Students, however, frequently hand in incomplete assignments, incorrectly done assignments, or no assignments at all. Failure to turn in homework is one main reason for students. DIET FOR HYPERTENSION
Some people with hypertension may be able to stop taking their medication if they lose weight and reduce their sodium intake.
According to a multi-center study headed by Dr. Herbert G. Langford of the University of Mississippi Medical Center Jackson, withdrawal from anti-hypertension medication can be done if the patient, who has been taking medication for five years or more, loses about 10 pounds or restricts intake of sodium.

Diet control was all that was needed to keep blood pressure within the normal limits among long-term, mild to moderate hypertensives who were studied in this trial.
