IOWA PARK TX Hawks, Steers clash Friday in Bi-District

It's been a long time since the Hawks have been in the state playoffs, but they've earned their place back in familiar territory once again, and their first opponent is against an old rival, Graham.

The two will meet for the Bi-District title at 8 p.m. Friday in Hawk Stadium, and a capacity crowd is anticipated.

Iowa Park advancing into the playoffs was the rule, rather than the exception, in the late 1960s. But since 1970, when they shared the state Class AA championship with Refugio, the Mean Green has experienced frustration and at times humiliation.

The Hawks' 24-0 victory Friday night, coupled with wins by Vernon and Springtown, produced a three-way tie for the Dist. 5-AAA title. The Hawks had beaten Vernon but lost to Springtown, and Vernon had beaten Springtown, resulting in identical 4-1 conference records.

In accordance to district rules, representatives of the three schools met Saturday, appropriately in Graham, to draw three slips of paper from a hat. Numbers one, two and three were on the slips, and those numbers indicated how the teams would stand, as far as representing the district in the playoffs.

Coach David Baugh drew the slip with "one" on it, and that meant Iowa Park would represent the district as the "winner." Vernon drew "two" and Springtown, drawing "three," does

Following the drawing, Baugh and Graham coach Mike Calcote flipped a coin to decide which home field would be used for the game, and again Baugh got what he wanted.

Graham finished second in Dist. 6-AAA behind Breckenridge and sports a record similar to Iowa Park. The Steers are 7-2-1 for the season and 4-1 in district. Iowa Park is 7-3 and 4-1.

The winner of tomorrow's game will advance to the Area level, to face Gatesville. Those two are to meet

The Steers and Hawks have met four common opponents this season, but the outcomes varied.

Both lost to Breckenridge: Graham

0-33 and Iowa Park 24-28 in the season opener. Both defeated Bridgeport: Graham 13-0 and Iowa

The Steers defeated Stamford, in the second game of the season, 34-18. Iowa Park lost two weeks later to Stamford, 7-21.

But Graham lost to Decatur, 6-10. and the Hawks defeated the Eagles

After a 0-0 tie to Class AAAA Stephenville in the season opener, Graham beat Stamford and then took measure of St. Mark's (a team that heat Bowie 24-21) 24-0.

In district play, the Steers ran wild over Merkel, 34-6, Clyde, 24-0, Abilene Wylie, 31-14 and Comanche. 54-13, losing only to the Buckaroos in the ninth game of the season, in a game they lost the ball four times on turnovers in the last half.

A mature team, with 22 seniors and 13 juniors, Graham has experience in the playoffs. The Steers won their district last year, completing the regular 1984 campaign 9-1, before running into Vernon in Bi-District.

The Lions used a 42-3 victory as a springboard that took them all the way to the semi-finals. It was that same Lion team the Hawks had tied

Despite having a dominance of seniors, it's the junior class that is providing Graham with outstanding players.

Wade Railsback, 6-1, 200, is a two-way starter who plays offensive and defensive tackle. "I don't even try to coach him. He's one of those that you just try to let them play," Coach Calcote said.

Leading rusher is another junior, Robert Loftin, 5-10 and 170, who has gained 1,207 this season. Paul Blunt has a couple of 100-plus games and quarterbacks Bruce Logan is considered a "very respectable" passer. They're both juniors.

Railsback is the only junior on the Mark Parry, 185; tackle Kevin Taylor, 203; guards, Dan Meacham, 198, and Greg Miller, 185, and center, Brent Millican, 170. Grant Galbraith is the fourth junior in the backfield. Defensively, down linemen with

Railsback are: Dan Meacham, 198 Sr., Kevin Ferguson, 210 Sr., and Scott Armstrong, 198 Jr. Linebackers include Reagan Bewley, 175 Sr., Matt McCracken, 220, Jr., and Miller, Corners are Chris Haves, 170 Sr., and Logan, Mark Hardin, 165 Jr. and Grant Goble, 149 Jr. are in the secondary.

"If you guys will play, you can beat them," Baugh told his players, "You worked hard to get where you are." He complimented the junior varsity

players for their support and encouraged them to continue helping the team to improve and prepare. The JV always runs the opponents' offense and defense as the team prepares for its game.

"In the playoffs, it's not always the

hest team that wins. Some get tired of playing and let up." Baugh told the Hawks. He encouraged them to be both physically and mentally ready by adding, "The winners are the ones who want it (victory)."

Iowa Park and Graham played each other regularly from 1970 through 1981, becoming district competitors after the first year, but the Steers dropped down to Class AAA in 1982. Iowa Park holds an edge of 8-4 in

that series over the Red and Blue. Graham took advantage of the Hawks during that three-year stretch when Iowa Park went 1-29 ('75-'77). and again in 1978.

The Hawks won the last three games of the series with consecutive shutouts, 42-0, 28-0 and 12-0.

Pre-game tickets on sale

easy to make, the way the markings are put on the sheet," it was explained. So, the difference in the vote after

the canvassing was: 303 for the Charter and 306 against the Charter. Precinct 33, according to the canvass figures, voted 50 for the Charter and 88 against the Charter. Precinct 32 voting remained unchanged: 253 for and 218 against.

Mayor Hunter explained the only way for a recount to be forced would be through the courts by someone filing a suite against the mayor. The city council cannot initiate such action, he explained.

"If someone wanted to sue me (to force a recount)," Hunter said with a big smile, "I sure wouldn't object." OTHER BUSINESS

Other highlights of Monday's meeting included the council hearing request to waive paving requirements and dumping costs for a housing project, and a discussion of a method for relieving residents in Country Hills Addition from flooding

problems. Verris Wardell of Vernon asked that the council waive its requirements to pave the 700 block of West Aldine with concrete, as well as charges for dumping trees and other

materials from a block and half of land

He explained he is not a contractor, but invested in purchasing the property a few years ago. Now he wants to sell the lots for homes to be

Because of the small creek where Second Street would be, and can't be opened, he said Aldine would be a dead end street used only by residents. Trucks for contractors would be the heaviest to ever be on the block, and asphalt would do as well and cost less than the city's required concrete.

Since an estimated one-sixth of the land cleared is dedicated for city street and alleys, he asked that a charge of \$15 per truck load be waived, because he had cleared the

city's portion of the property. Hunter said the concrete street

requirement for all new construction was desirable because of maintenance costs experienced on asphalt. He said the city usually has to work on asphalt every seven years, but concrete repairs usually are not necessary at least 20 years after being laid.

When Wardell gave figures of cost difference between asphalt and concrete, council members suggested he look at Iowa Park's old asphalt specifications before using any figures given by a Vernon contractor. No decision was made on requests

for either waiver, but Wardell is expected to be at the meeting Nov. 25 for a response. Shirley Rains, local realtor, said

Trustees okay plans for additional rooms

Iowa Park school trustees approved a plan to add four classrooms at Kidwell Elementary during Tuesday night's regularlyscheduled board meeting.

In addition, they approved work on the gymnasium at the Bradford campus, heard a report on the 1984-85 school audit, and received a complaint from a local businessman concerning a recent bid purchase.

The board, faced with providing adequate space to meet mandated teacher/pupil ratio, has been studying various plans more than six months for the Kidwell campus.

Members, after discussing a new drawing with architect Don Daugherity, which had been altered from a drawing offered last month after teacher input was received. okayed the estimated \$216,000 cost project.

It had already been decided to build four 24x32-foot classrooms onto the west end of the south wing at the building. The teacher input was to add restrooms for the students. because of the distance to existing facilities, as well as retain some of the

storage space of the earlier drawing. The school is to advertise for

construction bids as soon as Daugherity has the plans and specs

Work to stop infiltration of water into the Bradford gymnasium was explained by Daughterity. The project was earlier approved when the cost was estimated at \$2,000. However, after Daugherity inspected the structure with a contractor, the cost estimate was raised to some

Part of the work can be done by school personnel, it was decided, to

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
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As I See It....

I'm really interested to see if anyone will come forth and sue Mayor Tim Hunter to get a recount of the Home Rule Charter election, since there was only a three-vote difference.

It's not even the end of the year, and I've already learned something in

I'm attempting to be funny, rather than pompous. But I learned something at the city council Monday that I'd wondered about ever since city sales taxes began in Texas.

It seems our legislators, using all their wisdom when writing the bill that set up city sales taxes, decided to make it easy for those firms that do business in more than one business.

The sales tax collected here, for instance, when paid for cable television service is actually credited to Burkburnett. That's a quirk in the law, because the business office making its report to the state just turns in its money collected, and the

state credits Burkburnett with the tax when its rebated.

The cable tv people don't have anything to do with it, you need to understand.

But the same thing is true, say when one of those office supply salesmen from Wichita Falls comes over here and sells one of our businesses pencils, tape, paper, envelopes, etc. That sales tax is rebated to Wichita Falls.

I'll credit Raymond Greenwood, the local cable manager, for his pledge to work it out that Iowa Park will get its sales taxes due for his firm's service.

Raymond said he would assist, also, in every way possible to get the law changed so that each community in the state gets its rightful tax money

Mayor Tim Hunter said the Texas Municipal League was starting a project to get the law changed.

Auditor Navland Smith told the board the school ". . . did not quite collect what it estimated, but didn't spend as much as anticipated."

He pointed out the school's balance at the start of the year was \$1,786,000, and at the end of the year the school had \$1,721,000, including \$321,000 in checking and \$1.4-million on certificates of deposit.

Smith complimented the school for being a "good, financial sound district," and added that a good effort had been made to cut the delinquent taxes from \$40,509 to \$37,800.

Bill Bates, local Chevrolet dealer, appeared before the board to object to its action taken last month in approving a bid from Shaw Motor Co.

Bates based his objection on the fact that his pickup was lower than the price given by Shaw, but board members pointed out the Shaw pickup was a larger pickup and "more

that the board should compare "oranges with oranges," and the lower bid should have been accepted. He said the district's costs could be cut and increasing taxes wouldn't be necessary if the board accepted the low bids on purchases.

"The consistance of action by this board does not, in my opinion, show good management of taxpayer

Trustee Jimmy Howell told Bates he could have submitted more than one size pickup for bid, because of the motor size range included in the bid package.

In other business, the oath of office was administered to Jerald Brown, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the last Ray Hicks; trustees approved collision insurance on its six latest model buses, and set a school vehicle use policy.



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



Iowa Park's Hawks earned their first berth in the state playoffs since 1970 by shutting out Bridgeport here Friday

The win featured an explosive offensive showing by the Hawks early in the game, supported by a demonstration of tenacious defensive the end zone, but humiliated Bridgeport's offense by holding the visitor's running game to a minus 15

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
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


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Eagles humble Cubs to earn playoff slot



TIM O'BRIEN GAINS FIVE IN FIRST QUARTER ACTION

In the last game of the 1984 season for Holliday's Eagles, a talented Olney team utilized its big play ability to down the Big Red 16-10, catipulting the Cubs into the Class AA state playoffs as runners up behind Charlie Lott and Electra.

Miraculously, they won big game after big game until the semi-finals, in the process upsetting Mart in the quarterfinals 20-19. One week after Mart ended Lott's junior season

In 1985, Lott is a year older and probably one-half step faster. He and his Tiger teammates managed to complete a second consecutive unbeaten regular season, and will represent the conference as champs.

But, in a change from last season's scenario, the Big Red placed itself in a position to equal, if not surpass, Olnev's 1984 fortunes, via a 13-0 blanking of the Cubs in Eagle Stadium Friday night.

Playing close to mentor Don Lucy's pigskin philosophy of ball-control, run-oriented offense and tenacious, pad-popping defense, Holliday dominated the visiting Cubs almost to the point of embarrassment.

On offense, the Eagles ran 63 plays, 27 more than Olney, with workhorse Larry Krob leading all rushers with 137 vards on 26 carries, 11 more

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
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
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
