Burnett Library open Tuesday

After 10 weeks of no library facilities being available to Iowa Parkans, the Tom L. Burnett Memorial Library is supposed to be open to the public next Tuesday.

City Administrator James Barrington said yesterday morning, "Unless something drastic happens, it will be open the 14th."

The old library was closed Nov.

1 to prepare for the move, and the new facility was anticipated to be ready to open Jan. 2. However, unforeseen delays extended the opening until next week.

Barrington said the library will have new hours, determined from responses to a survey about two years ago.

The library will be open from 8

a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays; 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesdays and Fridays; 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays, and closed Sundays and Mondays.

The administrator admitted hours may be changed a couple of times in the future, should more input from the public indicate different hours are desired.

City, school meetings are slated next week

After five-week respites, both the city council and school board will meet next week.

The council is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers, and trustees will begin their meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building. Both have provided tentative agendas.

Tom L. Burnett Memorial Library will take up considerable time of the council. First, there is the official acceptance of the contractor's work, and then aldermen are to discuss a proposal to use a drawing of the building in the city's logo for letterheads and other printed matter.

Additionally, aldermen will consider insurance coverage on the library, which currently has \$500,000 on structure and \$100,000 on contents, according to Administrator James Barrington.

Architect Don Daugherty has been hired by Lakeview Church of God to draw plans for the new church already under construction. The council told church representatives certain building plans must be

provided, to determine what portions of the building code might be waived and also to give inspectors something to determine if work is being done properly.

The council will consider continuing with a proposal to sell certificates of obligation to finance a project to correct flooding problems in Country Hills Addition. The project could cost as much as \$500,000.

Aldermen will discuss a project to update the main water line on Wall which serves the south side of town. A larger line with control valves has been approved, but starting time has never been determined.

Two changes in the city building code will be considered. One, having to do with the electrical code, was tabled for more work by the Electrical Board and is ready for action. The other, mandated by the state legislature, would require inspection of all air conditioning installations.

A proposal to replace the three-year-old copying machine at city hall

will be considered. Barrington said the present machine has produced some 116,000 copies.

SCHOOL BOARD

School trustees will consider extension of Supt. Glen Mitchell's contract, after holding an evaluation of his work since being hired last spring.

Consideration of the superintendent's contract has traditionally been done in January by the board. This is followed by all other administration and key personnel contracts in February and teachers in March.

Also on the tentative agenda are: enrollment report; electing new personnel; adoption of 25 updated policies, and presentation of a cost study to repair the track at Hawk Stadium.

Three stores have new owners

Three businesses changed ownerships, another opened in a new location and another closed, during the past week in Iowa Park.

New owners have been announced for Settle Drug, H & R Block and Easy Shop Food Store.

Settle Drug, the oldest retail store under the same ownership, has been purchased by Joe Hughes, according to A.K. "Bumps" Settle, effective Jan. 1.

Hughes, who was raised on a cotton farm between Davidson and Frederick in Oklahoma, has been a pharmacist since 1974. He began working in Arlington after graduation from Southwestern at Weatherford, Okla., during which time he worked

with three chain operations and the past two years with an independent.

The Hughes family, including his wife, Patti, and their daughters Shellye, seven, and Sharla, five, now reside at 822 N. Park.

Hughes said there would be no changes in the store's operation, including credit accounts, the name, nor its employees. "The only change is a younger man in charge," Settle commented.

Settle, who worked for Walgreens in Wichita Falls 21 years before purchasing Berry Drug in 1962 and moving to the store's present location in 1972, says he is committed to continue at the store 30 days, after which he will work part

time there and in Wichita Falls.

H&R Block, located in Park West Shopping Center, will continue to operate under that franchise name, but the business is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Hutchison.

The Hutchisons have moved here from Dodge City, Kan., where Mrs. Hutchison was a "satellite" owner 17 years and he was a district manager for the firm, according to Dwen McCorkle, district manager.

New owners of the Easy Shop on Johnson Road are Mr. and Mrs. Keith Fisher of Ninneka, Okla., who plan to change the firm's name to K&K Quick Stop.

Keith has been in the grocery business and built homes before moving here. His wife, Kay, says the couple has a seventh-grade daughter, Cassie, 12, and the family now lives at 1304 Mary.

They are planning a grand opening promotion in the near future.

The business relocated is Family Hair Styles, owned by Mrs. Ken Turman, closed its doors in the 100 block of West Cash recently, and has re-opened in the former city library building on East Park.

Otis Scobee closed his Scobee's II the first of the year, but continues to operate Scobee's I. The store closed is the former Cabe's.

He said he has accepted employment with Berend Baros, and will join the firm Jan. 20 at the firm's store on Seymour Highway in Wichita Falls, where he will begin management training.

He will continue to reside in Iowa Park.

Commodity distribution set Jan. 16

USDA Commodity Distribution will be Thursday, Jan. 16, at First Christian Church from noon to 6 p.m. Food to be given are butter, cheese, flour and non-fat dry milk.

All persons wanting to receive food must apply and be certified. Eligibility is determined by income: a single person household under 60 can make up to \$569 a month, over

60, \$722; two people under 60, \$764, over 60, \$969. For larger families add \$195 per person under 60 and \$247 per person over 60.

Families who receive AFDC, Food Stamps or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) are automatically eligible. They must bring their cards with them to apply. All others must bring identification.

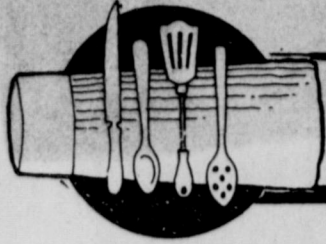
Also shortly after midnight Sunday, a similar arrest was made of Robert Jason Maxwell, 21. He was turned over to the Department of Public Safety.

Belenda (Mrs. Terry) Walls describes Peanut Butter Chews as her children's favorite cookie. The peanut is one of the most popular ingredients in both candy and cookie recipes today.

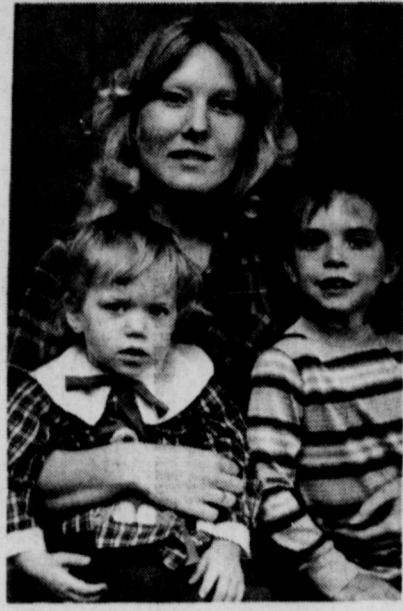
There has been some dispute as to what country the peanut is a native of, but it has been found in mummy tombs in Peru where it is pictured on Chimnu pottery. The earliest reference to peanuts in the United States dates back to 1791 or 1792 when Thomas Jefferson was known to have grown them.

George Washington Carver once demonstrated the versatility of the peanut to a group of Alabama businessmen by serving them a meal based solely on the peanut. The great promoter of the peanut discovered 300 uses for it, and when he was admitted to the Columbia University Hall of Fame, an article in the New York Times stated that the peanut was 2,000 years old.

The former Belenda Sharp was graduated from Wichita Falls High School and worked as an accounting clerk for Bailey Meissner Co.

She is a member of the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church where she teaches a Sunday school class of three to five year olds. She is an assistant room mother at Kidwell Elementary School. saucepan. Mix and pour over the loaves: 1 can cream of mushroom soup, 1 can French onion soup. Cover and cook on top of stove for 1 hour, turning meat loaves every 15 minutes. For more gravy double the soup.

TERRY'S FAVORITE PECAN PIE

3 eggs
2/3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/3 cup margarine or butter, melted
1 cup corn syrup
1 cup broken pecans

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Prepare pastry. Beat eggs, sugar, salt, margarine and syrup by hand. Stir in pecans. Pour into pastry-lined pie plate. Bake until set 40-50 minutes. Cool completely before serving.

CHILI RICE

1 cup rice
1/4 cup butter or margarine
2 teaspoons salt
2 teaspoons chili powder

Brown rice in butter or margarine. Add salt and chili powder. Pour in enough hot water to cover one inch above rice. Bring to a boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer about 30 minutes.

MEXICAN HOT DISH

1 lb. ground beef
1 Tbsp. salt
1 medium onion, chopped
1 small can taco sauce
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 soup can milk
1 Tbsp. taco mix
1/2 lb. grated cheddar or colby cheese
tortillas

Brown meat with salt and

chopped onion; drain. Add taco sauce, soup, milk and taco mix; stir and simmer 3-5 minutes. Cover bottom of casserole dish with broken pieces of tortillas. Pour over part of the meat sauce, then sprinkle with part of the grated cheese. Continue layering until all of the ingredients are used, ending with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes.

PEANUT BUTTER CHEWS

1/2 cup Crisco
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 1/2 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking soda

Cream together: Crisco, brown sugar, peanut butter, salt and egg. Combine dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture; mix well. Shape into little balls. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet; flatten by pressing criss-cross with tines of fork. Bake at 375 degrees for about 10 minutes.

8 large white onions
2 large sweet peppers
1/2 cup salt
5 cups cider vinegar
5 cups sugar
2 Tbsp. mustard seed

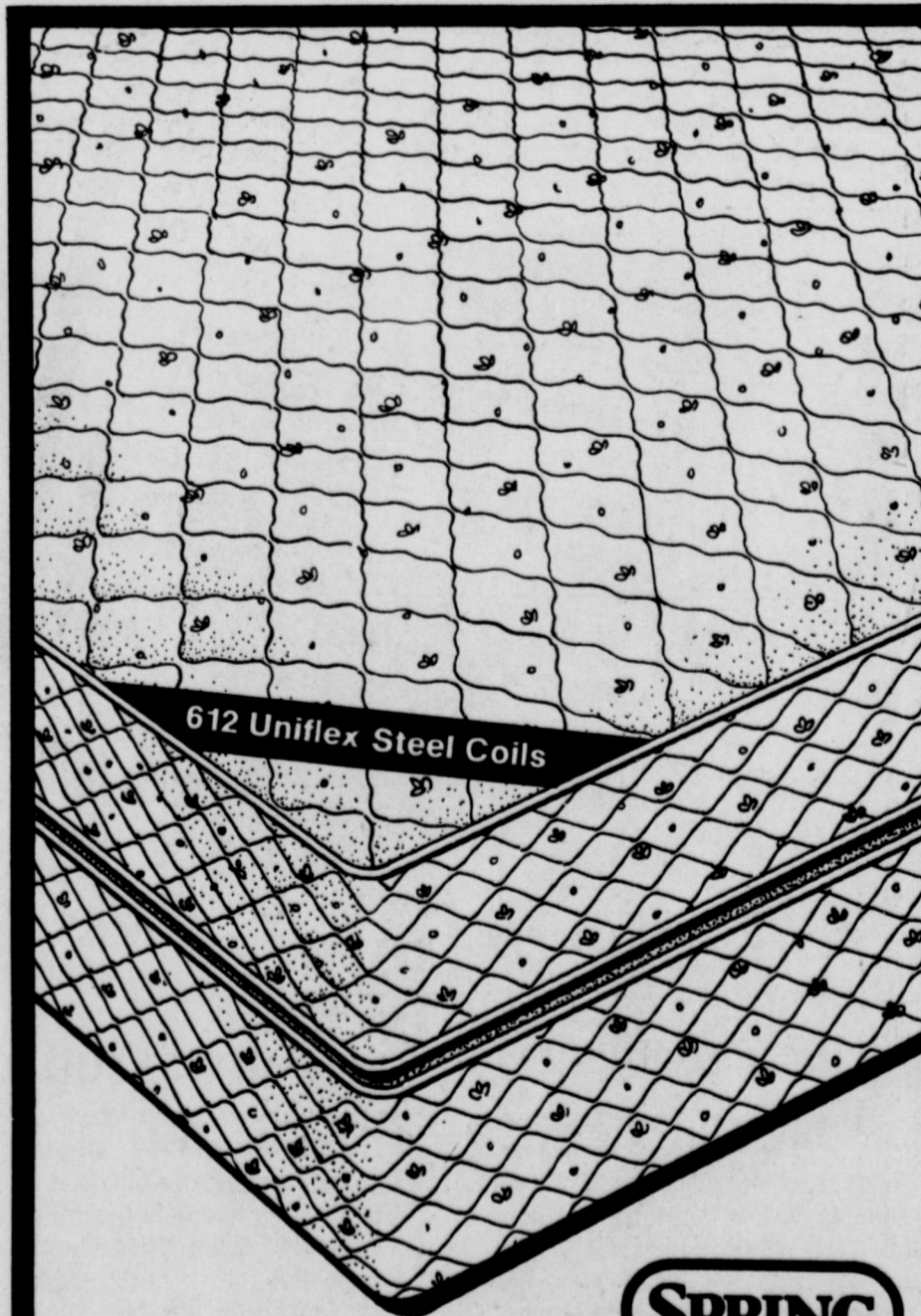

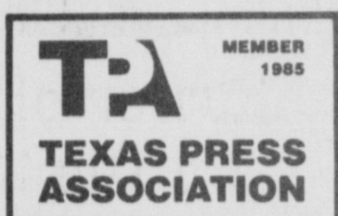

DIETARY OAT BRAN REDUCES TOTAL CHOLESTEROL LEVEL

Oat bran has the potential to diminish a major risk factor for atherosclerosis by lowering blood cholesterol levels, according to Dr. Kenneth J. Storch of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Clinical Research Center in Cambridge.

He reported that water-soluble fiber, in the form of 50 g per day of oat bran, significantly decreased total serum cholesterol levels in healthy young adults.

Wheat bran (which has a lesser content of water-soluble fiber) has not been found to affect serum cholesterol levels significantly, according to Dr. Storch.

The 50 g of oat bran can be consumed as a single bowl of hot oat bran.

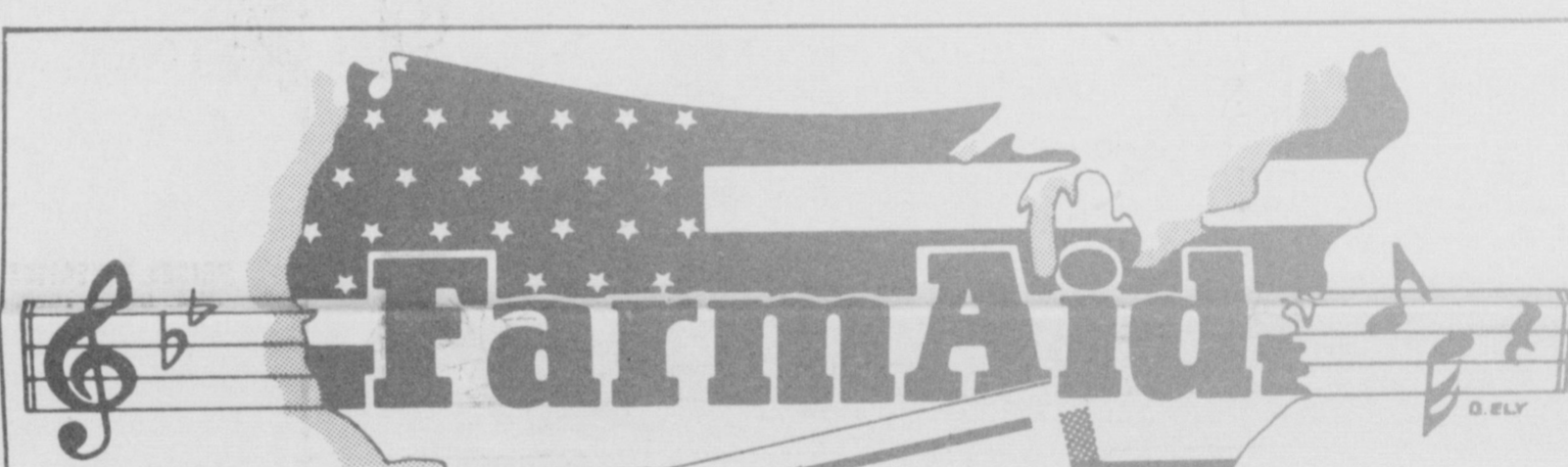
Ingestion of oat bran, in a college student volunteer group, resulted in a 5% decrease in total cholesterol and a significant decrease in low-density lipoprotein cholesterol.

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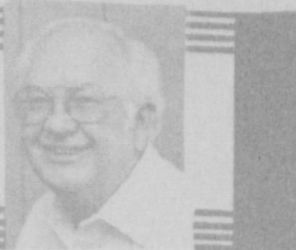

As I See It....

I appreciated Cong. Beau Boulter's visit to Iowa Park Tuesday, our conversation and then his talk before the Noon Lions Club.

With a district as large as his, as many towns in the district and organizations to whom he could talk,

it was nice of him to schedule Iowa Park.

I have little doubt Boulter speaks as he believes. He tells you when he disagrees with the president, even though both are Republicans. He'll tell you he doesn't like the new tax bill, that the farm bill isn't good, and he has little regard for most members of the congress.

Case in point, he explained the farm bill didn't pass until December, which is months and months late for farmers to decide what they're going to do for 1986 crops, because "Congress is the most inefficient body on earth."

He said members "lack political courage" to vote on bills with the nation as a whole in mind.

Beau said he believes oil prices will stabilize, but admitted "We're in very, very tough times."

And can you believe it, an elected official from Washington stood before the group and agreed with Mayor Tim Hunter, that congress should not mandate programs to be carried out, if it's not going to fund those programs.

It'll take more than a year to determine Boulter's effectiveness in congress, whether he will continue to be an independent thinker working for his district and continues to be conservative and straight-talking.

But as of one year in office, what I've seen, heard and read about Beau Boulter, I like him.

TEEN SEXUALITY AWARENESS SEMINARS

The Wichita County 4-H and Youth Committee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will sponsor two seminars dealing with teenage sexuality in the Wichita Falls area Jan. 9 and 23. The seminars will begin at 7 p.m. and will be held at the 4-H Auditorium at 1626 Midwestern Parkway in Wichita Falls.

"The statistics are surprising for Wichita Falls," points out Bethann Oswald Wichita County Extension Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "ten percent of the teenage females in Wichita Falls are expected to become pregnant before they graduate from high school. Five lives are touched either emotionally or physically by each pregnancy."

Two seminars will address this alarming problem in our community. The first on Jan. 9 will deal with parents awareness of teen sexuality.

Eloise Garcia of Wilson Family Planning Clinic of Wichita Falls will cover topics such as statistics for Wichita Falls and Texas, teen service provided by Wilson Family Planning Clinic, communication between adolescents and parents, the responsibilities and pressures faced by area youth, and parents responsibilities in educating youth. All parents in the Wichita Falls area are encouraged to attend this seminar.

The Jan. 23 seminar will afford area teens the opportunity to learn about topics such as: basic anatomy, assertiveness and decision making, dating attitudes, teen-pregnancy, VD and contraception featuring the film "Hope is Not a Method," provided by Wilson Family Planning Clinic.

The Teen Seminar will provide isolated question and answer periods for both sexes. This seminar will be under the direction of Garcia, Donnie Frazier, MSU nursing student and County Extension Agents Oswald and Donnie Peters.

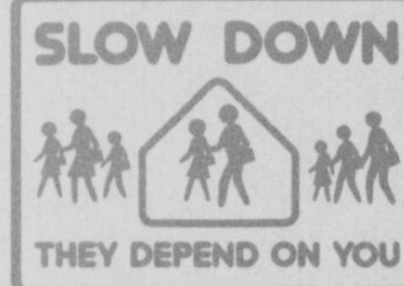

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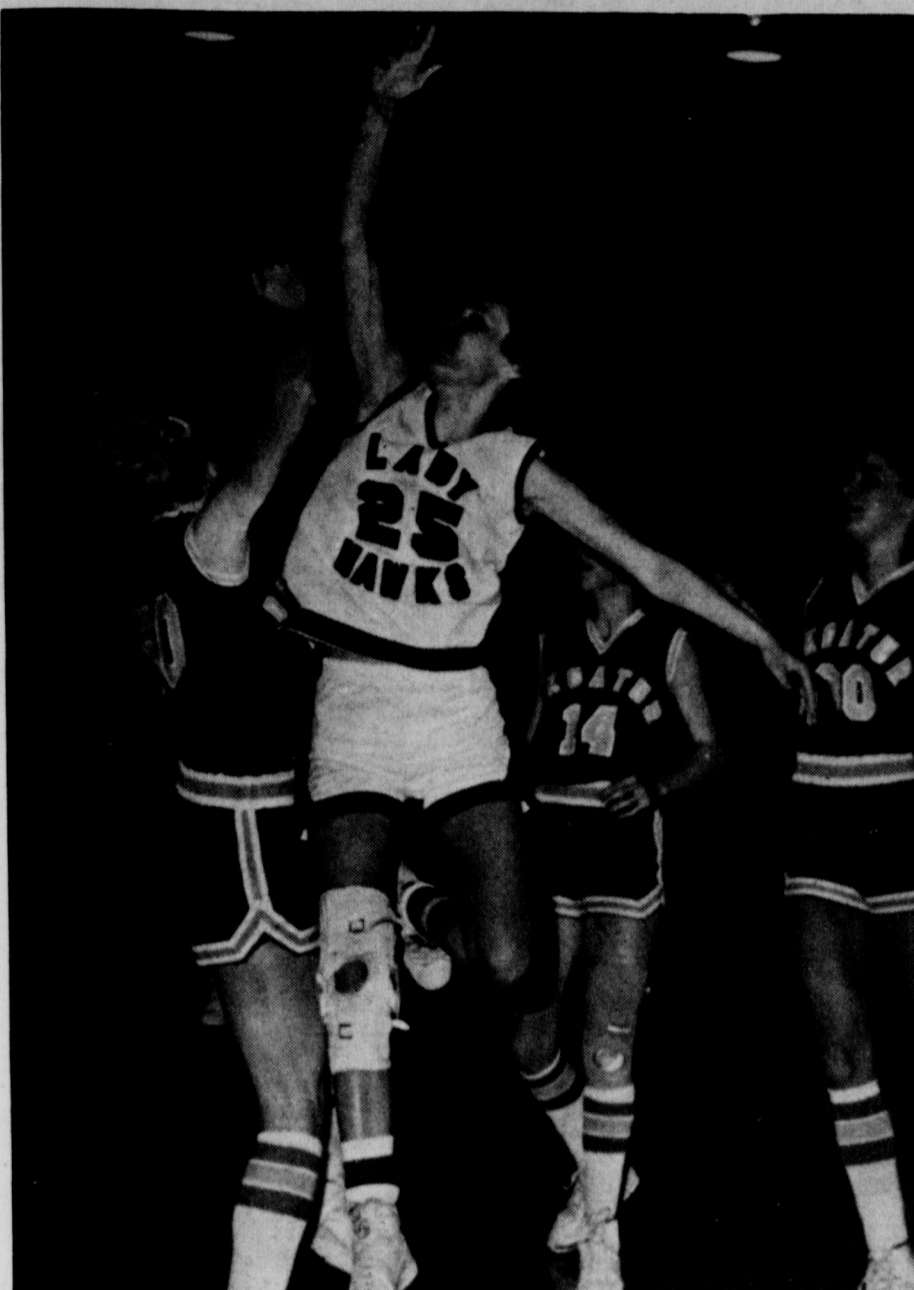
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CINDY CLANTON FOULED DRIVING TO BASKET

Iowa Park Junior High girls swept a double header with Olney, and the seventh grade also took measure of City View.

The seventh grade is to see action against Vernon at 4 this afternoon, playing in the City View tournament.

Against Olney, the seventh grade won an easy 31-18 victory, but the

eighth grade was pressed to a 28-20 margin. Against City View, Iowa Park won 22-17.

Chasity Sims and Julie Short each scored eight points against Olney, and Short led seventh grade scoring with the same eight points against City View.

Ginger Echols had 10 points and Angie Turner eight in the eighth grade game.

Lady Hawks share district lead, 2-0

Holding a share of the Dist. 5-AAA lead with Vernon going into their third game, the Lady Hawks will host Springtown at 6 this evening.

Coach Ray Sefcik's club knocked off Bowie in the district opener Friday, and then beat Decatur here Tuesday to remain undefeated in conference play along with the defending state champs from Vernon.

But both the team's victories have been cliffhangers.

A free shot by Lisa Selby, after having missed her other three attempts earlier, with three seconds remaining gave the Lady Hawks a 54-53 district opener victory.

Bowie had led 12-6 after the first quarter and 25-24 at the half, but Iowa Park came back to lead 40-36

going into the final period. In the last period, Iowa Park held eight-point leads a couple of times, but the hosts cut the margin late in the game.

Cindy Clanton led scoring with 15 points, while Crystal Lewis had 10.

In Tuesday night's game here against Decatur, the win wasn't as easy as the 43-40 final score might indicate.

Clanton sank a pair of free shots with 1:20 remaining in the game to give the Lady Hawks a 41-40 lead. Decatur missed the front end of a one-and-one free shot with 25 seconds on the clock. Then, with 11 seconds to go, Shelly Allen missed her chance at a free shot, Decatur got the ball at their end of the court, but Clanton stole it.

After the steal, Clanton was fouled, and put the two additional points on the board, giving her 17 for the night. Sherri Schweiss canned 13.

Though polls mean little until the trophies are in the case, these two wins by the Lady Hawks give an indication of their strength.

At the time they beat Bowie, at Bowie, the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches poll had the Lady Hawks ranked fifth in the state, with a 16-3 record.

That same poll ranked Vernon, with a 10-4 record, seventh. The same night Iowa Park beat Bowie, Vernon was pressed into overtime before defeating Decatur 57-54.

The Lady Hawks travel to Bridgeport Tuesday, and to Vernon the following Friday.

The Hawks lost Thursday night to the Wichita Falls High Coyotes, 77-51, and again Tuesday, 61-46, at Archer City. In both games, one to three starters were missing because of injuries.

But Coach Earnie Reusch is hoping to field a sound club now he has finished his non-conference schedule and takes to the title road.

Tomorrow's game is slated to

begin at 7:30 p.m. in Hawk gymnasium. Tuesday, they travel to Bridgeport and the following Friday to Vernon.

The Coyotes jumped all over the Hawks in their first quarter, taking a commanding 22-7 lead. Both teams evened out in the second and third frames, 18-18 and 14-14, but the Coyotes outscored the Hawks 23-12 in the last quarter.

Stephen Bidy led Hawk scorers with 20 points and Steve Allen canned 10.

Archer City, with only two losses (one of them at the hands of

the Hawks) in 19 starts, found their home court to their liking and led 27-16 at the half. Iowa Park's only good period was the fourth, when the Hawks outscored their hosts 22-16.

Biddy was also high for Iowa Park in that game, scoring 21.

Going into district play, the Hawks have a 7-8 record.

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YEAR IN REVIEW

Change is key to Holliday's year

Holliday saw many changes in 1985. In April, Allsup's Convenience store was robbed at gunpoint, spurring the city council's decision to hire an additional police officer, and for the first time in Holliday's history, two law enforcement officers were serving the public.

There was a tremendous change in city government with three city administrators serving during the year, a new mayor being elected in April, and two new faces on the city council.

Holliday school officials felt the impact of House Bill 72, also known as the school reform bill, as they adjusted personnel and policies to conform with the bill. As several teachers submitted resignations, trustees were forced to hire in order to fill the positions, plus do additional hiring in order to meet the guidelines of HB 72.

City water customers saw two rate increases, one in August and the other in November, with the total water rate for city residents being increased \$5 for the first 2,000 gallons used, and a 55-cent increase on each additional thousand used.

JANUARY

State Representative Charles Fennell was sworn into office after being re-elected in November of 1984. He ranks fourth in seniority of the 150-member House of Representatives. He was then appointed to the House Appropriations Committee, responsible for the state budget. Fennell named Suzanne Haterius as the administrative aide in his Holliday district office. The Holliday Volunteer Firemen elected Curt Dolberry as president and Hershel McDaniel as fire chief of the department. Deborah Jackson was chosen as a member of the All-Area Band. All-Region Orchestra and the All-Region Band, and headed the list of four high school Eagle band members chosen to the A. AA. and AAA All-District Band. Becky Cullers, Terry Varnell and Darrin Carlton also earned places on the All-District Band.

FEBRUARY

Holliday's first city administrator, Jim Hamill, left his position of four years with the city for a new career at Sheppard Air Force Base. A major water system improvement began when a \$160,000 grant was dispensed. The bulk of the project was to be the replacement of aging cast iron water lines with a superior pipe. Holliday school board approved changes in eligibility requirements for student participating in extracurricular activities requiring those students to be passing in order to participate. The board also voted to have two eleven-month personnel units for vocational agriculture programs for the 1985-86 school year. The lack of funds for the program was credited to SB 72. School classes and a city council meeting were postponed or cancelled due to icy conditions. Glenn Woods was chosen as the Fireman of the Year for the Holliday Volunteer Fire Department at their annual fireman's banquet. The Holliday Eagle boy's basketball team ended the season as they lost the runner-up spot in District 9-AA to the Henrietta Bearcats 64-61. Mrs. Noma Campbell was named by St. Jude Children's Research Hospital to act as chairman for their annual bike-a-thon.

MARCH

John Lewallen Construction Company of Holliday was awarded the contract for the water system improvement project in the city with a bid of \$18,743, the lowest of the three bids submitted. Holliday school board accepted the resignations of band director Mark Cartwright, assistant director Mark Bannister and girl's athletic coach Jeannie Wilson. Additional hiring of elementary personnel was done in order to meet the guidelines of HB 72. All middle school teachers and aides were hired back and Jake Cottrell was named as principal and teacher of the 1985-86 school year. Teachers, aides and secretaries at the high school were also hired back for another year. The city council hired Gary Jones as the new city administrator to replace the position vacated by Jim Hamill. Seniors Gradlin Franks and Kristi Martin were named Mr. and Miss Holliday High School. The Texas Schoolboy Poll ranked pre-season Eagle baseball team sixth in the state.

APRIL

In city elections, Holliday voters elected Don H. Duke mayor with a defeat over veteran alderman John A. Goforth. For Place 1 on the council, Roy Pursur defeated incumbent Jimmy Willis. For Place 5 on the council, vacated by Goforth in his bid for mayor, Melvin Bills won the position against opponents Leon Addison and H. Doris Owens. Alderman Jim Virdell was the only incumbent to successfully seek re-election, defeating Glenn R. Woods and write-in candidate George Kriedler. In the at-large school board elections, Board President Tommy Mankins was the only incumbent re-elected to another term as trustee. Jack Parkey III and Carl Nichols won the remaining open seats against incumbent Larry Fennell, Durhl Caussey, Don McClendon and incumbent Larry Lilley. Allsup's Convenience Store was robbed at gunpoint as two men, one armed with a shotgun, took a small amount of cash and merchandise before fleeing.
