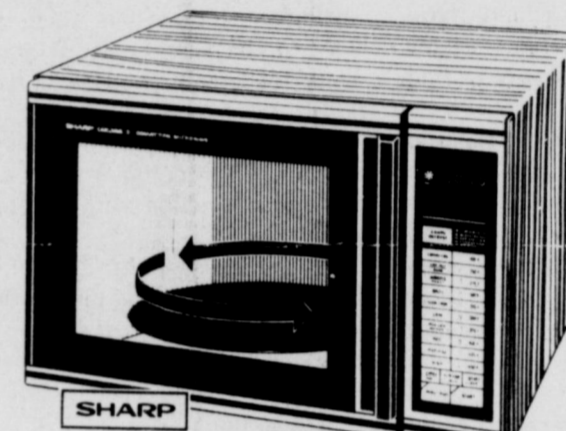
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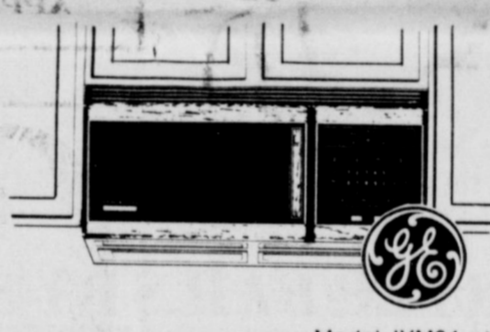
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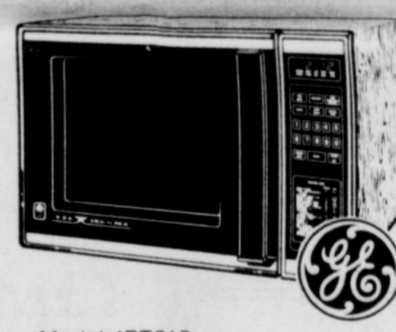


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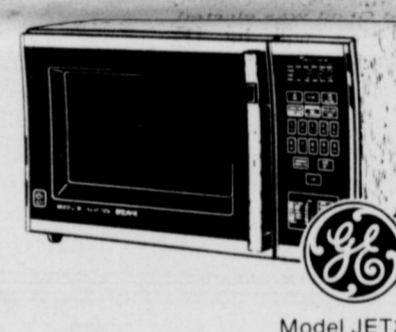


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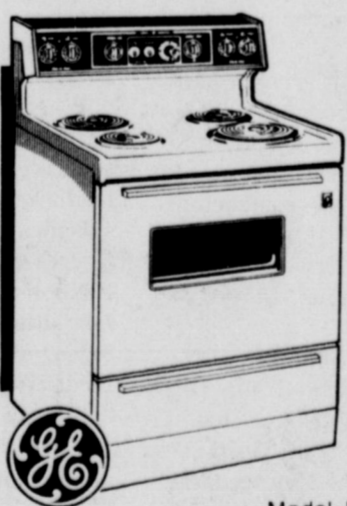


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Study Clubs hold joint meeting

Woodfin showed slides on grafting and named the pecan trees that would yield the most meat, giving the Choctaw as his favorite pecans because it is heartier and peels easier.

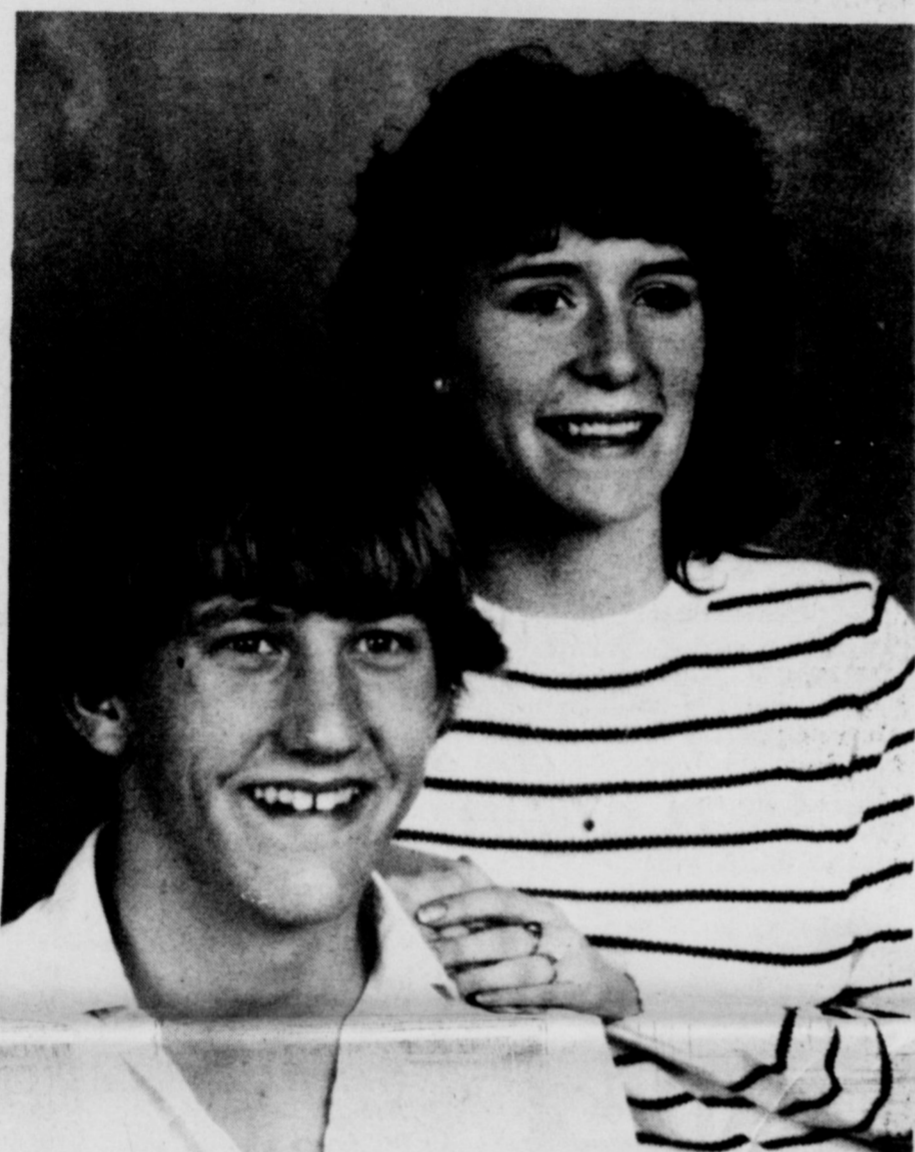
Mrs. Charlie Lee gave the thought for the day and conducted the business.

Scott is a member of the varsity football team and the track team.



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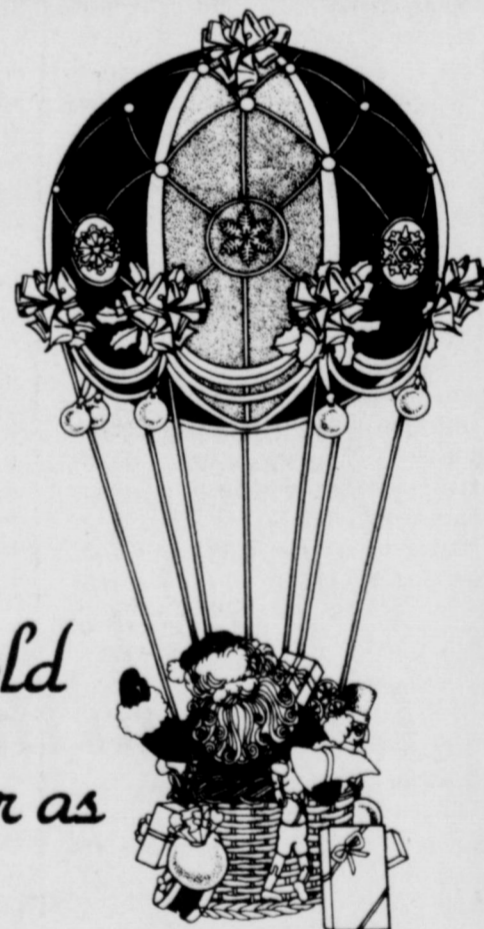
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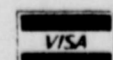
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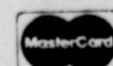
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As I See It....

I couldn't be happier about the Hawks being in the playoffs, and the way the drawing for positions worked out. It all came out exactly the way I wanted it.

I wanted to play Graham, both because of the old rivalry and because we would be representing the district as the first-place team, and I wanted Springtown to stay at home.

No, I have nothing against the people of Springtown. I just felt the Hawks and Vernon were the better teams of the district.

Go get'em Hawks!!!

I'm really interested to see if anyone will come forth and sue Mayor Tim Hunter to get a recount of the Home Rule Charter election, since there was only a three-vote difference.

Any election of that narrow a margin should be automatically

recounted, I believe, regardless of the issue or the outcome.

It's not even the end of the year, and I've already learned something in 1985.

I'm attempting to be funny, rather than pompous. But I learned something at the city council Monday that I'd wondered about ever since city sales taxes began in Texas.

It seems our legislators, using all their wisdom when writing the bill that set up city sales taxes, decided to make it easy for those firms that do business in more than one business.

The sales tax collected here, for instance, when paid for cable television service is actually credited to Burk Burnett. That's a quirk in the law, because the business office making its report to the state just turns in its money collected, and the

state credits Burk Burnett with the tax when it's rebated.

The cable tv people don't have anything to do with it, you need to understand.

But the same thing is true, say when one of those office supply salesmen from Wichita Falls comes over here and sells one of our businesses pencils, tape, paper, envelopes, etc. That sales tax is rebated to Wichita Falls.

I'll credit Raymond Greenwood, the local cable manager, for his pledge to work it out that Iowa Park will get its sales taxes due for his firm's service.

Raymond said he would assist, also, in every way possible to get the law changed so that each community in the state gets its rightful tax money back.

Mayor Tim Hunter said the Texas Municipal League was starting a project to get the law changed.

Other business included:

- * approving rezoning a 7.44-acre tract on Smith Street from R-3 to A.G. as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Commission;
- * approved annexation of another 7.44-acre tract on Smith, where Cornerstone Pentecostal Church of God plans to erect a church;
- * voted to reject all bids for a new police car and re-advertise;
- * approved a \$4,999 expenditure for a computer terminal and printer to be used at the police station;
- * approved rules for use of the upstairs meeting room of the Tom Barnett Memorial Library, and though the library will be open for use earlier, decided to hold a formal opening Mar. 12;
- * approved a waiver of fees for door-to-door solicitors who will canvass the community for the local cable television firm to sell converters for the additional channels to be offered.

approval.

During a public hearing on annexing Shiloh Four, which would front Johnson Road, a delegation of residents on Douglas Street in Country Hills Addition asked about more water runoff from the area.

The group had been at the last council meeting, when relief efforts for their flooding problems were discussed.

Administrator James Barrington said the city's engineer had a new approach to helping their situation, and it cost less than other avenues discussed at the earlier meeting.

Barrington explained the engineer did not have specific plans and cost estimates ready, but would for the next meeting.

The engineer proposes to construct a storm drain, heading it north of Mary Drive on Douglas, and having it in Douglas to the Access Road, with intakes put in the curb along the route.

When the drain was put down, a new concrete paving would replace the present asphalt surface, and the entire project would cost less than other options discussed earlier, Barrington quoted the engineer.

cut the cost. Actual savings was not determined, however.

Another "maintenance" project involved the school's roof. The school board members voted to place a concrete ramp for handicapped students with concrete ramps.

Auditor Navland Smith told the board the school "... did not quite collect what it estimated, but didn't spend as much as anticipated."

He pointed out the school's balance at the start of the year was \$1,786,000, and at the end of the year the school had \$1,721,000, including \$321,000 in checking and \$1.4-million on certificates of deposit.

Smith complimented the school for being a "good, financial sound district," and added that a good effort had been made to cut the delinquent taxes from \$40,509 to \$37,800.

Bill Bates, local Chevrolet dealer, appeared before the board to object to its action taken last month in approving a bid from Shaw Motor Co.

Bates based his objection on the fact that his pickup was lower than

the price given by Shaw, but board members pointed out the Shaw pickup was a larger pickup and "more suited to the money." The Chevrolet dealer contended that the board should compare "oranges with oranges," and the lower bid should have been accepted. He said the district's costs could be cut and increasing taxes wouldn't be necessary if the board accepted the low bids on purchases.

"The consistence of action by this board does not, in my opinion, show good management of taxpayer money," he said.

Trustee Jimmy Howell told Bates he could have submitted more than one size pickup for bid, because of the motor size range included in the bid package.

In other business, the oath of office was administered to Jerald Brown, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the last Ray Hicks; trustees approved collision insurance on its six latest model buses, and set a school vehicle use policy.

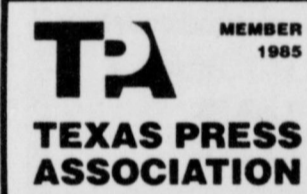
He concluded by covering briefly the situation in Lebanon and emphasized what he considered the importance of settling the Palestinian issue in order to have any measure of peace in the area.

Mean Green shuts out Bulls

Iowa Park's Hawks earned their first berth in the state playoffs since 1970 by shutting out Bridgeport here Friday night, 24-0.

The win featured an explosive offensive showing by the Hawks early in the game, supported by a demonstration of tenacious defensive play that not only held the Bulls out of the end zone, but humiliated Bridgeport's offense by holding the visitor's running game to a minus 15 yards.

Despite their 1-9 season record, the Bulls lived up to Coach David Baugh's prediction that they would be a tough team to control and their defense would force a good effort by the Hawks.

Iowa Park scored twice in a little over five minutes of play. Taking the opening kickoff and returning it to their 43 yard line, the Hawks needed only seven plays to light up the scoreboard.

Quarterback Ray Sefcik completed his first pass attempt of the evening, hitting wide receiver Stephen Biddy down the middle at the 12. The senior receiver shook off a couple of tackles and sprinted into the end zone on a play that covered 30 yards.

Robert Adams' kick attempt for the extra point was wide of the uprights, but the Hawks led 6-0 with 8:53 still remaining in the first period.

Linebacker Dennis Phillips covered a Bull fumble on the third play following the kickoff, setting up Iowa Park's next TD at the Bridgeport 24. The Bulls' offense held a penalty on the first play, the Hawks covered the distance in only four plays, with fullback Randy Boutwell plunging over left guard the final four yards.

Coach Baugh called on his short-yardage back, Robbie Wilson, to attempt the two-point conversion. He went over the hole Boutwell had used, and Iowa Park had its second touchdown, only 2:04 after scoring its first.

Just before the end of the opening quarter, Greg Feltman blocked a Bull punt, giving the Hawks possession on the visitors' 37. But the first of two pass interceptions of the game by the Bulls thwarted that scoring opportunity.

Bridgeport then began a series of short passes that took the Bulls all the way to the Hawk four yard line. That's when the Mean Green defense really got tough.

From the four, Bridgeport was held to no gain on the first play, then had the ball moved two yards closer on a penalty against the Hawks.

Bridgeport advanced the ball to the one and throw an incompletion on the third down. Eric Whitman applied pressure on Bridgeport's Tommy Eambs on fourth down, forcing him to throw the ball well over the receiver's reach in the end zone, and the Hawks took over at the one.

On their final possession of the half, the Hawks marched 90 yards, requiring only 12 plays to score.

The touchdown was a 20-yard pass and run play from Sefcik to Scott Weaver, followed by an Adams extra point kick.

Bridgeport suffered another fumble early in the fourth period, and Feltman emerged from a pile-up with the ball at the Bulls' 31 yard line.

Tailback Danny Forman appeared to have scored on a 15-yard sprint around left end five plays later, but a 15-yard clipping penalty nullified the play.

Two downs later, Adams kicked a 36-yard field goal to complete the evening's scoring.

Coach Baugh gave his reserves experience the remaining 5:33, and

sophomore quarterback Jeff Huff directed the offense to the Bulls' nine yard line before the drive stalled.

Weaver went over the 100-yard mark for the second consecutive game. He carried the ball 23 times and produced 150 net yards. His two pass recipients for another 32 yards put him at 182 yards on the evening.

Forman rushed 43 yards in only four carries, and Boutwell was called on 12 times and netted 56 yards.

Biddy caught another pass besides his scoring play, and finished the evening with 45 yards.

Wilson was called on only twice to punt the ball away, and he averaged 40 yards for the evening.

Big defensive plays were credited to Phillips, Feltman, Whitman, Shawn Price, Wilson and Kevin Haney.



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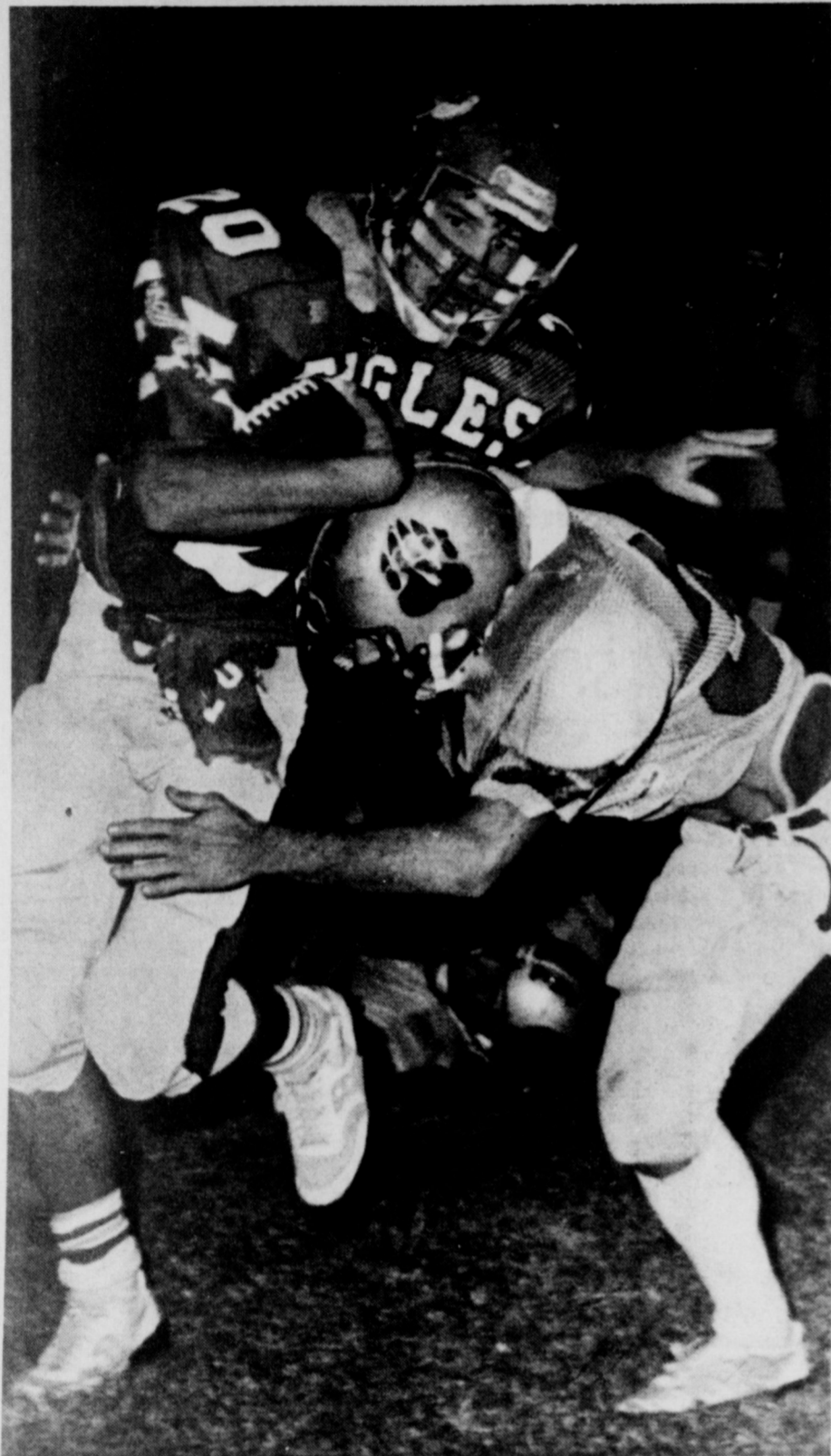
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Eagles humble Cubs to earn playoff slot



TIM O'BRIEN GAINS FIVE IN FIRST QUARTER ACTION

In the last game of the 1984 season for Holliday's Eagles, a talented Olney team utilized its big play ability to down the Big Red 16-10, catapulting the Cubs into the Class AA state playoffs as runners up behind Charlie Lott and Electra.

Miraculously, they won big game after big game until the semi-finals, in the process upsetting Mart in the quarterfinals 20-19. One week after Mart ended Lott's junior season 30-22.

In 1985, Lott is a year older and probably one-half step faster. He and his Tiger teammates managed to complete a second consecutive unbeaten regular season, and will represent the conference as champs.

But, in a change from last season's scenario, the Big Red placed itself in a position to equal, if not surpass, Olney's 1984 fortunes, via a 13-0 blanking of the Cubs in Eagle Stadium Friday night.

Playing close to mentor Don Lucy's pigskin philosophy of ball-control, run-oriented offense and tenacious, pad-popping defense, Holliday dominated the visiting Cubs almost to the point of embarrassment.

On offense, the Eagles ran 63 plays, 27 more than Olney, with workhorse Larry Kroh leading all rushers with 137 yards on 26 carries, 11 more

yards than the Cubs' total offensive output. Fellow back Tim O'Brien led 75 yards on 18 rushes of his own, as Holliday grounded out 284 total yards on the ground, at the same time eating up huge chunks of the scoreboard clock.

Eagle quarterback Pat Parker was given an opportunity to show off his passing talents to the home crowd, completing four of seven attempts for 95 additional yards, two of the passes very instrumental in the two scoring drives.

The Stonewall Gang, given explicit orders not to allow a Cub jersey into Holliday's end zone, performed with few breakdowns, and achieved its objective. The Cubs weren't allowed a first down until midway through the second quarter. Parker, O'Brien, Kroh, Les Dolberry, Daneil Meador, Bryan Box, Kerry Wise, John McGill, Bobby Pautsky, David Hoepfner, Kyle Bedford, and Garner Mahan all executed well all night, holding back Earl Fobbs and his teammates to 81 yards total rushing.

Cub signal caller Keith Daws must of thought he was living a nightmare, as he was sacked four times by Eagle linemen, completed only four of 11 attempts for 45 yards, and had three passes batted away. Daws led Olney in rushing with 34 yards, the majority coming on scrambles out of the pass pocket.

THE GAME

Olney found out early how receptive the Stonewall Gang would be, punting from its 12 after three plays after returning the opening kickoff to its 22.

Holliday drove from its 44 down to the Cub 23, on five runs by Kroh and one by O'Brien. However, a holding infraction brought the ball back to the 32. Two plays later, after a short gain, Parker attempted a 43-yard field goal attempt, but the effort fell short and to the right.

(A note before continuing: Holliday was flagged 10 times, about average, for 70 yards, while Olney was

penalized just twice, for 19. The penalties made for a much closer game than the score indicated, as potential scoring drives were interrupted for the Big Red on more than one occasion).

A fired-up Stonewall Gang returned to the field following the missed three-point try to force the Cubs into another punting situation after gaining seven yards in three plays.

Setting up shop at its 33 following the ensuing punt, the Big Red put together its first scoring drive of the night, going the 67 steps in 10 plays. Parker connected with tight end Box for a 45-yard pass to Olney's 17. Runs by O'Brien and Kroh took the ball down to the one, where Hoepfner bulled over for six points with 46 seconds left in the initial period. Parker's kick for the conversion sailed right of its mark, leaving the score at 6-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Olney was penalized half the distance to the goal on a personal foul call, and the Cubs found themselves in a hole at their nine. John "Too-Tall" McGill batted down Daws' pass attempt on a third-and-seven situation, forcing a punt once again, this one going 33 yards to the Olney 45.

Kroh carried first for a three-yard gain, then O'Brien swept around right end for 13 steps, and a first down at the 29. Two more runs by the duo netted only three yards, and Parker dropped back to pass on third down, connecting with Dolberry for a 23-yard gain at first down at the three.

Kroh carried twice from that point, finding paydirt from one yard out on the second attempt to extend the Eagle lead to 12-0. Parker found his mark on the point after kick, increasing the lead to 13-0, which stood as the final score.

Olney recorded its initial first down of the game following the kickoff, with Daws and Fobbs rushing for five and eight-yard gains to the Cub 38.

Wise sacked the Cub quarterback on the next play for a three-yard loss, but two rushes by Olney moved the chains for a second time at the Eagle 49.

Daws was swarmed by the Eagle linemen for another sack, this one for a seven-yard loss, and two subsequent rushes netted six yards, short of a first. Punting from midfield 34 yards, Dolberry returned it to the 21 where Holliday took possession once again.

Eating up the remaining four minutes of the second quarter, the Big Red drove down to the Cub 34 in eight plays, including a 12-yard pass completion from Parker to Kroh. However, Cub Jon Moore kept Holliday from building an even bigger lead before halftime, intercepting Parker in the end zone to kill the drive, with 32-seconds remaining before intermission.

SECOND HALF

Neither team could mount a sustained drive in the final two quarters. In the third, Meador pounced on a Cub fumble to give Holliday possession at the 49 of Olney. But, two plays later, Kroh turned the ball over on a fumble, at the Cub 39.

Olney mounted a short drive, fighting its way to Holliday's 38 before turning the ball over on downs.

Holliday took the ball from its 38 all the way down to the three of Olney, but an inspired Cub defense kept the Eagles out, regaining possession on downs late in the period.
