The annual Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce banquet, largest social event of the year in the community, will get underway at 6:30 p.m. Saturday in the high school cafeteria.

On tap is entertainment, a big steak dinner, the commanding officer of Sheppard Air Force Base and recognition of four individuals.

Entertainment, featuring a pianist and the award-winning high school choir, will last until the meal is served at 7.

Saturday's menu, provided by the MuleSkinners, is charcoal-cooked steak, slaw, baked potato, hot rolls and pie.

Maj. Gen. Richard W. Phillips, who was a fighter pilot in Vietnam among numerous other duties since his graduation from West Point, has not announced the topic of his talk.

The general is a command pilot with more than 5,000 flying hours, including 211 combat missions in F-4s while in Southeast Asia. He is a native of Harrisburg, Pa.

One of the more popular portions of the annual banquet is the presentation of awards to citizens who, in the opinion of an anonymous committee, contributed greatly to the community during the past year and years.

The original recipient of the Outstanding Citizen of the Year was Mrs. D.O. James, in 1971. She was followed by Dr. Gordon Clark, 1972; Mrs. Frank Harlin, 1973; Ralph Beall, 1974; Wayne House, 1975; Darrell Dick, 1976; Lita Watson, 1977, and Mrs. Charlie Lee in 1978.

State requires voting booths

Voters in Iowa Park city and school elections will finally have some privacy when marking their ballots during elections.

Instead of voters sitting at tables where no dividers were available, booths will now be available for marking of ballots.

Myra McDaniel, secretary of state, mailed a memorandum Dec. 11 to all political subdivisions informing them of a change in the law, requiring voting booths, would become effective Jan. 1, 1986.

The memorandum states ". . . unscreened tables will no longer be

Rules for "voting stations" are: "Sec. 51.032.

VOTING BOOTHS. (a) Voting booths that provide privacy for voters while marking their ballots shall be provided at each polling place.

"(b) The entrance of the voting

Tough week for basketball

It was a rough week for Iowa Park varsity basketball teams: four games, four losses.

The Lady Hawks lost 48-66 Friday to Vernon, closing out the first half of round robin play in sole possession of second place and dropping out of the top 10 standings in the state after only one week in the rankings.

Then in the opener of the second half of the district schedule, the girls lost Tuesday 54-67 to Bowie, the team they had beaten 54-53 earlier.

Vernon manhandled the Hawks, 48-66, but the boys came back for a close one against Bowie, bowing 46--

The Vernon girls, defending state champions, finished the first half of play undefeated. Iowa Park was 4-1, Bowie and Decatur were 2-3 and Bridgeport and Springtown finished 1-

Vernon cinched a playoff berth by winning the first half. Now the other five girls' teams are battling for the other playoff position.

The Lady Lions had it all their way Friday, jumping out to a 20-7 first-quarter lead and extending that to 43-18 by the half. The hosts' fullcourt press caused repeated turnovers and fouls by the Lady Hawks.

Lori Allen was the only Iowa Parkan to finish in double figures, scoring 10 points. Sherri Schweiss and Laura Parker each had eight.

Iowa Park led 14-13 after the first quarter against Bowie, though the Lady Hawks had led 10-5 at one

Bowie took command in the second period to hold command 34-26 at the half and 49-34 going into the final quarter. The Lady Hawks cut the lead to eight points, 51-59, with 1:52 left in the game, but Bowie scored nine points from the foul line after that to insure the win.

Schweiss finished with 15,

The Hawks were hitting from the outside in their game at Vernon, and eventhough the Lions were much taller, trailed only 25-29 at the half.

But depth, and more especially control of the backboards, made the hosts more than the shorter Hawks could handle. Stephen Biddy had the hot hand for Iowa Park, scoring 19 points, and Ray Sefcik canned 11. Both were hitting well on long

After trailing 22-26 at the half, the Jackrabbits changed their transitional play, fast breaking on rebounds and inbounds and beating the Hawks to the other end of the floor. It paid off and Bowie trailed only 38-40 going into the final

Again facing a much taller team, the Hawks lost control of the backboards and trailed 44-49 with 1:11 left in the game. Mike Sikes made it 46-49 with 43 seconds, but the Jackrabbits' stall, which they went into at the 3:33 mark, effectively kept the ball out of the Hawks' hands and forcing them to foul.

Bowie missed a free shot with 15 seconds remaining, but put the game out of reach with two seconds, again at the charity line.

Biddy was Iowa Parks only double digit scorer with 14 points. Steve Johnson had eight and Sefcik

"(c) A voting booth may be used without approval of the secretary of state if the booth:

"(1) is rectangular, with at least three sides of opaque material beginning not more than three feet from the floor and extending to a height of at least six feet from the

"(2) has inside dimensions at least 22 inches wide and 30 inches deep; and

"(3) has a shelf for writing." Wichita County acquired voting machines several years ago, but the shields on the sides of the portable machines would not comply with the height and dimensions spelled out in the new requirements.

Land common topic on council's agenda

Four different actions concerning land in the city will be considered by the city council when it meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

An ordinance will be considered to accept the final plat of Shiloh Four, a strip of land that fronts Johnson Road.

Two property owners are to propose changing the size lots of their original plats.

Verris Wardell is proposing to increase the width of his lots on a block and a half of land north of West Magnolia. Bill Swan will seek to narrow the width of lots he owns in the 700 block of W. Louisa.

And Andy Arrington proposing to trade a five-foot strip of property for a similar strip owned by

The owner of Country View Mobile Home Park, on the east edge of the city, will seek to have his facility rated as an industry, in an effort to lower his minimum monthly water bill. At present, each lot in the park has an individual minimum bill, and the city will be asked to consider the park as a whole for one minimum bill.

City administrator, James Barrington, will ask the council for authorization to seek bids on a fence to be constructed around the sanitation truck garage.

Cook of the Week

Someone has said that preparing food pleasing to the eye and pleasing to the palate can be as satisfying as the artist's creation on canvas, so it is reasonable to assume that the appearance of food is almost as important as its taste.

The recipes shared by Mary (Mrs. William) LaBrier this week certainly sound like they would be pleasing both to the eye and to the palate. Two of her dessert recipes and one salad recipe call for pineapple, a favorite fruit of many Americans. The pineapple, a native of South America and the West Indies, was brought to Hawaii by an Englishman, and it is the second largest (sugar is first) product of our 50th state today.

Mary LaBrier is a native of St. Louis, Mo. and finished high school there at Festus High School. She attended Jefferson College at Hillsboro, Mo. She and her husband, who is a technical consultant for Professional Communications, came to Iowa Park in 1974. She worked for a time at Wichita Falls Computers Service.

BAKED CHICKEN AND RICE

1 cup Uncle Ben's rice (not minu 1/2 frying chicken or four breasts 1/2 pkg. Lipton's dry onion soup 1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 round steak, cut in strips 1 cup beef broth (made from bouillon)

1/4-1/2 cup soy sauce

2 green peppers (cut and sliced)

2 large tomatoes (cut in wedges) Turn strips of steak in flour, then brown in oil in skillet. Drain excess oil; add broth and soy sauce and simmer 10 minutes or until meat is tender. Add green peppers, simmer 5 minutes. Add tomatoes and heat through. Serve on rice.

1-15 oz. can chunky pineapple with

3-4 medium bananas, sliced


The Naomi Sunday School class of Faith Baptist Church met Thursday afternoon in the home of Mrs. John Hopkins with 12 members and two guests present.

Iowa Park School Scene

Homework! It's something many students view as a big annoyance -

something they'd rather forget about and sometimes do. But in reality, it's a very important part of your child's education. It serves a variety of purposes: from providing necessary practice in a skill, to enriching class materials through research.

Students, however, frequently hand in incomplete assignments, incorrectly done assignments, or no assignments at all. Failure to turn in homework is one main reason for low or failing grades for some students. Following are several suggestions which might help students and parents when faced with difficulties dealing with homework.

First of all, it's very important that your child write down the details of each homework assignment. Be sure that your child has some type of booklet or note pad on which to write his/her assignments. He/she should be encouraged to listen carefully when assignments are given and ask for clarification when necessary. Also, if there are subjects in which no assignment was given that day, that should be written in the assignment book, too. Each subject should have something written beside it daily. The assignment book should also show the date each assignment was given.

The assignment book can be used as a checklist for the child as he/she prepares materials to take home at the end of the day and as each assignment is completed at home. The list should come home with the youngster each day after school to be used as a solid reminder of what needs to be completed.

The child should have a regular time each evening to do homework.

It might be helpful to have a schedule that the child helps to develop that includes time not only for homework but also allows for free time activities and chores.

After a time is established, parents and child should decide on a reasonably quiet place for doing the assignments. If possible, this should be away from TV, playing siblings, and active places in the home. If your child keeps all materials and books in the study area, he/she will be less likely to forget anything the next morning when leaving for school.

With a basic organized framework in which to work, it is ultimately up to your child to take the responsibility for completing and handing in assignments on time. It is important to show an interest in what your child is doing and to assist him/her when feasible. But remember, it is a learning and practicing time for the child. Encourage the child to be attentive in class and to ask the teacher if he/she does not understand a concept or an assignment. If these study habits are developed in the child's early school

DIET FOR HYPERTENSION

Some people with hypertension may be able to stop taking their medication if they lose weight and reduce their sodium intake.

According to a multi-center study headed by Dr. Herbert G. Langford of the University of Mississippi Medical Center Jackson, withdrawal from anti-hypertension medication can be done if the patient, who has been taking medication for five years or more, loses about 10 pounds or restricts intake of sodium.

Diet control was all that was needed to keep blood pressure within the normal limits among long-term, mild to moderate hypertensives who were studied in this trial.





Council has busy session (Holliday News

During a lengthy meeting of the Holliday city council held at Erma Barton Auditorium, Mayor Don Duke read a letter of intent to reside in Holliday, controversy developed over the newly-formed Parks and Recreation Board, and members of the Holliday Chapparal Riding Club came forward to discuss the lease agreement between the city and the club that it holds in Stonewall Jackson Park.

When Mayor Duke moved outside the city limits for temporary residence until the Baptist Church he

purchased was ready to house both his business and family, he was required, according to Administrator Brown Hudson, to sign a letter of intent to reside in Holliday in order to maintain his position as mayor.

In his opening remarks, Duke read the letter of intent to reside. It reads as follows: "It has been necessary to temporarily move my residence to Turkey Ranch Road which is outside the City of Holliday. I have negotiated an agreement with the First Baptist Church to purchase their old building. However, the new church building will not be ready for occupancy until March, 1986. It is my intention to continue my residence and business at the old church location as soon as possible."

"My Post Office address remains and will continue to serve as my permanent location. Also, my insurance business continues in the City of Holliiday. It is my intention to continue my residence and business in the City of Holliday by the end of March, or sooner if the old church building should become available."

During the departmental report section of the meeting, Parks and Recreation Board chairman Ken Potts gave the council a report listing the findings and recommendations of the board. Also included in the report were a list of receipts and itemized activities for items, including locks and keys for gates, signs and posts for Girl Scouts, long distance calls, mileage at 25-cents per mile and check-order charge, to name a few, for a total of \$433.66 and showing receipts for only \$140. This, based upon Pat Parker's written statement to the Mayor and Board, stating that these "seem reasonable as justified cost elements in the performance of the Board's activities."

Alderman Elizabeth Gorman protested the statement, pointing out that the board had virtually no receipts for the expenditures that there could have been estimations on some of the costs, and finally, that the board had no authorization from council for expenditures.

Duke stated, "I will take

responsibility for all the expenditures listed." Further stating that there was a misunderstanding when the board was formed, that it was originally formed to do a fact-finding survey. The council then tabled the matter for further study.

Many members of the Holliday Chapparal Riding Club turned out to discuss the lease agreement on land in Stonewall Jackson Park used for the club's arena. The Chapparals, a 90-member club, took out the original lease agreement in 1968, then updated the contract in 1978 to be good for 25 years, stating that the club will pay \$1 per year for the

Larry Cunningham, speaking on behalf of the riding club members, addressed the council concerning it's consideration of renewing the lease with the Holliday Riding Club, stating, "It is our belief that we have a lease already." He said there was never a question about the lease until the Parks and Recreation Board was formed.

He said, "We got word that the new park board was going to tear down the arena. . . that they chained off a road in the park leading to the lease. . . and that a member of the board had asked police to arrest members of the riding club who were on the lease." This apparently stemming from an allegation that the riding club had abandoned the lease, which they stated they had not.

Cunningham further stated, "This is an inept group acting in an inept and illegal fashion. I am against the cavalier way the board handled the situation."

responded Cunningham's remarks saying, "I don't feel that it is anyone's intent to impose a hardship on the club. We need to build things up not tear things down." He added that hearsay wasn't the best way to gather facts.

It was agreed by the council that the actions of the Parks and Recreation board needed to be investigated. Later in the meeting a motion was made by Alderman Jim Virdell to dissolve the board and "start over." However, the council's advisor, David Gorman, suggested further investigation into the legality of dissolving the board.

Both matters were tabled pending the lawyer's review and are expected to be discussed at a called meeting some time next week.

OTHER BUSINESS

The City of Holliday will be required to have constructed new voting booths, according to a law that went into effect Jan. 1. The law states that unscreened tables will no longer be acceptable.

In accordance with the law, the city will need three new booths, the city and county will require 19 booths, together, and the city, school and county will need 24. The council tabled any action in order to look into which method of purchase would be more cost effective.

Aldermen passed an amendment changing payment of water bills from the 25th day of the month to the 15th day in order to get a faster turnover on the money. This includes a \$1 charge on bills payed after the 15th.

Don Brackeen, who is building a new home in Holliday, addressed the council on an ordinance prohibiting the placement of a meter any larger than 3/4-inch on one lot, passed to prevent the overcrowding of structures on a lot. Brackeen told the council that a 3/4-inch meter would not supply an adequate amount of water pressure to his home since the water line would slope uphill from
